HITMAN GUNNED DOWN

Mobster Michael Meldish slain in Country Club

A notorious local mob hit man finally became the victim, gunned down on a quiet east Bronx street.

Michael Meldish, believed responsible for more than a dozen gangland hits, was rubbed out with a single shot to his head as he was getting out of his car in middle-class residential Country Club in the late evening hours of Friday, Nov. 15.

His infamous brother and fellow Purple Gang member Joseph Meldish, is doing a 20 year-to-life stretch for a Throggs Neck murder

Meldish 62, was found about 10:30 p.m. inside his rusty Lincoln LS sedan, parked in the middle of

a crosswalk on Ellsworth Ave. at Baisly Avenue.

Meldish was shot in the right side of his head, with neither the bullet nor any shell casing recovered, said a law enforcement source, adding that the absence of powder burns indicated Meldish was shot from a short distance.

"He was getting out of his car with one leg already out, so it looks as if someoone either came up on him or shot him from inside the car," said the source, adding that it looked like Meldish had pulled up in the crosswalk rather than at the curb "as if he had pulled over to stop to either pick someone up or let them off."

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Ice rink talks down to wire

Cabrera power play charge casts shadow

The final issues over the proposed Kingsbridge National Ice Center are being worked on down to the wire between the developers and the local City Councilman who could decide whether the project lives or dies.

Staffers for Councilman Fernando Cabrera, whose support on the KNIC project has been shaky, are focusing on a growing concern over traffic issues.

Opponents believe the already swamped northwest Bronx nabe could see bumper-to-bumper traffic should the City Council and mayor choose the massive ice palace, home to nine ice skating rinks.

Cabrera is viewed as the key player in seeing the project come to fruition. The project needs 26 votes to pass or 34 votes to override any mayoral veto.

The traffic gripes were

enough for local Community Board 7's economic development committee to vote against the project, but the full board ultimately voted in favor of it in September under the city's Uniform Land Use Review Procedure.

Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr., the City Planning Commission and the city Landmarks Commission soon approved plans for the ice palace, slated to be built by 2018 if approved.

But Cabrera's office appears to have backed antirink locals, citing traffic concerns similar to those linked to the 2009 mall project by The Related Cos., which was ultimately killed in the Council.

Greg Faulkner, Cabrera's chief-of-staff, argued that traffic concerns have not been studied closely enough given 7,000 guests per day projected at the cen-

Faulkner believes traffic could be snarled with even a thousand guests per day. "That's still a heavy amount of traffic," he said.

The talks come amid a

published report by Kate Pastor in the Norwood News alleging through unnamed sources that Cabrera attempted to squeeze \$100,000 a year from KNIC to fund a religious nonprofit to which he's no longer tied to.

The end result was Cabrera backpedaling on his request.

His endorsement of the project was allegedly motivated by his request in a pay-to-play scheme that could catch the attention of prosecutors, according to the report, citing sources closely tied to the Community Benefits Agreement talks that took place early this year.

"It's just not true," Faulkner said of the report, though he did not elaborate further.

But the sudden turn of events appears to be in contrast to Cabrera's stance when the city Economic Development Corporation formally announced it had picked the ice rink plan developed by former Wall Streeter and eco-friendly builder Kevin Parker.

"This is going to become the Yankee Stadium of ice skating," Cabrera boasted at the April 23 announcement.

These days, he's remained silent.



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Traffic upgrades for Westchester Square

Safety measures due for E. Tremont Ave.

A dangerous stretch of local asphalt is about to get smart.

A length of E. Tremont Avenue in Westchester Square will ill-defined traffic measures will receive a major safety upgrade this spring.

The city Department of Transportation plans to redesign an accident-prone chunk of the wide avenue from Bronxdale to St. Raymond's avenues.

DOT statistics show 180 people were injured from 2007-2011 along the stretch.

Almost 85% of drivers along it during that time went faster than the citywide 30 mph limit, the DOT said

The plan aims to shorten crossing distances for pedestrians by adding islands and crosswalks, tackle speeding with new stoplight timing, and combat traffic backups by installing leftturn only lanes.

The incoming changes are separate from a Neighborhood Slow Zone, slated for 2016, that will target motorist speeding on the nabe's narrower residential streets.

No man's land

The highlight of the planned rejiggering is an overhaul of what locals call a "no man's land" – the collision of E. Tremont with Overing and Silver Streets. That problematic patch will be divided into two different intersections.

Among the changes:

•Three pedestrian islands in the middle of E. Tremont Avenue to give those crossings the 70-foot wide avenue a chance to catch their breath.

•Extensions of the sidewalk at Overing Street and Silver Street that cut down on crossing distance.

•A new stoplight timing plan that breaks up turning into four different "phases."

•Banning a left turn from Silver Street onto E. Tremont.

•Creating a designated left turn lane from E. Tremont on to Silver Street.

The current intersec-

tion alone accounted for 61 injuries from 2007-2011, including some high-profile crashes. Last July a man drove a car through a brick wall and into the Clarke And Son Signs store just off E. Tremont on Overing, killing himself and injuring his passenger. A crash happened as recently as

Thursday, Nov. 7, when a car rammed into a pole on E. Tremont and Silver Avenues.

More organization could not come soon enough, said Lisa Sorin, executive director of the Westchester Square BID. Though the area is flooded with 25,000 daily bus riders on the BX40 and Bx42 buses, pedestrians are frightened to walk across the unorganized street to visit the stores there, she said.

