Laura Rodriguez of Throggs Neck didn't realize she was running for her life at the Boston Marathon.

Neither did her fellow runners at the Van Cortlandt Track Club, recalling the moment they came close to death at the scene of a bloody terror bombing on Monday afternoon, April 15.

For Rodriguez, it was simply a day to test her endurance.

A medical assistant at Montefiore Medical Center, Rodriguez crossed the finish line at 3 hours and 4 minutes, roughly an hour before two explosions detonated on Boylston Ave., killing three and injuring 176.

Walking out of the Marriott Hotel on Exeter Street with her husband and a friend, Rodriguez was jolted by the explosion.

"It was the loudest thing I ever heard," she said. "Then like 12 seconds later, there was a second blast that went off and people just started running."

They also started screaming,

sprinting for their lives as a flood of ambulances jammed Boylston Avenue, stumbling onto a bloody scene of death and blown off limbs.

"It just brought 9/11 back again," said Rodriguez. "Like the feeling of not being safe and not knowing what's going to happen."

Rodriguez quickly tried to called her teammates from the track club, Bronx runners who practice year-round to qualify for the prestigious Boston Marathon. But cell phone service was down.


"I kept trying to text them 'please don't come to downtown Boston, you have to get out of here," recalled Rodriguez.

Good fortune was on the side of club president Bette Clark, who decided the day before not to go to the finish line.

Instead, she was riding the Tline near Heartbreak Hill at mile 21, about 5 miles from the finish line, spending the early afternoon cheering runners on.

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Sniper kills dog

Throggs Neck neighbor charged

A Throggs Neck family was mourning the murder of their beloved pet dog, while their neighbor was facing criminal charges for allegedly shooting it.

The Lopez family lost their beloved Spike, a Maltese who was an important part of their family for eight years, when neighbor Donald Savino, 73, allegedly shot the small dog with a pellet gun around 6 p.m. on Tuesday, April 9, according to court documents.

Marco Lopez, 49, was standing across the street from his home on Emerson Avenue looking at repairs on his wife's car and was verbally giving instructions to Spike, who was standing near the sidewalk in front of Savino's home at 272 Emerson Place, when he heard a "whoosh" sound, he said.

"I saw my dog just jump up in the air," said Lopez, "and I heard him scream really loudly in pain, and I

knew he had been shot."

Lopez said that he looked up and saw Savino standing in an upper floor window with a rifle.

"I screamed, 'why did you shoot my dog?""

Police called to the scene found a Crosman Arms .22 caliber air rifle with a hunting scope in Savino's basement, according to the court documents.

Spike staggered back into the family home, where Lopez realized that the pellet had gone through his body and come out the other side.

He called the police, and his wife brought Spike to a late-night veterinarian clinic in Forest Hill, Queens, where the family was told that the pellet had torn through vital organs, said Lopez.

"He was a tough little dog," said Lopez. "He was in pain, and he was not reacting well...he was getting worse and worse by the minute, and we had to make a decision."

Video of Spike's last moments shows one of Lopez's son, Daniel, 13, crying and saying to Spike, "I love you so much."

According to a complaint report, Savino admitted shooting the Lopez family's dog.

"Ok, I did it," Savino stated to police. "I didn't

mean to kill the dog. I just wanted to shoot it in the butt and scare him."

The complaint report states that Savino told police that over years he talked to his neighbor about the dog being off the leash.

Lopez said Savino had also complained about the dog urinating on a tree on his property.

Lopez wants to make it clear that Spike was not on Savino's property when he was shot.

Savino was arrested and arraigned in Bronx Criminla Court, charged with felony aggravated cruelty to animal and four misdemeanors, including criminal posession of a weapon, criminal mischief, firearms and torturing and injuring an animal.

He was later released.

"Spikey was part of the family," said Lopez. "We got him when he was a puppy, and since we got him, he was part of us. We gave him

a lot of love and had a lot of care for him."

Lopez also said that Spike had been shot once before with a pellet, but the shooter was unknown.To ease the pain, the family has adopted another dog, Lex, a cockapoo. They are also interested in adopting a dog that looks like Spike.

"I want people who love animals to know about this," said Lopez. "It is terrible."

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Morris Park: We want middle school!

Parents don't want to send kids out of neighborhood

The push is on for Morris Park to get its own junior high school.

With parents and community association members claiming they've become somewhat of a forgotten neighborhood, Morris Park Community Association president and Community Board 11 vice chair Al D'Angelo has been leading the charge to get the community its own junior high school.

D'Angelo met earlier this month with Monica Major, director of education & vouth for Borough President Diaz, to discuss the is-

"Basically, the students in District 11 have no place to go once they graduate from fifth grade, other than the other side of the parkway," D'Angelo said. "This is something that parents around here don't want.

They would rather have a school in this community."

Morris Park currently has two middle schools that accommodate 6th through 8th graders - P.S. 83 and Van Nest Academy- not nearly enough to accommodate the hundreds of graduating students from P.S. 108 and 105.

"When students graduate from 108 and 105, there is no place on this side of the parkway to go," D'Angelo

Because of overcrowding in neighborhood schools. students and parents were forced to use a lottery system last year, with the losers sent to schools at the far end of the school district near the Westchester County line.

Department Of Education officials admitted at a meeting last July with Councilman Jimmy Vacca and D'Angelo that were

not enough nearby middle schools to accommodate local graduating students.

The DOE is now claiming community District 11's need-which includes Morris Park and Van Nest—is at the elementary school level. A DOE spokesperson said the department is currently working on creating seats to meet the need.

Adding to the crunch, another K-5 school set to open on Lydig Avenue this

"What the DOE seems to keep doing is building schools in our area that are not serving the needs of our community," D'Angelo

One possible solution, he noted, would be to use the vacant lot on 180th street where the old ASPCA building once stood.

"We've proposed that to the DOE many times," D'Angelo said. "No one gets

back to us. We need a neighborhood school. That is one thing everyone in the community agrees on."

D'Angleo said the DOE has said - on more than one occasion - that "they are looking into all possibili-

Bronx Assemblyman Nelson Castro's resignation after his involvement in a bribery scandal has created political fallout in both his west Bronx district and the City Council one just east of it.

For those just back from another planet. Nelson was formally charged with bribery this month after wearing a wire for the feds since 2009 and allegedly ensnaring Morrisania Assemblyman Eric Stevenson in a bribe scheme.

Cut to the local chase: Yudelka Tapia. Nelson's female district leader in the 86th A.D., who's been eyeing a run for term-limited Council Majority Leader Joel Rivera's central Bronx seat, tells us she's now ready to go for Nelson's now vacant seat.

And why not? She has her own 400-member political club, what she predicts will be a \$35,000 campaign kitty by May, and a majority of the district's state committee members when the Bronx Democratic Party holds its nominating convention to back a candidate for the seat.

That and the fact she is Dominican in a heavily Dominican district, and expects support from northern Manhattan's Dominican electeds in a race that generally only pulls out 2,800 or so voters.

Yudelka still owes the city Campaign Finance Board over 100Gs in unaccounted for funds and fines from a previous race, and is awaiting a court ruling on that one.

But as one Bronx political operative put it, "If Yudelka can adjudicate that little problem with the CFB, she has a strong shot at it."

To which a Bronx elected added: "She could raise 10Gs and send out two mailers and call it a day in a special election there."

And that's even if Gov. Cuomo waits to fold the special election into either the September primary or November general election.

The cash-strapped city Board of Elections would love to save its \$350,000 cost by piggybacking it. The downside, of course, is the district will be leaderless for five to eight months.

As for that crowded City Coun-

cil race, if Yudelka does pull out, it could leave two of the leading candidates going head to head -Richie Torres, who's backed by Councilman Jimmy Vacca, and Joel's longtime chief of staff Albert Alvarez.

The 15th Council District covers Bathgate, Belmont, Crotona, Fordham, East Tremont, Van Nest and West Farms.

