DISTRICT LINES **OPPOSED**

Proposed 80th, 82nd AD splits MP

Leaders in Morris Park are up in arms over the recently proposed State Assembly lines that would effectively divide the community in half, therefore reducing the community's voice..

Under the Legislative Task Force of Demographic Research and Reapportionment redistricting plans for the 80th and 82nd Assembly districts, that were made public on Thursday, January 26, the center of Morris Park, an area roughly bound by Tenbroeck, Radcliff, Morris Park, and Sackett avenues will be removed from the 80th Assembly district, represented by Assemblywoman Naomi Rivera, and placed into the 82nd Assembly

district, currently represented by Assemblyman Michael Benedetto, said Morris Park Community Association president Al D'Angelo.

The move will diminish the political power of the MPCA because it divides the community, D'Angleo stated. A group of concerned Morris Park residents and business leaders are collecting petition signatures opposing the proposed district lines, and a group is headed to the LATFOR hearing on Tuesday, January 31 at the Bronx Museum at 1040 Grand Concourse to voice their opposition. LATFOR is the commission in charge of district apportionment for Congressional,

Hauben art works to grace BCC Library

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Artist Daniel Hauben, who has captured Bronx images on canvas over a 30year career, will soon have 22 pieces at his art hanging permanently in the new Bronx Community College Library.

The installation includes two larger panels which will adorn the main stairwell of the new library. called the North Instruction Building and Library, when it opens in the spring, and 20 panels will hang over the information commons or main reading room, Hauben stated. The images depicted include street scenes of recognizable places around the borough, including the Kingsbridge Armory, Burnside Avenue, Bronx Community College's campus and Hall of Fame, five different scenes of elevated trains. the Amalgamated Houses. Harlem River, Hudson River, Macombs Dam Bridge, and views of the Harlem River and the Robert F. Kennedy Bridge.

who has garnered national and international attention, started out as a plan to create mosaics for the library, Hauben said. But when the decision called for painted images instead, Hauben said he couldn't have been more delighted. Hauben loves paiting borough landscapes, he said.

"I think that I am drawn to landscape and strive to create a sense of depth and distance in order to make a world on canvas," Hauben stated.

The paintings are oil on Belgian linen, and while the current plans for the grand opening of the library are still to be announced and do not include any detailed mention of the artwork that will beautify the new building, an open house showcasing the paintings in the installation will likely occur in the summer or fall, Hauben stated.

Initial plans on the installation were reviewed in the spring of 2008, and the paintings were finally The six-figure commis- finished towards the end of Hauben's work.

533...By Patrick Roc- sion for Hauben, an artist 2011. They are currently in Hauben's Riverdale studio, awaiting installation.

The artist recently painted the interior of the Arthur Avenue retail market at 2344 Arthur Avenue, and his work over three decades includes street scenes and landscapes around the borough, but also places abroad, including Berlin, Germany.

"It has been a journey." Hauben stated. "This kind of symbiosis between artist, environment, and community will resonate."

Hauben's work hangs in prestigious art collections around the world, including those at the White House, New York Historical Society, Goldman Sachs, Pfizer, Montefiore Medical Group, Pepsico, Harvard University, Rutgers University, and the New York Public Library.

More problems at 3555 Bruckner

Although residents at 3555 Bruckner Boulevard may finally be cooking with gas, they aren't out of the fire just yet.

Back in early October. gas service to all apartments was cut off due to a gas leak discovered in early October, leaving the tenants without gas for nearly three months.

After the restoration

of gas to the building, the tenant association. which was formed during the gas crisis, has started addressing other troubling issues within the building.

Vito Signorile, an aide to Councilman Jimmy Vacca, said the councilman has organized a multi agency inspection of the entire building.

According to Ritchie Torres, director of hous-

ing service for the councilman.the inspection led to a few frightening discoveries.

"A full tank of propane gas was found in the garage which is extremely dangerous." Torres said.

Propane gas, when stored indoors, is capable of causing an instant explosion. Torres said.

"This is a scarv scenario in a building of 142 house-

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holds," Torres said.

Torres said during the inspection, the NYC Department of Building stopped a construction project that did not have a permit.

"While doing the inspection near the boiler, we were able to stop a private construction company from working on the foundation wall," Torres said.

"They had not obtained a work permit, in real time."

Another cause for concern, Torres said, is the condition of the garage itself.

"The garage is in horrible condition, there is leakage everywhere, there are cracks in the concrete floor that pose both trip and fall hazards, and there is corrosion in the concrete ceiling," he said, "all serious violations of either the building or housing code."

