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

September Primary underway

Today belongs to the voters - at least the few inspired to go to the polls to vote in local primary contests for state legislators.

With a few hot races and a number of tepid ones with minor candidates challenging incumbents, the turnout nunbers are expected to be low - an advantage to incumbents who have strong local organizations to turn out their supporters.

In the heavily Democratic Bronx, a win in the primary is virtually a win in the November 6 general election.

The switch from the traditional second Tuesday of September to a Thursday after the 9/11 attacks, may also confuse many voters for an even lighter turnout.

The hottest primary contest in the Bronx today has embattled incumbent Assemblywoman Naomi Rivera, dealing with major investigations and scandal, fighting to keep her seat against challenger Mark Gjonaj, a strong, wellfinanced businessman, and two other candidates seen as potential vote drainers in the 80th Assembly District covering Morris Park, Allerton, Pelham Parkway, Pelham Gardens and Norwood.

Borough president launches drive to stop wave of borough shootings

"Be part of the solution." That's the call from Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. over the wave of gun violence that's swept the Bronx this summer.

He's pencilled a September 22 date for the third annual "Peace in our Streets," an anti-gun rally calling attention to several highprofile shootings disturbing the Bronx.

Diaz Jr. will personally take to the streets, knocking on doors todole out anti-gun violence flyers. The borough-wide effort will also be led by the Bronx Clergy Task Force, Community Board 3 and ah, a West African immigrant, Forest Houses Tenant Associa-

tion, the group representing the Morrisania housing complex where 4-year-old Lloyd Morgan was killed.

He was killed back in July after getting caught in the crossfire between two young men. His death sparked calls to end gun violence in the Bronx.

Another child - 2-year-old Trayvon Bunson - also joins a list of shooting victims. The Hunts Point tyke was grazed in the back shoulder on September 6th while being pushed by his mom in a stroller, according to police.

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

Bronx Times co-founder and publisher John Collazzi retires

John Collazzi, a founder and publisher of the Bronx Times Reporter and Bronx Times, has retired after 31 years.

Collazzi founded this paper in 1981 with Michael Benedetto, expanding it from a monthly to a biweekly paper within a few years, and to a weekly in 1989

It was sold to the News Corporation in 2007, with Collazzi presiding over their circulation expansion as they were cross-marketed with the New York Post and Community Newspaper Group.

The paper's new publisher will be longtime executive editor and operations manager Laura Guerriero, who has been with the Bronx Times Reporter for more than two decades.

Former longtime New York Daily News reporter and Bronx bureau chief Bob Kappstatter will be in charge of the day-to-day editorial operation as deputy editor.

Benedetto said that while the idea to start the paper Times Reporter originated with him, Collazzi was the visionary who quickly saw the paper's potential.

" I thought it would be a great idea for the community to have a paper to keep it informed, and I was heavily involved in politics and so was John at that time, and I thought it could benefit me personally," said Benedetto. "John, however, realized right away ... that we should keep it above politics and just report on the news in the community, and like on so many of the early decisions, John was right."

Benedetto said that when he left the paper in 1988 because he felt his election as a district leader would be a conflict of interest, he knew he was leaving the paper in good hands.

By the end of summer 1984, the masthead of the paper listed John Collazzi as both the editor and publisher.

Councilman Jimmy Vacca recalled that he had

written a column for the paper shortly after it was founded, and that many community leaders pitched in to help write stories when it was a smaller operation.

"John was committed to a community newspaper, and if it wasn't for the Bronx Times and for John, a lot of the successful community efforts would not have happened," said Vacca.

Collazzi avoided crime

stories that were flooding newspapers during the 1980s and focused more on people in the community who were making a difference. The paper was kept local, with editions serving Throggs Neck and then Morris Park and surrounding areas. Other parts of the Bronx were added with the launch of the Bronx Times 18 years ago.

Collazzi was also a founding member of the Bronx Chamber of Commerce, where he now serves as a vice-president.

Joseph Kelleher, chairman of the chamber, called Collazzi an "elder statesman" of the board of directors with a vast knowledge of the borough."

"Collazzi is someone who is fantastic consulting with about the Bronx because he knows the businesses, and understands the borough and its political sensitivities," Kelleher said.

Longtime friend, NYPD Assistant Chief Edward Delatorre, said Collazzi "has an incredible sense of concern for the Bronx and the people that live in it - a very genuine concern about the people who live in the Bronx and the quality of life in general."

