

# **RODMAN'S NECK \$\$ YANKED BY MAYOR**

### Funds to rebuild, abate gun range not budgeted

East Bronx communities feel they have been betrayed by City Hall after the mayor again sidelined the planned reconstruction of a police facility.

Mayor de Blasio left out a multimillion dollar allocation in his recently released Fiscal Year 2016-2017 executive budget that would have been earmarked for the reconstruction of the police firing range at Rodman's Neck next to Pelham Bay Park.

The budget was to have included the much needed sound gun range.

Community leaders at the City Island Civic Association, who had been advocating for sound abatement for over two decades, were disappointed.

The budget for FY 2016-2017 is scheduled to go into effect on Friday, July 1.

Councilman James Vacca said prior to the release of the mayor's budget that he fully expected a \$150 million appropriation for sound attenuation at the range.

The councilman said he had been advised that plans to reconstruct the Rodman's Neck

abatement funding to quiet the police facility and add sound controls were completed, and that the NYPD had submitted one of the plans to the mayor in time to be included in this year's budget.

However, a source in the mayor's office disputed the councilman's assertion.

Vacca said that it would appear that the mayor's politics have once again gotten in the way of progress.

"It is incomprehensible that our city would not allocate funds to a facility that is essential for the training

# Move forward with armory plans: judge

The disagreement between the city and developers of the proposed Kingsbridge National Ice Center is now in court.

On Monday, May 16, it was time for both sides (Mayor de Blasio / the NYC Economic Development Corporation and KNIC) to lawyer up, as a court hearing was held as a result of a lawsuit filed last month.

The hearing was held before Judge Ruben Franco on the sixth floor of the Bronx Supreme Court.

Judge Franco ordered the city and state agencies to compose a letter stating that they are fully committed to a loan in order for construction and re-development to begin on what is believed to be the largest armory in the world.



Cocucci, 17, said that she believes it is important for young people to be involved in their community because eventually they are going to be the long-established community members and that they could learn from their elders as to what works and does not work in their neighborhood.

She said that it is exciting to see that young people care about the community.

"I was at the right place at the right time, and I started to enjoy the meetings," said Cocucci of her involvement.

The youth organization attracted high school-aged teens because many need service hours to complete their academic programs, she said.

Before the creation of the Youth Leadership Council, Caserta said wanted to get involved in her community but did not see an outlet to do so.

After her mother and a neighbor advised her to attend a CCCA meeting, and she asked what she could do, the formation of the council for youth took shape with Cocucci, she said.

"I am really passionate about helping people and I seek leadership opportunities because I feel that I am good communicating with other people and organizing projects," said Caserta. "For me to have this opportunity to get involved in my neighborhood is just amazing."

Teenagers who are interested in learning more about the Youth Leadership Council, or who are interested in becoming members, can attend CCCA meetings, typically held the second Wednesday of the month at Villa Maria Academy's cafeteria.

"We are documenting ser-

vice hours, and can provide a letter to their current schools, or colleges they are applying to, regarding their volunteer service in the community," stated McNerney.

The CCCA president indicated that he would give the youth some latitude in developing their own agenda.

"We are allotting them the opportunity to be creative thinkers who set much of their own agenda," he stated.



# Supportive, affordable housing for Morris Ave.

A groundbreaking development is underway at 2264 Morris Avenue.

NYS Homes and Community Renewal. NYS Office of Mental Health. NYC Department of Health and NYC Department of Housing Preservation and Development, along with Services for the Underserved, Bronx Pro Group LLC and other project collaborators held a groundbreaking ceremony on Tuesday, May 17.

Located in University Heights, the 11-story, 94-unit affordable housing project developed by Bronx Pro Group LLC and designed by Santoriello Architects, will include 31 supportive units for 17 young adults with mental illness aging out of foster care and other institutions and 14 homeless adults with mental illness.

The remaining 62 affordable housing units will house 14 moderate-income individuals and families and 48 low-income individuals and families earning from \$29,400 to \$50,340 annually

The total development cost for the Morris Avenue Apartments approximates \$47 million and is projected to be completed by December 2017.

The new building being constructed on Morris Avenue between East 182nd and East 183rd streets, will feature 31 studios, 23 one-bedroom units, 25 twobedroom units and 14 three-bedroom apartments in addition to a two-bedroom apartment for the building's superintendent.

It will also include community rooms with computers, on-site laundry facilities, multiple outdoor recreation areas and a 15-space parking lot for tenants.

Residents will have access to onsite supportive services provided by SUS which include individualized

case management and personalized recovery programs based on identified needs, daily life skills training, employment training and job placement services and structured social and recreational activities.

This \$47 million development is being financed by both the state and city.

State funding sources include \$23.5 million in tax-exempt bonds from HCR, \$5.8 million from Governor Cuomo's NYS Medicaid Redesign Team. an \$820,000 Homes for Working Families Loan loan and approximately \$9.3 million in permanent capital funding from OMH.

This long vacant parcel's development will be funded under Mayor de Blasio's Housing New York: A Five Borough, Ten Year Housing Plan with NYC providing a \$7.05 million loan through HPD, federal Housing and Urban Development Section Eight rental vouchers and a 420-c tax abatement.

In addition, OMH will provide debt service payments on a portion of the permanent loan as well as \$857,800 in annual funding for the on-site social services.

