The naysayers are beginning to come out in the debate over Bronx's proposed new soccer stadium.

South Bronx's stakeholders are organizing in anticipation of a deal that would bring a Major League Soccer arena to a 10-acre site between E. 152nd Street and the Major Deegan Expressway.

Mayor Bloomberg's administration is buttoning up the final details with the New York City Football Club — a new MLS franchise mostly owned by an Abu Dhabi Sheik and part-owned by the New York Yankees — to build the 28,000-seat stadium one block south of Heritage Field, Yankee Stadium's former home.

If the city and its partners close the deal, it will then travel the rungs of public review. Bronx's borough president and the nearby community board are weighing whether to throw their support behind the project.

But some embittered locals are skeptical their concerns will be drowned out.

Community Access

If locals do decide to support the arena, they'll want to be able to use it.

Key to the discussions going forward will be the extent that the surrounding community — one of, if not, the poorest in the nation — can access the space.

Demand for soccer in the Bronx does exist.

Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. painted the borough as crazy for the sport in a letter he sent this summer encouraging the MLS and the New York City Football Club to bring the franchise to the

Shotgun bandit hits Ampere Ave. pizzeria

Cops hunting for a shotguntoting bandit who held up an east Bronx pizzeria wish it wasn't so merry a Christmas.

They had hoped to catch the bandit - and maybe a waiting accomplice in a getaway car on a security camera on a store across the street.

Only problem was, the otherwise perfect view was blocked by holiday decorations.

Police said the bandit walked into the Country Bay Pizza shop in quiet, residential Spencer Estate about 7:20 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 12.

Waving the shotgun at the three workers in the shop at the time, he ordered them to "Open the register!" then herded them into a walk-in freezer before scooping up about \$1,000 and running out the shop, at 3233 Ampere Ave. between Stadium and Research avenues.

A police source said investigators believe the bandit may have possibly had an accomplice waiting outside in a getaway car.

"It's possible there was a getaway car waiting, since it was a really cold night and the shop workers said he didn't look freezing cold like he had walked in off the street."

Detectives had hoped to find some security cameras along the block, lined with small shops, that might have caught the bandit – and possibly any waiting getaway car - on tape.

But the only camera with a potentially line of sight on the pizzeria, formerly known as Casablanca Pizza, had its view blocked by the Christmas decorations.

It's still possible the victims may gotten a good enough look at the bandit's face to work up a police artist's sketch, police said, since the bandit was not wearing a ski mask or scarf to conceal his face.

He was described as a male white or Hispanic, about 5-feet-11, weighing 180 to 200 pounds, and wearing jeans and a black jacket.

Anyone with possible information the robbery is being asked to call Detective Rogers at the 45th Precinct Detective Unit at 718-822-5414.

Spencer Estate is one of the quietest neighborhoods in the local 45th Precinct for crime.

Wedged in between the Bruckner Expressway to the west and Eastchester Bay, it sits just below Pelham Bay Park and north of Country Club.

Crimes in the neighborhood so far this year amount to about a dozen so grand larcencies, with no violence.

The 45th Precinct, covering a major swath of the east Bronx, has had a 13% drop in robberies, with 150 through Dec. 8 this year, compared to 173 for the same period last year, according to the nypd.org website.

Diaz knocks Paris pols knocking boro

Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. is once again seeing red over his borough taking a bad rap.

Most recently it was English artist Banksie painting his valuable grafitti on local walls.

A few years ago, it was Bronx-bred songstress Jennifer Lopez staying silent as a judge on "American Idol" while the show served up a gritty portrayal of the borough as a litter-strewn urban badland.

This time it's over French politicians in the upcoming Paris mayoral race comparing the rising crime and decay in the City of Lights to the Boogie Down borough.

The original Englishlanguage article with the pols knocking the borough appeared in the Englishlanguage Quartz Daily, titled "Surreal: French politicians are debating whether Paris now resembles the Bronx."

"Paris resembles the Bronx," said former National Police chief Frederic Pechenard.

"Paris is not the Bronx," proclaimed Socialist Party candidate Anne Hidalgo, backed by outgoing mayor Bertrand Delanoe, who also said his city "is not the Bronx."

"The Bronx is lawless," Rachida Dati, a mayoral candidate from the fashionable 7th arrondissement, declared on television. "Paris is not the Bronx."

