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

# SANDY, AYEAR LATER

## Still rebuilding from storm

A year later, Superstorm Sandy's scars still remain fresh in pockets of the Bronx.

For some, it's too early to call it "back to normal." Indeed, for many residents such as Nick Virello of Locust Point, or Judy Bonnano in Harding Park, it feels like just yesterday that a 13-foot surge battered the borough's shore-

Areas formerly known as Zone A territories, are now designated Zone 1 on new hurricane flood maps.

An infamous deluge struck hundreds of waterfront homes,

shaking foundations, knocking out power and ripping out piers many believed were invulnerable.

At the height of the storm, City Island was aglow in a fiery mess as firefighters battled a six-alarm blaze that engulfed Tony's Pier, a popular eatery.

Since then, government assistance has trickled in, though incomparable to Queens, Manhattan or Brooklyn, which all bore the brunt of Sandy's path given the exposure to the Atlantic Ocean.



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# Where's our borough's wheels?

### Transportation Alternatives demand CitiBikes

In just a few months, those stout electric blue bikes have zigzagged their way into the fabric of our city.

Now Bronx's bikers are gearing up to find those shiny new Citibikes a home in the Boogie Down borough.

"Whenever a new station pops up, I think 'Where's ours?'" said Jill Guidera, Field Organizer at Transportation Alternatives, a bike activist group.

Bronx's would-be bike sharers will need to prove that the city's poorest borough is worth the investment. Citibike launched on May 27 with a fleet of just below 6,000 bikes spread across the dense areas deemed most likely to use them: Manhattan south of 59th street and downtown Brooklyn.

The bikes have done big

business. Citibike is privately owned and its organizers have declared the program a smash success, with hundreds of thousands of registered subscriptions to date. An annual membership costs \$95, a weekly pass \$25 and a 24-hour membership \$9.95.

Citibike has since expanded to Williamsburg and there are concrete plans in the works for additional bikes in Long Island City, Greenpoint and part of Bedford-Stuyvesant, according to an interactive station map on the Department of Transportation (DOT) website.

But the bikes have yet to come anywhere near the Bronx. Cyclists here needn't hold their breath: Citibike does "wish to expand" the bike share program to the Boogie-Down borough butwould require additional sponsorship funding, a

spokesman for the Department of Transportation (DOT) said in an email.

Citibank has already

shelled out \$41 million for the project's naming rights, with Mastercard sponsoring the payment sites for an additional \$6.5 million.

The borough's cycling advocates are distributing surveys in an effort to show demand for the bikes.

"There are folks here that would use it as a public transit choice. We would love for it to be here," she said.

Guidera imagines bikesharing racks dotting the borough's major public transportation hubs and being installed near landmarks like Yankee Stadium. She also pictures cyclists pedaling into Manhattan over the 3rd Avenue Bridge.

Since Citibike's May kickoff, elected officials in brownstone Brooklyn and areas of western Queens have started petitions to get in on the action. The reaction in the Bronx has been more lukewarm, though Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. said he'd love to see

the bike share in the area because of the health benefits of exercise and lower air pollution.

Olga Luz Tirado, the executive director of the Bronx Tourism Council, said that she'd like to see the bike share as well but hedged on whether the program would be popular.

"In principle I think it's a good idea, but we need more data," she said.

Bronx's bike lovers will have plenty of time to make their case. Citibank's licensing deal with the bikes is slated for at least six years. Until then, Bronxites will have to make do with local bike shops, at least one of which is in no rush to see Citibike expand here.

"I don't see it working out here. It'll take away from the mom and pops," said Joseph Maldoneo, who runs Castle Hills Bikes in Throgs Neck.

#### Clean slate

With mayoral candidate **Bill de Blasio** leagues ahead in the polls over G0P challenger (and Bronx native son) **Joe Lhota**, it might not bode well for some big borough projects being rushed through before Mayuh Mike leaves.

Given the Bronx Democratic machine's all-out push for **Bill Thompson**, De-Blasio's tsunami primary win in the Bronx and across the city, certainly embarrassed the party and Borough Prez **Ruben Diaz Jr.**, who practically joined themselves at the hip with Thompson.

DeBlasio even clobbered Thompson in Dem Party Boss **Carl Heastie's** mostly black northeast Bronx assembly district.

And while Ruben and Carl were quick to do a fast 180-degree turn and throw their arms around De Blasio, folks are saying the new City Hall heir-apparent owes no favors.

"He was doing his own thing campaigning in the Bronx," a local political insider said of de Blasio's borough stealth campaign. "He doesn't owe anybody in the Bronx."

"The organizations didn't support him, and with the projects like the Kingsbridge Armory and Fresh Direct, if they can't push them through before he takes over, they'll all be subject to his review," added political consultant **George Arzt**.

A Boro Hall insider added that a number of "smaller" Requests for Proposals could also wind up yanked by a Mayor de Blasio.

De Blasio has previously blasted using tons of taxpayer bux to subsidize moving Fresh Direct into the borough. Not known yet where he stands on turning the white elephant armory into a big ice skating rink.

#### **WINNERS**

While other pols and Party Boss Heastie had to make fast friends with de Blasio, three prescient Bronx electeds were early out of the gate with their support: Assemblyman Luis Sepulveda, Senator Ruth Hassell-Thompson and City Councilman Andy King. To the victor's supporters, so to speak, go the spoils.... We'll see just what they are down the road.

We're going to go out on real limb here and predict - drum roll please - the winners in Tuesday, Nov. 5's general elections in the Bronx.

# Setback for City Island living facility

It looks like it's back to the drawing board again for a group that wants to build a controversial assisted living facility on City Island.

The Italian Hospital Society's attorney and representatives have been fighting it out with a lawyer hired by the City Island Civic Association before the city Board of Standards and Appeals for months.

The Society is seeking a variance to skirt local zoning, on land at 222/32 City Island Avenue, currently an M-1 manufacturing zone.

As both sides had another go round at the BSA on Monday, Oct. 28 and Tuesday, Oct. 29, the BSA asked the Society for more information after IHS reduced the size of the project from 212-beds to 150-beds. The BSA then gave the IHS until Jan. 7, 2014 for more information. The City Island civic group still opposed the re-design, arguing the plan is out of character with

of the mostly low-rise, lowdensity island.

CICA board member Barbara Dolensek said the IHS attorney at the Oct. 29 meeting "pleaded" for some more time to provide additional information.

She said that the Society, whose president is obstetrician Dr. Domenico Mignone, had witnesses there saying that Italian-Americans need such a facility, but without making arguments about the site.

"City Island would welcome elderly Italian-Americans; in fact, many already live here," she said. "Our problem is simply with the scale of the project."

She pointed out that City Island is vulnerable during major storms, and that the facility would put seniors at risk during mandated evacuations, such as one during Superstorm Sandy in 2012.

Community Board 10 district manager Kenneth Kearns, also at the hearings, said "As far as Bronx Community Board 10 is concerned, we have been completely supportive of City Island's Civic Association's position on the subject and we will continue to do so."

Still unanswered, according to the Society's filings with the BSA and obtained by the Bronx Times Reporter, was a question about a statement from a real estate planning firm that "the project is still not viable due solely to the subsurface conditions, and the constructions premiums devoted to solving them." This presumingly refers to the soil requiring environmental remediation. The location was home to a former boat builder.

No clear answers have been given to questions about two tests in 2009 and 2011 that found groundwater at the site 7 to 8 feet below the surface either.

Also unanswered was the Floor Area Ratio (essentially the density) of the 150bed building having a FAR of 1.35, more than two and half times the typical area of residential buildings.

Another question was how supporters of the plan have referred to the City Island community as "economically distressed" both in an early interview and online. In the one full interview Dr. Mignone gave to this newspaper before the litigation, he cited vacant storefronts and said the project would bring construction jobs and more foot traffic for local stores.

