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Community remembers Thiebad

A Bronx business owner, entrepreneur and close community friend known primarily for his coconut-flavored ices passed away after a tragic accident, leaving friends and family members stunned and sorrow-filled.

Alfredo Thiebaud, founder and president of Delicioso Coco Helado, died on Friday, September 19 at the age of 74 after being crushed by an electric overhead security gate.

Friday was just another workday for Thiebaud, who had just finished sweeping outside his factory at 849 St. Anns Avenue and activated an electric overhead gate to close.

After activating the gate, Alfredo somehow ended up on the ground while the gate continued to descend, crushing his chest and neck. He was pronounced dead at the scene when police found his

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PROTEST AGAINST FACILITY

Van Nest rejects transitional housing plan

A company that provides transitional housing for the homeless has introduced a proposal for a facility in Van Nest, and residents are pushing back.

Metro Safe Housing, a for-profit company that was formed in early 2014, recently presented plans to turn a four-family house on Taylor Avenue into an Emergency Placement Unit for individuals referred by NYC Human Resources Administration.

After the plans were brought by Metro Safe Housing to members of Community Board 11, the Van Nest Neighborhood Alliance organized a protest, imploring that the neighborhood "Invest in families, not facilities."

The goal of the protest was to raise awareness in the neighborhood about the plans for the facility, said VNNA vice president Bernadette Ferrara, and the group collected more than 175 signatures in protest and sent the petition to the community board and local elected officials.

Fred Aldehari, CEO of Metro Safe Housing, said he felt disrespected by the protest, which he said left fliers all over the property in question. His company, which currently has four other facilities in the Bronx, is trying to provide a good service, he said.

"Our mission is to provide quality, safe housing for those in need," said Aldehari.

Metro Safe Housing screens the individuals who are referred by HRA, said Aldehari, and they choose only people who would be a good fit for their home.

Beyond that, he said residents agree to a strict code-of-conduct, which includes curfews, and the

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Sopranos actor heads Columbus Day Parade

The grand marshal of the 2014 Bronx Columbus Day Parade is Vincent Pastore, the actor best known for his role on The Sopranos.

Pastore, a 3rd generation Italian-American, said he's proud to represent Italian culture and history at this year's Columbus Day Parade. He described the Italian values as food, family and friendship, pointing to a culture that comes from the roots of civilizations, the Roman Empire.

"We have such a great heritage," said Pastore, "It's an honor to be able to celebrate all that."

Pastore was born in Port Chester, and was raised in New Rochelle, he said, in an Italian-American neighborhood. He has childhood memories of visiting his grandmother on Arthur Avenue, along with the Bronx Zoo and the New York Botanical Garden.

He moved to Pelham Bay in the late 80s when he started pursuing acting, he said, after running night clubs in New Rochelle for about 25 years.

"It was hard, I was 42 when I broke into the business," said Pastore.

The first film he worked on, "True Love," was filmed in Morris Park. After the success of The Sopranos, he bought a house on City Island, where he said he had been visiting since the 60s.


Abortion hurts all concerned; the child that is lost, the mother who grieves, and other family members."

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CB 10 votes "No" on Ferry Point shelter

After a meeting with city homeless officials and a service provider, that was at times contentious and constructive, a Community Board 10 committee voted to oppose the Capri Whitestone Motel homeless shelter.

The motel, located on the Hutchinson River Parkway service road in Ferry Point, was leased to service provider Acacia after the Department of Homeless Services determined nee.

Up to 95 families will be housed at that location, according to DHS officials and Acacia representatives at a Monday, September 22 meeting.

After about two hours of discussion with DHS and Acacia, Community Board 10's Municipal Service Committee voted unanimously to oppose the siting of a shelter in the Ferry Point community for a variety of reasons.

"Community Board 10 is opposed to the installation of a homeless shelter at the location of the Capri Whitestone Motel, due to a lack of nearby services for the proposed tenants, the failure of the Department of Homeless Services (DHS) to follow due process and perform due diligence, and the adverse impact that it will have on the socio-economic well-being of the Ferry Point community," stated the resolution that was approved. "The committee further opposes this siting, because it will have a decided negative affect upon an area slated for future development, depriving the board's service area of the benefits associated with its promised economic rejuvenation of the surrounding community..."

The resolution will be voted on by the full board at its next general meeting, scheduled for Thursday, October 16 at 7:30 p.m. at Riverbay Corporation, 177 Dreiser Loop, Auditorium A in Co-op City.

According to DHS representatives at the meeting, 54 families were housed at the shuttered motel as of September 22. DHS committed to establishing a Community Advisory Board for the shelter, which opened last week in the midst of what the agency termed an "homelessness emergency."

CB 10 board member Robert Bieder said that although the Bronx is just one of five boroughs, it has about 35% of the city's homeless population. He was cheered by many in the room when this point was made. He said that the entire city has a legal and moral obligation to house the homeless, but the borough has more than its fair share of shelters, which should only be 20 percent. "We are not getting our fair share; we are getting abused," said Bieder about shelter sitings in the Bronx. "It has gotten to the point where you say, 'you know what, we can get away with it, let's put it in the Bronx."

Representatives of the Trump Organization were also present at the meeting. Donald Trump's real estate firm is completing work on a new golf course close to the Capri Whitestone in Ferry Point Park. That golf course was paid for by taxpayer funds.

CB 10 chairman Martin Prince said, among other comments presented during the meeting during a robust Q&A period, that the eventual number of DHS' homeless families slated for this facility will outnumber the current residential population of the Ferry Point community.

JoAnne Somers, president of the Ferry Point Civic Association, Inc, stated at the meeting that the area was going to be inundated with traffic because of school buses and a shuttle service going and coming from the motel.

Dotti Poggi, leader of the Ferry Point Community Advocates, said that the DHS' bullied her community into accepting it, and expressed concern about the "image" of the area.



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St. Ray's bids farewell to longtime athletic director

Ronald Patnosh, former athletic director and founder of St. Raymond High School For Boys baseball program, died Friday, September 19. He was 76.