"You get off the bus and have no reason to want to cross or stay in that area," she said.

More Changes

The DOT's plan also calls for a raised median on E. Tremont at Maclay Avenue and Benson Street to better define where motorists should turn. A safety island for pedestrians will come in at E. Tremont and St. Raymond's Ave.

A few blocks east, DOT will redefine the stretch of E. Tremont between Bronxdale Ave. and Montgomery Place by slicing the current lanes into smaller designated turning lanes.

The city agency had been studying the intersection since 2011.

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

Oh my!

Call us Bronx-centric, but we'd say Jimmy Vacca made some heavy brownie points at the Bronx forum for City Council Speaker.

Based on Jimmy's responses to questions and his familiar "That's not acceptable!" mantra, Vacca notched up his creds as a viable candidate after lagging behind on the political blogger circuit.

Jimmy has always been our gold standard for a hardworking local elected, so we're not that surprised he impressed folks not from his east Bronx district.

While the real vote will come down to the 51 council members, establishing public creds as a viable leader is all part of the process.

The forum, Monday night, Nov. 12 at the New Settlement Community Center in Mt. Eden, also brought out Councilmember/Speaker wannabes Annabel Palma of Soundview, Brooklyn's Mark Weprin, E. Harlem/South Bronx Councilwoman Melissa Mark-Viverito, Dan Garodnick of Queens and Harlem's Inez Dickens

While the others are pushing for a tsunami of reforms that would weaken the Speaker's power - and increase individual members' independence and clout. Vacca and Palma warned it could weaken the Speaker's power in negotiations with the mayor - and the council grilling some city agencies who think they are above answering to the council.

"When we address rules reforms, we have to look at making it more democratic and definitely more transparent, but we also have to assure that we remain strong, a united voice that's prepared to fight," Vacca told a standing-roomonly crowd of about 150 people in the packed community room at the

He drew loud applause responding to an audience question about potential reforms to curb corruption, saying "If you're a crook, you're a crook!"

GOP VICTORY

Giving credit where its due, the Bronx Republican Party showed it's strength in the mayoral election with a majority vote for

Joe Lhota, even if the winning territory was only a small slice of the borough.

Lhota swamped ultimate winner Bill de Blasio in the GOP's east Bronx stronghold running from Country Club south through Throggs Neck and including Waterbury-Lasalle, as well as Morris Park, a chunk of Pelham Gardens as well as a solid vote of heavily Irish-Amerian Woodlawn. All told, de Blasio pulled 86.1%, or 113,644 borough votes, while Lhota garnered 11.1%, or 14,580. Ex-Borough President Adolfo Carrion Jr., who (Gasp!) dropped his Democratic registration to run on the Independence Party line, squeaked out 1.9% or 2,452 votes in his home borough.

Losing his pension could be just one more worry for Stevenson, whose three indicted co-conspirators recently pleaded guilty in the scheme involving greasing the wheels for two Bronx adult daycare

Newly elected west Bronx Assemblyman Victor Pichardo heading to Albany on Nov. 25 to be officially sworn in. Pichardo filled the 86th A.D. seat vacated by disgraced Nelson Castro after a squeaker race with former District Leader Hector Ramirez that many complained was filled with irregularities - beyond the city Board of Elections normal incompetence. Hector screwed up filing a lawsuit on time that listed numerous irregularities, so it looks like clear sailing for Pichardo – at least until next year when he'll have to run for a full term. The former staffer for state Senator Gustavo Rivera will likely again have the backing of the Bronx Democratic machine.

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Police nail four suspected Throggs Neck van-dals

They came, they sawed, they were conquered.

Cops nailed four crooks accused of sawing exhaust pipe emission converters from 11 vehicles -including two vans used by the local senior center — on residential Throggs Neck streets in the middle of the night Tuesday, Nov. 19.

The suspects Mount Vernon and Edenwald used power saws to remove thousands of dollars worth of parts from vehicles on Schley and Balcom avenues, according to a criminal complaint.

But with an assist from an eagle-eyed car owner, cops caught the thieves redhanded.

Eagle-eyed local

Police were called to the scene after a resident on Balcom Avenue near Dewey Avenue spotted someone meddling with the exhaust pipe of his Toyota Corolla at around 2 a.m, according to the complaint.

When cops pulled over a white Acura at the scene

they found the power saws and metal blades in the passenger compartment and a treasure trove of stolen parts in its trunk — 11 catalytic converters sliced from exhaust pipes in the area, police said.

The stolen converters are pollution-limiting devices required by state law to be attached to the exhaust pipe of every motor vehicle. They range in price from a few hundred dollars to over \$1,000.

Out of town thieves

The four suspects were arraigned on Wednesday, Nov. 20, charged with auto stripping, criminal possession of stolen property and possession of burglary tools.

They were identified as Morris Kemar, 26, and Raymond Thompson, 23, both of Mt. Vernon, and 27-yearold Donald Monfries and 20-year-old Junior Stevens of Edenwald.

The four men were released and are due back in court on January 9.

Senior vans looted The thieves' bounty included two converters from vans at a nearby senior housing project on Schley Avenue that were used to shuttle around its members, said Amy Chalfy, director of programs at JASA, the company that runs the service.

Councilman Jimmy Vacca had allocated \$51,000 for one of the new senior vans just a month ago.

"These vans are essential to seniors in my community, and I am appalled that someone would attempt to rob them of this service," he said.

The vans serve seniors who live miles away and otherwise would have no way to reach the center for its daytime activities, Chalfy said.