Whoever brings the most campaign bux and union backing to the table is most likely to get Dem Party backing, just about guaranteeing a win, which at the moment would seem to be the 24-year-old Torres.

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

Political scandals

Unfortunately, this past week New Yorkers were once again subjected to the turmoil of corruption allegations.

More unfortunate are the consequences these political scandals will leave behind for our community and our government.

As an elected official whose three predecessors violated the public's trust, I have experienced firsthand the consequences that develop in a community which has lost faith in the sys-

I have worked tirelessly to rebuild their trust and encourage them to participate in the process. Nevertheless, every time a political scandal erupts, that trust is once again challenged and the public is once again discouraged, further dissuading them even from participating in the political process.

Instead of allowing these disgraceful and dishonest actions to create a greater divide, I hope they will serve as a call to action to become more involved in the political process.

According to a study by George Mason University, only 35 percent of New Yorkers voted in 2010. It is even worse in New York City.

A study by the New York City Campaign Finance Board found fewer than one in five New Yorkers of voting age cast a ballot in the 2009 general election for mayor. In the November 2010 federal midterm and New York state elections, only 28 percent of city residents voted.

Too often, political scandals sour voters to the whole political process. If these scandals were to, instead, motivate the public to become more involved in the political process - and in the issues and decisions that elected officials are tasked with handling - it would lead to them being more accountable.

A more active, engaged and informed public has a better understanding of the role and purpose of government, more of an ability to voice dissatisfaction, more power to make change and leaves less room for corruption to flourish.

Schools Chancellor Dennis Walcott responds to parents' questions

Why are my child's tests getting harder? As a parent, I'm tired of hearing that this is going to be great for my kid.

Let's be honest. Tougher tests aren't the problem. The real problem is that too many of our kids aren't prepared to succeed in college or flourish in a career. We're not doing them any favors if we don't challenge them. It's time we raised the bar.

The new curriculum demands that your kids engage their creativity and intellectual curiosity. The goal is

to take them beyond the pages of their textbooks and prepare them for the real world.

The new tests will reflect that richer—and more challenging—coursework. When you set a new goal for yourself that feels out of reach, you work harder to meet it. This will be no different. And that's a good thing.

Why am I hearing that my child's test scores are going to drop?

There's no way to know how your child will do until he or she takes the test. But we're now measuring based on completely different, and tougher, criteria. The last tests measured basic skills. The new tests measure your child's ability to get into college or learn a skill after high school graduation.

Some states that have adopted the Common Core have seen lower test scores of over 30 points at first. We have

set new benchmarks in the past and our students have always risen to meet them and we think that over time they will do the same with these new standards.

I'm struggling to support my children with their homework. How can I help my child master the more challenging coursework?

We get that. We've worked hard to develop vast parent resources for you. They include sample questions similar to those that your children can expect to see on the new state tests, and "webinars" that I've hosted which explain the transition to the Common Core (for more information, search *NYC.gov* for Common Core Parent Resources).

If your child is struggling and needs extra help, talk to his or her teacher or to your school's parent coordinator. It's a new era in teaching and testing. I'm committed to helping your child succeed.

Push for Country Club traffic fix

Community leaders call on city DOT to change traffic flow

Country Club drivers are standing up for their right -

They say they've been hit with a ticket blitz at a key right-turn only street into their community.

Community leaders are pushing for a fix to that and other traffic problems in the quiet, residential enclave, and have asked Community Board 10 to request the city Department of Transportation study three problem locations there.

Under consideration is whether to keep the approach to the Country Club Road/ Jarvis Avenue overpass the same as traffic reaches it or to change the right lane to let drivers cross into Pelham Bay or make a right turn onto McDonough Place.

Other concerns are:

•having "no standing" signage on all three sides of the Greenstreet triangle Rawlins and Kearney Avenue, up from two-sides now

•improving traffic flow at a sharp turn at Siegfried Place and Country Club Road

"The board has asked that I send [letters] to the DOT to do a traffic study, and I will," said CB 10 district manager Kenneth Kearns. Kearns added: "It will take 90 days."

Kearns said the board's

municipal services committee heard Marcia Pavlica. president of the Country Club Civic Association, and her husband Richard, its community improvement chairman, at its April 9 meeting.

Richard Pavlica, who drew detailed maps of both the Greenstreet area and the Country Club Road/Mc-Donough Place (Bruckner Expressway service road), said that during the morning and evening commute, many Country Club and Spencer Estate drivers are receiving tickets when they go straight onto the viaduct while in the right lane of Country Club Road at McDonough Place.

"A police officer sometimes sits in a car on the viaduct and tickets drivers who go straight ahead in the right-turn-only lane," said Richard Pavlica.

He added that having only one lane of lawful traffic crossing over the Country Club Road/Jarvis Avenue overpass is creating backups on Country Club Road. He would like to see an rightturn arrow traffic light at the location, if he had his way.

"Logan Avenue and Bruckner Boulevard would be the precedent," said Pavlica. "They have a timed arrow traffic light."

But if the traffic arrow idea does not work, he suggested that DOT could also




Country Club Road, as drivers approach McDonough Place going west, allows only one lane of lawful traffic to go forward across the viaduct.

install new signage and road markings allowing the right lane of traffic to turn right or go straight.

On Rawlins Avenue, installing a third "no-standing anytime" sign at the Greenstreet triangle would increase driver visibility for those making a sharp left turn to continue traveling north-bound on Kearney Avenue, said Pavlica.

Downed signage at the location could also be replaced, they both said.

While it would require the loss of one or two parking spaces at the Greenstreet triangle, Marcia Pavlica said avoiding any other loss of parking spaces in the community, where parking is at a premium, should be avoided.





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
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Seek advisory board for Montefiore Square

Community leaders and elected officials are waiting for Montefiore Medical Center to bring what a majority of other Bronx hospitals already have to its new Montefiore Westchester Square facility - a community advisory board.

With the borough's medical giant scooping up the assets of the bankrupt Westchester Square Medical Center earlier this year, Community Board 10 called several community leaders to ask if they would be interested in sitting on such a board.

Councilman Jimmy Vacca has expressed hope that Montefiore will establish such an advisory board at some point soon, calling it "an important link between them and the community."

"It might behoove Mon-

tefiore to take advantage of the residents' knowledge and expertise if it wants to maximize its contribution to the neighborhood," said Vacca.

Such boards already exist at other local hospitals and medical facilities, including Jacobi Medical Center, North Central Bronx, Einstein, and Lincoln Medical Center, as well as separate boards for two of Lincoln's satellite clinic facilities.

The Health and Hospitals Corporation requires all city hospitals to have CABs, said a source familiar with CABs, adding that they are not mandatory for most medical facilities, and do not have direct control.

Since the new Montefiore Westchester Square facility opened, Montefiore has declined to say either way whether it plans to name an

advisory board for it's new facility, which includes New York State's first free-standing Emergency Department and same-day surgery unit.

"We are not committing to a community advisory board" Monte spokeswoman Mariann Caprino responded in an email.

One of the community leaders contacted by CB 10 about sitting on any Montefiore CAB was Westchester Square Civic Association founder Lou

When asked about an MWS advisory board, Rocco said he wondered how much influence it would actually have.

"It is their facility, and we are going to go along for a ride," said Rocco. "The only thing to do is to have a good relationship with Montefiore."





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Mother of crime victim holds fundraiser in son's memory

After the murder of her son, Joanne Cicero has found peace in helping crime victims.

Cicero knows all too well the pain and loss associated with crime.

Her 17-year-old son, Paul Cicero Jr., was stabbed to death on June 20, 1995 on Hering Avenue, as part of a meaningless dispute with a ruthless gang.

The Indian Village resident has since dedicated her life to helping those who have become victims of abuse and crime through an organization she founded called Crime Vicitims Support Services of the North Bronx.

The organization provides counseling and emergency services to victims of all kinds of crime and abuse. Victims of crime are referred to the program through police precincts in the area and the medical examiners office.

