Second incident aborts grand opening

A Pelham Bay restaurant, about to reopen after it was damaged in a car accident a few months back, was destroyed in a gas explosion.

Texas Chicken & Burgers, the revamped restaurant located at 3275 Westchester Avenue, a few hundred feet from the IRT#6 Pelham Bay station, was seriously damaged after a gas leak ignited a fire on Wednesday, September 30.

The occurrence took place shortly before 5 p.m. the day before the restaurant's planned reopening.

In response to the incident,

approximately 25 units and 100 firefighters and EMS personnel were called to the location.

Neighboring businesses, Peghe Deli and Gana Wine Spirits, were mostly affected by smoke and water damage.

According to the FDNY, two firefighters sustained non-life threatening injuries.

There were no injuries to civilians.

This is not the first time a horrific accident has taken place at this restaurant site.

This past June, an elderly driver lost control of his vehicle while backing into a park-

ing space and struck three dining customers, killing seven-year old Ethan Villavicencio and injuring Ethan's father and sister.

At the time, the restaurant went by the name of 'Kennedy's Chicken & Sandwiches'.

Following the tragedy, the restaurant closed and underwent months of renovation.

According to an employee from Crosby Cleaners, which is located two doors down, the restaurant was expected to open the day on Thursday, October 1.

As a result of the fire, the

Legionnaires' meeting in MP

A Legionnaires' cluster impacting the 10461 zip code appears to be waning, according to the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.

A town hall discussion on Legionnaires' disease was held on Thursday, October 1 at Maestro's Caterers where community leaders, elected officials, DOHMH medical professionals and residents learned more about the disease and how the city is ensuring peoples' safety.

During the meeting, New York City's Commissioner of

Health Dr. Mary Bassett said the Legionnaires' cluster discovered in the 10461 zip code remains at 13 people infected and one reported death.

She added that four patients have been discharged from the hospital while eight remain hospitalized.

A spokesperson for DOHMH said the 13 cases include three individuals between ages 25 to 44, eight individuals ages 45 to 64 and two individuals more than age 65.

The three cases in the 25 to 44 year group had multiple medical problems and all 13 cases had underlying health

conditions, according to DOHMH.

Five individuals are residents of the 10461 zip code while eight either worked or visited the infected area.

Dr. Bassett said there have been no new cases since September 21 and added the incubation period for the disease is two to ten days which is soon approaching.

She said the cluster was first identified starting with four, then six patients who had a connection the area.

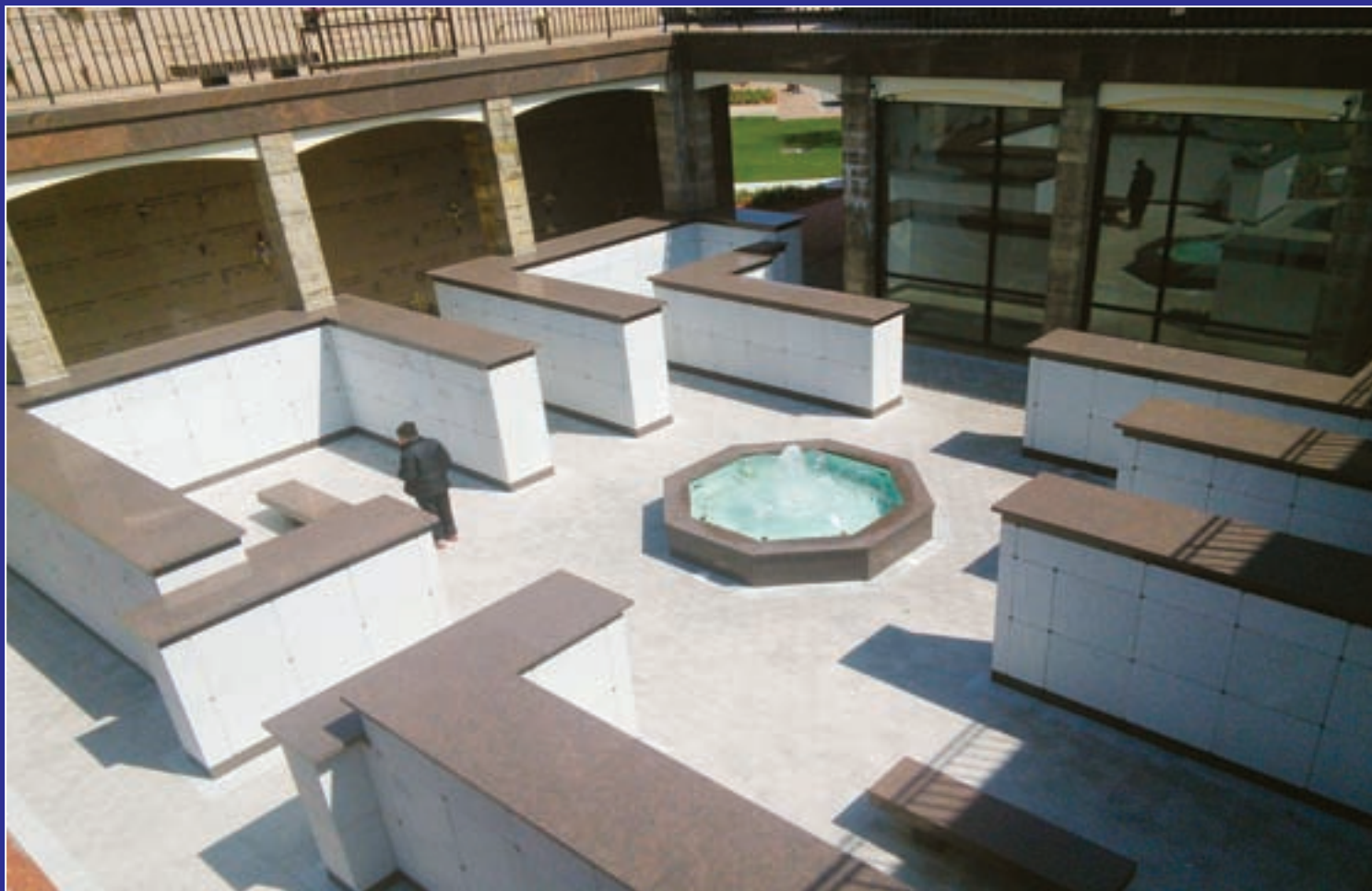

Veteran's advocate honored in street co-naming

A late City Island veterans' advocate who championed the cause to have captured and lost soldiers remembered was honored recently.

On Saturday, September 26, Councilman James Vacca, family and friends of the late American Legion post commander, William G. Clancy, and veterans gathered at City Island Avenue and Cross Street to co-name the intersection as 'Commander William G. Clancy Lane' to honor the veteran who passed away on July 7, 2012 at age 75.

According to Councilman Vacca, this ceremony was attended by American Legion members from all around the nation.

"Commander Clancy did so much for the Bronx County American Legion, City Island and the Leonard H. Hawkins American Legion Post 156, but did it quietly without looking for any accolades," said Councilman Vacca, a long-time friend of the Clancy family. "He was a true unsung patriot."

"As a lifelong City Islander and Bronx resident, I am very

proud of this honor given to my father," said William Clancy III. "It was a beautiful, moving ceremony with at least 200 people in attendance and we are all incredibly proud of him."

Aside from his work with Post 156, Clancy was involved in the New York State American Legion where he lead successful efforts to have Prisoners of War and soldiers Missing in Action nationally recognized by having the U.S. Department of Defense declassify documents to provide families of these soldiers more details and have POW/MIA flags flown from many government flagpoles.

"This was an issue that could have been easily forgotten and he was a leading champion of this cause," said Clancy III. "Since then, they have helped find hundreds upon hundreds of these soldiers to bring them back home. He was forceful in what he went after, but was very nice and respectful while doing so."

Clancy III added his father served as the American Legion's Bronx County commander and New York State vice commander and was

nominated as New York State commander-elect shortly before his death.

An active community member, Clancy served as an original member of the now defunct City Island Volunteer Ambulance Corps and as an assistant scoutmaster for City Island's Troop 211, according to Clancy III.

"He was a tremendous believer of people doing community service and he never

saw it as being a chore," said Clancy III.

According to U.S. Army Colonel Michael Clancy, his father was drafted in 1961 and served for two years as a combat engineer deployed in southern France to help rebuild the country's sewer system which was destroyed during World War II.