She added that she expects no delay in the organization's services, though they may have to rent out another van for the short term.

"You feel disheartened when something like that happens," she said, "but it's a setback we will over-

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Benedetto butting youth football

Wants ban tackling under 14-year-olds

A Bronx elected official's new bill banning youth tackle football because of its risk for brain damage has the borough's football coaches and organizers feeling blitzed.

East Bronx Assemblyman Michael Benedetto announced Thursday, Nov. 14 that he had revised a bill calling for a ban on 10-andunder organized tackle football he first introduced in February.

Now Benedetto's proposed law, the first of its kind in the United States, would make the sport illegal for kids under age 14.

The assemblyman cited evidence from university studies that suggest that young athletes enduring repeated head injuries face a greater risk of brain damage later in life. University

Joining Benedetto on the

podium in Albany was Dr. Robert Cantu, co-director of Boston University's Center for the Study of Traumatic Encephalopathy, research shows that even smaller, lower impact hits damage too minor to be considered a "concussion" - cause serious damage to undeveloped brains.

If passed, the bill would either shut down the borough's youth football leagues, or force them to play a safer but watereddown version of the sport.

Benedetto's bill would "cripple" the Warrior Football Club, an intramural league that plays at Rice Stadium in Pelham Bay, square in the assemblyman's district, said league director Jay Demers.

He said that in his 55 years of coaching in the league, he has yet to witness even one concussion on the field. Players in his league

are taught not to launch themselves head first into tackles and simply do not move fast enough for head injuries to be a concern, he

"We just don't see it, not at this level," he said. "Our players tackle standing

Hitting leagues

Benedetto's bill would also hit citywide Pop Warner leagues hard. A ban on youth football would put a wrench in the youth league's recent trend of sending more and more alumni to colleges with athletic scholarships, said Lloyd Rodriguez, the league's organizer and coach of the Brooklyn Pitbulls.

"The time learning how to tackle the right way at a young age, or developing vision as a running back, you can't replace that," Rodriguez said.

The majority of Pop Warner players come from poorer black and Hispanic neighborhoods and view playing football as a possible route to a college education, or even a shot at playing in professional leagues, Rodriguez said.

"I'm worried about what will happen if you take away that childhood dream," he

Benedetto expects that getting the bill passed will be an uphill battle. He is still seeking a co-sponsor for the legislation in the state Senate. But instead of backing down, he decided to double down.

"I just came to the simple conclusion that if you're going to do this, let's do this right," he said at the press conference.

Benedetto said that he would also introduce legislation banning the practice of "heading" the ball in soccer - players using their heads to butt the soccer ball.

"I understand that it is a process," Benedetto said. "People are reluctant to change their views on something they grew up with. But we need to protect these kids at any cost."

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Cops bag 'Loot' tagger - again

Leaves mark IN precinct during graffiti cleanup

The infamous graffiti tagger "Loot" faced new charges only a week after his initial arrest for tagging graffiti all over the east Bronx.

This time, the 16-yearold was busted for driving a stolen car.

And to top that off, he was arrested inside the 45th Precinct for carving his tag with a coin into the bench he was handcuffed to.

While he was cooling his heals in the station house, local electeds, Community Board 10 members and the precinct commander were working on a graffiti cleanup program.

According to a complaint report, Anthony Miro was caught in the drivers seat after he broke into a 1997 Nissan at Baisley and Ellsworth Avenue at 2:32 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 16.

Back at the precinct,

cops said he apparently couldn't resist leaving his tag carved into a bench.

He was charged with Unauthorized Use of a Vehicle, Criminal Mischief, Making Graffiti, and Possession of Graffiti Instruments.

Just a week before, on Saturday, Nov. 9, he was caught in the act, and confessed to cops of up to at least 10 incidents of spraypainting "Loot" on local highways and businesses since July 1 around Throggs Neck, Pelham Bay and Waterbury-LaSalle.

He was released in his own recognizance for a Jan. 22 hearing.

"Even as we were gathering outside to clean up graffiti, he was in his cell

nearby," said Community Board 10 chairman John Marano, who along with 45th Precinct Crime Prevention Officer Erin Rabbitt, Police Officer John Sourada, and Ciarra Gannon from Senator Jeff Klein's office took leading roles in organizing the event. It went off without a hitch, with about 50 volunteers showing up.

"I think the graffiti cleanup went great," said Marano. "We hit about a dozen locations between all the volunteers. We had about a dozen youth from the Villa Maria Academy basketball program and their coaches."

Among the areas cleaned were the Bruckner Blvd. service road between East Tremont Avenue and Hutchinson River Parkway, at These Our Treasures building on Bruckner Blvd., Lafaytte Avenue under the Cross Bronx Expressway underpass, Dill Place, Law-

ton Avenue and E. Tremont Avenue, Sampson and E. Tremont Avenue, Scott Place and East Tremont Avenue and several others he said.

Senator Jeff Klein, 45th Precinct commanding officer Captain James McGeown, Councilman Jimmy Vacca, Marano, CB 10 district manager Kenneth Kearns, and about 45 volunteers, including members of the Precinct's Youth Explorers program participated.

At the start of the cleaning, Senator Jeff Klein presented awards to John Provetto and Sydney Flores, who make graffiti cleanup in their communities a regular thing.

"To keep our streets graffiti-free, we have to work together," said Klein. "Last weekend, dozens of volunteers came together to remove nearly 30 graffiti tags along East Tremont Avenue. Graffiti damages property, creates blight and causes financial hardship for home and business owners. With the help of the 45th Precinct, Community Board 10 and local residents, we've shown that our community will not tolerate tagging property.