To which Diaz definitely responded with more than a Gallic shoulder shrug.

"The tired, ancient stereotypes about the Bronx continue to unfairly cloud the minds of people as far

away as Paris, France. We in the Bronx have had enough," he declared, citing the steady drop in crime in the borough, with the borough showing the lowest rate of crime last year than it has seen since the early Sixties. This year, he said, the borough "is on pace to be even safer."

"And we're not just lead-

ing the way in crime reduction," he added. "Tens of thousands of new housing units have been constructed here, new businesses are coming to our borough and the existing businesses are growing. We are leading the way in 'green' construction, with projects like Via Verde. We have major new projects such as the PGA caliber golf course at Ferry Point Park and the Kingsbridge National Ice Center, which will add to the list of reasons, like the new Yankee Stadium, and the New York Botanical Garden, as to why the Bronx remains an international destination."

But he grumbled that "Yet here we are, once again, forced to defend our hometown from the slanders and libels of politicians thousands of miles away, in Paris no less, who are using the Bronx to score cheap political points. Enough already. While we may not be home to the Eiffel Tower, we are the home to 1.4 million hardworking people who are proud of their hometown and how far the Bronx has come."

He warned that "The elected officials of Paris would do well to remember that and focus on the issues Paris faces today, rather than the issues the Bronx faced decades ago."

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Residents demand baby unit back

Officials hedging on NCBH return date

They want their babies back, stat!

North Bronx locals are demanding that the city provide a firm date for when labor and delivery at their nearby North Bronx Central Hospital will reopen.

The city's Health and Hospitals Corporation (HHC) shuttered NBCH's maternity wing in August, citing a dearth of senior physicians. Expectant mothers were rerouted to Jacobi Medical Center, which was overwhelmed with overcrowding and long wait lines, community members said.

In November, amid public outcry, North Bronx Central's Vice President William Walsh announced that the hospital's services would reopen sometime in the summer of 2014 —good news for the around 1,000 mothers who deliver there

every year. abies But a g

But a group of angry community members, labor unions, nurses and health advocates worry that the city's reopening will lag behind schedule and not be of the same quality. **Rattled locals**

"They haven't told us when, they haven't told us how, and they haven't committed to opening it with the midwives which made this place what it was," charged Eileen Markey, who delivered her son Hugh at the hospital four years ago and who has been active in the protest to bring back the maternity wing.

An angry group of north Bronx residents braved subfreezing temperatures Thursday Dec. 12 outside the Kossuth Avenue hospital to call for the city to get the maternity wing up and running as soon as possible.

"We know the hospital has been going through some economic problems... but we don't want the North Central Bronx to be the sacrificial lamb," said Fay Muir, who serves on the hospital's community advisory board.

Unclear timeframe North Bronx Central leadership committed at a public meeting later that day to bring the service back by April 30, said sources who attended the public hearing at Moshulu-Montefiore Community Center. But the HHC's official word at this point is that the city will "begin to plan" the reopening of North Bronx's labor and delivery in 2014. They've brought in a new Obstetrics and Gynecology Chair, Dr. Michael Zinaman, to oversee the transition.

The North Bronx Health Network, which includes North Central Bronx Hospital and Jacobi Medical Center, is being cautious at this point because it can only open with a safe level of staffing, said a hospital spokesperson.

Hospital brass agreed at Thursday night's hearing to meet with the community monthly to work together to address concerns about the process, Markey said.

"They need to have us involved every step of the way," she said. "We're ready to help in any way that we can."





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CB7 district manager resigns

Socrates Caba quits after only half year

It may have been over philosophical differences. Or maybe his enemies

slipped him a symbolic glass of hemlock. But either way, Socrates

Caba has resigned as district manager at Community Board 7 after less than six months on the job. In a resignation letter

to Board Chairperson Adaline Walker-Santiago, Caba cited "unsatisfactory" procedures from the board's executive committee as cause for his departure.

The Fordham resident's final day as district manager was Friday, Dec. 13.

Walker-Santiago said she was surprised to hear that Caba had decided to leave after only half a year at the helm.

The board had been very active in the last few months, including working on approval of the Kingsbridge Armory ice rink project, which netted the community a substantial benefits agreement.

"He called me out of the blue," said Walker-Santiago. "But I wish him all the best."