E-mails requesting comment on documents from BSA filings reviewed by the newspaper were not answered, nor was a message left at Dr. Mignone's medical practice.

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






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# Bill would put cork in fake IDs

Klein, Crespo back 'Card Hard' campaign

Two Bronx pols are taking a shot at making it harder for the borough's minors to buy booze.

A new bill backed by Senator Jeff Klein and Assemblyman Marcos Crespo incentivizes Bronx's booze sellers to invest in electronic scanners that test for fake IDs.

"In the 21th century, it is not acceptable for businesses not to have this technology," Klein said at a press conference.

The verification machines, which can cost up to \$800, scan the bar code on the back of an ID to test for authenticity and check that a customer is of legal drinking age, which since 1985 has been 21 years old nationwide.

Law-breaking liquor stores and groceries would have an option to purchase one of the scanners in lieu of paying their first fine. First offenses for selling booze to minors ring in as high as \$3,000, and further illegal sales can cost a retailer up to \$10,000 per violation.

The outcry comes on the heels of a sobering State Liquor Authority (SLA) sting operation that exposed the Bronx as the easiest place in the city for a minor to purchase alcohol. A third of the 76 licensed liquor stores and groceries charged with selling booze to minors were based in the Bronx, according to Gov. Cuomo's office. Most of them were small grocery stores, or bodegas, licensed to sell beer but not hard alcohol.

The problem runs deeper than simply the use of fake IDs. The SLA's underage agents bought the booze with either their real ID cards or weren't asked

for identification at all, said an SLA spokesman.

Klein and Crespo are


hoping that local businesses will cooperate with what they've dubbed the

"Card Hard" campaign. The package of laws also gives liquor sellers the legal right to confiscate fake IDs.

"This sting highlights the fact that we need to do more to dry up the source of underage drinking," Crespo said at the Wednesday, October 23 press conference, held in front of one of the accused retailers, a Rite Aid at 1710 Crosby Avenue.

Community leaders joined the legislators in the importance of keeping alcohol away from the area's youth.

"Those of us who are parents know that kids who use alcohol have health issues, academic problems, and are at greater risk of being perpetrators or victims of violence," said Frances Maturo, executive director of the Throggs Neck Community Action Partnership, adding, "We can do better."

#### Struggling schools

A Yes Vote On Proposal #1 Is A Yes Vote For Our Schools, Our kids & Our Economy.

Let's be honest: our schools are struggling. Our kids are sitting in crumbling classrooms, and if they are able to graduate at all (half of them aren't), they are not prepared for college and careers.

Even worse, our schools aren't failing all students equally: they are especially bad when it comes to educating minority and lower income students. Only 28% of African-American and Latino boys who enroll in a New York City high school will graduate within four years. That graduation rate has not budged in the past decade, and we can't expect it to while we, as a society, fail to prioritize our schools.

Our school districts are suffering from a funding crisis. New York City's teachers are dedicated and hardworking, but they are not miracle workers. They cannot teach a child to read without having a book for him to read. And right now, the New York State budget cannot spare the millions of dollars we need to properly fund our schools.

When the state can't help out, the gaps in the New York City public school system budget tend to be filled by parents. At schools in higher income areas, parents will do things like organize galas and auctions to raise money for the schools budget. The parents will fund supposed "non-essentials" like a new textbooks or arts programs. But that model only works for schools with highly involved and wealthier parents. At other schools, no one steps in, budgets are slashed, and the students suffer.

Proposal #1 on the Nov.5 election ballot can help change that. It will bring \$94.4 million each year to help fund New York City schools. That money will pay for teachers' salaries, school supplies, and special education. It will pay for field trips and textbooks. That's \$94.4 million that will no longer have to be paid for out of our taxes.

There is no silver bullet that will fix our school system for free. There are societal problems, such as poverty and unemployment, that make it incredibly hard for some students to perform at grade level. But more funding will make an immediate improvement in our school

Ask any parent, student, or teacher whether their public school could do a better job if it had just a few thousand more dollars, and I assure you they will say yes.

There's \$94.4 million here for the taking. Every year, New Yorkers spend an estimated \$1.2 billion at casinos in other neighboring states and Canada. All we need to do to bring that money back to New York is to vote yes on Prop One.

The casinos want to come to New York. They know that casino gaming in New York State will build on our state's existing top-notch tourism infrastructure. Our construction workers are eager to build world-class casinos. The business community, hoping to kickstart our sputtering economic, is just as welcoming.

And best of all, we get millions for the New York City school system. Better schools help everyone. A better public school system brings better jobs, more equality, more investment, and a growing economy. The future of our economy lies in an educated and highly skilled work-

In an economy still recovering from the Great Recession, we shouldn't forget the present, and Prop One certainly doesn't do that. The New York State budget office estimates that it will create 10,000 construction and permanent jobs in the next two years. Many of them will be in upstate, close to the casinos, but they will cause a ripple effect that creates jobs down-





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# Gjonaj delivers searing speech

Elected officials aren't exactly known for their candor.

But it was a different case with Assemblyman Mark Gjonaj speaking to a Morris Park group.

In a rare move, the freshman pol unleashed an unrestrained, off-thecuff manifesto that railed against do-nothing Bronx legislators who commonly attend functions yet balk at


Gjonaj, a successful Realtor, ousted veteran Assemblywoman Naomi Rivera, who hails from a powerful borough political dynasty.

This year's honorary


grand marshals-deceased service members-are Ted Hansen, Ken Champlin, Bobby Hoyt, Nick Mileo, and Charlie Baasch.



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# Aldi Supermarket opens in Melrose

A new supermarket offering quality inexpensive groceries has made its way to a neighborhood in dire need of good eats on a budget.

South Bronx shoppers lined up Monday, October 28 for their first glimpse inside Aldi, Melrose's newest bargain supermarket.

The German-owned retailer opened its doors on Third Avenue and E.155th Street at a ribbon-cutting ceremony, with store officials saying they are thrilled to service a relatively poor area with high foot traffic, just a few blocks north of the central HUB shopping district.

"People were used to shopping here," said Bruce Persohn, a vice president of Aldi USA. "A grocery store in this area is not a foreign idea."

The Melrose store is Aldi's second expansion into the Bronx, following its 2011 opening of a store on Gun Hill Road in the east Bronx.

The discount grocer keeps its prices low by producing and distributing many of its own brands.

David Livingston, a supermarket analyst with DJL Research, said the store's model of efficiency is at the forefront of the supermarket scene.

Aldi is stocked with just 1,400 items at a time, incentivizes customers to bring reusable bags and does not allow shopping carts off the premises.

"It doesn't matter where they come in," said Livingston, "no one can beat them on price."

That could spell trouble for the area's existing supermarkets, including a Pioneer Supermarket a few blocks south on Melrose Avenue.

"We canvassed the area," said Persohn, "and we're confident our savings will hold true in this neighborhood."

"I would definitely come in here," said Christina Slack, as she brandished a sturdy wooden stirring spoon on sale for \$3.99.

"Look at this spoon!" she exclaimed. "Look how

strong it is. It's so thick and nice."

Slack said she normally heads out of the borough to buy fresh groceries, going to 125th street in Harlem, or up to New Rochelle or White Plains to do her shopping.

"You normally always get junk in the Bronx," she said, "but I like this place – and so cheap!"

Jose Santiago, who lives

on E. 138th Street, said the box of cereal in his Aldi shopping cart cost half as much as it would at his regular supermarket.

"We need more places like this, where we can save money," he said.

Melrose's Aldi is the fifth supermarket the company has opened in New York City, Persohn said. The German company has over 1,200 locations nationwide, and is owned by the same parent company that owns Trader Joe's.