MPCA collection effort for Philippines

The disastrous effects of Typhoon Haiyan, the Philippines second-most destructive tropical storm on record, have surfaced in the Bronx.

A massive relief operation is underway, hoping donations can help rescue native Philippinos from the fallout.

The typhoon struck on Nov. 11, just a week and a half following an earthquake in Bohol.

"They haven't even recovered from that calamity, and here comes this tvphoon," said Hilda Diongon, president of The Philippine American Association of the Bronx (PAAB). The Pelham Parkway resident is leading a collection effort with help from the Morris Park Community Association.

"We do need your help, it's really hard for us to accept the fact that my countrymen are suffering there,"

said Diongon.

Diongon pleaded for funds at the Nov. 13 MPCA meeting, stopping with her husband Art and PAAB members.

Assemblyman Gjonaj attending the meeting committed an undisclosed amount to the cause.

"Cash is the best because if we take clothes it will take two months for the ships to get there," said Diongon, whose family in the Philippines was spared by the storm that killed over 4,000

Diongon has partnered with the Philippine-niche group dubbed the United Filipino American Communities of Connecticut & New York to collect funds.

Diongnon has carved a life for herself in Pelham Parkway, immigrating from the Philippines in 1983. She's worked at Jacobi Medical Center for nearly thirty years, serving as an Infec-

"Today it can happen to the Phillipines," said Signorile. "Tomorrow it can happen to the Greeks."

Joe Bombace, an active member of MPCA, echoed Signorile's sentiment.

"Just as we did what we did for Italy with the earthquake, we should try and do something for the Philippino community," Bombace said of the 2009 L'Aquila quake.

Knocked out by Sandy

The Bruckner had been shuttered for 13 months after Superstorm Sandy flooded the low-sitting neighborhood joint last October and caused damage to the shop's basement, beer taps and freezers.

Recovery was then delayed amid ongoing legal disputes between the restaurant's co-owners and landlords over who should pay for the cost of repairs.

Now the Grill is back up and running, complete with new black-and-white tiled

\$3 million for Sandy relief

When the floodwaters from Hurricane Sandy receded at Providence Rest in Country Club, some boulders supporting the seawall unfortunately went with it.

The nursing facility, where 200 elderly and frail seniors enjoy panoramic views of Eastchester Bay, is not alone among borough cultural and not-for-profit institutions that were hit by Sandy's howling wind gusts and crushing rain just over

Now Senator Jeff Klein is teaming up with Providence Rest, the New York Botanical Garden, Fordham University and a host of others affected by Sandy, announcing on Thursday, Nov. 14 at Providence Rest that the allocation of \$3 million in Federal Emergency Management Agency disaster relief funding had been expedited.

It was approved earlier

this year by the state legislature in conjunction with the governors office.

"It has been just over a year since Superstorm Sandy hit our shores," said Klein, "and while the repair and rebuilding continues, I am happy to report that money so desperately needed to bring the Bronx back has arrived."

FEMA responsive

Providence Rest administrator Susan Steinberg said FEMA was very responsive to their needs, with \$262,000 allocated to to repair infrastructure.

"A team came to Providence Rest several times to assess our property damage and talk to us about our needs going forward," she said. "We have been reimbursed for all the damage to our air conditioning units and their replacement, debris removal, tree removal, roof repair, catch basin repair. All of that has been

taken care of except the seawall, which we are working to repair once and for all."

Providence residents live just 23 feet from the sea wall, which took a terrible beating during Sandy, she said.

Among the organizations receiving funding were NYBG with over \$566,000; Fordham

\$254,000; SUNY Maritime College with about \$394,000; Manhattan College with about \$29,000.

Wave Hill, the Wildlife Conservation Society's Bronx Zoo, Calvary Hospital, Jacobi Medical Center, Montefiore Medical Center. and many others also took a pounding from Superstorm

At the NYBG, many trees in its 50-acre native forest were felled by Sandy, said Aaron Bouska. Initial reimbursements allowed the garden to reopen quickly after Sandy, he said.

Assemblyman Michael Benedetto, who also played a role in working to make sure that area institutions got their fair share of FEMA disaster relief monies, said in a statement at the press that "One of the major objectives that we had in our last legislative session was to provide some relief to those adversely affected by Superstorm Sandy.

"I am gratified that some of the funds are reaching our Bronx institutions and I hope there will be more to follow."

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
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Optimism at Job Search Club

Morris Park Library workshop helping job seekers

"It's not difficult to get a job," said Robyn Saunders as her rapt, slightly confused audience looked up from their laptops in the conference room at the Morris Park branch library.

"No. Finding a job is easy," Saunders continued. She flashed a grin. " You already took the first step. You're here!"

Saunders headed the first of a series of meetings of the library's "Job Search Club" on Friday, November 15. Bronxites seeking employment joined her at the free clinic to redesign their resumes and develop talking points for interviews in a job market that can seem daunting.

Jobs are out there

The borough is the most unemployed county in the state, with a whopping 12% jobless rate, according to the latest state Department of Labor statistics

But Saunders, a Dynamic Career Coach at the library, said there are jobs out there for the taking. She said she's placed more than a thousand people over the last year, with help from the Labor Department, which sends her lists of open positions.

The only tricky part of the process is figuring out how to sell yourself, she said.

"We struggle sometimes to understand the value of what we've already done," she said.

