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BRONX SHELTER NIXED

Comptroller Liu rejects proposed contract

City Hall and city Comptroller John Liu were in a war of words last week over Liu rejecting a contract for a controversial proposed homeless shelter at a former Army Reserve center in the north Bronx.

Liu charged "possible fraud" in rejecting a \$91 million, 21-year contract with the Doe Fund for the men's shelter at the former Muller Army Reserve Center in Wakefield.

The local community has long complained that it is already oversaturated with homeless facilities, while Liu and borough officials raised serious questions about the Bloomberg's overall homeless shelter policy.

Liu particularly cited procedural issues, involving whether a

proper vote was taken of the Wakefield contract by the city's Local Re-development Authority.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development was seeking approval from the LRA - comprised of Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. and Deputy Mayors Robert Steel and Linda Gibbs - to convert the former reserve center at 555 Ne-reid Ave. into a 200-bed homeless shelter.

The Bloomberg administration has maintained that a legitimate vote of the LRA took place in Nov. 2010, but Diaz has argued that it was only an informal meeting to discuss approving or denying the plan for a homeless shelter.

"Time and again since Mayor Bloomberg took office, serious

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Bronx borough blizzard a fizzle

What blizzard?

Despite dire warnings from forecasters and the media, the winter storm that blew in to the borough and rest of the city last weekend was pretty much a dud as far as blizzards go.

It dumped about a foot of snow, with a major city response, helped by rain and warm temps, to make it more of a weekend wonderland for kids.

The digout began one day after Winter Storm Nemo roared into the Bronx, with neighbors excavating their cars and driveways, removing mounds of snow.

They certainly hunkered down when Nemo reached maximum strength during the early morning hours of Feb. 8, heeding the warning from Mayor Bloomberg who called Nemo the perfect time to "cook a meal, stay home, read a good book,

watch a movie, just take it easy."

But the day after, homeowners from Throggs Neck to Kingsbridge began shoveling and plowing their way out of the snow.

Boroughwide, an army of Department of Sanitation crews worked round the clock to clear high-priority streets, utilizing salt spreaders and frontend loaders.

The City's Strongest was certainly ready this time compared to the blizzard of 2010 when crews were blamed for the slow cleanup process that forced Bronxites to abandon their cars in the middle of streets.

But the timely cleanup this time around allowed kids to get out of the house to bask in the winter wonderland, schlepping to Pelham Bay Park for a day of sledding last weekend.

Crowds of thrillseekers skidded down the hills of Crotona Park where city

Park's Department staffers doled out warm cocoa. The amount of snow was enough for families to square off in snowball fights, build snowmen, or plop themselves on the ground to create a family of snow angels.

But some young entrepreneurs saw the white stuff as white gold, venturing out with a shovel in hand to dig out their neighbors driveways for some pocket money.

By Feb. 11 the streets were passable thanks to a daylong rainstorm, turning much of the remaining snow into slush.

Calm before the storm

Hours before the storm made landfall in the Bronx, city agencies prepped for the big storm.

While Metro-North service was scaled back, institutions like the Bronx Zoo and Botanical Garden closed early.

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Fordham Plaza Reconstruction Project Set For Spring

If you think Fordham Road is a traffic mess, you haven't seen anything yet.

The city will start a major reconstruction project next month at the busy thoroughfare prone to risky jaywalkers, speeding taxis and lumbering buses.

The seven-phase project, part of the city's PlaNYC traffic initiative, will first tweak traffic patterns around two square blocks along E. Fordham Rd. comprised of E. 188th and 189th streets and Park, Third and Webster avenues.

By late 2014 new street lighting, sewer systems, traffic signals, modern bus shelters and trees will pepper the Fordham area.

The overall aim of the project by the city Department of Design & Construction is to ease traffic conditions for

people traveling through the zone that is home to Fordham University and the Fordham Plaza marketplace.

"All this is done to improve the traffic flow in and around Fordham plaza," DDC community liaison Jonathan Conte told the Community Board 6 transportation committee Feb. 7.

He added that several heavily used buses, namely the 55, 17, 12 and Special Bus Service 12, will be rerouted around the construction work.

Major changes

Permanent roadway changes include:

- Turning 189th St. between Third and Webster avenues into a west-bound one-way street
- Creating a bus loop on Third Ave for the MTA bus depot area by Fordham Plaza
- The demapping of Park Ave. between 188th and 189th streets
- Cars on East Ford-

ham Road and 189th Street will be barred except for buses and emergency vehicles

Initially, much of the work will divert traffic to certain portions of the square block, making it tough to maneuver around the area.

"traffic nightmare"

"This is going to be a traffic nightmare," groused neighbor Jose Badilla Jr., worried about Webster Avenue becoming a virtual parking lot for cars forced to pack the road while each phase cuts off traffic.

Traffic agents will be on hand from 7 a.m. 7 p.m. throughout the project as it gets underway.

"There's no traffic at seven in the morning," said Wilma Alonso, head of the Fordham Road Business Improvement District. "That's too early."

To speed up the project, the DDC contractor

filed a 24-hour permit to work round the clock.

Daytime work (6 a.m. to 6 p.m.) will be take up less space compared to nighttime work (9 p.m.

to 6 a.m.), which will bring out heavy equipment to a relatively desolate area, said Conte.

He did warn "certain operations will be

noisy."

With the city still weighing between a fancy ice skating rink and a retail/entertainment complex, Ruben'll have to be satisfied with listing his accomplishments and outlining his goals for the coming year.

And we DO give him credit for moving the Bronx forward, despite it's overwhelming poverty, high unemployment and major health problems.

VOTE BOARD CHAOS

As if the city's Board of Elections didn't have enough *tsuris* with voting machines, etc., a takeover coup by the City Council's Republican minority has everyone there shaking in their boots.

J.C. Polanco, the Bronx GOP commissioner to the board and its former board president, has already submitted a *pro forma* resignation letter, if it should come to that.

It all stems from possibly up to eight Republican and Democratic county leaders allegedly failing to file on time with the City Council their nominations for commissioners to the equally-divided ten-member board (We're told the Bronx met the deadline).

That technically allows the four Republican councilmembers, headed by Council Minority Leader **James Oddo** of Staten Island, to step in and grab board control by naming their own set of commissioners. - which they already did in Queens and Brooklyn.

We're still trying to wrap our head around all the details and implications - as are a number of savvy political types and board workers- in what could become a BIG TIME shakeup at the patronage-laden board. Creds to Daily Newser **Celeste Katz**, by the way, for breaking the story.

The Queens GOP organization has already gone to court over the issue.

At the moment, Bronx Republican **Dawn Sandow** is holding down the fort at the board as deputy director while Manhattan Dem Boss **Keith Wright** wrangles with his board commissioner **Gregory Soumas** over clearing the way for Bronx Dem Commissioner **Naomi Barrera** to fill the long vacant executive director's \$172,753 job.

"Right now, they're trying to get order restored at the board," said a Democratic insider. "We just have to wait and see what happens with these Republicans."

Having lived in public housing most of his life, Ritchie has secured repairs for hundreds

of tenants in both public and private developments, including numerous buildings in the Van Nest and Pelham Parkway North naves within the 15th.

We're told he'll be filing for an official campaign committee shortly, paving the way for a fundraiser in early March headlined by Vacca, Assemblyman **Mike Benedetto** and Assemblyman **Mark Gjonaj**.

Within minutes progress was being made and the main body of fire was knocked down. Before 3 a.m. the incident was declared under control.

THURS, JAN. 24th, 7:00 p.m. — 1258 Hobart Ave. A fire damaged a three story dwelling in the Throggs Neck section near Waterbury Ave. Despite a delay caused by a frozen fire hydrant, engine crews were able to contain the flames and quickly extinguish the flames. Fire Marshals were requested to looking into the incident since there was indication of how the fire started.