Following his 1963 homecoming, Clancy, a skilled carpenter, worked as a boat

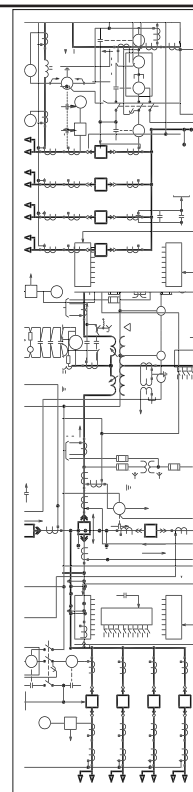
builder at the Minniford Yacht Club and joined Post 156.

"He was a blue collar guy from the Bronx who collected people for a living," said Michael. "He had such an impact on so many people's lives that they looked up to him as a father figure. He was a great ambassador for the Bronx who helped change people's perception of the borough and his name will live on in the community with this new street sign."

Bronx Columbus Day Parade ready to go

The 39th Annual Bronx Columbus Day Parade is set for Sunday, October 11, a day before the official holiday honoring the great Italian explorer.

Parade volunteers expect the event to go off without a hitch, starting on Morris Park Avenue at White Plains Road at noon, marching on Morris Park Avenue to Williamsbridge Road.

A red, white and green line has been painted on the median of Morris Park Avenue that is part of the parade route, said parade coordinator Tony Signorile, and Italian flags will also be hung across the avenue and on utility poles for the event.

"The community is excited; they look forward to this event every year," said Signorile.

"I feel that our children should grow up with (the parade) to know their culture, know their roots and to continue the tradition," said the parade coordinator.

The Morris Park Community Association hosts the event. Signorile is president of the MPCA.

The Bronx Columbus Day Parade also serves as a day that allows people to reconnect with the Morris Park community, even if they have moved away, he said.

"I am happy to bring back people who were born and raised in this

community, and then unfortunately, moved away," he said.

"For me it is an honor to bring them back for this event once a year; they look forward to the parade and seeing family members and friends."

After the parade, there will be a Doo-Wop concert in Loreto Park at 5:30 p.m., with music by the Gio Venuto Band, he said.

The parade itself features 15 marching bands, a variety of community groups marching, as well as schools from Morris Park, Throggs Neck and Westchester County, Signorile added.

The grand marshal is labor leader Mario Cilento, president New York State AFL-CIO, who grew up in Morris Park on Williamsbridge Road.

"He is responsible for 2.5 million members," said Signorile of Cilento. "Mr. Cilento believes in education, as I do, and providing our children with better education."

Josephine Fanelli, principal of St. Theresa School, was honored for her commitment to children and education, he said.

Local businessperson Joseph Lucchese, owner of Joseph A. Lucchese Funeral Home in Morris Park, is being honored for his community service.

The 2015 Miss Columbus is Bianca Mastropietro, an athlete and scholar who will use a scholarship she received

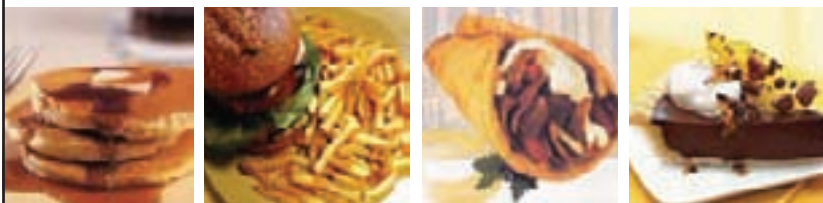

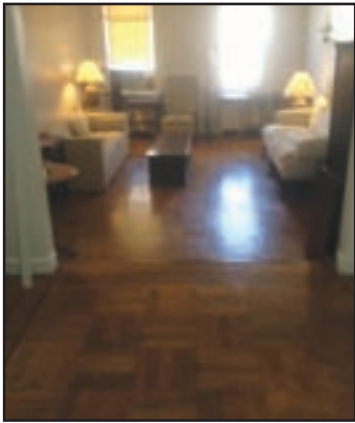

Paul Frances George Valentine was born on September 23, 1922 in the Bronx. He was given the nickname of 'Dukie' because several other relatives also had the same first name, which was confusing to other family members.

He lived on 138th Street and St. Ann's Avenue. When he was 8 years old, he moved to Logan Avenue in Throggs Neck, attended P.S. 14, and Christopher Columbus High School.

When he turned 21, he was drafted in the U.S. Army for three years moving around the Philippines, building roads, air strips, covered bunkers, hospitals and McArthur's headquarters. He participated in six battles and one invasion. He served three years without a furlough. During one battle, Paul survived an explosion that sent him flying in the air, landing unscathed. He also contracted Malaria in the Pacific theater.

In 1986, Paul received a Certificate of Award in recognition of his military service during World War II, which was presented to him in June of 1999. He also received a Certificate of Appreciation for his war service from the Army Air Force.

After the war, Paul worked for the Department of Sanitation for 32 years in the Maintenance Department at the Pelham Bay Landfill and Ferry Point Park, working with bulldozers, graders, pay loaders and dirt trucks.

From there he went to work at Monsignor Scanlan High School for 12 years as a maintenance man, after which he went into full retirement.

Paul married Helen in 1948. They were married for 66 years. Helen passed away in 2014.

Today, Paul spends his time making totem poles, wooden lawn eagles, and working around his house. Paul will soon be 93 years young, and still going strong.

Please honor our vets by marching with us in the Veteran's Day Parade on November 8.

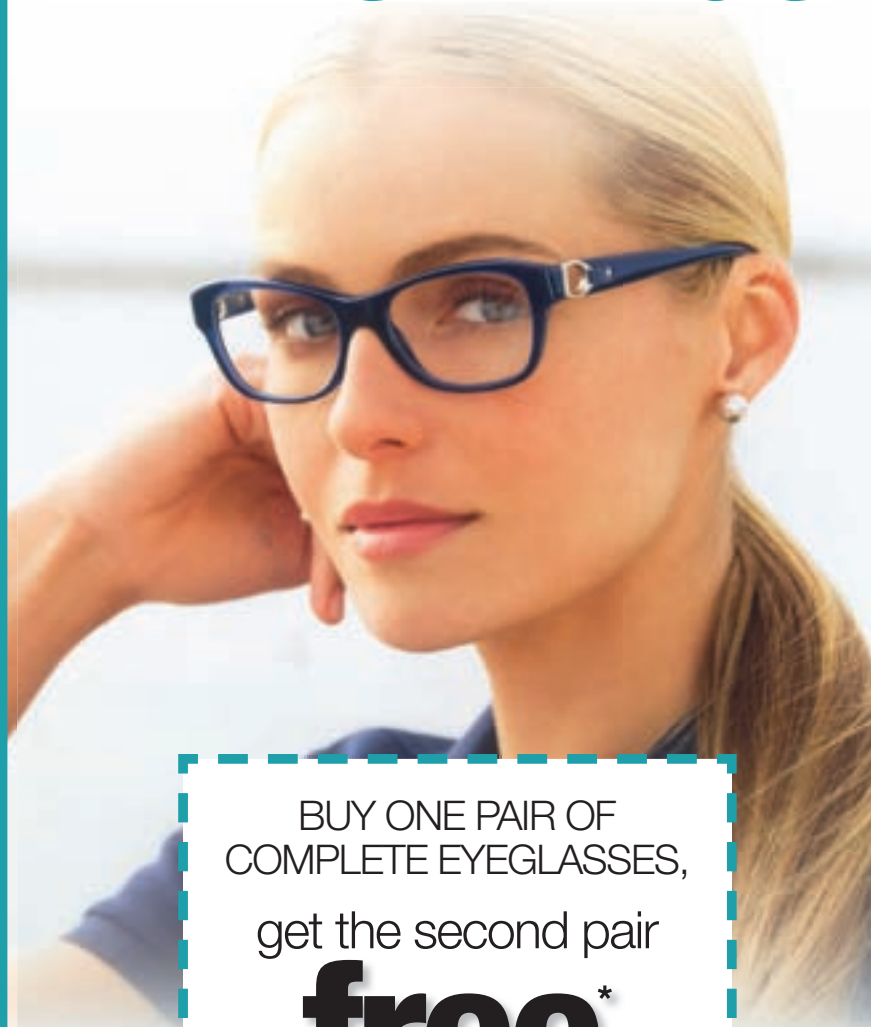

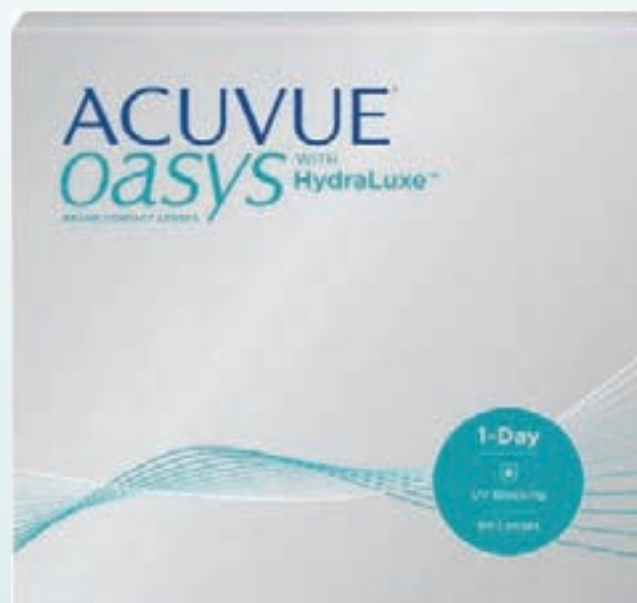

Mother, four children injured in livery cab accident

An unusual car crash involving a livery cab and five pedestrians, including four children, is under investigation.