Caba's resignation letter is a bit cryptic over his reason for leaving.

It claims that "new procedures" adopted by the executive committee forced him "in good conscience" to resign from his post.

Board setback

Paul Foster, CB7's former chairman called the loss a "shame" for the board, which covers Bedford Park, Fordham, Kingsbridge Heights, Mosholu, Norwood and University Heights.

"You need a real people person, someone warm, and he fit that mold," said Foster, who served on the selection committee that recruited Caba. "I oppose whatever drove him to leave."

Foster said that Caba clashed with at least one member of the executive board on a personal level. But the outgoing district manager insisted in his goodbye letter that "I hold no personal animosity toward individual members of the board."

Caba's departure leaves CB7 without a district manager for the second time in two years.

In October 2012, former District Manager Fernando Tirado resigned from the post after battling with the board over a slew of issues for nearly a year.

The job was vacant until Caba was voted into the district manager role 13-3 in June. The former healthcare professional took over on July 1.

Got chops? Apply! Like each of the City's 59 community boards, CB7 is tasked with connecting city agencies with local voices. A community board's power is technically advisory, but boards can have major influence over land use and zoning issues.

Walker-Santiago said the board is now taking resumes for the open position, which it hopes to fill by April. Tom Lucania, who oversees local community boards for the borough president, will serve as an interim district manager until the position is filled.

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Klein pushes huge spending plan

Local senator's agenda to make NY affordable

An expansive public housing plan. Higher pay for families on six-week paternity and maternity leave. Millions of dollars in tax credits to alleviate toll and utility costs.

Senator Jeff Klein is swinging for the fences as he gears up for next year's state budget talks in Albany.

Klein, whose district includes parts of the Bronx and Westchester, is pushing a legislative agenda that calls for over \$1.5 billion spent toward policies he argues will make New York affordable for the middle class.

Bronx Affordability

Klein, who served in the northeast Bronx for ten years as an assemblyman, now serves as co-leader with Senate Republicans through his Independent Democratic Conference, with early indications that GOP co-leader Dean Skelos is supportive of his proposals.

Klein said he crafted his spending-filled plan with struggling Bronxites in mind.

"The Bronx is full of the middle class, the people who make our city run," he said as he unveiled his agenda in front of Bronx locals at Mercy College Friday, Dec. 13.

"The less we can make New York affordable for them, the more they'll disappear. "

Klein's plan calls for New York to join New Jersey and California by offering six weeks of paid leave for working mothers and fathers, as well as investing \$750 million over five years in a subsidized public housing program he's calling "Mitchell Lama 2020."

Creating home owners

The plan also would provide college graduates who qualify a \$5,000 a year tax credit for 10 years to be used toward owning property, something that for most young Bronxites is a mere pipe dream, said Al Carena, president of the Spencer Estates Civic Association.

"We've created a situation where young people starting out are up against it," Carena said. "It's almost impossible to buy a house."

Klein's doozy of a legislative agenda also includes one-time \$300 "relief checks" that senior citizens can use to help pay for utilities.

"Utilities are definitely a factor, especially now with the winter coming on," Carena said. "Those rates can take a pretty good sized bite out of a senior's budget."

Rounding out Klein's plan:

•Requiring daycare centers to post their latest inspection reports in their windows.

•Creating a yearly tax credit of up to \$250 out of a New York transportation toll cost.

•Making donations to public and private schools tax deductible.

•Postponing mortgage payments for one year after a damaging storm or flood.

Klein will head up to Albany in January, where he could likely clash with Gov. Guomo. Klein's plan calls for no tax cuts, while the governor recently appointed a tax commission that suggested \$2 million in tax cuts for property and business owners.

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New light shed on Mosholu doughboys

cials have put a new light on Mosholu Parkway's doughboy statue.

Thanks to a \$100,000 grant from City Councilman G. Oliver Koppell, they cut the ribbon on a new lighting system for the WWI Monument, which honors the heroism of WWI servicemen.

"For nearly 90 years, this monument on the historic Mosholu Parkway has stood as a testament to the courage of Bronx servicemen in the War to End All Wars. But without lighting, it was only visible in the daytime," said Bronx Parks Commissioner Hector Aponte, who was also joined by Community Board 7 Chairwoman Adaline Walker-Santiago at the ribbon cutter Monday, Dec. 16.

