

CHILD DIES IN HIT AND RUN TRAGEDY

SUV crashes through store

A horrific crash in Pelham Bay claimed the life of a seven-year old.

According to police, the driver of a Mercedes Benz SUV, Kwasi Oduro, lost control of his vehicle while backing into a parking space, striking three patrons, who were family members, inside of Kennedy Fried Chicken & Sandwiches near IRT 6 Pelham Bay Station on Thursday, June 4 at around 5:30 p.m.

Oduro, from Soundview, allegedly fled the scene after the accident, only to be stopped by traffic enforcement agents two blocks away at Continental and Westchester avenues, according to police.

A store employee, Ali Ibrahim, said that just before the accident he had served ice cream to a table where the three victims were seated: Ethan Villavicencio who died, and his father and sister who were injured.

"The car reversed into the store hitting tables right inside," said Ibrahim, who was in the back of the house when the impact occurred, adding

"What I caught from the side of my eye was what I thought were flying rocks."

The rocks were actually shards of glass, he said, adding that the Mercedes was inside the store for less than 30 seconds before fleeing.

Ibrahim said the Mercedes first backed into a parked car and made a brief stop, and then continued in reverse through a glass storefront.

"I saw the kid on the sidewalk struggling for about ten minutes," he said, adding that Villavicencio was covered in blood after being moved to the sidewalk before an ambulance arrived.

According to an official at Jacobi Medical Center, Villavicencio's dad and sister sustained non-life threatening injuries. The mother had a doctor's appointment at the medical center across the street at the time of the incident. The family is from Mott Haven.

Within a day of the tragedy, a memorial with candles and signs were placed in front of the boarded up restaurant, and it has continued to grow.

There is a no word yet on whether the Kennedy Chicken

franchise will reopen, said Irene Guanill, president of the Pelham Bay Merchants Association, who added that it is too soon after the accident.

Balsamo Funeral Home, located on Westchester Avenue several blocks from the accident site, agreed to cover the costs of the funeral for Villav-

encio, according to a spokeswoman for Senator Jeff Klein.

The senator's representative also stated that her office

Parks names new Bronx commissioner

NYC Parks has a new Bronx commissioner.

On Monday, June 1, NYC Parks commissioner Mitchell J. Silver and NYC Parks appointed Iris Rodriguez-Rosa as Bronx Parks commissioner.

Rodriguez-Rosa, who previously served as Queens chief of recreation since 2006, brings nearly 30 years of experience working for NYC Parks to the Bronx and its recreation areas.

Throughout her career, Iris has held various positions in a number of capacities in various divisions city-wide including the Bronx, where she served as the Bronx chief of recreation from 1994 to 2006.

During that tenure, she was instrumental in converting all of the borough's recreation centers into multipurpose facilities, which increased the recreational opportunities in those particular neighborhoods.

She also oversaw the renovation of the St. James Recreation Center which was

Pelham Parkway N. revamp meeting set

Local residents will have the chance to learn about the long-awaited plans for the reconstruction of the north side of Pelham Parkway.

Community Board 11 will hold a public hearing on the subject at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 16 at the Institute for Special Education at 999 Pelham Parkway North.

At the public hearing, plans will be presented by the NYC Department of Design and Construction, and there will be an opportunity to comment for those who sign up before the meeting starts.

Those plans encompass Pelham Parkway's westbound main roadway and the Pelham Parkway North service road, and will address the road's deficiencies such as the lane width, pavement deterioration, poor drainage and the need for a dedicated turn lane at Williamsbridge Road, according to a presentation shown to community stakeholders in early June.

The project will also upgrade the aging water mains and sewers under the roadway, install a dedicated bus service lane, and install American Disability Act Accessible sidewalks.

Smaller improvements such as upgraded street lighting and new traffic signs are also included.

And although community leaders acknowledge the need for the project, so far several have raised concerns about the plan.

Details questioned include the removal of about 26 trees for reasons of disease or sidewalk installation, the removal of 31 parking spaces for 'day-lighting' at corners, which increases-visibility and provides room for the turning radius of emergency vehicles, and the construction of a sidewalk on Pelham Parkway north between Williamsbridge and White Plains Road that could narrow the roadway and encroach on parkland.

A number of people at the stakeholder's meeting were particularly concerned with the loss of parking, said CB Parks Committee chair Joanne Rubino. "It's very congested," she said of the

area.

At the meeting, they also learned the installations of guiderails will only offer breaks to cross at the signals, which Rubino said has caused problems on the south side of the parkway.

"People hop over them," said Rubino.

The reconstruction of Pelham Parkway South, completed in 2013, frustrated locals with the construction of a 'sidewalk to nowhere' that had no outlet and narrowed the service road.

During that first phase of the project, the Pelham Parkway Preservation Alliance was formed to fight the parks department on the removal of several dozen trees for the installation of the guardrail, which was successfully avoided.

This time around, they are questioning the planned removal of about 26 trees for reasons of disease or sidewalk installation. The alliance has requested evidence that the removal is necessary because of the health of the trees, said leader Joe Menta.

"We don't want to see any trees come down," said Menta. "Trees maintain the beauty and aesthetic of the parkway."

Concerns about the process in general stem from the problems encountered during the first phase of the project.

"It was a real mess on the other side," said Rubino.

But although there is some lingering distrust of the agencies, leading the community board to be super-vigilant in overseeing the plans, Rubino said most feel the process seems to be going better this time.

"This go-around, the city agencies have done a much better job with the design and have been sensitive to our concerns," said Menta.

And none of these changes are due to take place either this year or next. The tentative time line presented by DDC calls for plans to be finalized in 2016, when the project will be put out to bid. Construction is due to begin in mid-2017.

"It's going to be a long project," said Rubino.

High Bridge reopens after 45 years

Bronxites can now walk high above the Harlem River on the recently reopened High Bridge.

Completed in 1848, the oldest standing bridge in the city was the final link in the Old Croton Aqueduct that brought freshwater to New York City.

The bridge also acted as a pedestrian walkway between then-rural northern Manhattan and the Bronx.

The aqueduct was decommissioned in 1958, and the walkway closed several years later.

But everything is old is new again, and the High Bridge officially reopened to fanfare on Tuesday, June 9, the result of a \$61.8 million project to restore the bridge.

"It remains an engineering marvel to this very day," NYC Parks Commissioner Mitchell Silver said about the bridge.

At the ribbon cutting ceremony, city agencies, elected officials and community-based organizations celebrated the history of the bridge.

"This bridge right here helped to foster in modern day New York," said Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr about the former aqueduct.

But the High Bridge's walkway also functioned as a promenade on weekends, as well as an important transportation link between family and friends on both sides of the Harlem River.