The new store hired 20-25 employees, Persohn said. Entry cashiers make just over \$12 per hour and store managers make around \$25 per hour, he said.

Persohn said he was confident the new store would thrive.

"The great things about Aldi is that interest really transcends income levels," he said. "People are always interested in saving money."



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# Up the ranks for new 52 C.O.

New 52nd Precinct Commanding Officer Nilda Hofmann missed the precinct's 10th annual Community Council Fellowship Recognition breakfast on Friday, October 25.

But the gathered crowd at Monroe College in Fordham couldn't blame her.

As the Five Two honored its police officers of the year and praised the community for staying active, the 23-year veteran was in Lower Manhattan at 1 Police Plaza getting new gold eagles pinned on her uniform shoulders to newly promoted full inspector's rank.

The 23-year police veteran moved up from the ranks from Deputy Inspector to Inspector, a move that, knows well, having shed the silver olive branch Deputy Inspector medal for his own gold eagle a few years back.

"When One Police Plaza calls, you gotta answer," said the precinct's former commander, Inspector Joseph Dowling. "It takes a lot of work. She deserves it."

The newly minted Inspector Hofmann will be put to the test in the coming months.

Hofmann's top goal of slowing down shooting incidents in the area could prove difficult.

The precinct, which covers Bedford Park, Fordham, Kingsbridge, Norwood and University Heights, has endured a 66% uptick in shooting incidents, and 38% increase in shooting victims so far this year.

Friday's breakfast was delayed by an early morning shooting incident at Rochambeau Avenue and E. 206th Street in which shots were fired at police.

The night before, a 17-year-old high school student was fatally shot in the face on Jerome Avenue.

"We've had some outside people coming into our neighborhood with some

violence, which we are addressing," said Dowling.

At the breakfast, a number of officers were recognized for their achievements, including Office James Carron, who was honored as Cop of the Year for nabbing a bank robber minutes after the crime.

From his post on E. Fordham and Grand Concourse, waiting for backup, Carron saw a man matching the description of the robber walking in his direction.

The man was covered in the red dye from an exploding red dye pack in the stolen moneybags.

"It was very simple," Carron said. "Just being in the right place at the right time."

Former community council president Sallie Caldwell, who handed over the reins to her daughter Brenda Caldwell-Paris, said "We feel that we've really brought the community together."

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# City Build Back program helping Sandy vics

Homeowners facing an onslaught of repair bills from Hurricane Sandy may find some relief in the Build it Back program, and several other city and private initiatives.

As an extended deadline for the city program that distributes federal dollars from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development earmarked for relief from the approached on Thursday, Oct. 31, Senator Jeff Klein's office reached out to homeowners who had not yet signed up.

A Klein spokeswoman said a hundred homeowners were notified they may be eligible for benefits under the program, with many responding to the letter and follow-up calls. "Helping homeowners and businesses rebuild after Superstorm Sandy has been one of my top priorities this year," said Klein. "Whether it's helping institutions like Tony's Pier rebuild or helping homeowners get a timely reimbursement from their insurance company, my office has been hands-on every step of the way."

Klein added that his office is now working with those homeowners who qualify for the Build it Back program "to make sure they get the funding they need and deserve."

A representative from the Build it Back program spoke at a general meeting of Community Board 10 in September, explaining that their goal was to distribute a "pot" of money from HUD.

He explained that the program covered houses, co-ops, condo, and multiple-family dwellings.

The funding, however, only covers repairs to the structure

of houses, and not such things as decks, docks, and seawalls. Tony Macchia, 67, a waterfront homeowner on Tierney Place in Locust Point who qualified for the Build it Back said it will help him replace the roof on his house.

"We put back everything [on the roof] temporarily for now, because the new roof and underside will cost about \$15,000," he said, adding that he also lost a dock from Sandy.

He did not have flood insurance because his home does not get flooded, but luckily he was able to obtain relief from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. He has been living there for more than 60 years.

"We were very lucky that the interior of the house withstood the storm," he said. "We lost all of our property ten feet back from the waterfront."

As an additional part of the city's recovery effort, the Mayor's Fund, with support from the American Red Cross and the Robin Hood Foundation, created a home repairs program to help non-structurally damaged properties.

That program is being administered by the Mayor's Office of Housing Recovery Operations and is managed by Neighborhood Revitalization NYC.

The Department of Housing Preservation and Development and a group of 16 foundations and institutions known as NYC Housing and Neighborhood Recovery Donors Collaborative have also secured \$3.2 million in private funding to help vulnerable communities and low to moderate income people with a range of initiatives, according to the city.

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
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
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




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

city, was largely spared, with landlocked communities mainly experiencing 65 MPH winds.

But it doesn't erase the fact that the storm left thousands of homeowners in the dark for days, weeks of gas lines and several months of removing downed trees, repairing basements and wrangling with insurance companies.

The pain of rebuilding continues, with many slowly intending to come back piecemeal, and on their own. With several setbacks hindering the rebuilding process, a sense of abandonment has crept in for many folks in the outlying area.

### **Harding Park**

"We are forgotten about. Nobody's done anything for us," said Bonnano, whose low-lying Harding Park community bore the brunt of storm damage.

A remote village abutting Eastchester Bay, the neighborhood was nearly drowned by the infamous 13-foot surge.

Joanne Pache's bungalow could not with-

stand the pressure. She survived even as the storm took out all her belongings she amassed over the past 44 years.

Even more tragic was the fallout – she passed away. Her home was later bulldozed on orders by the city Department of Buildings deeming the house as unlivable, replaced by wooden boards.

Across the street, Charlie Vaiciunas' onestory home was hard hit.

He was already distraught, having lost his mother and brother the year before Sandy's ram-

page. But as Federal Emergency Management Agency assessed the damage, Vaiciunas was already lost. He hung himself shortly after the recuperation money was taken back, according to neighbors.

"FEMA should be held accountable," said long-time neighbor Jimmy Ziegler. "They take care of everyone else," said Ziegler. "But they don't take care of anyone here."

The area once known as "Little Puerto Rico" has not been the same since, as Judy Bonnano sees it. She wishes the city could elevate the stone that did little to stop the rising floods.

"Who wants to be worried about water after putting thousands of thousands of dollars into it?" she asked.

### **Locust Point**

Locust Point stands among the hard hit waterfront nabes, with locals pressing insurance firms to help cover costs for homes and damaged docks. In some cases, homeowners have simply walked away.

On Tierney Place, homeowner Tony Macchia spent months fixing his two-story home that boasts a scenic view of the shore. He's since repaired his roof, knocked around by Sandy's heavy winds and rains.

"I haven't stopped working since the day of the storm," said Macchia, who's lived in the same house since he was born 60 years back. Since Sandy, he's struggled to get his insurer Narragansett Bay Insurance Company to foot the damage.

These days Tony's learned to "read the fine print" to any insurance

Owner Joseph (Jo Jo) Mandarino said he's in the process of replacing it.

What he remembers most about Sandy, besides the out-

pouring of support from neighbors and customers afterwards, was the triple hit of the hurricane, the snow-storm that followed, and the gas shortage ("really devastating" for business).

Nevertheless, he said, "we rolled up our sleeves, we persevered, and we got through it."

policy, and is looking for another insurer.

A few doors down, contractor Nick Virello has restored his private dock, spending roughly \$90,000 of his own money and no federal assistance. He's built smarter now, though he's vowed never to re-build again. "I'll be done."

It's already happened to several siblings who've posted "For Sale" signs at their seaside property.

But there were shimmers of a silver lining, as Chrys Napolitano of the Locust Point Civic Association pointed out. She recenly toured the city-owned LPCA house, newly-built after getting pummeled by Sandy.