Under Collazzi's leadership, the successful launch of several new publications associated with the original Bronx Times Reporter and Bronx Times occurred as he

continued on as publisher into the News Corporationera of the paper.

Collazzi brought about the first editions of a Community Newspaper Group insert in the Sunday New

York Post called Bronx Weekly, as well as Bronx-Stats, 25 Bronx Influential Women, and numerous auto, medical, and elder care supplements and publications.

Collazzi has been on the board of directors of Bronx-Net public access television since it began broadcasting ω in 1993, said BronxNet executive director Michael Max **9** Knobbe.

"He is a prime mover in terms of journalism and providing valuable information to the people of the Bronx. " said Knobbe, "and has been a strong guiding force on the BronxNet board in terms of our expanding services and educational training programs, and our growth over the last two decades."

Friends said they expect Collazzi, a former longtime member of Community O Board 10, to continue his work volunteering and sitting on boards in the community.

"I know that John is retiring, but I cannot accept that," said Kelleher. "He will always be my go-to guy."

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Eleven years later

9/11 tragedy felt like it was yesterday

Eleven years after the worst terrorist attack in New York, Bronxites are pausing this week to never forget.

They will gather on the steps of Borough Hall tomorrow for a solemn gathering that pays respects to 156 Bronxites who died on a day that scarred the nation's soul but did not break its spirit.

"A Day of Remembrance" is set for noon on Friday, September 14, hosted by Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. and the Supreme Court of Bronx County.

Several singers will lend their voices while the names of the Bronxites who died on 9/11 will be read.

The event caps a week of ceremonies honoring the men and women who perished on that historical day.

At a ceremony on Tuesday's anniversary of the attacks, dozens shuttled to a tree grove at Jacobi Medical Center.

Mourners, Jacobi staff and elected officials gathered at the 9/11 Memorial Garden there, a circular shrine with two square plaques symbolizing the imprints of Ground Zero.

Each plaque bears the names of 156 people who died in the destruction of 9/11.

Diaz Jr. recalled his close friend Darryl "Pop" McKinney, one of nearly 3000 victims, with whom he often played basketball in Soundview Park in the 90s.

McKinney went on to become a success story, working in the financial district.

"We need to not just mourn but celebrate the lives lost," said Diaz.

A NY Maritime College honor guard opened the solemn ceremony. A woman quietly wept. There was not one smiling face.

Members from the hospital's community advisory board read an inspirational poem entitled "One", reemphasizing a theme of unity stretching back the moment a jetliner hit the first World Trade Center tower. "As the ash fell, we became

one color," read Al D'Angelo.

Deidre Ruddle attended the Jacobi Hospital ceremony for the first time.

A teary-eyed Deidre Ruddle of Morris Park re-lived the terrible day her easy going younger brother David, a union carpenter, perished on the upper floors of Two World Trade Center.

"When the building collapsed it was like I ran into a wall," said Ruddle, who spent days riding past her brother's parked car near a train sta-

would get there. "My brother's remains not even a tooth - have never

not even a tooth - have never been found." Among the first respond-

ers paying respects was 49th Precinct Community Affairs Officer Vic DiPierro, who rushed with his fellow officers to Lower Manhattan eleven years ago.

"On September 11th, I go through each and every minute every year as if it were year one," said DiPierro, who's still reminded of 9/11 the moment a plane passes by.

DiPierro spent hours at the World Trade Center site, sifting through The Pile, working with the Bucket Brigade and simply staring at the magnitude of destruction.

His dedication at the site also gave him thyroid cancer in 2005, a disease he eventually defeated.

"There were a lot of people who weren't so lucky and since died because of September 11," said DiPierro.

The federal government recently added 50 cancers under the James Zadroga Act, which covers the medical costs for anyone who suffered debilitating effects of Ground Zero.

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Study: Rink project could net \$1.3B

The report estimates Σ the ice rink will have a \$1.3 billion impact on the economy.

The project will house nine ice skating rinks and a 5,000-seat arena.

HR&A Advisors, an economic analyst and consultant firm, wrapped up the study in March but released it just this week.

The figures have already been reported to the city's Economic Development Corporation, the agency weighing both projects.

Much of the revenue will come from various sources including rink visits, tax revenue and citywide economic activity, the study states.

About \$42 million of that annual income will come directly from an ice skating rink that's said to rival Manhattan's Madison Square Garden.

Construction of the KNIC will add roughly \$650 million to the ciity's economy, according to the study.