"It was more than an aqueduct, it was the center of the community's social world," said Silver.

That reestablished connection between the boroughs was also celebrated on Tuesday.

"I can't think of a better symbol of community and solidarity," said Manhattan Borough President Gail Brewer.

The project represents a partnership among the two boroughs, the parks department and NYC Department of Design and Construction, numerous elected officials including Congressman Jose E. Serrano, who earmarked the first \$5 million for the project as a state senator, and groups including Partnership for

Parks and the High Bridge Coalition, among many others.

The Harlem River Working Group supported the project as part of an effort to expand access to the Harlem River waterfront, in the process creating safe routes for people to get around and explore the city on bike or on foot, said group leader and Highbridge resident Chauncey Young.

"It's hard to put into words how important this is," he said.

The bridge will offer neighbors direct access to High Bridge Park in Manhattan,

with its playgrounds, walking and bike paths, baseball fields and basketball courts, and recreation center and pool.

Highbridge resident Sahiem Baines is excited to have easier access to the park, which he uses with his friends in the summer.

Now instead of walking up to the 181st Street Bridge, the High Bridge's entrance at University Avenue and West 170th Street is just blocks from his home.

Baines has been waiting for the opening of the High Bridge since 2006, when his

middle school class attended a ceremony announcing the project.

He's been looking forward to it ever since, especially after hearing stories from family members who remember when the High Bridge was last open.

"I always wanted to know what the view would be like from the bridge," said Baines. "I wanted to experience that too."

The High Bridge is open daily from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. during warmer months. The High Bridge Festival will be held on July 25 from noon to 4 p.m.



Gerardi's sister, Mary Jane Musano, of the Waterbury La-Salle Community Association, is very proud of the job that Joan has done to make such an opportunity happen for her hardworking students.

"A child's education should be balanced with academics, sports and the arts so they can become well rounded adults," said Musano. "Also, when a child succeeds at being creative, especially when they struggle with academics, it gives them the self esteem they need to carry them successfully through life."

Misrepresented

(The following letter was sent to NY State Liquor Authority re: the recent incident at Bronx Beer Garden in Throggs Neck.)

We are writing to express serious concerns about a business located in the Throggs Neck area of the Bronx at 3392 East Tremont Avenue. Over the years, this location has gone through several name changes and has been referred to as the 'Bronx Beer Garden', 'Nicky's Beer Garden', and 'Nicky's BBQ'. However, the only active liquor license at this location is filed under the name 'Hops' and therefore we will refer to it as such.

On Saturday, May 30 the Throggs Neck community was sent into chaos due to the irresponsible management of this establishment. A promoter was allowed to take over Hops by the current owner to run a drinking event advertised as featuring free food, free tobacco or hookah smoking and free Jungle Juice, which was a mystery alcoholic concoction given at the door as people entered and exited the premises.

The event was over-promoted on social media, local radio, etc., which resulted in large crowds descending upon East Tremont Avenue, thereby disrupting the local community and creating hazardous conditions. If not for the swift and effective actions taken by the 45th Precinct, we are sure that someone could have gotten seriously hurt or even killed.

The event started early on Saturday and by 2 p.m., the situation had already grown to the point where the police had to be brought in to de-escalate matters. It continued to the point where neighboring businesses had to shut down for several hours in an effort to protect their businesses and assist the police in dispersing the crowd.

The 45th Precinct had to dedicate all resources available to this event and officers were unable to regain control of the situation until about 6 p.m. when Hops voluntarily shut down. With the continued cooperation of the neighboring merchants, the crowd was dispersed and order was restored.

At that point, the lieutenant in charge was given the establishment's liquor license and a meeting at the Community Board 10 office with the owner, prospective owner, members of

the community and elected officials, was organized so that we could all discuss how to ensure that a situation like that is never allowed to happen in this community again.

At the meeting, the current owner, Michelle Kauffman, and prospective owner, Jerald Taylor, apologized and discussed at great length their remorse, willingness to cooperate with the community and shared desire to turn over a new leaf.

Ms. Kauffman explained that she was overwhelmed and was not equipped nor did she possess the management skills required to operate the establishment. She claimed that she was currently in negotiations to sell the location to Mr. Taylor and his wife, who would take over in short order.

At the end of what was thought to have been a productive meeting, the lieutenant returned the license to Ms. Kauffman, who claimed that they have no other events scheduled at the location other than a weekly meeting of Police and Corrections Officers, which usually wraps up before 11 p.m.

Nonetheless, it has come to our attention that both the current owner and prospective owners misrepresented themselves at that meeting. They neglected to inform the community of another event that is scheduled for June 13, which is expected to be of a similar size and caliber as the one that occurred on May 30, yet again having partnered with an outside promoter.

It is obvious now that the reason why Michelle Kauffman would not surrender her license is that she planned on continuing these irresponsible business practices right up until the point where she can hand off this thorn in the community's side to an inexperienced and unprepared new owner, if in fact she was being honest about her intent to sell.

Let us be clear, what occurred on May 30 cannot be repeated. These operators have shown little concern for the safety of their patrons, their neighbors or their reputation. Thus, by way of this correspondence, we request immediate action by the State Liquor Authority to suspend this liquor license and provide no interim license to the new owners until satisfactory evidence is provided that the business will be run within the parameters or

the licensing agreement and in cooperation with the community.

Sets housing straight

(In reference to "Tenant advocates rally for rent regulations")

Last week a group of tenants from the New Settlement Apartments' organizing arm, Community Action for Safe Apartments, arrived unannounced at my office to distort my record on rent regulation and the 421-a program. They failed to research my current positions, my stellar voting record on tenants' rights and their own buildings' history.

I support the continuation and strengthening of rent regulations in New York City.

While up in Albany, I continue to hold discussions with my colleagues in the Senate and the Assembly on overhauling vacancy decontrol – so that apartments do not fall off the rolls – and limiting the MCI (major capital improvement) costs passed onto tenants in New York City.

I have also sought to strike the right balance on affordable housing incentives such as 421-a: We need to ensure that the program is more efficient and that we get the maximum number of affordable housing units in return for the taxpayer's investment. At the same time, it is important that the program actually spur affordable housing construction.

Sadly, these nuances are lost on the protesters who call for the end of these housing incentive programs despite the fact that projects built by their organization, under the Settlement Fund, Inc. umbrella, have been receiving 421-a and J-51 benefits.

One of their developments, Two Bridges in Manhattan, has received \$1.5 million in 421-a benefits since 1998. In the Bronx, the city granted a "J-51" benefit to the New Settlement Apartments on Townsend Avenue, a tax break for rehabilitation of multi-family housing.