Patnosh.aQueensnative. started his St. Raymond's career in 1962, two years after the school first opened its doors. For 45 years, he coached both the JV baseball and varsity baseball teams and lead them to win 1,080 games during his legendary career. Patnosh was instrumental in the Ravens achieving two city championship victories in 1980 and 1989. According to Frank Eisele, president of the Throgs Neck Little League board of directors. Patnosh frequently recruited many of the league's members for his team and ultimately emerged victorious in their first city championship win. "He mentored a lot of kids," said Eisele. "Ron was respected by everyone."

He continued as head coach until retiring in

spring 2010 after his team won the city championship's semi finals. Patnosh was the proud recipient of the Sportsmanship Award by the Catholic High School Athletic Association and was inducted into the St. Raymond's Hall of Fame by principal, Brother Daniel Gardner and athletic director, Benjamin Aguirre in May.

Aguirre shared memories of the late Patnosh who he knew since he was 12. "He was part of its foundation," said Aguirre. "He was always enthusiastic about St. Raymond's, passionate about the boys, and feisty. He was always real with you and never minced words."

In addition to athletics, Patnosh's credentials included serving as an assistant principal for 15 years, a teacher of Global History, the chairman of the History Department, and moderator of the History Club. "He dedicated his whole life to the boys here at St. Raymond's," said Aguirre.

St. Raymond's coach Marc DeLuca remembers his friend as being "a very prominent coach in the area" and well known for his competitiveness on game day.

"He would do anything for anyone especially for his players and his students. He was like a second dad to them," said DeLuca. "He was never married and didn't have a family of his own, but he had a St. Raymond's family."

After retirement, Patnosh continued supporting the school's student athletes and academic community. Even nearing his final days, he retained his charismatic personality. Despite health concerns, "he was in good spirits," recalled Aguirre who saw and spoke with his predecessor at last Friday's varsity game.

As he did in life, Patnosh's death has had a tremendous impact upon the entire St. Raymond's community. "He was our heart and soul," said Aguirre. "When they think about St. Raymond's, they think of Ron Patnosh."

One local St. Raymond's alum, Robert Gaspari, the owner of Loretta's Pizzeria was saddened by Patnosh's death. "He was a lot of help to the school and to the students," said Gaspari. "He was a great guy and served almost as a mentor to us. He was really someone you could look up to."

A Class of 1978 alum, Gaspari played for four years as the Raven's first baseman and pitcher during the Patnost era. "He knew everything about the game and he was one a really tough cookie," said Gaspari. "He really put his heart and soul into the game every time."

Patnost was survived by his sister, Mary Ellen Storniola and his nieces, Stephanie and Kim. In lieu of flowers, his family requested donations be made instead to the Ronald Patnosh Foundation, dedi-

cated to the care of St. Raymond's.

A memorial service was held in St. Raymond High School For Boys Gymnasium on Monday, September 22 and a funeral Mass was conducted the following morning. Over 1,000 people were in attendance to bid him a final farewell.

"He was the one who built everything and was responsible for the school's success," said DeLuca. "You know you're important when they move the venue from a church to a gym."

Mayor de Blasio and New York Police Department Commissioner William Bratton visited the 47th Precinct on Sunday. September 21, after an automobile accident, shortly around 5:08 a.m., took the life of police officer Michael Williams, 25, on the Bruckner Expressway. Eight other officers, also assigned to the precinct, sustained non-life threatening injuries.

The accident is currently under investigation by the NYPD Highway Unit's Collision Investigation Squad.

The group of nine officers were travelling in a police van heading to Manhattan to police a climatechange demonstration on Sunday and the start of a United Nations General Assembly when the vehicle struck a jersey barrier on

the expressway near Bryant Avenue.

Officer Williams was ejected from the vehicle through a right rear passenger seat window, and was pronounced dead at Lincoln Hospital. No other cars were involved.

De Blasio and Bratton took questions from the media outside the 47th Precinct after meeting with officers inside.

"Very early in this new day we lost one of our finest,

and we lost one of the newest members of our finest, and that hurts even more," said the mayor of the young officer. "Officer Williams's dream was to be an NYPD officer. He came from a police family. This is what he wanted to do with his life."

The mayor added, speaking of Williams' assignment to the four-seven, (a precinct which several months ago saw a spike in violence): "He was assigned here to a tough precinct where a lot of work

Mayor de Blasio also said that the men and women of the 47th Precinct "are hurting right now." The mayor and Bratton both said that they had spoken at Williams' NYPD graduation.



Vietnam veteran's charity helps Saigon's neediest kids

A Pelham Bay-born, Vietnam vet is celebrating the ten-year anniversary of his charity.

Burke House, a children's charity started by Vietnam veteran Tom Whelan that helps Saigon children, become more educated and financially supported, will host an anniversary fundraiser on Saturday, September 27.

Tom Whalen first thought of the idea for a charity when he took a three-day tour to Vietnam and other countries in Asia in 2002. He had planned to take a retirement-like trip and settle down after ending his previous job tenure working at a computer company.

After seeing the many poor street children of Saigon, Whelan decided to start a charity with the help of his one sister and four

brothers who also served in the US military in the 1960s.

In 2004, Tom Whelan created Burke House, in honor of his mother's maiden name – the goal being to educate and financially support the children from Saigon, also known as Ho Chi Minh City.

Whelan, who served in Vietnam from 1967 to 1968 including the Tet Offensive, said that his interactions with the 10-year old girl Nga greatly influenced his decision on starting this charity.

"When I first met Nga in 2002, she told me that she worked for her family by selling books to tourists," said Tom Whelan. "It made me so sad to see a girl working at such a young age while gaining no education whatsoever, so I had to sponsor and help her."

"There are many kids in Vietnam who don't receive the proper education that they should, along with kids who live in other countries that struggle with poverty. That's the reason Burke House was started – to lift the spirits of the poor street

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Pols push for gun offender database

City Hall lawmakers are pushing for a searchable online gun offender database registry, not too dis-similar in its concept from one already in place statewide for sex offenders.

A bill introduced before the City Council and gaining traction among Bronx elected officials including co-sponsor Councilman Ritchie Torres -- as well as Senator Jeff Klein, Borough President Ruben Diaz, Assemblyman Jeff Dinowitz and Councilman Andrew Cohen -- would create an online searchable registry of gun offenders.