Range of unemployed

Clinic visitors spanned the spectrum of job seekers. Saunders told a new entry into the job force that she was, in fact, experienced, since her parents were her "first bosses."

"What's putting away the groceries? Organizing inventory!" she said.

Abdul Ahmed, 29, was dropped last month from his job working at upscale clothing giant BCBG. He said he's been giving his resume around shops in Midtown Manhattan, but with no luck.

Ahmed's hoping that the

"Job Search Club" will help him spruce up that resume in time for the holiday season, when many retail companies take on part-time workers.

He spent his afternoon editing down and cleaning

up his resumes, after being told a good resume is both precise and detailed, with it crucial not to say too much.

Newly unemployed

Other "Job Search Club" members have been thrust back into the job market for the first time in decades.

"You feel like your self esteem goes down a bit, but it's their loss," said Silvia Armerino, who worked in financial accounting for the same firm for 34 years before being let go at the end of August.

Gladys Rhee, a Korean immigrant who spent 25 years at her family's jewelry shop in Manhattan before it went out of business during the last economic downswing, said she sometimes still gets nervous in interviews, since her English isn't perfect.

"But I'm here to find something to do," she said, eyes widening. "Every day, doing nothing is boring."

The next scheduled "Job Search Club" session will be Friday, Nov. 29 from 1 p.m to 3 p.m. at the library at 985 Morris Park Ave. For information, call 718 931-0892.

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Big Chill at Pelham Houses

Hundreds of residents at the Pelham Parkway Houses are fuming over the Big Chill there.

They've had to suffer through on-again, off-again heat and hot water for days at a time.

The problem for parts of the project began on the evening on Thursday, Nov. 7 and continued until Tuesday, Nov. 12. Sporadic outages continued past Nov. 12 until at least Nov. 15 and appear to be ongoing.

The outage occurred after a work crew interrupted service on a gas line near Mace Avenue that provides heat and hot water for buildings south of the Columbus Educational Campus and north of Pelham Parkway, near Bronxwood Avenue.

Assemblyman Mark Gjonaj and Councilman Jimmy Vacca both pushed the New York City Housing Authority into action. The agency provided blankets which some residents com-

plained were too thin, and worked to get the heating systems back online in the

Gjonaj, who has a background in real estate management, said permanent repairs to the line servicing part of the project will be needed. Gjonaj personally went into the basements of the buildings with NYCHA engineers to assess the situation, even on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, he said.

He called the outage a major hardship.

"It was a heartfelt concern for the residents because it just so happened that this was during the first cold snap, and they were not prepared," said Gjonaj. "You've got elderly, young, and some who are disabled and sick, including one young man who is suffering from leukemia and recently had surgery, so there were plenty of issues."

He said that both he and Vacca promised to look into

providing electric heaters if the situation worsened.

Eventually. NYCHA brought in a mobile boiler in an attempt to restore service, residents said.

"It is unacceptable for people to be without heat and hot water at any time let alone with temperatures near freezing," said Vacca. "I visited with residents to assure them I would do everything in my power to resolve the issue, and luckily we were able to relatively quickly."

Tenant Lorraine Ritter of 2245 Bronxwood Avenue, confirmed that sporadic problems continued past Nov. 12, "NYCHA should have been on top of it."

Cathy McFadden, a tenant at 840 Astor Aveneue, was still without heat or hot water as of Friday. Nov. 15. "We are not happy," she said. "All you can do is dress warmly."

NYCHA's only response to the Bronx Times, via email, was that the outages were sporadic and were fixed and addressed immediately.

Gionaj said that while he wanted to commend NY-CHA for responding over a holiday weekend and for calling out senior personnel, the city has a doublestandard when it comes to judging itself as a landlord with NYCHA, and in judging private landlords.

'The truth is that there

is no private landlord who would ever be able to get away with what NYCHA does," he said. "I am hopeful that the new administration will turn this around. I believe they will."

Former city councilman, state assemblyman and attorney Steve Kaufman has now been elected chairman of the Bronx Overall Economic Development Corporation.

not-for-proft founded in 1981, is an affiliate of the borough president's office charged with economic development and providing low-cost-loans and other assistance for borough businesses.

Kaufman said he believes that the borough is poised for strong economic growth as Brooklyn and Queens become more and more unaffordable for businesses.

He feels that the breakneck growth in the city and investment in the borough will inevitably lead

to more jobs for Bronx residents, and said that BOEDC can help with employee training.

"I think if you are watching trends, Brooklyn and Queens are now overpriced, and the Bronx is starting to become the area of choice," he said. "It is incumbent upon us in our goal of revitalizing the Bronx and creating jobs for our residents, that we make a hospitable environment for businesses to want to locate here, and also for middle and upper-middle class people to move here."

Among BOEDC's great strengths, he said, is that it is helpful in cutting through government "entanglements" in red tape and is one of two local administrators for a Small Business Administration 504 low-interest loan pro-

Kaufman noted much of the economic develop-

ment that has already taken place, including the new Trump Golf Course at Ferry Point Park, as well as new shopping centers opening in the Throggs Neck area and in Riverdale. He also cited the new outlet mall coming to the former Whitestone Cinemas in Throggs Neck, calling the construction boom "an explosion of malls."

Oftentimes when a chain store does decide to locate in the Bronx. he said, it turns into one of that chain's busiest stores.

"These malls enable people to not have to leave the borough to shop for brand name items," said Kaufman.