I also believe that public housing should be part of the solution to the city's affordable housing crisis, which is why I have called for a NYCHA repair certificate program. This innovative plan would award zoning bonuses in certain areas in exchange for expeditiously repairing public housing developments.

No options for semis needing a rest stop

There are laws that restrict tractor trailers from parking on service roads for extended periods of time.

Unfortunately, for many truckers that travel through the Bronx on a consistent basis, there is no other options due to a lack of rest stops.

An on-and-off issue in the various Bronx neighborhoods for many years, tractor have used service roads along highways and expressways as rest areas.

This breaks the law stating that 'tractor trailers cannot be parked on a service road, unless it's a properly zoned area, for more than three consecutive hours or anytime after dusk,' much to the complaints of local residents.

Many of these occurrences have been reported taking place on Bruckner Boulevard between Middletown Road and Wilkinson Avenue,

Hutchinson River Parkway Service Road near Ferry Point Park off of I-678 and Randall/Lafayette avenues between the Cross Bronx Expressway and I-695, among other locations.

Community leaders and council members have also spoken on the issue, many supporting the passed legislation in 2012 to increase the ticket penalty from \$65 to \$250 and \$500 for repeated offenders.

For tractor trailers making long trips, however, parking on these service roads is inevitable, especially for truckers traveling from Connecticut to New Jersey and vice versa, or further, as the closest rest stop between these two states is off of I-95 in Milford, CT and off of I-287 in Morristown, NJ.

"I drive a truck during the week and when I'm home for the weekend, typically Saturday afternoon to early Monday morning, I park on the street," said Anthony, a trucker and a

Bronx resident who wished to not disclose his full name.

"I see no other option - to pay for parking at a garage or a lot each weekend isn't affordable. Most tractor trailers that have been seen parked on service roads, I suspect, are taking mandatory breaks and would have to travel almost another two hours in either direction to find a truck rest stop," he said.

Anthony added that most people are unaware in regards to how much they rely on the trucks that transport the goods that they purchase on a frequent basis and also stated that the best solution to this problem is one that satisfies both sides.

"Get out of here' may seem like a good solution to the person who doesn't want a truck in their neighborhood, but it won't solve the problem - truckers need a viable solution too," Anthony said.

FEGS services find a new operator

As one human services agency bows out, another equally experienced non-profit organization will assume control in providing important services.

On Monday, June 1, \$75 million of essential programs and services were transferred from Federation Employment & Guidance Services to the Jewish Board of Family and Children's Services.

FEGS declared bankruptcy this past March and the recent programs shift represents the largest group of programs to be transferred from FEGS.

With a total annual budget approximating \$250 million, the Jewish Board will now become the largest human services agency in New York City.

Currently serving over 5,800 Bronx clients, The Jewish Board provides a wide range of services including care management services, mental health clinics, preventive services, an emergency shelter for domestic violence survivors, supported housing

and apartment treatment programs for adults with mental illness, and residential services for adolescents.

The transfer includes such Bronx-based FEGS programs as Burnside Residence on Burnside Avenue, White Plains Community Residence on White Plains Road, Kingsbridge Road Community Residence, supported apartment and permanent housing throughout the borough, as well as Bronx clinic and Bronx personalized recovery oriented services, both located on Jerome Avenue.

In January, after a thorough internal selection process, the New York State Office of Mental Health selected the Jewish Board as the recipient of behavioral health services previously provided by FEGS.

OMH determined the safest, least disruptive way to achieve this was having an experienced agency replace FEGS' operation of all behavioral health services.

For more than 140 years, the Jewish Board has been

aiding individuals in realizing their potential and to live as independently as possible.

Each year, this non-profit organization serves more than 35,000 people of all ages throughout the five boroughs and on a 125-acre Westchester campus by addressing all aspects of a person's life including mental and physical health, family, housing, employment and education.

"We are deeply saddened by the loss of our colleague organization, which has worked for 80 years to provide services for some of New York's neediest, but we are pleased we were able to save these valuable programs both for the people served and the staff employed by them," David Rivel, Jewish Board CEO, expressed. "We are grateful for the support of New York State and the UJA-Federation for making this unprecedented transfer of the scope and range of these services as smooth and straightforward as possible."

In addition to this transfer, the Jewish Board of Family and Children's Services has

announced a new branding campaign to reflect its heritage, communicate its present position and support its vision for the future.

The agency will be known as the Jewish Board with its tagline, "Health and Human Services for All New Yorkers" and a new logo of a stylized skyline of the five boroughs.

Partnered with SJI Associates, a NYC branding and design firm, the Jewish Board researched and developed a

revised name to help establish a more powerful and recognizable brand.

"By conveying our organization's commitment to innovation while maintaining our mission, we want our brand to reflect our base of support and attract new donors and volunteers," Rivel explained.

According to the Jewish Board, a new website is currently in development and is slated to be launched within the next few months.

PSAC II set for full operation in 2016

A recently constructed call center in the Bronx will improve the city's emergency communication systems and 911 call response times.

On Thursday, June 4, the New York City Council Fiscal Year 2016 Executive Budget Hearings saw Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications Commissioner Anne Roest testify before the City Council Committees on Finance, Land Use, and Technology.

During the hearing, Commissioner Roest revealed recent developments regarding Public Safety Answering Center II located near the Hutchinson Metro Center on Marconi Street.

"We're on track to take over from the construction firm in January of this coming year and in June 2016, we'll have police in the building taking the first calls," she said. "There are no additional overruns in this project and we are working within the budget."

According to a New York City Department of Design and Construction spokesper-

son, the department is coordinating a phased turnover of PSAC II with the DoITT who will be its operator.

Situated along the Hutchinson River and Pelham parkways, the 252-foot tall facility is designed as a backup call center to receive over 12 million calls a year and will be responsible for the call transfer and dispatch of all emergency services within the city.

Costing approximately \$900 million, PSAC II was designed by Skidmore Owings & Merrill LLP and will be operated by the NYPD, FDNY and DoITT 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The facility will aid existing 911 services by fortifying NYC's ability to maintain communication during a natural disaster or large-scale emergency and is designed to operate continuously under severe conditions.

PSAC II seeks to provide redundancy to PSAC I, the city's primary call center located in Brooklyn's MetroTech Center and should the city face a disaster or PSAC I somehow fails, PSAC II will con-

tinue to improve responses to emergency calls during such events.

Sitting on a nine-acre site, the 550,000 square foot cube building is a blast-resistant structure possessing few windows as a security precaution.

The DDC spokesperson added PSAC II's occupants are protected from many man-made and natural threats as these windows have special protection features to ensure their safety.

PSAC II has a call-taking and dispatch floor for 911 calls, a secure data center to run the call-taking operation as well as office space and employee amenities.