Torres said that although the gas to residents' apartments has been restored, the pipes that have been left exposed are still a

problem.

"This raises the risk of an explosion in the event of a gas leak." he said.

According to Torres, he returned to 3555 Bruckner the following Monday after the initial inspection to reinspect the garage himself, where he found the propane tank had still not been removed.

"I then called the police

to come and have them remove it," he said.

Torres said the tenant association has been very helpful throughout the process. As many as 80 residents show up to a meeting, depending on what concerns are being brought up.

"The core leadership remains very active," he said.

Morningside House opens sub-acute unit TNLL dinner set for 60th year

32-bed penthouse addition prepares patients' return home

Morningside celebrated the opening of a like cable-ready television new rehabilitative unit that will help patients transition from hospital to home.

A ribbon cutting was held for the organization's new 32-bed sub-acute care unit in the penthouse of Morningside House's building B on Wednesday, January 25. Morningside House is located at 1000 Pelham Parkway South.

The sub-acute unit serves as an interim step as patients go from hospital to home, said Morningside House administrator Robert Bardach.

"This is a specialized unit that was built for rehabilitation," Bardach stated. "We have ADL. Activities of Daily Living, and the facility helps patients learn how to be independent again."

The penthouse suites House includes modern amenities and wi-fi access, as well as a community kitchen that helps patients get used to preparing meals for themselves, and a lot of single rooms, Bardach said.

The subacute rehabilitative unit features "on floor dinning", where hot food is prepared for the patients and then brought up and plated on the floor before being served, Bardach stated.

The penthouse floor was completely renovated and updated, said Thomas Wilder of the facilities department of Morningside House. It was a large effort that required numerous contractors, he said.

One of the first patients to use the new facility was Felix Celestino, 71, of Barker

Avenue. He had heard about the unit from his daughter, and received physical and occupational therapy there after he had open heart surgery at Albert Einstein College of Medicine on Thursday, January 5.

The staff is leading him

through exercises seven days a week that will help him regain his strength. Celestino said. These exercises include stair climbing and light weight lifting. and he went from being in a wheelchair to walking with a cane in about 10 days, Celestino said.

"I like it here because they are nice people and I know the staff, who have taken care of me in a right way," Celestino stated. "This is close to my home, and my family who come to visit every day."

Once at the scene, the Con Ed crew was able to isolate the power feeding the apartment house and permitting the fire to be extinguished. The levels of the poisonous gas was high in the basement area and also the first floor. It was found lower on the upper floors. Once the fire was out at 5:32 p.m., firefighters vented the building and retested air samples before permitting residents to reoccupy their homes.

P.S. 304's priorities

(The following letter was sent to NYC Department of Education Chancellor Dennis Walcott) Dear Chancellor Walcott,

I am writing on behalf of my constituents whose children currently attend pre-k at P.S. 304 in the Bronx. It was brought to my attention by parents and the Superintendent of District 8 that the policy for enrollment into kindergarten has been abruptly changed this year. Traditionally, students in the pre-k program were given priority when applying for kindergarten. This year parents are being told that their children will be given no priority and will be assigned based on their school zones.

Although I understand the current kindergarten Admission Guidelines, I believe parents who have students that are already enrolled in pre-k should be grandfathered into the previous policy. Parents applied to P.S. 304 in a lottery based system with the established precedence that P.S. 304 pre-k students receive some form of priority. Once their children were accepted to the pre-k program, these parents spent countless hours attending local and school meetings in order to develop a vested interest in the school and the Throggs Neck community. Not only it is unfair to ignore the exerted efforts that the these parents have demonstrated to support P.S. 304 and the school community but it is a disservice to the students who are currently enrolled in the Pre-K program.

By eliminating priority for P.S. 304's pre-k students to matriculate into the school's kindergarten program, students who have already adapted to P.S. 304's environment, experience an increased risk of having to leave the educational institution where they have developed a routine and comfort level, being forced to attend a new school in a different community.

In closing, I would again ask that the traditional policy be upheld for the 2012-2013 enrollment year allowing priority for students enrolled in pre-k at P.S. 304.

HRA helps Bronx couple polish jewel of a home

AS he sat in his newly remodeled living room, Howard Surino, sitting next to Frances, his wife of 40 years, looked through a photo album and noted how different the inside of his house used to look.

"When I bought this house back in 1979, we had all kind of ideas of fixing it up," Howard said. "It was a lack of money and one thing led to another and it didn't happen."

One day, the answer to their problems arrived in the mail: an advertisement from Housing Rehabilitation Assistance, a program designed to help homeowners complete remodeling projects during tough economic times.