Cicero, executive director of the organization, said she opened the Neill Avenue office in 2005 after North Bronx -Westchester Neighborhood Restoration Association, a similar crime victims support program she was involved with, lost its state funding.

Cicero said she ran a local assistance program for crime victims as an outgrowth of other programs already operated through the NBWNRA.

"I didn't want to give up this program, so I went and got my 501-c3, and I changed the name and this

This year, the organization will host its first Paul Cicero Jr. Memorial Fundraiser, a bingo game, to help increase the program's dwindling funds.

"We desperately need money," she said. "We are funded through the federal government filtered down through the state, but we also need matching money. We have to match like \$35,000. It's going to be a struggle."

Cicero said this is the first year the program has needed to hold a fundrais-

"We do get donations, but we usually get them from the state legislature," Cicero said. "But this year, they have no money to give

The fundraiser will be held on Friday, May 3 at the Morris Park Community Association, at 1824 Bronxdale Avenue from 7-10 p.m.

Admission is \$10 per person and includes one bingo card, a goodie bag, one free ticket for a door prize drawing and complimentary coffee and cake.

Cicero said the organization, which has helped 400 victims over the past year is an important part of the community.

"This makes me feel

good that I can help people," Cicero said. "When they come in here, I can tell them I know exactly how is mine now," Cicero said. vou feel."

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

TNCAP launches new campaign

A Throggs Neck organization dedicated to preventing teen drinking and drug use has launched a website to help parents talk to their teens about the harmful ef-

The website, theriskisreal.org, was developed as part of a grant given to the Throggs Neck Community Action Partnership and 10 others similar groups by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance

It was developed specifically for the Throggs Neck area based on a survey of parents and teenagers by TNCAP in 2011, said Fran Maturo, executive director of the Archdiocese of New York Drug Abuse Prevention Program, sponsor of TNCAP.

"We are often led to believe that underage drinking is a right of passage," said Maturo, "but research shows that youth who start drinking before the age of 15 are four times more likely to have alcohol dependency."

Maturo said the goal of "The Risk is Real" campaign, which also includes posters in local schools, churches, and businesses, is to encourage parents to talk to their kids about the dangers of teen drinking and act as role models.

"We want parents to talk to their teens early

and often, and this campaign helps parents learn the risks and how to avoid them," she said.

The web site includes a mix of videos and narratives from teens and parents, with helpful hints for parents on how to best to approach their adolescents.

"They are hearing from real parents about what they observe in their children," said Maturo. "There are also conversation starters that go along with the video that parents can use as a guide. Sometimes parents may be interested in watching a video on the site with their own children, and they can use it that

The website features links to social media such as Facebook and Twitter, and plenty of videos that feature real parents who were in the dark about drinking and drug abuse of their teens.

The social marketing campaign was developed by the instructional media company "Connect with Kids."

Maturo said that ADAPP/TNCAP may follow up with another survey in the coming months to determine the effectiveness of "The Risk is Real" cam-

She said it was a big step forward for TNCAP, founded in 1998.

Janet Bliss, the organization's coordinator of community programs, said ADDAP/TNCAP's 2011 survey found:

•Drinking increases from 9th grade at 22% to 11th grade at 51% of teens drinking alcohol.

•The majority of 11th grade youth surveyed said they did not think their parents saw their drinking as a problem.

"This is just unacceptable," said Bliss. "Our goal is to educate parents and teens about what really happens as a result of youth drinking, and teach them to 'think before they take a drink."

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Bronx getting a hi-tech high school

Bronx Academy for Software Engineering opening fall 2013

The city Department of Education is looking to keep up with the fastestgrowing technology sector in the country by opening a software engineering school in the Bronx.

The Bronx Academy for Software Engineering, a four year career and technical education (CTE) high school, will be opening this fall.

The school is set to open with 115 ninth graders at the Grace Dodge Career and Technical High School campus at 2474 Crotona Ave., near Fordham University.

Students will receive four years of training in programming, software design and app development.

The curriculum calls on students to engage in creative, solution-orientated problem solving, with all of the learning revolving around the context of community.

Students' senior projects will involve taking on an issue directly related to a community they care about, and then using design thinking and software engineering to work toward a meaningful solu-

There is no screening process, and any eighth grade student can apply to be accepted, according to the city Department of Education.

During their four years in the CTE program, students will build portfolios to showcase their skills.

helping to ensure they will be ready for college or to enter into the industry.

Ben Grossman, the school's principal, started his career in education at a transfer high school in the Bronx. He joined a Children First Network in 2010 as an achievement coach and later as director of achievement, providing instructional support to a network of 30 NYC public schools

He has worked closely with principals and assistant principals to conduct network quality reviews and has trained school leaders on city and state school accountability.

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



Dr. Sheldon Teperman helps victims of major trauma like gun shot wounds survive.

Now he is on a mission to push for tougher guncontrol laws in the wake of the Newtown, CT school shootings that left 26 dead last December.

The 52-year-old Riverdale native became a doctor at Jacobi's Level 1 Trauma Center when he was just 22 years old, just as the crack epidemic of the mid-80s and it's gun violence soared.

"If you were a trauma surgeon in the Bronx, you got to be an expert in penetrating trauma, particularly gun shot wounds," he said.

"I was too young when I graduated medical school, and I think a lot of this was like a hydrant hitting me," he said. "It was all I could do to get the medicine right and the horror of it all was just was sort of blasting past me, because my job was basically putting my finger in the dyke of all this blood."

Several incidents broke through the wall that Teperman and other doctors like him put up during their daily routines at busy, urban trauma cen-

One was a shot teenager Teperman lost to cardiac arrest after being saved from wounds.

Another was a gang execution where the victim, shot in the head, lived, but had part of her face blown

A third was 92-vear-old

Sadie Mitchell, shot in her Williamsbridge home by a stray bullet from a street fight outside in 2009. Teperman, who had met Mitchell previously, said he was literally holding her heart when she died.

It all led Teperman to become an activist in the war against gun violence, fighting for tougher gun regulation.

"I used to say that I am the 'patron saint of lost causes,' because I have been tilting at this windmill for 13 years," he said, "and it was literally nothing up until Newtown." Teperman, a board member at New Yorkers Against Gun Violence, is now lobbying to get Congress to close a loophole that allows people to buy firearms at gun shows without a background check.

He and his staff were recently inundated with protest calls from gun owners and even a National Rifle Association

official, he said - "People like to remind me that I piss off people who own guns."

He said the resistance in the fight to ban assault weapons is "all about the money made by the civilian gun industry, about \$12 billion a year."

"This is all and only about money. It always has been," he said. "This is not about the second amendment, and it never has been."

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City envisions major changes for Webster

Bronx institutions in line to anchor "main street" look

A major Bronx corridor crisscrossing a spectrum of nabes is set to rebrand itself as a key economic player.


A Request for Proposal is now available until Apr. 19 to operators looking to run the incubator, part of the Leveraging Innovations and our Neighborhoods in the Knowledge (LINK) Entrepreneurship Program.

The program will provide 30 aspiring Bronx-based merchants with business loans. incubator space, and meet and greet opportunities with already established institutions such as The Bronx Zoo. Fordham University, The New York Botanical Garden and Montefiore Medical Cen-

The quadrant of groups make up the Four Bronx Institutions Alliance, considered the economic bait to the lofty endeavor intent to drive up tourism.

"The vision plan for Webster Avenue provides a roadmap," said EDC head Seth Pinsky. "Not only for connecting great Bronx neighborhoods, but for integrating historic Bronx institutions with new business and residential development."

The Vision Plan comes just two years after the City Council voted to rezone

80 blocks of Webster Avenue, between Woodlawn and Fordham Road. The

changes okayed an extra 430,000-square-fett of business space and 950 more residential units to an area flanked with empty lots, mechanic shops and residential buildings.

The area, mostly within the Beford Park/Fordham area was also known for its late-night drag races, car wrecks and fatal shootings.