On Wednesday, September 30, a livery cab traveling on Valentine Avenue towards East Kingsbridge Road struck a mother and four children waiting for a school bus, resulting in the hospitalization of all five.

The incident occurred at about 7:45 a.m. on a rainy Wednesday morning.

A cabbie, who was traveling southbound on Valentine Avenue, towards East Kingsbridge Road, lost control of the vehicle after it struck a metal curb.

As the vehicle tilted, it hopped the curb and slid into the five pedestrians, including a five, six, seven and 11 year old child, along with the 33-year old mother.

Two of the four kids who were hit are believed to be her children, according to Community Board 7.

The cab ended up sideways against the storefront of Kingsbridge Pharmacy, located at 229 E. Kingsbridge Road, pinning the seven-year old under the car in the process.

As a result, passersby immediately

freed the trapped child.

She experienced the worst injuries, suffering two broken legs and severe belly bruising.

The victims were taken to Jacobi Medical Center and St. Barnabas Hospital.

As of press time, two of the three individuals who were taken to Jacobi are in fair condition.

The other victim is still in serious condition. The cab driver, Bialo Daillo, was not charged in the incident.

"My thoughts and prayers are with the victims of the horrific crash where the livery cab driver struck multiple pedestrians and I pray for their speedy recovery," said Councilman Ritchie Torres. "I have spoken to city agencies such as the DOT and NYPD, and have been assured of a full investigation into the crash and the driver. Additionally, I request DOT to install traffic-calming and safety measures at the intersection of East 194th Street, Kingsbridge Road and Valentine Avenue, so that this type of vehicular violence does not happen again."

As East Kingsbridge Road enters Valentine Avenue, approaching 194th Street, the roadway forks into seven different sec-

tions.

To control traffic flow a traffic island is located in the middle of the busy intersection.

This traffic island, which includes multiple 'Do Not Enter' signs, only has two sets of reflectors, which, along with the rain, could have contributed to the incident.

One of the triangle island's curbs could have also contributed, as the car may have hit it before losing control.

CB 7 chairwoman Adaline Walker-Santiago is also looking into safer traffic-calming options for the busy intersection.

"We will have to look at videos of the incident to figure out which safety alternatives should be implemented, but putting something at the triangle barrier should help this neighborhood avoid similar occurrences," said Walker-Santiago, who added that a speed bump can't be installed on the road because it includes a bus lane.

"This situation is sad and heartbreaking for this area and we hope that all of the victims are okay," she said.

The incident was recently discussed at a CB 7 Public Safety Meeting, which was attended by NYCDOT and NYPD.

49th Precinct Bike Patrol is on a roll

The new bicycle patrol unit in the 49th Precinct is bringing the police closer to the community.

The unit was formed two and a half months ago.

"When I was newly assigned to the precinct, I was looking for a way to help improve community and officer relations," said Captain Walton.

He had a suggestion box placed on the front desk giving officers a chance to voice opinions and share ideas on how to the precinct could achieve his goal.

Police officer Roger Rachelski suggested creating a bike patrol unit which struck a cord with their commanding officer.

As a community police officer from 1997 to 2001 in Harlem's 32nd Precinct the captain patrolled by bike.

Police officer Rachelski and his partner, police officer Juan Sanchez are bike certified and have experience patrolling the streets of New York on their two-wheeled vehicles.

"It was so fitting when they came up with this idea and I remembered from my own experience how success this idea was in Harlem," said Captain Walton.

The bike patrol covers all nine sectors of the 3.8 square mile precinct as many as three times a day and has received rave reviews from the community.

As a way to have the precinct become more involved in their community, police officers Rachelski and Sanchez have their precinct's official Twitter handle, @NYPD49Pct emblazoned on the back of their shirts so residents can contact them with non-emergency issues.

The bike patrol unit responds to 911- and 311-related calls, issues quality-of-life summonses, visits schools and interacts with the local folks.

This dynamic duo will continue to ride into late November.

The precinct is looking to increase the bike patrol unit in addition to having officers trained to become bike-certified this spring.

"This new bike unit is beginning to show the different neighborhoods coming together while at the same time quality-of-life matters are being addressed freeing up the patrol officers to respond to emergency calls," explained police officer Jay Sturdivant, 49th Precinct Community Affairs. "We are always looking for more ways to better serve the community and the community loves seeing the bike unit patrolling and never miss

the opportunity to have me relay the message to the commanding officer, Captain Walton."

Police officer Sanchez joined the ranks of the 49th Precinct in January 2007 and has been patrolling the precinct's confines ever since.

Police officer Rachelski transferred from the 62nd Precinct in Brooklyn to the 49th Precinct in 2009 and is partnered with Sanchez.

Since then, police officers

Rachelski and Sanchez have become a great team, enjoying their work with the NYPD.

The duo can often be seen lending a helping hand to anyone in need which is why the bike patrol unit has been a great fit for them.

By patrolling on bikes, the police officers are better connected with the community they have sworn to protect and serve, said police officer Sturdivant.

"It's been a very positive experience being part of this patrol and people almost treat us like celebrities when they see us in the neighborhood," said Sanchez.

"People see us as being more approachable and it's really starting to help bridge the gap between the community and law enforcement," said Rachelski.

"I fought for five years to bring bike patrol officers back into the community and I am very glad we have these officers because they really are a great crime deterrent," said Susan Shapiro, Pelham Parkway Houses resident.

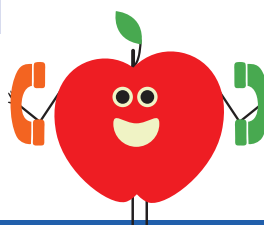

E. Tremont Avenue overpass repair set

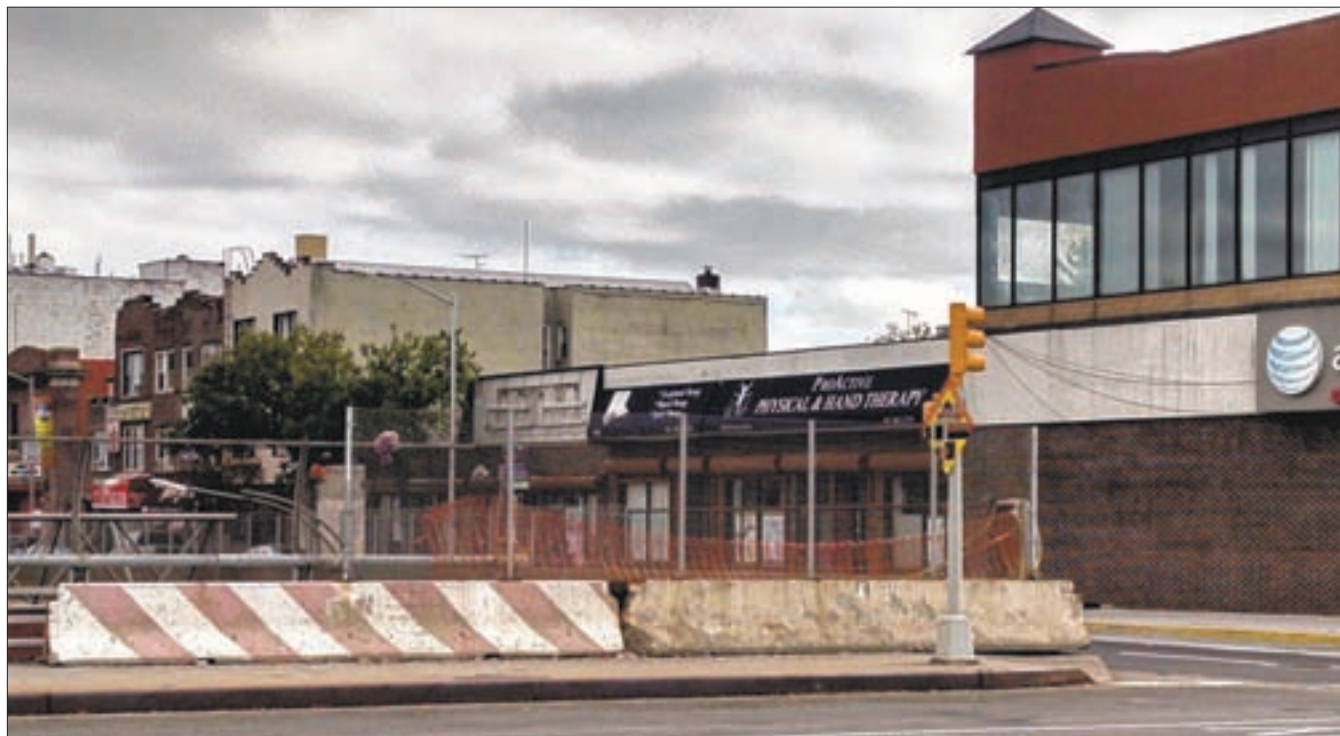
A damaged highway overpass barrier in the Bronx will soon be fixed.