The center's unique serrated facade is made of recycled aluminum and was installed to offset its monumental stature and gives it a more rhythmic appearance.

Despite its heavily fortification, PSAC II also intends to provide a stress-free environment for its call takers.

This center's lobby and cafeteria will feature a green wall behaving as a natural air filter which also serves to fos-

ter a relaxing atmosphere for an often stressful work environment.

PSAC II's site includes a landscaped berm wrapping around the building which attempts to downplay the building's enormous size, DDC explained.

"PSAC II is a large, ugly, monstrosity that is out of

character for the community, however the one benefit is that there will be a constant flow of several hundred police officers to and from the building every day," Councilman James Vacca said. "Anything that increases the police presence in the community is ultimately a positive."

Latin album artwork exhibit opens

A new exhibit celebrates the history of Latin music in the Bronx.

On Friday, June 5, the Women's Housing and Economic Development Corporation held an opening reception for their new art exhibit, Visual Clave, at the Bronx Music Heritage Center.

The exhibit explores the evolution of Latin music cover art over the last 50 years and displays original album covers from Latin vinyls - album artwork which includes paintings, photographs, sculptures and layouts.

The name of the exhibit, Visual Clave, comes from the African-derived 2-3 or 3-2 beat used in almost all genres of Latin music, as well as the wood percussion sticks used to mark these syncopated time signatures.

Displaying vinyl album artwork from Latin artists such as Tito Puente, Beny More and Tito Rodriguez, the Visual Clave exhibit is a tribute to the artists as well

as the photographers, producers, promoters, songwriters and every individual involved in the completion of each album.

The exhibit which configures half a century of musical creativity also shows a deep appreciation for the history that the Bronx has witnessed regarding music of all genres, not just Latin music.

"This exhibit, although focusing primarily on Latin music, is a celebration and a tribute to the history of music in the Bronx in the past 50 years - from the Jazz clubs on Boston Post Road to the movement of Irish music in Woodlawn to the Bronx being the birthplace of Hip Hop," said Elena Martinez, one of the co-artistic directors of the Bronx Music Heritage Center.

"Iconic album/vinyl covers are identifiable art to many and I'm glad the (Bronx Music Heritage) Center is celebrating this part of music history in a visual way," he said

Martinez also added that

many of the artwork being displayed in the center originates from Latin artists and musicians who grew up in nearby areas just decades earlier - allowing Bronxites who visit the exhibit to appreciate the history behind it even further.

"Many of these musicians and artists created their best work in nearby neighborhoods such as Hunts Point, Longwood and Morrisania. This was their stomping grounds - and they eventually became the voices of their communities."

The Visual Clave exhibit runs from now until Saturday, August 15, with a closing reception taking place on Friday, August 14. The sister exhibit, taking place at the Picture Farm Gallery in Brooklyn, opened on Saturday, June 6.

E. Bx. Traffic Coalition forum to meet June 23

The East Bronx Traffic Coalition is going public!

After a year of meeting in private, the consortium of civic groups concerned about increased traffic on major arterial roads caused in part by large new retail development, will hold a public forum to demonstrate what they have learned and invite the community to offer feedback.

The town-hall style meeting will take place at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 23 at Providence Rest, located at 3304 Waterbury Avenue.

Residents concerned about local traffic issues are urged to come and view about 45 minutes worth of presentations on local traffic hot spots and offer their feedback.

"This is about promoting awareness and activating people who care about the issue of traffic," said John Doyle, an activist with the group.

The coalition is concerning itself primarily with the highways in the 45th Precinct.

The area the precinct serves has seen much growth over the past couple of years with the opening of the Mall at Bay Plaza, the Throggs Neck Shopping Center, Trump Links, as well as a new 911 Call Center and the expansion of the Hutchinson Metro Center.

The coalition is necessary because a more holistic approach to congestion, which has been building for years, can affect multiple communities at once, said Doyle.

"The whole purpose is to engage your neighbors as to what is happening in your neighborhood," he said. "This is taking it a step further."

Robert Barbarelli, who represents the Throggs Neck Home Owners on the coalition, said that since the members of the group are not traffic engineers, they welcome input from the community and elected officials.

The group has already met with Assemblyman Michael Benedetto and

Councilman James Vacca, and representatives from Senator Jeff Klein's office are regulars at its meetings. The town hall is another chapter for the group in terms of engaging the public.

"The public will be able to tell us about any problems they are experiencing and give us their ideas," said Barbarelli.

Barbarelli believes that the group played a role in a decision by Senator Klein and state and city officials to appropriate \$1 million for traffic study of ramps directly into the Hutchinson Metro Center off the Hutchinson River Parkway.

"There is a lot of red tape involved, but if you stick with it and are patient you really can accomplish some things with the elected officials," said Barbarelli.

Other areas the group is looking at are the area around the Unionport Bridge and the site of the former Whitestone Multiplex Cinema that was to have been Paragon Outlets under a scuttled plan put forth by developers.

Mary Jane Musano, another coalition member representing the Waterbury LaSalle Community Association, said she sees the meeting as a precursor to an official public hearing once ideas have been properly cataloged and reviewed.

The entire community is affected, so all should attend, she added.

"Whether you take mass transit or drive a car, you should know what is happening because it is going to affect you," said Musano.

At stake are larger issues, like the long-term viability of the area's middle class population, she said.

"You need means to keep your middle class here," she said. "If you have a city only of rich and poor people, that is going to affect the tax base."

Good transit options and roads are one way of keeping the area an attractive place to live, she indicated.

munity.


"We got such a great turnout," said drama teacher Jennifer Susi. "It made the kids feel really special."

Benedetto bill addresses Male Breast Cancer

A week in October has been set aside to raise awareness among men about male breast cancer.

On Friday, June 5, the state legislature passed a bill that proclaims the third week of October, October 18-24, 2015 as Male Breast Cancer Awareness Week in the state of New York.

The timing for the passing of the bill could not have been better, as June also happens to be Men's Health Awareness Month.

Assemblyman Michael Benedetto who sponsored the bill, reached out to male breast cancer survivor and Bronx resident Michael Singer after hearing his presentation on the disease at a Community Board 10 board meeting.

Singer, who had presented the resolution to Benedetto's office, was presented with an embossed copy of the bill, Resolution K559.

"Last week, we passed the resolution in Albany that proclaims October 18-24, 2015 as Male Breast Cancer Awareness Week," said Benedetto. "This bill passing is impor-

tant because this is a very overlooked and underrated disease that must be paid attention to. Males as well as females should always be aware and not ignore the signs because it is a serious health risk and I'm very glad (Michael) Singer introduced this resolution to my office."

"Michael's presentation at CB10, the passing of the bill and this story will have an accumulative effect on increasing the level of people's overall awareness on this issue," Benedetto said.