This would easily allow the community to search an online database by their geographic area, to see if people who have committed crimes using guns live near them.

The database would identify gun offenders for four years, at which time, if there is no other crime related to guns, the offender will be removed from the list, said a spokesman for Torres. This provides an incentive for a gun offender to stay away from guns, the spokesman said.

"We must take every measure to stem the tide of gun violence in New York City," said Torres. "This bill will create a commonsense crime-fighting tool that provides both law-enforcement and community members with real-time information on violent gun-offenders in their neighborhoods."

The information in the database will be the offender's name, block on which they live, a physical description, the crime the offender was convicted of, and sentence imposed. It will be updated monthly.

Borough President Diaz first proposed such a database in his 2013 State of the Borough address, he said.

"A safer New York State, and a safer nation, demands that we shine a light on those individuals who would commit gun crimes in our neighborhoods," said Diaz. "An easily-accessible gun crime registry will serve as an excellent tool not only to keep neighborhoods informed about crime, but to serve as a deterrent from such acts."

Senator Klein added: "New York residents deserve access to any information that will help them lead safer lives and give them the tools to better protect their families. By allowing for community access and mandating community notification to the city's gun offender registry we will give our citizens the knowledge they need to make smart choices."

Sonia Medina, 55, an anti-gun community activist from Fordham who is familiar with the legislation, said she thought it would "empower communities."

"For me, it is a very good idea because it would be easy for people to check around their neighborhood

to see if there is someone nearby who caused violence because of guns," she said.

Indeed, violence touched Medina very recently. She said that gun violence is common in her Fordham neighborhood, and she received some shocking news in Decemeber 2013 shortly after attending an anti-violence rally. She received a phone call from her niece in Pennsylvania that a family member had been shot in the head. Gun violence is ubiquitous from other states to her Fordham community, where she says there has been an uptick recently.

"We have had quite a few deaths from gun violence in the past couple of months," she said. "It has gotten worse for sure."


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Street art group 'tags' the Bronx

TAG Public Arts Project, founded by local artist J. "SinXero" Beltran, brings artists together to treat the borough's buildings as their canvases as a way to affect change in neighborhoods.

"We encourage graffiti artists, street artists, and fine artists to work together, while enhancing the visual landscape of urban communities with art," said Beltran.

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Morris Park 'No Parking' signs cause safety issues

A pole supporting "No Parking/No Standing Anytime" signs has the residents of Morris Park and Pelham Parkway furious.

The signs, located on the Pelham Parkway South service road, between Williamsbridge Road and Yates Avenue, have created an annoyance and inconvenience amongst pedestrians and drivers that live and work in the area.

The "No Parking" sign pointing towards the beginning of the block states that it is against the law to park within its boundaries from 7 AM to 7 PM including Sundays. The "No Standing Anytime" sign pointing to the zone ahead of it states that it is against the law to park or stand in the zone at anytime. This creates a tremendous safety issue, due to the fact that the Pelham Parkway South service road's three eastbound lanes all have to merge into one lane.

Drivers are informed of the merge once they cross Williamsbridge Road and continue along the Pelham Parkway service road with a "Lanes Merging" warning sign posted, except the sign does not advise the driver how severe the merge is.

Reversing these signs would mean that no cars would be allowed to park at the beginning of the block, creating more space for cars to maneuver instead of encountering a race-like scenario where cars jockey for position to go first after the three lanes and one turn have merged.

Having the "No Standing

Anytime" sign pointed towards the beginning of the block, and the "No Parking" sign pointed to the zone just ahead of it, drivers would also be in a safer scenario to park their cars, instead of being forced to park with numerous vehicles from the four lanes behind it.

The placements of these signs don't make any sense," said Jeremy Warneke, district manager of Community Board 11. "I believe switching these signs around would solve this problem instantly and it would make this area a lot safer for drivers and pedestrians."

The signs, which were put up in January 2013 as part of a project to rehabilitate Pelham Parkway, detach one parking zone from the rest of the parking zones, and it's unclear as to why this particular parking zone is isolated and separated from the rest.

According to Warneke, the Department of Transportation informed Community Board 11 that they would switch the signs six months ago.

"This is just one of many problems that have been caused by the attempted revamping of Pelham Parkway," said Frank Vignali, who was born and raised in the neighborhood.

"This is a safety issue due to poor planning by the DOT as well as the city, and it needs to be fixed before someone gets hurt or killed. I demand that DOT Commissioner Polly Trottenberg agree to a walk through with Community Board 11 and/or the Morris Park Association to discuss and fix this problem."

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
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Parkway walkway paths deemed unsafe

An isolated walkway in Pelham Parkway has generated numerous complaints from residents and caused a major safety issue for pedestrians.

The dirt walkway, located in the park area between Pelham Parkway North and South, near Tenbroeck and Narragansett avenues, has been an ongoing problem for residents and employees who work in the area who need to cross from one side of the parkway to the other.

The problem is that the walkway doesn't lead anywhere - anywhere or safe, that is.

While walking from Pelham Parkway North side to South, a pedestrian has the option to walk on a dirt walkway.

More than likely, this person will continue walking on the path, believing that the walkway will lead them to the other side.

This walkway is deceiv-

ticipating locations only. Certain restrictions may apply. Call for detail

ing, however, leading pedestrians instead into a guard rail at the end of the park on the south side that separates the park from the parkway. To go further they must climb, hop, jump - or whatever – to get over the railing and onto the Pelham Parkway service road sidewalk safely.

Easier said then done, especially when a mother is pushing a stroller or when a handicapped person needs to get to the other side of the parkway and is incapable of doing so because there is no handicap ramp.

And nobody wants to make a five-block U-turn via wheelchair.

Walking from the south side to the north side of Pelham Parkway poses the same issue for those who need to get across quickly and safely. Doctors and nurses from Jacobi Medical Center and students from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, among others,

are forced to run across the parkway to give themselves enough time to successfully hop over the railing before a car hits them.

This is also a problem for Bx12 bus passengers that get off at the bus stops on Pelham Parkway and need to get to the other side, two of these stops being located right next to the walkway.

Their placement creates the illusion that the bus stop and walkway are connected to each other, until the guard rail suggests otherwise and generates confusion.