He added that malls have inherit advantages such as parking, but that more can be done to help small mom-and-pop commercial strips to survive and thrive in a competitive environment.

The very active Bronx Tourism Council, along with BOEDC, wants to rebrand the borough as one that is open for tourism and the Bronx, he said.

The Throggs Neck golf course is a prime example, he said, because they took 300 acres of what had been a waste dump and turned it into a first class golf course capable of holding major sports events.

When asked if the new business activity would change the atmosphere in the borough, Kaufman said that people should not be afraid of the unknown.

"People should not be afraid of prosperity, they shouldn't be afraid of development," he noted.

"They should not block good things from happen-





Assemblyman chael Benedetto is once again teaming up with the Throggs Neck Merchants Association, the St. Benedict Choir, and numerous other community organizations to sponsor an annual celebration of the Christmas spirit with a tree lighting in Throggs Neck.

"As a resident of Throggs Neck, I personally know the Mennas and I am glad they got it started,"


said Cerini. "And I am gratified to carry out the tradition of it."

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A greener look for Clinton HS

Carlos Davila of Soundview is a reformed ex-con with little work history.

He ran into trouble after peddling drugs and was later sentenced to community service to avoid prison time.

He's since stayed on the straight and narrow, helping the world become a greener place while boosting his job prospects.

Davila was one of fifteen ex-cons volunteering to build a greenhouse for Dewitt Clinton High School on behalf of the nonprofit Osborne Association and its Justice Community. The job readiness program is not mandatory, but a benefit to ex-cons with virtually no employment history, according to its website.

The new addition complements the school's already-existing garden, whose tomatoes and kale made their way on to the menus at several high school cafeterias last year.

Ray Pultinas, an English teacher and amateur botanist, stood alongside Davila as they jiggered the plastic boards that insulate the heat. For Pultinas, the garden's larger purpose served as a way for 4,000-student body to understand "where real food comes from."

Building a resume

In building a greenhouse, volunteers build a resume that's largely lacking in legitimate work, making it difficult to land work. Their job hunt struggle is further stigmatized by their criminal background.

Osborne's Justice Community serves as a job readiness program, offering ex-cons the chance to fulfill their community service while polishing their resume.

Davila notes his involvement with Osborne has been uplifting so far, infusing a different meaning that he couldn't find in

his former life.

"I actually feel proud of myself because I always

felt that I wouldn't be anything," said Davila, 19.

To a certain extent,

the greenhouse served as a metaphor to turn things around, "re-boot toward a more positive future," as John Valverde, the nonprofit's executive director,


"Projects such as this one are really critical in re-establishing young people's ties to their neighborhoods," said Valverde.

Their time, geared towards ex-cons 18 to 24, is just one aspect to that step. In Davila's case, the Soundview resident is working toward earning a General Education Diploma.

"I'm more focused on getting my GED, going to college, and doing what I have to do for myself to do better in life," said Davila, who wants to start a construction firm that intends to hire ex-cons.

For now, he's working on getting his OSHA license to work at a construction site.

"I want to prove my family wrong," he said, "to show them there's more to life than doing illegal things."



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
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
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

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Anne Hutchinson faced fate portrayed in The Crucible

I recently attended another great theatrical production of the City Island Theater Group. This time it was "The Crucible" by Arthur Miller. He wrote it in 1953 and it brought to life the Salem Witch trials of the 1690's. What it didn't say, but what lurked in the back of Miller's mind when he wrote it, and in the minds of those savvy enough to understand the political climate of the day, was Wisconsin Senator Joe McCarthy's quest to rid America of Communists. He managed to see one behind every tree and made it his mission in life to unmask them. Although I'm sure he did some good also, it appears that he hurt a lot of innocent people along the way and was eventually censured for his actions.

What "The Crucible" overtly discoursed upon was the existence of witches in the minds of many of our fore founders. Hallucinations possibly brought about by ingesting bread

made from ergot infected rye or a variety of other possible explanations appears to have caused the village of Salem to become panicstricken. Betty Parris, the young daughter of the local minister was the first victim to exhibit the strange behavior and it soon spread throughout the village with real or imagined results. Soon a good portion of the settlement went amok with visions of witchcraft.

That spring and summer of 1692 saw nineteen hard working men and women hanged and one old man crushed to death under the weight of heavy rocks placed upon his chest for not admitting to witchcraft. It was a sad time in our colonial history and the theme was resurrected by Arthur Miller when he saw

how ugly and often untrue accusations were causing the political or economic destruction of numerous good people simply because McCarthy accused them of being communists or abetting leftists. Some of his accusations may have been true, but it's the innocent victims who also suffered. The play was an apt metaphor but unfortunately many minds were already closed.

Watching the inquisitors question the accused reminded me, and some of the others in the audience familiar with colonial history, of the trial of Anne Hutchinson (1591-1643). As most readers know, this is the 420th anniversary of her birth and has been celebrated all year in some areas of Massachusetts as well as here in the Bronx and in

the Town of Eastchester. Although she was not accused of witchcraft, she was declared to be an antinomian which was a treasonable offence in that era. She was forced to remain standing for the full two days of her civil trial on November 7th and 8th, 1637 and then had to face a religious trial the following March. She was condemned at both trials and her sentence was excommunication from the church and banishment from the colony. The methods of inquisition had not changed much from 1637 and 1638 to 1692. The theatrical production was well worthwhile and I'm certainly glad that I made it a point to attend.