Benedetto also said that he intends to pass a new bill in the near future to permanently purpose a week in October as Male Breast Cancer Awareness Week, not just 2015.

Singer, who has been a male breast cancer survivor for almost five years, continues to spread awareness by representing the Male Breast Cancer Coalition and also recently participated in a Breast Cancer research program as a consumer reviewer where he further researched and shared advice with other survivors about the disease.

According to both Singer

and Benedetto, 2,100 men in the United States are diagnosed with male breast cancer each year and an estimated 450 men will die from the disease due to lack of awareness and early detection signs.

"Most people have never heard of male breast cancer while most men not only ig-

nore the signs but are also embarrassed to talk about their condition - well that stops right here and right now in New York" said Singer.

"(Assemblyman Michael) Benedetto and his staff really recognize the importance of raising awareness on this issue as so many men die from

this terrible disease each year," he said.

"Today was a great day in the state of New York and I thank Benedetto and his staff for listening to the constituents of the Bronx and taking this serious men's health issue all the way up to Albany."



City Planning reviews senior housing plan

The community got a preview of a plan that would relax parking requirements for senior housing that could be built along Westchester Avenue, near Westchester Square's 'transit hub.'

The Department of City Planning made a presentation before Community Board 10's Housing and Zoning Committee on Tuesday, June 2 on changes it believes would encourage better building designs and allow affordable senior housing to be built by providing incentives for such developments.

The changes will have to come before the board for an advisory vote this fall as part of the Uniform Land Use Review Process.

The proposals are part of the city's Zoning for Quality and Affordability plan that looks at building or maintaining 200,000 units of affordable and senior housing by 2024.

"We are glad the community board shares our priority to improving the availability of senior housing options within communities," stated

a DCP spokesman after the meeting. "The proportion of seniors in the city's population is expected to increase by 2040 and this proposal will make it easier for people to age in their neighborhoods."

Many local activists have said they think senior housing for elderly from the area is a laudable goal.

But the proposal's preview is already drawing ire from community activists who advocated for downzoning for years because they see the plan as an upzoning, allowing for bigger building and less parking.

The plan to relax parking requirements along Westchester Avenue near Westchester Square's transit hub to encourage development seems particularly controversial.

Waterbury LaSalle Community Association leaders Andrew Chirico and Mary Jane Musano both said that the need for parking is not going away.

"I don't think you are ever going to go to a community and hear them say 'we need

less parking," said Musano, who added she believes the proposal is a giveaway to developers and the real estate lobby.

Chirico expressed concern about Westchester Square, which he said seemed to be where the proposed changes would have the most impact.

"It is really bad if it affects the Square because (merchants and community) are trying to bring the Square up," said Chirico.

"The thing that I cannot

take is that they want to relax the zoning, and say you don't have to have parking."

According to sources and documents, Zoning for Quality and Affordability is looking at encouraging housing development along elevated train and subways, within two or three blocks of places like the I.R.T. #6 line.

"All of a sudden they want to attack the zoning that we have been fighting for and tweaking for years, and open it up and create more loopholes,"

said Chirico, who added the community vigorously fought to tighten parking requirements.

Bob Bieder, a merchant along Westchester Avenue, said that he believes DCP is looking only at statistics that show lower car ownership in existing affordable and senior housing, and does not account for the needs of merchants in the community.

"The merchants in those areas are screaming for parking, and they want to allow builders to come in and put up housing projects with less parking," said Bieder, who added "Everyone is looking for parking there, and it is a major concern of the (Westchester Square Business Improvement District).

Bieder said it is his belief that the DCP should consider all factors when it comes to this issue.

Even if the zoning rules did change, it does not necessarily mean that affordable housing would be developed in these locations, meeting attendees said.



Bronx-born author tells 'Bitter' tales

A Bronx-born author has stories to tell about his hometown borough.

On Monday, June 1, established author Jerome Charyn released a new book, titled 'Bitter Bronx: Thirteen Stories', a publication that describes Charyn's experiences of living in the Bronx.

The book was published by the Liveright Publishing Corporation, a division of W.W. Norton & Company.

In 'Bitter Bronx: Thirteen Stories', Charyn explains his perceptions of life as a kid growing up in the Bronx.

Throughout the stories, he shares his many personal experiences including walking along the Grand Concourse, falling in love with three voluptuous librarians in the south Bronx and eating at mob-owned restaurants along Arthur Avenue.

Among other reflections in the book, three interconnected stories, 'Silk & Silk', 'Little Sister' and 'Marla' are sure to interest readers, especially if they were born and/or raised in the Bronx.

One of the stories discusses master builder Robert Moses' 'savior' plan to build a highway (the Cross Bronx Expressway, built between 1948-72) while dynamiting and destroying entire Bronx neighborhoods in the process.

"The central sadness of these sto-


ries is the breakdown of vibrant lower middle class communities through the tyranny and madness of one man - Robert Moses," said Charyn.

"However, out of the anger and sadness that Moses caused grew a very strange flower, and these stories are about love, not about hate - these are love stories and a tribute to the history of the Bronx."

"In all honesty, I couldn't have written this book without that strange man who caused such heartbreak to people in the Bronx. He impoverished them and their borough in so many ways."

Charyn, who now lives in Manhattan and splits his time between New York and France, has lived in multiple cities across the United States and Europe and has released 35 fiction books and 11 non-fiction books including this one.

As a student, he majored in painting at the High School of Music and Art in Manhattan before turning to literature when he enrolled at Columbia University, studying history and comparative literature with a focus in Russian literature. He eventually graduated Phi Beta Kappa and cum laude with a BA in 1959.

TNLL clubhouse to be renovated

Standing strong against the test of time, Throgs Neck Little League's clubhouse and field will soon receive a much needed face lift.

Senator Jeff Klein secured \$200,000 funding to be utilized in renovating and improving the local little league's clubhouse.

The repairs will include, but are not limited to the replacement of the clubhouse's roof, windows, and sheetrock.

According to Frank Eisele, TNLL president, these funds will also be invested in renovating all dugouts, repairing the clubhouse's exterior, new bathrooms, and replacing the baseball field's sod, top soil, and gravel.

"By investing in our little leagues, we are building important foundations for our children's futures," Senator Klein explained.

Eisele said the clubhouse's initial building was constructed in 1970 and an addition was later added in 1976.

As the years progressed, time has taken its toll on the structure as Eisele reports wa-

ter is penetrating the building from its roof.

"We've have this renovation project for our clubhouse on the drawing board for the last four to five years, however it was placed on the back burner due to other more important repairs which needed attention during that time," he said.

Eisele added that the league has been proactive in obtaining contractor bids for the clubhouse's exterior, dugouts and bathrooms.