"I always see people attempt to cross the park, either from the service road or when they get off the bus." said Orthodontist David J. Stevens, who works at 1228 Pelham Parkway South, right near the dirt walkway.

"It's dangerous for pedestrians as well as for drivers, and every time I see people attempt to get across it looks like somebody's about to get killed."

To make matters worse, "No Pedestrian Crossа ing" sign right next to the bus stop faces north, making it completely invisible to the pedestrians that need to walk from the southern part of the parkway.

"I've seen parents carry baby strollers over the guard rail while watching the other children to make sure they don't get hit by traffic," said longtime Pelham Parkway resident Frank Vignali, who is outraged by this whole situation that he claims has been dragging on for over two years.

Frank Vignali also expressed the frustration the winter months create.

"When it snowed last winter, the dirt walkway was shoveled and the sidewalks on the service road weren't," said Vignali. "When the dirt walkway is shoveled, or any walkway for that matter, it's ensuring people that they are eligible to walk there."

"Somebody is going to get

hurt because the city chose not to listen to the people in our neighborhood that have problems crossing the parkway on a daily basis," said Vignali.

"I don't care how many or how few people cross Pelham Parkway. In this situation, two people crossing is too many people crossing."

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CB 10 makes Fiscal Year 2015 budget requests

submitted its wish list for the upcoming city budget, which will be finalized in June.

The process, which includes a number of written recommendations and public hearings with board members and the community, is already underway with four major Fiscal Year 2015 recommendations made so far from CB 10, said district manager Kenneth Kearns.

According to Kearns, the four key requests, in no particular order, are: the dredging of Hammond Cove in Throggs Neck; acknowledgement that the elliptical buildings, the "pavilion" at Orchard Beach, could be turned into a year-round performing arts center; expediting of the Country Club/Waterbury Avenue sewer reconstruction project; and getting more police and law-enforcement vehicles for the 45th Precinct.

"We did not do very well last year, no board did," said Kearns of CB 10 capital and expense budget requests for Fiscal Year 2014. But he held out hope that community boards might do better this year with the de Blasio administration in place.

"All the indications are the current administration is going to try to do things a little differently than they were done in the past," he said. "It was elected with a different mandate, so we will see what they can do."

Hammond Cove, near Locust Point, is not living up to its potential because it is silted up and needs to be dredged, said the district manager. It is the site of a city-owned marina, as well as a private one that serves as a rescue site for the FDNY boats, according to sources.

"There is a big boatowning public in Community Board 10, and on top of that there are other waterborne sports that could be launched from that site, like kayaking or jet-skiing or canoeing," said Kearns.

The district manager believes that the state Department of Environmental Conservation could also be helpful in moving the dredging projects.

Locust Point Yacht Club member Pat Devine concurred that DEC might be of help. He said that at low tide, many larger boats cannot get in or out of the channel, and this would include FDNY that sometimes dock at LPYC.

Orchard Beach, built by 20th Century public works honcho Robert Moses, said Kearns, also has more potential.

"We think that it can be winterized," he said, adding "we think that they should work on that and make it a year-round event space."

Sewer Project Change Order

A sewer replacement project in Country Club

around Waterbury Avenue hit a snag when the contractor discovered a large boulder which changed the scope of the work, according to several sources.

The board is advocating for an expedited 'changeorder', if possible. The process usually takes several months, said Kearns.

More Police at 45th Precinct

The board service area

needs more police for a variety of reasons, including the newly opened malls, an increased population, and a drug-trade that is different than all other Bronx precincts, said Kearns.


Pastor Jay Gooding Sr. is on a mission to stop gun violence, and to spread the "good news" of the gospel.

While leading and providing spiritual sustenance as pastor of two churches - Fellowship Tabernacle in Williasmbrdge, which he founded 17 years ago, and Miracle Revival Temple near the Grand Concourse - he is also one of the leading lights in an anti-violence program based out of Jacobi Medical Center called Stand Up to Violence.

The anti-violence initiative employs people to try to prevent retaliation when shootings happen in communities and Gooding, 52, leads rallies within 72-hours of gun violence to urge a stop to bloodshed. The program, also referred to as SNUG ('guns' spelled backwards), was founded earlier this year by Senator Jeff Klein with other elected officals and medical, religious and community leaders.

"I have been called on through pastoring to help families who have lost loved ones tragically," said Gooding, adding that he was asked by Senator Klein to be a part of the program.

"I believe in ministry, and I look at ministry as being able to serve," he said of his work. "The reward that I get is being able to serve and maybe save a life. I do about 200 funerals a year and I

am tired of burying our young people. But if we can bring 'life' to them, and save a life, that is the greatest thing we can ever do."

Gooding came from a church family. He is the son of the late Bishop Ceacer Gooding of Miracle Revival Temple. His father was pastor of the temple until 2009, when Gooding became co-pastor there with his mother Josephine Gooding. Both houses of worship are now referred to as "one church in two locations."

His entry into ministry was partially through gospel music, he said. He began playing the organ at age of five, and became the organist at his father's church when he was 11. While in his teens, he played football for DeWitt Clinton High School.

From 1984 through 1987 he was a member of the award-winning gospel music group "The Ecstatistics." His music ministry led him to establishing a community choir: "Jay Gooding and the Fellowship" in 1991. The choir has recorded five albums, including a track called "No Stopping Us Now - The Remix Project," which was a number one single on a countdown of WTHE, a gospel music radio station.

While at times he never thought he would become a pastor, music helped lead Gooding back to God, he said. He preached his first sermon in 1993. Today, he is a Bronx superintendent for the Church of God in Christ.

His community service is extensive, including: president of the 49th Precinct Clergy Council, the executive board of the 44th Precinct Clergy Coalition from 2002 to 2008, executive of Chaplains Helping in Police Situations (C.H.I.P.S.), and now director of community outreach for SUTV. He is the recipient of the 49th Precinct Community Council's Tom Twyman Citizen of the Year Award for 2009. and NYPD 2013 Partnership in the Community Award.

He is married to Nicole Stacey Ann Gooding, and has four children and five grandchildren. Gooding said that his motto is "life is a gift from God; what we do with that life is a gift to God."