Corporation for Supportive Housing has supplied \$3.9 million in acquisition and pre-development funding toward the project.

Chase Community Development Banking will serve as the bond letter of credit provider while Red Stone Equity Partners LLC will act as tax credit investor for the site.

"It's a very unique project because it will serve members from a wide spectrum of society by solving the issue of homelessness, while helping these adults with mental illness to live normal lives," shared Dr. Bola Omotosho, Community Board 5 chairman.

# A ratpack takes over Pel Bay LL's outfield

A Bronx little league is frustrated that its outfield has been taken over by a 'ratpack'.

Pelham Bay Little League field, located at 2680 Westchester Avenue, is plagued with rats, some eight inches long, near the right field bleachers of the ball park.

The rats have been living in that area of the field for about a month.

According to the PBLL, a Dumpster belonging to the Dunkin Domuts at 2973 E. Tremont Avenue, located in an area that abuts that portion of the field, is to blame.

"I'm afraid somebody in the bleachers is going to get bit," said Vinny Prestopino, president of the PBLL for the last ten years. "You see them in the bullpen, you see them in the batting cages - it's almost like they're taking over the field."

Prestopino said he had rat repellent placed on the field over the weekend, but it only kept them away a couple of days.

"These aren't mice that scurry off when they see you," Prestopino said, addding, "They don't seem to be afraid of anything."

The influx of rats may also be the result of recent construction that was done on the Dunkin Donuts parking lot and drive through area, which could have disturbed the rats' underground nesting areas.

Another factor could be the wind blowing the garbage from the Dumpster, onto the field.

This usually happens when the Dumpster lid is open or its overflowing with garbage.

Prestopino said that he has reached out to Councilman James Vacca's office, who has been looking into how to resolve the issue.

Since being contacted by Prestopino, Vacca's office has been in contact with the PBLL and told them to reach out to 311 as well as the Department of Health.

Vacca's office also reached out to Dunkin Donuts to alert them of the situation and asked them to do its part by mediating the compact waste that comes from their establishment.

Due to a wait from 311 and a potential 30-day examination period of the field, this issue could take up to two months to resolve.

"By the time this problem gets fixed, the season might be over," said Prestopino. "My main concern is keeping everybody who comes to the games safe."

The owner of Dunkin Donuts was not available to comment.

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# Bronx teacher awarded \$25G Fishman Prize

A local teacher was recently selected as a recipient of a \$25,000 reward.

Tuesday, May 17, when Evelyn Rebollar, a ninth through twelfth grade English teacher at Bronx Arena High School, learned that she was selected as one of four teachers nationally to receive the 2016 Fishman Prize for Superlative Classroom Practice.

The announcement was shrouded in secrecy.a

A student coaxed Evelyn into the hallway feining she was 'upset' about something.

The student, who remained in character, then led Evelyn to the library, where she was congratulated by fellow teachers, students, family, friends and community leaders who had gathered for the announcement that she had won the prize.

Vidyarthi, vice president of communications at TNTP (formerly known as The New Teacher Project), an organization whose mission is to end the injustice of education inequality by providing excellent teachers to the students who need them most.

Along with cash award, Rebollar will also received a seat at the Fishman Prize Summer Residency, where she will invited to write an essay on

her teaching experiences and meet with education leaders from across the country

Rebollar was born in Washington An announcement was held on Heights, where she spent much of her childhood, although she also lived in Long Island City, Queens and the west Bronx.

> She graduated from Manhattan Village Academy and attended New York University for three and a half years before transferring to CUNY City College, where she majored, specialized and received her Bachelor's degree in Secondary English Education.

> Currently in her fifth year at Bronx Arena High School, Rebollar said she felt privileged, honored and blessed to have been selected to win the award, but also said that she will continue to strive to provide her students with the great education they deserve while becoming an even better teacher.

"It was an incredible feeling to be She was presented the award by Liz a recipient of this award - something I never thought I was capable of," said Rebollar, who is also enrolled at Queens College as a graduate student studying Adolescent English Education. "I know that I have a lot more to learn as an educator, but winning this award is very reassuring that I am on the right path.'

Rebollar credited her eleventh grade English teacher, who was her mentor, for being her greatest influ-

ence and biggest motivation for choosing her profession.

"I want to do for other students what my teacher did for me," Rebollar said. "If I didn't have her, I wouldn't be where I am now."

Rebollar's students, on average, enter her class with a grade point average of 53 out of 100 in English Language Arts, but graduate with an average GPA of 85.

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



#### Dear editor,

It was not without some sense of irony that last week's Bronx Times Reporter carried a photo of Assemblyman Gjonaj's Sanitation Legal Forum because last Saturday I awoke to find a sanitation violation notice taped to my front door. Two of my neighbors also received summonses that morning.

It was a \$100 ticket from the NYC Department of Sanitation for failure to clean 18" from the curb in front of my house under rule 16-118 (2)(A). The offending items were a "piece of tissue paper, a cigar wrapper and other items".

A little internet searching quickly revealed that it didn't matter that I cleaned the front of my house the day before, any debris found during the routing hour of 8to 9 a.m. leaves the homeowner liable to a summons. In other words small pieces of paper blown by the wind, washed down the street by the rain or dropped by a careless commuter on the way to the subway station can easily lead to a ticket despite reasonable efforts by homeowners to maintain the front of their homes.