HR&A admits the figures could be underreported since KNIC added a hotel and a sports-themed public school to the mix shortly after the study concluded.

It promises 890 construction jobs in the Bronx and more than 170 permanent jobs that will pay a \$10 "living wage," a big reason why Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. is publicly backing the project.

The job numbers are extremely low compared to Mercado Mirabo's, which promises 1500 Bronx jobs, with 700 construction jobs and 800 permanent positions.

Their's does not promise a living wage, but it does promise a modern-day com-

munity "town square" featuring a 4D movie theater, sports facilities, hip hop museum and community space to host art venues.

Though the study doesn't directly mention Mercado Mirabo, it boasted KNIC will draw folks to already-established local mom-and-pop store, unlike "other proposals."

Diaz Jr. hailed the results of the study, calling KNIC a project that could keep shopping districts like Fordham Road thriving.

"The KNIC proposal is the right choice for the Kingsbridge Armory," Diaz Jr. said. "I urge the city to select KNIC for the future of the Kingsbridge Armory."

Meanwhile, the neighborhood is taking steps to ensure it has input in any project that is approved.

The Kingsbridge Armory Redevelopment Alliance is now demanding both proposals provide health benefits on top of a living wage.

They held a protest on Wednesday in front of the armory demanding each side commit to health coverage.

A judge yesterday ruled the rent hike will be kept on hold while both sides battle it out in court.

The hike, over a fouryear period at the twin towers Mitchel-Lama coop, had been due to go into effect on Saturday, Sept. 1.

But a lawyer for the tenants won a temporary restraining order on September 5.

With both sides back in court on Wednesday, Bronx starte Supreme Court Justice Howard Sherman extended the TRO to at least the next hearing on Friday, September 21.

"We will continue in negotiations with the land-

lord and the city for a fair candidate Mark Gjonaj. and reasonable resolution

Madonna filed for an Article 78 proceeding, used when administrative appeal runs out with the city or state.

The first phase of the rent hike that was due to go into effect on Saturday, September 1, would have seen tenants' rents initially increase by 16 percent, followed by further increases over the next three vears.

Gjonaj said he will continue to help fight for the tenants.

"The battle continues," he said. "We'll continue with the negotiations with the owners, lenders and HPD. Winners never quit and quitters never win. But it looks like we're on good footing."



School is open, yet parents of over one million school age children were denied once again the opportunity to shop for reasonably priced clothing and school supplies at Walmart.

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Art Rapture captures south Bronx art scene

As Manhattan and Brooklyn's art scene continue to be an enclave for wellknown artists, an ambitious movement is budding in the Bronx

Dubbed Art Rapture, the movement aims at turning the Bronx into a Mecca of art by introducing undiscovered artists to the world.

"We created Art Rapture as an artistic fusion," said Frankie Caamano, the brainchild of the movement inspired by a similar project in San Diego, California.

Since March, he and business partner DJ Menyu have supplied artists with a free venue to present their work - in this case the gallery at the Bruckner Bar and Grill in Mott Haven, a nexus for artistic creativity with help from the nabe's gradual gentrification.

performing artists. drumming DJ and a "network of professionals networking."

"There's a renaissance

going on in the Bronx and it work from several unknown needs to be showcased," said Caamano, owner of Oak Hill Realty, a Manhattan-based firm.

"We give an artist the opportunity to make a name for themselves," said Menyu, 37, an English teacher at Spelman High School, who moonlights as a professional disc jockey.

Like Menyu, Caamano sees the borough as "an impetus of talent" overshadowed by a negative image branded by the borough's blight in the 70s.

"We take that concept that the Bronx is Burning and flip it upside," said Caamano. "So the Bronx is booming."

Menyu agreed, adding the movement revives an art scene that once saw the musical birth of hip hop.

"We want to bring that Each gallery shows art, culture back here," said Menyu. "To where it's originally started."

The pair has hosted numerous galleries, featuring Boogie Down artists.

The movement's focal point is its thematic adapta-

For the exhibit set for Saturday, September 22 at 8 p.m., Bronxites will step into the days of Ms. Pac-Man and Reaganomics with "80s Retro."

Local artists Dannv Garcia. Gladys LaFrossia. Desiree Torres and Demostina will put on an 80s pop art exhibit, featuring variations of the famed "Crack is Wack" mural of 1986 or a funky take on President Ronald Reagan's presidential portrait.

Also on hand will be beat boxers -- musical artists who imitate drum tunes with their mouth.