THURS, JAN. 24th, 10:30 p.m. — 640 Mead St. A fire was reported in the Van Nest community. Firefighters from the White Plains station were the first to arrive at the fire which was near Unionport Rd. The blaze was spreading within a two-story frame dwelling. Officials reported that flames were already on the 1st and 2nd floors. At 10:4 Battalion 18 requested an additional engine and ladder company to respond. Firefighters were able to make quick progress as they advanced hose lines on each floor extinguishing all the flames. By 11:15 p.m. the fire was declared under control.

SAT, JAN. 26th, 2:20 p.m. — 3255 Parkside Pl. Firefighters from several stations responded to a reported fire in the Norwood community near Webster Ave. The fire was reported in a five story apartment house in an apartment on the 5th floor. As hose lines were being placed into operation, the blaze was already spreading and heading into the cockloft. The incident commander requested an additional engine company and also an additional ladder company. After sizing up the situation, Division 7 ordered the transmission of a second alarm. The chief also requested two additional ladder companies to respond. Four hose lines were stretched by the engine crews with water flowing through three of the hose lines. At 3:20 p.m., the incident commander indicated that the fire was contained.

Council pork

Dear editor,

Once again, New York City Council Speaker Christine Quinn has removed the veil of her Manhattan liberal independent reformer image to reveal that she is a seasoned Democratic Party machine leader. To the victor goes the spoils is practiced by Quinn just like former Council Speakers Gifford Miller, Peter Vallone Sr. and the late Tom Cuite of Brooklyn.

On January 18, 2010, Speaker Quinn announced her appointments of various Council committee chairpersons. Councilmembers loyal to their respective county organizations (the ones that endorsed her candidacy for Speaker) were rewarded with salary increases known as lulus ranging from \$4,000 to \$28,000 to chair Council committees. Hard working municipal civil servant employees and most ordinary New Yorkers would never see such treats from their respective employers.

Under Speaker Quinn's reign, it continues to be the usual political quid pro quo with councilmembers. Vote as instructed by the Speaker and members will continue to receive the perks of office. These include the salary bonuses for chairing Council committees, extra cash for local district offices, staff and mailings along with your share of several hundred million dollars available for funding local neighborhood pork-barrel projects to grease the wheels of re-election.

Council members have staff to drive them around town and private parking privileges at City Hall. How many ever considered using mass transit for commuting to work like millions of their constituents do daily? Do any Council members have a Metro Card and use it regularly? Check out the City Hall parking lot when the Council is in session and see. Quinn continues the tradition of allocating millions of dollars in member item pork barrel projects to her Council favorites.

With 8% of New Yorkers still out of work, another 7% who have given up looking, along with many others working part time and/or for minimum wage, there are many public minded citizens besides the current 51 Council members with the knowledge and wisdom to perform their jobs at a fraction of the cost.

Many would gladly serve and show up for

work full time without the perks of office for \$112,000 per year minus all the traditional lulus or other benefits ordinary citizens can only dream about. There is a clear appearance of a serious conflict of interest with Quinn running for Mayor in 2013. Will she be rewarding those loyal Councilmembers with lulus in exchange for their support of her Mayoral campaign? Ditto when Quinn will be issuing the remaining 50% balance of lulus in July 2013.

This conflict of interest is even worse when the new City municipal budget is adopted on July 1, 2013. Will Quinn "steer" the bulk of several hundred million dollars worth of member item pork barrel projects she controls to the same loyal Councilmembers and recipients of earmarks who by coincidence will be supporting her in the Democratic Mayoral Primary?

All of these lulus and member item pork barrel projects are paid by your hard earned tax dollars. The five county Democratic political bosses don't care if you are liberal or conservative, gay or straight, man or woman — just play ball like Speaker Quinn and you're welcome to the smoke-filled clubhouse back rooms!

Like past Speakers Miller and Vallone Sr., Quinn believes she is qualified to become Mayor. On Primary Day, the voters may tell Quinn no thanks just like they did for Miller and Vallone.

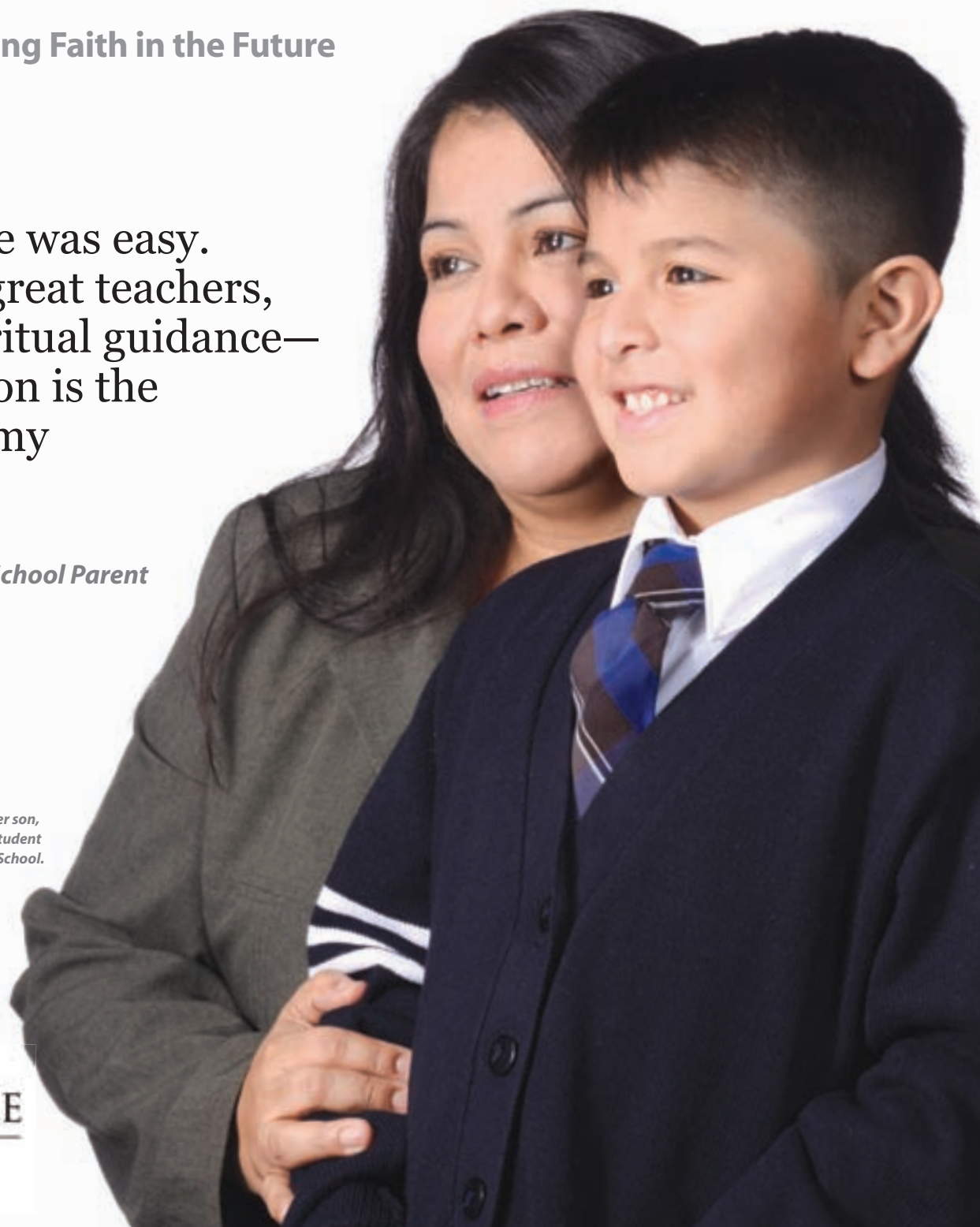

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Fencing with absentee builder

With the national housing market picking up and more buildings likely to be built or finished in his east Bronx district, local City Councilman Jimmy Vacca said he is stepping up his vigilance of inactive worksites.

The biggest recent case in point, a collapsed worksite fence around a home construction site in Throggs Neck that he recently got the city to fix.

"I think we have to be vigilant once again and check all of the building department applications and make sure that the zoning is obeyed," said Vacca.

Neighbors expressed concern to Vacca's office about the fence that collapsed at 817 Hollywood Ave.

