GROUP HOME APPEALS VOTE

Service provider challenges CB 10's 'no'

The operator of a controversial proposed group home in Throggs Neck is appealing a community board decision to oppose the home's siting.

Martin Prince, Community Board 10 chairman, said that CB 10 received notice that operator Services for the Underserved will appeal to the NYS Office for People With Developmental Disabilities regarding the proposed site at 276 Graff Avenue. An OPWDD commissioner's hearing will be held on the matter, SUS confirmed.

A hearing date has not been set yet, said Prince, who also said that the board is committed to representing the community.

Under the 28-year-old Padavan Law, which provides means for communities to oppose group homes for the developmentally disabled, the community could oppose the siting if there is over-saturation, meaning a concentration of similar facilities, in the area, said Prince.

"You can go with over-saturation: that is the primary reason a community could oppose one of these facilities," said Prince of the options. "Finance can also come into play."

However, Prince added that the outcry over the Graff Avenue location has made it

Three deadly 'H' overdoses in Loreto Park

A rash of heroin overdoses have become a common occurance in a local park recently.

According to sources, there have been at least three reported incidents of heroin overdose inside Loreto Park, which is generating great concern among the Morris Park community.

The apparent overdoses, which are believed to have all

taken place inside the park over the last two weeks, claimed the lives of 21-year old Chris 'Hood' Morello and Michael Coscia, the former of whom was a Morris Park resident. The third overdose victim has not yet been identified, as of press time.

Morello, who passed away on Saturday, July 2 and attended nearby P.S. 83, was described as friendly and harm-

less but didn't receive parental guidance from an early age, according to a former classmate.

"He wasn't a bad kid by any means - he just went down the wrong path," said Andrew Melillo, Morello's classmate nearly a decade ago. "I hadn't been in touch with him in recent years, but in the past I remember him being on the streets frequently

Grand opening of Triangle Plaza Hub held

The grand opening of a new shopping plaza signifies a turn in the right direction for development in the Bronx.

On Wednesday, July 13, Triangle Equities, along with elected officials, business partners and local merchants, gathered for the grand opening and ribbon-cutting ceremony of the Triangle Plaza Hub, a \$35 million multi-use complex located at 459 E. 149th Street, right in the center of 'The Hub'.

The Triangle Plaza Hub, an 88,000 square-foot community-centric development, will house Fine Fare Supermarket, Brightpoint Health, Da-Vita Dialysis Center, Vistasite Eye Care, Boston Market and Dunkin Donuts, along with a 6,000 square foot plaza for the public's enjoyment.

Last, but certainly not least, the plaza will be home to the Metropolitan College of New York's Bronx campus, where classes will begin in September.

The campus, located at 463 E. 149th Street, will serve over 500 students and will feature

17 classrooms, three computer labs and a multipurpose conference space, allowing the college to host large events.

"The opening of MCNY Bronx demonstrates our longterm commitment to the south Bronx community and its renaissance," said MCNY president Dr. Vinton Thompson.

The 2-story building has 83 rooftop parking spaces.

Currently, one ground floor of retail space totaling 3,900 square feet and one 3,000 square-foot pad site adjacent to the public plaza are available and present prime opportunities for potential tenants.

In total, this project generated 151 construction-related jobs and 191 permanent jobs. In addition, Triangle Eq-

uities has worked with the HireNYC program to develop a targeted local hiring and workforce development plan to fill these newly created employment opportunities.

"I am very proud of this

beautiful facility - for the fact that it has created economic opportunities, educational and social services and provided this area with a much needed supermarket - an area that has been a food desert for years," said Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr.


"This is a very exciting project - one that will provide countless opportunities for the area," said Marlene Cintron, president of the Bronx Overall Economic Development Corporation.

"Development like this one continues to revitalize this area," said Councilman Rafael Salamanca, who remembers the property back when it was a vacant lot.

"The completion and grand opening of Triangle Plaza Hub is a great source of pride for us," said Lester Petracca, president of Triangle Equities, the lead developer on the project.

"We're delighted with the mix of tenants we have at Triangle Plaza Hub and even more so now that their services and amenities are available to this south Bronx community, and while this was an exceptionally challenging project to build, as is the case with the majority of our developments, reaching this milestone and providing tangible value to a community is what truly matters to us," Petracca added.

CB 11 objects to removal of tree, street

Community support for the reconstruction of the northside of Pelham Parkway is slipping over items that have been around 100 years.

The objections arose when the city proposed closing an access street and removing a majestic tree as part of the project.

The city's plan to remove the small roadway and return it to green parkland is scheduled for Phase 2 of Pelham Parkway's reconstruction.

The NYC Department of Design and Construction is heading the project that will run from 2017 to 2019.

Also, the Pelham Parkway Preservation Alliance has raised concerns about the planned removal of a Civil War-era elm tree next to a bus stop just west of Williamsbridge Road, according to John Fratta, CB 11 administrative manager, who handles community concerns regarding this project.

"Both issues are basically non-starters for us," said Fratta, adding the community by and large agrees with the rest of the project.

CB 11 voted unanimously to name the 200-foot section of roadway near the New York Institute for Special Education that links a Pelham Parkway service road with westbound Pelham Parkway as Paulding Avenue, in support of the community.

The vote took place at a full board meeting on Thursday, June 23. In order for the CB 11 street naming plan to move forward, the NYC City Council would have to approve it, and the street portion would then have to be alienated by the state legislature to remove it from NYC Department of Parks and Recreation jurisdiction.

"That's been a street for over a 100 years, before the Parks Department even existed," said Fratta about the road. "People use that street, the NYC Department of Transportation put a stop sign there and it is paved, so for anyone to say it is not a street is nonsense."

Councilman James Vacca said he supports the CB 11

proposal, adding that in order for it to work, approval will be needed in two consecutive state legislative sessions.

Senator Jeff Klein said in a statement that he looks forward to working with the city and state legislatures to make sure the community needs are met on both issues.

PPPA has information indicating the elm tree will be felled because the city plans to move the bus stop within feet of the tree, further west, said Joe Menta.

"We are very adamant that the tree stays," said Menta, adding "That tree has stood the test of time, and escaped Dutch Elm disease, and I think we owe it to the tree to have it remain."

As an alternative, he believes that instead of moving the bus stop further west, the city could move it a block away.

According to a source familiar with the Pelham Parkway reconstruction plan, the elm tree in question is within the area of the exiting bus stop, and that trees are usually grandfathered in, but an engineer's report recommended the tree's removal for road safety reasons. The tree's girth prevents a guardrail installation at the location.

A DDC spokeswoman stated that the city agencies involved in Pelham Parkway's Phase 2 reconstruction would review the plan.

According to DDC, Pelham Parkway's Phase 2 reconstruction includes a new trunk water main, a select bus service lane, dedicated left turn lanes and wheelchair accessible sidewalks and ramps.

Cabrera finances renovation to Grand Playground

Construction has started on the new Grand Playground on the corner of West 181st Street and Grand Avenue.

Councilman Fernando Cabrera who financed the \$2,690,000 project and other borough officials gathered on July 7 to share a few words on the project and break ground on the site.

"As you can imagine I'm excited today because it is going to happen," Cabrera told the community members in attendance.

Discussions to revitalize the park began in 2010 and in 2011 and Cabrera began allocating funding to renovate the park.

However, he said as he was allocating funding, nothing was moving forward under the previous parks administration.

The councilman said under the new administration and NYC Parks Commissioner Mitchell J. Silver, this park and others are progressing.

The new park will feature a basketball court, a play area designed for children of various ages, and two entrances.

It will also have sprinklers and a seated area for seniors.