"Now, thanks to funding allocated by Koppell for a new lighting system, the monument will 'shine a light' on this pivotal era in American history at all hours of the day," he continued.

The bronze monument honors local servicemen who paid the supreme sacrifice during World War I.

Designed by artist Jerome Connor (1875-1943), the monument depicts a fallen soldier, protected by a comrade who stands vigilant with bayonet in hand. At his feet, an eagle with wings spread symbolizes the victorious call to arms.

The sculpture is set upon a circular pedestal of Rockport and Deer Isle pink granite designed by architect Arthur George Waldreaon and is framed by a bed of trees and floral beds.

Seven years after the Armistice was signed, the sculpture was unveiled before thousands of specta-

tors on November 11, 1925. In 1989 it was conserved through the Municipal Art Society's Adopt-A-Monument Program.

The landscaped Mosholu Parkway, connecting Bronx Park to Van Cortlandt Park, stretches from Allerton Avenue to Gun Hill Road, with an extension north through Van Cortlandt Park.

The parkway was designed in the 1860s by distinguished landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted, who designed a number of historic parks in New York City, including Central Park, Prospect Park, and Morningside Park.

Call it River(a) Avenue

Council names street after Yankee legend

He may be immortal in the Yankee record books, yet he's very much alive.

But the City Council decided to make an exception to its normal street renaming rules for retired New York pitcher Mariano Rivera on Dec. 10, when the body voted 47-0, with two abstentions, to co-name River Avenue between E. 161th and E. 162nd Streets "Rivera Avenue" after the legendary closer.

Rare rule change

The Council voted in 56 renamings in total at the Dec. 10 meeting. But all the others had at least one thing in common: the honoree was deceased.

In the Bronx, Thwaites Place and Barker Avenue will be co-named "Elias Karmon Way" after a longtime passionate Pelham Parkway local. The borough will also soon play host to a Mike Amadeo Way —Amadeo was a beloved Latin composer and a Private First Class Carlos James Lozada Place in honor of a 21-year-old Bronxite who died in Vietnam.

On an afternoon when the Council reserved most of its drama for the landslide 'yes' vote on the Kingsbridge National Ice Center, "Rivera Avenue" got little fanfare.

No Councilperson voted against the Yankee great —who won five World Series title in pinstripes — netting

his own street. Councilman Joel Rivera joked that he could never vote against a sign bearing his own name. "Even a die-hard Met fan

can recognize a classy job well done," said Brooklyn Councilman Lew Fidler.

A loud abstention

Queens Councilman Peter Vallone, who joined Manhattan Councilwoman Jessica Lappin in abstaining, warned that the Council should never make exceptions to its street renaming rules.

"I'm going to have to rain on this parade," Vallone said. "We should never name anything after a living person."

Vallone has also been crusading against the renaming of the Queensborough Bridge after former Mayor Ed Koch.

Yet the new Rivera Avenue marks the second time



"If anyone deserves it, it's him, but we're setting a dangerous precedent here," said Vallone at the meeting.

Local petition push

The pitch for Rivera Avenue came in September after a local Yankee fan etched a makeshift "A" onto the River Avenue sign one block away from the new Yankee Stadium. After the issue made headlines and local community groups organized petitions and rallies, Councilperson Maria Carmen Del Arroyo added Rivera Avenue to the list of street conamings up for councilwide vote in December.

Now the street will live on for the rest of the retired Yank's life, and beyond. Local businesses, many of which sell merchandise with Rivera's name etched on the back, hope that the new Rivera Avenue will draw more customers.

"We've fought for a long time to redirect peoples thinking about this borough," said Cary Goodman , executive director of the E. 161th Street Business Improvement District. "This will be a great boost to the area."

Consider it a case closed.

est Generation" who sought to preserve the history of World War II has passed away.

Salvatore Jerome Spadafora, 92, of Morris Park, passed away peacefully on Thursday, Dec. 12, surrounded by his family.

Sal was one of the people who helped fellow Morris Park World War II veteran Joe Garafolo coordinate the Bronx Veterans Museum, which collects military memorabilia in the lobby of John Dormi & Sons Funeral Home at 1211 Morris Park Ave.