These days, with crime in the downswing, businesses have been bullish on the Bronx, buying up property along the strip while prices are still low.

Recently, the Stagg Group purchased \$2.25 million worth of property in the Bedford Park/Fordham Area.

Meanwhile, other major projects like the Fordham Road Reconstruction project are underway, helping to ease congestion to the already crowded nexus of

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E. Fordham rezoning hearings

With a long stretch of Webster Ave. primed for development thanks to rezoning, city officials are ramping up similar efforts for a neighboring strip.

East Fordham Road, long considered the stepchild to its more bustling west end, will be the subject of several upcoming public hearings outlining the Department of City Planning's rezoning campaign.

Under the proposal, twelve blocks will be rezoned between Bathgate Ave. and Southern Blvd., allocating space for more affordable housing, offices and businesses to complement the medical offices, gas stations and auto body shops already settled into that stretch of road along the Fordham/Belmont strip.

City officials intend to strike a balance between the nabe's current and future look, grandfathering in established shops while boosting the economic upside.

"Everybody benefits," said David Rose, owner of Automotive Realty Corp., a 65-year-old business with six lots falling within the rezoned territory.

The area has been largely viewed as underutilized, given its closeness the Bronx Zoo and New York Botanical Garden, which officials argue are greatly impacted by the diminished foot traffic.

"A lot of the businesses had to move because the city took away their parking," said Community Board 6 District Manager Ivine Galarza. "Then they came with the Select Bus Sevice to make it worse."

Public Hearings

But before anything's approved, officials have outlined seven areas that could pose a health hazard from the rezoning plan should it move forward.

They run from noise pollution to how much shadows are cast by any new buildings.

Officials plan on finding solutions that could ease those issues, with help from neighbors participating in the public hearings.

They want folks to stop by at One Fordham Plaza for a

10 a.m. meeting April 30.

Galarza will be attending, having waited months on any movement to this plan.

"We haven't had a meeting about this for over a year," said Galarza, who envisions a "cosmopolitan" makeover for the area housing Fordham University.

Galarza said she has sensed a shift in tone from the Bloomberg administration, now pushing for this plan with greater urgency.

"This leads me to think it's going to go forward fast," said Galarza.

Following the April meeting, CB6's Planning Committee will hold a May 2nd public hearing at 6 p.m. on the rezoning effort, with planning officials expected to make a presentation, to be repeated at the board's May 8th general meeting.

If CB6 votes in favor of the rezoning, it will then go through the lengthy Uniform Land Use Review Process (ULURP), followed by a full vote by the City Council.

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

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Pratt sculpture resides at the Huntington Free Library

The Huntington Free Library at 9 Westchester Square is like a museum. Even the material that it is constructed of seems to be born of antiquity.

Created by famed architect Frederick C. Withers, the same person who along with Calvert Vaux designed the Jefferson Market Courthouse on Sixth Avenue at 10th Street in Greenwich Village which was much later taken over by the New York City Public Library, still attracts many tourists as well it should for its overall beauty both inside and out.

The Huntington Free Library, too, has been toured by many who admire the work of the architect. His personality seems steeped in its rugged stone walls and arched rib ceiling.

Walking into the building is like stepping back in time and the first thing that attracts one's attention is the bronze relief of Collis P. Huntington, the library founder. Sculpted by B. L. Pratt in 1911, it was a later addition to

this wonderful old building, but one that sets the tone for visitors by advising them of the structure's genesis.

It is actually one of two such sculptures. The other adorns a wall at the Hispanic Society of America, an organization established by Collis P. Huntington's step-son, Archer Milton Huntington, in 1904. It is located at Audubon Terrace off 155th Street and Broadway in Washington Heights and is home to a vast array of art work and books attracting visitors from around the globe. The reliefs are both the same size: 105.5 centimeters high and 74.2 centimeters wide. and bear the inscription on the bottom: "This building is dedicated to the memory of Collis Potter Huntington" in bold lettering and both are signed by the artist.

The one at the Huntington Free Library holds a special place of honor as it is just inside the front door and can't be missed when entering the building.


The library attracts numerous visitors as it also offers a host of research material on the history of the Bronx and displays numerous other works of art by noted artists such as an 1893 portrait of Collis Potter Huntington painted by William Edgar Marshall, a leading portrait artist of the day. Other Marshall works at the library include rare early prints of his engravings of presidents Washington and Lincoln.

Bela Lyon Pratt (1867-1917) was born in Norwich, Connecticut and educated at Yale University after which he attended Ecole des Beaux

Arts in Paris. Upon returning to America, he went to work for Augustus Saint Gaudens creating a number of museum quality pieces along with sculptures for the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago.

That same year he became the professor of sculpture at the Boston Museum School of Fine Art, a position he held until his death 20 years later. Numismatists know him as the designer of the two and a half and five dollar gold coins in 1908 that were once so popular in America and still hold a place of special interest to that group due to their incuse design.

His sculptures can be found throughout the nation and his portrayal of Nathan Hale from 1914 seems to be among his most popular. It is located at Yale University and a copy is at the CIA. A good number of his works can be found at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston but before traveling to find some outstanding examples of his

sculptures, why not stop by the Huntington Free Library at 9 Westchester Square right here in the Bronx and examine his bronze relief of Collis P. Huntington.

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

The stunning wave of the most recent corruption charges that have hit New York politicians barely scratches the surface. Unfortunately, practices long considered legal, but which are utterly immoral, have become the norm, and they have virtually destroyed the integrity of the State's electoral and governing processes.

Back in the heyday of Tammany Hall, bribes, graft and corruption were standard operating procedure. The organization began in the 1790s, and from the 1854 election of Mayor Fernando Wood to the 1932 election of John O'Brien, that group, (named after the Lenape Indian chief Tamanend), was the city's leading power. Mayor Jimmy Walker, who left office in disgrace over corruption, became its most famous symbol. The great political cartoonist,

Thomas Nast, rose to fame with his scathing criticism of Tammany's practices.

Tammany Hall-style corruption didn't end with the elimination of its influence. As has been seen in the most recent series of indictments against Democrat elected officials and several New York City Republican Party leaders, it merely changed form.

Today, something far more insidious assaults the integrity of New York's government, and the honesty of our electoral process. It has less to do with practices that are officially illegal, and therefore indictable, and far more to do with politicians rewriting the rules to benefit their own careers in ways America's Founding Fathers would have clearly rejected.

In 1947, State Senator Irwin Pakula, and Assembly Member Malcolm Wilson (who eventually went on to become governor) intro-

duced a new law that mandated that candidates not registered in the political party whose endorsement they were seeking had to secure the permission of party leaders to run. There were and are a number of valid reasons for the concept, but it also opens the door for some corrupt political bosses to demand illegal compensation in return for their support.

The disruption of the electoral process also continues in, ironically, what was meant to be a reform movement: the implementation of campaign finance laws. Again, there were many with good intentions who introduced the concept in an effort to reduce the in-

fluence of dollars. Unfortunately, in practice, the idea has become a major pillar of party boss strength, and an opportunity for illicit money making. Regulations and compliance practices that make the IRS Code look like child's play insure that only those with the right connections to political bosses (and their in-tow legal staff), or those who are wealthy enough to hire a whole battery of lawyers and accountants with particular knowledge of the field, can successfully navigate the process. Frank Capra's "Mr. Smith" will never get to Washington (or Albany, or City Hall) in this environment.

In the most recent revelations, Democrat State Senator Malcolm Smith is charged with bribing two Republican leaders to get their OK to run on the GOP line. That's an illegal act. But what about Mayor Bloomberg's "generosity" to two political parties in return for their support of his elections? A review of Mr. Bloomberg's extremely liberal pre-mayoral contributions certainly doesn't point to an affinity with those parties' beliefs. Legally, that slips under the wire, but morally, it's difficult to tell the difference. Plain and simple, he bought the endorsements.

