FIRST HEARING FOR 49TH CO

Residents show support for Keith Walton

Keith Walton, deputy inspector of the 49th Precinct, had his first hearing on Thursday, December 1 in a case stemming from the alleged sexual abuse of a subordinate.

According to a complaint, on November 6 Walton allegedly grabbed a female officer by the hair, attempted to kiss her, put his hand on her groin area and attempted to put her hand on his genitals over his clothes.

Walton is currently suspended without pay.

He was charged with two counts of sexual abuse, in addition to forcible touching, harassment and official misconduct. One of those counts is a felony charge.

In Walton's absence, Captain Thomas Alps has stepped in as commanding officer for the precinct.

Alps, a former member of the NYPD Intelligence Division and Counter Terrorism Bureau, recently told the Bronx Times, "My philosophy has long been intelligencebased policing."

"So in listening to the community and their issues we will be able to not only address the issues they have but utilize their assistance in solving crimes," he continued.

At the hearing, which took place in the Bronx Hall of Justice, Walton supporters held up signs reading 'America: Innocent Until Proven Guilty' and 'Keith Walton: Trailblazer, Innovator, Innocent.'

Raphael Schweizer, a community advocate who has been very vocal in his support of Walton, said it is important for Walton and others to see the support for the deputy inspector.

"Look it makes a difference in the public eye when the news media covers it and there's a big group of people supporting Keith Walton," said Schweizer. "Yes, we have to keep Keith Walton motivated and he has to see that people support him."

Schweizer believes Walton is innocent and also believes there is an ongoing attempt to sully Walton's name.

Morris Park gets holiday lights after all

Just when it looked like there might not be holiday lights in Morris Park this year, the community rallied together and got them installed.

The Morris Park Community Association reversed course on Thursday, December 1 after being encouraged to continue its fundraising drive for the holiday tradition, according to MPCA board members.

The MPCA had suspended its efforts the day before because merchants weren't responding in sufficient numbers to cover the cost of the

lights, said Tony Singorile, of the many." MPCA president.

Over the past two years, the community association has had to reach into its own coffers to cover shortfalls in the roughly \$17,000 yearly effort, he said.

The MPCA got back into the holiday spirit after Assemblyman Mark Gjonaj implored them to continue the drive. and offered his own financial help.

"The fundraising for the lights is going to continue," said Gjonaj. "We need business owners to come forward and participate in this; it is always the few who do the work

The assemblyman said that he personally called New York Christmas, a lighting company in Hunts Point and explained that he, the community and other elected officials did not want Morris Park to be in the dark this holiday season.

"This is a huge win for the community," said Gjonaj. "The children don't know where the lights come from. They are just happy the lights are up again."

After more donations came in, the MPCA was able to

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DOT to address Brush Ave. traffic

An industrial area in Throggs Neck will receive road improvements to alleviate rush hour traffic jams.

The improvements will be implemented at Brush Avenue, the location of numerous manufacturing and retail facilities, which has seen increased traffic congestion over the years.

Brush Avenue, a twoway street that runs north to south, parallel to Westchester Creek, will soon have an additional lane travelling north bound to give vehicles, especially trucks and buses, more room to maneuver.

Brush Avenue will have three lanes going northbound, including a dedicated bus lane. NYC Department of Transportation will shift the centerline on Brush Avenue, which will create the space for a left turn only bay.

According to a DOT study, 84% of the northbound traffic on Brush Avenue turns left onto Bruckner Boulevard.

The bus lane would also ease traffic congestion for the Q44-SBS, which runs on the avenue. A bike lane is also expected to be implemented on the northbound side of the street.

In addition, 'No Standing Anytime' signs will be installed on the northbound side of Brush Avenue, to deter food and drink vendors from setting up shop and further worsening the traffic issue.

It is unknown how many parking spaces will be eliminated to make room for the additional lanes.

The industrial strip is home to Home Depot, Cablevision, Pespi, Grocery Haulers, Caterpillar and UPS, along with new Throggs Neck Shopping Center.

"When you know you are traveling through Brush Avenue, especially during morning and evening rush hours, you always have to plan accordingly," said JoAnn Sohmers, president of the Ferry Point Civic Association, who said that she sometimes sets aside an extra hour in her commute to prepare for the traffic on Brush Avenue. "This has been an issue for years and I'm pleased that something is being done about it."

Sohmers added that she hopes there will be a solution for pedestrian as well. Most of Brush Avenue lacks sidewalks.

"It is impossible to get out of Brush Avenue - especially during rush hour, when cars, trucks and buses are all traveling in the same direction," said Tom Accomando, acting chairman for the Municipal Services Committee and Community Board 10 member, who also said that he frequently uses Ring Road, an isolated road which runs southbound, under the Whitesone Bridge through Ferry Point Park, to avoid the traffic congestion.

"It would have been nice to have these changes and improvements completed before the holidays, but I am thrilled that a plan is in place to address this long-pressing traffic issue," Accomando said. "With this plan, it will be easier to access the bridges and the Cross Bronx Expressway."

The project stems from the Community Board 10's 2015 budget requests, after a Brush




Construction on Brush Avenue, including the left turn onto Brush Avenue, will begin in the spring. Community News Group / Steven Goodstein

Avenue plan was submitted to the DOT, before the plan was approved, Accomando said.