The way this code is written the tickets are essentially impossible to fight according to an article published in the National Association of Administrative Law Judiciary.

The way this code is enforced is unfair to homeowners. It's revenue generation disguised as taxation without representation plain and simple and in this case you really can't fight City Hall. Homeowners beware.

### Preferential rent scam

#### Dear editor,

On Thursday, June 2 from 6 to 9 p.m. a citywide 'Tenant Town Hall' will be held right here in our borough to put a stop to the sudden, crushing rent hikes hurting thousands of Bronx tenants.

Join the Real Rent Reform 'R3' Campaign, Bronx Park East Community Association and many other housing NYC advocacy groups inside 2448 White Plains Road as we urge our state elected officials to stop the'Preferential Rent Scam' plaguing tens of thousands of NYC rent-stabilized tenants.

What exactly is the Preferential Rent Scam?

Well, let's say you are a tenant. When the landlord of a rent-stabilized building rents you an apartment, there is a limit to how much they can charge you per month - this is the 'Legal Rent'

When a landlord rents an to a resurgent Republican apartment to you for any-

thing less than the legal rent, this lower amount that you'll be paying is called the 'Preferential Rent'.

For example (hypothetically), in 2015 when the landlord rented you your studio, the legal rent was \$1350. But the landlord decided to rent it to you for \$950 - that's a \$400 difference.

You now have a \$950 preferential rent.

Before 2003, if the landlord was renting to you at a preferential rent it would remain your rent (adjusted yearly by the NYC Rent Guidelines Board of course) until you move out.

But in June 2003, when the rent laws were updated the NY Syate legislature snuck in an eleventh hour amendment that allowed landlords to take away the preferential rent - at the end of your lease. This preferential rent law, a.k.a. the 'scam' remains in effect.

So when you go to sign a new one- or two-year lease for your studio this year, you'll be expecting a modest monthly rent increase, let's say 2%.

But instead of going from \$950/month to \$969/month, when the landlord takes away the preferential rent, vour new monthly rent will be \$1365/month per month for your studio apartment.

Wait. Can the landlord legally raise your rent by over \$400 from one year to the next?

Yep. Because as the 2003 law states, the landlord can take away the preferential rent at the end of your lease, no matter how huge the resulting rent increase will be

You'll either have to pay \$1365/month or find somewhere else to live. There is no legal recourse.

This preferential rent scam is forcing residents in the Pelham Parkway/Allerton community, and thousands of other Bronxites, to find second and third jobs to shell out the extra rent. Many are suffering, many have already moved. You know, gentrification.

If you're a tenant, this affects you.

So come to our 'Tenant Town Hall' and urge our Bronx state legislators to stop this scam - not next year, not when the rent laws expire in 2019, but this year.

Tenants, and the rent laws affecting them, have been getting ignored by some state legislators for far too long. It's time that we make all of our Bronx state elected officials fight for the rentstabilized tenant constituents that they are elected to represent. Not just in tenant meetings in rent-stabilized buildings - but in Albany where it matters.

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# NYCHA plans Mill Brook senior housing

A proposed NYC Housing Authority development is slated for Mott Haven in the near future.

On Thursday, May 5, the NYCHA announced a plan to develop three affordable residential buildings in the city, including Mill Brook Terrace, a project that will provide senior housing.

The proposed nine-story development, which will be located within the Mill Brook Houses complex at East 135th Street between St. Ann's and Cypress avenues, will provide 156 new affordable units for low-income seniors.

Currently an accessory parking lot, the property will include a ground floor senior community center, a commercial kitchen, a large dining room, neighborhood community space and activity rooms for senior programming.

Other features planned for the development include a roof-top garden, terraced walls and a public garden area with seating for seniors.

Proposed sustainable fea-

tures include energy efficient windows as well as provision for recyclable and organic composting.

Approximately 30% of the apartments will be set-aside for supportive housing, while 42% of the apartment units will require a 60% area median income, which is about \$43,500 per year for a family of two or \$38,100 for an individual.

The Bronx site's developer is West Side Federation for Senior and Supportive Housing, a non-profit organization with over 40 years of experience in developing, managing and providing social services to seniors living in Manhattan and the Bronx, and is the largest provider of senior housing and services in Mott Haven.

According to NYCHA, the deal with WSFSSH is expected to be finalized by the end of the year, with construction beginning in 2017. The ultimate goal is to have the development leased up with new tenants moving into the building sometime in 2019.



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# **Cove gets \$150G more for dredging**

A long-awaited dredging project is inching closer to become a reality.

The dredging of Hammonds Cove, which has been a top budget priority of Community Board 10, has received an extra \$150,000 in the 2016-17 New York State budget, sources said.

This comes on top of the \$1 million allocation secured by Senator Jeff Klein in the 2015-16 state budget, said Justin Dambinskas, proprietor of the Hammonds Cove Marina, a NYC Parks Department concession.

project is badly needed because boats entering the narrow channel encounter a shallow draft at low tide.

Hurricane Sandy winds deposited a large amount of silt in the cove.

"The hurricane pushed east to west and the inlet silted up across the throat of the creek," said Dambinskas, adding "It is getting almost impassible at low tide, especially for big boats."