"We want to make sure when we have playspaces -we have an aging population in New York City - we want to make sure they have a wonderful green space where they can age beautifully and watch the children play but also just get outdoors and enjoy the green space," said Silver.

Cabrera said the issues in connection to the park surrounded more

than just the playground. Water from the park was running into residents' homes.

"Now everyone is going to benefit including the neighbors whose property is adjacent to the playground," said the council member.

Cabrera, like Silver, also touted how the park will be able to appeal to all ages.

"We have something for the seniors, we're going to have something for the children, we're going to have basketball for the teenagers," he said.

Eduardo Hernandez, a park manager, grew up in the neighborhood.

Hernandez said, as he stood on Grand Avenue parallel to West 181st Street, the right side of the park was sunken in six or seven feet.

He added the park used to be all blacktop, with insufficient benches and one basketball hoop.

"I lived in this neighborhood for 21 years," said Hernandez. "I'm really excited about this park."

Kavan Brandon, parks and recreation committee chair for Community Board 5, was also happy to see a new park coming to the area.

"We don't have as many playgrounds and park as some of the other districts," said Brandon. "So it's a great day when something like this happens because we have very limited space."

He added, "I think we need more of this and the current parks administration and the councilman are doing a great job in making sure these parks are pursued."

The advent of **TV** dinners

Dear editor,

July 18, will mark the eleventh anniversary of the passing of 'TV' dinner inventor Gerry Thomas. His employer Swanson & Company overestimated the demand for Thanksgiving turkey in 1953. They were stuck with 260 tons of frozen turkeys. The birds were stored for many weeks in ten refrigerated rail cars which traveled back and forth on a track between Nebraska and the East Coast. The train had to be moving so the compressors which supported the refrigerators preserving the turkeys would keep working.

In the early 1950s, Thomas observed how airlines provided passengers with meals in aluminum serving trays. He modified this by adding separate sections for the main course, vegetable and potato. This resulted in the first Swanson TV Dinner. For only eighty nine cents, over 25 million were sold in 1954 which was the first year of production. Many were consumed by customers watching television, which was also still a relatively new invention in the 1950s. Thomas was the marketing genius for Swanson & Company who came up with the name TV dinner.

Growing up in the 1960s as a teenager, my dad was a teacher during the day and a high school librarian several nights per week. On those evenings. I would have to prepare dinner for and my younger sister. When we tired of the local options such as McDonalds, Westons, pizza or Chinese take-out - TV dinners were a quick solution. Selections were provided by either Swanson's, Banquet or Morton's. They were the big three competitors during that era.

A real treat in those days were the TV diners which provided a fourth compartment, containing a brownie for dessert. Sometimes two TV dinners were required to satisfy your appetite as the portions were never that big.

The selection of TV dinners at your local supermarket today is much different from those of past generations. Besides Swanson's, Banquet and Morton's, there are many more competitors such as Carl J. Cannizzaro Healthy Choice, Lean Cuisine,

Stouffers, Boston Market, Marie Callendar and others. Their various product lines offer far more variety and selections. Far healthier choices are available for today's generation on the go.

Even during college and post college bachelor days, TV dinners always found some space in the freezer compartment of my refrigerator.

Perhaps the post office should consider issuing a stamp for Gerry Thomas and the TV dinner, still American as apple pie 63 years later.

CB 6 district manager Ivine Galarza retires

Community Board 6 district manager Ivine Galarza is set to retire from the board after nearly 21 years of service.

According to CB 6, Friday, July 29 marks her official last day as the board's district manager.

Originally from Puerto Rico, Galarza and her family emigrated to America in the early 1950s and settled down on Boston Road in the Bronx.

Galarza graduated from Lehman College earning a bachelor's degree in business administration in 1972.

Following college, Galarza embarked on her governmental career serving as liaison to community boards 4, 5, 7 and 8 during former borough president Stanley Simon's administration.

After working for the borough president, she founded and served as executive director for the now defunct non-profit housing organization, the Housing Workshop from 1985 to 1995 where she implemented a program providing legal representation to lowincome tenants in housing court and formed a housing education program added to all public school's across community school districts 10 and 12's curriculum.

Appointed CB 6's district manager in 1995, Galarza has since demonstrated excellent leadership and commitment toward improving the community and residents' lives throughout her career.

As district manager, her responsibility was to observe and make recommendations ensuring city services and programs were delivered in a timely and sufficient manner to the community.

She also served as an arbitrator to NYC municipal agencies and elected officials while advising the community board on the city's capital and expense budget.

Since the late 1990s, Galarza has worked closely with the families of the victims of the Happy Land Social Club Fire by organizing an annual Mass at St. Thomas Aquinas Church and a vigil at the Plaza of the Eighty-Seven to remember the 87 victims who perished in one of New York's worst tragedies.

"A lot of the families didn't know each other, but they became bonded through this terrible tragedy," said Galarza. To ensure this tragedy is never repeated, Galarza led the effort to have domestic violence and fire prevention forums for the community and to have the FDNY properly inspect local bars. She noted the district does not house any nightclubs following the Happy Land incident.

"She's an excellent worker and professional," said Wendy Rodriguez, CB 6 chairwoman, adding. "Whenever there's an issue in the community, she will not stop until it is resolved."

A retirement Mass and reception event were held for Galarza on Wednesday, June 29 at St. Thomas Aquinas Church and St. Thomas Aquinas School.

In recognition of her many years of service to the borough, Galarza received proclamations from Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr.; Councilman Ritchie Torres and 78th Assembly District State Committeeman Kenny Agosto representing outgoing Senator Ruth Hassell-Thompson.

The Throggs Neck resident was also awarded a citation from the NYS Assembly by Assemblyman Luis Sepulveda and a commendation from Ash-

ley Torres representing NYC Comptroller Stringer.

Galarza has received many accolades over these two decades most notably being named as the 2012 Woman of Distinction by Senator Hassell-Thompson.

Upon her retirement, Galarza said she intends to continue working with her parish, St. Thomas Aquinas Church by teaching English as a second language classes and introducing workshops to explain to recently arrived immigrants how the government operates and the services available.

Galarza's successor has not yet been named.

Hoops tournament for mom lost to gang violence

Rev. Anthony Hendrickson is using basketball to promote safer communities against gang violence.

Hendrickson, head of the Lead By Example Reverse The Trend non-profit group, will hold the Jessica White Safer Community tournament on Friday, July 15 from noon to 4 p.m.

White, a 29-year old mother of three, was fatally shot in March during a shooting exchange linked to gang violence.

White was shielding her children as bullets flew across a park at 700 Westchester Avenue.

According to Hendrickson, the tournament was created to promote public safety and youth development.

"The reason we did it is because we don't want to lose another parent," he said.

"Jessica White should not have lost her life protecting her children inside a park and playground," he added.

Hendrickson said he wants to send a message to gang members that this is not a place for gang activity.

As part of the tournament, which will take place at 721 Tinton Avenue, police officers in the 40th Precinct will play against kids from the community.

Originally, the tournament was supposed to happen on July 9.

However, due to the string of violence that occurred in Louisiana, Minnesota and Dallas, officers were stationed at other locations around the city during protests.

Instead of having the tournament, the kids held a scrimmage on July 9 to get ready for the real thing.

Hendrickson also took the time to provide a short word to the kids about the recent string of violence.

He explained that not all officers are bad despite a few rogue officers and what happened over the weekend were tragedies.

He added that the children should not act out in violence in response to the recent tragedies.

cus on what happened to Jessica White and the steps the community is taking to move forward.

The pastor explained he wants everyone in the community to spread the message of public safety.