On top of exposure, another selling point for Art Rapture artists is they can take their profits home with them. Artists pay no commission fees, according to Caamano, a major financial hurdle for starving artists.

The medium is certain-

ly intriguing for Caamano, an entrepeneur who admits to living through the artistic acumen of the creators.

"I live through the artist with the work they put on the wall," said Caamano.

capitalistic But his knack has allowed him to streamline several business transactions during gallery openings, including the buy-

ing process for prospective sellers and buyers. He's introduced them to several smartphone apps like PayPal.


"It's like doing a transaction in the street but it's fully secured," said Caamano.

Local community, precinct boards gear up for new year, new issues

It's back to business after summer hiatus for the community boards and precinct community councils in the east Bronx.

Community Boards 10 and 11 will be taking up full slates of business for the final months of this year and into 2013.

Boards 10 will meet on Thursday, September 20, 7:30 p.m. at Providence Rest, 3304 Waterbury Avenue. Board 11 will meet on Thursday, September 20 at 7 p.m. at Lubin Hall, 1200 Van Nest Avenue, Albert Einstein College of Medicine.

Community Board 10's key issues include possible hearings on the new City Island bridge, traffic control for the three major malls planned for the area at Bay Plaza, Whitestone cinema and Brush Avenue, restoring the drug module for the 45th Precinct and dealing with overnight truck parking on local streets.

"All of them are major issues," said district manager Kenneth Kearns. "We're working to develop a traffic plan because when these three major malls go up, I-95 will be a parking lot in that area.

We are working on getting the drug module back because our drug sales have gone up and they are more sophisticated than in any other areas, and the overnight truck parking has become a major problem. Community Board 10 is being turned into a truck parking lot."

Community Board 11 covering Morris Park and surrounding neighborhoods will see a major change in committee structure.

"We used to have geographical committees, now we have changed back to issues committees," said district manager Jeremy Warneke, who believes the new structure could be more effective.

The new format will have committees based on neighborhood issues, such as parks, sanitation, public safety, and youth.

Some of the issues CB 11 will look into will be smokefree housing in more apartment buildings and dealing with the Pelham Parkway reconstruction project.

"Since we are in a tran-

sitional period, we are really still having meetings to see what each committee wants to focus on and what their major concerns are," Warneke said.

Meanwhile, the precinct community councils at the sprawling 45th Precinct running from Throggs Neck to Coop City, and the 49th in Morris Park/Allerton will be keeping watch on local crime and enforcement activity.

Robert Bieder, president of the 45th Precinct Community Council said their major concern this year will be reinstating the local drug module.

Joe Thompson, president of the 49th Precinct Community Council said they will be focusing on five main issues in the next couple of months.

The council hopes to enlarge the safe haven program, become more proactive in areas that concern police activity, continue to support civic organizations fighting against drugs use and gangs, collect more food for the needy during the holiday seasons and continue current crime prevention programming.



Five feet from death

BY KIRSTEN SANCHEZ What does taking five feet away from a 31-foot wide roadway equal?

To the fearful Concerned Citizens for Pelham Parkway South, it could equal death.

Now they're suing the city to have a new unwanted sidewalk torn up that they say dangerously impairs fire engines and other emergency vehicles from getting through.

Their attorney, William Madonna, filed an Article 78 proceeding last week calling for the city to rip up the sidewalk and repave the street.

An Article 78 proceeding is used to appeal the decision of a state or local agency when administrative appeals have failed to correct the situation.

About 100 residents marched south along Pelham Parkway from Williamsbridge Road to Wilson Avenue on Tuesday, September 10 to protest the city Department of Design and Construction's latest answer to their pleas to rip up an unwanted five foot sidewalk added as part of the Pelham Parkway Reconstruction Project and announce the legal action taken.

"We certainly have shown some wisdom when it comes to that sidewalk," said protest leader Dr. David Stevens, a dentist with offices on the service road.

"The sidewalk to nowhere has to go. The median sidewalk in-and-of itself leads pedestrians or bicyclists to dangerous ends," he said. "East to the 'deadman's point or Wilson Avenue is very dangerous if you are attempting to get to Jacobi Hospital, and west to Williamsbridge Road business district. That is the reason that sidewalk is the sidewalk to nowhere."

In June, the DDC issued a statement saying the new sidewalks, running from White Plains Road to a block beyond Williamsbridge Road, comply with city standards and will not be ripped up.

City officials argue that even with narrower streets, FDNY fire trucks can still get through safely.