This is affecting his busi-

ness, the Hammonds Cove Pat Devine. Marina, as well as the Locust Point Yacht Club, and several private docks along the coastline, said the marina proprietor. All told, about 300 boats are affected, he said.

The NYS Department of **Environmental Conservation** will oversee the project, said Dambinskas.

At present, he is working on preliminary tasks, such as taking soil samples and preparing a topographical survey, he said. However, there are other bureaucratic hurdles to clear.

"It has been a long, drawn Dambinskas said that the out, and pretty disappointing process," he said.

Senator Klein's allocations are much appreciated and should go a long way to seeing the project to fruition, he said.

Right now, it is Dambinskas' hope that the dredging project can get underway when the boating season ends on Monday, October 31.

Another booster of the Hammonds Cove Marina dredging is longtime CB 10 Parks Committee member

"I think this has to be done, and I think it is good for the community," said Devine, who added that the activism for the project really intensified when the FDNY stated in writing that it might have difficulties getting fire boats in and out of the cove at low tide, as previously reported in the Bronx Times.

In a statement, Klein stated he was committed to ensuring that a plan is implemented that serves the best needs of the community.

Dambinskas is looking towards the future, and said it is good that the funding is in place.

The docking spots along the cove are some of the last in the community where people can enjoy recreational boating.



# Jacobi hosts suicide prevention confab

A community advisory board for two borough public hospitals recognized Mental Health Month in May.

The Joint Community Advisory Board of Jacobi Medical Center and North Central Bronx Hospital held a conference on 'Preventing Teen Suicide' on Monday, May 16.

It presented a variety of speakers and information on the subject.

The conference, the sixth annual conference on mental health topics, was held in conjunction with the Jacobi Auxiliary.

It was dedicated to the memory of longtime community activist, the late Blanche Comras-Rifkin, who was a CAB member for three decades, said event coordinator and CAB vice chairwoman Sylvia Lask.

"It is such a timely subject at this point," said Lask, adding that she chose the topic after Peter Cronkite, the grandson of legendary newscaster Walter Cronkite, committed suicide in 2015, days before he was to graduate college.

"This is a kid who came from a wonderful family and there was no one there to help him, and it touched me," she said. "I began looking at statistics and I learned that there is so much suicide among young people and it is going up."

She is not quite sure what is causing the rise in teen suicide, but bullying or concerns about the future could be reasons, she said.

"The comments I got at the conference were just amazing, she said, estimating that there were 130 to 145 attendees.

Among the presenters at the symposium were Tom Templeton, a public policy specialist, and David Woodlock, Institute for Community Living president.

Councilman Andrew Cohen, chair of the council's committee on mental health, and Maryanne Popiel, chair of behavioral healthcare services at Jacobi and North Central Bronx Hospitals, presented remarks.

The keynote speaker was Tom O'Clair, family affairs advocacy specialist with Office of Mental Health who fought to pass a mental health insurance parity law called Timothy's Law, named after his son Timothy O'Clair who committed suicide in 2001 when he was an adolesnent. He presented on the topic of Timothy's Law.

Prior to the passage of the law in 2006, insurance companies could limit the number of outpatient visits per year.

"Any suicide, regardless of age, can be prevented, and in order to prevent it you have to have the proper tools," said O'Clair, who added that the conference opened a door in terms of helping people further their knowledge about suicide prevention and helped dispel some of the myths.

"People walked away with a better understanding of what suicide prevention is and how they can participate in it," he said.

Jacobi interim CEO Chris Fugazy said that the medical community needs to do all it can to increase awareness, education and prevention.

"As the father of two teen girls myself, I cannot imagine the heartache and despair surrounding such tragedies," said Fugazy, adding "I commend our community advisory board, and Lask in particular, for being out in front on this issue."

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

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



The initiative builds upon ongoing projects at BCC, including the Center for Sustainable Energy, which Congressman Serrano helped inaugurate by securing \$5 million in federal funding, and the College Now program. Through College Now, high school students will be able to earn college credits to eventually pursue

The program's ultimate goal is to prepare students and provide them with employable skills in emerging STEM fields related to clean, renewable energy and chemicals using biomass feedstock platforms. It will also serve as a model in preparing students for STEM careers and developing middle employment skills (i.e. skills in computer technology, nursing, high-skill manufacturing, and other fields).

The enormous size of the extension to P.S. 14 will wreak havoc on our community. create a dangerous situation for our students and make learning impossible. It must be reduced in size and we must appeal to every elected to help us bring some sensibility to this project. And it must be done now because the School Construction Authority is working fast.

When something of this magnitude is proposed for any community it should be done with transparency and those in charge should strive for a consensus and not attempt to deceive the community that has to live with it forever.

This is absolutely unacceptable and we should fight this attitude and this project with all of our might!

Right now dismissal time at P.S. 14 is at a dangerous level with double and triple parked cars blocking Crosby Avenue.

Add hundreds more students and the situation becomes even more dangerous for the students and residents of our community. There is no way to solve the problem

at dismissal. If you have staggered dismissals it just compounds the problem. Parents have children in different grades and therefore they will not leave but instead wait for their other children.

So, instead of one hour of a dangerous situation we will have two hours both in the morning and afternoon.