The collapse left wooden boards strewn

on the outskirts of a large parcel of land with an unfinished building that had been under construction before work stopped several years ago.

Vacca said he had been monitoring the site prior to the reports of the fence collapse, since the original plans on a two-family house being built there did not comply with the area downzoning's parking requirements.

Vacca and others helped put the requirements in place in the area between 2004 and 2006.

"All the boards have fallen," said Vacca, shortly before he alerted the Department of Housing Preservation and Development, which hired a contractor to complete emergency work in late-January.

"It is a complete mess and I have asked the city to go and restore the boards and give the owner the bill," said Vacca.

Department of Buildings records show more than \$25,000 in unpaid

fines and a stop work order in place because of the fines.

Some of the violations include "lack of protection for the public or property during excavation activities," and a Nov. 26, 2012 complaint

for failure to maintain the collapsed job fence.

According to DOB records, the owner is listed as Joseph Noriega Sr., with only a P.O. Box as a contact for him on several documents. He could not be reached

for comment as of press time.

Community Board 10 chairman John Marano who lives nearby said he was glad to see the property re-secured.

"This has been an eyesore for the longest time," said Marano. "I would like the owner of the property to take responsibility if he ran out of money, or whatever the reason may be."

Marano said that in such cases, the DOB and the banks, who may hold mortgages, must work to make sure fines are paid and that work can proceed.

"If they are not going to rebuild it and not finish it, they should make it safe for the people who live around it," he said.

"Who would want to live next door to an abandoned property?"

Future of E. Tremont's Mande again unclear

East Bronx elected officials and community leaders are keeping a wary eye on Mande.

The future of the Throggs Neck clothing retailer appears to be up in the air as its parent company, Big M, recently re-filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection.

Jeff Resnick, who owns the property at 3860 E. Tremont Ave. at the Cross Bronx Expressway, said in an e-mail that the company cited the damage and disruption in commerce caused by Superstorm Sandy as its reason for re-filing.

Mande has continued operations for the time being, but Resnick indicated they may be looking to downsize the store, with plans for the location once again "up in the air."

"They have told me that their current business plan calls for a much smaller store, so I believe

they would like to operate in half the space," stated Resnick. "We are currently trying to find someone who might want to use half the space, or 7,500 square feet. However at this moment uncertainty abounds and they might give up this location."

The entire property, at 15,000 square feet, is now being listed by Welco Realty as being for available for lease.

Mande, which has been at the location for about 28 years, recently completed major renovations to the facade and parking lot, said Resnick.

"The renovations at 3860 E. Tremont Avenue have been completed in total... the face of the store looks wonderful and the parking lot is repaired," he said.

Councilman Jimmy Vacca said he was concerned that having any vacant store of its size would

be an eyesore.

"Mande has been here for years, and it was only several months ago that they made a commitment to stay in Throggs Neck."

In late 2011, it appeared that the location might close as other Mande stores were shuttered, but a spokeswoman for Big M said in June 2012 that they planned to stay at that location and renovate and modernize the building, which had previously been a supermarket.

Whatever the fate of Mande, bankruptcy re-organization is often a good thing for many companies, said Steven Kaufman, president of the Throggs Neck Merchants Association.

"It is not necessarily a bad thing, because it will allow them to shed their debts and come out clean, and lean and mean," he said. "We don't know what the final play will be."

Lehman hearing on Feb. 26; Clinton also on Feb. 21

For all parents and community members who are interested in education at Lehman High School, this meeting is for you.

They are being invited to give testimony at a public hearing later this month about the city Department of Education's proposed phase-out, or gradual closure over the next three years, of the large, comprehensive high school.

The hearing will be at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 26 at the school at 3000 E. Tremont Ave.

Department of Education officials will be on hand to listen to feedback from the public on the possible effect the phase-out of Lehman, and the co-location of three new smaller schools in the building, would have on

the school community. Those wishing to speak at the "Joint Public Hearing" need to register online at savelehmanhs.eventbrite.com by Wednesday, Feb. 20, said James Rodriguez, coordinator of student activities at Lehman.

"Essentially we have a revisit to last year," said Rodriguez. "The future of the high school is in doubt, so much so, that we are now going through a series of public hearings."

Rodriguez said he feels the situation is similar to last year's when the DOE proposed a "turnaround" of the school - which could have led to the furloughing half the staff. That move was ultimately defeated, along with similar proposals for 23 other city schools, by legal action

by the United Federation of Teachers and Council of Supervisors and Administrators.

"I want to highlight the achievements of these students," said Rodriguez, who cited examples of Model UN and students competing for prestigious scholarships.

Meanwhile, another hearing will be held at DeWitt Clinton High School at 6 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 21 on a DOE proposal to open two new district high schools in Clinton's building at 100 West Mosholu Parkway South, and to reduce Clinton's enrollment to roughly 2,210-2,250 students by the 2016-17 academic year.

Currently, about 3,600 students are enrolled at DeWitt Clinton, according to DOE data.

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Protests planned against strip club

Charge the West Farms club has more brass than its pole

Protests are in the works over a West Farms building that's been home to several floozy clubs in recent years.

The latest incarnation is Divas Gentlemen's Lounge, which held its grand opening Jan. 11 and is now in the crosshairs of community leaders intent of driving them out of business.

Several demonstrations will take place during high turnout weekends, said Assemblyman Luis Sepulveda.

"We're going to mobilize the community so much it's going to make them go away," said Sepulveda, living just blocks from the night spot just on the tip of the Sheridan Expressway.

Schools, a post office and several private buildings pepper the area, considered a high-crime area, according to Community Board 6.

The club, opened daily, boasts 25 nightly dancers, a VIP lounge and live music, according to its Facebook page. Latin music station Mega 97.9 is expected to DJ on Thursdays.

MD3 Inc. is the firm behind Divas, once the site of the MD3-operated

Luxury Box, a seedy bar featuring bikini-clad women working the pole. The club closed late last year to open as Divas this month. Ten years before, the nightclub was dubbed Smitty's, which eventually closed after issues with

"If this was in the upper east side they wouldn't allow these kinds of establishments," said Sepulveda.

In November 2010, Luxury Box was granted a liquor license by the State Liquor Authority, a move Community Board 6 and local 48th Precinct strongly opposed. Dissenting letters were sent to SLA, but they went unanswered.

SLA later admitted to overlooking the letters after seeing it wasn't scanned into a file that would have sent the application to a three-member panel weighing the case.

When reports of brawls, illegal parking and pounding music arose, opposition for a license renewal jumped, with CB6 leading the charge.

"They claim that it's a gentleman's club, that it's not going to draw the wrong crowd," said CB6 District Manager Ivine

Galarza. "But it is."

In November last year, CB6 met with owner and his attorney Martin Mehler over the club's plan to renew its license.

"I asked the owner would you want one of these in your community and it was dead silence,"

said Sepulveda, who attended the meeting.

But despite letters from Community Board 6, the Four-Eight and city lawmakers to SLA, owners were granted a license.

Galarza soon sent a letter to SLA, explain-

ing the community was shocked over the license renewal despite "reports of criminal activity in and around the lounge."

Bill Crowley, a spokesman for SLA, said complaints usually do not warrant a license denial. He added it often is eas-

ier for a club to keep its license than if it were to first file for one.

But as demonstrations continue, CB6 promises to keep an eye on any developments.

"Any rule they break we'll use against them," said Galarza.

"He said, 'there's an opening for chair of the Veterans Affairs Committee. Are you interested?'" said Benedetto. "I said 'yes, of course.'"

Benedetto has since settled into his new role, first convening a Feb. 5 sit-down with his 18-member panel.

"They all realize the importance of our veterans," said Benedetto, speaking at his Throggs Neck office, where a book on D-Day rests on his bookshelf.

Sitting on the committee holds a special meaning for Benedetto, who hails from a family of veterans. He also hails from an assembly dis-

trict that's home to the most veteran's posts than any other part of the borough. It's made holidays like Memorial Day no day at the beach.

"I will literally spend the entire day going from event to event to event," said Benedetto.