"I think when the youth get involved, parents get involved and the community comes together, it sends a strong message," said Hendrickson. He hopes that message will cause others to "be more vigilant" and said "together we can put the 'neighbor' back in neighborhood."

Lead by Example, founded by Hendrickson and other group of mentors in 2014, was created to "to reverse the spiraling growth rates of incarceration of young people in disadvantaged communities," according to the organization's website.

Hendrickson, now an ordained evangelist at True Vine Pentecostal Faith Church, and some of the other mentors at Lead by Example are former convicts who are now looking to affect positive change for young people in their communities.

Like their big brother both boys now attend the school.

"There can't be talent without nurturing," said Klinger. "They bring the talent and we nurture and that's our job."

Although both brothers love performing, being on stage is about much more.

"I want to change the world which is what our generation is supposed to do" said Max, who will be attending the Professional Performing Arts School in the fall.

Kenny said he hopes to change people's thinking on subjects that aren't commonly discussed.

He pointed to the play 'Runaways,' which the two performed in at the New York City Center from July 6 to July 9.

Elizabeth Swados created the play in 1977 after studywho had run away from home and dealt with various difficult experiences.

Max played the role of Shabach - a New York City teen who runs away from home because his parents won't get along. Kenny played the role of Jeremiah - a young teen who has a terrible relationship with his mother and turns to the basketball court to find comfort.

Both boys acknowledged that, although the play's cast consisted totally of children, there were mature aspects to the play as many runaways deal with abuse, prostitution and drug abuse.

Max and Kenny said they appreciated the opportunity to show an aspect of the real battling.

Salamanca obtains \$2 million to fund Pier Park

Councilman Rafael Salamanca has secured \$2 million through NYC Council Speaker Melissa Mark-Viverito's office for the revitalization of East 132 Street Pier Park.

Salamanca, since he stepped into office in March, has been working to get funding for this project, according to his office.

"What an exciting investment we are making today for the Port Morris neighborhood and for families across the south Bronx," said Salamanca. "Without a doubt, providing waterfront access to our community through places like Barretto Point Park in Hunts Point and now the Haven Project in Port Morris make a huge positive impact for south Bronx residents. That's why I was so proud to work with our speaker, Melissa Mark-Viverito, to secure this funding."

Ryan Monello, Salamanca's communications director, said the councilman has also been looking to improve parks such as Boretto Park in Hunts Point and Starlight Park in Longwood.

"He sees the value of having these types of parks in areas that for far too long didn't have any access to waterfront [spaces]," said Monello.

The work that will be done at East 132nd Street is the first step in a larger New York Restoration Project open space plan.

According to a press release, the NYRP is looking "to harness the ex-

pertise of local community leaders, researchers, designers and health partners to deliver a network of open spaces that will improve community health, support safe pedestrian and bike movement, foster social capital and support shoreline resilience."

NYPR is also working with various partners such as HealthxDesign, Healthfirst, Montefiore Medical Center, South Bronx Unite and Bronx-Works to complete the open space plan.

"Through this collaboration, the south Bronx will in the long-term see a new Pier Park and waterfront esplanade that will provide shoreline resilience and brand new waterfront recreational use, improved access to the Randall's Island Connector, a network of green spaces with significant improvements to the urban tree canopy, and revitalization of industrial heritage sites," said NYRP.

In addition to aiding the aforementioned open space plan, Salamanca has also provided aid to other parks in the Bronx.

According to Monell, the councilman's office contributed \$82,000 towards PEPS vehicles for Crotona Park, \$70,000 for ARGUS security cameras at Crotona Park and \$100,000 for improvements at Drake Park.

Salamanca also provided funds, along with Mark-Viverito and Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr., to the \$1.5 million expected to help improve the new Garrison Playground.

City Island discusses 'paid detail' for restaurants

A plan is in the works that could lead to a greater police presence on City Island during the peak tourism periods.

The City Island Chamber of Commerce and City Island Civic Association met recently with NYPD officials regarding the possible creation of a 'paid detail' of off-duty police officers to work in cafeteria-style restaurants during busy times.

The officers would be paid by the local eateries to complement existing security when they are not on the clock at the NYPD.

The plan's details, including who would be liable for any confrontations, are still being worked out, said Gerard "Skip" Giacco, CICC president.

"There is no objection to it, but its needs to be done in a way that protects the merchants from liability," said Giacco, adding that the plan could come to fruition if the restaurant owners would not bear any or would carry minimized liability from any confrontations arising between these off-duty cops employed by the restaurants and anyone else.

"If the positives outweigh the negatives, we will talk about it further," added Giacco.

The meeting comes after renewed openness to the idea from the NYPD, said John Dovle, CICA corresponding secretary, who added that his group was very grateful to the police department for looking at the idea from a fresh perspective. It has been a nonstarter for years, he added.

Meeting attendees included representatives from NYPD community affairs and 45th Precinct commanding officer Deputy Inspector Danielle Raia, as well as representatives from Seafood City, Don Coqui and Johnny's Reef, said Doyle.

"We are hopeful that the major stakeholders can come together," he said. "Whether you own a business or live on City Island, we all share the same general goal: we want to be people to be able to travel on City Island safely and we want the area to be secure.'

A paid detail can go a long way to accomplishing goals of both the businesses and the community, said Doyle, adding that while the idea is still being developed, everything has to start somewhere.

After discussion with the security personnel from some of the restaurants, it was apparent that a contingent of four or five officers would be necessary, said Giacco.

This is important because if a police officer removes someone from a restaurant, additional officers could be needed to make sure the ejected people do not continue problematic behavior out on the street, he said.

The chamber president added that a NYPD paid detail would be tasked with maintaining order, and that the discussions are recognition that when you have many people in a small space, as is the case with many of the island's eateries, there is the potential for issues.

John Marano, Community Board 10 vice-chairman, community activist and a former police officer, said that he believes that the police department and the businesses on City Island working together regarding a paid detail is mutually beneficial.

"When that happens, it benefits everyone," said Marano. "It shows that that the restaurants are taking a proactive approach and are working out the concerns of residents of City Island."

Catholic Charities opens food hub for soup kitchens

Catholic Charities is now making it easier to serve hungry Bronxites.

The organization opened on June 23 a new food hub at its South Bronx Community Center, located at 402 E. 152nd Street.

The hub will serve as a warehouse type-location at which fresh produce and other food will be delivered.

From there Catholic Charities will distribute the produce to soup kitchens and other smaller operations in their organization that help feed residents who need food.

"For nearly 100 years, Catholic Charities of New York has been feeding the hungry," said Monsignor Kevin Sullivan, executive director of Catholic Charities. "We are establishing this new food hub in the Bronx to continue to help hungry individuals and families of all religions throughout New York City. Critically important is the hope that these families achieve greater independence in their lives. Through the professional support Catholic Charities will provide."

Planning for the food hub began in 2015, according to Dianne Johnson, division director of community outreach service for Catholic Charities.

Johnson said members of the organization noticed a lack of fresh produce available at the smaller operations and wondered how they could provide that produce.

She said the group had to come up with a way to use space Catholic Charities already owned - but was under utilized - to provide the necessary service to the community.

According to Johnson, for many of the smaller operations produce shipments are too large.

She said if the shipment is too big - and the soup kitchen can't take the food - then that food is taken back.

Johnson said the new food hub will act like a warehouse.

The hub will be able to hold large shipments of food from which Catholic Charities can distribute the right amount to the various operations.

Johnson said Catholic Charities currently has a Ford Transit and is working on getting a box truck to make distribution easier.

Catholic Charities is also providing food to non-Catholic operations including a few Protestant locations and a mosque.

In addition to the food hub, Catholic Charities also opened a new Client Choice food pantry.