We have a wonderful school now with a beautiful property that is so unusual in an urban setting. Our school is not overcrowded. You may hear reports of a working capacity of 159%, but as a wise man once said, "there are lies, damn lies and then there are statistics!". Right now there is not one class at P.S. 14 that has the cap of 32 students. The largest class has 29 students. Those are the honest facts

P.S. 14 has been blessed with a wonderful gift from the Parks Department. The lovely park adjacent to the school is a little oasis of natural beauty for the students. That park is a buffer between the school and private homes and it is used by the school for graduations and other school events. It is



also a place where the school and the community come together for planting and learning about the environment. To invade that area is just unconscionable. The building must be scaled back and the park must be saved.

This project is so huge that it will take three years to complete. That means that every single day for three years the students of P.S. 14 will have to try to learn in the middle of a construction site.

Some students have a hard time focusing when it is quiet, they will never be able to focus with noise all day long.

We also have many students, parents and residents with asthma or COPD, this situation may create an environment that has deadly consequences for them.

You may have heard that this project will create 340 seats but I caution you other- this now before the shovel of support we need now.

wise. That number is a minimum and I guarantee that we will see many more students attending our school. The plan calls for many extra rooms that will eventually be turned into classrooms.

In my 40 years of experience in education I have seen it happen over and over again. The music room, the computer room, the art room. all of the extra rooms that our students deserve will be filled with students eventually.

The elevator will bring more busses with children with disabilities because very few schools have elevators. Then instead of 340 we will have 500 extra students.

The community that is zoned for P.S. 14 is made up of mostly one and two family homes. Our community does not have much more room to grow and therefore we will never be able to fill all of those seats.

So, when you are told that this project is for our children, don't believe it. The right thing to do is to build schools where they are needed.

While it seems that the weather does not want to easily transition into spring, I have been utilizing the overcast and rainy weather to transplant seedlings. Seedlings never like being transplanted and left to bake in the sun on their first day in the ground - and no amount of hardening them will change that. By 10 a.m., the beds are in full sun which makes them great for growing peppers and tomatoes, but makes getting them in the ground tricky. So rainy days are a welcome assistance from Mother Nature.

A few more rainy and overcast days ahead this week will help me continue to transplant the poppy and borage seedlings that are growing in between the slate in the path that runs through my shade garden. I have sections of the

garden dedicated to both of these edibles and they transplant happily on a rainy afternoon, and begrudgingly otherwise. On Friday, I picked up 28 Serrano pepper plants from a community gardening friend who is working with Bronx Hot Sauce. I am waiting for the instruction sheet, but the goal is to care for the plants and harvest the peppers for sale back to Bronx Hot Sauce for use in this year's batch. I am planting 16 of them in the garden next door and proceeds from these peppers will fund Two Wrasslin' Dogs Farms. The other 12, which are slightly smaller and not ready to transplant, I'm hoping will go in the Preston garden and proceeds from these peppers will go back into the garden's expenses. If not, I will find space in our garden for them

#### A Few Updates

First, a few weeks ago, with the help of a friend's daughter and New Beginnings Animal Rescue, I was able to trap two of the feral cats in my backyard. Both were neutered and given a quick check up and returned to my backyard. It cost about \$60 for both. In a few weeks, I'm going to try to catch a few more. The goal is to help out with the feral cat problem by reducing the amount of cats that are having endless litters of more kittens. Feral cats will always be around, it would take a catapocalypse to rid us of them – this is the humane thing to do if you can do it. And thanks to New Be-



ginnings Animal Rescue for helping me. If you would like to donate to New Beginnings Animal Rescue, they have a GoFundMe account set up.

Also, CSA is starting in a few weeks! We already have 31 shares sold and three left remaining. I ordered a 10x10 tent for the driveway and we are ready to go! If you haven't signed up already, go to www. stoneledge.farm. Create an account and then place an order for your share. Any questions, contact me at cnapolitano@ netzero.net.

In a recent post on Two Wrasslin' Dogs Farm's Facebook page, I mentioned that I had harvested a bucket full of dandelion blossoms and was fixing to make Dandelion Blossom Jelly. This is something I have wanted to try and I finally had access to a field of blossoms that I knew were not chemically treated. I spent an hour carefully cleaning the blossoms and made the tea, just like the recipe called for. I let it steep for 4 hours, just like the recipe called for. But when I strained the infusion from the blossoms, the resulting liquid was a beautiful amber color. This was not what I expected; the recipe said that the jelly would be a more golden yellow color. I tasted

the liquid and it had a bitter, nasty taste that I couldn't imagine would ever be appetizing. I picked more blossoms and attempted another batch, this time only steeping it for a short period, about an hour, until the water was cooled down. The resulting liquid was still nasty and bitter. I threw that batch out too! I haven't attempted another batch and at this point, all of the blossoms have turned into puff balls.

When I was weeding last week, I pulled as many dandelions as possible. If I managed to get a root, I set them aside. Once in the house, I washed the roots clean under running water to remove loose dirt. (Clean the roots as quickly as you can, letting them sit on a counter a few days before cleaning them will not work.) Once they were clean, I set them to dry on a paper towel and after a few days, they were dry enough to put into the spice grinder. I'm going to experiment with the resulting product. I'm going to try adding a small amount to black tea, but I'm concerned it will be bitter as well. The other experiment is to add it to some coffee. Updates to follow.