"I had stuff being mailed to me constantly reminding me that there are opportunities out there," Howard said. "My son's grown up and pretty much on his own so it was timing. The right place at the right time."

Built in 1920, the Surinos' home in the Throgs Neck section of the Bronx is the largest on the block. Frances' grandparents purchased it in the 1940s and sold it to Howard just as he and his wife were looking to lay down roots.

"It was a tight-knit family, and everyone lived in the Bronx," Howard said. "On Sundays they would all come over for dinner and hang out."

The couple envisioned a bright and airy home



with elegant fixtures but what they received exceeded their expectations. Frances said the new sundeck is one of her favorite aspects of the new and improved home. She added that she couldn't wait to read by the window and entertain friends come spring.

The living room was originally painted dark colors accented by wood paneling and a drop ceiling. The dining room, which over the years was used as a bed-room and TV room, used to be covered in thick gray textured stucco paint. Now, both spaces are decked out in a lovely shade of beige with white trim along the moldings and windows. The parquet floors have been replaced with glossy wood from the front door through the dining room, while marble tiles cover the floors of the foyer, bathroom and kitchen.

"I met with Howard and explained to him how the HRA works, how we could get him assistance, the right contractors — which is very, very important — especially for the magnitude of this work. You don't want some fly-bynight contractor," explained HRA representative, Carlos Fontanez. "And as you can see the work turned out phenomenally well."

The HRA was able to get \$10,600 in tax credits, grants and other assistance, to help the Surinos cover part of the cost of re-modeling. The HRA-approved contractor gutted two bathrooms, a bedroom, living room, dining room and two kitchens, and rebuilt them using only high quality materials hand-picked by the Surinos. Best of all, the work is guaranteed for life.

"You hear horror stories about contractors all the time, so you want some-one in your corner to make sure the work is done properly and in a timely fashion, to prevent you from getting ripped off or your house destroyed — and that's the HRA." Howard said. The organization covers two distinct categories: energy efficiency projects involving roofs, windows, siding and insulation or capital improvements, and jobs that typically involve kitchens, bathrooms and basements.

Frances, the family cook, loves her new kitchen so much that she says she has completely blocked out the way it used to look, but Howard hasn't. There was no fan over the stove, allowing grease and smoke to cake up a nearby window. Her love for cooking became a chore.

"In the new kitchen everything is so spread out. Everything is at my fingertips. Open one drawer, I've got my knife. Open another drawer, I've got the wax paper. Cooking in there is a pleasure," Frances said.

Now, there are 14 large cherry wood cabinets with shelves and drawers that slide out, making for easy access. A lazy Susan, concealed in a cabinet, allows Frances to grab pots and pans in a snap. In the bathroom, the tub has been replaced with a beige marble shower stall and glass doors. Above the toilet, an exposed brick wall gives a rich earthy texture to the room.

When asked how her parents and grandparents would react if they could see the house today, Frances replied, "They would be amazed because you never think something like this is possible. It is better than anything I could have dreamt of."

José Alberto, nicknamed "El Canario" because of his exquisite voice and melodious whistling skills, is one of Latin music's most influential and respected vocalists. The Dominican-born Alberto moved with his family to Puerto Rico at age seven and sharpened his vocal skills at Las Antillas Military Academy. Moving to New York in the early '70s, he became a master improviser, singing with an extensive list of orchestras. He released his first single in 1974 and appeared as lead vocalist on Tito Rodriguez, Jr.'s 1976 album Curious. He was the lead vocalist of Típica '73 from 1977 through the early '80s. Alberto has recorded a dozen solo albums, many gold and platinum, and performed at festivals world-wide with his New Yorkbased orchestra. He formed his own band in 1983 and in 1987 was the first artist signed to the Tropical division of Ralph Mercado's RMM label, recording the international smash hit "Sueño contigo." 1991's Dance with Me was a salsa romántica hit. Alberto also toured with the late Celia Cruz.

Domingo Quiñones, singer, composer, producer and actor, was born in Perth Amboy, NJ of Puerto Rican parents. He began his career singing with Conjunto Nativo in 1983 and worked with Jose Alberto "El Canario," Johnny Rodriguez and Conjunto Clásico. In 1985 he replaced Roberto Lugo in Luis "Perico" Ortiz's orchestra, and later sang with Louie Ramirez and Roberto Roena. In 1990, Quiñones recorded his first solo album, Sunday is My Name. After joining Tito Puente on his 100th recording, he released his second solo album, Painting Lunas, which included the duet "Two Friends" with Tony Vega. Six more recordings followed, including 1997's influential It Takes a Miracle.