According to a New York State Department of Transportation spokesperson, the wall located at the intersection of East Tremont Avenue and Bruckner Boulevard, over the Bruckner Expressway, is expected to be repaired within the next few months after a horrific car accident took place at the site nearly a year and a half ago.

The steel bridge rail on the southeast portion of the overpass was damaged in late June of 2014, when a 26-year-old male, driving a 2012 Chevy Cruze at about 10:50 p.m. eastbound on the Bruckner service road broke through the barrier, plunging 23 feet onto the Bruckner Expressway, according to the NYPD.

He was removed to Jacobi Medical Center where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

A temporary fence was immediately installed by NYS-DOT to seal off the opening. A

concrete barrier was also installed at the site.

A roadside memorial, that included candles and photos, was set up by the deceased's

family and friends.

A NYSDOT spokesperson stated that the new bridge rail is expected in approximately three weeks.

The agency also noted that the installation is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

"We would have liked to

have seen this repaired a lot sooner, but it's good that this situation is finally being handled," said a Community Board 10 spokesperson.

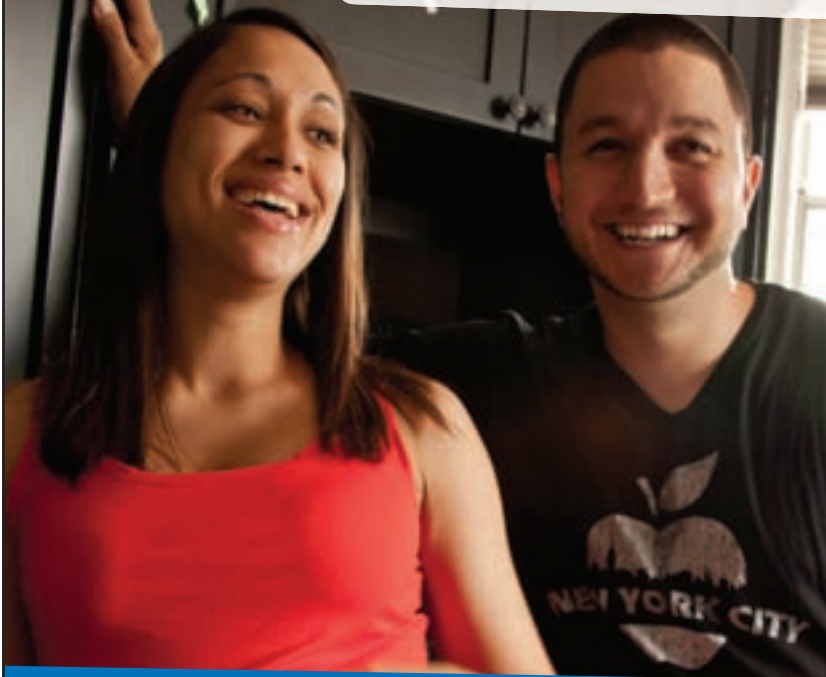

Sidewalks, curbs replaced at Parkside Houses

Improvements to a substantial portion of the sidewalks surrounding Parkside Houses has residents and local community members breathing a sigh of relief.

The stretch from White Plains Road between Arnow and Adea avenues, outside of the New York City Housing Authority Development, has new pavement after more than 10 years of being a tripping hazard to pedestrians, especially seniors, according to sources with knowledge of the situation.

The \$132,200 renovation was celebrated on Tuesday, September 29 at the housing complex.

The improvement was lauded by Polly Trottenberg, city Department of Transportation commissioner; Congressman Joseph Crowley; Councilman Ritchie Torres, who advocated for the improvements; Tony Vitaliano, Community Board 11 chairman and Jeremy Warneke, CB 11 district manager; and community leaders, including Arlene Drayton, Parkside Resident Council secretary, Parkside Resident Council and CB 11 board member.

Funding for sidewalk repairs both at NYCHA developments and citywide have been increased recently, according to sources.

"For too long, Parkside Houses' sidewalks were ranked the worst in all of NYCHA's housing stock," said Torres. "These newly repaired sidewalks, made possible by increased city funding, will provide safer streets for hundreds of residents."

Councilman Torres said that he looks forward to seeing more necessary sidewalk repairs done in a timely manner at other NYCHA projects.

Drayton said she was compelled to advocate for the repairs after a fellow community activist, who was in a wheelchair and concerned about the condition of the sidewalk, passed away.

"Specifically, (the sidewalk in this area) was cracked, caving in and there were a lot of holes," said Drayton. "There are a many senior citizens in this area, and we had a lot of near misses, meaning accidents where pedestrians could have fallen."

The advocacy for repairs to this stretch of sidewalk began with many 311 calls, with complaint numbers subsequently forwarded to CB 11, she said.

The effort intensified when Drayton was appointed to the community board, she added.

Councilman Torres was especially helpful in getting DOT's attention, said Drayton.

And the repairs were surely needed, she said, adding that there was one spot that had collapsed.

"It has been tremendous," said Drayton of the repairs. "I have heard people say how happy they are and that they can walk without (fear of) falling, especially the seniors."

Before the repairs, the sidewalk symbolized the condition of the Parkside Houses. Now, it seems like an asset, he indicated.

Congressman Crowley thanked DOT for the repairs.

"New Yorkers do more walking than anyone else in the country and it's imperative that our defective sidewalks are replaced and maintained to prevent pedestrian injuries," said the congressman.

A spokeswoman for NYCHA suggested that the repairs contribute to an overall goal of fulfilling the vision of a new reinvestment program, Next-Generation NYCHA.

"These vital physical repairs and improvements help protect the infrastructure of our developments, and make our streets safer for residents to navigate," she stated.

Almost 12,000 square feet of concrete sidewalk was replaced, including new curbs and pedestrian ramps.

Answers unclear in CI bridge mishap

A clear reason still has not emerged as to why a piece of a new temporary bridge between City Island and Pelham Bay Park failed recently.

The section of the new temporary bridge, described by NYC Department of Transportation officials at a recent community meeting on City Island, as a pie-shaped section at a turn, partially collapsed on the morning on Monday, September 21 while asphalt was being poured, multiple sources have confirmed.

Principal contractor Tutor Perini, is building a temporary bridge so that it can remove and then replace the existing City Island Bridge.

The company declined to comment through a spokesman, who said that its contract with the city requires DOT to respond to media inquiries.

DOT officials meet with concerned City Island residents at a monthly City Island Civic Association meeting on Tuesday, September 29.

Attendees of the meeting said afterwards that they were pleased by the agency's attention

to the matter, but that they were still waiting for official findings as to the cause of the incident.

"(DOT officials) said that until they know what needs to happen to fix the bridge, they will not open it," said John Doyle, CICA corresponding secretary, adding "They said it was probably a design flaw."

The CICA was promised access to an official report into the incident once it becomes available, he said, and that the agency believes that there may need to install an additional brace on the temporary bridge.

A Tutor Perini subcontractor designed the temporary bridge, according to DOT, Doyle added, and he said that DOT officials said the temporary bridge would be tested before it was opened.

The opening of the temporary bridge has been repeatedly delayed.

Barbara Dolensek, CICA second vice-president, said she thought it took a great deal of courage for DOT officials to attend the civic meeting.

"We assume that DOT is

waiting for some explanation...as to the error," said Dolensek, adding "We don't know where the fault lies because we don't know what the cause was."

The community definitely wants the new temporary bridge to be tested for strength before it opens, she said.