While Dandelion Jelly was not a successful recipe, I will share one here that is: Cilantro Mint Chutney. The Preston garden is pumping out cilantro at a rate that is hard to keep up with. I have been harvesting it and so far I made a batch of this chutney that I shared with Elizabeth. the Preston art teacher that is in charge of the garden club. She shared the chutney with some of her students and everyone loved it. I'm going to get some mint started there too, so we can continue making this delicious concoction.

2 cups lightly packed fresh cilantro leaves

1 cup lightly packed fresh mint leaves

1 garlic clove

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin 1 Serrano chili, seeded and minced

1/2 teaspoon sugar 1 teaspoon kosher salt 2 tablespoons fresh squeezed lemon juice

1/3 cup plain yogurt

Put it all in the food processor and puree until smooth. A couple of things - if you do not have fresh Serrano chiles, pickled jalapeno can be a decent substitute. Try to use a full fat or a good quality Greek yogurt. Cilantro Mint Chutney is perfect on grilled chicken or lamb, used as a spread in a grilled vegetable sandwich or added to the options on Family Taco Night. It is a fresh product and has yogurt in it, so remember it is a limited shelf life product and you should eat it within a month, which is usually not a problem in my house. And since the cilantro and mint will be growing for a while. you can just keep making new batches.

In the meantime, be the change you want to see in the world.

## **CLINICAL STUDY**

The chairman of the House Armed Services Committee. the former Secretary of the U.S. Air Force, and a top Marine Corps aviator have recently and substantially pointed out dire conditions that indicate the looming end of U.S. air supremacy. Americans are still under the illusion that their air power is in a league of its own. Sadly, that is no longer true.

The U.S. retains a diminishing lead in the total number of aircraft versus any individual adversary, but worldwide commitments resulting from America being the guarantor of freedom across the globe, the advanced age of the aircraft themselves, the technological advances of potential opponents, and the growing cooperation and arms transfers between Russia and China eliminates any advantage those dwindling total numbers represent.

That cooperation has included the transfer of advanced Russian air defense systems such as the S-300 to Iran and

the S-400 to China. The growing closeness of the Russian-Chinese-Iranian alliance poses a massive threat to American air, land and seapower.

House Armed Services Committee member Rep. J. Randy Forbes (R-Va) and former Air Force Secretary Michael W. Wynne outline the challenge. Today, the U.S. Air Force's fleet is the smallest and the oldest it has ever been. Meanwhile, Russia and China have been fielding and exporting new fighters and sophisticated air defenses to countries like Iran. Russia rolled out its first fifth-generation stealth fighter, the PAK-FA, in 2010. China followed in 2011, flight-testing the J-20, an F-22 look-alike, while Secretary Gates was visiting Beijing. Gen. Mark Welsh, the Air Force's chief of staff, warned last year that future Russian and Chinese jets "will be better than anything we have today."

Defense Industry Daily reports: "The current US Air Force fleet, whose planes are more than 26 years old on average, is the oldest in USAF history...Many transport aircraft



and aerial refueling tankers are more than 40 years old and under current plans, some may be as much as 70-80 years old before they retire...average aircraft age will climb even if the US military gets every plane it asks for in its future plans."

The National Interest notes that the crisis is about to deepen. "Today's Air Force is already struggling, and tomorrow's is entirely at risk ... Congress must step back and look at the collective impact of recent capacity and capability cuts on purchases of aircraft in particular. They will find that not only is there virtually no slack left in America's current Air Force to meet global peacetime and war plan demands, the historically most innovative service is now left to incrementally upgrade existing capabilities while abandoning transformational and leap-ahead investments. Additionally, Congress must understand several trends underway in recent years that have it buying fewer and fewer planes, both in absolute and relative terms, while at the same time proposing hundreds for retirement."

General Frank Gorenc, commander of U.S. air forces in Europe and Africa, quoted in theDiplomat reported that "NATO's air superiority vis-àvis Russia is waning." The authoritative and objective publication Jane's Defence Weekly states that "Russia's military modernisation has diminished NATO's air superiority in Europe."

A Rand Corporation study warns "in the event of a conflict [involving China],...the United States could find itself engaged with adversary air forces both qualitatively and quantitatively superior to any it has fought since the end of the Cold War...Indeed, the United States has not fought a conflict against an adversary capable of challenging its supremacy in the air since at least the Korean War."

Forbes and Wynne advocate building more F-22 air superiority fighters to help begin resolving the issue. The original number of F-22's slated to be built has been slashed, they note. "the Air Force had scaled back the F-22 program from 750 to 381 aircraft. In 2009, however, [former defense secretary] Mr. Gates canceled a number of defense-procurement programs and limited F-22 production to 187 jets.

The Marines have their own airpower issues. Lt. Gen. Jon Davis Davis, deputy commandant for aviation, is quoted in the Marine Corps Times noting that there are not even enough aircraft within that service to allow for adequate training, and too few of those on active duty are actually operational and available to perform.

We want to also address our support and concern for one of our local landmarks. For those that are not aware, the Coops at the end of Allerton between Barker and Bronx Park East is a historic landmark.