"He used to come in here every day in the funeral home and he would help take care of the memorial," said Dormi & Sons funeral director and manager Chris DiCostanzo.

Spadafora served in the U.S. Coast Guard during

World War II, and his time in the service saw his marriage to his wife and the love of his life, Fannie in 1944, said his daughter Teresa Alifante. Fannie ran a popular cosmetics store until her passing in 1981, she said.

Spadafora grew up in Belmont, and went to Roosevelt High School. Both his wife and he lived on Cambreleng Avenue and later, after they were married, they moved to Morris Park, and raised a family, his daughter said.

He felt strongly about creating and contributing to the Bronx Veterans Museum with its founder, Garafolo, because he was concerned that people would forget about the sacrifices made by his generation, Teresa said.

"His uniform is there, his hat is there, as well as his father's picture from World War I," she said. "I

think he felt that not many young people knew about World War II, and was concerned people were going to forget. It was such a great cause, and it was special to

him because it was a time when people were defending their country and their liberty."

His meeting with Garafolo was something that greatly influenced him, she said.

"Joe was a big influence on him and they became very active with the veterans memorial at Dormi's," she said. "He was the one who started the album at the museum because he had such beautiful handwriting, and people would give him the photos of their platoon or troop, and he would inscribe all the names on that book."

She said her father also kept a journal of his experiences while in the service, where he recorded the names and hometowns of the military personnel he served with, as well as books he read and bands he saw. Later on, he kept a journal of his activities and the life he led after his wife's passing, said Alifante.

Spadafora was the devoted father of James and Teresa and their spouses, Linda and Augie. He was a generous and supportive grandfather to Nicole, Ann, Jessica and Jamie and the great grandfather or "Goo Goo", to Avery, Leo, Liam and James.

He loved time with his family, especially summer vacations at the beach, according to a bio. He documented his family's life in pictures that his family will cherish forever.

On Saturday, December 21 the family will be receiving visitors at Dormi's Funeral Home on Morris Park Ave. at 9 a.m. There will be a memorial service at St. Francis Xavier Church on Van Nest Ave. at 10 a.m.

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Monte's tips for stree-free holidays

Saying "no"

"It's simply not feasible to say yes to every request," said Rego. "You have to learn how to say – and mean – no. Don't let people take advantage of your generous nature, make a to-do list and stick to it. No extras." Eater's remorse

Calories still count during the holidays. To control the holiday consumption, he suggests drinking water or juice and eating a healthy snack before heading out the door, thinking twice about the food options, and using a smaller plate.

Real resolutions

The trick to keeping New Year's resolutions, he said, is to make them "simple, achievable and meaningful."

"If you make goals that are realistic and make you feel good about yourself, you're more likely to maintain them."

Here are a few examples of practical, feel-good resolutions:

•Try a new activity: Rather than committing to working out every day, try something a little less mundane that will get you moving. Take up a new sport, sign up for dance classes or go rock climbing. Exploring new activities can introduce you to something fun that will keep you physically fit and also be enjoyable.

•Take simple steps when it comes to your health: Instead of "committing" to losing 20 pounds this year, take baby steps. The new year is a good time for an annual physical, taking "ownership" over your cholesterol levels, blood pressure and other key measures for optimum health.

Being more mindful of what you're eating and the role your emotions and environment play in food choices can make a big difference. Astor Traffic Light

intersections on Boston Road.

The first intersection, as explained by Gary, is the corner of Boston Road and Astor Avenue. Sometimes one needs to experience an intersection from the driver's point of view, as well as the pedestrians.

So, while in the passenger seat the other day, I was going north on Boston Road, getting ready to turn on to Astor. And it occurred to me that the speed which my car was going while making the turn onto Astor was indicative of the fears that Gary explained.

When cars make that turn, they don't always speed out of reckless abandon, they do it because Boston Road is treated like a highway, and cars which ride on Boston Road with a legitimate "freeway" mentality, make that turn in the same mindset; over 30 miles per hour. Thus, the reason for so many accidents and near-accidents taking place at this corner.

The second intersection where a traffic light will be requested is Boston Road at Cruger Avenue, which is between Waring and Mace Avenues.

One way to chip away

at the "freeway" mentality of motorists on Boston Road, is to allow more areas for pedestrians to cross, which will take away the long stretches of roadway that lead drivers to push the pedal to the ground. And this particular spot is right near the 2440 Boston Road NYCHA Senior Citizen facility, where many elderly choose to cross, due to the walking distance to the Waring and Mace traffic lights.