This month members of our board hand-delivered two separate pieces of documentation to every business on Morris Park Avenue from Unionport Road all the way up to and across Williamsbridge Road to Pelham Parkway South announcing our meeting and an application to join the Business Alliance.

Last week the board members followed up with another handout that contained the minutes of our January meeting and a second application for membership with a pre-addressed return envelope.

Here's a brief synapsis

of the meeting's minutes; board chairman Robert Ruggiero greeted the guests and entertained questions from the attendees. He explained the mission of the alliance, the importance of membership, past successes and future plans.

The Christmas lights gained a great deal of attention. After some lengthy discussion about a solution, the following was proposed,

voted and agreed upon: Preparation for this project is to start immediately. The Morris Park Alliance will assume responsibility for placement of the lights for 2012 and will make the appropriate notification to the Morris Park Community Association relieving them of their community obligation. Written notification will go out to every business owner as to who is in charge, the cost of the project along with a pre-addressed return envelop. The project is \$24,000 and will embrace Morris Park Avenue from Unionport Road to Williamsbridge Road and across Williamsbridge Road

from Vataj Realty to Pelham Parkway South. The cost for each business is \$100 for alliance dues and \$100 for the holiday lights. There are almost 300 businesses within those confines. The monies are due from now until June 1. On July 1 we will either be signing a contract for the installation of the decorations or notifying the community that there will be no lighting again for 2012 due to the lack of participation by the merchants.

There will be no pooling of monies for from one failed year to the next. If the merchants fail to participate, we will be returning the holiday lighting money

to the people who did donate and we will start over again in January 2013.

The alliance has established a PayPal account on the www.morrisparkalliance.com website to make membership and donations more convenient. No one is going door-to-door to 'collect' a check, it's the merchants obligation to see to it that the donation reaches the Alliance and cash will not be accepted.

The website will soon be updated to include all the business' names and addresses within the Morris Park community and those who donated to the project and joined the Alliance will be duly noted as will those who choose not to participate. Unfortunately these measures may seem harsh but in order to achieve a positive result we have to implement change unilaterally until we can establish the formality of a Business Improvement District which could be as long as 4 years in the making.

Santa Maria Church was established for new immigrants

Until this past Sunday, I had only been in Santa Maria Church, located at 2352 St. Raymond Avenue at the corner of Parker Street, twice that I recall. The first time was for Mike Medora's funeral mass in August of 1991 and the second time was when his wife, Mary, passed away. Mike was the kind of person often referred to as a pillar of the church, meaning that he was involved in every aspect of parish life. Today you would have a hard time finding someone who remembers him as so much has changed. Father Antimo Fiorillo was pastor cuzzi, who was born, eduthen but he retired in 1993.

The Medora family and Father Fiorillo were leftovers from when Santa Maria was largely an Italian parish. When the parish was established by Patrick Cardinal Hayes in 1926, the expressed purpose was to provide a place of worship for the growing population of Italian speaking immigrants. The elevated line of the #6 IRT line had just



been extended to the area in 1920 and a population explosion came with it. Soon eggplant, tomatoes, zucchini and basil were growing in backyards throughout the neighborhood. Many of those Italian homesteaders have since been replaced by Hispanic and Asian households who still keep the parish vibrant.

Father Edward Marcated and ordained in Italy, was chosen as the founding pastor and he obtained the temporary use of a storefront for his first mass. Thus the parish got its start at 1605 Parker Street on July 8, 1926. Property for a permanent structure was soon acquired and within a few months mass was being offered in their own church. It was dedicated in February of 1927.

Father Marcuzzi passed away in 1932 and Father Anthony Profilio, also born, raised, and ordained in Italy, was installed as the second pastor of Santa Maria. He helped to build up the parish by establishing many of the parish societies so necessary to parish life. He was recalled to Sicily in 1947 to become the Vicar General of that diocese.

Francis Cardinal Spellman then assigned Father John Caldarola as the third pastor of the parish. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1926 and named a monsignor in 1957. It was he who opened the new school in 1951 with Sister Dolorita as principal. He also oversaw the construction of the convent for the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in 1964.

When Father Caldaro-

Cardinal Cooke appointed Father Joseph Adamo as his replacement. He, in turn, was replaced by Father Antimo Fiorillo who served the parish from 1981 to 1993. John Cardinal O'Connor then placed the parish in nando Rielo on the Spanish Idente Missionaries.

la retired in 1972, Terrence the safe hands of Father John Carbo until November of 1994. It was then that he invited the Idente Missionaries of Christ Crucified to administer the parish. That religious congregation had been established by Fer-

Several recent trends challenged First have Amendment rights as never before.