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





Minutes in Letter form of 201 our meeting April 15, 2014 I regards to the Capri/ ດ໌ Whitestone Motel becoming 26-OCT. a Homeless Shelter: With the many detrimental and dangerous burdens that this location places on the homeless we hope that NYC finds SEPT. a better location for these families so they can grow and develop without spend-**BRONX TIMES REPORTER** ing half their day walking through our neighborhood and transferring around on buses to get to school and other appointments. any Half their allotted income to pay for cabs and the MTA fares that go over the transfers allowed for students. Then only to get home and breathe in fumes and hear the noise all night from the toll booths and Pepsi Trailers parked outside their windows. There is no playground for small children; there are no fences to stop access to swamps and a rocky deep fall area into Westchester Creek (within 1/2 block). This is a flood zone and the synthetic field at Ferry Point Park (across the street from the Motel) was approx. 3 feet deep in water during Sandy and evacuation during crisis is not in place. We also have heard that there are no kitchens supplied in their small rooms which is a law?.

If this is a shelter for Mothers with infants and or toddlers with daycare for the Moms to reach permanent housing it may work. If the children are active and need outdoor play areas it is dangerous. If they are teens they will be bored into mischief. If they are late teens there is nothing for them to do here. No community centers, library is 1 mile away.

Well we will do research and combine our efforts with those of our neighborhood businesses and Elected Officials and others to attempt to have the "Done Deal" shelter moved to a better location that will benefit the residents that NYC is trying to provide assistance to. This may end

up as a lawsuit that at least shows NYC that they should re think their present policy of just flopping families into inappropriate neighborhoods that do not fulfill the needs of these families to make a successful transition to permanent housing. While at the same time diminishing the economic engine that helps run the city by eliminating this viable location from the available space to create jobs and taxes.

A family with a car can get their kids up at 7am. A family without a car has to get them up around 5am and they are still late many times due to weather and traffic conditions. A family with washing machine/dryer in their home can do other chores while the machine is working. Families without this option have to use the bathtub or take a cab to carry laundry to E. Tremont to wash and a cab back.

Of course our neighborhood has sympathy for the homeless and wishes the best location for them. But we also know that ongoing forcing of homeless into neighborhoods with basically no amenities for them is not helping them but instead piling more burdens on their shoulders.

How can anyone say it is fair to take any empty building and move families in within a week without preparing the neighborhood for this? The City is creating a fear and shunning wall between the homeless and the neighbors who are already overwhelmed with daily fighting for traffic studies, street paving, double parking of huge buses for repair at HO Penn, noisy Pepsi Trucks doing their inventory in front of our homes, intermittent sidewalks. proper "no idling" and "5 ton limit"signage etc.

We know from experience that families without at least one car have a problem existing in this neighborhood due to limited public transportation service. The public schools are over a mile away and they are full to capacity. The buses available are ¹/₄ mile through dangerous streets with intermittent sidewalks, no speed bumps, no street lights and no crossing guards. The available bus lines take 3 transfers to get to Lehman HS and maybe 3 to get to IS 192. At our meeting we were able to discuss these problems with those who could attend on short notice. Our Community Board District Manager Ken Kerns and our Chairperson Martin Prince called as the meeting was in process to ask to attend. They were available to sit with us and explain our situation from their eyes, research and information. We thank them for their help. So far Councilman Vacca, Assemblyman Benedetto, Senator Klein and Borough President Diaz are in agreement with the poor choice of the location and have expressed this in various media. They also feel this is to important a location to take off the market in this economically developing area. The outcome of our meeting was to continue to support homeless shelters in general but also to express concerns with the choice of the location of this particular shelter. This Motel is an expensive piece of property and it is located in a prime spot for something more fitting to the economic development of the Bronx. We had hoped Donald Trump or Simone Development might have stepped up and continued their development in the Hutchinson River Parkway Corridor with this site (and the irregular triangle spot next to it with a billboard on it that might advertise the Golf Course) to guarantee a continuous upgrade to this area offering jobs that are so important to prevent homelessness in our borough.

Living with MS

An ever-growing popular concept in personal healthcare is the idea of the empowered patient. This term can mean different things to different people, but the general concept is that an individual makes well-informed health decisions based on research and conversations with their physician. MS is thought to affect more than 2.3 million people worldwide.

Leslie was determined to not let MS get her down and to continue living her life. After much research and weighing the pros and cons of different therapies, Leslie found the right one for her. "The first step I took was having an open conversation with my doctor about how to treat what is a lifelong condition. I read a lot of newspaper articles, health columns, research and online forums. Thanks to those conversations, I was put on an oral MS treatment called AUBAGIO® (teriflunomide).'

Using the tools of an empowered patient, Leslie was able to understand her disease and change the way she was treating her condition. Leslie has become an advocate for herself and others.

Leslie's advice: "Speak up! Be your own advocate. Everyone always tells you this, but if something is bothering you, talk to your doctor. Even if it is an embarrassing problem or it seems silly - most doctors have heard it all and they can help! My diagnosis started as a slight tingle in my spine when picking up a pen off the floor. It could have been nothing and turned out to be something.

September 23rd marks National Falls Prevention Day, a day set aside to raise awareness about how to prevent fall-related injuries among older adults.

According to the National Council on Aging, Falls are the leading cause of fatal and non-fatal injuries for seniors-70% of these falls occur in the home. Additionally, every 15 seconds, an older adult is treated in the emergency room for a fall, and falls can often begin a downward spiral of related and serious health issues. But there's no doubt that with or without injury, falls can heavily impact the quality of life for both active and homebound seniors. Underestimating the risk from falls can lead to hospitalization and serious illness.

As a licensed occupational therapist with the notfor-profit Visiting Nurse Service of New York my work every day is to work with individuals and their loved ones to develop goals for

treatment, and coordinate with other medical providers – like doctors and nurses – to deliver a plan of care that meets an individual's needs.

National Falls Prevention Day

It's worth the time to remind ourselves of some tips and techniques for avoiding falls, like how to assess a home environment for potential fall hazards, how to choose footwear and ensure walking aids for stability, and how to find local resources that can help seniors be more active in building strength and increasing balance.