In chairing the committee, Benedetto will help shape veteran-related bills before they hit the Assembly floor, vetting their overall benefits to former servicemen and women. Albany already earmarks \$17.5 million to the Department of Veterans Affairs for services such as counseling.

The Bronx is home to 50,000 veterans from wars old and recent. And while some have managed to integrate back into normal life, other veterans have been unable to cope, contributing to a rise in unemployment and homelessness.

Benedetto said he intends to address those issues by convening hearings that can "guide the legislature for new ideas for new bills."

He also plans to publicize all state entitlement benefits for veterans by including a web link to the

Department of Veterans Affairs home page on his own Assembly web page.

He's already thrown his support behind the "Jobs for Heroes" bill by Senator Jeff Klein, giving tax credits to small businesses that hire vets discharged after 9/11.

His chairmanship is already viewed as advantageous for Benedetto's 82nd Assembly District, boasting eight veteran posts from Co-op City to Silver Beach.

Among those glad to hear about Benedetto's new committee chairmanship is Pat Devine, a well known Bronx veterans advocate who chairs the Rehabilitation committee at the Manhattan and Bronx Veterans Hospital.

"This is going to be a big plus knowing we have a friend in Albany," he said, already spreading the word on Benedetto's chairmanship.

Klein backs veteran jobs bill

proposal aims to cut veteran jobless rate

Veterans are moving from the frontlines to the unemployment line at an alarming rate in the Bronx.

But a bill, co-sponsored by a Bronx legislator and recently introduced in Albany could inspire small business owners to hire down-on-their-luck veterans.

It's called the "Jobs for Heroes" bill, offering tax credits upwards to \$15,000 to small time merchants who hire veterans from post-9/11 conflicts.

Sen. Jeff Klein co-sponsored the bill, hoping to put a dent on the 10.7% jobless rate among veterans, higher than the national

jobless rate.

The proposed measure also hopes to spur job creation, an incentive Bronx plumbing supply company owner Bob Bieder backs.

"When you're looking to hire someone, hire a veteran," said Bieder, who's now seeking veterans to fill two entry-level posts. "You can't go wrong."

But advertising a job solely for veterans is illegal, according to federal discrimination laws. Bieder thinks one way around that is to simply call Veterans Administration offices asking for recommendations.

The bill is now in committee, waiting to be discussed before the Senate floor.

He knew that, but decided to address only the need to pay sick workers this noteworthy benefit, hoping that no one would notice how he conveniently ignored the truth.

So where does he stand on the issue of small business fines? No one really knows, because he has conveniently straddled the issue.

And, if he's not clear on this issue, will we ever really know where he stands on issues like taxation, homelessness, housing, public safety or economic development?

Leaders take consistent positions, and if DeBlasio wants to lead this great city, he has to do better than this.

This actually is a tongue-in-cheek story.

Relics believed by Catholic worshippers to be part of the skin from the cheek and two ribs of an Italian saint who founded the Franciscan order are heading to the Bronx.

The relics of St. Anthony of Padua are making the journey from Italy as part of a mission of Franciscan Friars Mario Conte and Ciprian Sava. Conte is the editor of The Messenger, a Franciscan magazine. Sava is the editor of the Romanian edition of the same publication.

The friars are coming to the tri-state area in honor of the 750th anniversary of the discovery of St. Anthony's relics by St. Bonaventure. The relics, normally housed in the Pontifical Basilica of Saint Anthony in Padova, Italy, also include what worshippers be-

said Pope Benedict XVI. "By inviting us to venerate the mortal remains of

the martyrs and saints, the church does not forget that, in the end, these

are indeed just human bones, but they are bones that belonged to individuals touched by the living power of God."

St. Adalbert's was chosen to display the relics because it is part of a Franciscan Friary that runs the St. Anthony Shelter, a six-story homeless shelter and soup kitchen, said Tom Miscatello, of the Franciscan Friars of the Athonian Association & Messenger of St. Anthony in Elmhurst, Queens.

"They were greatly pleased to know that they were going to a place where St. Anthony's name was part of homeless shelter," he said of Conte and Sava.

As part of the veneration service, there will be a holy mass, as well as a presentation of a biblical passion play "dialogue" between St. Anthony and a tyrant called Ezzelino, he said.

The cheek skin relic will be in a gold bust of St. Anthony, and the "floating" or upper, front-ribs, should be displayed correctly on the altar. Those in attendance will not only be able to observe but possibly also be able to touch the relics.

"We all know that they are simply a fossilized part of Anthony's body, but at the same time, they are a concrete bridge, a link of love, between you and St. Anthony," said Conte.

Amidst all of the bad news as of late concerning the passing of the great, three-term, one hundred fifth Mayor of the City of New York, Edward Irving Koch; the wrath of an epic snowstorm and the dire conditions that remained in its wake; and this morning's news from the Vatican that Pope Benedict XVI has decided to become the first Pope to resign from office in nearly six centuries, it is somewhat understandable that perhaps a bit of very important good news would appear to have gone unnoticed and by the boards. Overlooked and disregarded as it might have been, though, this information was as profound in its effect as its announcement was greeted with enthusiasm. In a decisive action that rapped the knuckles of the Bloomberg Administration and encouraged the residents of Community Board 12, the Comptroller of the City of New York, The Honorable John C. Liu, announced on Thursday morning, February 7 that his office was rejecting a contract in the amount of some ninety-one million dollars to operate a homeless shelter for 200 men in the now shuttered Sargeant Joseph E. Muller United States Army Reserve Center (M.U.S.A.R.C.) located at 555 East 238TH Street/Nereid Avenue in Bronx Community District #12. The homeless facility was slated to be operated by THE DOE FUND, INCORPORATED, a 501(c)3 tax-exempt organization headquartered in Manhattan, whose Founder and President, Mr. George A. McDonald, is a candidate in the upcoming Republican Primary for Mayor.

In refusing to certify the contract between the New York City Department of Homeless Services (N.Y.C.D.H.S.) and Mr. McDonald's outfit, Comptroller Liu cited as his rationale for so acting the failure of the City of New York to adhere to the process delineated in Federal Law governing the transfer of closing United States military bases to local jurisdictions for projects designed to assist homeless persons. In other words, the Comptroller was upholding and agreeing with the long-standing assertion of The Honorable Ruben Diaz, Jr.,

Borough President of The Bronx, that no properly and legitimately convoked meeting of the Local Redevelopment Authority (L.R.A.), the body constituted and empowered by Federal legislation to determine the future use of decommissioned bases, ever took place. Borough President Diaz, along with Deputy Mayor for Health and Human Services Linda I. Gibbs and Mr. Tokumbo Shobowale, the Chief of Staff to Deputy Mayor for Economic Development Robert K. Steel, comprised the L.R.A., whose meetings required a quorum of all three (3) aforesaid members in order to meet and to take action. The Bloomberg Administration's two (2) L.R.A. appointees maintained that a duly-constituted meeting did take place at which it was voted to turn the Muller Center over to THE DOE FUND. Borough President Diaz vehemently denied this, having specifically stated that any gathering with Deputy Mayor Gibbs and Mr. Shobowale was informal in nature only and solely for the purpose of airing differences on the disposition of the M.U.S.A.R.C. Indeed, no agenda was formulated for this gathering and no minutes were either recorded or printed. Moreover, it was months after the three (3) public officials unofficially met off the record that the Bloomberg folks curiously and abruptly came up with the claim that a bona fide meeting and decision had taken place. Comptroller Liu's investigation of this matter failed to produce any solid evidence to support the City's contention.