But opponents, including Community Board 11 and the Uniformed Firefighters Association, disagree.

Besides having to lose already scarce corner parking spaces so the rigs can make tight turns from side streets, the sidewalk makes getting to fires at hi-rise apartments lining the roadway just plain dangerous, they argue.

Their concerns include: tower ladders now have no room to extend their stabilizers to keep them from tipping while trying to reach hi-rise floors, and firefighters can't reach their equipment when compartment doors become wedged in from cars parked on both sides of the narrowed street.

Residents feel their safety concerns have fallen on deaf ears, and have decided to make their voices heard.

Pelham Parkway resident Elio Morales said he feels the road is "just plain unsafe."

"People think it has to do with parking but it's really about the safety of the neighborhood. If someone is getting out of a car or double parks it's going to obstruct fire trucks and plows."

Senator Jeff Klein, a supporter of the Concerned citizens of Pelham Parkway South, also spoke during the rally.

"This is about the safety of our community," Klein said. "DOT and DDC are just being pig headed, they are being bureaucrats. They are not listening to community or the study we did. A fire truck can not get through this narrow street. By spending a couple of extra dollars and making it right will go a long way to the safety of the community."

Councilman Jimmy Vacca agreed. "The DDC did not design this project the way that they were supposed to," Vacca said. "They have no right to call themselves a department of design and construction because they did get what they did right they got it wrong. This was not supposed to be done they way it was done and when all the agencies said they made a 'boo boo' they said 'Oh no, we did it right."

"There is no question that Pelham Parkway needs to be reconstructed," said resident Bob Nolan. "But what doesn't need to be added is sidewalk on Pelham Parkway south which has made it dangerous for residents, drivers, and Fedex and other people who are dropping things off." Organizations involved in the demonstration were Al D'Angelo of the Morris Park Community Association, Pelham Parkway Neighborhood Association, the Pelham Parkway Conservation Committee, and 80th Assembly District challenger Mark Gjonaj.

Egon Erickson, early Bronx athlete

I recall John McNamara telling me a story many years ago about his father courting his mother. His father came from the Canal Street area of Manhattan where he was a well-known pugilist. When he asked for his intended wife's hand in marriage, she said not as long as he continued prize fighting. He made a decision then and there to give up boxing. Instead, he took up running and became rather adept at it, narrowly missing a chance to compete in the Olympics.

He also found a job working on the construction of Immaculate Conception Church being built on Melrose Avenue near where the couple later raised their two sons.

Recalling the story reminds me of a once renowned Bronxite from East 136th Street who actually



did get a chance to compete in the Olympics. Gabby Williams is the current AAU champion stealing newspaper headlines but back in 1909 it was high jumper and runner Egon R. Erickson who reigned supreme with the press. He won the National High Jump championship that year.

Among the organizations he competed for were the New York Athletic Club. Mott Haven Athletic Club, Swedish American Athletic Club, the Irish American Athletic Club and after joining the police department in 1911, the NYPD Athletic League.

He also made it a point to participate in fundraisers including one for

the widows and orphans of members of the Jersey City Police Department held at the Jersey City Baseball Ground in September of 1917. He represented the NYCPD along with other members of his department.

He started competing early and by 1904 at age 16 he had already broken the running broad jump record at a meet held at P. S. 31 here in the Bronx. His family was living on East 136th Street at the time.

He competed in the high jump category in the 1912 Olympic Games in Stockholm, Sweden where he tied for fourth place with Jim Thorpe.

Erickson was born


in Gothenburg, Sweden (where Volvo was founded in 1927) on July 4, 1888. Gothenburg, by the way, is in southwest Sweden not far from Smaland, which is further east and is recalled as the birthplace of Jonas Bronck.

The river that runs down the center of our borough was named for Bronck and the borough gets its name from the river. Erickson came to America in 1891 and became a naturalized United States citizen in 1909. His wife was born here but both of her parents were born in Ireland.

Egon retired from the New York City Police Department in 1939 and passed away on January 20, 1973. He now lies peacefully interred in the St. Martin Section of St. Raymond's Cemetery with his wife Nora who died on November 8, 1973.

was shot to death during a robbery at a Belmont gas station he manned. The 28-year-old is survived by his pregnant wife living at home. Police are now looking for two masked men linked to the shooting.