Putting a light here will deter seniors from crossing without the safety of a traffic light, as well as prevent cars from using the pedestrian ramps to enter the parking lot of Harbor Freight and Salvation Army.

As was witnessed by myself, B-PECA Vice-Chair Kenny Agosto, resident Charles Gorelick and Bronx DOT Commissioner Connie Moran, over 15 cars each HOUR use the space between the pedestrian ramps at the corner of Cruger and Boston Road to gain access to the parking lot of these two stores, putting children and adult passersby in danger of being hit.

The placement of a traffic light pole in between these two ramps will provide the dual benefit of accommodating pedestrians to cross Boston Road at an area where they frequently do so (albeit illegally) already, as well as placing a barrier (the metal traffic light pole) to prevent cars from making the illegal entrance into the parking lot. ω Ω

The news that the national unemployment level continues to be in the official 7% range. (The New York State rate is about 7.7%, and the Bronx rate is 12.2%, the highest in New York State and vastly worse than the next highest, Brooklyn, at 9.6%) highlights the dire outlook for the U.S. economy, especially since that figure doesn't count those that have simply given up looking, have managed to get on disability, or have replaced lost career-level positions with part time work at a small fraction of their former pay.

This is, according to all statistics, the worst jobs recovery period since the Truman Administration, marked by rising part-time employment over full time jobs, declining wages, and increased workforce dropouts.

A report by economist John Williams, who carefully examines government statistics in his "Shadow Government Statistics" publication, questions the official unemployment numbers. In an analysis performed on the July unemployment rate of 7.4% reported by the U.S. Department of Labor, he found that the actual rate was 23.3%.

What about the jobs that have been created?

According to the U.S. House of Representative's Ways & Means Committee, even many of those fortunate few who have found work and are counted as em-

ployed are actually working only part-time. Rep. David Camp, (R-MI) who has dug far deeper into U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics data than most, notes that Seven out of eight new employees under President Obama have been part-time employees."

Since January of 2009, when the current Administration took office, to July 2013, there has been a 7.14% increase in part time jobs, compared to an almost nonexistent 0.23% increase in full-time jobs, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The problem with parttime work isn't only reduced pay. These employees generally don't receive medical coverage, retirement benefits, and other perks vailable to their full-time counterparts.

By the President's own standards, this represents a failure of his economic plan. Mr. Obama stated that "A well designed recovery plan will not only create numerous jobs, but also many jobs paying good wages and providing full-time employment.""

The news gets worse.

A startling new study by the Mercatus Center revealed that during November, over 300,000 jobs, over 40% of all employment created, were in government. According to the Mercatus Center, which is a division of George Mason University, government employment made up more than 16% of the American labor market in 2012. That figure includes not just people actually working for the government, but also those positions financed by federal contract dollars.

The same study revealed some unpleasant facts about how badly the actual job market has been doing during the recent past, from 2007-2012. 41 states actually lost real private sector jobs, with the national average being a loss of 3%. Only North Dakota, with its vast natural resource boom, Alaska, and Texas made any substantial gains in private employment. South Dakota. New York, Louisiana, Vermont, and West Virginia had very slight gains.

As taxes continue at levels that discourage businesses from hiring and individuals from saving, more and more people are being hired by government, except in those areas that really count, such as defense. Incidentally, on defense, reports have been published that some service members are forced to rely on welfare to make ends meet.

The news on other economic fronts continues to be dismal, as well. According to the Federal Reserve's Household Debt and Credit Report, outstanding household debt increased \$127 billion from last quarter, the largest increase since 2008. Mortgages, student and auto loans, and credit card debt were the big culprits.

You have to wonder how long the American economy can continue to bleed this way.

Fteley is more widely remembered for his design of the Croton Dam in 1891. Construction began the following year with some of the skilled labor imported from southern Italy. The masonry dam is 297 feet high and goes down 130 feet below the river bed. When constructed it was the tallest in the world. The mashold up to nineteen billion gallons of water which seems like a lot but is only a small fraction of the water we use in the city.