Community Board 12 and its Wakefield neighborhood specifically have been threatened in the past year with a homeless colony consisting of four (4) facilities in close proximity to each other. If all four (4) facilities were to be opened, Wakefield would be burdened with several hundred homeless individuals, many of whom are afflicted with alcohol and chemical dependencies and/or mental health issues. Fortunately, a few months ago, after negotiation with Community Board 12, Department of Homeless Services Commissioner Seth Diamond announced that he would not open a shelter on White Plains Road at East 240TH

Street in an apartment complex constructed and owned by developer Mark Stagg and his STAGG GROUP. Comptroller Liu's action, taken at the behest and in support of the Borough President of The Bronx, holds open the prospect, even if at least temporarily, that only two facilities housing the homeless will be

opened in Wakefield. The Comptroller's refusal to certify the contract with THE DOE FUND can, and will most probably, be brought by Mayor Bloomberg and his Corporation Counsel to court, where Mr. Liu's can either be upheld in his determination or ordered by the Judiciary to certify the contract. Let us hope that the Judge who hears the case is as forthright as our Borough President in standing for the truth and as courageous as Comptroller Liu in standing up to the Bloomberg Administration for its perfidious

and fraudulent manner of undertaking what is supposed to be the PEOPLE'S business.

Our accolades and appreciation go wholeheartedly to Messrs. Diaz and Liu for coming together as an effective and valiant tag-team for the hard-working, honest taxpayers of Community Board #12 (The Bronx). If legal action is to be initiated at this juncture, perhaps it should be to uncover whether or not any Federal statutes were violated by the knowingly bogus and patently counterfeit claims made by officials of

the Bloomberg Administration in order to secure possession of the Muller Center for the City of New York in breach of a process required by Federal law. Such would be a much more pertinent and apropos recourse to the courts on this topic. Perhaps prior to leaving office at the conclusion of this year, Mayor Bloomberg and friends need to learn that not telling the truth is not only disreputable and dishonest, but also unlawful and illegal.

Until next time, that is it for this time!



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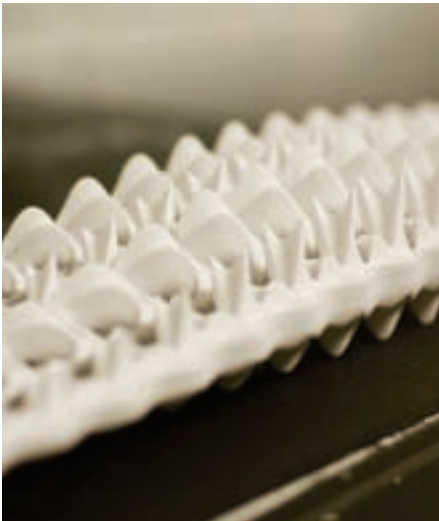
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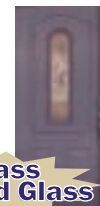
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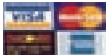

New York Botanical Garden Orchid Show

Beginning March 2, The Orchid Show dramatically transforms The New York Botanical Garden's landmark Enid A. Haupt Conservatory into a lush rain forest. Each year, the eagerly anticipated exhibition displays thousands of orchids in the country's largest curated show featuring orchids. This year, the exhibition is designed by the Botanical Garden's own Francisca Coelho, Vivian and Edward Merrin Vice President for Glasshouses and Exhibitions.

In a local nod to how many orchids grow in the wild, trees that fell in the Garden's Thain Family Forest during Hurricane Sandy will be incorporated

into the show as a design element. Nearly 300 of the Garden's specimen trees were either uprooted or otherwise destroyed. Some will be recycled to be used as replicas for tropical rain forest trees that will be laden with epiphytic orchids and other tree-dwelling plants. (Epiphytic plants grow upon other plants, using the stems and branches of these plants solely for support.)

Upon entering the Seasonal Exhibition Galleries in the Garden's Victorian-style glasshouse—the largest of its kind in the country—visitors first encounter a stand of giant bamboos immersed in a sea of mist that camouflages the entrance to this exotic world. Tall canopy palms, ferns,

and tropical trees support woody vines that crisscross from trunk to trunk, arching downward with their precious burden of fascinating flora. Orchids, aroids, ferns, bromeliads, and epiphytic cacti are among the species that hang nonchalantly overhead. Costus, Calathea (prayer plants), Cymbidium (Asian corsage orchids), Philodendron, and bananas, with their impressive foliage and inflorescences, grapple across the forest floor competing for every available inch of space.

In the main feature of the display, rocky outcroppings dominate, large palms protrude, and orchids thrive alongside ferns and aroids. A large pool in the center

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is fed by waterfalls. Two large canopy trees barren of leaves, dripping with Spanish moss and full of epiphytes, hang over the pool. Natural arbors saturated with vandas (rainbow orchids) and dendrobiums (cane orchids) nestled between Davallia and Asplenium ferns line the far path. The most lasting impression is one of astonishing greenery interspersed with strong bursts of vivid color.

Through exhibition interpretation, The Orchid Show will also explain the extraordinary history and conservation stories of rare and endangered orchids in the rain forests of the world.

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5th Annual Bronx Zoo Run for the Wild Apr. 27

Run for their lives!

The Bronx Zoo is celebrating the fifth anniversary of the Wildlife Conservation Society's Run for the Wild this spring.

The 2013 run will take place Saturday, April 27 and will be dedicated to saving elephants, their habitat, and other wildlife.

Wildlife supporters, runners, and walkers are invited to participate in the annual 5k run and family fun run at the zoo.

Participants can choose from two different events. The 5k run for individual runners will begin at 8 a.m.; casual runners and walkers can take part in the Family Fun Run/Walk at 8:45 a.m.

New this year is WCS Run for the Wild: World – allowing people who cannot be in New York for the zoo event to participate and fundraise from anywhere in the world.

The new WCS Run for the Wild: World allows participants world wide to make tracks for elephants from wherever they are.

“Virtual” participants can run on their own, start their own team, support teams or participants at the event, or even create their own fundraising event to contribute to WCS's work to save the elephants. Since its start in 2009, more than 23,000 people have participated and \$2.6 million has been raised through donations, registration, and sponsorship.

“Each year we dedicate the WCS Run for the Wild to a different animal species in need of conservation,” said John Calvelli, WCS executive vice president of public affairs. “The decision to dedicate this year's event to elephants was made out of necessity. The illegal wildlife trade is now a multi-billion dollar industry that threat-

ens thousands of species around the world. Elephants have been particularly hard hit, with 2011 considered the worst year since 1989 for the illegal poaching of elephants for their ivory.”

The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is co-hosting a citywide workshop to present and review the modeling processes that will be used to test potential alternatives identified as part of the Long Term Control Plan (LTCP) Program with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC).

As part of the LTCP Program, DEP is developing comprehensive evaluations of long term solutions to reduce combined sewer overflows (CSOs) and improve water quality in New York City's waterbodies and waterways. The goal of each LTCP is to identify appropriate CSO controls necessary to achieve waterbody-specific water quality standards, consistent with the Federal CSO Policy and the water quality goals of the Clean Water Act.

At the workshop, DEP and DEC staff will review the Watershed/Landside and Hydrodynamic/Water Quality models and the proposed baseline assumptions for evaluating the benefits of CSO control alternatives. Also, DEP and DEC staff will be available to answer any questions you may have.

Reminder: The Pelham Bay Taxpayers and Civic Association does not meet during the month of February. Our next meeting will be in March. The time, place and guest speaker will be announced in next week's article.

This week is a week that finds many of us in Pelham Bay with snow removal issues on our minds. Here are a few tips that might be helpful to you.

First, do not attempt anything that can cause you to suffer a heart attack or irritate a back problem. If you have any doubts about your health ask your doctor if you are healthy enough to shovel snow.

Second, when shoveling snow do not attempt to raise a shovel load of snow above the level of your heart. Studies show that doing so places extreme stress upon your heart and greatly increases your chances of having a heart attack.

Third, size up the task before you and reduce it into smaller manageable chores. You can divide the sidewalk

in half.

When pushing snow towards the curb you can cut down on the mass, volume and weight of each shovel load by starting not at the building line but at the mid point of the sidewalk.

This way instead of lets say having to push a 40 lb. shovel load you will be pushing a 20 lb. load.

Doing it this way you reduce the amount of stress which you may face at any one time. But it will take you a little longer to finish the job. When you are finished with the curb side/half of the sidewalk you will want to go back and clean off the side of the side walk that is adjacent to the building line.

Doing this will prevent any snow melt from running towards the curb and eventually freezing on you'r freshly shoveled sidewalk.