"What concerns me most with these changes is the left turns," said Dotti Poggi, a member of the Ferry Point Community Advocates. "Unless wide safety zones are implemented, trucks will almost always be forced to merge into another lane or even oncoming traffic to make a turn, which would cause more traffic congestion and safety hazards."

DOT expects to begin the construction in the spring, to avoid the harsh winter weather conditions.

Murphy's 9/11 Firefighter scholarship to continue

A memorial scholarship fund for a deceased FDNY lieutenant will continue to give 15 years after 9/11.

The Lt. Raymond E. Murphy Memorial Scholarship Fund will award \$45,000 a year to students at three Bronx and Westchester schools for the foreseeable future, fund coordinators said.

However, the scholarship fund will no longer hold its major fundraising vehicle, the annual golf outing, said Edward Murphy, a brother of Lieutenant Murphy and a fund coordinator.

The golf event was held annually, most recently this past July at Blue Hill Golf Course in Pearl River, NY.

A couple of hundred people attended the outing every year. It featured a breakfast, cocktail hour, dinner and raffles, said Edward Murphy.

"It turned into what I am told was the premiere golf outing in the area," he said. "Since the committee is getting older, and it was a lot of work for everybody, we decided to call it after 15 years."

Lt. Murphy's widow Linda Murphy, also a fund coordinator, will continue to donate \$15,000 per year to each of the schools her children attended: St. Frances de Chantal, Iona Prep High School and Archbishop Stepinac, he said.

Each \$15,000 school scholarship is split two ways: \$7,500 for financial assistance to children of firefighters or emergency personnel, while the other \$7,500 goes to general tuition assistance funds, said Edward Murphy.

For Linda Murphy, the scholarship is a way to honor her husband, as well as a way to give back to the community.

"After 9/11, when my husband died, everyone was so generous to us and my family," she said. "(The fund is) just a ltraymurphy.org.

way to pay that back and honor my husband's memory."

Linda Murphy said that she wanted to have an academic scholarship because her children's education was so important to her husband.

Awards will continue to be given at graduation ceremonies at the earmarked schools every May and June, she said.

Edward Murphy said that different future fundraisers will fund the scholarship for the next 20 to 25 years.

Raymond Murphy spent much of his FDNY career at Engine 42 on Monroe Avenue, his brother said.

After his promotion to lieutenant, he was transferred to Ladder Company 16 in Manhattan.

The day of September 11th, Lieutenant Murphy was assisting in the removal of injured people, including a firefighter, after the collapse of the World Trade Center's south tower.

After removing injured people to an ambulance staging area, Murphy and another firefighter went back to the horrific scene.

Shortly thereafter, a general evacuation of the area near the North Tower was called, and the building collapsed.

Murphy's body was returned on October 1, 2001.

The lieutenant's brother said that merchants and restaurants in Throggs Neck have been gracious enough to support the golf outing over the years, and fund coordinators are thankful.

His wife is especially thankful for the FDNY, their firehouses and personnel. They all made the golf outing a success year after year, she said.

Composting takes off at Lehman

Don't throw away that old lettuce in the back of your fridge. Repurpose it by bringing it to Lehman's Food Scrap Drop Off location on Mondays from 8 to 10 a.m. The initiative is a joint project of the NYC Compost Project and Lehman College Campus Sustainability Council This program is open to all.

Since late 2009, the on-site Rocket Composter has been used to process approximately 120 pounds of food waste produced each day from food preparation at the College. Additionally, the College has a food pulper that extracts moisture from food, and chops it into small pieces, thereby doubling the amount that can than be processed by the composter.

All scraps dropped off at the college will be turned into compost and used throughout the Bronx, at Lehman, in community gardens, or even as part of a compost giveaway in the spring so individuals can bring nutrients to their own flower or garden plots. Donations will not only lessen the city's environmental impact but will help nurture the natural plant life that we enjoy.

Under HPD's Mixed Income Program: Mix and Match, sponsors purchase City-owned or privately owned land or vacant buildings and construct multifamily buildings in order to create affordable rental housing units with a range of affordability in which half of the units are affordable to low income households earning up to 60 percent of the Area Median Income ("AMI") and the remaining units are affordable to other low income households. Construction and permanent financing is provided through loans from private institutional lenders and from public sources including HPD, the New York City Housing Development Corporation, the State of New York, and the federal government. Additional funding may also be provided from the syndication of low-income housing tax credits.