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
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Bronx schools

In the October 20th O.L.A Church Bulletin, Fr. Aloysius wrote: "After my heart transplant, I will never forget the prayers of so many people... I am alive today because of the powerful prayers of the people at O.L.A."

The Pelham Parkway Neighborhood Association had our monthly meeting at Bronx House on Tuesday Nov.12. Our Guest speakers this month were Councilman James Vacca and The honorable Robert Torres, Administrative Judge from Bronx County Court. We were also fortunate enough to have our Assemblyman Mark Gionai in attendance. The meeting turned out to be one of our most heavily attended meetings with over 100 community members attending.

Our first order of business was our petition. For too long the Pelham Parkway Community has been serviced by our Public Library that bears the branch name of Van Nest on it. We in the PPNA feel the Library should reflect the neighborhood it services and be named the Pelham Parkway Branch Public Library. To this end we asked all members to sign a petition to rename the library. We will present the petition to the proper people to get them, hopefully, to change the name. Councilman James Vacca addressed the assembly first. The councilman gave us an outline of his office accomplishments so far. Among them was the passing of 40 bills in his 4 his vears in office. He also addressed his concern about our streets and the dangers involved in crossing them for pedestrians. He mentioned the need of speed guns for law enforcement and enforcement of speeding laws. The Assemblyman, and indeed Councilman Vacca as well, were both sincere and sympathetic to the residents' concerns and promised swift action by being hands on and working with Building management to rectify all the problems as quickly as possible and promised court intervention if necessary.

Our last guest speaker was Judge Robert Torres, who is a Deputy Administrative Judge on the Criminal Team of Bronx County. He supervises 57 judges and a support staff of 600, the largest courthouse in the state. He discussed how his office works with veterans and helps to place people with mental health and drug addictions into programs. He also gave some statistics about the backlog in the Bronx County court system and did mention that they have been able to cut into the huge backlog that he spoke with us about last year.

The last order of business we had at our meeting was our yearly turkey raffle for the holidays. We gave away over a dozen turkeys to people in our assembly. We hope they and their families enjoy them year. And hope that all members have a happy and healthy thanksgiving.

PPNA will not be meeting in December because of the holidays. However there are some events to look forward to. Assemblyman Mark Gjonaj will be sponsoring a Menorah and Christmas tree lighting on White Plains Road between Pelham Parkway South and Pelham Parkway North at the end of the month, we will give more information on our Facebook page as soon as we have. The American ideal of participatory democracy, in which citizens and their elected representatives work together in public to decide which laws to enact, is rapidly fading into obsolescence due to the growing power of unelected and unaccountable federal agencies.

Americans are concerned not only with the increased cost and number of new regulations, but the manner in which they are imposed. As noted by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, new rules "are imposed through a system

that operates without effective checks or balances, or accountability. Currently, nearly all major regulations go into effect without our elected representatives in Congress ever voting on

The problem is accelerating, notes Chamber president Thomas Donohue. The Obamacare legislation, 2,400 pages long, created 159 new panels, commissions, regulatory bodies and agencies. It follows on the heels of the 2,319 page Dodd-Frank Act, which calls for 400 new rules throughout 20 agencies.

Community Action

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The Economist examined the impact of regulations on commonplace activities. Its report provided salient examples, including:

"Every hour spent treating a patient in America creates at least 30 minute of paperwork, and often a whole hour. Next year, the number of federally mandated catego-

ries of illness and injury for which hospitals may claim reimbursement will rise from 18,000 to 140,000. There are nine codes relating to injuries caused by parrots, and three relating to burns from flaming water skis."

The \$70 billion in increased regulatory burdens over the past four and onehalf years, the result of 131 major new regulations, is a central reason why America continues to lag behind those other free markets. This includes a \$23.5 billion increase in 2012 alone. (Adam White, writing in the Weekly Standard, also stressed that these costs do not include "lost opportunity" expenses for blocked activity such as the Keystone XL pipeline.)

Overbearing regulations affect small businesses particularly hard. According to Donohue:

· The average regulatory cost for each employee of a small business exceeds \$10,000 per

· Businesses with fewer than 20 employees incur regulatory costs 42% higher than larger business of up to 500 employees

He notes that "Small

businesses pay disproportionately to comply with federal regulations...[The] average cost borne by small businesses is \$10,585 per employee - 36 percent more than the compliance cost for larger firms. It shows environmental regulations are especially burdensome on small firms, costing a whopping 364 percent more for small firms than large ones.

Speak with your doctor and discuss whether you would benefit from the various nicotine replacement systems that are available, such as the patch, nasal mists, etc. Make a list of reasons to guit and put it up where you will see it. Consider that cigarette/cigar smoke and smokeless tobacco have carcinogens that affect you literally from head to toe. Think of your kids, your looks, anything that motivates you and write it down. Tape motivational slogans around the house. Think about joining a support group, whether on-line, on the telephone, or in person. Many hospitals have Smoking Cessation clinics where vou can get additional sup-

Understand that there will be withdrawal symptoms and think of how to handle them.

Avoid smoke-filled places and people who smoke. Avoid "triggers" if you can, like alcohol. Talk on the phone standing up. Take a walk after dinner instead of a smoke. Take up knitting, jigsaw puzzles, and other new hobbies to fill your time and keep your hands busy. Play with clay or worry beads. Chew sugarless gum. Sip water. Keep repeating in your head, "I am a nonsmoker."