The pantry allows families in need to hand pick their groceries like they are at a supermarket.

Johnson said this is "more empowering and liberating" for those who visit the pantry.

The Client Choice pantry opens on Thursdays at 10 a.m., Thursdays at 5 p.m. for working families and Fridays at 10 a.m. Catholic Charities has partnered with Goya Foods to bring approximately 30,000 pounds of food to the hub each month. Goya has committed to providing a total of 300,000 pounds of food for the year.

"Goya is proud to partner with Catholic Charities of New York and support the mission of its new Food Distribution Center," said Bob Unanue, president of Goya Foods. "We are eager to work closely together in an effort to feed those who go without nutritious meals and to reassure that the center is fully equipped with enough healthy food each month."

Catholic Charities is also working with City Harvest from which they expect to get another 30,000 pounds of food per month.

Resources to rescue children in crisis

high school sent word that they had a student in an emotional crisis, Debra Thomas was at the school, ready to help. Debra, a psychiatric social worker with VNSNY's Bronx Mobile Crisis Team for children and adolescents, quickly convened a meeting with the student, 16-year-old Nicole*, and a school guidance counselor. This swift response is what the Mobile Crisis Team is known for-and so is their ability to connect quickly and effectively with the youngsters they treat.

"As it turns out, Nicole was in no imminent danger," says Debra, "but she was clearly depressed." The teenager, who had a borderline IQ, lived with her mother and would cut herself as a way of dealing with the anxiety she felt after one of her troubling visits with her absentee father. Together, Debra and Nicole came up with a "safety plan"actions the girl could take when she felt like cutting herself. Nicole liked poetry, so she agreed that when she felt the anxiety welling up, she'd write a poem or call a designated adult.

In the follow-up meeting, Nicole told Debra about a bad visit she'd just had with her father. The visit had left her with the urge to hurt herself—but she hadn't. Debra asked her how she was able to restrain herself. "Because I made a contract with you," Nicole said. Debra linked Nicole with outpatient mental health services at a non-profit mental health agency, where she would receive ongoing psychological support.

For at-risk New York City youth like Nicole, VNSNY's Mobile Crisis Team program is a proven lifesaver. The program launched its first mobile unit in the Bronx in the summer of 2013 and added two others last fall in Brooklyn and Queens. Each mobile team is staffed by a coordinator, two psychiatric social workers and two family advocates. Referrals are made through LifeNet, New York City's 24/7 crisis call center, and may come from parents, teachers, ther-

Less than two hours after a Bronx apists, or the children themselves. The team then has two hours to dispatch two field workers to the site.

Thanks to funding from the city's Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, Mobile Crisis Team services are available to any child under age 18 in their service area free of charge. While Mobile Crisis Team members don't administer actual psychiatric treatment, they provide children with coping skills, help them draw up a safety plan, review intervention techniques with the parent, and link children and families with longer-term services as needed. During the four weeks after the initial call, staffers also follow up to make sure the child is stable and receiving the services that he or she needs.

Today, Debra works as a Program Coordinator for the Mobile Crisis Team, supervising and supporting the social workers and family advocates on the Bronx team. Her clinical experience coupled with her ability to improvise when appropriate makes her a gifted program coordinator. "People can sense if you aren't authentic," she says, "especially the kids. They're street smart, and you have to meet them where they're at." In her program coordinator role, Debra helps instill these qualities in her team. "We have team meet-ings twice a week, and I also sit down with each team member individually. I might ask them, 'What could you have done differently?' or 'How would you react if the child's mother said this?'

Debra still takes on an occasional case herself, and also goes out with her clinicians to observe their technique and give constructive suggestions. "My staff knows they can call me anytime," she says. "As I tell my team, these people aren't just calling out of hysteriathey're calling for help. And we have a great track record of helping."

Senator Klein to host 'Cease and Desist' hearing

BY STEVEN GOODSTEIN No solicitation, never!

On Thursday, July 28, at 7:30 p.m., Senator Jeff Klein will hold a follow up 'Cease and Desist Zone' public hearing at Villa Barone Manor, 737 Throgs Neck Expressway, to officially determine the size of the zone - determined by communities who have been subject to intense and repeated real estate solicitation.

The public hearing will provide those in attendance the opportunity to submit testimony and other evidence that proves an intense solicitation by real estate agencies and salespeople.

If a cease and desist zone is indeed established, property owners in the affected areas, whether residential or commercial, will be eligible to add their address and telephone number to a cease and desist list, which would prohibit real estate brokers and salespeople from contacting them.

Area property owners claim they have been deluged with offers to buy houses for cash flyers on their front doors and fences.

At the initial public forum held on Wednesday, April 20 at P.S. 14, which was led by Klein and attended by the NYS Department of State, the senator spoke to property owners from community boards 10 and 11.

Many in attendance were victimized by aggressive real estate solicitations mailed or dropped off to their homes.

A follow up forum, which on June 28, began the process of determining the boundarary of the Cease and Desist Zone where solicitations would be prohibited.

"The first meeting really got the ball rolling in moving this process forward in the right direction," said Michael McNerney, president of the Coun- hearing, contact (718) 822-2049.

try Club Civic Association, who added that he receives several solicitations each week, either by mail or handbills, and presents between 25 to 50 solicitations to Klein's office each month.

'Without this law in effect, the solicitations have increased and I still see real estate agents going door-todoor on a consistent basis. It's harassing our community and hopefully this law can be in effect for the greater 10465 area."

According to Klein, a Cease and Desist Zone was in place in sections of community boards 10 and 11, which prohibited real estate businesses from contacting and soliciting residents in those areas.

However, the law expired in 2014, and Klein is looking to renew it and extend it to Community Board 9.

He also repaired a loophole that allowed real estate agency representatives to solicite on behalf of the real estate business.

'We must continue to defend our Bronx homeowners and I will continue to work with the Department of State to establish a cease and desist zone in Community Board 10," Klein said. "Our residents should not be subject to these aggressive and repeat solicitations."

"I urge homeowners to continue to submit evidence to my office and participate in our upcoming hearing to further determine the perimeters of the zone," Klein added. "This is my responsibility, along with the community's responsibility, to prove to the state that this 'Cease and Desist Zone' is still needed in our neighborhoods."

As recently as this week, a solicitor representing KW Realty Group was seen going from door to door and handing out real estate flyers on Calhoun Avenue, just off of East Tremont Avenue.

The New York City Department of Housing Preservation and Development commissioner Vicki Been and New York City Housing Development Corporation president Gary Rodney announced the opening of the Housing Connect lottery for 151 affordable apartments in the 3160 Park Avenue development. The new building is currently being constructed on once vacant land in the Melrose section at the intersection of Park Avenue and E. 161st Street.

The rents range from as low as \$532 a month for a one-bedroom apartment to \$1,683 a month for a three-bedroom apartment.

Generation born in 1995 already has a name

ou can tell a person's age by his teeth.

No, not by whether they're missing or yellowed (or, if they're really old, wooden!). They key is what the teeth are sinking into. "Generation Z" — the folks born after 1995 — have already established different eating patterns from the rest of us.

At least, so said an article I was reading in Nation's Restaurant News. (Yes, I love reading trade magazines!) Fascinated, I called up the editor to ask, first of all, what new food trends are coming down the pike? And second of all, ye gads — does the generation born after 1995 really have a name already?

The answer to the second question is apparently yes. And the answer to the first, according to editor Sarah E. Lockyer, is that Gen Z is even more Millennial than the Millennials.

"We always believed that Millennials were the first digital natives," she says. "But they really weren't. They weren't born with a phone in their hand. They got them at 10 or 12." That makes them practically pterodactyls compared to the Zs. The newest kids on the block want to eat what they see on social media, and they want to put on social media whatever they eat.