### **Country Club**

The Interclub, comprised of six seasoned local recreation clubs – the Manhem, Askov Hall, D.A. Beach, White Cross Fishing, American Turners, and Westchester Country clubs – is still primed for a comeback, though much of the delays stem from lagging insurance payments, with the Manhem Club still awaiting brokers to

process claims.

"I have not received a dime of insurance money...," said Watson. "The clubs who put in claims are going through the same thing."

Though he's haggling with his insurance company, he was able to corral volunteers to restore the club's damaged pier.

Elsewhere, the track and field at Villa Maria Academy, torn by Sandy's punishing surge, was restored recently thanks to parent contributions. It had faced damage a year before when Hurricane Irene blasted through.

Michael Bernard, VMA's physical education teacher, said the contractor admitted not much can be done with a storm the insurance companies are billing as an "act of God."

### Looking Ahead

With Superstorm Sandy now recorded as the second costliest storm in history, city officials have taken preventive steps to keep a catastrophe like this from happening again.

Locally, Community Board 10, covering the hard-hit areas of the Bronx, has devised a survey that determines which city-owned seawalls are in need of an upgrade.

District Manager Ken Kearns has also drafted an initial report that provides storm-prevention recommendations to the city, which include heightening the seawalls to keep waters at bay.

Their outline would come months after the city's own 500-page storm resiliency plan, that offered some suggestions for the Bronx such as ensuring the Hunts Point Food Center is safeguarded.

This comes as scientists predict storms will intensify in the next few years.


But Napolitano with LPCA has since pored over the city's storm resiliency outline, recommending seawalls for Locust Point, though she was surprised to see the Bronx barely mentioned.

"At the very end of it, the report mentions what initiatives are being done borough by borough," she said. "But it's only broken down to four boroughs. The Bronx is not even mentioned."

It wasn't bad enough that frustrated drivers running on almost empty were backed up for blocks as area gas stations either ran dry waiting for deliveries or were knocked out of action with no backup generators.

Gov. Cuomo just announced 258 downstate gas stations are now installing back-up power, under a new state law.

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


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

### Norwood public schools face rezoning

### New school prompts zone change

Norwood's public school students are set for a major shakeup.

Starting next fall, hundreds of students in the neighborhood will be rezoned within the heavily overcrowded Community Education Council District 10 to relieve overcrowding as a new school opens on Webster Avenue.

The public schools servicing the area now are so packed, that over 20 schools applied this year for grades to be "capped," which has forced nearly 300 students to travel to schools out of their zone.

The Department of Education is hoping that its new proposed zones will help the schools become less squeezed for space. At a public hearing Thursday, Oct. 17, the area's public school principals bemoaned gyms having to be turned into classrooms, hur-

ried early-morning lunches and other chaos.

"It's terrible for the students," said P.S. 46 Principal Nelly Diaz.

The changes will take place for next year's kinder-garten class, and for all other new students entering into the system.

Current students won't have to switch schools, said CEC 10 President Marvin Shelton. Siblings will also have priority to stay at the same schools.

The changes affect P.S 46, P.S 280, P.S 56, P.S 20, P.S 8 and P.S 54.

The biggest reduction comes for P.S 8, whose zone near the Grand Concourse has been dramatically reduced in the proposed new zones. Enrollment at P.S. 8 will go from 1,206 pupils to 905 to 915, according to a DOE report.

P.S 54 will also be reduced, but that school's prin-

cipal, Dr. Marybelle Ferreira, is worried that her zone will become too small. The proposed lines remove the northern part of her zone, above E. 195th St., where she said her most stable students are located. Those students will be sent to P.S 20 under the latest plan.

"I don't know how it will affect our attendance rate," she said at the public hearing. "We already don't have the numbers we need."

P.S 54 already houses tens of students from other zones, according to DOE numbers. The proposed zone change does shift a densely populated southwest slice of P.S 46 into P.S 54, but that area is set up on a dangerous hill, she said.

"I grew up here, and no one wants to walk down that hill to go to school," she said. "You are leaving us with the ones that cannot make it. This is not going to benefit us at all."

The CEC, which is continuing to work on the new zones, will hold its next

scheduled public meeting Nov. 21 at P.S/M.S 37 on W. 230th Street.

The deadline to set the

new zones is January, when area parents will register their children for the following school year.

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



Tom Casev was out in the snow this past winter snapping some photos. Knowing my interest in sculpture and art, as well as my fascination with West Farms, he photographed some interesting views of an outdoor abstract work of art at East Tremont Avenue and Boston Road,

The unpainted wooden sculpture was created by Mexican artist Diego Medina and is titled "Aurora." He chose the name from the 1930 poem "La Aurora de Nuevo York" by Frederico Garcia Lorca whom he thought denigrated our great city in that poem and created this art work as a rebuttal.

The title is translated "Dawn in New York." The sculpture remained there from August of 2009 to May 21, 2011 without being desecrated in any way by miscreants or vandals. It had been installed by the Bronx River Art Center located on Bronx Street at West Farms Square and the

Born in 1969, Medina holds a degree in Visual Art and Architecture from the Instituto Techologico de Estudiors de Occidente in Guadalajara, Mexico and has exhibited his work throughout the world. Mexicans are well familiar with his artistry but his work was also on display in South Africa, Europe, Cuba, Canada and, of course, the United States where he makes his home in New York. He also runs cultural workshops both here in New York and in Mexico.

His "Aurora" at West Farms is composed of marine birch plywood and stands 14" high, 11' wide and 11' deep and is meant to be used. Medina wanted children and adults to be

able to sit on it, climb on it, and make it their own little piece of outdoor furniture or plaything. It was meant to be touched and used, not just looked at.

There are six different shapes all joined together to form one unit. You really can't appreciate it from only one view but have to walk around it and view it from all perspectives to get a full appreciation of what Medina intended to create.

Although this work is created of wood, Medina utilizes all mediums in his creations. He especially seeks to enjoin cultural mores with the creation of art and, to that end, he has received numerous awards. The next time you see one of his works on display in the metropolitan area, you may wish to make it a point to view it.

Sister Joan Whittel visited the Navajo Reservation in New Mexico/Arizona. The reservation is two times the size of Massachusetts;

the walls of the Canyon in some places measures 1.000 feet above the floor and covers 84.000 acres of the reservation.

Says Sister Joan, "We toured various places of the Reservation. The most beautiful place was the Canvon de Chelly.

Evidence shows that Navajo's lived in these canyons for nearly 5,000 years.

It has taken millions of years and volumes of water to make the stone paths. The Navajo's are very gentle people and very God-fearing. We visited the St. Michael Indian School. The Franciscan Fathers were the first missionaries to convert the Navajo. Mother Catherine Drexel founded St. Michael's school. Saint Kateri Tekakwitha is highly honored. Her statue and Mother Catherine's statue are in every Church or Hogan. We also visited Four Corners where four states: Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, and Utah meet. We saw rainbows, even double

rainbows, every day. The clouds are so close you could almost reach out and touch them. I would return to Arizona in a minute.

Sandra Noer. who teaches Math at the Mount, attended the Summer Career in Architecture Program at the Spitzer School of Architecture at CCNY from July 1 to 30, 2013.

The CCNY program serves as an opportunity for adults without any training in design and engineering to explore the process of program design and presentation within the study of architecture. Says Sandra, "I had a month to complete and present an architectural design for a school campus building consisting of a lecture hall café and gallery for the analysis by a board of architects, students and deans at the Spitzer

Through Bearing Witness, participants explore the history of anti-Semitism, including the role of the Church during the Holocaust, recent changes in Catholic teachings on Jews and Judaism issues of prejudice in contemporary society and practical strategies for teaching students about the Holocaust and anti-Semitism.