Perhaps one of the most important things to do is to be honest with vourself and never fool yourself into thinking you can have just one puff, just this one time and then never again. This inevitably leads you right back into smoking. If you could smoke just one cigarette every now and then, you probably would not be in this situation to begin with. Keep a journal where you can challenge your excuses and write down the truth-if cigarette smoking was so wonderful, you would not have tried to quit several times already.

Finally, don't forget to reward yourself for your successes. Sanitation Department begins winter night plow schedule

Sanitation Commissioner John J. Doherty announced that the Department of Sanitation has begun its Annual Night Plow Operation that enables DSNY to respond promptly and effectively to snow and ice conditions

around the clock.

The seasonal change assures that DSNY will have a sufficient number of employees assigned to work the night and early morning shifts and to operate essential snow fighting equipment

in each of the city's 59 Sanitation Districts. These two shifts are 4:00 p.m. to Midnight, and Midnight to 8:00 a.m. The day shift starts at 6:00 a.m. DSNY's snow season runs from mid-November through mid-April.

DSNY has a frontline defense of 365 salt spreaders that are dispatched prior to the start of the impending snowfall to salt arterial highways and bus routes. DSNY has a storage capacity of about 235,500 tons of rock salt, and 295,000 gallons of calcium chloride deicing solution at facilities throughout the city. Once snow begins to accumulate on the City's streets and highways, DSNY will deploy up to 1,800 collec-

tion trucks equipped with plows to clear snow from the City's 6,300 curb miles of streets.

When not on snow and ice removal duty, the night shift will collect household refuse and recycling.

The source said that he had relatives in the neighborhood, but not close to the

His murder ended a long reign of terror by the two brothers.

Police believe his younger brother Joseph, 60, carried out dozens of contract murders for the gang, which was involved in the heroin trade in the Bronx and Harlem, as well as contract killings for the Bonanno, Lucchese and Genovese crime families.

"We heard of over 70 different homicides, from the Bronx to Harlem, all the way up and down the East Coast all the way to Florida," said retired Bronx Homicide Detective Kevin Tracy, who arrested Joseph Meldish for the 1999 mistaken identity murder of Joe Brown inside the now defunct Frenchie's Bar on Bruckner Blvd. at E.

Tremont Avenue.

Meldish had sent his crackhead girlfriend into the bar looking for Thomas Brown, who owed him drug money, but the girlfriend picked out his brother. Meldish, wearing a ski mask, walked up to a back table and blew Brown away. He was convicted and sentenced in 2007.

"One of the reasons we believe both brothers weren't killed a long time ago was that they're related to Angelo Prisco, a capo in the Genovese family," said Tracy. "A lot of people feared Michael and Joe. If you killed one, you'd have to contend with the other."

"The Purple Gang pretty much doesn't exist any more," said another police source. "They moved on to other 'careers' with the Lucchese and other mobs."

The mob rubout was the

talk along tight-knit Ellsworth Avenue, a suburban street lined with two-story homes decorated with Thanksgiving decorations and American flags.

"This is the safest neighborhood in the Bronx," said one neighbor who only went by Ralph, as he rushed out his Baislev Avenue home to run errands.

The way categories such as student progress, student performance, school environment, and closing the achievement gap are weighted into the final letter grade leave the impression that a particular school is performing better or worse than it really is, said several principals.

How the numbers are crunched really matters, they said.

This year, 60% of the overall letter grades came from the score on the student progress section - the amount of change, hopefully in a positive direction, schools made between this past year and previous years.

Throggs Neck's P.S. 304 principal Joe Nobile said he feels that the grading system - which in 2012-13 saw the high-performing 304 get an A in the student "performance" sub-section but a C in "progress" - is stacked against high-performing schools that have relatively few "high needs" students.

He said there is not much room for improvement or progress because

304 is ranked at or near the top in reading and math, he said, vet "performance" remains only 25% of the letter

"When you are at a highlevel like that, it is difficult to make progress because you're close to the ceiling," he said. "Schools that are at lower levels can make progress more easily."

The way schools are rated is more complicated because adjustments are also made for the numbers of special education children, students with learning disabilities, and children who face economic challenges, he said.

"I am grateful that I have always gotten As and Bs," he said, "but I don't think it is fair."

Lehman High School near Westchester Square improvements besaw tween 2011-12 and 2012-13 in performance, progress, and learning environment - which all rose from Fs to

But because the numerical scores used to determine the category letter grades changed, and the score-range used to create the overall grade did not change, the school's overall grade dropped from a D to an F, said its principal Rose LoBianco.

The bright parts of Lehman's latest progress report included an improved score on "Closing the Achievement Gap," and a Quality Review rating that improved from "Developing" to "Proficient," which is a step up. The Quality Review ranking measures if the instruction prepares students for colleges and careers, the school's organization and management, and the quality of the learning environment.

"The overall letter grade is down, but in terms of each of the categories, the grades have gone up," said LoBianco, adding that "We are seeing upward trends."

Another bright spot in Lehman's progress report was receiving a B in College and Career Readiness, as it had in the 2011-12 report card.

"It's not who we are," Masiello said. "We are not an outscore you team. We are a defense and rebounding team and we didn't get it done."



Maria Backman left her skateboard at the door when she walked into Cardinal Spellman girl's basketball tryouts as a freshman. She was looking for an opportunity to pick up a new sport and she ended up getting that and much more by earning a Division-I scholarship.

The eventual four-year varsity player, who grew up practicing tricks on her skateboard, had only played a few pickup games before joining the Pilots. Backman joked that during her first scrimmage the referee had to tell her to stop standing in the paint when lining up for a free throw.

She's come a long way since then.