א. מ' The provisions guaranteeing free speech and religious freedom are the most vital portions of the Constitution. Throughout American history, they have held the greatest respect. Even during disagreements on how to interpret those rights, the arguments have been framed in how best to fulfill its mandates. Partisans on both sides of heated disagreements over issues such as pornography, hate speech, and other flashpoints had, at least, one common ground: a strong belief that the provisions in this sacred law are central to the nation's character. During periods when religious bigotry has been widespread, the First Amendment has kept the nation together.

> That common ground however, has slowly been eroding. In the past three vears, attempts have been made to regulate the internet, and impose federal rules on political programming. Lately, an assault on religious institutions has been added to this worrisome trend.

> The current attack on the first amendment began when former Speaker Pelosi attempted to reinstate the so-called "fairness doctrine," which would have allowed the federal government to regulate broadcast editorial content. Organizations such as the Society of Professional

Community Action civic Association

Journalists, along with talk radio hosts (who feared that they would be targeted by the then Democrat-controlled controlled Congress) managed to fend off that attack.

The next battle concerned attempts to control Under the the internet Obama administration, the Federal Communications Commission attempted to impose what it described as "net neutrality," which, in reality, gave that organization the unprecedented authority to regulate the great marketplace of ideas which has become so much a part of our lives. This assault, too, has been held back-so far. Those in favor of this censorship attempt keep coming up with different excuses to control free speech. The latest version hid under the disguise of stopping the unlawful reproduction of copyrighted works, ignoring the fact that such laws already exist. Defeated here in the USA, the White House signed an international treaty that would allow foreign interests to demand the removal of web content. There is, of course. another key portion of the First Amendment-the right of religious liberty. This provision has been taking a beating both here in New York

and across the nation.

public schools NYC frown upon mentioning Christmas, Chanukah, or other religious holidays. The educational bureaucracy has banned all religion from the classroom, and imposed the doctrine of secularism on our schools. In essence, it has established a state religionsecularism-in clear violation of Constitutional prohibitions against this practice. It has gone so far as to attempt to ban religious institutions from even having an equal opportunity with other organizations to use school buildings after hours. These acts violate the First Amendment prohibition against a governmental imposition of a particular creed.

The federal Health and Human Services Department has recently mandated that health insurance plans of all institutions, regardless of their religious beliefs, cover abortions, sterilizations and similar services at no cost. Some religious groups would be forced to either violate federal law or their core values.

The time has come for all Americans—regardless of party affiliation or ideological persuasion-to come together and oppose the ongoing assaults on the most important provision of the Constitution.

"Thirteen feet, nine inches is the highest I've ever jumped, and my teammate Danny Kaul almost did it, too, he just tapped the bar and knocked it over," said McEvoy. "But it was great being in the final two with a teammate, knowing that our team was going to win the event."

Influential girls hoops coach discusses sabbatical, Loughlin

Chez Williams is back New York City basketin ball.

Once one of the most influential coaches on the scene, Williams took a three-year sabbatical away from the game. The Bronx native, who most recently was an assistant at Murry Bergtraum and a coach with New Heights, has returned to be a part of Kasim Alston's staff at Bishop Loughlin along with Jahar Vann.

Williams was successful on the grassroots circuit for more than a decade with programs like Abyssinian. Douglass and New Heights. His New Heights team. which featured the likes of Bria Hartley, CeCe Dixon and Doris Ortega, won a national title in 2007.

In this exclusive sitdown with NYPost.com girls basketball beat writer Marc Raimondi, Williams discusses where he was the last few years, why he has returned, the misconceptions people have had about him and his regrets.

Marc Raimondi: T guess the question everyone wants to know is where have you been the last couple of years? We know you stepped away for awhile. What were you doing and why?

Chez Williams: Well, Marc, my mother (Louise) has dementia. I was trying to take care of my mom and it just didn't work out and I ended up having to put my mother in a nursing home. She's at St. Patrick's nursing home up on Mosholu Parkway. That was a big deal for me. I'm what you call a mama's boy. That's the lady that took care of my all my life. It was kind of hard for me to ask somebody to help me with it. That's basically where I was. I wasn't in jail - you hear all types of crazy things. God, he's in charge and that's where I was at. I was trying to take care of my mom. It was a real difficult situation for me. It put a big damper on my immediate family, my kids. MR: She got a little bit

worse about two years ago? CW: It was really bad. If you know anything about dementia, it doesn't get any better. It gets worse. What happens is you put yourself on a guilt trip where you feel like you have to do everything and there's only so much you can do. Your mind is telling you that you can do more. That's basically what I got caught up it.