Staying Safe at Home use a home safety assessment checklist to review all rooms and outdoor areas; remove clutter on the floor; tape down rugs/cords; arrange furniture to widen pathways; keep commonly used items in easy reach; do not use step stools; fix uneven surfaces.

• Staying Safe On the Go—always wear sturdy shoes; use handrails on stairs; avoid wet floors and wipe up spills immediately; be sure chairs and other furniture are stable; check for adequate lighting; consider safety items such as grab bars, raised toilet seats, non-skid tub mats and carry a cell or portable phone for easy access, especially if you live alone.

· Balance, Strength and Mobility-work on strength and balance by being active; consider activities such as light exercise programs, weight training, walking programs, Tai Chi, yoga, and hobbies like bowling, dancing and gardening; talk with a health professional before beginning any physical activities. · Multiple Medications-review all medications, both over-the-counter and prescription drugs, with your doctor and pharmacist; always carry a list of your medications; do not share or "borrow" medications; know the common side effects for each drug; and remember to take medications as described.

• Most importantly, know your PERSONAL risk factors for falls—such as weakness in the legs, previous history of falling, vision problems, cognitive impairment, dizziness, urinary incontinence, being over age 80, walking and balance problems.

I want to share with you some very disturbing information that was written in an article in New Business magazine. It will make you angry without a doubt. And I hope your anger inspires you to contact the offices of every area politician as well as our Borough President. We, the residents of the Bronx, need help now!

The Bronx has taken on more city-financed supportive housing in the past decade than any other borough. The author, Eddie Smalls, gives us the distressing breakdown "From 2005 Through March 2014, the city has paid to create roughly 2,500 units of supportive housing in the borough...Manhattan followed with approximately 1,711 units, then Brooklyn with 1,644, Queens with 52 and Staten Island with 19."

If you are not furious yet, let me present it this way.

The per capita distribution of supportive housing in the Bronx is about 90 times greater than it is in Queens! So what are the residents, politicians, and civic leaders in Queens doing that we are not doing? How did the balance become so even—so unfair? Unfortunately, the article does not give us the answer. But we, as residents of the Bronx, should be lighting fires under our politicians to get the answers.

Right now we have supportive housing at the Pelham Grande and at the Capri Motel. Neither program gave proper notice. They never do! No community, no matter how understanding they are, will ever welcome a supportive housing program when they sneak in under the cover of darkness and then try to deceive the community about the details of their program. And we should let them know just how unacceptable it is

every chance we get!

Now, of course we know that some supportive housing is needed but with a downturned economy the amount should correspond to the city and State's ability to pay for it. Too many people that can get along on their own do not. Therefore there should be strict guidelines as to who qualifies and how long help will be provided.

Now, it's apparent that no one in city government really cares whether or not a program is accepted into the community, because if they did programs would enter the community in a respectful way and they would be balanced through-

out the city so that every community is required to shoulder the burden.

The best way to have a supportive housing program be accepted and even welcomed into a community is to have most of the residents of the program be from the community. People are much more willing to help people they know and residents want to be near relatives and friends. They want to shop in stores they are familiar with. Generally speaking, they want to be in familiar surroundings.

This would go a long way toward helping the residents of supportive housing achieve their goals. Very simply, if supportive housing was equally distributed throughout the boroughs it would much easier to place program participants close to their own community.

I encourage you to go to our politicians, civic leaders

Klein has served admirable as the Chairman of a Senate sub-committee charged with finding efficiencies and cost savings within the State budget. In this capacity he has identified cost savings and numerous better ways to deliver much needed services by State Agencies and Departments.

The Senator's skills, no-how, and talents will go along way towards developing ways to serve the homeless, provide affordable housing for the elderly, and bless all our Veteran's with decent clean inexpensive housing.

It is time to not only argue against certain ill advised shelters being imposed upon our communities, but to also demand that the laws which give the Department of Homeless Services dictatorial powers be changed. These laws and regulations must include the voice of the people who make up the communities that have been targeted.

That is right targeted. To move in under the cover of darkness is to acknowledge that what you are do-

As I write this, the seasons are changing from summer to fall. Despite the flurry of activity I see noted in the pages of my datebook, I am still amazed at how the season passed me by.

Despite my best intentions, the garden starts out with such order and then before you know it there is a sea of yellow blossoms from the wild arugula that's taken over

the stone path through the tomatoes. I should just whack it back but I love the way my dogs get covered in the yellow blossoms when I let them out in the backyard in the morning. And so I have learned to live another summer with the wildness, content in the knowledge that while some would consider it weeds. it's all edible.

We ended up with 8 cantaloupes, 2 normal sized and the rest small but still delicious.

I spent the last week processing the pears from the Sister's Servants of Mary and from our pear tree, as well as the rest of the tomatoes from our yard.

The CSA had a huge crop of tomatillos and the week before I gave the sisters what had to be a ten pound bag of them, so when we had another huge bag leftover this past week, I brought them home and made a huge batch of Salsa Verde. My fridge and freezer are now filled with jars of chutneys, pre-



Bags of frozen peppers, frozen slices of fried eggplant and greens are also in there, all ready to help with meal planning over the winter, when the CSA is over.

It is a lot of work, but I enjoy it and the benefits are many. For example, my adult siblings and cousins loved receiving jars of various preserved items in their Christmas Grab Bags.

One of my cousins remarked that getting food was a terrific new tradition that he hoped we'd continue.

This year, I created a few new items and look forward to staying out of the malls shopping for gifts this holiday season (my nieces and nephews are all just want cash in an envelop).

Having all these jars of various delights in my fridge has made planning meals in the winter so much easier, not to mention less trips to the supermarket.

Of course, all this processing makes for lots of scraps and I was making a deposit into the big brown organics composting bin every day.

Despite my best efforts, which include the small compostable bags inserted into the countertop container and a large compostable bag in the big brown bin, things still get messy while they await the weekly collection.

And so before I got involved in peeling and cutting up the 18 pounds of pears I had, I chanced across an article on making your own vinegar from fruit scraps. Sounded like an interesting project; if it works out I will let you know.

The only jar I had that was big enough to hold the quantity of skins and cores I had has a spigot at the bottom. I thought it would be helpful when filtering the liquid from the solids after the fermentation process is over, but I didn't

just want to put it on the floor in my pantry in case the spigot burst. We'll see. The resulting vinegar will not be the type we use

for pickling; it won't have the acidity level. It will be good for salad dressings and as a digestive.