Under the proposed project, the City will sell the Disposition Area to Bronx Commons Housing Development Fund Corporation ("Sponsor") for the nominal price of one dollar per tax lot, and Sponsor will convey beneficial ownership to Bronx Commons LLC (the "LLC") (the Sponsor and the LLC are collectively known as "Owner"). The Sponsor will also deliver an enforcement note and mortgage for the remainder of the appraised value ("Land Debt"). The Owner will then construct one building containing a total of approximately 304 rental dwelling units, plus one unit for a superintendent, approximately 23,143 square feet of commercial space and approximately 16,802 square feet of community facility space on the Disposition Area

The Owner will enter into a 40 year regulatory agreement providing that not less than 60% of the units will be rented to households whose incomes are between 30% and 60% of AMI, unlike a standard Mix and Match project in which 50% of the units are rented to households with this income level. A portion of the units will be rented to households earning up to 30% of AMI, 50% of AMI and 60% of AMI, with at least 10% of the units rented to households whose incomes does not exceed 30% of AMI. For a term not to exceed 30 years, up to 5% of the units will be set aside for homeless families with incomes up to 30% area median income (AMI) and their rents will be set at 30% of 30% of AMI for a period of not less than 30 years. For the remaining 10 years of the regulatory term these units will no longer be set aside for homeless families, however, they will remain affordable for families with incomes up to 30% of AMI and their rents will be set at 30% of 30% of AMI. Up to 40% of the units will be rented to families and individuals whose incomes are between 80% and 110% of AMI, with a portion rented to households earning up to 80% of AMI, 90% of AMI and 110% of AMI.

The Land Debt will be repayable out of resale or refinancing profits for a period of at least thirty (30) years following completion of construction. The remaining balance, if any, may be forgiven at the end of the term.

Albanian independence

(The following letter was sent to the Albanian community from Borough President Ruben, Jr.)

Congratulations on your celebration of the 104th Anniversary of the independence of Albania. The Bronx is home to the largest population of people of Albanian descent outside of Europe, and I am proud to continue to partner with this important community and your organization to rebuild and rebrand the Bronx.

The Bronx has a great connection to Albania, and we are proud of that shared heritage. With a population of over 12,000 people of Albanian descent - more than any other borough in NewYork City and the largest Albanian community in the United States. Our borough's history with the Albanian community goes back

to the 1930s, when a young Regis Philbin was growing up in the streets of Van Nest and Morris Park. Today. from Belmont to Pelham Parkway to Morris Park and everywhere in between, Albanians are helping to strengthen the core of the Bronx when it comes to our business, cultural and

non-profit communities. Since as early as my assemblyman days I have been involved with the Albanian community in the borough. Later in August of 2009, I joined together with our borough's Albanian community to honor Mother Teresa with her very own street in the Bronx, a portion of Lydig Avenue between Holland and Wallace Avenues that we now call Mother Teresa Way.

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DEP project to impact local hospitals

BY ARTHUR CUSANO

A NYC Department of Environmental Protection construction project that has caused traffic congestion just outside the Jacobi Medical Center and Albert Einstein College of Medicine will continue through fall 2018, according to city officials.

The DEP is working to replace existing sanitary and storm sewer structures in the Westchester Creek area and install upgraded water treatment equipment.

The project will also include the relocation of a gas main on Eastchester Road, installation of new traffic control devices on Eastchester Road, Morris Park Avenue and Waters Place.

During the \$22 million project, the DEP will substantially enlarge two underground regulators, or sewer junctures, under Eastchester Road to reduce the discharge of raw sewage into Westchester Creek.

In addition to work at the busy intersection, work is also being performed between Waters Place and Bassett Avenue. on the west side of Eastchester

Road and on Morris Park Avenue west of the intersection.

About 400 million gallons of sludge will be diverted to the Hunts Point Wastewater Treatment Plant annually once the project is completed, according to the DEP.


construction community liaison for the DEC, said changes to the traffic lanes and patterns at the intersection are only temporary.

"The traffic re-route on Morris Park Avenue and Eastchester Road for the Westchester Creek CSO Modifications is only through the duration of the project."

In addition to noise and dust from the construction work, area residents are also advised there will be limited parking on Eastchester Road and limited street access from some side roads.

Area residents may also experience water service interruptions, however the DEP will notify residents by 4 p.m. the day before.

Water service will be restored every day by 6 p.m.

neke said the project has been a headache for drivers since it began, and relief was not in sight any time soon.

The traffic has been a topic of discussion at CB 11 meetings.

"It's going on until 2018 and they haven't even started on Waters Place yet," Werneke said. "The backup of traffic has been horrendous."

was applauded by Councilman James Vacca.

He said his office had received regular complaints about the odor and appearance of the creek, which is located a half mile from the project, and said it had been a topic of complaint for decades.

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DA calls on Grand Jury to investigate **Danner shooting**

District Attorney Darcel Clark is requesting a grand jury to investigate the shooting death of 66-year old Deborah Danner.

Danner was shot on Tuesday, October 18 by NYPD sergeant Hugh Barry.

"I will ask the Administrative Judge of the Supreme Court to impanel a special grand jury to investigate the fatal shooting of Deborah Danner, a 66-year-old woman, in her apartment ... and to determine whether, and to what extent, criminal charges should be brought in connection with that incident," Clark said on Monday, December 5.

"I have pledged to the people of the Bronx to conduct a thorough, fair investigation into this matter and I believe that presenting the evidence to a grand jury will best accomplish that goal," Clark added. "It is important to determine exactly what happened in this tragic incident."

She also said there is "no timetable for the grand jury to be impaneled or for it to reach a determination."

Danner's death stirred controversy throughout the Bronx, the country and social media.

Police responded to a 911 call at the 630 Pugsley Avenue apartment at 6:06 pm.

They arrived at Danner's 7E apartment where she swung a pair of scissors at them.

The five officers were able to get her to put the scissors down but Danner later picked up a bat and began swinging it at them before Barry shot her.