That isn't news. Food porn is possibly more popular than good old-fashioned porn porn. What is news is how the restaurants are responding. Take, for instance, Taco Bell.

"Taco Bell used to be food that you ate at 2 am," says Lockyer. "You really didn't think about it. And while that still happens today, now you can go on the Taco Bell app and you can add guacamole and take off sour cream and add extra cheese. It's very mobile friendly. You order on your phone, you pay on your phone, you go pick it up."

Restaurants that are completely interactive are the ones that are going to win, she says.

So are the ones that allow you to, in the words of an ancient Burger King jingle, "Have it your way." Even McDonald's is jumping on that trend. My hus-

band went to the tricked-out Mickey D's near Bloomingdale's and ordered from a kiosk rather than a human at the counter. He was served a giant, juicy burger slathered in chipotle mayo that made the Big Mac look like the meat equivalent of a flip phone.

Maybe even a landline.

Burgers themselves are still cool, but Gen Z is not eating as many of them as their elders. The Zs prefer chicken, pizza, and food that is ostensibly "clean" — a word that is both holy and amorphous. Ask me, it roughly translates to "\$1 extra."

YPulse, a New York market research firm specializing in young people, calls this trend the "healtifying" of fast food. Young folks aren't rejecting milk shakes or cheeseburgers, they just want them organic, or locally sourced, or something more "pure" (i.e., labor intensive) like that.

So "clean food," light-colored, ostentatiously healthful restaurants are winning out, as are places that feel communal: You walk in and sit at a big table with people you don't know. Maybe you don't actually strike up a conversation, but at least you feel like you aren't alone. (Except if everyone else is having a great time and you're poking at your oatmeal.)


Communal tables are popular with older folks, too, particularly those folks willing to forgo a couple of car payments to afford a cup of soup at Le Pain Quotidien. But for young people, communal eating is not a new concept, it is just the way they expect to eat: in groups and sharing food.

And then comes the sharing of the experience of the sharing of the food. Everything is documented to the point where showing friends what you ate is almost like showing them your closet or (I'm dating myself again) your bookshelf.

So if you wonder who the Gen Z kids are and what are they bringing to the table (as it were), it is: organic ingredients, hyper-customized entrees, lots of sharing each other's food without getting (visibly) annoyed about it, and phones busy every step of the way, from finding the restaurant to videoing the very last drop of sriracha dipping sauce.

This generation may still be too young to earn a living. But the way they're going, they better start soon.

In memory of Dervish Luzha, the holy man

The least we can do for a man like Dervish Luzha, who has left undelible traces in the memory and the consciousness of the Albanians from Malësia to Tropoja, from Rrafshi i Dukagjinit to Rugova all the way up to Kaçanik, as well as in Puka, Has and Mirdita, is to honor his name and tell the young generations about him.


In this context I would like to share a personal story that has been meaningful to me.

Not long after the fall of communism in Albania, in company of my mother, I returned to the country of my birth. It was September 1992, 41 years after my family had left in search of freedom and a better life in the west.

In Tirana, I met my brother Sahit. We spent one week with relatives in Tirana, before travelling to my birthplace in Luzha in the north. During my sojourn there, I visited every day with my brother the tomb of Dervish Luzha.

One evening we stood there until very late. That night would change my life. It was about 5 a.m. when I woke and I felt as if I was living a dream. I heard a voice telling me: "Your way is clear, do something about the children!"

My brother sensed my reaction and turned to ask me about what had happened. "I didn't see anyone or any image," I replied, "however, I distinctly

heard a voice saying: do something about the children." From that moment, I felt very much relieved as if a heavy weight had been lifted off my shoulders.

My brother told me that we had to go again to the tomb of Dervish Luzha. That is what we did... I felt a different man after that night and a growing sense of courage self-belief in me.

What was that voice and where did it come from? I believed it came from the tyrbe (tomb dedicated to dervishes) of Dervish Luzha.

A few days later, I travelled with Brahë Ali Gegëhyseni to purchase a photograph in the town of Bajram Curri. He gave me a small photo of Dervish Luzha and I took it with me to Tirana. I was again accompanied by Brahë Ali Gegëhyseni and Fadil Furriku and we met with a talented artist, a painter. I asked him whether he could enlarge the photo and use the color that Dervisha Luzha so much admired. He loved the season of spring and the green color that came with it.

"The spring resembles the birth of man, the blossom of a flower, the start of life...," he used to say. The artist worked the whole day and produced a large photo in color.

Three months later, after I returned to America, I met with Hasan Gashi and some other teachers who had opened an Albanian school in the Bronx. They asked for my help to convince the authorities in the Bronx borough so that one of the local public schools could offer a classroom free of charge, to hold classes in the Albanian language.

So, together with Hasan Gashi, Shaqir Gjonbalaj, Dervish Ramë Çelaj, Martin Papovic, Father Pjetër Popaj and Mark Shkreli, we went to the office of District 10 Superintendent John Reehill who was very sympathetic to our request and the Albanian school began its work in the Bronx in a classroom provided for free.

Meanwhile, I intended to start a foundation named for Dervish Luzha, with the purpose of supporting the school, but my father Ali Alia convinced me against it. "Never mix school with religion or politics," he wisely advised.

It is important to remember again how natural and easy it had suddenly become for me to engage in these efforts in the service of my nation and my community since that dream episode back in the place of my birth.

Suddenly I was filled with trust in my efforts and belief in the victory of our causes.

In 1993, I went on to found the Foundation of the Albanian American Society, which has been very active for many years and has played an important role in the life of the Albanian community here in the United States, in New York and beyond.

Twice during 2000 and 2001, the mayor of New York City, Rudolph Giuliani presented our foundation with special proclamations declaring November 28th as the Day of the Albanians in New York. Another highlight of our cooperation with Councilman Vacca was naming a street in the Bronx, as 'Mother Teresa Way', a beautiful gesture in honor of the famous Albanian saint and Nobel Prize winner.

Besides Councilman Vacca, Dervish Luzha was honored by Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr., Council members Ritchie Torres and Andrew Cohen.

My engagement in all these activities and in many others has been inspired and encouraged by the life and work of Dervish Luzha.

Interestingly, I have met this great personality only once, when I was only three years old. I still remember it. He came to our house, held me on his lap and gave me an apple.

Dervish Luzha was a great humanitarian, patriot, prescient man and prophet from whom I and many others like me have found the strength and the audacity to do great deeds for the Albanians.

The reality of the persecution of Christians is an issue that continues to be neglected.

The U.S. State Department has outlined an example of the persecution of Christians in its International Religious Freedom Report: "In Mosul, Iraq and nearby towns, shortly after the takeover of the area by militants of the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL). Christians who had been given the choice to convert, pay a ruinous tax, or die, gathered their families and what few possessions they could carry, and sought all possible means to escape. Their community, having been a part of the rich culture and history of this city for more than a thousand years, was being threatened...[by] ISIL's brutal persecution, which has targeted all those, including religious and ethnic minorities, who oppose or do not fit in with ISIL's ideological vision and its categorical and violent opposition to religious freedom.'

The Open Doors organization notes that: "The most rapidly growing areas of persecution are in the Middle East, Africa, and Central Asia.

"Islamic extremist self-

styled caliphates have ex- hostilities in 2014 "

panded their sphere of operation across international borders.

"Governments became more fearful of Islamic extremism and responded by either (a) boosting nationalism as a counter-force or (b) tightening regulations and increasing surveillance over all religious expression.

"Muslims throughout the world are becoming more Islamic out of fear that extremism may take over their areas and that sleeper cells may awake.