The goal of "Bearing Witness" is to create a framework which fosters a mutual atmosphere of respect, dialogue and encouragement between the Jewish and Catholic communities. The program at the same time is a unique professional development opportunity designed to provide Catholic school educators with the training and resources necessary to teach their students about the historical relationship between Jewish and Catholic communities and the impact of that relationship on Catholic teaching, catechesis and liturgy.

Bearing Witness is a partnership between the ADL, the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA), the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum and local dioceses.

In 2000, Bearing Witness was one of 15 programs across the country to receive recognition by the NCEA as a SPICE program (Selected Programs for Improving Catholic Education). SPICE is a process that identifies, validates, and systematically disseminates elementary and secondary school programs so that teachers and administrators in other schools can adopt them.

Says Bro. Gerry, "Emphasis was placed on Jewish exegesis of scripture, Jewish ritual and prayer, and that community's desire to maintain and continue a dialogue with the Roman Catholic Church. Discussions centered on Vatican II and its teaching through Nostra Aetate, the Council's

revolutionary teaching on Jewish-Catholic relations through which centuries of prejudice and stereotypes of the Jewish people were challenged and deconstructed."

The Catholic school educators who comprised the study group were invited to a Sabbath celebration at the Riverdale, New York, synagogue in which participants were invited to enter into Jewish worship and prayer.

Savs Sister Joan. "We went into great detail discussing the reasons for the Holocaust, met with survivors and toured a Museum of the Holocaust. The seminar was taught so that we could share it with our students and follow the saying "We shall never forget." Sr. Joan will be teaching a course about the Holocaust to Mount Juniors, and she, as well as the other Bearing Witness participants, will have the chance to visit Israel next summer as a follow up to the course.

A multi-instrumentalist, he began his career as an adolescent with the San Juan Municipal Orchestra, and then served in the US Army 369th Battalion "Harlem Hellfighters" during World War I. Upon discharge from the military, he moved to New York, where he met important figures in the Puerto Rican musical community and began composing, which was followed by four years of directing the Orchestra of the Faustus Theater in Havana, Cuba. He returned to New York where he enjoyed success with songs such as "Siciliana," "Me la pagarás" and "Menéalo." After spending sixteen years in Mexico, where he composed "Lamento borincano" and "Preciosa," and was a conductor at the National Conservatory, he returned to Puerto Rico to serve as

Music Director of the Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra. He died there in 1965.

A native "Nuvorican," a Bronx Walk of Fame inductee, and seven-time Grammy nominee, Bobby Sanabria is a renowned drummer and percussionist who is also a noted bandleader, composer, arranger, producer, filmmaker, educator and activist. Known for his work in the jazz, Latin Jazz and Salsa genres, his diverse recording and performing experience includes work with Dizzy Gillespie, Tito Puente, Paquito D'Rivera, Charles McPherson, Mongo Santamaria, Ray Barretto, Marco Rizzo, Arturo Sandoval, Larry Harlow, and the heralded "godfather of Afro-Cuban Jazz," Mario Bauza. Sanabria directs the Manhattan School of Music Afro-Cuban Big Band.

Formed in 1998, the 19-piece Bobby Sanabria Multiverse Big Band has been hailed for its 21st century approach to the art of the large jazz ensemble. It has appeared at Italy's Verona Jazz Festival, and Lincoln Center Out of Doors, and most recently on Central Park's Great Lawn. Combining Latin, spiritual and folkloric influences along with jazz, funk, rock, rhythm and blues, and the avant-garde, the band's music is inspired by the cultural diversity that is New York. All three of the band's three recordings-Live & In Clave, Big Band Urban Folktales, and Multiverse, released in 2012were nominated for Grammy

In tribute to Hernández's role as a trombonist with the 369th Army "Harlem Hellfighters" Band, which was conducted by legendary African American band director James Reese Europe, the 319th U.S. Army "Statue of Liberty" Band will perform re-creations of the "Harlem

Hellfighters" repertoire. During World War I, the "Harlem Hellfighters" Band had the distinction of being the first musical group to expose European audiences to early jazz and ragtime. Commissioned in 1944, the 369th "Statue of Liberty" Band is based in Flushing, New York, and is now led by Chief Warrant Officer Luis Javier Santiago Sierra. A native of Yauco, Puerto Rico, Chief Santiago was formerly Bandmaster of the 248th Army Band in Puerto Rico, and he was appointed leader of the Statue of Liberty Band in February 2013.

New York State's government has clearly lost its way. It has become the possession of power brokers and politicians.

This goes beyond partisanship or even ideology. Albany's malpractices benefit no one except the most powerful elected officials and the "consultants" who put them in office. The needs of the state and its citizenry are increasingly ignored.

Part of the problem, of course, is official corruption. To address that issue, Governor Cuomo appointed a "Commission to Investigate Public Corruption" to examine corruption in state government, political campaigns and elections in New York State.

While this effort, falling

under the jurisdiction of the Moreland Act, is a welcome and long overdue move, the problems go beyond what is actually illegal. It goes to the way political and governmental business is conducted in New York, and the establishment of a series of

laws and practices that pre-

vent meaningful competi-

tion for elected office. A key reason that reform has not been successful in Albany is the almost solid guarantee of re-election that incumbents retain. It has frequently been said that more New York elected officials leave office through death or imprisonment than through being voted out of office. Because of this, government has become far too removed from the people.

This is the result of sev-

eral factors. Ironically. campaign finance laws that were intended to take the influence of money out of politics have had the reverse effect. Their complexity, and the fines that result from improper filing of paperwork, dissuades nonprofessional politicians and those not wealthy enough to hire lawyers and accountants from entering races.

The problem is particularly acute in New York City, where the powerful NYC Campaign Finance Board has allowed local media sponsoring official debates to exclude candidates who

did not raise a great deal of money, thereby pandering to the party bosses, the wealthy and the powerful, exactly the opposite of what it is supposed to do. The exclusion of former Bronx Borough President Adolfo Carrion from debates in this year's mayoral contest is a prime example.

The professional political class jealously guards its power. Far too often, those brave enough to enter the campaign arena are ill-served by well connected "political consultants" foisted upon them by party leaders. These "professionals" get significant fees but produce minimal results.

The very few non-establishment candidates who actually do get elected find themselves in a legislative environment that leaves them powerless. The "three men in a room," including the Governor, Speaker of the Assembly, and the Senate Majority leader basically make all key decisions. Innovative ideas by rank-and-file State Senators or Assemblymen rarely see the light of day.

The New York media shares a significant portion of the responsibility. The press is vital to the success of any candidate. Increasingly, our state media picks their favorite and simply ignores the opposition. A prime example: despite widespread reports of temperamental issues that made Elliot Spitzer a questionable choice for governor, the press proclaimed him "governor presumptive" at the outset of his campaign and essentially ignored his opponent.

The result of all this is a state government that continues to ignore the needs of the citizenry. Albany repeatedly ranks as the most dysfunctional state government in the nation. For the second year in a row, New York has been declared the worst state in the United States for its tax climate. Unemployment rate remains high, and its youth move away.

New York can only be saved by ending the nearly unchallenged reign of the professional politicians and the power brokers who put them into office.

### **Benedetto: Veteran status now** available on NYS driver's licenses

New York State is home to more than 900,000 military veterans and families. Their sacrifices have safeguarded our way of life, and without them, our country wouldn't be nearly what it is today. As a member of the state Assembly and Chairman of the Veteran Affairs Committee, I'm committed to honoring and helping those who have served our country in the mili-

Beginning month, a law takes effect that allows eligible residents to have their status as a veteran designated on their New York State driver's license. Those who qualify can have the word "Veteran" printed on the upper left corner of their newly issued license, learner permit or non-driver photo identification card at no additional charge. The standard \$12.50 replacement license fee applies if a veteran chooses to replace his or her current license prior to its expiration

Rather than carrying official military paperwork wherever they go, these special licenses will allow veterans to show proof of their service anywhere they bring their wallets. As a result, it will be easier for veterans to take advantage of many of the programs, benefits and discounts that are available to them. With this new law, New York will join more than three dozen states that offer similar options for veterans.