"We're waiting for this funding to be signed off by the governor and are hoping to have this project started by this October," he said.

He added Francisco Marti was very instrumental in getting this proposed renovation pushed through in Albany and is thankful for the senator's help in securing the funding.

Established in 1952, the league was originally called Northeast Bronx Little League and chartered by Little League Baseball Inc. of Williamsport, Pennsylvania.

In 1953, NBLL was on the verge of disbanding due to in-

adequate finances, however was spared when Leo Vitti stepped up to the plate to take over the league.

A partnership would be formed when Vitti was joined by Robert Jonap two years later and in 1960, the league won the NYC Little League Championship which was televised on WPIX-TV.

In 1963, the league changed its name to Throgs Neck Little League and held its first bazaar on East Tremont Avenue to raise funds to re-build its fields.

A neighborhood staple, TNLL has undergone renovations in previous years which recently included upgrading its lawn irrigation system in 2003; installing new lights in both its junior and senior fields with help from the late Councilwoman Madeline Provenzano who secured a \$105,000 grant; installing a new generator to power their field's lights in 2010 made possible by Councilman James Vacca; completing a new Harding Avenue fence in 2011 as well as new infields and sprinkler system that same year; and last year

saw new score boards added to both fields, a new stereo sound system as well as new windows, ceiling and paint on the clubhouse's second floor.

Last October also saw Hell-

man Electric, a Bronx-based firm, joined with members of the Bronx Electrical Club and Local 3 repairing TNLL's senior field's lights free of charge.


St. Barnabas class of 2015

4-star general hailed from Van Nest

do you remember

Four-star General James F. Collins hailed from Unionport Road.

I attended the outdoor Memorial Day ceremony at the monument in Van Nest Park dedicated to those who lost their lives serving our country.

It was hosted by the East Bronx History Forum and the Van Nest Neighborhood Alliance and was held on the east sidewalk of Unionport Road at Mead Street.

As I stood there, I recalled that it was right near the home of a four-star general. James F. Collins was raised at 1820 Unionport Road.

He was born of native Irish parents on September 2, 1905 and attended P.S. 34 from 1911 to 1919 before going on to Regis High School. Thereafter he received an appointment to the West Point Military Academy from which he graduated and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in 1927.

Collins was assigned to Field Artillery and served in the Hawaiian Division before and during the Second World War.

He fought in the Papua New Guinea campaign where he

led American and Australian forces in ousting the Japanese from New Guinea.

He also fought at Luzon in the Philippines and even after the war he continued to command the artillery in the Philippines and at Japan.

It's well to note that he was promoted to Brigadier General as the war drew to a close in 1945. The following year he was assigned to the National War College where in 1950 he would join their faculty.

His next command was heading up our forces in Alaska from 1954 to 1956. Thereafter he led the Second Infantry Division which had included South Korean troops until being deactivated.

The Pentagon then assigned him as Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel under Assistant Secretary of Defense Herbert F. York from 1958 to

1961.

It was on April 1st of that latter year that President John F. Kennedy promoted him to Four-star General, the 54th person to hold that rank. Collins was serving as Commander-in-Chief, U. S. Army Pacific at the time. He retired in March of 1964.

The following month he was named president of the American Red Cross where he set about enhancing their services to our military in Vietnam. He increased services to civilians, but among his prime concerns were blood donations and its availability to our injured troops. He retired from the Red Cross on September 30, 1970.

He married Marian A. McLaughlin in 1932. She passed away on April 13, 1986 and is buried with the General in Section 2 of Arlington

National Cemetery. General James F. Collins, the pride of the Bronx, died on January 22, 1989 of prostate cancer.

He was 83 years old and is survived by his daughter and grandchildren.



It's a business model that has become as American as an ice cream cone at a drive in stop, or a hamburger at your favorite fast food shop.

The franchise model of business has allowed large numbers of Americans to become business owners, and has provided jobs to extraordinary numbers of people who might otherwise face unemployment or may never have had a chance to enter the job market at all. The Competitive Enterprise Institute notes that "minority-owned franchise businesses succeed at a rate 46 percent higher than that for minority-owned non-franchise businesses."

But it is a formula that is under attack on two fronts. Attempts to increase the minimum wage to \$15, and a legal maneuver that would raise liability for franchisors to the extent that it would make the entire franchise model a non-viable business model, may bring an end to this successful part of the U.S. economy.

USNEWS reports: "The franchise business model that has flourished for over two generations is under attack. The Service Employees International Union, as part of a national campaign to bolster its membership and finances, is leading an assault on franchise

businesses. If the unions prevail, nearly 800,000 small business owners who employ more than 8 million workers could face economic uncertainty, even bankruptcy, and thousands of other would-be entrepreneurs could be deterred from pursuing their dreams and creating additional jobs, according to a recent industry report; meanwhile, franchisees are expected to create nearly a quarter million new jobs in 2015 alone. In addition, the franchise model, which involves less risk than that typically associated with a small business startup, has been especially attractive to aspiring women and minority entrepreneurs. Around 20 percent of franchises were owned by minorities in 2007, compared to 14.2 percent of non-franchised businesses."

The Daily Signal concurs: "Legal experts worry that the franchising model could become extinct. The stakes are huge because by the end of this year, the more than 770,000 of these independently owned franchise stores nationwide are expected to employ more than 8 million workers. More than 31,000 automotive businesses, more than 155,000 fast-food restaurants and nearly 90,000 real estate businesses are part of this model."

The minimum wage dis-

pute is fairly simple: those representing workers want to force owners to provide substantial wage hikes, while business owners worry that those hikes will wipe out their profit margin and force them out of business. But the liability issue is more akin to a law suit strategy that seeks to incorporate as many 'deep pockets' as possible into an action in order to gain the largest recovery, even if many of the parties dragged into the law suit have no real connection to the issue at all.

It would work like this: if an individual who works for a franchisee gets injured, he would not only be able to sue the owner of the franchised business he works for, but also the entire parent franchise company. That liability would shake the entire franchise industry to the core, as it would provide almost unlimited liability.

Forbes analyzes it this way: "The real objective for trial lawyers is to bring in another set of deep pockets for the phase of the case in which they

attempt to prove the amount of punitive damages that should be awarded," Oncidi [a partner in a Los Angeles law office who focuses on labor and employment law] said. "They would much rather have a punitive damages award based on the income and profitability of the franchisor rather than just that of the franchisee."

The legal theory being proposed by critics of the franchise industry, including the National Labor Relations Board and the Service Employees' International Union, is called 'joint employment,' which would define a franchisee worker as being employed not only by the franchisee but by the entire parent franchise company as well.