"More states are lawless, with minorities suffering at the hands of violent groups."

A Pew study found that there has been a "rise in religion-related terrorism... Of the 198 countries included in the study, 24% had high or very high levels of government restriction in 2014...Although only about a quarter of the countries included in the study fall into the most religiously restrictive categories, some of the most restrictive countries (such as Indonesia and Pakistan) are very populous. As a result, roughly three-quarters of the world's 7.2 billion people (74%) were living in countries with high or very high restrictions or



The report found that there was a "marked increase in the number of countries that experienced religion-related terrorist activities carried out by such groups as Boko Haram. al-Qaida and the Islamic State. Of the nearly 200 countries and territories included in the study, 82 (41%) had religion-related terrorist activities in 2014, up from 73 (37%) in 2013... in 60 countries, religion-related terrorism led to injuries or deaths, including at least 50 casualties in each of 28 countries. Casualties from religion-related terrorist activities have been rising in recent years...Looking at the overall level of restrictions in 2014 whether resulting from government policies and actions or from hostile acts by private individuals, organizations or social groups - the new study finds that restrictions were high or very high in 34% of countries...Christians were harassed in 108 countries in 2014, up from 102 in 2013."

Christians are extremely

endangered throughout the Islamic world. The Obama Administration's bizarre refusal to admit them in any more than a minisue token number, while disproportionately welcoming Islamic refugees, raises numerous questions.

According to National Review "The gross underrepresentation of the non-Muslim communities in the numbers of Syrian refugees into the U.S. is reflected year after year in the State Department's public records. They show, for example, that while Syria's largest non-Muslim group — Christians of the various Catholic. Orthodox, and Protestant traditions — constituted 10 percent of Syria's population before the war, they are only 2.6 percent of the 2,003 Syrian refugees that the United States has accepted since then. Syria's Christian population, which before the war numbered 2 million, has since 2011 been decimated in what Pope Francis described as religious "genocide."

The percent of Christian Syrian refugees admitted to the U.S. is dwindling even further. A CNSstudy report found that "The number of Syrian refugees admitted into the United States jumped to 1,037 during May – an increase of 130 percent over the previous month - but the proportion of Christians among them remains miniscule: two Christians (0.19 percent) compared to 1,035 Muslims. May's figure of 1.037 Syrian refugees brings the total number since the beginning of 2016 to 2,099 - compared to 2,192 for the whole of 2015, according to State Department Refugee Processing Center data...Of the 2,099 Syrian refugees admitted so far this year. six (0.28 percent) are Christians, 2,043 (97.3 percent) are Sunni Muslims. The remaining 50 are 17 (0.8 percent) Shi'a, 30 (1.4 percent) other Muslims and 10 (0.47 percent) Yazidis."

The facts raise serious questions for the Obama Administration. It has not been favorable towards the current al-Sisi government in Egypt, for example that has sought to stop oppressive acts against Christians, but the White House was supportive of the former regime of Mohamed Morsi, a member of the radical Muslim Brotherhood, which increased anti-Christian persecution.

In Orlando, where 49 human beings who were slaughtered for being LGBTQ and Latino by a disturbed self conflicted individual done in the name of ISIS. Two African American men who were killed by police officers in Louisiana and Minnesota captured on live social media sparking nation-wide protests. And now, five members of Dallas law enforcement who were murdered while protecting and serving at a peaceful rally.

Lorne Ahrens, 48, who had been with the department since 2002; PD Officer Michael Krol, 40, who had been with the department since 2007; PD Officer Patrick Zamarripa, 32, a Navy sailor and Iraq War veteran who had been with the department since 2011; and DART Officer Brent Thompson, 43, a former Marine[who had been with the department since 2009. Thompson was the first DART officer to be killed in the line of duty since the department's inception in 1989.

The deaths of five officers in the shooting made this the deadliest single incident for police officers in the United States since the September 11 attacks, surpassing two 2009 shootings in Lakewood, WA, and Oakland, CA, where four officers each were killed.

On Tuesda, June 28, I was thrilled to attend the gala evening honoring this year's recipients of the Bronx Times Reporter's 25 Bronx Influential Women Award. Being honored this year was especially wonderful after a somewhat tumultuous year, personally. But as I said in my speech, from change comes new beginnings. It was wonderful to hear everyone else's speech and learn about their stories.

Having my cousin Debra Arles also being honored this year was great and three of our nieces were able to attend the event to see what their crazy aunts are up to. Extra special was the fact that my table was filled with some of my Locust Point Civic Association cohorts, the people who made all those hours of work on the LPCA board fun and worthwhile. Plus, some very special friends attended, people that truly inspire me with all of the things they do in our community. My BFF was there with one of my cousins and most important, my husband was there too. Many people have heard that he exists but he is an elusive one.

Speaking of tumult, the last minute change of venue for the Locust Point CSA was somewhat panic inducing. I knew it would cause some members to not return (it did), but in the end, we got plenty of new members to make up for those who dropped out. Having the CSA at my house is ac-

tually easier for me and my wonderful neighbors have all been incredibly supportive of the mad rush on Monday eve-Our members have nings. been respectful as well, nobody has been double parking or blocking driveways. Some of our neighbors have stopped by during set up and distribution to ask what we're doing. We always have extras, so I have been 'spreading the love' with random bags of vegetables left on front stoops in the morning.

We had a juice tasting from a small Vermont business called 'Purify Juice Company'. Patrick, one of the owners, brought a large cooler filled with cases of four of his Our members were inices. able to sample all of the flavors and by the end of the evening Patrick had sold out. Three of our members are single men and they spent the whole night chatting under our tent, helping with moving empty crates and just generally enjoying the evening. Even the rain shower did not deter our crowd; we moved the table under the tent and continued doling out samples of the four inices

The week before, we had escarole in our shares. This is a delicious green, a little bitter though and not one I like to eat raw in a salad. It can be sautéed in oil and garlic, but my husband is not a fan of the sautéed green and with all the salad we've eating, I don't need any more greens in my diet right now. And so I de-



cided to make a big batch of escarole and white bean soup with the head I got from my share, plus the two that were leftover in the extras bin. It's in season and if you see it in the farmer's market give it a try. If you have borage growing in your backyard, my new neighbors, who are northern Italian, told me you can use borage the same way you use escarole. I have it growing in copious amounts in my backyard; I'm thinking of giving it a try with the last bag of beans and the last jar of stock I have left.

I didn't have cannellini beans, but I had a one pound bag of organic heirloom beans that were white with a touch of tan, so I decided to use them. I soaked them overnight in water, drained them and put them in a large enamel pot. I added fresh water to cover by two inches and turned the heat to high. Once the pot was boiling I lowered the heat to a simmer and let the beans cook for an hour. At this point, you can add a bay leaf or two, but do not add salt. The cooking time for the beans I use is pretty short and if you are using standard grocery store beans you may need to cook the beans longer. I'm using dried beans that were harvested in fall of 2015. Many typical grocerv store dried beans can be a year or two old by the time you use them. This will extend the cooking time.

Once the beans are cooked, drain them in a colander and set them aside in a bowl. Some people will make their soup utilizing the cooking liquid from the beans. I find that this practice can cause the excessive gas that some people experience when eating beans, similar to when you don't drain canned beans of their packing liquid. If this is a problem for you, I recommend you try this method.