Danner had reportedly struggled with schizophrenia.

Protesters have recently decried police treatment of people with mental hind on rent.

Following the shooting, NYPD commissioner James O'Neill said the department had "failed Danner"

Mayor de Blasio noted the officers were originally able to de-escalate the situation but wondered why they were not able to get Danner to drop the bat.

"But why the rest of the protocol wasn't followed is what we don't understand," DeBlasio added.

When dealing with a person with a history of mental illness, officers are supposed to wait for the Emergency Services Unit which is specially trained to deal with mentally-ill civilians.

Following Danner's death, the Bronx became home to a protest march on October 19 which started at her building and made it's way through Soundview to the 43rd Precinct.

The next day elected officials held a vigil to remember Danner, called for peace and requested a further look into the events surrounding Danner's shooting.

At the press conference Assemblyman Marcos Crespo called for more accountability among officers.

"We love you - we know the work you do - it's not easy and I don't envy the job you have to do" Crespo said during the vigil in a message to members of the NYPD. "But at the same time we have to be able to say to our own colleagues, 'You did the wrong thing, you weren't supposed to do that, you made us all look bad.""

Danner's death reminded some Bronxites of the 1984 shooting of 66year old Eleanor Bumpurs.

Police shot and killed Bumpurs, who had a history of mental illness, while she was waving a knife at officers.

Police were trying to help evict Bumpurs because she had fallen be-

An ambitious affordable housing project in Norwood has earned a prestigious honor.

On Monday, November 28, Webster Commons, designed by Aufgang Architects, was selected as the 2016 Project of the Year by the New York Association for Affordable Housing.

NYSAFAH annually celebrates projects demonstrating excellence in development and construction in addition to affordability and design.

Constructed by Joy Construction, Webster Commons is a 470,000 square foot project located at 3620 Webster Avenue and is comprised of 484 affordable units in five buildings ranging from nine- to 12-stories.

The complex features indoor and outdoor recreation areas, community facilities, above ground on-site parking and a universal pre-k classroom.

Aufgang's design for Webster Commons includes a combination of colored bricks, panels and various levels of setbacks and terraces along the facade.

"My colleagues and I are proud to receive this NYSAFAH award," said Ariel Aufgang, AIA, Aufgang Architects principal. "As we strive to creatively apply our experience, insights and expertise to the design of our clients' projects including both affordable and luxury commercial buildings and adaptive re-use designs, we have worked closely with NYSAFAH and its members."

Aufgang said each building in Webster Commons has its own distinctive stylistic approach.

This is a welcomed departure from large affordable projects of decades past that were characterized by multiple large, monolithic buildings whose designs reflected few aesthetic considerations.

The five buildings known as A, B, drew Cohen.

C, D and E are 100 percent devoted to people qualifying for affordable housing.

Building C is exclusively intended for senior housing, according to Aufgang.

The project is situated on a 2.3 acre parcel located east of Webster Avenue and north of Gun Hill Road.

Prior to development, the site was owned by the Woodlawn Cemetery for over a century and used as a holding area for stones from the historic cemetery.

Webster Commons, LLC purchased the site in December 2008.

Established in 1971, Aufgang Architects is known for its thoughtful, effective and creative designs for both affordable and luxury multifamily buildings and hotels throughout the New York metropolitan area.

Formed in 1995, Joy Construction is a full service general contracting and development firm specializing in multifamily and commercial projects throughout NYC.

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'I Love NY' signs not loved, funding threatened

The U.S. Department of Transportation and Federal Highway Administration do not love the hundreds of 'I Love NY' tourism signs that have been placed on New York state highways over the past five years, including some that were recently installed in the Bronx, and wants them removed.

The state has put up over 500 of the large blue signs on highways across the state. at a cost of almost \$17 million.

The signs include the iconic "I Love New York" logo, along with icons that promote the 'Path Toward History' tourism program, the 'Taste NY' program that promotes state food and drink offerings and one for the state parks.

The primary sign is followed in quick succession by four smaller signs.

The signs encourage travellers to visit the state tourism website, iloveny.com, and the state tourism app.

There are 16 such signs in Bronx County, which can be seen on the Bronx River Parkway and Hutchinson River Parkway.

Governor Cuomo has been a vocal cheerleader for state tourism, which he has cited as a major economic engine for the Empire State.

"Tourism is a major driver of New York's economy and these signs are part of a multipronged effort that has helped increase tourism across this state," said Adam Ostrowski, spokesman for the Empire State Development Corporation.

"Last year, the tourism industry generated a recordbreaking economic impact of \$102 billion statewide while supporting more than 894,000 jobs and contributing \$8 billion in state and local taxes."

But federal DOT officials never approved the signs, and warned the state in 2011 as the program was ramping up, to stop installing them.

The feds are now threatening to withhold up to \$1 billion in federal funding unless the signs are removed.

The sign's lettering is too small and hard to read for a highway motorist and could distract drivers, the federal agency charges.

state DOT know that these signs are not in compliance," said Federal Highway Adspokesman ministration "We have continued to let Neil Gaffney. "A particular

area of concern for us is the fact that we are committed to reducing situations where distracted driving can occur, and these signs can distract drivers. We are working to bring the state into compliance.