MR: How is she doing now?

CW: Nah. My mother, she's basically holding on. She can't talk. It's sad.

MR: Well, what made you want to come back now? And what made Loughlin the place you chose to come back to?

CW: Me and Kasim, we both grew up raising Chicken playing basketball. Chicken played for me. I might have been the first person she played with outside of playing with Kasim. She played with me for a couple of years. When I was talking about coming back, I mentioned it to Kasim. He called me back and said, why don't you come work with me at Loughlin? I thought it would be a different experience. I always wanted to coach in the Catholic school league and this was a job that, when I was an assistant coach at Murry Bergtraum, that I turned down because a lot of my girls were still at Bergtraum and I wanted to stay at Bergtraum until they graduated. But it didn't work out that way because of my mother having dementia.

MR: You started the season three years ago at Bergtraum and left.

CW: Right. Things kind of got worse. We had a home attendant. The home attendant couldn't deal with the situation. It got beyond needing a home attendant. It was a hospital-bound situation

MR: Was there any thought of going back to Bergtraum? Is your relationship with [head coach] - meant a lot to me.

Ed Grezinsky still good?

a good person. He did a lot for me as far as allowing me to come. I appreciate the opportunity of coaching at Murry Bergtraum. We don't talk on a regular basis, but we communicate.

MR: You were involved with some very good teams there.

CW: Yeah, starting with Erica Morrow. Shakeya Leary. Doris Ortega. CeCe Dixon and Doris Ortega were part of my 2007 national team when I was at New Heights in addition to Bria Hartley.

MR: That's one of the better teams this area has seen recently.

CW: Absolutely. God rest his soul. I might have spent some of the most precious moments with [Exodus and Nazareth coach] Apache [Paschall] as far as competitive AAU basketball in New York as far as that team being challenged by his team. Shukurah Washington was also on that team. It was a pretty good team. We didn't have anyone 6-2 and we won the nationals. I had Ka-Diedre and Desiree Simmons of Shabazz. That was my nucleus. Sade Jackson, who plays with Adelphi. Ka-Deidre Simmons plays with Seton Hall. Desiree Simmons plays with LIU. There's nothing better than watching your former players play in college.

MR: What was your relationship like with Apache before he died [on Jan. 3]?

CW: I always say that when my [coach Donald Jenkins] passed away [six vears agol, me and Apache were rivals at the time. And [Exodus coach] Lauren [Best] and Apache were front and center at my brother's wake. That's something I'll never forget. That kind of eased the tensions somewhat for me as far as I was concerned. We didn't communicate after that, but just to see him at my brother's wake for the duration– him and Lauren sitting up front

MR: There was still CW: We talk. Mr. G is some tension between you and him and when that happened things changed?

> CW: That kind of eased the tension. The one that kind of broke the tension with me and Apache it was me and Apache communicating on [the] Slam Jam [message board]. One of the things that I can say is when I did come back Apache was one of the first people to talk to me through Slam Jam. he said. Chez things haven't been the same since you've been gone. It kind of touched me. It made me feel like he appreciated what I did and I definitely appreciated what he did. He made me a better coach. I had to prepare for them. That was one of the things that motivated me. Our relationship changed. The one that broke the relationship was Kia Vaughn's mother, Aia, We played Apache in the championship game in the Rose [Classic]. Apache didn't know me and Kia Vaughn's mother were good friends. I asked her to come to the game with me and when I walked in the gym with her, it kind of blew Apache away. He said, "What are you doing here with him?" She said me and Chez are real good friends. You and Chez need to stop this thing that's going on. Everything kind of subsided after that.

MR: Now that you're back, are you going to get back on the AAU scene?

CW: I'm actually coaching again at New Heights. I'm back at New Heights with Rocky Rosa. I'm grateful that New Heights gave me the opportunity to come back. I coached with the New York Elite this summer that just passed. I just wanted to not come back to the same scene. I still had the passion to coach, so I went and coached with the New York Elite. [Administrators] Debbie [Brajevich] and Marc [Riley] were gracious to allow me to come back and coach. I just knew

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in my heart that I wanted ώ to be back at New Heights. It was just comfort. It was nothing personal against FEB. marc and Debbie at all. they allowed me the opportunity to see if I wanted to come REPORTER and coach again. I'm appreciative of that.

MR: Do you know what age group vou'll be coaching at New Heights?

CW: Yes. I'll be coaching the younger girls. I have an eighth-grade team. I'll be helping with the high school girls as well. But basically just focusing on my eighthgrade team.

MR: Were vou interested in working with the younger girls? What do you like about that age group?