"I am just glad this happened before people started traveling over it," she said, adding that she does not think that the bridge should open before tests are done to see if it can withstand the weight of tractor-trailer trucks and heavy vehicular traffic.

According to James Breen, a filmmaker working on a documentary called 'The New City Island Bridge,' and who was filming nearby when the damage occurred, said that the part of the bridge that collapsed did not fall into the water, but onto land on the Pelham Bay Park side of the bridge.

The crash brought numerous construction supervisors to the scene to examine the damage, he said, adding that he witnessed the immediate

aftermath of the incident but not the collapse itself.

The new temporary bridge runs alongside the existing

City Island Bridge, which dates back to the early 20th century, and remains in use.

After 20 years, Prospect Ave. streets calmed

Residents concerned about speeding on their local streets have been heard.

Councilman Ritchie Torres was able to work with the NYC Department of Transportation to get three speed bumps installed in a three-block stretch on Prospect Avenue between East 182nd and East 183rd streets.

One was installed on each of three blocks between the

two intersections.

The recent installation comes after decades of speeding on the quiet, residential street, said local residents, who gathered with Councilman Torres on Friday, October 2 to celebrate the installations.

"You have an active community here in Twin Parks which had been clamoring for some kind of traffic improvement for years," said Council-

man Torres. "Obviously there is a lengthy process of studying traffic, and after the process was done, we were able to persuade (the Department of Transportation) to install speed bumps here."

Torres credited Constance Moran, Bronx DOT commissioner, as a strong partner in the effort.

He said he had personally reached out to her and she was unfailingly responsive.

The community also demonstrated overwhelming support, he said.

"We believe in the mayor's vision of Vision Zero," he said. "It is important that we put speed bumps in place to prevent traffic fatalities and injuries; pedestrian safety is a priority in this community."

Francene Miller, president of the nearby Twin Parks LP Tenants Association said that speeding on the street had been in issue for years.

One of her friends was killed by a speeding car at Grote Street and Prospect Avenue in the early 1990s, she said.

"She was on her way to

church," said Miller. "She stepped off the curb and a car backing up killed her."

It was at that time that she and her neighbors began petitioning and advocating for traffic safety.

Later, another senior was knocked off of her motorized scooter on Prospect Avenue, she added.

She was pleased with the change, the culmination of about 20 years of efforts.

"People slow down now when they get here because they cannot go fast," she said, adding "We have a lot of children in Twin Parks crossing from one side (of the street) to the other."

Lorreine Matthews, who has lived in the community a year and a half, said that speed humps are a big change in terms of traffic.

She commended Councilman Torres for his help.

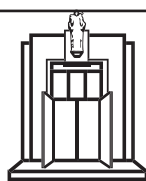

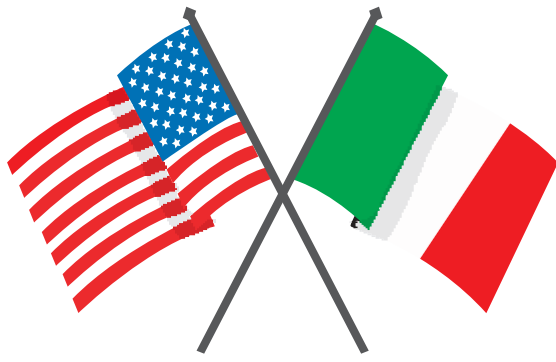

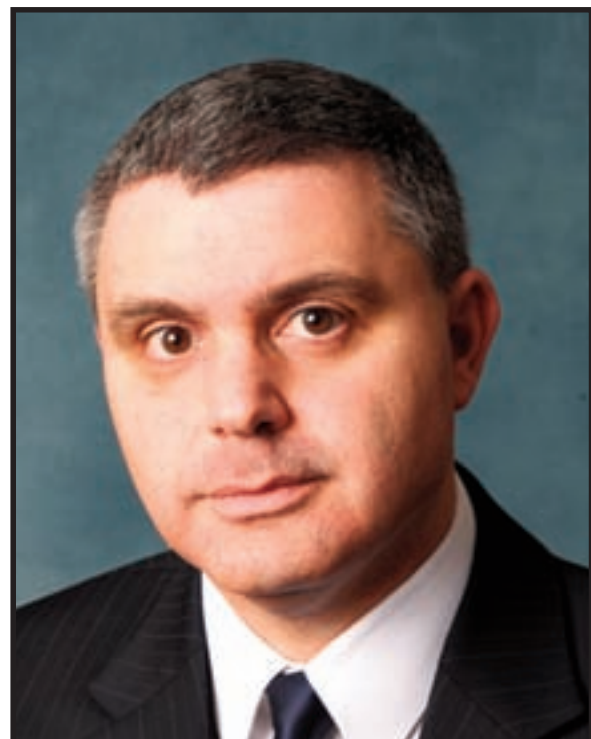

A growing trend towards incredibly bad decision-making on the part of America's leadership in foreign and military affairs has been well-illustrated in the strange case of Sgt. 1st Class Charles Martland.

Sgt. Martland, a heroic Green Beret who has been awarded two Bronze Stars, faces both a reprimand and a dismissal from the Army because he defended a child from a rapist, and the child's mother from a vicious beating from that rapist.

As described at military.com. Sgt. Martland, serving in Afghanistan with an elite unit "beat up an Afghan police commander he was supposed to be mentoring because he was fed up with the commander's 'brutal' sexual abuse of a village boy... A one-star general reprimanded Martland after the September 2011 incident for a 'flagrant departure from the integrity, professionalism and even-tempered leadership I expect from all soldiers of this command, but especially a Special Forces professional'....He likely will be discharged in November because the discipline handed to him for assaulting the Af-

ghan made him a target for Army downsizing. Veteran soldiers with negative performance reviews in their service records are being culled from the ranks as part of the post-Iraq War drawdown."

In its determined attempt to reduce the size of the U.S. military, excuses are being manufactured by the Obama Administration to eliminate as many service members as possible. Recently, experienced U.S. Army majors, some serving in the field in Afghanistan, and key Navy personnel, including chiefs, have been let go.

If this year's expected cuts go into effect, the United States Army will be smaller than its North Korean counterpart. China's Navy will be larger than America's within five years. Russia, for the first time since the dawn of the atomic age, now has a larger and more modern nuclear force than the U.S. The U.S. Air Force is at a historically low level.

The punishment levied against Sgt. Martland has incurred the anger of many, including Rep. Duncan Hunter, (R-California) who has petitioned Defense Secretary Ashton Carter concerning the matter, and retired Lt.

Gen. (US Army-Ret.) William "Jerry" Boykin, now serving as executive vice president of the Family Research Council. That organization is currently circulating a petition opposing the punishment being given to Martland.

According to the group, "While most of us would consider the act of trying to stop the sexual abuse of a child as a normal human response, Sgt. Martland was reprimanded for this action...Sgt. Martland's case is unfortunately not unique. While the sexual abuse of children is widespread in Afghanistan, the New York Times reports, 'Among American military personnel and civilians who served in Afghanistan, it was well known that many wealthy and prominent Afghans rape boys, often making them dress up as women and dance at gatherings during which they are assaulted — and that Western officials often turned a blind eye to the practice for fear of alienat-

ing allies.' What does it mean to be an American soldier? If our brave men and women must turn away from such atrocities in the name of not alienating allies, do we stand for anything anymore?"

While punishing Martland for doing the right thing is, in itself, a cause for concern and protest, what does the move to censure this American hero say about the mindset of U.S. leadership?

Clearly, the mindset of the Obama Administration is that America is almost always wrong in its relations with the world. This has been evident in the President's 'Apology Tour' of Islamic nations early in his administration. It has been evident in the Obama-Clinton 'Reset' with Russia, in which the Kremlin was essentially green-lighted to become the leading military power on the planet. And it is most clearly seen in its energetic attempts to slash the U.S. military budget and demoralize America's soldiers, sailors, marines and airmen.

During the tenure of the Obama Administration, the U.S. has been reduced from being the world's only superpower to being an impotent non-player on the world stage.

Russian forces have invaded Ukraine, threaten Eastern Europe, and have become a major force in the Middle East. Moscow's military has become a force in Latin America. China has invaded and stolen off-shore possessions belonging to the Philippines, and Beijing is constructing naval bases on disputed islets which will soon give it a stranglehold over an area through which 70% of the world's commerce flows.

The lack of appreciation for the services of Americans serving abroad extends beyond the military. It could be seen in the White House's failure to even attempt to rescue Ambassador Stevens and his staff when they were attacked in Benghazi, and the lack of any substantial follow-up in the aftermath of that assault.