Adding to the awkwardness is the fact that the signs were made outside the state in an Arkansas factory because the state did not have the necessary equipment to make them, according to published reports verified by the state DOT.

State DOT spokesman Gary Holmes said a meeting with the federal DOT and highway department had been scheduled this month in Washington where he hoped the sign disagreements could be worked out.

"This issue has been discussed for years and involves the interpretation of rules for directional signage versus informational signage, and whether or not an email address can be posted.," said Holmes. "This isn't high crime, but minor disagreements that we look forward to meeting with the feds in order to resolve.

"The 'I Love NY' tourism program is highly successful and a big economic driver," h said.

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Manhattan legislators introduce bill to allow 'selfie' ballot photos

A bill to be introduced shortly by two Manhattan legislators may allow voters to take selfies of their ballots.

The legislation is being introduced in January by Senator Brad Hoylman and Assemblywoman Linda Rosenthal.

It would permit picture taking in the voting booth, something that is currently prohibited in New York state.

Hoylman said that idea for the legislation originated from photos circulated on social media on Election Day in November of celebrities' ballots.

Specifically, concerns arose about a photo of music star Justin Timberlake's ballot in Tennessee, one of 18 states that bans voting photography along with New York, said the senator.

"The law in New York currently prohibits voters from taking photos of their ballots," said Hoylman, adding that the law originated as a protection against voting coercion by employers.

With the advent of social media, the senator believes that the law needs to be updated.

"Technology has changed and social media is a way of a lot of us communicate; the idea of employee coercion I think is an anachronism," said Hoylman, adding "Certainly the bill that we are going to be introducing shortly is going to remove the prohibition against ballot photographs but maintain the protection against intimidation or coercion."

The senator believes that social media is a way to engage voters, especially younger voters, to participate in the democratic process.

Rosenthal agrees, saying that millennials are definitely using social media like Instagram, Facebook, Twitter or Snapchat for their communications.

The assembly woman believes that the posting of ballots on social media could encourage civic dialogue.

"First of all, so much of civic dialogue either starts or is present on social media," said Rosenthal. "That is increasingly how people discuss world and state events.

She added: "I thought that the prohibition of taking photos of the ballot was just a throwback to another time when there were different needs.'

She believes that if people want to advertise the fact that they voted, there is no need to stop them.

Many people who are not knowledgeable of the law are taking selfies of their ballots and posting them online now.

Rosenthal stated that the current law against voting photography is 126 years old.

She believes the bill will pass.

Rosenthal's colleague, Assemblyman Michael Benedetto, was lukewarm to the idea.

Benedetto said that his concern is that taking selfies while voting may slow down the voting process.

'Especially during presidential elections, we have lines of people at polling places looking to vote ... now we are going to have people taking selfies while they vote, which will slow things down even more," said Benedetto.

Benedetto added: "While I don't object to the bill...I am a little unsettled as to what the consequences may be."



While questioning a group of young teenage boys, one of them, 15 years old at the time, shot Det. McDonald three times. The first shot was in the head, the second in the throat and the third shattered his spine leaving him paralyzed.

Throughout his story, Barnabas students listened intently and many were overcome with emotion after hearing how Det. McDonald persevered through rough times and how his faith kept him going. He described to them the very moment that he allowed his faith to guide him, "My darkness was replaced with light. I found my new reason to live and change the way I was living when my son Conor was born just six months after I was shot".

During his address, Det. McDonald had the students listen to the speech that Robert F. Kennedy gave just 24-hours after Martin Luther King, Jr was assassinated. Kennedy is quoted saying, "So I ask you tonight to return home, to say a prayer for the family [of Martin Luther King] But more importantly to say a prayer for our own country, which all of us love -- a prayer for understanding and that compassion of which I spoke." It is of this faith that Det. McDonald told the students to use to end this streak of violence, "Have faith. Say yes to God and good thing will follow." He reminded the students that this is not easy to do, but it is important to break the cycle of violence and improve the world by living and sharing your faith.

Det. McDonald then told the students that he forgave his shooter because it is important to choose love and forgiveness and he knew if he didn't he would not have survived. He concluded his address by reading the prayer, You Are Very Special, and praying a decade of the rosary. "I thought for a long time that if the boy who shot me had heard this prayer, things may have been different". He also brought copies of the book, Why Forgive?, of which he wrote the foreword, for each student.

At the end of the address Det. Mc-Donald signed copies of the book and took photos with students and faculty. In honor of Det. McDonald, Saint Barnabas High School is making a donation to the American Special Children's Pilgrimage Group, an organization close to him.





Aircraft carriers are America's first line of defense, as well as the vital instrument used by Washington to protect allies and project influence across the globe.

As Rep. Randy Forbes, (R-Virginia) notes, "When a crisis arises and American lives and interests are at risk, the first question decision makers ask is, 'Where are the carriers?' Our Navy's aircraft carriers provide 4.5 acres of sovereign American territory and a mobile base of operations that reduces the need to deploy U.S. boots on the ground.