Fourth, before you start to shovel check the shovel make sure it is in good condition.

When using a metal shovel I will spray the metal with WD 40 lubricating oil. This helps to keep the snow from sticking to your

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shovel and it also facilitates a smoother pass of the shovel over the cement sidewalk. It does make life a little easier.

Fifth, and, the most important point dress for the task at hand. Wear 2,3,4 layers of clothing to protect you from the cold but not to the point where the clothing weighs you down and interferes with your ability to move around and breath effortlessly.

Also invest in a great pair of wool socks. You can't beat them for keep your feet dry and cold free.

So good luck with the rest of our snow season and hopefully since we are ready for it chances are we may not get any more heavy snow falls. I hope I just did not jinx us.

If you have any storm related problems with snow removal Councilman Vacca is the person to call. If you are having problems with Con Ed utilities Senator Jeff

Klein is the person to call.

Assemblyman Benedetto is the person to call with problems concerning Education. On February 26, at 6 p.m., the NYC Department of Education will be holding a joint hearing on the closing of Lehman High School.

"The times they are a changing!" And now the burden shifts from... to the individual- Mr. Average Citizen. It used to be that the lists of "to do's" turned in by civic and homeowner associations were received by the local NYC community board and included in their capital and expense budget items.

Community Board 10 was always supportive of our requests. Now, if the City agency (as in Department of Environmental Protection) has no 311 complaint calls regarding that location, they do not consider there to be a need to even investigate the item. So, if you need a catchbasin installed because of a heavy water flow on your block, start a weekly call to 311 to describe the need- "the street water overflows the curb in front of my house and now my property is being flooded. I need a catch basin." (Catch basin is defined

as the slit and grate next to the curb which directs the unwanted street water into the existing sewer line) But that won't help if the City has never given you a curb to begin with, even though they have faithfully collected sewer taxes...the problem on numerous blocks in our community and in others, where there has never been a capital project and the streets, curbs, sidewalks etc. are non-conforming. Maybe your existing sidewalk is being undermined by the street water run-off and yet because there is no track record of calls to 311, the agency doesn't consider the catchbasin as a need. So start the 311 calls, get a complaint number. Keep track of the complaint number and when you called. They will say that the agency will respond to your complaint in x number of days. After X number of days, call 311 back. If you have no satisfaction/ or if it

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has not been fixed, give 311 the complaint # and when you called and ask what the agency has found with regard to your complaint.

Then, call CB 10 with the complaint number and the resolution or the lack thereof, and CB 10 will contact the agency to find out why there has been no resolution. (also please give the information and complaint # to the local civic association, so that CB 10 and CCCA can discuss the problem]. Some catchbasin requests have been on the CB list for literally years.

By this time, if you are still paying your taxes and if you still own the house, you probably have become

totally jaded and turned off by the whole 311 system. But then again, maybe you'll be lucky! Use 311 for a stop sign that had been hit by a car, for a parking sign that is needed, a street name sign that is dangling or swinging in the wind, a street light that has burned out or which is flashing and of course for that catch basin that you need or the pot hole that is collecting hub caps as cars drive by and hit it, for the street tree that has snapped off and is half blocking the sidewalk and half on your car.

If a crime is happening at that very moment or has just happened, then call 911. If a neighbor's dog gets loose and has jumped your fence, and is having his way with your dear little Fifi, I honestly don't know who you call! But keep a list of your 311 calls, their complaint number and the the number of days they have to respond. If the date goes by and your haven't re-

activated the complaint with a call, you have to start from scratch.

Breathe deeply, now, and go on with life. Another hole in the street is about to be dug- the sewer excavation for SEX 20045. Due to start February 4th, 2013, or so the City said. As we write, it is now Feb. 11th!... Years ago, a young Mayor Koch came to Stadium Avenue for the shovel in the ground for our very first sewer project. We presented him with a bouquet of balloons that said "thank you" and he said we were so like a country town that he could almost smell the hay growing! We have fond memories of this dear man who shared the day with us and our first capital project. How proudly we wore our NYC DEP hard hats as the ground was broken! It is sitting together in the peanut gallery at CB committee meetings with those striving to improve their communities just as we are. It is a strange fraternity to which we belong, but the primary criteria for membership is to never use the word "I" but instead "we" or "the community".

As always, your home extends beyond your property line. Take pride in your community.

Once again, Bronx County possesses the dubious distinction having the highest unemployment rate in the entire State of New York, coming in at 11.9 percent. The state average is 8.2 percent, which itself is above the national average of 7.9 percent. Nationwide, long term unemployment represents a startling 38.1% of all those without jobs, a number unprecedented in the post-World War II era.

Even those terrible numbers are far below the real rate. If those who have run out of benefits, stopped looking for work out of frustration, or who have found minimal part-time employment are included, the percentage will easily increase by at least 10%.

Unemployment is higher now than when President

Obama first took office in January of 2009. Even more worrisome, the number of long term unemployed has skyrocketed from 2.6 million at the time of his first inauguration to the current 4.7 million.

It is deeply troubling that there has been relatively little reaction to the latest worsening of America's unemployment crisis. Neither the general media nor the politicians seem particularly upset over this unprecedented and prolonged crisis.

The disastrous state of the economy is more than just unemployment, and it cannot be blamed on the aftermath of the most recent recession. The American economy is failing on many levels, in a manner never before seen. Consider these factors:

Community Action civic Association

- America slipped into recession at the end of 2012. According to the U.S. Commerce Department, real GDP (gross domestic product -- the output of goods and services produced by labor and property located in the United States --) decreased at an annual rate of 0.1 percent in the fourth quarter of 2012. Economists had expected an increase of 1%.
- Americans are becoming poorer. The 2013 Assets & Opportunity Scorecard reveals that 44% of American households are liquid asset poor; one in three has no

savings account, and 56% of consumers have subprime credit scores.

- Taxes hikes have hit Americans hard. Despite widespread statements from the White House that the fiscal cliff deal meant no new taxes for middle income Americans, a rise in the payroll tax from 4.2 to 6.2% has taken a sharp bite from over 70% of all workers.

- Gas prices are up. According to a recent AAA survey the national average price for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline is \$3.35. This price is four cents more expensive than the prior week and six cents more than the prior month. Despite significant supplies of gas, the cost per year to the average American family has risen sharply during the past four years, from

\$2,816.40 in 2009 to \$4,112.40 currently.

- Food prices are rising. According to the U.S.D.A, the inflation forecast for both all food and food-at-home (grocery store) prices in 2013 is an increase of 3 to 4 percent. This forecast represents an annual increase that is above the historical average for both indexes. Inflation is expected to remain strong, especially in the first half of 2013, for most animal-based food products due to higher feed prices. Furthermore, inflation is expected to be above the historical average for food categories such as cereals and bakery products as well as other foods.

- Exports are down. During the 4th quarter of 2012, exports plummeted 5.7%.

- The U.S. national debt now exceeds 100 percent of the

Gross Domestic Product. In the past four years, the debt has increased by 4.939 trillion dollars, a hike that is more than the entire previous eight years. Spending more than doubled, without any discernable gain for all those taxpayer dollars spent. Never before has federal spending been as wasteful and ill-conceived. It is wholly legitimate to demand that the White House explain their thinking. There must be an accounting.

There has rarely been such a clear picture of an utter failure of economic policy as has been seen in the past four years.