Some readers may also recall that he was involved with the design of the Panama Canal which revolutionized travel from the east coast to the west coast and beyond. It cut the distance by more than fifty percent and avoided the necessity of traversing around Cape Horn or through the Strait of Magellan.

Alphonse Fteley passed away on Thursday, June 11, 1903 at the age of 66 in his Alta Avenue home in the Park Hill section of Yonkers. He was cremated and his remains were interred in the Locust Section of Woodlawn Cemetery. His headstone is of a natural granite design and can be viewed just off Prospect Avenue.

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Tattoos and Piercings

These days, it seems like almost everybody has a tattoo or piercing. In just a matter of hours, a part of your body can be transformed into a living work of art.

But did you know that it can also lead to a lifetime of health consequences?

According to Dr. Uri Belkind, Director of Adolescent Medicine at Union Community Health Center and St. Barnabas Hospital, common complications include: • Allergic reactions and infection; • Diseases like hepatitis, tetanus, HIV and mycobacteria, if the needle or equipment is contaminated; • Raised scars (keloids); • Area-specific complications, such as oral piercings which can cause broken teeth or

gum disease

"Although impossible to eliminate all risk of complications, there are ways to lower them," said Dr. Belkind, who is fellowship-trained in adolescent medicine. "Body art procedures should always be performed by a trained tattoo artist or body piercer in a licensed studio that follows local or state health department regulations."

He further recommends that the body artist: • Washes his hands and uses clean gloves; • Cleans the skin to be tattooed or pierced; • Uses a single-use, disposable razor to shave the skin, when needed; • Uses single-use sterile needles and tubes, and single-use inks; • Covers the tattooed skin with a ban-

dage and provides aftercare instructions

Dr. Belkind also advises that in keeping the area clean: • You do not touch the area except for cleaning; • Wash your hands with soap; • For piercings, clean the pierced area with antibacterial soap and rinse well. Salt water soaks are good to loosen up crusty formations; · For tattoos, remove the bandage after 24 hours and apply antibiotic ointment. Use plain soap and water to keep the skin clean. Use a moisturizer several times a day and avoid skin exposure.

"If you notice any complications or have questions, don't wait," he said. "Schedule an immediate appointment with your physician."

Bill de Blasio won the mayoralty largely on his promise to end the "Tale of Two Cities," something that has bedeviled New York and other major urban centers around the world going back to the time of Dickens. His new deputy mayor, Lillian Barrios-Paoli, pledged last week that one of her main goals was to make New York "one city" as she criticized the current policy on homelessness.

And there was a very eyeopening and heart-wrenching series of articles in The New York Times recently about Dasani, a young girl in Brooklyn who was living with her seven siblings and parents in a decrepit shelter. Can the new mayor and his administration help the growing number of Dasanis in this city?

We all should hope so. I am one who prays that de Blasio succeeds in giving hope and help to Dasani and her family. Isn't that what this holiday season is about, helping those less fortunate?

But how can a mayor accomplish this?

Well, it will take some short-term fixes and some long-term planning. As Confucius once said: "If you want to think of only one year, plant rice. If you want to think ahead for a decade, plant a tree. But if you want to plan for 100 years, educate a child."

Bill de Blasio must "plant rice" by speaking passionately about creating good jobs with good wages and encouraging the development of much more affordable housing. He must "plan for 100 years" by sticking to his guns on universal pre-K and improving public education.

The new mayor can help create good jobs by luring moreCornell-Technion-type college campuses to the five boroughs, by making New York a center for new industries such as biotechnology. and by helping incentivize the growing tech sector. He can even give tax credits to those who hire unemployed New Yorkers.

affordable Building housing will need to be championed by the mayor with the same zeal that Rudy Giuliani and Mike Bloomberg took to fighting crime. It will need publicprivate partnerships that attract capital to this vital sector.

And de Blasio will need to fix the New York City Housing Authority, so that its tenants won't have to wait months to have simple repairs made or heat and elevators fixed.

On education. de Blasio can't get sucked into the charter vs. public school debate and polarization. His focus needs to be on empowering the new chancellor to insist that new teachers have two to three vears of rigorous classroom training and that current teachers are relentlessly retrained so that they can succeed. All the evaluations in the world cannot make up for improper training or the lack of teacher mentoring.

In fact, the mayor and new chancellor would be wise to study those charter networks that are succeeding, because what they all have in common is rigorous teacher training. All year round.