When ISIS blitzed through the Middle East last year, the strike fighters aboard the carrier George H.W. Bush were the only U.S. aircraft in position and ready to halt their advance. It took 54 days for the United States to negotiate deals with allies in the region that allowed us to employ aircraft based on their territory. In the months since, the carriers Carl Vinson and Theodore Roosevelt have rotated through the region, providing a constant American military presence, supporting ongoing operations against ISIS, and deterring aggression by Iran. In other theaters, meanwhile, the presence of American carriers has deterred aggression, protected the free flow of goods, people, and information, and enabled the United States to extend a helping hand when natural disasters strike."

However, while threats

across the planet multiply, the number of these vessels continues to be below what is clearly necessary. Rear Admiral Thomas Moore once said. "We're an 11-carrier Navy in a 15-carrier world." Federal statutes require a minimum of eleven carriers.

Unfortunately, the U.S. now has only a 10-carrier navy (An 11th, the new U.S.S. Gerald Ford, is not yet operational, and may not be fully ready for duty until 2021) and the world has become even more dangerous, as both China and Russia have expanded their sea power while America's continues to contract. In 2015, Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus warned that a "Carrier force structure below 11 would inject significant risk in the Fleet's ability to comply with the Defense Strategic Guidance."

The human element cannot be overlooked in all this. In an attempt to make up the difference, carrier deployments have increased in length from 5.5 months on average in 2008 to 9.5 months. That's difficult for both sailors and their families. Further, it puts a great deal of stress on the ships themselves, delaying home port maintenance.

As noted in Breaking Defense, "The Navy's in a carrier crunch. US commanders around the world keep asking for carriers to cover trouble spots from Svria, Iran, and Afghanistan to the Western Pacific and the South China Sea, but the Navy doesn't have enough to go around."



President Obama sought to cut the carrier fleet to 10 in his 2015 budget. From the 1980s to 2002, the Navy went down from 14 carriers in the fleet to 12. of which at least two and more often three were deployed around the world at any given time. (The average wavered between 2.5 and 2.75). Since 2003, however, the Navy has shrunk from 12 carriers to 10.

There have some who have argued that aircraft carriers are increasingly vulnerable to enemy missile attack, and there is some element of truth to that. In war, there will be casualties. That may sound harsh, but it reflects reality. However, that is not a reason to lose the vital advantage that carriers provide.

dramatic im-Further. provements in U.S. defensive technology have taken place. Rear Admiral Edward Masso discusses the vulnerability issile.

"The U.S. Navy is greatly endangered by the global proliferation of anti-ship ballistic and cruise missiles. Some analysts, like Dennis Gormley, Andrew Erickson, and Jingdong Yuan at the National Defense University, say U.S. aircraft carriers in the western Pacific are sitting ducks for communist China's missiles, especially their CM-400AKG

Mach 5.5 Wrecker cruise missile and their DF-21 ballistic missile, dubbed 'the carrier killer.' They are wrong. Simply put, the ongoing improvement of missile defense systems on U.S. Navy warships is keeping pace with the development of new Chinese missiles and with others that are appearing in North Korea, Iran, and Russia. Innovative U.S. shipborne defenses with the capability to detect, track, destroy or deflect such advanced missiles are now being deployed, as they must be, if our warships and the world's commercial vessels are to have access to the Persian Gulf, South China Sea, Sea of Japan, and the Eastern Mediterranean. The capabilities of China's Wrecker and DF-21 missiles, for example, are far from being ignored... the navy [has] carried out sea trials of a new countermeasure to anti-ship missiles called Pandarra Fog. Slated to be deployed as part of a warship's defensive armament, the Pandarra Fog system creates radar-absorbing carbon-fiber clouds that prevent a missile's seeker from finding its target. It is a simple but effective means of blinding the radar target acquisition system of anti-ship supersonic cruise missiles and ballistic missiles like the Wrecker and the DF-21."

While budgetary concerns limit the possibility of a return to a 15-carrier navy, there has been discussion about supplementing an 11-carrier force with a number of smaller carriers.

Tyler Rogoway, in a foxtrotalpha article, makes the case for this concept. "The Navy is experiencing serious operational shortfalls due to running its fleet of ten aircraft carriers hard in recent years, which is one short of the mandated 11. As such, it is time for the U.S. to build smaller aircraft carriers in greater numbers than what today's one-size-fits-all super carrier strategy permits."

Rogoway points out that two smaller carriers could be purchased for the price of one larger one. The loss, he argues, in the capability of a larger version would be made up by other advantages. It would give the Navy additional flexibility in deployment. "By building smaller carriers, and more of them, Navy commanders will be able to better pair their available resources with the mission at hand. For instance, you do not need a super carrier for simply creating a strong presence in a region, or to support low-intensity warfare operations, or to train aircrews, or to execute goodwill tours. In fact, smaller carriers would provide everything a super carrier could, although at diminished sortie rates. For missions where a super carrier's capability is needed, and if none are available, two smaller carriers can be deployed in one's place."

The Russian and Chinese navies, which have trained together during the past several years, are rapidly enhancing their strength, now exceeding the U.S. in numbers of subma-

Under the proposed project, the City will sell the Disposition Area to Comunilife La Central I Housing Development Fund Corporation ("Sponsor") for the nominal price of one dollar per tax lot. The Sponsor will also deliver an enforcement note and mortgage for the remainder of the appraised value ("Land Debt"). The Sponsor will then construct 2 buildings containing a total of 494 rental dwelling units, plus two units for superintendents and approximately 104,650 square feet of commercial space and/or community facility space on the Disposition Area, and will develop approximately 41,252 square feet of the Disposition Area as open space.