The miscarriage of justice being administered to Sgt. Martland is a symbol of the utter contempt the Obama Administration has both for America's service members and America's role in the world.

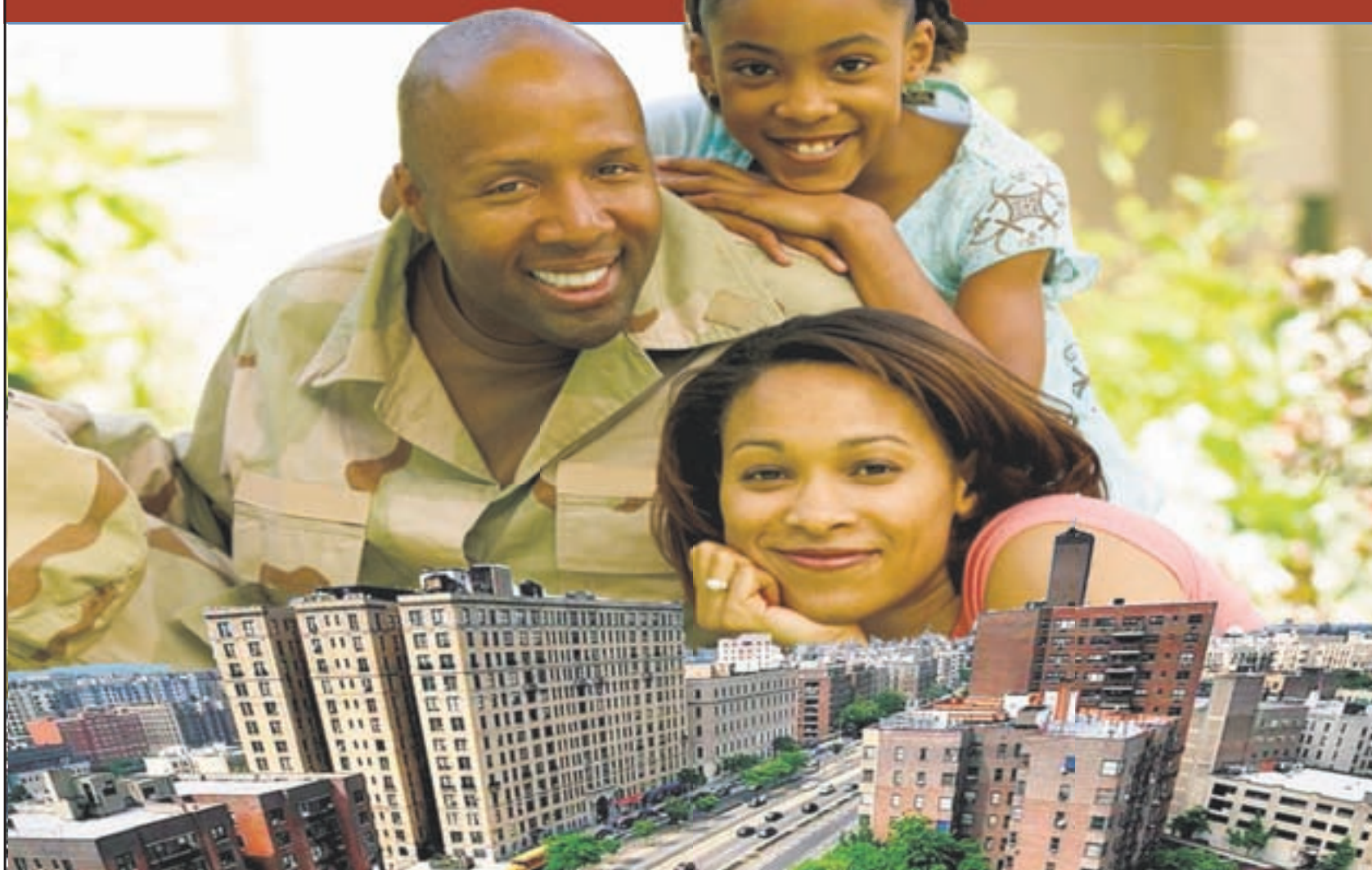

New movie gets really inside Lenore's neighborhood

Queens!

As if it wasn't enough that the Lonely Planet recommended it as the No. 1 tourist destination in all of America this year, along comes the world's leading documentary filmmaker, Frederick Wiseman, to make an entire film — a *three-hour* film — about Jackson Heights.

Wiseman debuted his movie at the New York Film Festival on Sunday night, and stayed to answer questions, beginning with, "Why Jackson Heights?" His answer: "Because it's the most diverse place in the world."

It also happens to be where I live. So perhaps you're wondering what it is like to see so much of your own neighborhood on the big screen — its people, food stands, puppy groomers, Hindu temples, jazz musicians, taxi driver teachers, 98-year-old jokers and, in the one scene that will make its way into every film class for the rest of the century, its live chickens as they go in a matter of minutes from cage to knife to de-feathering vat to being sawed into chicken parts?

Frankly, it is appalling. And at other times (and other scenes), it is exhilarating. Sometimes it is hilarious, sometimes it is embarrassing and sometimes — too many times — it is boring in the way that real life can also be arm-grawlingly dull.

A veteran of 40 films, Wiseman is known for making the proverbial fly-on-the-wall type of documentaries: no narration, no explanations, no captions except for translations. The scenes speak for themselves. So when he drops into a cramped mosque where the Imam is chanting Ramadan prayers, all we know is that this is a local place that, for many of us, has been off-limits. Then he shows us the faces of the men there — some intense and mournful, but some just plain sleepy — and slowly this "other world" starts to feel familiar. Maybe you've never been in a mosque. But you've probably been in a religious service at some point in your life, and you have probably seen (or felt) those same emotions.

Likewise, when he wan-

ders into an eyebrow threading salon and watches a worker plucking out facial hairs with the speed of an AK47, there is something familiar about her, too. She is as focused as a surgeon. The exotic, once again, becomes a little less so.

That, to me, was what was so embarrassing about the movie. As a gal who lives here and likes to feel I really know my neighborhood, the shameful truth is that I've poked my head into only a tiny fraction of the places Wiseman sallied into. He takes us into belly

dancing classes and transgender support groups. Gay bars and straight bars. A Holocaust memorial. A conference call in Councilman Daniel Dromm's office. He even gets up close — very close — to the tough toenails being clipped at a mani-pedi salon. I don't think I've ever looked that closely at my own toenails, much less a stranger's. There is nothing that Wiseman isn't curious about.

The church just two blocks from where I live — the fantastically beautiful St. Joan of Arc — is filled to capacity for services in Spanish, with a priest who is simply enthralling. But I don't speak Spanish and I'm not Catholic, so I'd never wandered in. Wiseman is not a Catholic and he doesn't speak Spanish, either. But he filmed the heart-soaring scene there, complete with, once again, a sleepy parishioner.

Like a great painter, Wiseman highlights the humanity in all his subjects — including, sometimes, the human capacity to drive people crazy by talking too much.

This is what will keep some

viewers away from Wiseman's film: He counterpoints his fascinating chunks of daily life with stupefying meetings.

A community meeting about commercial rents. A community meeting about age and sex and gender, transgender, economic, gay, ethnic discrimination. A community meeting where participants discuss, at length, where to hold the next community meeting. Then another and another and another. Most of these seem to feature one speaker who gets up, takes the microphone, and then manages to ignore all the other people in the room as they start sighing, fidgeting, and finally being barely able to remain polite as the minutes tick by.

To be able to sit through those meetings is perhaps the biggest testament to Wiseman's heart. They're part of the fabric of Jackson Heights life, and he wasn't going to miss them. Though, frankly, I'd rather watch a toenail trimming.

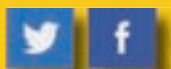

A cloudy, blustery morning is so much better than the hurricane that we were fearing a few days ago. The weather gods have complied and we can look forward to a few days of sunny weather in the 70s. Perfect weather for getting the garden cleaned up!

For me, both compost piles are in need of cleaning up, so at least one day this week will be spent on sifting so that I can add the chopped up remains of 2015's plants. For those who don't have a compost pile, this is the perfect opportunity to add your garden trimmings to the organics collections.

Many people are still grossed out by the idea of composting their food scraps and refuse to participate in the Department of Sanitation's efforts to collect organic waste. While I will agree that the process is a bit messy in the summer time, there are many things you can do to avoid or diminish the bugs and other creepy crawlies.

First of all, if you have space in your freezer, keep a container with food scraps so that you can dump them in the brown bin on the day of collection. Frozen food waste won't attract the fruit flies and gnats that love the countertop container. Food stained paper towels, napkins and cardboard are all considered organic waste. Putting these items in your brown bin helps to collect the moisture from the food scraps. Always rinse out the brown bin after collections.