Sheldon Silver, speaker of the State Assembly, has presided over one of the most corrupt legislative bodies in the nation, and has engaged in numerous activities that are clearly a conflict of interest. Yet, his reign continues.

Unfortunately, the public is not blameless. Many involved and active citizens belong to wonderful community organizations, groups which, of course need funds to operate. Thanks to the concept of "member items,"

discretionary funds from state or local governments which are distributed at the direction of local elected officials, members of the City Council, State Assembly and State Senate can provide those necessary dollars—with the unspoken understanding that no matter how otherwise odious that elected official is, the beneficiaries of his or her largesse will nevertheless ask their members to provide votes or volunteers in the next election cycle.

The apprehension of crooked politicos for violations of the law is a step in the right direction. But the job will not truly be done until illicit, but still legal, forms of electoral abuse are outlawed.

If last year's budget was described as a "mixed bag", we are anxious to know how he will describe this year's budget.

Having just tidied up and submitted our own income taxes, as homeowners and taxpayers we are very conscious of our personal finances.

At our March meeting, there were complaints regarding the delivery of mail to our homes. A new postmaster for 10465 and the retirement of several key postal employees at the Throggs Neck branch seem to have allowed for some problems to arise.

The banding of mail into carrier routes is now being done at a distribution center far from the observing eyes of our favorite longtime carriers and the use of fill ins from other post offices indicates mail is not being visually scanned by the all knowing carrier. There is also a problem with the traffic exiting I95, merging on Mac-Donough and then trying to turn left onto the over-

The problem was presented to Bronx NYC Department of Transportation (DOT) which asked that the situation be presented to Community Board 10's Municipal Services Committee.

No problem, except that the committee was scheduled and then cancelled and we had to wait one more month for our day in court.

We asked that our two DOT items be calendared as definite listings rather than as "new business". Three calendars listed us in place for our two presentations.

Then, a Co-op City item appeared on the agenda and then a sewer project was added to the agenda, so our CCR item moved farther and further down the list to be discussed. It was a long evening!

Now, following CB 10's procedure, the item and our suggestions have finally be given for consideration to NYC Bronx DOT.

The replacement of traffic signage on a greenstreet at Kearney and Rawlins was also submitted. The original signs were removed by parties unknown, thus allowing for illegal parking which caused visibility problems at the merge point of the two streets.

Both items have now found their rightful place in the hands of Bronx DOT for resolution. !!!...

Please tell your friends in Pelham Bay, Country Club, Throggs Neck and all of the smaller communities that they should attend this hearing if they have any concern that relates to zoning.

And who doesn't have a concern! Are you driving around looking for a parking spot when you shop in our commercial areas? It's maddening that we must waste time and gas to shop in our own community. We need municipal lots in our commercial districts and they are long overdue.

Are you wondering where all of the one family homes are going? Well, they are being gobbled up by larger homes with smaller yards and the city gives a tax incentive to do this! Does anyone in city government think about the consequences of making our community so dense? Our schools are bursting at the seams. We can't park in front of our homes or even on the same block! What about the infrastructure! What are they thinking?

We have apartment buildings. We have two and three

family homes. What we don't have are one family homes with yards, garages and enough space to comfortably raise a family. And young couples are leaving our area to find those one family homes. If our community is to remain viable, we must keep our young families here. We should be giving tax abatements for what we need in this community-decently sized one family homes. Instead we give tax abatements for what we have too much ofmulti-family homes, and all it does is squeeze us in like sardines and make our lives miserable! City Planning is not responding to the needs of this community nor has it planned our commercial areas well.

We have laws that make absolutely no sense and those laws negatively impact our quality of life. More importantly, they are dangerous! But no one seems to care, even when the lives of our firemen are taken because the DOB just refuses to enforce the laws that do make sense!

Many residents in our community have illegally converted apartments. They are dangerous to the people who live in them and the firemen who will come to save them if a tragedy strikes.

Firemen have lost their lives and still the DOB will not enforce the law. We live in hard economic times and we are all struggling to pay the bills but doing something illegal and dangerous is not the answer. Those of us that do follow the law are impacted negatively by those that choose to disobey the law, and the DOB will not protect the law abiding citizen.

Zero lot line homes are an example of city government turning their back on the people. It's happened too many times in our community and it absolutely must stop! It's just plain unacceptable for a structure to be built so close to an existing house that the gutter or the side of the house cannot even be repaired. We need a minimum of three feet between every building. This is the only thing that makes sense.

How sad it is that in our community you can buy a home and then in an instant your whole life can change. You can't even open a window on one entire side of your home and let the sun and fresh air in. It's an out-

rage!

Why is it that the Board of Standards and Appeals always seem to be on the side of the builder? Who's watching out for our rights? In the last downzoning Schuylerville was lucky enough to have our required lot width expanded to 30 feet. But the BSA will allow two houses

to be built on a lot of 55 feet. One house on the 30' lot and instead of requiring the additional 25' to be the yard of that house, they allow another house to be built. The width of 30' should stand in all circumstances.

City government and our politicians work for us. We must let them know that the

zoning must change. We fought for downzoning in 2008 and 2009 and we won. We can do it again. We must speak in one unified voice and we must stand together. Please put the May 9th public hearing in your calendar and ask your friends and neighbors to attend. Together we can!

Mental Attitude: Video Games and Happiness? Older adults who play video games are more likely to be happier and have better emotional health. Those who played video games (even those who said they just played occasionally) reported a greater sense of well-being. The seniors who did not play video games reported more negative emotions and a likelihood toward increased levels of depression. - Computers in Human Behavior, March

Health Alert: Dementia Death Rate Soars! Dementia and Alzheimer's disease have risen from the 24th leading cause of death in the United Kingdom to the 10th in the last 20 years. Dementia is now one of the

top 10 (and fastest rising)

causes of death. Not including the untold human cost, dementia costs the UK economy £23 billion a year. - *The Lancet, March 2013*

Diet: Heart Healthy Lifestyle Also Lowers Cancer Risk. People who adhere to 6 out of the 7 factors from The American Heart Association's "Life's Simple 7 Steps" to reduce heart attack risk also reduced their risk of cancer by 51%. Those who followed at least four of the 7 factors decreased their cancer risk by 33%. The seven factors include: being physically active, keeping a healthy weight, eating a healthy diet, maintaining healthy cholesterol levels, keeping blood pressure down, regulating blood sugar levels, and not smoking. - American Heart Association March, 2013

Exercise: Exercise and Sleep. Light, moderate, and vigorous exercisers are more likely to experience restful sleep than non-exercisers (67% vs. 39%). If you are inactive, taking a ten minute daily walk could improve your likelihood of a good night's sleep. -National Sleep Foundation, March 2013

Chiropractic: Don't Wait. While patients with chronic (>3 months) low back pain generally report good outcomes following chiropractic care, patients with acute pain (<4 weeks) recover faster. - Journal of Manipulative and Physiological Therapeutics, July 2012

And until our next monthly Community Meeting, EACH weekend we will be conducting our Thwaites & Olinville "Love Your Block" Beautification project, with activities for the youth and adults alike to participate in. It will all culminate into our June 22nd Block Party Extravaganza on Thwaites Place between Barker and Olinville Avenues!

Cultivating Community

So, join us this Saturday, April 20th as we do some tree care on Olinville Avenue, and then watch one of our neighborhood artists start the first of many artpieces on the graffitied rolldown gates on the Thwaites Place small-business strip.

The last two weekends have featured painting activities to contribute towards our neighborhood's Spring Renewal: We painted over the graffitied walls of

our neighborhood grocery store on Sunday the 7th, and then gave a fresh coat of blue and green to our mailboxes on Saturday the 13th.

We're making our block pristine and brand new, baby, prepping it for the ultimate makeover: Frames for our Natural Arboreal Wonders and Art Pieces within the Frames of our Stores' Roll-down gates.

So, the first thing we'll be doing this Saturday is cleanup and cultivation.