Alyosius Hogan of the Competitive Enterprise Institute explains the issue: "National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) cases involving three different companies could upend... business practices by radically redefining what constitutes a joint-employment situation—when an employee is considered jointly employed by two businesses. The joint-employer cases threaten to overturn decades of established precedent, upsetting the expectations of thousands of businesses that have relied on the current rules in developing their business models. These cases involve

major American businesses—McDonald's, CNN, and Brown-Ferris Industries (BFI), to list but a few—and regular American citizens across the nation would be harmed.

"NLRB General Counsel Richard Griffin and U.S. Department of Labor Wage and Hour Administrator David Weil are pushing a radical re-definition of 'employee.' Their goal is to give unions greater leverage against the businesses they seek to organize, by turning many American workers' employment by one company into simultaneous joint employment by two or more companies.

The effect would be to add an additional, usually larger, employer to the collective bargaining table for negotiating wages, safety, and benefits... "Furthermore, the NLRB is using sly means to impose this new definition of joint employment. Rather than issuing a rule, the board will simply exploit its ability to decide the cases it prosecutes. Utilizing case law evades a number of congressional checks and balances to administrative rule-making power."

Now, that's what I call old New York!

To me, "old New York" is the city I moved to in 1981. Back then, the subway cars were so covered with graffiti, you couldn't see out the windows. You always added a 20-minute cushion to your commute, just in case. And Times Square...

Well, I'm getting off track. My point is, everyone's got an "old New York." The one Edith Wharton was referring to when she was writing a hundred years ago was the "old New York" before the Civil War, already a quaint and distant memory in the Gilded Age.

Old New Yorks are always being demolished, or updated beyond recognition, so it is astonishing to learn that one slice of the old old New York not only still exists, it stands virtually intact, right down to its original furnishings from 1832. It is the Merchant's House Museum at 29 E. Fourth St., and last week I went to hear at lecture about it at another amazing venue, the National Arts Club. (Hat tip to Gary Shapiro, the club's dapper emissary, who alerted me to the talk.)

"We call it the 'Miracle on 4th Street,'" began the speaker,

Carl Raymond, a tour guide at the Merchant's House who is also a professional chef. He combines both those skills to sleuth out what the home's original owners would have been eating 183 years ago, when they first moved in. But before getting to the meat of his talk — as it were — he explained how the miracle came to be standing at all.

When a young man named Seabury Tredwell moved to New York at age 18 to make his fortune in the hardware business, he lived in a boardinghouse. Perhaps predictably, he fell in love with his landlady's daughter. They married and had seven kids. In 1832 they bought a brand new house on Fourth Street — the suburbs at the time — and in 1840, when Seabury was 60, they had a surprise eighth child, Gertrude.

"Like my mother," continued lecturer Raymond, "Gertrude never threw anything away." She also never married. So when she died in 1933, just 20 feet from the bed she'd been born in 93 years earlier, she was surrounded by the very same objects that she had grown up with, right down to 39 dresses. These included the one her mom

got married in more than a hundred years earlier, in 1825.

Gertrude's heir was about to sell the place and all its dusty contents when a distant cousin, George Chapman, realized that this was no ordinary fixer-upper. Stepping inside was like walking into a time capsule — the King Tut's Tomb of Manhattan. Gertrude had kept the house "as papa would've wanted it" and Chapman wanted that

for the rest of us. He purchased the place and turned it into a museum.

In 1965, Merchant's House was one of the first 25 buildings on which our city bestowed landmark status. To this day, 90 percent of the items in it are original.

So what did the Tredwells eat during the century or so that they lived there?

Alas, nothing particularly delicious at first.

Despite our modern pining for heirloom vegetables, early 19th century New Yorkers generally boiled these to death. The watery mess was served alongside boiled or roasted meats with perhaps some melted butter as gravy. And since Eliza was raised in a boardinghouse, it is likely she served the same kind of food her mom did, including what one boarder back then described as "the dessert feared by every boardinghouse resident: a sour apple encased in dough."

Historians contend that more change occurred in the 19th century than in any other era, and happily, some of that occurred in the kitchen. By the end of the 1800s, French cuisine

was all the rage, along with the new practice of serving food in courses, instead of putting it all out at once.

You can still see the dining room table and chairs the Tredwells used, and some of their cookware, and the bells to call the servants, a la Downton Abbey. But threatened is the beautiful original plasterwork in the dining room and elsewhere.

The neighboring lots are not landmarked, and a boutique hotel is slated to rise on one side. Vibrations from nearby construction could crack the walls. The museum is hoping to ensure that doesn't happen by working with lawyers and engineers to develop protection plans.

With any luck, the Merchants House will be around for another 183 years, when aged locals may remember an "old New York" back when food was created by cooks, not 3D printers, and delivered by bike, not drone.

With Hillary as front-runner, Mike needs to step in

I'm a Democrat and I am very concerned about the upcoming presidential election. Our country's ability to tackle all kinds of inequality — racial, gender, economic, and the list goes on — largely hinges on the outcome of the 2016 election, and if Democrats prevail.

I want to make clear that I don't think all Republicans are completely misguided, just many of them such as union-bashing Gov. Scott Walker of Wisconsin and polarizing Texas Sen. Ted Cruz and thuggish New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie. Moderates like Jeb Bush and Marco Rubio — although too far to the right on many issues for me — at least offer new ideas on education and immigration.

But we saw what eight years of George Bush-Dick Cheney did to our country — a near economic collapse, a rush headlong into a calamitous war, and a rightward tilt of our Supreme Court.

So the stakes are high in 2016. It is easy to find fault with some of President Obama's policies and methods — particularly in Middle Eastern foreign policy and his ability to negotiate with an intransigent Congress — but history will almost certainly be very kind him. His landmark health care plan will one day be hailed as revolutionary as Social Security. Obama rarely gets enough credit for bringing America back from the brink of economic collapse early in his

presidency with his steady stimulus plan and strong monetary policy.

Ironically, the first President of African-American decent hasn't done enough to help the underclass in this country and the huge gap of economic inequality has widened. There has been a surge of activity around the country around the minimum wage, but this is not nearly enough.

There has been no attempt to address America's unfair tax code, no attempt to make higher education less expensive for middle class and low-income families or reform the predatory college loan program.

There also is the proverbial elephant in the room: the presumptive — and seemingly only — Democratic nominee for president, Hillary Clinton.

I am a fan of Hillary's because she is progressive without being dogmatic and polarizing; she is extremely competent and has invaluable experience on foreign and domestic issues; and she is battle-scarred and has been tested in public life for three decades.

But.

For all her experience and intelligence, I worry that Hillary is not a great candidate or campaigner. I worry there is much Clinton fatigue in this country. I worry the media and the public will focus on the wrong things and damage

her electability. I worry she will stumble late in the campaign. I worry there is no Democratic back-up plan.