Can't solve problems using the thinking that created them

Mental Attitude: Think You Are Fat? Researchers found that normal weight teens who perceive themselves as fat are more likely to grow up to be fat. 59% of girls who felt fat as a teen became overweight in adulthood while 31% of girls who did not consider themselves fat during adolescence were found to be overweight. Normal weight girls were more likely than boys to rate themselves as overweight (22% of girls vs. 9% of the boys). One reason for weight gain in later years may be due to psychosocial stress, which can be associated with gaining weight. Under this scenario, the psychosocial stress related to having (or not having) an ideal body type, along with the perception of oneself as overweight, can result in weight gain. Another explanation may be that young people who see themselves as fat often change their eating habits by skipping meals, which can lead to obesity. Also, a diet you can't maintain over time will be counterproductive. as the body tries to maintain the weight you had before you started to diet. - Norwegian University of Science and Technology, July 2012

Health Alert: Depression. It's widely believe that depression is a phenomenon of Western culture, but researchers who analyzed studies involving over 480,000 people across 91 countries have found the opposite is true. They estimate the rate of depression in Middle Eastern and some Asian countries (~9%) is twice that found in countries like the United States and Australia (~4%). - World Health Organization. 2010

Diet: Bad BBQ News! Barbecue can sabotage your waistline. A 20 ounce T-bone steak can weigh in at 1,540 calories, with 124 grams of fat. A cheeseburger has 750 calories and 45 grams of fat. Pork or beef ribs come from the fattiest part of the animal. Healthier options include pork tenderloin, skinless chicken breast, and lean ground beef. - American Heart Association

Exercise: Regular exercise maintains or improves joint flexibility, improves your glucose tolerance and reduces workdays missed due to illness. - Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health, 1996

Chiropractic: Motion and Nutrition. Cartilage is avascular, meaning it does not receive nutrition via blood vessels. Like a sponge, it takes in fluid and releases the fluid when compression is applied. This alternating compression and re-expansion allows it to receive its supply of nutrients and remove metabolic waste. - Arthritis & Rheumatism, 1984

Wellness/Prevention: Lose To Gain? People who are overweight or obese could gain ten years worth of health benefits by simply losing 20 pounds. Modest weight loss (average 14 lbs) reduced the risk of individuals developing Type 2 diabetes by 58%. Weight loss of just 10% of a person's body weight has been shown to have longterm impact on sleep apnea, hypertension, quality of life, and to slow the decline in mobility that occurs as people age. - American Psychological Association, July 2012

Mental Attitude: Feeling Sleepy? One third of all workers sleep less than six hours each day, instead of the recommended 7-9 hours. People at risk of not getting enough sleep include those in the health care, social assistance, and transportation fields. - CDC, June 2012

Health Alert: Cancer and Aging. Why does our risk of developing cancer increase as we age? By the time we stop growing in our teens, we accumulate a large percentage of the mutations we will have during our lifetime. There's a mismatch between the mutation curve and the cancer curve, meaning that if cancer is caused by reaching a tipping point of mutations, then we should see higher cancer rates in 20-vear-olds, as this is when the mutation rate is highest. The body's healthy cells function best in healthy, younger tissue: however, in older tissue, cancerous cells may adapt better in that environment than healthy cells and more easily propagate. - Oncogene, June 2012

Diet: "The obesity cri-

sis is made worse by the way industry formulates and markets its products, and so must be regulated to prevent excesses and to protect the public good," writes Kelly Brownell, a leading food expert. He argues that left to regulate itself, the food industry has the opportunity, if not the mandate from shareholders, to sell more products irrespective of their impact on consumers. Thus, government, foundations, and other

powerful institutions should push for regulation of, and not collaboration with, the food industry. - PLoS Medicine, July 2012

Exercise: Exercise reduces your risk of developing Type II (non-insulindependent) diabetes, reduces the risk of developing breast cancer and improves mental cognition (a short-term effect only). - Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health, 1996

Chiropractic: Joint **Friction?** The supplement chondroitin sulfate significantly reduces the friction coefficient of articular cartilage, which, in turn, leads to a decreased risk of joint degeneration. - Journal of Biomechanics, 2007

Wellness/Prevention: Vitamin D, Fractures: Taking 800-2,000 IUs of vitamin D per day significantly reduces the risk of most fractures in men and women age 65 and older. In a study, the top 25% of Vitamin D consumers sustained 30% fewer hip fractures and 14% fewer fractures of other bones. There was no benefit to taking Vitamin D in doses below 800 m IUs. The cost of treating a hip fracture is \$26,912. - New England Journal of Medicine, June 2012

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