Universal pre-K is a wise, 100-year move, that won't immediately bear fruit. I suspect Gov. Cuomo will find \$500 million somewhere in the 2014 budget to allow de Blasio to achieve his signature education program.

And maybe in 2015, when the governor and the

International friendlies hosted at Yankee Stadium so far have drawn massive crowds.

"The games already held here have had very high community interest," said Cary Goodman, executive director of the 161th Street Business Improvement District. "Soccer is enormously popular here."

But locals plan to push for more than mere tickets to games. Many remain bitter about the construction of the new Yankee Stadium, which opened in 2009.

"We tried to stand up for ourselves, but in the end we were steamrolled," said Killian Jordan, who actively protested that stadium

Jordan hopes for a better deal this time around, and is looking at the nearby Kingsbridge Armory deal for inspiration. In that deal, approved this month by the City Council, the developers of what will be the world's largest ice rink center agreed to a Community Benefits Agreement (CBA) in which they promised to hire locally, provide a 50,000-square-foot community space and fund local skating lessons.

Allowing locals inside the stadium on non-game days may prove crucial in winning community support. Goodman suggested an indoor fitness center as something locals could rally around.

"If they are going to build this stadium, they should let our kids in," Jordan said. "They need to open it up so the people here can set foot in it."

Parks fans bruised

An application for a new arena will also have to contend with park lovers still smarting from the 24 acres of parkland the city bulldozed in order to build the new Yankee Stadium, which opened in 2009.

Under the current proposal, the new soccer stadium would replace part of a debt-saddled garage the city built on parkland at E. 153rd Street and River Avenue.

Environmental activists remain sour that the land is not being used as a park.

"If parking isn't needed, then let the community have its park back," said Geoffrey Croft of NYC Park Advocates, a city park watchdog group.

De Blasio shutdown?

Even if stakeholders do strike a deal, construction won't start overnight.

The proposed soccer stadium would rely on numerous city land-use and zoning changes that require it to go through a Uniform Land Use Review Process, or ULURP.

It is unclear whether Mayor-elect Bill be Blasio would try to put the kibosh on the deal. De Blasio told the New York Times recently that he had "serious concerns" with the proposal, though he supported the Barclays Center basketball arena development project in Brooklyn.

Crowley's silent days and nights

Joe Crowley, (D-Bronx, Queens) commercial airlines must hush a fourth of their fleet to meet the Federal Aviation Administration's Stage 4 noise standards by 2015.

The FAA has required since 2006 that every new aircraft meet the quieter Stage 4 standards, but the sky remains crowded with older, noisier planes.

Crowley's legislation compels airlines to convert half of their fleet to Stage 4 standards by 2020. One hundred percent of every airline's planes must meet the lower standards by 2035. Airlines can either purchase new aircrafts or retrofit the older ones with quieter engines.

Maddening noise

Quieter aircrafts would help better the lives of east Bronx locals who have complained of loud lowflying planes for decades, said Ken Kearns, district manager at Community

Board 10.

"The planes are a noisy and unhealthy presence in our community," Kearns said. "On any given day, these planes pass within 300 feet of our local businesses. We have hope that this legislation will improve our quality of life."

Locals have long griped that planes landing at Queens' La Guardia Airport create disturbing high-pitched whines as they descend over Country Club and Throggs Neck.

Crowley and Councilman Jimmy Vacca hosted a airplane noise Town Hall Meeting packed with fed-up locals in Country Club last February.

Quiet compromise

CB10 pushed back then for the FAA to reroute some of the ten or so flights an hour that pass over the east Bronx en route to La Guardia. Around 185,000 flights flew over the two neighborhoods into the busy airport in 2012.

But FAA brass flew

back at Kearns, arguing that rerouting planes would cause chaos at surrounding airports.

Crowley believes that hushing the existing planes is a worthwhile compromise.

"While commercial aircraft can never be truly silent, we can make sure they are less disruptive to the families who live nearby and improve the quality of life in our communities," he said at a press conference on Dec. 6 at La Guardia.

Kearns says he's optimistic as well, but still holds out hope that New York City will someday form a group specifically tasked to deal with community concern about aviation.

Those concerns currently fall into the jurisdiction of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, an agency that Kearns said works hard but is overwhelmed.