So I will join the small but growing chorus of those who are saying, "Run, Mike. Run!"

Former New York City Mayor Mike Bloomberg is perhaps the only other supremely qualified moderate in public life who could lead this country. He has the intelligence, the independence, the wealth, the team, and — most importantly — he was great when holding the *second* hardest job in America for 12 years.

I'm debating whether it would be better for Bloomberg to jump into the Democratic primary soon, so Hillary has a real challenger to sharpen her campaign and message, or whether he should wait until early 2016 to see if Hillary flounders.



you are trying to do your lesson, or if you have a SMART Board on and you are delivering some Internet lesson and you hear a plane come over," he said. "You cannot hear; you have to stop your lesson or replay what you already have shown on the screen."

These interruptions become problematic for teaching, and there are no set patterns to the air traffic, the principal said.

There are times during the day when it is quiet and then there are periods when the low-flying planes appear every 90 seconds, he added.

"It is not continuous for the six and a half hours, but for the time that they are coming over, it is continuous," said Doran.

Joseph Solimine Sr., chairman of the Facilities Committee for the board of directors, supplied the Bronx Times with a letter from PANYNJ that indicates that the school qualified for the program in 1993.

Solimine explained that if a school is in the flight path, known as a contour, and the level of sound exceeds 65 decibels, then a school can qualify for funding, 80 percent of which comes from the FAA and 20 percent from the PANYNJ, which administers the program.

"We are saying that the Port Authority and FAA made a commitment...and we want them to honor that," he said.

PANYNJ lost the records of the 1990s correspondence with the school in the World Trade Center attacks in 2001, and after reviewing the sound levels and testing the school again, determined in 2006 that the school no longer qualified

for the program, documents supplied by Solimine show.

A letter to the school from PANYNJ in 2006 indicates it is no longer in the flight contour and that "noise levels from aircraft have dropped dramatically in the last few years."

Ongoing sound metering on the school ground is continuing, he and Doran confirmed.

Solimine said based on research into the matter, he believes that Scanlan is entitled to funding for many of the buildings on its grounds, which in addition to the high school, includes a pre-k program, and in September, a charter elementary school.

"The campus is 13 acres," he said, adding "This is an educational fortress being interrupted by airplane noise."

If it were to qualify, Solimine, a volunteer board member, said that the school could install new 'soundproof windows,' as well as an upgraded heating and air-conditioning so that windows do not have to be opened when the weather is warm.

Carl Cannizzaro, owner of local firm Ensign Engineering, who is familiar with the situation at Scanlan called it a "20-year epic."

A source at the PANYNJ confirmed that the agency believes that the Monsignor Scanlan no longer qualifies for the program.

"The high school does not meet the FAA guidelines to receive noise soundproof funding because it is not located within the current noise contour map, which includes areas with a 65 (day-night sound level) average for decibel levels," stated a spokeswoman for the Port Authority.



Senators dream season ends in city final loss

The team known more for its books than ball will not be able to call itself city champions after a magical ride to the title game.

The second-seeded American Studies at Lehman College baseball team was shutout by No. 12 East Side Community 7-0 in the PSAL Class AA title game at Yankee Stadium on May 3. The Senators, who were making their first final appearance, collected just two hits against East Side starter Timothy Lopez. He struck out six and also drove in three runs at the plate.

"This one game doesn't really define us," said American Studies senior shortstop Jonathan Rubin. "We know what we did this season. We know what we accomplished and I am proud of that."

The season was still a rebounding for the small Bronx school, which is the top-ranked public school in New York State and No. 11 in the country by U.S. News and World Report. Its enrollment is just 400 students.

American Studies, who

was the No. 29 seed in the 'B' division last season, finished second in the Bronx AA West league in 2015. It won 15 straight games before losing in the final. Many of them came with its home field of Harris Park deemed unplayable midway through the season.

The Senators beat division winner and borough rival Bronx Science 12-2 in the semifinals. American Stud-

ies (17-3) also took down much bigger schools such as Curtis and Townsend Harris along with way.

"They have nothing to be ashamed of," Senators coach Howard Blitz said. "There are probably like 75 teams in AA, 73 of them are still in school right now. We are here in Yankee Stadium on a beautiful day playing baseball."

The magic ran out in the title game. East Side led just 1-0

on an RBI single by Lopez off reliever Jack Buckley in the fourth. The Tigers opened the game up an inning later with a five-run fifth. The big blow was a two-run single by Hasane Azir off Eli Kimbell to make it 4-0. Lopez added another RBI single to put East Side up six. Blitz felt his team ran out of gas after playing eight games in 11 days to close the regular season and the emotion of knocking off Bronx

Science. His players agreed.

"I think we got wrapped up in the whole thing," Rubin said. "At the end of the day it's just a game, a game we got to win. I don't think we had the energy we have most games."

Two errors, including a throw to first that got away, hurt American Studies in the frame in an otherwise well-pitched game. East Side scattered seven hits over the other six innings. Blitz started senior Samuel Frere-Holmes, who is awaiting Tommy John surgery, on the mound. He loaded the bases with one out in the first, before Buckley came onto strike out the next two batters to end the threat. Frere-Holmes was told he could not do any more damage to his arm.

East Side eventually broke through and used the big fifth inning to end American Studies' title dream. The defeat was the only thing that took away from a memorable day.

"We are in the same dugout as the Yankees," Buckley said. "The only thing that could have made it better was if we won."

Morris Heights native Rodriguez closes out GW's city title win

Wesley Rodriguez ensured his team a city championship by ripping the baseball out of his coach's hands.

The George Washington star senior, who was playing third, has seen the velocity on his 98-mile-per-hour fastball drop in recent weeks. He was tired, according to head coach Steve Mandl. That is why he didn't plan on putting the Morris Heights native into the title game to protect a one-run lead with two on and one out in the bottom of the seventh inning.

Instead, Trojan pitching coach Rafael Rodriguez walked to the mound to discuss a potential defensive play with the infield and reliever Kelvin Tapia. Rodriguez would have none of it. He grabbed the ball.

"He is the best pitcher I ever had and he's one of the top 2-3 hitters I have ever had," Mandl said. "As a two-way player there is no one like him."

Rodriguez continually praised his teammates, especially starter Yanmanuel Infante and Tapia, who combined to shut down Tottenville for 6 1/3 innings. They still needed his help to finish the job. Rodriguez ensured his talents were taken advantage of even if it had to be by force.

"Those are the moments I look up to in baseball," Rodriguez said. "If you don't want to be in those moments, that guy, that wants the ball in those moments. That guy who wants to hit in those moments don't play."