If you are an eligible veteran, you can apply for the status designation in person at a Department of Motor Vehicles office or by mail. To qualify, you will need to provide verification that you received an honorable discharge from military service or were released from military service under honorable conditions. If you would like to apply in person, you will need to provide an original document, which will be returned to you; if you apply by mail, you can include a photocopy. Acceptable forms of verification include:

· a U.S. Department of Defense form DD-214 that indicates an honorable dis• a form DD-215 that indicates an honorable discharge; or

· honorable discharge forms WD AGO 53, WD AGO 55, WD AGO 53-55, NAVPERS 553, NAVMC 78PD or NAVCG 553.

This law I helped pass will make it easier and more convenient for those who have served our country to get the benefits they deserve. The brave men and women of our military have made enormous sacrifices for all of us, and we have a responsibility to do everything we can to support them. As Chair of the Assembly Veteran Affairs Committee, I'll continue to work hard on behalf of veterans, their families and all New Yorkers.

One of the greatest political books ever, "A Team of Rivals," by historian Doris Kearns Goodwin, tells the compelling and relevant tale of President Abraham Lincoln's unprecedented hiring of his presidential rivals to serve in his admin-

Not before nor since have we seen such a blatant act of humility and bipartisanship that ended up subsuming Lincoln's ego for the greater good of our country.

We saw a microcosm of this tactic in President Barack Obama's appointment of his once Democratic rival, Hillary Clinton, to be U.S. secretary of state during his first term.

That turned out well for both parties. Hillary worked hard, repaired U.S. relations around the world, gained huge foreign policy experience and positioned herself as the frontrunner for 2016.

Obama, who wisely did not let past political feuds cloud his management vision, got a savvy and well-known foreign policy partner who helped him execute a tough but coherent global policy - and, we're told, Hillary was one of the main proponents of carrying out the Osama Bin Laden raid despite Vice President Joe Biden's reported re-

In New York, we now almost have the dawning of a new mayoral administration, and there are a number of people who ran for the highest office who could be helpful to the new mayor.

Although it's unlikely to happen, imagine if city Public Advocate Bill de Blasio wins Nov. 5 and reaches across the aisle and picks his Republican opponent. Joe Lhota, to be first deputy mayor or deputy mayor for operations. Lhota has already done one of those jobs, so even if de Blasio decides to turn to him for help, it is unlikely Lhota wants to be second in command again — particularly for a mayor whose experience and ideas he vigorously challenged during the campaign.

Would City Council Speaker Christine Quinn (D-Manhattan) make a good deputy mayor just as Hillary made a good secretary of state? Probably, but that move is also unlikely. It's too bad: Quinn is a hardworking public servant and would probably do well in the right role.

How about Bill Thompson or city Comptroller John Liu? It's hard to imagine Thompson wanting an appointed position after he was comptroller for eight years and ran the former city Board of Education for a number of years. But it's a shame to lose his wealth of ex-

Liu is ideologically similar to de Blasio, so it wouldn't be too much of a stretch for him to be a deputy mayor or an agency head. But here again it is more likely that Liu will decamp to the private sector to make money to support his family while he strategizes his next move in public life.

Adolfo Carrion is a smart, pragmatic man who knows a lot about urban policy — why not make him head of the city Department of Housing? He could help the next

mayor a lot in that role. But once again, it's a stretch to expect if asked that he would take an appointed position.

Sal Albanese is a wise man who could still serve our city well, but there were too many fireworks during the campaign between him and de Blasio to imagine them working together. And John Catsi-

In the final analysis, while most people do not know this agency even exists, it has had and continues to have a dramatic and damaging effect on the residential character of neighborhoods throughout our city by allowing developers to circumvent the zoning I in many cases ruining the quality of life for millions of New Yorkers. Last week. I wrote about the cavalier and dismissive manner in which the New York City Board of Standards and Appeal (N.Y.C.B.S.A.) has treated our District and some of the detrimental consequences of it. Far from providing a safety net in extraordinary issues pertaining to zoning and development, the five Commissioners of N.Y.C.B.S.A. have hopped right into bed with developers looking to thwart zoning regulations, with folks who have made bad business decisions, and with crafty lawyers who make big bucks helping the aforementioned to do so. Under the Guiliani and Bloomberg Administrations, The Board of Standards and Appeal, all of whose members are appointed by the Mayor for terms of six years, has become the willing accomplice of business and development interests, all the while giving the back of the hand to the concerns of the people from whose pockets they take their generous six-figure salary.

The problems caused in Community Board 12 by N.Y.C.B.S.A. are neither exclusive nor unique to our neighborhood. We are not alone. In order to drive home the point that the Board of Standards and Appeal is a nemesis to localities citywide, I have received permission from New York State Senator Tony Avella to reprint a piece hat he authored on behalf of the Juniper Park Civic Association in Queens. It appeared in the publication THE JUNIPER BERRY in March of 2009 when Senator Avella was a member of the New York City Council. THE JUNIPER BERRY is a magazine that since 1938 has published articles on crime prevention, neighborhood issues, meeting reports and notices, neighborhood history and photographs, guest features, and editorials. Here with a few

paragraphs omitted is his well-written composition, the contents of which I agree with and recommend to you, dear readers, wholeheartedly.

A quasi-judicial agency, BSA is comprised of five Commissioners appointed by the Mayor for six-year terms to, in large part, issue variances to the zoning code. It is the implementation of this responsibility that has irked, frustrated and outright angered elected officials, community boards and residents.

The original mission of BSA was to provide a relief valve for property owners in those rare circumstances where existing zoning regulations would prohibit them from reasonably developing their property. I stress the

Unfortunately, BSA has been allowed to mushroom into a huge loophole for developers who want to circumvent the law. For far too long developers have used BSA as an old boys' network where a handful of law firms represent hundreds of clients/ developers trying to build in excess of existing building and zoning code requirements.

While the Borough Presidents and Community Boards routinely submit comments on variance applications, their opinions are only advisory and often dismissed by BSA.

Despite BSA's assertions to the contrary, Borough President and Community Board recommendations are generally only successful in achieving very minor changes to original plans. It is fascinating to note that Council Members have no official role in the process other than to receive a copy of the application.

When reviewing applications, BSA must evaluate the request in terms of the following five criteria:

· Does the unique condition of the property prevent reasonable development?

- · Would unique property conditions prevent an owner from obtaining a reasonable financial return?
- · Does the variance, if granted, alter the essential character of the neigh-
- · Is the situation the result of a self-imposed hardship? (In other words I you cannot buy a property knowing the restrictions and then claim hardship) · Is the variance requested the minimum necessary to afford relief?

Unfortunately, BSA routinely disregards these guidelines. The selfimposed hardship restriction is rarely enforced. The BSA requirement that the variance will not alter the character of the neighborhood is a joke! It is never really considered.

And why does the City, through BSA, reward developers for making a bad financial decision? If you own any other type of business in this city and make a bad investment or your business fails, the city does not bail you out. But, BSA will grant a financial hardship variance for developers who make poor judgments or risky investments. This practice clearly demonstrates the huge political influence that the real estate industry enjoys in this City. It is a foolproof system that rescues developers from their own incompetence and investment mistakes.