Trim and clean the escarole using a colander or a salad spinner. Chop the leaves to one or two inch pieces. A few rinses will do, this can be a gritty green. Using the same large enameled pot, add ¼ cup of oil and a ¹/₄ cup of butter (remember, I'm using three heads of escarole, cut the oil and butter to 1 tablespoon each if you're making it with one head) to the pot and turn the heat to medium high. Add three cloves of garlic, chopped fine (again, reduce for a single batch). You can also use your garlic scapes here instead. When garlic is light gold, start adding the escarole in large handfuls to the pot, stirring to get the leaves covered in oil and butter and to get them to start wilting. After each handful, add a pinch of salt, this helps keep the escarole green while it cooks. Once the escarole has all been added to the pot and tossed about, add one quart of chicken stock

and one quart of water. I used my homemade chicken stock, which is loaded with flavor and can handle being diluted. Turn up the heat to high and bring the liquid to a boil.

When it's bubbling, add half of the reserved beans. Using a potato masher, mash the rest of the beans and add that to the soup. The secret ingredient to this soup is the rind from a piece of imported Parmaggiano Reggiano cheese. I got mine from Pastosa on Tremont Avenue. Add piece of rind to the soup and turn the heat to a low simmer. Cook for 45 minutes. Taste and season with salt, freshly ground black pepper and red pepper to taste. Serve with a splash of very good olive oil and a piece or two of crostini.

Needless to say, with a heat wave going on, escarole soup and white bean soup may not be on the menu for you, but we did manage to have a small bowl on Saturday night. The rest of it was put in three containers and placed in the freezer for a few winter meals. You can replicate this recipe quickly by using one head of escarole and a can of low sodium or organic cannellini beans, plus a quart of undiluted stock. But if you can get a hold of a rind of cheese, it will make all the difference. Plus, in the middle of the winter, you will have something to remind you to sign up for your 2017 CSA share.

So get your cook on! And be the change you want to see in the world.

clear that CB 10 needs to be more proactive when a group home is sited in the board.

He wants to bring together the communities affected, service providers and group home clients and their families to foster greater understanding when OPWDD facilities plan on locating in CB 10.

"In OPWDD type cases, what I would like to see in that 40-day period is that the providers working with us and the community to explain themselves and get to know (us), and to interact with people who will be in close proximity," said the chairman, adding that just scheduling a public hearing is not doing enough.

Stronger dialogue would be helpful in preventing tension in a community that feels as if something is being forced on them.

Speaking for the board, Prince said that the developmentally disabled are citizens of the community.

He added that while there may be objections that the group home clients do not come specifically from CB 10, he

believes there is need for developmentally disabled services in the board and borough.

Opposition to all group homes will make it harder for the community to request services when they are needed or to attract top-notch operators, he said.

Nevertheless, opposition to the Graff Avenue site remains among neighbors, a group of which attended CB 10's Thursday, June 16 meeting and voiced their opposition.

Graff Avenue neighbor Sonia Capifali believes that the purchase price for the property, \$600,000 according to SUS, is way above fair market value for the home.

"From a taxpayer standpoint, [the house] is just not worth the money,' she said. "It is not a good use of taxpayer money."

Neighbor Foti Bouklis believes the operator should seek a more commercial area for its facility.

He is also concerned about traffic congestion and safety in the residential area, and said that he believes the purchase price is very high.

SUS is determined to exercise its right to a commissioner's hearing un-

der the Padavan Law, said Louis Cavaliere, SUS executive vice president for developmental disability services, in a statement in response to several questions from the Bronx Times.

The service provider doesn't plan on further dialogue with the community on the matter, the statement said,

adding that the community was entitled to voice its opinions.

SUS has already attended two public hearings and answered all questions posed to them, Cavaliere said.

"It is now up to the OPWDD commissioner to decide what happens next," he stated.

at an early age, with his parents barely in the picture.'

Melillo, who said he was unsure of what drug Morello took to overdose, added that another former P.S. 83 classmate of his, Muhammad Ahmin, also overdosed on drugs two months ago after ingesting Xanax followed by alcohol, which led to seizures and ultimately led to his death.

"It's a tough situation to be in - to be young and have a tough home life where the parents are barely involved. As we have seen, the consequences can be drastic," he said.

Due to the increasing concern in the area, these incidents have caused residents to get proactive in searching for the drug dealers in the neighborhood who were responsible for these deaths.

"These incidents are very concerning to our community - and something needs to be done about it," said Al D'Angelo, first vice-president of the Morris Park Community Association, who said that Loreto Park has been a drug scene for years, including minors smoking marijuana and drinking alcohol in the park.

"Our main task here and now is catching the 'small fish' who will lead us to the 'big fish' - and we know who these dealers are. It's important that we continue to work closely with the 49th Precinct so we catch them and save our community," D'angelo said.

Posters and flyers were displayed throughout the neighborhood in the aftermath of the deaths, which gave information on several drug dealers believed to be responsible for the distribution of heroin and other drugs in the community.

One flyer read that a potential suspect lives on Van Nest Avenue and that "he is to blame - and needs to be wiped out of the community forever." The flyers were later removed by the 49th Precinct.

"I am very disturbed by these incidents that have occurred - it's bringing down the community with every incident," said Tony Signorile, president of the Morris Park Community Association, who added that he believes that a local resident across the street from P.S. 83 has been selling drugs from their first floor window.

"I encourage anybody with information to reach out to us so we can work with the 49th Precinct in catching those who have triggered these incidents."

"It's devastating that lives were taken from us because of heroin addiction," said Senator Jeff Klein. "Tragically, in every corner of our state, heroin and opioid addictions are destroying lives," Klein added.

A spokesperson for the 49th Precinct said, "the precinct is looking to ascertain some leads to identify the individuals distributing these drugs.'

On Saturday, July 9, a prayer vigil and impromptu memorial ceremony

where family members, friends and community members gathered to pay their respects.

A poster board with pictures, messages, flowers and balloons were placed on one of the park's fences. as well as over 100 candles, which were arranged under the poster board.

The rate of unintentional overdoses in the Bronx decreased by 39%, from 20 deaths per 100,000 residents in 2006 to 12.3 deaths in 2010.

Since 2010, rates of unintentional drug overdoses in the Bronx increased to 15 deaths in 2013, according to DOH.

In 2013, heroin was the most common drug involved in overdose deaths and contributed to 58% percent of overdose deaths among Bronx residents, according to DOH.

DROWSY DRIVING CAN BE AS DANGEROUS AS DRIVING IMPAIRED

The public is well educated about the dangers of driving while impaired by medication, alcohol or illegal drugs. But drivers may not be aware that driving while tired can be just as dangerous.

Driving when tired can be a fatal mistake. Just as alcohol or drugs can slow down reaction time, impair judgment and increase the risk of accident, so, too, can being tired behind the wheel. Drowsy driving is reportedly what caused the fatal crash in June 2014 between a limousine and a Walmart truck that ended the life of comic James McNair and seriously injured fellow comedian Tracy Morgan. The driver, Kevin Roper, was going 20 miles over the speed limit and was almost at his drive time limit, according to preliminary reports by the National Transporta-

tion Safety Board. According to the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, about 100,000 car crashes in the United States each year occur as the result of an overly tired driver. Various studies demonstrate that drivers who have remained awake for 18 hours prior to driving mimic the driving performance of intoxicated motorists. In fact, drowsy driving can be confused with driving with a high blood alcohol content.

Sleepiness can arise relatively quickly, and according to Thomas Balkin, PhD, director of the behavioral biology program at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research and a leading expert on sleep and fatigue, it's difficult for drivers to assess just how sleepy they are. "Sleepiness affects the

"Sleepiness affects the part of the brain responsible for judgment and self-awareness," he says. "When you've reached the stage where you are fighting sleep, the effect of any method of reviving yourself can be very short-lived."