As per the MillionTrees NYC standard, we'll be cleaning, then weeding, cultivating, and mulching the tree-bed soil that is so vital to the health of our street trees. We'll be beautifying the tree bed, forming an upto-par "mulch donut", that will benefit the trees, and not to mention the Parks Department, in many ways:

1. Mulch (commonly referred to as wood-chips) adds vital nutrients and protection to the tree's soil, which is often contaminated with cigarettes and other toxic substances from the urban environment.

2. It helps the tree's soil retain water, lessening evaporation during the scorching summer months.

3. It also helps the tree attain water, if the tree stewards form a proper "mulch donut" which guides rainfall into a 24 inch "bowl" around the trees' roots.

4. And finally, Mulch is beautiful! Putting a fresh layer of these wood-chips really makes our street trees, and thus our blocks, so much prettier and attractive.

And not to mention, mulch smells wonderful! You don't often get to experience that aroma in the stuffy city, so come by and experience it. We'll be helping the Parks Department. as they are burdened with "Cities" of mulch, due to the damage done to NYC's Canopy by Hurricanes Irene and Sandy. So, like many things in life, it'll be mutually beneficial, for both the Community and for the Parks Department.

They need to use it, and

we need to use it!

An Artistic Renaissance

We'll also be doing something that's both revolutionary and common sense: Transforming the oftengraffitied metal roll-down gates of Thwaites Place's businesses into an artistic promenade of varied, visual masterpieces, created by artists that reside in our

I mean, why should we paint these 9 gates plain grey? Just so they can get graffitied in another month or two?

No. Let's be both preventative and practical.

If we replace a plain grey gate with say, a portrait, a landscape, or any other type of visual masterpiece (which there is precedence for), it is MUCH less likely that it will be scrawled or tagged in the coming months.

And above all, it'll be something that everyone on our block will take PRIDE in. WE painted over the graffiti, and WE also created something unique.

your thing, give a try I guess. Mix the milk and the milk powder in a heavy saucepan and bring to a boil (212 degrees) stirring constantly over a low heat. Pour the mixture into a warm pyrex type bowl and let it cool until 80 to 85 degrees. Whisk in the yogurt until smooth and pour into four clean 8-ounce glass

jars with lids. Using a glass baking dish large enough to accommodate the jars, line the bottom with a cloth dishtowel and arrange the jars on the towel. Fold the heating pad into a "c" shape and drape over the jars. Drape another towel on top and turn the heating pad to the lowest setting. The yogurt should thicken to the consistency of thin custard in about 5 to 6 hours. Refrigerate. NOTE: Always save a few tablespoons to make the next batch!

I started my tomato seeds yesterday, six of each type of twelve varieties. Why so many Different varieties prosper or fail depending on each year's weather conditions. One year I won't get any Green Zebra's but the next year, I get plenty. Blossom rot will infect the Opalka Paste and nothing else. One year, I planted two Pink Brandvwine next to two Black Krim and they must have cross pollinated because I ended up with four of the same tomato.

From tomatoes to potatoes...In Peru, where the potato was first cultivated on the steep slopes of the Andes, they grew over 500 different types in a rainbow of colors and sizes. The rocky, mountainous terrain created individual microclimates that allowed these early agriculturalists develop this myriad selection so that if the crop of blue potatoes that grew on the south facing mountain failed, the crop of red potatoes that grew on the west facing slope would probably not.

When the potato was introduced in Ireland, it was a boon to their diet. The potato was perfectly suited to the environment and when combined with milk, it provided the proper nourishment to help the Irish population prosper and grow. However, they only planted one type of potato, the "Lumper". Beginning in September of 1845, an airborne fungus attacked the fields and destroyed the potato harvest. Unlike previous crop failures that had been mostly limited and regional, this failure infected the whole country and lead to the huge crisis called the Irish Potato Famine.

Had we known then about the perils of monocrops, a variety of potatoes would have been grown and we would have found what the ancient Peruvians knew all along - crop diversity is the best bet against crop failures. Beautiful diversity, just like in humanity, where we are each equal and yet unique. Why eat the same potato day in and day out when there are over 500 varieties? Why eat the same

pretty but bland "vine ripened" tomato when you can indulge in a platter of tomatoes that resembles the rainbow of yellow, orange, red, green, pink, ruby, burgundy and blood red. Why eat food that uses salt, fat and sugar as it's only "seasoning" when you can eat food that is seasoned with nutritive herbs and spices?

Is it a good thing that when you buy a fries at a fast food place in NYC it tastes exactly the same as the fries from the same chain's outpost in LA? Marketers appeal to us by promoting this homogenous industrial food as "comforting" and "convenient". We fall prey to food trends, like "low fat", "low carb" and "natural". I noticed the recent trend is adding "Greek Yogurt" in everything. In cereal? Come on folks, you can't possibly believe that's real and has the same benefits of eating true yogurt. Back in the 70's, my mom and I learned how to make "Greek Yogurt" from the nice Greek lady that moved next door to us. That science experiment in a cardboard box, that's not real food...but more about that later.

Why preach to you about the dangers of the monocrop? Why go around trying to get people to join a CSA? Because the industrial food system is killing our planet and I could write article after article about it's dangers, citing facts, figures and statistic to substantiate this. But I'd rather entice you with the idea of gardening, the joys of composting and the taste experience of good, pure, simple food. Do I care that you start reading books like "Diet for a Hot Planet". "In Defense of Food" and "This Organic Life"? Of course I do. Does it matter if you watch documentaries like "Carbon Nation", "Food Inc" or "The Weight of the Nation"? Of course it does. But you need to get there on your own.

And so, with tongue planted firmly in cheek, following: offer the Whether it be through the feed used for the animals that feed us or through the science experiments that have processed it into thousands of food additives, corn makes up a huge part of our diet (check out the documentary "King Corn" if you'd like to find out for yourselves). Native Americans used corn as part of the "Three Sisters" in combination with beans and squash. Corn provided them with carbohydrates and the beans provided the protein. The combination of the two provided all the essential amino acids and squash provided vitamins. Squash seeds provided oil, rounding out the major nutrients as fat.

They also knew to add slaked lime, or calcium hydroxide, when preparing corn so that the niacin in corn can be absorbed. Having calcium in your diet is important because if your body can't absorb the niacin in corn, you end up with a disease called In "Wicked pellagra. Plants", Amy Stewart tells the tale of how after corn was introduced to Europe in the early 18th Century, it became the primary source of food for many poor people. Soon enough. these people began to show the symptoms of pellagra, which were known as the four D's: dermatitis, dementia, diarrhea and death. It's also believed that these "ghastly symptoms" inspired the myth of vampires. It also caused sleepless nights and digestive problems.

Of course today, corn is considered a healthy part of a balanced diet when eaten with other foods. But what if you take into account all the corn we don't realize we're eating? Could that be the reason we see so many ads for sleeping medications and heartburn pills? Is our country suffering from a national case of low grade pellagra? Does this explain the "dementia" of a nation that feeds itself on a diet of fake food to the point where we have more people overfed than underfed? And what happens if a disease comes along and destroys the corn crop for two or three years, as we

saw in Ireland with the po-

Drug trafficking crews charged

Twelve alleged members of drug trafficking crews based around the Allerton Avenue Co-ops and the Parkside Houses have been slapped with additional charges, federal and local officials announced.

As alleged in a superseding indictment returned Wednesday, April 10 and other documents:

From 2006 through February 20, 2013, undercover NYPD officers made hundreds of significant street level quantities of crack cocaine buys from drug dealers there.

In addition, members of the drug trafficking organization used firearms, threats of violence, and violence to secure and enforce their drug territory.

That included the 2010 murder of Lequan Jones, the 2010 murder of Carl Copeland, and the 2011 murder of Shameek Young. An innocent bystander was critically wounded when Young was killed.

In the new superceding indictment, 11 of the 12 defendants were charged with conspiracy to distribute crack cocaine, and possessing, brandishing and discharging firearms in connection with, and in furtherance of, the charged crack cocaine conspiracy.