Another project I'm planning for the winter is to make a duck breast prosciutto again. We did it 2012 and it was delicious. We also made a pork jowl bacon that was a big hit. It's been kind of funny doing some of the research and reading blogs from people that are doing these things in rural Iowa or Kentucky and here I am in the Bronx trying to make

The founder and "King of Coquito Helado Delicioso" was a humble humanitarian who shared his success in business with the people in the community he loved. Don Alfredo will be sorely missed.

Longtime Disability Advocate, Terence Moakley, 69, who persistently fought for the rights of wheelchair users and other differentlyabled people to have equal access to trains, buses, and taxi cabs died from Myeloid Leukemia. The recent bid by New York "Progressives" to extend voting rights to those who are not American citizens is their latest attempt to unlawfully and drastically alter the voting landscape in the United States.

Throughout the U.S., Eric Holder's Department of Justice has ignored clear cases of voting fraud and overlooked conditions that lead to further abuse of the ballot box. A former civil rights attorney with the Department of Justice. J. Christian Adams, has stated that cases of voter intimidation against Mc-Cain voters in the 2008 election in Philadelphia were the worst on record. Utterly improbable voting results, such as instances in the 2012 campaign when, in several districts, there were more ballots cast than registered voters and all of those votes were for the President's reelection, have been noted.

The efforts by the White House and like-minded elected officials across the nation extend far beyond the passive tolerance of cheating on behalf of candidacies they support. They include active opposition to measures to avoid fraudulent voting and the intimidation of state governments acting in good faith to preserve honesty in elections.

However, Attorney General Holder has received bad news in Wisconsin and North Carolina.

The Judicial Watch organization has opposed the drive by the Justice De-

partment to overturn state efforts to require voters to show photo ID at the polls. The group also has also sought to bring to light the role illegal immigration plays in expanding the numbers of unlawful voters.

Holder contends that photo ID requirements discourage participation by black voters. But research by Judicial Watch indicates that after the implementation of photo ID in North Carolina "black turnout increased in 2014 by every meaningful measure. Black share of the total electorate increased. The percentage of black registered voters voting increased. Using Census Bureau estimates, "[there was] an increase in turnout among blacks of voting age. Finally, while turnout increased across the board in May 2014, and while white turnout increased by 13.7%, black turnout increased much faster – by an astonishing

29.5%." In a Wisconsin case, the United States Court of Appeals for the 7th Circuit has allowed enforcement of that states' photo ID law in the upcoming November election.

Opponents of requirements that voters display photo ID have uniformly failed to prove that the practice in anyway detrimentally affects minority voters.

According to Ballotpedia, "All states must meet the minimum requirement set by the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (HAVA) which requires photo ID for those who register by mail and did not provide identification. However, some states have stricter requirements set by state law. 20 states require photo ID, and 14 states have non-photo requirements. In general, valid forms of photo ID often include a valid driver's license, military ID, a state identification card, a United States passport, or student identification. If valid ID is not provided, most states issue a provisional ballot. Provisional ballots are usually counted once a voter's

eligibility is confirmed. Some states require that confirmation be provided within a particular time frame following the election."

One unusual result of efforts by New York progressives to extend citizenship rights to noncitizens would be that illegal aliens would have greater rights in certain areas, reduced college tuition at state universities being a prime example, than American citizens who live on the border of New York in New Jersey and Connecticut.

Critical mistakes, poor tackling and an inconsistent passing game kept Fordham Prep from overcoming an early deficit against Christ the King.

The Rams were down a score before its defense could get on the field. Kareem Davis returned the opening kick off 70-yard for a touchdown. Fordham eventually got even in the third quarter, only to see Christ the King pull away and hand it a 21-7 defeat in a CHSFL game at Jack Coffey Field last Saturday night.

"We shot ourselves in the foot a number of times," Fordham Prep head coach Pete Gorynski said.

"You are not going to be beat anybody when you make the number of mistakes that we made."

The Rams looking primed to tie the score in the second quarter on a second-and-goal from the CK 1-vard line. Quarterback Michael Wagner ended up being intercepted in the end zone by Davis to help keep the score 7-0 at the half. Freshman quarterback Matt Valeece, playing in his first varsity game, led Fordham down the field on that drive by completing four straight passes, three to Will Randle. Sophomore Joshua Johnson added 45 yards on 10 carries.

Valeece finlly helped Ford-

ham (1-1, 0-1) knot things up at 7-7 when he connected with Wagner on fourth down for a 21-yard touchdown pass. Christ the King answered with a 68-yard scoring strike that saw Jamen Williams slip through tackles on his way to the end zone. It was still an impressive debut for Valeece with regular backup quarterback Anthony Caserta away at a college visit. Valeece went 10-for-16 passing for 113 yards.

"He's very passionate about the game and it reflects in his play," Gorynski said. "He played much older than what he is.'

His team appeared to be getting one more chance to rally

late, but a ruffing the kicker penalty gave the Royals the ball back at the Fordham Prep 46-yard line. CK (2-1, 1-0) would later score as quarterback Davis Navas (8 of 9, 188 yards) capped a big day with another touchdown pass.

Gorynski wasn't completely certain the penalty call was a good one as many of his player felt it was the Royals center getting pushed back that hit the punter. The coach said he would have to go back and watch the film.



Legendary St. Ray's coach Patnosh dies at age 76

St Raymond lost more than a former athletic director and legendary baseball coach with the passing on Ron Patnosh last week.

To the high school's community the 76-year-old Patnosh was part of its soul and its face in many roles for the last 48 years. He died last on the morning of Sept. 19, after suffering what appeared to be a heart attack at his home, according to Ravens baseball coach Marc DeLuca. Patnosh suffered from vertigo and smoked during his life, but he appeared in normal health recently and began playing golf again, according to friends. Patnosh retired in 2010, leaving behind an unmatched legacy at the school.

"He is St. Raymond's," De-Luca said. "They always joke around that he came with the

building."