Furthermore, people do not have to be in a deep sleep to actually be asleep behind the wheel. Micro-sleeps occur when certain brain cells temporarily shut down for a few seconds. A person is not completely asleep but in a sort of fog as if they are asleep.

When sleepiness sets in, the best course of action is to pull off the road. Opening the window, turning on the radio or blasting cold air is, at best, only a temporary solution. If driving with passengers and feelings of sleepiness appear, hand the keys over to a passenger and have them take over driving, if possible. Otherwise, a short nap and a cup of coffee can be used in combination to increase alertness. It's also a good idea to avoid beginning a long

avoid beginning a long road trip in mid-afternoon around the hours of two or three o'clock. While alertness generally dips in the evening hours, due to the circadian rhythm, alertness also dips in the late afternoon, prompting drowsiness. A 2010 study by the American Automobile Association Foundation for Traffic Safety found that as many drivers reported falling asleep at the wheel in the afternoon hours as reported falling asleep late at night. Driving in a warm, quiet car also may spur drowsiness, as would driving after a heavy meal.

Driving tired is just as dangerous as other impaired driving. Slow reaction times and unawareness of surroundings can contribute to accidents that are otherwise avoidable.

"Consumers must also question the legitimacy of vague classifieds because they too could be a scam. Before responding to an ad, consumers should verify the source of all information & always be wary about sending money or signing a contract with an unknown party."



Will Savage is a thinker and, more often than not, he finds himself thinking about baseball.

The former Fieldston star, who was picked by the Detroit Tigers with the 475th selection in the MLB Draft earlier this year, is settling into his life as a pro ball player, hitting his stride with the Connecticut Tigers in the New York-Penn League.

It's been a whirlwind, jampacked with games and buses and different stadiums, but it's also given Savage plenty to think about. He thinks he likes it all.

"It's an adjustment, but it's definitely been a good time so far," Savage said. "I was hoping to be assigned to Connecticut because I knew it was a good league and it's a nice spot - close to home. So I definitely was excited to be coming back up here after being down in Florida for about a week."

Of course, Savage's reputation as a thinker goes bevond baseball.

After a standout high school career at Fieldston, the Bronx native stayed close to home, heading to Columbia University where he studied biology.

It was always a tough line to walk - between academics and athletics - but one that Savage was able to tread.

"It's definitely been challenging to do both," he said. "Academics and athletics are never easy together. But I enjoy doing both and I've really enjoyed going to school and being able to play. It's just always about getting better."

Savage certainly did get better during his three years with the Lions. A Louisville Slugger All-American at second base during his freshman season, Savage established himself as one of the best hitters in the Ivy League and wrapped up 2016 with a

Fordham Prep star running towards next challenge

It all started with Conor Lundy's grandfather.

Then it was his mother. Then his older brother. They all ran. They ran fast, they ran for miles, they ran and they won.

It was enough to inspire Lundy to run as well.

Now, the former Fordham Prep star, who graduated from the school a few weeks ago, is running towards his next goal, preparing for his college career at Princeton this fall.

He's also picking up a few more accolades along the way. Lundy earned his ninth All-American honor earlier this month after being named to the US All-American team in the two mile run.

"It's just a reflection of all the hard work and support I've had over the last four years in high school," Lundy said. "I couldn't be more grateful. I know it's a pretty great accomplishment, but it's not just me, it's all the great support from my family and my coaches and my school."

Lundy's four years at Fordham Prep were nothing short of dominant, but the standout credits his family for success.

"(My brother) ran at Fordham Prep and he's always been kind of a big role model for me," Lundy said. "He's 11 years older than me so when I was a little kid, he was having a lot of success."

"He won the Millrose Games when he was at Fordham Prep like four years in a row. I remember going to that and sitting at Madison Square Garden just thinking I wanted to do the same thing. I wanted to be a part of that success."

Lundy succeeded and then some. In addition to his nine All-Americans, he wrapped up his high school career with a second-place finish in the the boys NYS Federation 1,600 and a fifth-place showing in the two mile at the Brooks PR Invitational.

Now, however, he's ready for the next challenge.

Lundy will head to Colorado later this month, working out with some of his future Princeton teammates before the cross country season gets underway in the fall.

He's admittedly a bit nervous at running with a new squad, but Lundy is also determined to prove himself.

After all, that's why he runs in the first place – to prove something.

"The thing about running is it's so tangible," he said. "I've always been a competitive person and I'm willing to work hard to achieve what I want. I think running really allows for that because you're going to see the results from the work you put in."

Lundy isn't worried about the future holds.

He's well aware of the expectations around him and he knows that it won't be easy to balance academics with athletics. This is, after all, the Ivy Leagues. But he's also certain that his four years at Fordham Prep have helped prepare him for both sides of his soon-to-be college career.

Lundy isn't looking too far ahead. He knows that staring down the finish line will only result in him tripping over his own feet, but he still has plenty of goals he wants to accomplish.

He's going to take on Princeton first and then, he's ready to run towards everything else.

"I don't want to look too much into the future because I don't want to get in over my head or anything," he said. "But I think if I work day in and day out and continue to improve, then I think, as cliche as it sounds, the sky's the limit."

Natlie Martinez can't stop looking at the pictures.

She finds herself staring at them in her downtime, double and triple checking her social media profiles to rehash memories that will stick with her for the rest of her life.

The Fordham volleyball standout isn't sure she'll ever be able to stop. And she's not particularly sure she wants to.

After all, when a trip changes your life, you tend to want to remember every single detail of it.

Martinez competed with the USA Athletes International team in the Bavaria to the Beach Volleyball Tour last month, one of 10 players from around the country who made up the squad.

The trip took Martinez and her teammates from German to Austria to Italy, competing against some of the top talent in the world and showcasing the excitement of volleyball.

It's a trip Martinez isn't only thankful for, but one she knows she won't ever forget.

"I'd never been to Europe on my own," Martinez said. "So the opportunity to get to travel was really cool for sure. A couple of the upper-classmen had the opportunity to do it, but I thought that was a like one-time thing. So to have the chance to also go was definitely really cool."

Martinez, who grew up in Palmdale, California, has been playing volleyball for as long as she can remember and she's the first to admit that she feels more comfortable on the court than just about anywhere else.

That's why she was so anxious to join USAAI team. This was a once-ina-lifetime opportunity, giving her the chance to, not only see the world, but compete internationally. Aside from the Olympics, there aren't many other opportunities for athletes to play at such a high level.

"I think Austria gave us the hard-

est time," said Martinez, who actually played out-of-position while in Europe. "We did come out undefeated, but Austria's teams were definitely by far the strongest. It was definitely a challenge because every team and every country played differently."

Of course, while her focus was on the game, Martinez made sure she also experienced Europe during the nine-day tour. She had plenty of time to explore the cities and the cultures around her and Martinez didn't waste a single moment.

"They gave us a lot of time for that, I was actually surprised," Martinez said. "We had a couple of days that was just exploring actually. I loved Austria. It looked like something out of a fairy tale."

Martinez is a competitor through and thorugh, but for the first time in her career, she walked away from the game without focusing on the final score.

Instead, she realized that, at least in this instance, volleyball wasn't about who won or who lost, but, rather, who she met because of it.

She didn't have the same experiences off the court as the players she was comepting against. She didn't even speak the same language. But, in the end, the only thing they had in common was the thing that mattered most of all. They loved the sport.

It was an eye-opening revelation for Martinez, one that she knows has already helped refuel her dedication to volleyball and one, she hopes, will help spark her game at Fordham this year.

"It was really important to me," Martinez said. "You could tell how hospitable the other teams were and how excited they were to play against us. Everyone on our team had something to bring to the table, but when you put us all together I think we did a great job of representing Division I and Division III collegiate athletics."