Mental Attitude: Depression Risk. People who drank more than 4 sodas (sugar-sweetened or diet) per day were 30% more likely to be diagnosed with depression than those who consumed none. Those who drank 4 cans of fruit punch per day (sugar-sweetened or diet) were 38% more likely to become depressed. Consuming diet versions of soda and fruit punches was associated with a greater risk for depression than consuming versions sweetened with regular sugar. Interestingly, those who drank 4 cups of coffee per day were 10% less likely to develop depression than those who drank none. - *National Institutes of Health, January 2013*

Health Alert: Prescription Drug Abuse. Prescription drug abuse is just be-

hind marijuana as the United States' most widespread drug issue, with 22 million people beginning use of non-medically prescribed pain alleviating drugs since 2002. Rates of abuse span from 3.6% in Iowa to 6.4% in Oregon. Addressing prescription drug misuse remains a top public health priority. The key is educating the public on the serious health risks involved. - *Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, January 2013*

Exercise: Exercise reduces blood viscosity, enhances your muscles' abilities to extract oxygen from your blood, and increases your productivity. - *Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health, 1996*

Chiropractic: Macro vs. Micro Trauma? Macro-trauma is an accident such as a car accident or falling down. Many people think this is the only way injury occurs. Micro-trauma is a cumulative effect from simple acts of daily living over a long period of time (weeks, months, or years)

that ultimately leads to pain and dysfunction. These activities may be just one thing (like excessive computer use with bad posture) or multiple things you do throughout the day.

Wellness/Prevention: Drowsy Drivers. 4% of United States adults have fallen asleep or dozed off while behind the wheel. Sleepy driving is more common among adults who sleep less than six hours per night, snore, or fall asleep randomly during the day, compared with people who do not. Ways used to stay awake while driving, such as opening the window, turning up the AC and radio, are usually unsuccessful. Warning signs of sleepiness include hitting a rumble strip, drifting from one's lane, missing exits, yawning or blinking, and trouble remembering driving the last few miles. - *CDC, January 2013*

National Children's Dental Health Month at St. Barnabas

National Children's Dental Health Month, celebrated in February, was established to further awareness about the importance of children's dental health.

This includes such elements of preventive dental care as twice-daily brushing and flossing, regular dental care, wise food choices, and the use of fluoride in the prevention of cavities.

Many middle class parents of young children are well aware of the importance of dental care.

However, according to Dr. Paul Chu, director of

pediatric dentistry at St. Barnabas Hospital in the Bronx, that's not necessarily the case among parents living in the city's poorer areas and among the Latino population, where the percentage of untreated cavities has been found to be nearly double the average among children 6 - 19 years old.

"Not surprisingly, economic status has been shown to have a great deal to do with preventive dental care," Dr. Chu said.

"This is troubling because practicing poor dental care can set a child up for a lifetime of health-

related problems," continued Dr. Chu.

In addition to speaking regularly to children at local elementary schools and to parents at WIC (Women Infant and Children) centers in the Bronx, Dr. Chu and his team will present on February 27 at St. Barnabas Hospital to local Bronx community health centers on the importance of integrating oral health care into their center's activities and will provide free screenings and serve popcorn on that day to community children at its clinic.

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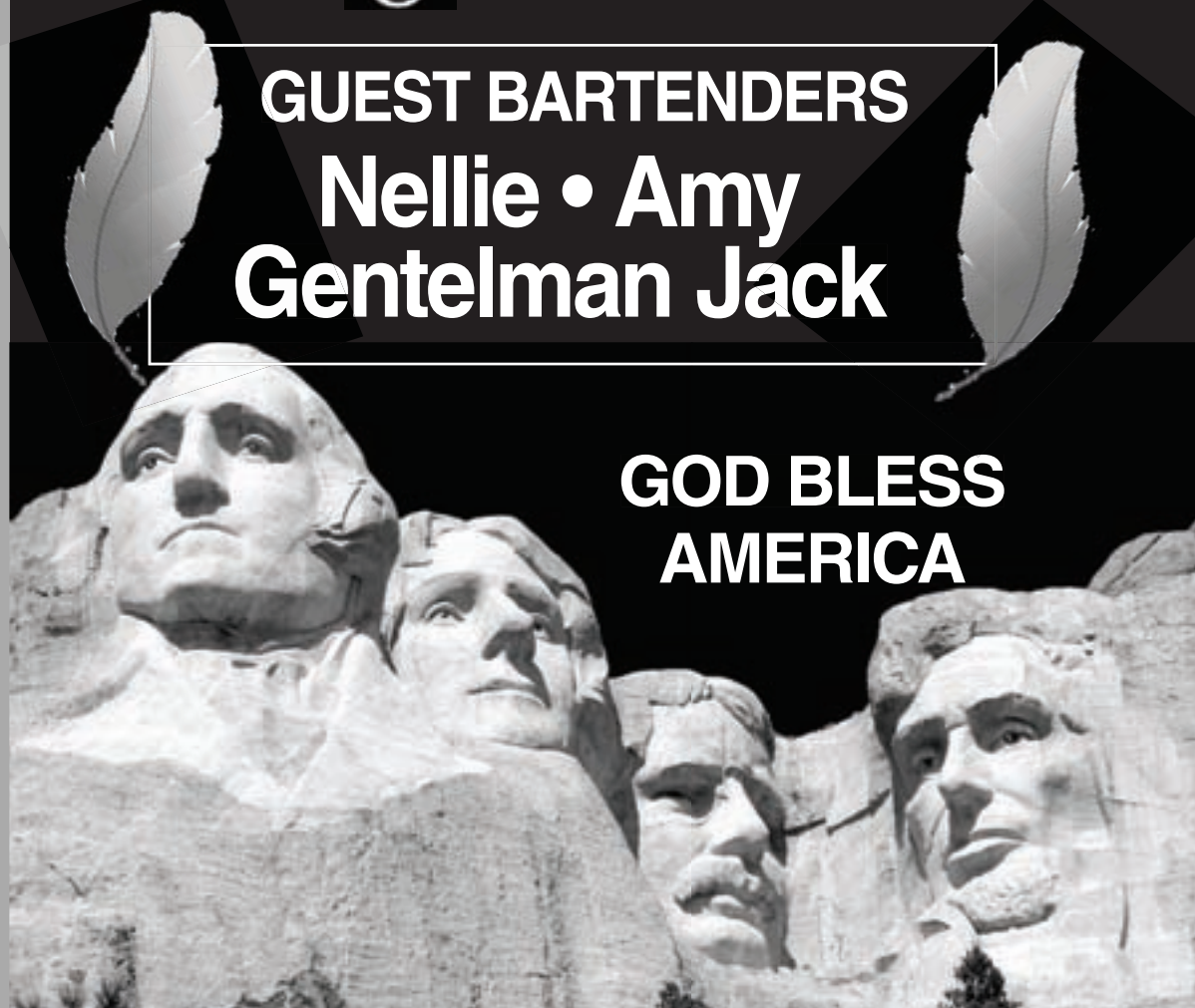
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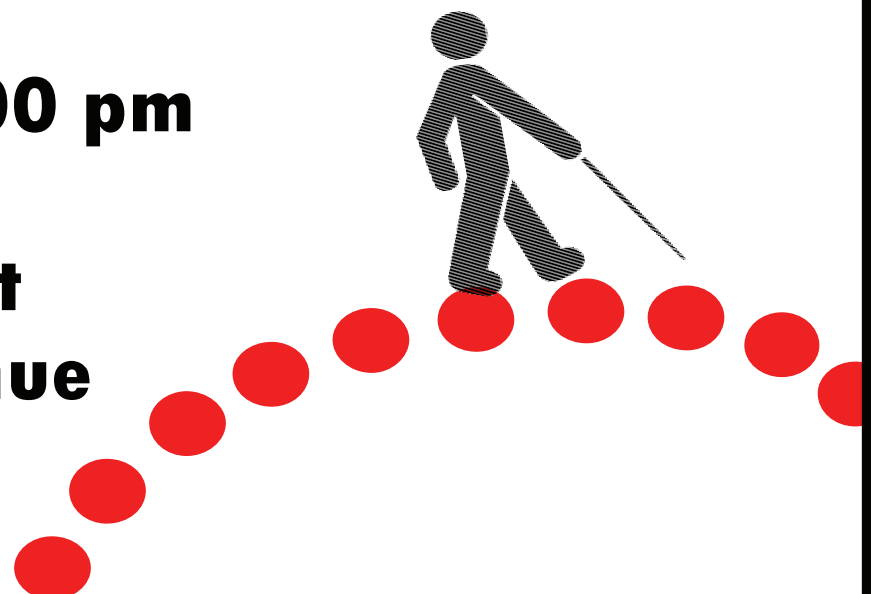

below the elevated subway stop at the Square.