The Land Debt will be repayable out of resale or refinancing profits for a period of at least thirty (30) years following completion of construction. The remaining balance, if any, may be forgiven at the end of the term.



General Fiorentino, Brigadier General, Van Nest resident

When William J. Fiorentino of Van Nest was attending P.S. 34 or Cardinal Hayes High School, his classmates would have no idea that he would one day be a Brigadier General. He was just one of the guys.

His grandparents, Anthony and Euphemia Fiorentino, immigrated from the small town of Giovinazzo on the Adriatic coast of southern Italy just a little over eleven miles west northwest of Bari and settled in the Bronx where they raised their 10 children.

One of those children, Dominic, became a priest and founded St. Dominic's Church at Unionport Road and Morris Park Avenue which was formally opened as a National Italian Parish on August 25, 1926. He had begun studying for the priesthood while still a young boy in Italy and clung tight to his vocation.

Another son, William, became a lawyer and raised his family at 1842 Hunt Avenue. It was his son, William, born



January 2, 1935, who would Defense Systems. graduate from P.S. 34, Cardinal Hayes High School, and Fordham University with a degree in physics. He joined the U. S. Army in 1956 and rose through the ranks to Brigadier General.

Along the way, he garnered quite a few plaudits including being inducted into the Ordnance Corps Hall of Fame in 1993.

Among his important assignments were: heading up the Pershing Project Office; Project Manager of the Joint Tactical Missile System; Deputy Program Manager of that same system; Deputy Program Manager of Ballistic Missile Defense; Director of the Army Space Study; and Program Manager and Program Executive Officer of the Forward Air

His name can also be found on a plaque at Dealy Hall on the Rose Hill campus of Fordham University where he is honored for heading up the Star Wars Project officially known as the Pershing Project. It was the first time that a material command unit was presented with the Army Superior Unit Award.

The General, by the way, also holds a Master of Science Degree in Engineering from the University of Alabama.

He retired in 1988 but is still active in Army affairs and also serves as the president of the board of directors of Redstone Village, a retirement village for Army veterans.


He lives in Madison, Alabama where he owns and operates Steelstables with his wife,

ally gave my head a pitying shake when a friend told me she had just discovered a fantastic restaurant in Jackson Heights that sells the giant Indian crepes called dosas.

"It's so great!" she said. "It's called —"

'Dosa Delight," I interrupted, as condescending as if she'd just discovered a great fast food restaurant called "McDonald's."

But food pride goeth before a food fall. Just a day later I found myself speaking with Katie Sutton, of the food trend-watching company (yes, there are such things) Food and Drink Resources. I'd read some of its predictions — egg pizza from Georgia (the country), Japanese cuisine by way of Peru, and even fried Brussels sprouts – in an industry newsletter called Restaurant Hospitality. Could these eats truly be coming our way?

Turns out they're already here — and I'm one of the last to know.

But possibly, so are you. For instance, Katie said, both coasts are currently

Okay, I did it. I actu- obsessed by Poke, and it isn't a virtual reality game on your phone. It's a Hawaiian dish consisting of cubes of raw fish marinated in sauce and served in a bowl, sometimes with rice.

> There are already several poke (poh-kay) shops in our city, some so popular that long lines form at lunchtime. Having once been absolutely positive that sushi was going to prove a flash in the pan (or, more accurately, a flash in the plate, since it's raw), I feel reluctant to predict a quick demise for this new fad. But really, how many Hawaiian creations have made it to the big time and stayed there? Besides Obama, I mean.

For now, though, poke is so ubiquitous that New York eateries are already cross-pollinating it with other popular foods, leading to items like the poke burrito. Meantime, the "phorrito" is another rising star. That's a burrito filled with Vietnamese pho, a soup of braised meat, herbs, and noodles. All of which leads me to my Food Theory No. 1: Wrap a burrito around anything that's already delicious and it will be a hit.

Theory No. 2 is: The gloppier the better, which is why

we're talking about eating a wrap filled with soup. But you can also see this trend with egg sandwiches. Katie pointed to a West Coast restaurant called Eggslut, famous for the runniest eggs around.

Another big trend she's seeing is fruit soups.

'It's like taking a smoothie and dumping it into a bowl and putting chunks of fruit into it," she said.

So here's my Food Theory No. 3: Anything chunked and put into a bowl is going to be a hit.

finding its way into these soups is dragon fruit, which I've seen at Asian fruit stands for years but have always been too unnerved to try. They're pink and green and look straight out of Dr. Seuss. But to catch up with the trends, I finally got two in Flushing, sliced them open and: Total shock! One was white inside with poppyseed-like seeds, but the other was ruby red, same seeds. So gorgeous!

And so incredibly bland! Yecch. They tasted like giant kiwis, minus the flavor. And the fact that they cost about \$5 apiece just makes me wonder how popular this fruit can ever be. But I'm the gal who bet against sushi, so let's move on.