CW: Yes. That's the same age I had with my national team. What happens with the vounger girls is you get a chance to mold them. They get used to the way you coach. A lot of times the girls in high school are set in their ways. When you get them younger, you get more involved with the families, vou get more involved with the kids. Besides basketball, this thing for me is character building. One thing I learned about this game is that none of these kids are yours. If these kids want to go somewhere else, you have to be susceptible to that being an AAU coach. You would hope that they stayed with you, but if they didn't vou would wish them luck and that's that.

MR: How do you think you've changed over the years? Do you think caring for your mother affected how you live now?

CW: I think what happened with me is just the growth. You can be grown, but you have to grow up when you deal with situations. That's basically what happened to me with the AAU thing. I can say that me and Apache totally made amends with each other. We were able to talk and communicate on the phone. I can call him and say, "Apache this is what I'm doing." He'd call me back. We had a nice relationship toward the end.

MR: Like you said earlier, people were saying Chez is in jail or Chez is doing this or that, how did

that make you feel and how would you respond to those who were saying those things about you?

CW: That's a tricky question. The reason why I say it's tricky, because people are always going to be people. I've learned how to let people be how they are. But until you find out facts about what's going on with somebody, you can only assume just like everybody else. It wasn't like I couldn't get in contact with anybody. I kind of isolated myself, because I wanted to get myself together, because spiritually I wasn't there. I didn't want to be approached by anybody like, "What's wrong?" I didn't want to answer any questions. I abandoned a lot of kids who were really worried about me. If I had to do it all again, I'd do it different. I would just let girls know in a group setting. I think that would have been a better way to do it than what I did. All I did was let people speculate based on how I separated myself. I can understand some of the comments. But like I said, God is in charge.

MR: There wasn't a lot of buzz when you came to Loughlin. You had so much success in AAU and high school. You're a big name guy. Did you not mind people not talking about it much?

CW: What happens is a lot of times people put you on a pedestal and for me it's not about me. It's about the kids. I came back that way. I didn't want anyone to really know I was coaching at Bishop Loughlin until they saw me on the sidelines. That was the goal - to come back quiet.

MR: Do you feel like you can help this program?

CW: Absolutely. Just letting kids see that you can be as good a basketball player as you want if you don't let your emotions dictate your behavior. I'm trying to get the kids to get a chance to know themselves a little bit. No matter what it is that you choose to do in life, you just have to apply yourself. That's my goal - to help kids achieve their goals. You got to be serious. These are kids' dreams, to be as successful as they can. You have to take that serious as a coach.

SNY Invitational cancelled

The SNY Invitational, a popular two-day tournament featuring the area's top teams set to be televised live on the regional sports network SNY, was canceled Thursday, the network announced, after a whirlwind two days trying to keep it alive.

The event was initially set for LIU's Brooklyn campus, before a relatively new NCAA rule forced SNY to attempt to move it to St. Ravmond – one of the four competing teams along with Cardozo, New Jersey powerhouse St. Anthony and Thomas Jefferson – in The Bronx at the last second, but that plan was scrapped as well for a variety of reasons, tournament organizers said.

"After being notified [on Wednesday], two days prior to the start of the SNY Invitational, that Long Island University was no longer available to us, we worked through the night to come up with what we believed was a viable plan to move the event to St Raymond High School for Boys," SNY said in a statement. "Unfortunately, as the details related to the large expected crowd and complex logistics became more clear, it was determined that St. Raymond's facility could not adequately accommodate an event of this size on 24 hours notice."

SNY has run the tournament each of the last four years, the first two years at NYU and last two at LIU. SNY

vice president of communications Andrew Fegvveresi said LIU approached the network on Wednesday about complications arising from NCAA bylaw 13.11.18, a rule enacted last April which prohibits non-scholastic events on a Division I campus as a way to prevent schools from hosting events as a recruiting tool.

LIU said in a statement that although the tournament involved high school teams, the NCAA deemed it "impermissible," and classified it as a non-scholastic event.

"Therefore, it would result in an NCAA violation if it were held at LIU Brooklvn," the statement read. "The university's appeal to the NCAA for a waiver was denied. LIU Brooklyn has exhausted all its options and appeals, in hopes of continuing to host this tremendous charity event."

LIU declined to elaborate on why this just recently came to light. Thinking quick, SNY spoke with coaches from all four teams and opted for St. Raymond.

SNY was moving its equipment into the gym to setup when administrators from the 43rd precinct called it off for safety reasons, St. Raymond coach Oliver Antigua said, because tickets had already been given out when the event was expected to be held at LIU, which holds up to 1,500 while St. Raymond isn't nearly as big.