It is a part of our Bronx heritage, culture and history. We will not allow this jewel to

### La Lupe, Queen of Latin Soul, lived on E. 140th St.

There's a stretch of East 140th Street between St. Ann's Avenue and Cypress Avenue that carries an official street sign bearing the name "La Lupe Way." Someone recently asked me about it and I recalled it very well as there had been some controversy surrounding the bill when it was first introduced by Fernando Ferrer. It was later re-introduced by Borough President Adolfo Carrion to a more receptive City Council who approved it in December of 2001.

Guadalupe Victoria Yoli Raymond, commonly known as La Lupe, was unquestionably the most important Latin female singer to come out of Cuba after the revolution. She was born on December 23, 1936 in San Pedrito, a barrio of Santiago, and was studying to become a teacher until becoming star-struck after winning a singing contest on the radio in 1954. The following year her family moved to Havana and soon she was making a name for herself at the local clubs. Her performance at Club La Red in 1958 really showcased her talent as she kept telling the pianist Homero Balboa to



play faster and faster. She was more than just another singer, she was a performer.

She recorded her first album, "Con el diablo en el cuerpo" (With the devil in my body), for RCA Victor in 1960 and two years later was exiled to the United States. She became an immediate sensation for her extreme antics, such as banging her high heels on the piano, throwing herself on the floor, tossing clothes and anything else available at the audience. The crowds went wild urging her on and she responded with unbounded energy. She was manic and almost impossible to control. She was fighting a losing battle with herself and it would certainly help bring about her early demise. Stardom only added to her erratic behavior especially after Pedro Almodovar included her song "Puro Teatro" in his film "Women on the Verge of a Nervous Breakdown." Her stage shows are unforgettable which

is why she managed to sell out her performance at Madison Square Garden, the first Latin singer to do so.

La Lupe, also known as La Yiyiyi by some of her fans, moved to East 140th Street here in the Bronx in 1986 and remained here until her untimely death on February 29, 1992. It was during these years that she settled down somewhat, turning to religion and switching to gospel music. The "Queen of Latin Soul" was reigning as a more becalmed soul but the damage was already done and death finally knocked on her door at age 52. She's now at peace in St. Raymond's Cemetery.

The official street sign bearing her name was unveiled at a gala ceremony on June 12, 2002 and both former Borough President Fernando Ferrer and the then current Borough President Adolfo Carrion were there to help celebrate. La India sang one of La Lupe's big-

## **Bronx schools** SCA students learn pickles and lemons can be sweet


The Manhattan College Engineer- series and parallel circuits. ing Ambassadors visited St. Catharine Academy's Robotics 2 class and the robotics team members on Wedneday, May 4. Students learned how to make quicksand and create home-aid batteries from lemons.

The Ambassadors performed two labs with more than 15 students. The first demonstrated mechanical and chemical engineering. The Viscosity Lab used mechanical engineering techniques. It demonstrated how Newtonian liquids and solids change due to stress and by certain temperatures, as well as their motion.

The second Pickle and Lemon Labs showed there is more to these foods than their unique tastes. The students demonstrated electrical engineering techniques. Students built batteries using the lemons. They created neon night lights with the pickles. The ambassadors created prototypes of both

The Manhattan College Ambassadors included SCA alumna Adwoa Manu '15 who is a freshman studying mechanical engineering. She, Alexandra Lahnes, a senior chemical engineering major and Michelle Blum, a freshman, environmental engineering major, have been working with schools to share their engineering knowledge and encourage students, especially females, to consider pursuing science and engineering in college.

St. Catharine STEM teacher Sheree Petrignani says, "All my students truly relished both labs. It is just one of the venues they have explored in the arrays of the sciences this year. My robotics 2 class is working on designs to use recyclable plastics and create alternative energy resources." They were finalists for the Water Champion Award at the NYC Water Resources 2016 Contest for the

### Swami dearest: Lenore chats with the Krishna next door

When he was 19, Richard Slavin, a nice Jewish boy from the suburbs of Chicago, went backpacking in Europe for two months.

"Hey," I told him. "I have a son about to do the same thing."

"But," Slavin added with a twinkle, "I never came back!"

With that he gave a hearty laugh — as jolly a sound as the ice cream man's bell. Pure joy. He could laugh now — he was laughing now, in a conference room in Midtown, in town for a book tour — because at 60-something and bald, he is no longer the wandering hippie of 1970. In fact, he is no longer even Richard Slavin. Today he is Radhanhath Swami, one of the most prominent leaders of the Hare Krishnas.

The swami was dressed in coral-colored robes, as well as a coral sweatshirt that he took off in the warm corporate office. His assistant jumped up to fold it for him, but the swami — spiritual leader to millions nonchalantly did it himself. This is not a guy who lives a

Kardashian life. He's a monk. He sleeps on the floor. He rises at 4 every morning for chanting and meditation — and breakfast isn't until 9!

So how does a suburban American kid end up living in India, leading a congregation that feeds 300,000 impoverished children a day, along with running a hospital, an orphanage, a handful of ecovillages, and about a dozen schools for the very poor? The swami smiled and raised his eyebrows as I asked. He looked as surprised as me.

And by the way, in between all these India duties, the swami travels the world to lecture at campuses across the states, including Google's and Harvard's, talking about things like spirituality and stress.

"I have to admit to them that swamis have as much stress as them," he chuckled. "It's just a matter of how you deal with it."

The trek from footloose teen to spiritual leader is what his first book, "The Journey Home: Autobiography of an American Swami" was about. A bestseller. His latest book, "The Journey Within: Exploring the Path of Bhakti,"

is about the spiritual lessons learned along the way.