To justify their favorable actions towards developers, BSA will frequently rely on their quasi-judicial status as a defense. This convenient excuse provides political cover for their lack of common sense and failure to

adhere to the five variance criteria. Yet, the qualifications for appointment to the Board say nothing about being

The only qualifications mentioned in the City Charter are that one Commissioner shall be a registered architect with at least 10 years' experience as an engineer and one shall be a planner with professional qualifications and with at least 10 years' experience as a planner. Why is there no requirement that the Commissioners have legal experience? Because it was never meant to be the final legal arbiter of these land use issues.

Ever since the old Board of Estimate was eliminated, the only recourse for New Yorkers to appeal BSA decisions is to file an Article 78 lawsuit against the City I a time consuming and expensive proposition. Good luck in trying to get satisfaction by that route!

When the Board of Estimate was in existence, BSA decisions could be appealed to that legislative body. Under that system, at least New Yorkers had the opportunity to press their case for justice before officials elected by the people as opposed to the appointed bureaucrats on BSA.

Thanks to Joe Donovan, finally back in the Point full time and already a board member again, for cleaning up the beach and being the best neighbor the civic could have. Mary Jane Musano for the Waterbury LaSalle Civic brought a tray of baked ziti (awesome) and an offer of free trees. After a powwow with Ron Griffith, Mary Jane left and came back with at least 8 beautiful trees (including two hazelnut trees) which Ron and Louis Bevilacqua planted and watered.

I also want to thank Ken Kearns, John Marano and Pat Caruso at Community Board 10 as well as Ben Randazzo of Assemblyman Benedetto's office for all their help with promoting the event and their support in getting Con Ed to complete the work on the house. DCAS is working on the punch list, the plumber is finishing up and applying for permits and once we have a Certificate of Occupancy (COO), the keys will be given back to us and after a quick clean up, we will have a Grand Opening Day Celebration, complete with ribbon cutting by Councilman Vacca, who's support we could not have done without. The house will be open for election day on Nov. 5, thanks to another temporary COO, but we don't expect to be fully up and running until mid -November at the earliest.

While this will give us the house back in time for us to organize a Breakfast with Santa in December and also to plan an amazing 2014 season, it leaves our 2013 CSA group with a year full of distributions in my backyard. I tried to organize cooking demos and food tastings, but it was just too difficult to do these things without the kitchen set up like we have

at the civic. However, the LPCA 2014 season will include events like cooking classes, CSA Open House and maybe even an Earth Day celebration so that we can continue to promote the idea of eating a healthy diet. And of course, when the 2014 CSA season begins next June, we will be back to weekly cooking demos as we did in 2012. Despite the backyard location, this year's CSA has been enjoyable and a really wonderful bounty. This is my 7th or 8th year in a CSA and I have to say that this year Stoneledge Farm and Mother Nature have outdone themselves. Butternut Squash and turnips that are huge, multiple weeks of cauliflower and kohlrabi, Fall lettuces if you didn't join the CSA this year, you really missed out on some great food...but there is always next vear.

At a recent CSA distribution, I had the chance to tell Mary Jane Musano how much I liked her column in which she wrote about how many trusted food suppliers are using GMO crops in their products. Her suggestion was to avoid these foods, but as we discussed, it is so much easier said than done. Taking you and your family "off the grid" when it comes to food, is not an easy process and one that must be approached with realistic goals.

Of course, joining a CSA, shopping at Farmer's Markets, creating "meat-

less meals" and avoiding processed food are great guidelines to get you on the path to a cleaner and healthier diet.

The phrase "knowledge is power" is a helpful adage when discussing not only your diet and health, but also the recent DOS Organics Composting Pilot Program. I have heard and read complaints about the program and I understand the concerns regarding rodents and insects that will infest the food and create a health hazard. So in an attempt to impart knowledge, I have some advise gleaned from my own experience.

In an urban setting, waste removal is a concerted effort between the municipal government, the citizens and businesses. Let's look at it this way: the amount of waste is a constant, what we do with it is what varies.

We can take the approach of waste as waste only and it becomes an expense. It costs the municipality (and it's citizens and businesses) money to store the waste in landfills (not to mention the impact to the environment and the health of the people who live near these landfills) and to transport it to other municipalities for storage in their landfills.

By recycling paper, glass, plastic and cardboard NYC turned these materials into an income stream by processing them locally and selling these raw materials to industry or using it themselves. The next step, to process organics, is an unprecedented step for a city the size of New York to make. Organics recycling has been successfully im-

plemented in cities such as Portland, OR and Se-Anyone who attle, WA. has attempted composting in their own backyard has had to suffer through the learning curve of how to balance your "greens" and "browns" so that your compost is neither too dry or too wet (which leads to stinky compost that is infested with flies and mosquitos). If you participate in the organics recycling program and you fill the brown bins with nothing but food waste, then it will be a stinky mess.

But if you went to any one of the many community meetings in which DOS reps spoke about the program you would know that there are ways to prevent this from happening. You can tear newspaper and put it on the bottom of the countertop bin before you put in your compostable bag. This will help absorb liquids and reduce smells. Stainless steel pails are available that do a better job of absorbing odors. If you feel uncomfortable recycling cooked food scraps that include fat, bones or meat, then by all means don't do it. But please consider using the countertop bin for vegetable and fruit trimmings and for paper towels and napkins.

To keep the brown container clean, keep a small garbage pail filled with dry leaves. I throw a bunch into the bottom of the container when it's empty. After each deposit from my countertop container, I cover the bag with more leaves and lock it shut.

I don't have bugs, and clean up on Thursdays after sanitation empties the container is a quick rinse with water. And lastly, if the idea of recycling any sort of food is repulsive to you, then at least participate in the program by filling the brown bin with your yard trimmings. You can also contribute filled brown paper leaf bags or open garbage pails with yard trimmings, which is a great idea since anyone who gardens is doing quite a bit of clean up right now.

In fact, I spent yesterday morning working on breaking down the tomato and pepper plants in my next door garden.

Despite the city's program, I have decided to continue composting my own yard waste to amend the soil in our raised beds this spring. So all the tomato, pepper, oregano, arugula, basil and celery plants got chopped up and added to the pile.

I separated the marigold and purple coneflower trimmings to spread out at the civic so we can get some wildflowers growing there too. However, since the industrial composting process does a better job of killing weed seeds, I kept a separate pail handy to throw these into. I have no problem with the aforementioned plants re-seeding where I want them to, but what a great opportunity to practice "natural selection" and maybe reduce the amount of weeds in the garden.

In the meantime, until next time, be the change you want to see in the world. And if you perceive of the world as a wonderful place, it will be a wonderful place.

Look for only the negative and you will find it everywhere.

Mental Attitude: Video Games are Good! Scientists have developed a video game-based training strategy called NeuroRacer that could "repair" cognitive decline in older individuals. The 3D video game challenges cognitive control by providing a series of distractions on the screen that the players must try to avoid while driving. Diet: Vitamin D Deficiency. Vitamin D deficiency is associated with osteomalacia, osteopenia, osteoporosis, and risk of fracture. Emerging evidence also points to increased risk for cancer and cardiovascular diseases. Good sources of vitamin D include sunlight, cod liver oil, salmon, mushrooms, mackerel, tuna fish, milk, orange juice, and supplements. - British Journal of Nutrition, September 2013

Exercise: Obesity and Post Heart Attack Mortality. A study of French heart attack survivors found that obesity (BMI =35 kg/m²) is associated with the largest risk of absolute mortality five years later (+65%). - European Society of Cardiology, August 2013

Chiropractic: Every Inch! For every inch your head is forward, your upper back and neck muscles have to hold an extra 10 lbs ( $\sim$ 4.5 kg), as they have to work harder to keep the head (chin) from dropping to your chest. ### Oral health and diabetes

Discussions about diabetes often focus around concerns involving the eyes, nerves, kidneys and heart. According to dentists at Union Community Health Center in the Bronx, diabetics also cannot neglect the importance of good oral health.