The program, run by Access Community Health Center, is relocating from 1500 Pelham Parkway South.

The board is taking issue with the clinic also providing chemical addiction treatment for about 40 people with the same type of disabilities and injuries, said CB 10 district manager Kenneth Kearns. Access now runs that program at its Manhattan headquarters.

"I think – and I don't know this yet for a fact – that the community might be willing to accept the medical program component of a program if they would just not bring in the substance abuse aspect of it," said Kearns.

Kearns said, however, that he plans to oppose the program outright

- clinic and all - because Westchester Square is already overburdened with social service programs. A number of similar types of programs have come and gone – or remained – over the past three decades or so near the Square area.

The decision is all the more difficult, he said, because Access is affiliated with the Association for the Help of Retarded Children (AHRC). That organization operates a group home and a program on Mayflower Avenue in Pelham Bay, in the board's service area, and has been a good neighbor for the past 20 years, he said.

"The problem is the Westchester Square community is a community that is on the comeback," said Kearns, noting a multi-million renovation of Owen Dolan Park and its community center, as well as local businesses recently form-

ing a city Business Improvement District.

He is concerned that the population being treated for addiction may congregate in the Square.

"The last thing we need is 40 people walking around, caching cigarettes and asking for money to support their habit," said Kearns.

The new associate director for the Access program, Victor Delgado, said the program for substance abuse issues will help many in the Bronx who currently have to travel to Manhattan for treatment.

Access will lease the space from AHRC, he said.

"AHRC's clients are the ones who typically come to our clinic," said Delgado. "We can see anybody, but we have a large amount of developmentally disabled folks who come to get medical care. And we'll address any addiction issues, medication abuses, and things

of that sort at the clinic as well."

The clinic that treats chemical dependency will not prescribe substances such as methadone, he said. In addition to medical and dental care, the clinic will

provide occupational, physical, and speech therapies, as well as podiatry, psychiatric services and screenings.

According to the letter that Access sent CB 10, the program will be the only

one of its kind in the Bronx.

An Access representative is scheduled to appear before Board 10's municipal service committee on Tuesday, Feb. 19 at 7:30 p.m.

questions have arisen about whether the administration has broken the rules protecting the rights of neighborhood residents and homeless people," said Liu in rejecting the contract.

"City Hall's failed record on homeless policy cannot and should not become the excuse for skirting rules in this Wakefield siting or for the many emergency shelter contracts proliferating in certain neighborhoods."

Borough and local officials, as well as residents in the area have expressed overwhelming opposition to the plan. Shortly after a June 2011 town hall meeting, the city announced that an approval vote had indeed taken place.

"This administration has worked to force this contract to completion," said Diaz, "and has used fraudulent means to reach that goal, blatantly ignoring the input of the community and its representatives."

Diaz noted that he has said all along that the site was inappropriate for use as a homeless shelter.

"I hope that we can now

move forward on a better, military use for this site," a pointed reference to the possible transfer there of a National Guard unit now housed in a building next to the Kingsbridge Armory. Kingsbridge residents have long advocated for new – and much needed – schools to be built in the space now occupied by the National Guard unit.

Community opposition on the homeless issue also piqued in adjacent Woodlawn because a homeless shelter in Muller would be the fourth one within walking distance of the others.

Homeless housing is also being readied in a former warehouse and factory diagonally across the street from the Muller Center.

"I think one of the things that you have to look at any contract is, was the contract made under legal and proper circumstances," said Community Board 12 chairman Father Richard Gorman, also a lawyer, who has expressed strong opposition to the Muller homeless facility since it was first proposed.

"Since there are questions about whether the

contract is proceeding under legal and proper circumstances, it is not only prudent, it is correct for the Comptroller to not certify it," said Gorman.

Deputy Mayor Linda Gibbs issued a sharp rebuke of the comptroller's decision.

"The comptroller purports to have rejected the contract based on questions about the 'legitimacy' of the process by which the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development approved the project," stated Gibbs. "However, as the comptroller knows, HUD has been deeply involved in the review of this project since as early as June 2011; after nearly two years of engagement with the federal government his summary announcement, without any communication with the city, defies credibility."

Gibbs cited a letter Mayor Bloomberg received from HUD in June 2012 that stated that the federal agency had determined that the homeless housing plan at Muller balanced the needs of the city in regard to economic and other development with the needs of the homeless population.

Cardinal coach C.J. O'Neill believes the Ram as getting a steal. Dawson was nursing a heel injury he suffered while running track last spring. It set him back during

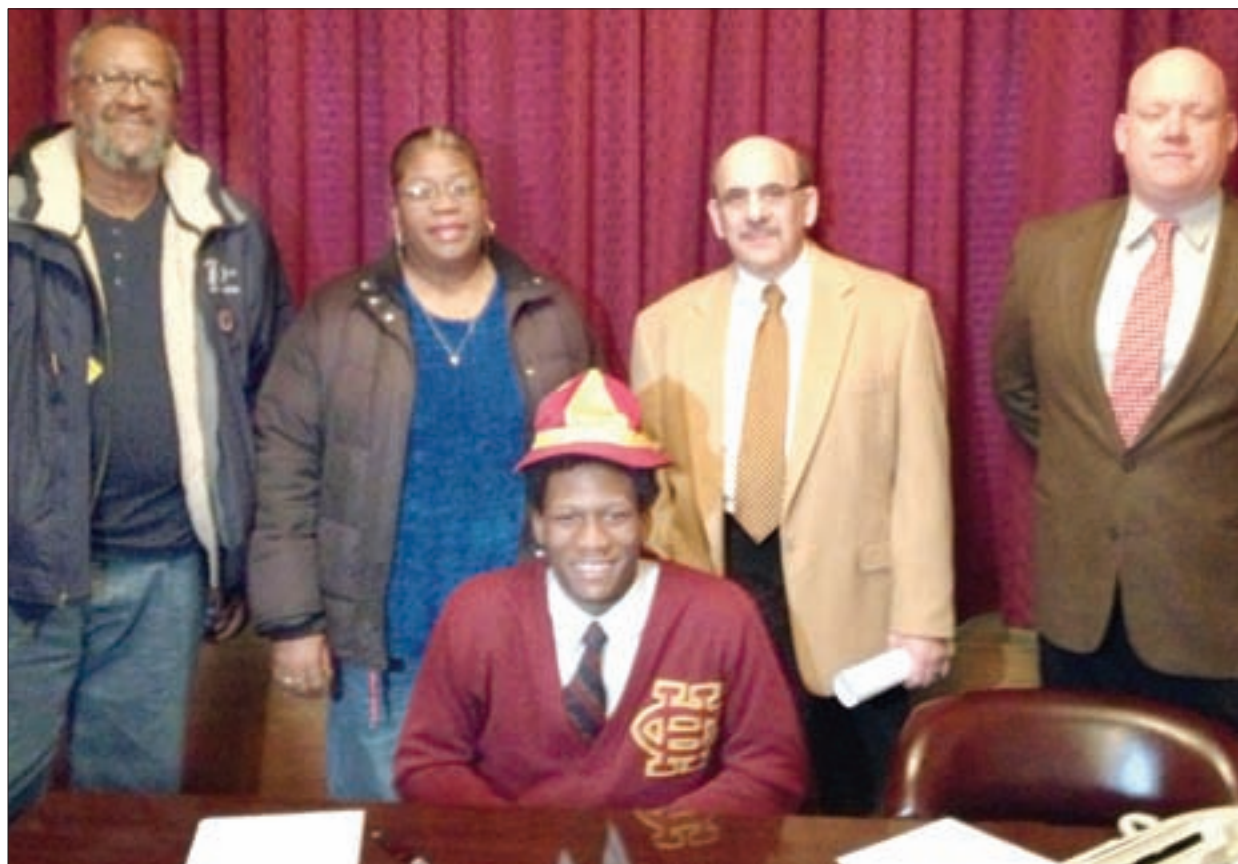
a camp in a Boston College over the summer and was never playing at 100 percent during the season. He felt like he didn't have the year he wanted to have as senior.