If you still don't want to put

your food waste in the brown bin, then continue putting it in your regular garbage with your non organic waste so that when you put your kitchen garbage bag into your regular garbage pail on the sidewalk, with the lid that may or may not blow off during the night, it can easily be accessed by the many feral cats, raccoons, rats and other creatures that roam our streets.

That way, when the bags are ripped open and the garbage is strewn all over your sidewalk, you can blame our mayor on all your problems.

On one of the local community group Facebook pages, a member of the group asked about what to do with the brown bins. As a master composter, I stuck my two cents in and explained that they are used for all organic waste and offered to speak at a community meeting to explain more about the bins and the NYC Compost Program. The reply I got back was that this person doesn't bother to do any recycling (plastic, glass and otherwise), because it was too much of a hassle. I replied that I didn't have the time to waste explaining composting to someone who has no intention of participating in the program.

It amazes me how something that humans have done for centuries upon centuries is now so foreign to us that we react with such horror and disgust and misplaced anger (sorry folks, you can't blame organics composting on the mayor). Composting our organic materials, whether they be food or yard waste is an es-

sential part of the cycle of nature.

We, as citizens of this earth, have got to start to realize that our city is trying to be innovative in their attempts to create a more sustainable city. I think that the fact that we, a city of over 8 million people, are trying to create programs attempted by cities one tenth our size is something to be proud of. But I'm a glass half full kind of person...

Once I finish sifting the compost I will utilize it to fill in the raised beds in my backyard, my neighbors (where I am expanding my permaculture experiment with plots of mint, lamb's quarters, stinging nettle, wild celery, arugula and cherry tomatoes) and at the garden at Preston High School. This 'black gold' is why the garden does what it does and why I find surprises like the cantaloupes that have now grown for two years in a row.

My other project for the fall is to build a shelter around the artichoke plants. If you remember, last year I got one of the three artichoke plants I grew to produce a single artichoke. Nevertheless, I was thrilled at this success. I did some reading on how to protect these perennial vegetables over the winter, but the plants did not survive. In the spring, once I realized that

last year's plants were goners, I seeded directly into the bed and now have four good sized plants growing. My husband promised to help me build a shelter and wrap it in heavy duty greenhouse plastic. I am determined to make this work!

Our CSA shares are getting very heavy now that the fall vegetables are being harvested. Every week, we seem to be getting two pounds of potatoes! The potatoes we get are fresh from the ground, not like the ones you get in the grocery store which came from the other side of the country in Idaho and are quite often at least a month old before they arrive in your fridge.

The potatoes we get are so fresh they will last in our refrigerators until December. Once they start getting a little soft to the touch, I recommend either making a huge batch of roasted potatoes or making some creamed vegetable soup bases.

We also just started getting Butternut Squash. This is a vegetable I never used until we joined a CSA. Winter Squash is such a delicious and nutritious addition to our diets. Butternut Squash, Acorn Squash and Pumpkin can all be used interchangeably. Acorn and Pumpkin can be a pain to peel, so I usually cut them in half, scrape out the seeds and steam them in the oven in ¼" of water at 425 degrees until the flesh is soft enough to scoop out. I run the flesh through a food mill to give it a smooth texture and I use the flesh for soup, to stuff a vegetable la-

sagna or as the base for a pudding. We get a winter squash almost every week, so freezing the pureed flesh in labeled Ziploc bag is essential keep up with it and avoid wasting any. Many a Winter meal has been saved by a bag of pureed squash!

Butternut Squash is my favorite because of its smooth skin and this makes it a more versatile Winter Squash. For our demo at last week's CSA, I created a Roasted Butternut Squash Salad that was a huge hit. First, I peeled two squash, cut them in half and scooped out the seeds. Then I cut the squash into ½" cubes and placed them in a glass baking dish. I tossed the squash with 2 tablespoons of olive oil, salt, pepper, 1 teaspoon dried thyme and 2 teaspoons of Chestnut honey. Into a preheated 425 degree oven for 20 minutes, a toss then back in for another 20 minutes. I served it over a bed of wild arugula (from my garden), cherry tomatoes (from the CSA) and then dressed the salad with Basic Balsamic Vinaigrette. I topped the salad with a sprinkling of wild arugula blossoms and borage flowers. The Chestnut honey, which I've had in my pantry for a couple of years (the taste is powerful!), is the perfect addition to this recipe as it adds a subtle nuttiness to the dish. However, any type of honey will be fine.

Even if you aren't in a CSA, you will find plenty of winter squash in the farmer's markets. And don't forget, that Halloween Pumpkin is edible too!

We are disappointed that it took the city so long in informing our leadership of this danger. When they were informed they were quick to respond and demanded an-

swers as to why it took so long to get the word out and why the towers weren't cleaned immediately.

We know the disease emanates from cooling system in water towers, so why not clean them all immediately; instead we tested them, waited for the results and then cleaned them. That took over a week,

a week that could have cost lives in this community. So to save money our lives were put at risk.

The community thanks our elected officials for demanding a town hall meeting and getting the word out to the community to ease our concerns and gave us the facts.

Our hats are off to one of our newest businesses in the community, Urgent Health Care located on Hone and Morris Park avenues. They immediately opened their doors to the community and

offered free screening for Legionnaire's Disease and they absorbed the cost. It is refreshing to see there are still some people who put people before dollars.

Just a reminder The Morris Park Columbus Day festivities begins with Mass at 10 a.m. at St Dominick's followed by a continental breakfast thanks to a donation from Senator Jeff Klein. The march will begin at noon sharp and the day will end with a concert in Loretto Park at 5:30 p.m.. Join your neighbors for a festive day.

Latest exhibition at Hebrew Home at Riverdale

The Derfner Judaica Museum + The Art Collection at Hebrew Home at Riverdale announces its latest exhibition, Different Views: Bronx Paintings by William P. Folchi and John Folchi. The exhibition, which is the first ever to show the work of the father and son artists together, will be on view in the Elma and Milton A. Gilbert Pavilion Gallery from October 4, 2015–January 31, 2016.

William P. Folchi (1922–1992) and John Folchi (b. 1955) have depicted the Bronx more than a half-century apart, and, though different in style, their small-scale works provide stunning views onto the visual landscape of the borough. They both approach the borough from different points of view—William P. Folchi finds most of his subjects out-of-doors, rendering a slice of the urban vista; John Folchi

selects close-up views of what we see when we look down.

William P. Folchi's paintings in this exhibition depict the Bronx from 1956–1960 mostly around the neighborhoods of his Morris Park home and Pelham Parkway automotive business. Although Folchi studied at the Art Students' League in New York, he never publicly exhibited during his lifetime. In 2012, however, another son, William O. Folchi, rediscovered dozens of paintings in the basement of the family home, bringing to light the full breadth of his work. The paintings capture a bygone era—bucolic views of Williamsbridge Road before it was commercially developed, a vacant lot at the corner of Lydig Avenue now occupied by a gas station, and green backyards strung with clotheslines. Many of the works are

painted from the elevated perspective of a window in the family's Yates Avenue home, giving the impression that the viewer is catching a glimpse of something fleeting.

Both artists present the Bronx in fragments, focusing on extracted views rendered from what is commonplace and may be easily overlooked unless observed with the artist's eye.

John Folchi earned an MFA from Lehman College in 1979, and has had solo exhibitions at such venues as Sears Peyton Gallery, Greenpoint Gallery (Brooklyn), Just Art Gallery (Providence, RI), and the Kimmel Galleries at New York University. His work is in the permanent collections of Pfizer, Fidelity Investments, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Care Center, and private collections. William P.

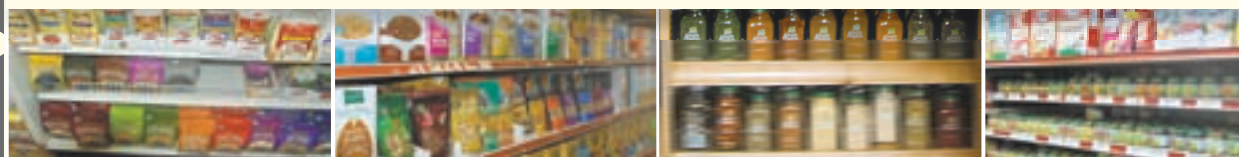

Billy Three Crows interred locally

do you remember

Anthony Pisciotta, noted genealogist Jim Murray and I spent some time at St. Raymond's Cemetery on Wednesday, October 5 searching for the whereabouts of Billy Three Crows. Billy was also known as Billy Three Claws and was originally from South Dakota.