"The Bronx has the largest incidence of diabetes in the city. We are on a constant mission to remind diabetic patients about the importance of being vigilant in maintaining good oral health," said Dr. Robert Margolin, DDS, who practices general dentistry at Union Community Health Center and is program director of the general practice dentistry residency program at St. Barnabas Hospital. "It is a double edge sword - uncontrolled diabetes can affect one's oral health and poor oral health can exacerbate one's blood glucose level and contribute to the progression of diabetes."

In general, said Dr. Margolin, diabetes reduces the body's resistance to infection, with the gums among the tissues most likely to be affected. Periodontal disease, which can damage the gums and bone that hold the teeth in place and cause tooth loss, is often linked to the control of diabetes. Patients with inadequate blood sugar control develop periodontal disease more often and more severely, and tend to lose more teeth than people whose diabetes is controlled.

In addition, an inability for diabetics to control the bacteria, viruses and fungi that occur naturally in the mouth and the diminished flow of saliva can lead to fungus infections like thrush - where white or red patches form on the gums, tongue, cheeks or roof of the mouth - or xerostomia (or dry mouth).

"Good oral hygiene is especially important for diabetics because their bodies generally can't fight off infection as well as those without the disease," he

Dr. Margolin offers these suggestions to diabetics (as part of Diabetes Awareness Month in November):

- · See your dentist immediately if you notice signs of periodontal disease. This includes gums that bleed or are red, swollen or tender; gums that have pulled away from the teeth; when pus has formed between the teeth; loosening teeth; persistent bad breath; or changes in the fit of partial dentures.
- · Plan to see the dentist on a regular schedule. This, he said, is particularly important for those whose diabetes is not under control or who have periodontal disease - whose symptoms only appear in the advanced stages. "This may mean seeing a dentist as often as every couple of months to remove the plaque that forms between the teeth and causes gum disease," he said.
- · Try to schedule appointments in the morning. This is considered the best time for diabetics to have dental procedures because it's when their blood glucose tends to be more stabilized

and the individual has had breakfast, taken their medication and tested their blood sugar level. "This gives the dentist a greater window of opportunity to work without worrying that the patient's blood sugar will drop too low," said Dr. Margolin. · Stay compliant with your oral care. In addition to following through on visits to the dentist for pro-

- fessional cleanings, this means brushing your teeth at least twice a day, flossing nightly, and using a fluoride mouth rinse. Dr. Margolin recommends the use of an electric toothbrush, which can get through to much of the plaque on the tooth surface and massage the gums without eroding the tissue. The dentist may also prescribe other rinses or medication.
- · Stop smoking. Smoking only makes matters worse. "It raises your chances of getting gum disease and fungal infections, as well as oral and throat cancers," he said. "If you smoke, we have certain aides that can help you stop."

With everything in the body interconnected, diabetics have both a particular need and a more difficult path in maintaining good oral health.

"Poor oral health can lead to harmful bacteria traveling in your bloodstream to the rest of the body and causing problems," said Dr. Margolin. "Conversely, having a healthy mouth can lead to lower blood glucose levels and a reduced chance of other inflammation-related conditions in the body that are common with diabetes."



### New name for former New Hawaii Sea Restaurant

The doors at the Williamsbridge Road eatery will remain shuttered indefinitely, as renovation work slowly gets underway, according to Larry Hockert, the owner's attorney.

News of it's impending re-opening comes as health officials confirmed New Hawaii Sea exposed three other people with hep A, upping the original number of infected to nine. A total of eight patrons and one food handler suffered from the food-borne illness, commonly found in restaurants.

The health scare drove thousands of customers to Lehman High School for a free hep A vaccine shots by the city Department of Health.

The agency set up a clinic for three days, administering shots to anx-

ious customers who ate at the Asian-fusion joint from September 7th to the 19th, the window of exposure, according to the DOH.

The outbreak soon drove lawyers to consider lawsuits against the restaurant owners, though Hockert maintainsed the first class action suit was an empty threat since no one has filed a claim.

"The first case as far as I know hasn't been filed," said Hockert. "It's just not a big case."

"The papers are prepared, I will file them at any moment," said Steve Kaufman, the local attorney seeking punitive damages on grounds staffers could have knowingly served hep A-tainted food despite warnings from DOH.

The eatery had already left a bad taste with the DOH, which slapped New Hawaii Sea with a B letter grade early this year, citing violations that included the potential for vermin to worm its way into the kitchen area.

#### **Cleanliness Lesson**

The restaurant fell in the jurisdiction of the Westchester Square Business Improvement District, with officials seeing the New Hawaii Sea's troubles as a teachable moment. Officials partnered with Community Board 10 for a forum on food safety on Monday, Oct. 28, with a handful of restaurateurs present.

DOH representatives debunked myths about hep A while doling out advice often overlooked by restaurant owners, including the importance of washing hands for over 20 seconds.

"Educate your employees to wash their hands because it can affect your business," said DOH rep Faina Stavinsky.



The New Hawaii Sea Restaurant in Westchester Square remains closed, though owners vow to re-open under a new name and management.

Ken Kearns, district manager at CB10, suggested the DOH should invite food handlers to similar workshops

The impact of the hep A scaret hasn't deterred businesses in Westchester Square.

"There's absolutely no indication that anything of a negative, commerce-type situation has happened on Westchester Square because of the closing of one restaurant," said John Bon-

izio, chairman of the BID. "I challenge anyone to come up with stuff."

Bonizio, owner of Metro Optics, blasted a report that linked New Hawaii Sea's mishap to the drop in business at a deli and pizzeria.



### Cuevas commits to SC hoops

Bianca Cuevas chose to use the approach that made her who she is today to mold the player and person she will become.

The Nazareth senior guard, who is one of the nation's top players, excelled under the tough-love style of former coach and father figure Apache Paschall, who died suddenly nearly two years ago. The Bronx-native saw similar qualities in the approach of South Carolina women's basketball coach Dawn Staley during her official visit. It was enough for her to verbally commit to the Gamecocks over Ole Miss last week.

"She was like, 'This is going to be hard for you. I'm going to be on you because I only want the best for you," Cuevas said of Staley.

Nothing will be handed her she said. She expects to play, but not start right away for a program that was ranked No. 17 in the nation at the end of last season. Cuevas believes Staley and South Carolina will create the best environment for her to grow.

Staley is a one of the greatest players in the history of women's basketball. The point guard won three Olympic gold medals, took Virginia to the NCAA title game, led the Charlotte Sting to the WNBA finals and is a member of the National Basketball Hall of Fame. Cuevas, who scored 17 points at the Metro Classic All-Star game last Sunday, struck up a close bond with her.

"She's going to teach me what I need to know," she said. "She is going to be honest with me. She's not going to sit there and lie in your face. She's going to take care of me."

The decision's forward thinking is a sign of how much Cuevas has grown as a person off the court ever since she was a phenom seventh grader playing against high school seniors with her Exodus travel ball team. Nazareth coach Ron Kelley said the 5-foot-6 Cuevas is a different person thanks to her tumultuous junior season. She was suspended for the remainder of the vear last February for two incidences of fight-

"The trouble that she got in last year in a little bit of a way was a blessing in disguise," Kelley said. "The kid has her head on her shoulders the right way right now. She's focused."

In South Carolina she sees a place where her growth can continue with the kind accountability she needs to continue to be successful. Staley and her staff are demanding on and off the court. Earning everything that comes to her sits just fine with her.

"I think I had a better future over there," Cuevas said. "I think I am going to have to work harder."

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
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