Patnosh, who played baseball St. Francis Prep baseball with former Yankees manager Joe Torre growing up, was one of the CHSAA's most successful and longest tenured coaches. He started the Raven's baseball team in 1964 and won 1,080 games, second only to Archbishop Molloy's Jack Curran in the CHSAA. St. Raymond claimed city championships in 1980 and 1989 and nine division titles in his tenure.

Friend and McClancy baseball coach Nick Melito said coaches and people like Patnosh gave the league legitimacy. His colleagues know what losing someone like him means.

"It's a huge void," said Bob Fletcher, one of Patnosh's former player and the Kennedy Catholic baseball coach. "You don't have people like this any more that do this for the love of the game

and to help people. It was always about the people and the kids. He is going to be sorely missed."

Patnosh's coaching style was described as old school, but filled

with compassion. He would immediately correct a mistake, but find away after the game with his sense of humor to leave a player feeing good about themselves.

"We knew as hard has he was, he loved us," former player and St. Ray's Athletic Director Ben Aguirre said.

Patnosh dedicated his life to helping kids in any way he could. He even coached youth basketball into his 60s. He was a history teacher at St. Raymond and the history club moderator. Patnosh, who had very little family, was also its athletic director and an assistant principal. The people associated with the school, his players and its students became family to him.

"It was always about his kids," Melito said. "Not players, it was his kids."

He made sureleave that family in capable hands when he retired. Patnosh handpicked and mentored both DeLuca and Aguirre. He was the one who told Aguirre back in 2002 he should come back to St. Ray's and helped him get a job. Patnosh welcomed DeLuca, who played at Mount St. Michael, with open arms. He stayed around the program after his retirement and was in the dugout when the Ravens won the city title in 2013.

"It's like learning to paint from Picasso," DeLuca said "I had the best. I couldn't have asked for a better teacher."

Patnosh's wake and funeral were both held in the in the St. Raymond gymnasium, the place and the school he home called for nearly five decades

"I cant imagine the school without him," Fletcher said. "It will keep going on, but I just can't personally invasion the school with out him."

Blocking The Plate

Bruce Jenkins (SF Chronicle) wrote: "The rules makers went too far. Runners are so terrified of contact now, they don't seem to realize that they can initiate a collision if the catcher has the ball and gives them no clear lane. Gripped by indecision, they often leave themselves vulnerable to injury with awkward slides. "And for us," Detroit outfielder Torii Hunter told USA Today, "you're causing bad throws because we don't

want to put it right on the plate. The whole thing is stupid."

Rule 7.13 was changed this week, but only to allow for common sense: If a runner is going to be out by 15 feet, the catcher's positioning is now irrelevant. But what about Wednesday night's play in the Ravs-Yankees game. when Stephen Drew was bearing down on the plate, the throw arrived directly over his shoulder from the left-field line, and catcher Ryan Hanigan had no choice but set up in front of the plate? Denied a crucial path, Drew was out trying a skewered slide inside the foul line.

"Next time?" New York manager Joe Girardi said. "I'm telling him to bowl (the catcher) over."

Maddon's Maynem It seems the Tampa manager, Joe Maddon, has made throwing at Yankee hitters part of his game plan. He feels that the Yankees won't follow their plan of waiting for good pitches if they're mad. Andrew Marchand (ESPNNY. com) wrote, "After a loss that saw three New York Yankees e jected and the benches clear, a "pissed" Joe Girardi accused the Tampa Bay Rays of pitching inside incompetently.

facility maintains a no-tolerance policy of illegal activities.

"They earn the right to be there every day by sticking to our strict honor code," he said.

He said he feels the facility, with his involvement and security cameras, can improve the condition of the block they're on.

"I thought it would be something beneficial," he said "The neighborhood looks like it needs help."

But Ferrara and fellow VNNA member and Taylor Avenue resident Sharlene Jackson Mendez resent the idea that the neighborhood should be grateful for the facility. The community is vulnerable, said Ferarra, and

nerable, said Ferarra, and a facility isn't a good fit for the neighborhood that's trying to improve. Jackson said the area has already shouldered their fair share of facilities.

"If program after program moves in, it won't be a neighborhood any more, it'll be a transient population," said Jackson.

They're also not convinced that Metro Safe Housing can keep out potentially dangerous residents.

"I don't believe they know enough about the people they're accepting," said Mendez.

Ferrara pointed to the

company's short track record, which makes her worried that they haven't had to deal with significant problems as they arise, and said she does not trust the company.

"I'm not a wolf in sheep's clothing," said Aldehari.

Jackson said she plans to continue fighting the arrival of the facility.

"The people in the community are not going to accept it," said Ferrara. "He needs to go somewhere else." Ardehali said that while

he's not inclined to give up easily, the plans for the Taylor Avenue facility are not a done deal.

"It's still up in the air," he said.

of the gate with a photo of him surrounded by flowers and lighted candles, while decorating the factory with images of tropical fruit. This terrible accident left many Bronxites deeply

ally distraught, including Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr.

"Mr. Thiebaud always gave back to the community, and was among our borough's greatest humanitarians. He was always quick to help a community group or a school with their event, donating money, time or product to numerous worthy causes across the city," said Diaz Jr., who recalls buying ices from Alfredo when he was a kid living in the south Bronx, calling them "coquitos."

"He was a great man and a great friend who was always there for us and for the Bronx, and this tragic accident has deprived us of one of the best."

Thiebaud was born in Honduras in 1939. By the 1960s he had immigrated to the Bronx with a vision of a business that recreated a dessert that was popular in Latin America and the Caribbean.

He made his home and his business all in one,

starting his coconut flavored-ice business "Delicioso Coco Helado" in 1967, in the kitchen of his south Bronx apartment. He would eventually added more flavors such as cherry and mango.

As Delicioso Coco Helado expanded, Alfredo employed workers and supplied vendors with pushcarts that he built himself in his factory basement. These employees became his family, as well as the Bronx community and the organizations that he supported.

Despite running a growing flavored ice business, Thiebaud still made time to visit his mother and the rest of his family in Honduras every Mother's Day.

The wake for Thiebaud was on Monday, September 22 at the Schuyler Hill Funeral Home, which was attended by Honduras President Juan Orlando Hernandez, among others. His interment was the following day.

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