The lessons did not come easily. After he landed in Europe, Slavin hitchhiked across the continent in search of truth.

"I was going to cathedrals and synagogues to study, because I really believed in the unity of all religions," he recalls. He studied Islam in Turkev and Iran. By the time he got to India to study the religions there, "I became a very serious ascetic. I would never

cause I considered that too luxurious. So I slept under trees, or in caves."

Now, readers, here I must confess something: This man grew up one suburb way from mine. He went to my rival high school and is just about 10 years older. When we discussed our favorite childhood haunts, he gleefully recalled the local pancake house and summers on Lake Michigan, though, "As a swami, I can't tell you what we used to do when we'd sneak onto the beach." Another laugh. The point is, he comes from a background very familiar to me. But ... most of us did not go off and sleep in caves. How on earth did his parents react?

When he finally returned to America for the first time, he says, "It was a culture shock for me and a culture shock for them. My father and brother came to meet me at the airport. The only luggage I had was a begging bowl. They didn't know what to think. But we adjusted to each other in a very sweet and wonderful way."

That's probably because the swami was not the caricature that many of us had or even still have of the Hare Krishnas — lost souls in loose robes

sleep inside any building, be- chanting in the streets and offering flowers. Cult members.

"In every religion there's wacky people," the swami said matter-of-factly. Because the Hare Krishna religion was first established in America in 1966, right around the time of the counter-culture, the two got entwined in the public mind. Lost souls did join. So what?

Hare Krishna is not an American fad. It's an ancient Indian religion that says we are all one — humans, animals, all of us who seek sustenance here on earth. And when we chant the name of Krisha — God — we get closer and closer to realizing that connectedness.

That doesn't sound any dippier than going to church or temple. And if it makes people ready to build schools, respect nature, and provide for the very poor, more power to it — and the former Richard Slavin.

(But if my son is reading this, please note: Do not stay away for 40 years!)

structure is literally falling apart."

Putting aside the sound issue, many of the buildings at Rodman's Neck were constructed as temporary buildings that were not designed for longterm use, and Vacca is now calling for the NYC Department of Buildings to investigate the soundness of the structures in the restricted facility.

"There are many structures that are temporary and have been there for years, and there are lead abatement issues too," said Vacca. "I am concerned about the conditions that our police officers train under."

John Doyle, CICA board member, said that its membership is disappointed.

"This fits the pattern for the past two decades, where promises were made and not kept about Rodman's Neck," he said, adding "A budget is a symbol of your priorities, and clearly the budget that has been introduced did not reflect any priority to addressing the (noise) situation for residents along the waterfront."

Noise abatement at the facility was first pledged by Mayor David Dinkins in 1993 when the parkland was being alienated and given to the police department, and similar promises have been made in the years since, but the installation of sound baffles was never successfully completed, he said.

The issue affects shoreline commu-

nities up and down Eastchester Bay, including Country Club and Edgewater Park, said Doyle.

Barbara Dolensek, another CICA board member, said she is urging her neighbors through Facebook to write letters to the mayor, but held out little hope of swaying him.

"I am sure the mayor is going to ig-

nore my letter," she said, adding that when the police firing range was slated to move to a new police academy at College Point, Queens several years ago, it was going to be enclosed to lessen the noise from gunfire, but no such treatment is being considered for Rodman's Neck.

A spokeswoman for the mayor's of-

fice indicated that the project is still being considered.

"There is currently a Capital Project Scope Development study underway to evaluate the project scope and costs," she stated. "The final presentation on the study is anticipated this summer, and the results of the study will help us determine next steps."

hood, want to see this project move forward.

A plan to redevelop the Armory and transform it into the Kingsbridge National Ice Center was announced in 2013, following other plans for the Armory that were proposed as early as the mid-1990s.

The project's financial progress began with \$20 million in private funding and a \$138 million construction loan commitment approved by ESD last December, followed by ESD approving a \$15 million construction loan (of a \$158 million total) towards phase one of the Armory's renovations, which was approved in February.

KNIC filed a lawsuit against Mayor de Blasio and the EDC for violating the contract, diverting the rightful owner from their business opportunity and deliberately delaying the progress of the Armory's development.

According to a letter that Mark Messier, KNIC's CEO, sent to Alicia Glenn, deputy mayor for NYC Housing and Economic Development, KNIC has satisfied the terms of the escrow agreement imposed upon the company.

However, the executed lease and signed documents are still currently held in escrow, which has and may continue to delay and prevent KNIC

from commencing construction.

Renovations on the nearly 800,000 square-foot, five-acre building would be intended for use by minor league and non-professional hockey teams, figure and speed skating, open skating times, instructional training as well as neighborhood, high school and college hockey leagues.

"Given that this historic project will promote jobs and opportunity in the Bronx, it is disappointing that EDC continues to frustrate the desire of KNIC and the community to get trial proceedings underway immediately," the attorney added. "We welcome the opportunity to bring the facts into full public view - and resolve any issues preventing the forward progress of this transformative project."

Earlier this month, in honor of National Day of Prayer, a vigil was held in front of the Armory, in support of the project moving forward.

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

When you do, that's when you get pitchers to start missing with more balls off the plate. That I haven't been able to do at this point."



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