"They could not guar-

antee safety," Antigua said. "There were not enough [police] cars for the amount of tickets given out. With the amount of people we hold, there would be 500 to 600 more people on the street. It was a potential riot scenario."

SNY plans to bring the event back in 2013 and said all four schools will receive the promised \$5,000 funding for participating and \$50,000 in scholarships as well.

"I'm disappointed because it's a great, great event. My kids were excited to shine on TV or get whipped on TV to get us closer to where we want to be." Cardozo coach Ron Naclerio said. 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theft, or the intentional damage to a scroll, religious vestment, vessel or any other item used in connection with religious worship in any religious institution to a Class D Felony punishable by up to seven years in prison. Currently, these charges would only apply in cases where items worth more than \$3,000 have been stolen, or where items have sustained more than \$1,500 in damages.

This legislation would also expand the definition of second degree larceny to include the theft of any item

worth more than \$250 used in connection with religious worship in any building of worship. This would be a Class C Felony punishable by 15 years in prison.

In addition, the senator's new legislation would seek to strengthen the penalty for any intentional damage to a house of worshipowned property to a Class E Felony punishable by four years in prison. Currently, this applies only to damage worth more than \$250.

Senator Klein's swift response to the recent assault on several of our religious institutions will show

Stiffer penalties for church vandals

recorded at Zoodohos Peghe Greek Orthodox Church, Our Lady of the Assumption Church and City Island's Temple Beth El.

Community leaders from the Pelham Bay Taxpayers, 45th Precinct Community Council, Waterbury LaSalle Community Association and Community Board 10 supported new legislation proposed by Senator Jeff Klein, at a press conference held near the entrance to Zoodohos Peghe on Sunday, January 29.

The new legislation would make theft or damaging of a religious item in a house of worship worth under \$250 into a Class D felony punishable by up to seven years in prison, up from a misdemeanor, while those stealing or damaging more the \$250 worth of church property could face five to 15^{-} years in prison.

"These assaults on a house of worship are assaults on the entire community," Klein said. "These vandals need to know that

there will be heavy consequences for their reckless and despicable crimes. This legislation will send that message and protect these scared institutions."

The disturbing patterns of thieves targeting houses of worship emerged in recent weeks, with Our Lady of Assumption school and parish being hit with the theft of \$400 and a stolen laptop, as well as a broken chapel door, according to Klein's office.

At the Greek church, there was the theft of several dollars from a candle donation box and destruction of an intricate wood carving made in Greece by a craftsman, said parish council president John Korres.

"This was just an unfortunate situation, and we have just as much pain for the person who was so desperate as we do for ourselves," Korres said, adding he believed that the depressed economy was causing a spike in these kinds of thefts. The breakin was his most devastating experience in more than 20

years on the parish council, Korres said.

On City Island at Temple Beth El, silver Torah crowns and Kiddush cups were stolen sometime around Friday. January 13. said Rabbi Shohama Wiener. The items were worth somewhere between \$5,000 and \$10,000. "People come [to the temple] because they feel that it is a safe home, but now that safety has been challenged," Wiener stated.

While the items were insured, they will not give the congregation back the sense of safety it once enjoyed. Wiener said. Temple Beth El is now considering bars for all first floor windows, upgraded locks, surveillance cameras, and an alarm system, Wiener stated.

Crimes against houses of worship should be treated more harshly because the entire community gets harmed when they occur, said 45th Precinct Community Council president Bob Bieder.

"A church is not just a building, it is a community," Bieder stated.

The 80th Assembly district would also now include a portion of Pelham Gardens and Allerton that was previously part of the 82nd Assembly district in the proposed plan, D'Angleo stated. He is especially concerned because he has seen the impact that dividing representation has had on Van Nest.

The Morris Park Business Alliance is also stanchly opposed to the new lines, said its president, Robert Ruggiero. Since the Alliance was founded in 2007. it has faced an uphill battle in dealing with several different state electeds, particularly in the Van Nest community.

"The damage done to

the Van Nest community due to decades of turf battles between politicians is reprehensible," Ruggiero stated. "Unresponsive political figures disregard the most basic support services available to them knowing that the community will pressure the assistance needed from the neighboring political figure. Now we're going to spread that poison around the St. Francis Xavier parish and alienate it from the rest of its community to what positive purpose?"

These new assembly district lines represent a major shift in power, said community leader Mark Gjonaj, who called the changes "ludicrous."

The new lines take a perfectlystrongcommunity and divides it to satisfy the needs of elected officials, and takes redistricting to a level where politicians can choose the community they represent, Gjonaj stated.