He was the son of Shoot-the-Cat and grandson of the popular Sioux Chief, Sitting Bull (1831-1890). Sitting Bull fought in many a war with the white men and was killed in an altercation with a federal agent on December 15, 1890.

Prior thereto, he was an important figure in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show where he was paid \$50 per week plus whatever he could earn by having his picture taken with tourists. It brought him a sizable income, but being a generous man, he gave most of his money to the homeless and indigent.

Billy Three Crows followed in his grandfather's footsteps and also rode in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. After a year, he returned to South Dakota to recover from a serious injury from being thrown from

a horse, but he returned to the show in October of 1898. Severe pain caused him to be admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital at 525 East 143rd Street in the Bronx on November 22, 1898 where he was treated for a serious lung disease (phthisis pulmonalis - asthenia) later called tuberculosis. He died at St. Joseph's Hospital on January 8, 1899 at 2:30 p.m.

He was a Roman Catholic, as was his grandfather Sitting Bull, and had asked to be buried in consecrated ground when he died. Thus it was that the hospital purchased some grave sites at St. Raymond's Cemetery for him and other indigent Catholics and that's where Billy Three Crows was laid to rest.

According to his death certificate, he was only 21 years old. We also know that he was six feet tall and weighed 180 pounds as Casper Mayer (1871-1931), the famous sculptor of

Native Americans created a statue of him.

Before arriving at the cemetery, Jim had already contacted them and obtained the location of the grave site. It was Jim, by the way, who uncovered the fact that Billy Three Crows was interred at St. Raymond's and he had Geri Neumann do some research on the newspaper articles.

While searching for the grave site, we noticed that the letters and numbers in Section four were somewhat confusing and we had a difficult time pinpointing the actual grave. Jim contacted the cemetery again and they were extremely helpful. They sent over a couple of workers with a grave marker which they inserted into the ground for us so there would be no mistake. We duly noted the location and paid our respects to Billy Three Crows, the wild west actor and grandson of the legendary Sioux warrior, Sit-

ting Bull.

Billy Three Crows is the only Native American that I know of interred at St. Raymond's Cemetery. There are other people buried in the same plot due to their being indigent and it adds to the problem of having a gravestone installed. All parties buried in the same grave would have to have their names inscribed on the memorial and that only serves

to complicate things further. Then there is the problem of finding a benefactor to donate a granite headstone.

It's not an easy task, but at least we've located the grave and outlined the problem so it was a well-spent visit to St. Raymond's Cemetery.

I should add, however, that the Sitting Bull family tree denies knowing anything about Billy Three Crows.

Rich Cimini (ESPNNY) wrote, "The New York Jets didn't do many things right on Sunday. One of them came after the game. Todd Bowles was asked if Geno Smith could "move up the depth chart" -- clever phrasing by a reporter -- and the coach shut down any notion of a potential Smith-for-Ryan Fitzpatrick change.

"Ryan's our starter," Bowles said matter-of-factly.

St. Peter's hands Hayes first loss

Running back Bobby Wing and the St. Peter's offense are built to wear its opponents down. For the two and half quarters Cardinal Hayes held firm against the Eagles' attack before seeing the ground-and-pound style begin to take its toll.

The Cardinals, leading by a point, failed to capitalize on recovering a fumble to start the second half before watching St. Peter's offense do exactly what it hopes to. The Eagles ended two long drives with touchdowns to pull away and beat Hayes 22-13 in CHSFL Class AAA football at the Rooftop last Saturday. It is the Cardinals first loss of the season.

"They run the single wing and the power stuff and just pound the ball on you and you got to stop them and we didn't have the ability to do that today," Hayes coach C.J. O'Neil said.

Wing carried the 47 times for 256 yards and three touchdowns. He was the driving force behind second-half scoring drives of 15 plays for 65 yards and 14 plays for 87 yards that put Hayes down 22-7 with 2:33 left in the game. The Cardinals ran just seven plays between the two touchdowns.

The Cardinals' lone first half score came when Williams scooped up a fumble caused by Jawaun Jones and took it 90 yards for a score to put his team up 7-6 with 7:51 to play before the break.

"I was there to pick it up and take it to the house," Williams said.

Hayes (3-1, 2-1) had a chance to add to the lead when Carlos Fernandez stripped the ball from

Mike Brech on the opening kickoff of the second half and set his offense up at the Eagles' 32-yard line. Penalties and the inability to run the ball consistency forced the drive to stall at the 22.

Senior running back Justin Covington finally broke free for a 44-yard score to make it 22-13

with 1:14 to play in the game, but was stop on two-point conversion.

"We have to do a better job of running the ball," O'Neil said.

He and his players plan to use the loss as a learning experience heading into a road game against unbeaten Archbishop Stepinac,

the defending champion, next Saturday.

"We had a lot of mistakes, a lot of missed opportunities," Covington said. "But you always learn more from a loss than a win. A loss gives us time to move on and learn from our mistakes and just come back harder."

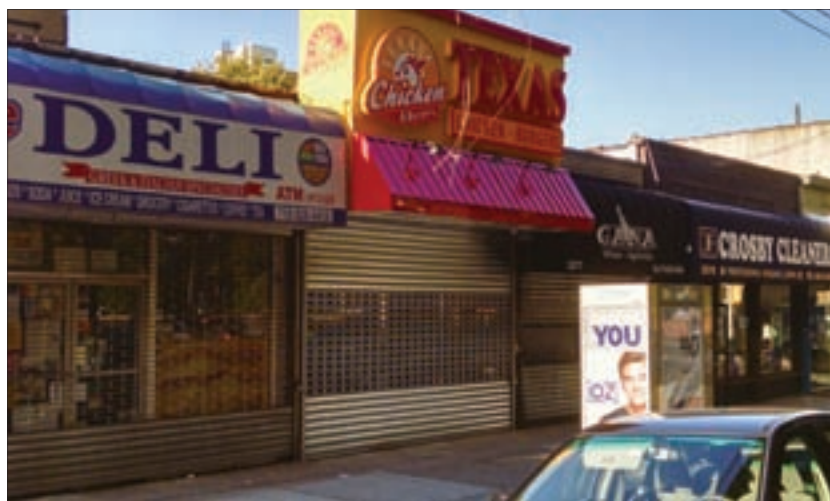

of people with Legionnaires' in the Bronx and looked for a connection between them and 10461.

"We added them to the cluster not because they were newly sick, but because they were identified by this link," she said.

Fifteen cooling towers including Chase Bank at 2725 E. Tremont Avenue; Calvary Hospital at 1740 Eastchester Road; Lehman High School at 2964 E. Tremont Avenue; Bronx State Psychiatric at 1500 Waters Place and ones located at Einstein College of Medicine's 1199 Sackett Avenue, 1845 Eastchester Road, 1301 Morris Park Avenue, 1250 Morris Park Avenue, 1865 Eastchester Road and 1925-1935 Eastchester Road, that tested positive have since been disinfected.

Cooling towers at Jack D. Weiler Hospital of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine at 1825 Eastchester Road tested negative for Legionella, the bacteria that causes Legionnaires'.

In accordance with Local Law 77 of 2015 which became effective on August 18, 2015; cooling towers must be registered with NYC Department of Buildings prior to initial operation and existing ones must register with DOB within 30 days of the law's enactment; owners and operators are required to annually certify the cooling towers have been inspected, tested, cleaned and disinfected with compliance of the law and must be performed in accordance with DOHMH regulations.

DOHMH said positive cooling towers must submit a long-term maintenance plan to the health department to keep them free of the bacteria causing Legionnaires'.

Legionella bacterium is characterized by pneumonia-type symptoms that occurs two to 14 days after exposure through inhaling contaminated water mist from cooling towers, whirlpool spas, showers and faucets.

The disease can be treated with antibiotics and early treatment helps reduce the possibility of serious compli-

cations.

There is no vaccination for the disease.

On Thursday, October 1, Senator Jeff Klein and Assemblyman Mark Gjonaj announced prior to the town hall meeting their offices would partner with ProHealth Urgent Care located at 1049 Morris Park Avenue for free Legionnaires' disease evaluations and treatment for seniors and uninsured residents.

ProHealth Urgent Care started offering evaluations and treatment on Friday, October 2 and will continue doing so until Sunday, October 11.

Senior citizens and uninsured residents residing in the 10461 or 10462 zip codes can walk in Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. or Saturday and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. if they experience Legionnaires' disease symptoms. Co-pays will be waived.

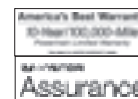