In connection with the crack cocaine conspiracy, Armani Cummings was charged with the January 2010 murder of Lequan Jones, and the June 2010 murder of Carl Copeland in the Bronx.

Bryan Rhodes was also charged with Copeland's murder.

Jose Munoz was charged with the December 2011 murder of Shameek Young in the Bronx.

Munoz, Cummings and Rhodes all face potential death penalties if convicted, though it's unlikely. The other all face up to life in prison.

In addition, Jessie Mc-Collum was charged with a non-fatal, drug-related shooting that same day. Munoz was also charged with conspiring and participating in an armed robbery.

Nine of the defendants are already in custody in connection with charges

from previous federal indictments related to the investigation, which led to the arrests of 63 individuals as a result of a combined federal, state, and local law enforcement operation.

Two of the defendants were released on bail following their arrests in December 2011. One of the defendants remains at-large.

The defendants were arraigned Friday, April 12.

"The charges in this indictment once again put the nexus between drugs, guns, and fatal violence into stark relief," said Manhattan U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara. "Through patient and painstaking work, the investigators and prosecutors targeted violent drug operations, charged drug crimes at first and eventually were able to charge drug-related murders, shootings and other violent crimes, which might have gone otherwise unaddressed. The law enforcement drumbeat will continue until we clean up the streets of our communities once and for all."

Through Chrys we can all participate in the purchase of fresh organic fruits and vegetables from the Locust point sponsored Community Supported Agricultural program. This program allows us to purchase our produce directly from a locale New York State Farmer. Angela discussed with us the many options that we may choose from in order to introduce into our lives enhanced nutrition and stress reduction techniques that have been proven successful in controlling hypertension, diabetes and other chronic conditions. Both ladies may be reached via their respective Facebook pages.

Mike Grubiak from Senator Klein's office extended the Senators best wishes to our membership and community. Prior to the start of the meeting Mike also expressed the Senators availability to attend our May meeting and discuss with us the States new Budget and how it will impact our communities. He also spoke on the need under the 2013-14 State Budget for home owners who are receiving a Star real estate tax reduction to reapply in order for the deduction to be continued. This recertification is necessary so that the State may more effectively and efficiently weed out individuals who may be receiving a Star tax reduction on more than one property. The reduction has always been intended to be granted if eligible to a taxpayers primary residence. Sorry vacation homes were never eligible for this program.

After Mike's presentation Anita Valenti brought to the attention of Councilman Vacca's representative, Stacy, the dire need to address the traffic congestion that plaques our highways and locale streets. We were advised that people are aware of this problem and they were studying it. A number of our members intensely pressed the issue further. There was and is a very strong sentiment that the need for traffic enhancements should have been addressed prior to the respective start of construction on the 911 call center to be located near Stillwell Ave.



and Pelham Parkway, the new mall to be located on the grounds of the Whitestone Movie Theater Complex, the Targets Mall to be located on the grounds of the Post Office distribution Center near Brush Ave and the Macy's Mall to be located at Co-op

In addition within walking distance of the Call Center, Target, and the Whitestone Mall a Marriott Hotel is being built at Waters Place along with two additional office towers within the Metro Center. And lets not forget that within the next five vears the Metro-North Stations at Co-op City and Morris park will also be opening. There is a very high level of concern and frustration that once these projects are completed the traffic jams will be unbearable. Not only will our ability to travel in safe and timely ways be impaired but the financial viability of these commercial ventures will be challenged.

It is most important to the property owners and citizens of our communities that these commercial ventures be of the utmost success. It is imperative that the thousands of employees of these new ventures and the tens of thousands of customers and visitors who will use their services be able to travel in a safe and timely way to and from their destination. As for the citizens of our communities who live, work, go

to school and travel along the streets and highways that are impacted by these developments our quality of life and wellbeing must not be jeopardized.

It is unreasonable to expect that we sit quietly, and wait, and wait, and wait for someone to eventually address our abundance of traffic problems and lack of clean air. Air pollution is known to be the number one cause of heart disease and lung cancer. It is also a major player in most chronic diseases such as diabetes and asthma. It has also been shown to impair the learning abilities of young children. And a car, truck, or bus that is idling is a much more efficient polluter that a vehicle that is in motion. The traffic on our highways must be made to move. The traffic jams which we are plaqued with are totally unacceptable!

Hutchinson River Parkway is all to often standing still in both directions for hours on end. The Bruckner Expressway at dead man's curve near PS 14 is anything but an expressway. And, 95 by Co-op City going into Bartow Avenue lets just say that at times you would think that you would have to leave by labour day to pick up your purchases and make it back home in time to wrap your gifts for Christmas. None of this can be allowed to stand. Improvements are needed and they are needed as of vesterday.

In recognition of the fact that almost all of us are not traffic engineers, I suggest that we look to the recent experience of the Big Dig up in Boston for guidance. The Big Dig during its time was the biggest highway construction project in the country. It called for taking traffic off the streets of downtown Boston and redirecting it underground into a series of new tunnels and across new bridges that take the traffic out of Boston. Sounds good. well it was plaqued by one problem after another. Cost overrun after cost overrun. and after it was finished and being many billions of dollars over budget some of the tunnel ceilings began to fall down onto the traffic below. The tunnels were taken out of service for days, and their ceilings redesigned and re-

placed. Well, lets just say there were many questions that needed to be answered. It was at this junction that NASA (the National Space Administration) an impartial organization with many billion dollar projects in its portfolio decided to take a look at what went wrong with the Big Dig. They were eager to learn from Boston's mistakes. NASA set out to do a forensic management audit. Their findings were pretty simple. What they found was that when all stake holders were involved from the very beginning in the preplanning, planning, plan preparation, bidding, construction and remediation of unforeseen problems things went well. The craftsmanship was of a high quality. The unforeseen problems were minimal. And, the cost overruns were minor. When all the stake holders were not involved from the very beginning the craftsmanship was poor, unforeseen problems were high. And, cost overruns were high and

unpredictable.

On that note it suffices to say that from the very beginning of any project, the Community Board, Members of the impacted Communities, Department of Transportation Representatives, Elected Officials all need to be involved in the preplanning, planning, and implementation of a project / development. It should be a given that no segment of our community whether they be Members of the Community Board or Members of impacted Communities can be marginalized.

It is respectfully suggested that the following recommendation be implemented as soon as possible. That the Department of Transportation solicits from the Community Boards and members of impacted communities input prior to deciding to approve or disapprove a change to our streets, avenues, signage, or traffic calming device.

Furthermore it is recommended that the State of New York find the means to install an exit and entrance off the Hutchinson River parkway going directly to and from the Metro Center.

As to the traffic problems concerning the Malls, our Community Board with the assistance of our impacted communities is well equipped to advise on proposed solutions that should be implemented prior to the opening of the Malls.

program, which will allow certain streets or group of streets to have the speed limit lowered from 30 mph to 20 mph. One of our members, Alan, would love to see Pennyfield Avenue added to that program, so we will go over the program at the meeting to see if Pennyfield fits the criteria. We have to submit our requests from May 5th to May 30th so we will have to see where we can recommend.

Here is a little bit about the program:

Neighborhood Slow Zones are a communitybased program that reduces the speed limit from 30 mph to 20 mph and adds safety measures within a select area in order to change driver behavior. The ultimate goal of the Neighborhood Slow Zone program is to lower the incidence and severity of crashes. Slow Zones also seek to enhance quality of life by reducing cut-through traffic and traffic noise in residential neighborhoods.


Neighborhood Slow Zones are established in small, selfcontained areas that consist primarily of local streets. Gateways announce the presence of a Slow Zone. A gateway is a set of signs and markings at an intersection to alert drivers to the reduced speed limit. An average of one or two parking spaces are typically removed to construct each gateway.

The zone itself is a self-enforcing, reduced-speed area with speed bumps, markings and other traffic calming treatments. Slow Zones are implemented in areas with low traffic volumes and minimal through traffic, where

reducing the speed limit will not cause traffic congestion.

Applications may be submitted by local Community Boards, civic associations. business improvement districts (BIDs), elected officials, or other community institutions such as schools or churches. The Slow Zone application period is open from March 5, 2013 to May 31, 2013. Approved Slow Zones will be implemented in 2014. Applications must be submitted via email toslowzones@dot.

away from Boylston Ave. Mutters of a terror attack soon engulfed the subway car. "An explosion," Clark remembered hearing.

And as cell phone towers and subways came to a halt, so did fellow VCTC runner and Norwood local Manlio Mondo, a mere mile away the finish line when the bomb went off. He couldn't finish the race following the explosion.

"We couldn't go in that area," said the 66-year-old four-time Ironman triathlete and Korean War vet, recalling that terrorism sprang to his mind that day, enraging him that some "mother muckers" set off a bomb that killed an eight-year-old.

Meanwhile, back at the Marriott, VCTC teammate

Kyle Hall of Pelham Parkway was recuperating from a successful run, finishing 90 minutes before the blast went off.

"We could see the smoke coming from where the public library is," said Hall.

When stepped out to meet other teammates at a nearby restaurant, "You saw dozens of ambulances, more than I ever seen or heard, just rushing to the street in all different directions,"

Survivor Guilt

Teammate Jamie Kyei-Frimpong of Riverdale, a nurse-practitioner at Bellevue, said she didn't sleep well that night, thinking she could have done more to help victims.

"I'm really struggling to think I wasn't there," she said. "Had I been down there I would've been more involved, but it was more about being safe in the hotel."

She's also been plagued by the "game of what if," playing out different scenarios that could have left her among the dead or wounded "had I run a lot slower...or what if my teammates were on the finish line instead of Heartbreak Hill."

Hall has also found it difficult coming to grips over the tragedy, himself wishing to help the fallen who high-fived him at the finish line.

"I think of all of them and that's what makes it so bad," he said, "because those are most of the people injured."

Mondo, however, thanks "the man of upstairs" for giving him his "nine lives."

"I'm still on this earth because he wants me to

serve the people and the community."

Circling Together

As in moments following a tragedy, the VCTC huddled in a solidarity circle Tuesday evening back

"We're truly a family, and we're truly blessed," said VCTC coach Ken Rolston. Despite the tragedy, Hall said every runner intends to go back next year, "If for no other reason, just for principle to support the memory of those who fell this year."

semblyman Eric Stevenson, and former Assemblyman Nelson Castro.

Dina Ely, another New Age attendee, wrote a review of it on the company's website, declaring the facility to be "a perfect place for me to spend my time...T hank you for opening this place in our neighborhood.

New Age is still open, but it's founders are embroiled in the Stevenson scandal, with the Morrisania pol accused of taking \$20,000 in bribes to fast track opening the building while drafting a bill to put a three-year hold on future competing adult centers.

But the center's uncertainty, its operators and source of funding are a mystery itself, given the lack of oversight from any city or state agency on such centers.

New Age, for instance, is considered a for-profit social daycare center, an alternative to full-scale nursing homes and adult day care centers that DO require city or state licensing and monitoring.

Such "social" centers have raised red flags within the health care community, concerned they are glorified entertainment facilities that can ultimately lead to fraud.

A sign outside the New Age center shows the facility offers free meals, doorto-door transportation and movies, and even manicures and pedicures.

Social Centers

After the Medicaid re-

forms by the Cuomo administration in July to off-load budget drains on the state coffers, social centers were allowed to directly receive contracts with a health insurer's Managed Longterm Care provider (MLTC), an umbrella health plan directly funded by Medicaid.

These underground adult daycare centers, opening in record numbers since the reforms, have now jumped on the "Medicaid gravy train," as one unnamed adult daycare provider put it.

They suggested MLTC's often look at the number of clients before drafting a contract with any center.

Months before New Age opened, staffers reportedly launched an aggressive recruiting campaign, luring as many Medicaid-covered residents as possible, with the promise of hot meals and entertainment.

The adult daycare provider suggested the strength in numbers would draw MLTC providers into drafting contracts with New Age.

The center, situated in the heart of an immigrantdominated community, officially opened March 7. Inside on a recent day, large groups of neighbors circled roundtables, others playing dominoes or shooting pool.

There was no indication the club-like facility was at the heart of a federal bribery probe.

Health agencies have now spotted a major spike in the number of these unlicensed centers, particularly in immigrant communities, pointing to why New Age operators Igor and Rostislav Belyansky, Igor Tsimerman and David Binman allegedly asked Stevenson to draft a bill gagging any other centers to open.

Tsimerman and Igor Belyanksy had been accused of fraud two years ago by Allstate Insurance, charging the pair filed more than a million dollars in bogus claims through their unlicensed acupuncture service.

A spokeswoman for the state Office of the Medicaid Inspector General would not confirm or deny the launching of an investigation into the center.

New Age did not respond to repeated requests for comment. On its website, the section on how it admits clients was blacked out.

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

Gum disease, worn enamel, cavities, and exposed roots. Individuals with gum disease or teeth with worn enamel are generally discouraged from undergoing a tooth-whitening procedure. Cavities need to be treated before undergoing any whitening procedure. Fillings, crowns, and other restorations. Toothcolored fillings and resin composite materials used in dental restorations (crowns, veneers, bonding, bridges) do not whiten. Tooth sensitivity often occurs during early stages of the bleaching treatment. Tissue irritation most commonly results from an ill-fitting mouthpiece tray rather than the tooth-bleaching agent. Both of these conditions usually are temporary and disappear within one to three days of stopping or completing treatment.

If you do experience sensitivity, you can reduce or eliminate it by:

Wearing the tray for a shorter period of time (for example, two 30-minute sessions vs. two 60-minute sessions).

Stop whitening your teeth for two to three days to allow teeth to adjust to the whitening process.

Ask your dentist or pharmacist for a high fluoridecontaining product, which can help remineralize your teeth. Apply the fluoride product to the tray and wear for four minutes prior to and following the whitening

Brush teeth with a toothpaste made for sensitive teeth. These toothpastes contain potassium nitrate, which helps soothe the teeth's nerve endings.

Whitening **Product** Safety

Some whitening products dispensed through dentists' offices as well as professionally applied (in-office) bleaching products have received the American Dental Association (ADA) Seal of Acceptance, which indicates that the product has met ADA guidelines for safety and effectiveness. Currently, dentist-dispensed home-use products containing 10% carbamide peroxide and office-applied products containing 35% hydrogen peroxide have received the ADA Seal of Acceptance. Over-the-counter bleaching products are not endorsed by the ADA, because the organization believes that professional consultation is important to ensuring safe and effective use. No whitening products using lasers are

on the ADA's list of accepted products. Several whitening toothpastes that are available in drugstores have received the ADA Seal of Acceptance. For a list of specific toothpastes that have gained the ADA's Seal of Acceptance, visit www.ada.org.

It should be noted that not all manufacturers seek the ADA's Seal of Acceptance. This is a voluntary program that requires considerable expense and time on the part of a manufacturer. Just because a product does not have the ADA Seal of Acceptance does not necessarily mean that the product is not safe and effective. You can be assured, however, that products that do carry the seal meet the ADA's standards for safety and effectiveness when used as directed.

Teeth whiteners are not drugs and therefore are not regulated by the FDA.


Tips When Choosing Over-the-Counter Kit

Try to select a teeth whitening kit that allows some customization of the mouthpiece. Some kits come with a mouthpiece that can be molded to some degree. These are better than others that come with a standard mouthpiece.

Try to gain the opinion of others who may have already tried the kit you are considering.

If at any time you experience a prolonged change in the color of your gums or an increased tooth sensitivity to hot or cold foods and beverages, stop wearing the mouthpiece and see your dentist immediately.