Another counter-intuitive trend is dark food on dark plates. After what feels like a century of ever lighter cuisine, Katie says the trend has gone 180. Charring, once known as "overdone," "burnt," or "ruined" in my family, is now one of the two hippest methods for preparing vegetables. (The other is deep frying.) Katie says she has started charring her salad greens on the grill, which I could understand if they got kind of pleasantly One particular ingredient caramelized. But I tried charred

broccoli recently, and simply cannot understand why my own, equally unhip method of broccoli prep steaming till it is bendably soft and slightly gray — lost out. Douse really soft broccoli in melted butter and I say yum.

I say that when you douse almost anything in melted butter. (I'm convinced that why lobster made it big: The shameless butter-dipping it made chic.)

And speaking of dipping, the last food trend we've got time for today is deconstructed ramen called tsukemen. The noodles are separate from the broth. You dip them in and slurp them down. Slurping, glopping, chunking and wrapping are clearly the order of the day, so here's Food Theory No. 4: Any obscure cuisine that we haven't discovered yet will burst onto the scene in 2018. And in 2019, it will be

wrapped in a burrito.

The life and death of a once-great newspaper

scary stock market crash in 1987 emerged a salmon-colored weekly newspaper, The New York Observer, that animated and chronicled New York's halls of power for almost three decades until its sad death last month.

It would probably be unfair to say that the Observer is the first media casualty of the Trump era, but you wouldn't be that far off — the print edition of The Observer, owned by President-elect Trump's son-in-law, Jared Kushner, was shut down the same week as the stunning presidential victory.

I have marveled at the small influential newspaper's but arc for the last 30 years from a unique vantage point — first as an editorial competitor, then as someone who The Observer tried to hire, then as a publishing competitor and also as someone who bid to buy it in 2006 when Kushner bested my company's offer by quite a few million dollars.

The Observer's death has not received nearly enough ink (or pixels) this past month. The weekly had outsize influence

ut of the depths of a despite its limited circulation of 50,000: elected leaders, Wall Street titans, media moguls, East Side socialites, and others who were part of the Manhattan elite cared deeply about its contents each week.

> An all-star team of media talent graced its staff box over the years: Graydon Carter (Vanity Fair), Susan Morrison (The New Yorker) and the late great tweedy editor Peter Kaplan steered The Observer thru the thicket of BS and self-importance that litters the streets of Manhattan.

> The gossipy weekly also boasted an impressive stream of columnists including: Candace Bushnell (Sex and the City), Jack Newfield, Joe Conason, Terry Golway, Michael Thomas, Jim Ledbetter, and Michael Tomasky. These smart and punchy pundits made the weekly a must-read for more than two decades and each of them eventually moved on to make their mark in larger media ponds.

I recall my first visit to the Observer's cramped offices in an East 60s brownstone in 1990. The founding editors, John Sicher and Ken Paul, two of the most serious and ethical journalists I've met, wanted to see if I'd like to join the staff as a weekly media columnist, a dream job that to this day I lament turning down. A few years later, when I had crossed over to the business side of publishing, founding owner Arthur Carter offered me the publisher role and once again, I demurred because I thought that this media gem could perish any day.

Arthur Carter was a fascinating New York personality who is the last of a dying breed: a multimillionaire who was willing to finance great journalism at his own expense. The Observer was rumored to be losing at least \$2 million a year and yet, Carter kept on feeding his journalism machine so that it could produce some of the best stories by some of the best journalists in the hyper-competitive media capital of the world.

Someone once said to me that The Observer was "Arthur Carter's gift to New York," and that sounds right because he lost more than \$40 million during a 20-year period in his quest to ensure that his weekly was a key player in the New York me-

dia landscape.

But even mega millionaires have their limit: in 2006. Arthur Carter sought a buyer for The Observer and after I tried to pry this media gem loose for about \$1 million, another, much more deep-pocketed buyer emerged: a 25-year-old man, Jared Kushner, from a New Jersey family that had recently suffered some legal problems. It was a perfect fit: a money-losing media property in search of a savior and a wealthy real estate family seeking to make a splash in Manhattan.

The last decade of The Observer coincided with the most turbulent period ever for media. The print publication repeatedly morphed into different formats (broadsheet to tabloid, pink to white) and its website became a more national platform for real estate, politics, technology, and society coverage. Until last month, the print publication hung on for dear life as dailies around the country bled red ink and shrank their newsrooms.

And on Nov. 11. three days after the owner's father-in-law became the leader of the free world, came the inevitable news: yandstateny.com.

As the publisher of a weekly magazine about New York politics (and a columnist for a chain of weeklies in the boroughs), I am still a big fan of print journalism. There's nothing like curling up with a newspaper or magazine and reading some of your favorite writers.

Unfortunately, the once great New York Observer will no longer land in my mailbox every Thursday.



Buie sidelined after seasonending injury

A former Wings Academy basketball star is grounded for the rest of the year after suffering a season-ending injury on Dec. 1.

Hofstra junior Desure Buie – who got his hoops start in the Bronx – will miss the remainder of the season with a torn anterior cruciate ligament and meniscus in his left leg.

Pride head coach Joe Mihalich announced the injury on Dec. 4.

"We feel terrible for Desure and wish him the best in his recovery," Mihalich said in a statement released by the team. "Desure was really starting to come into his own this season and his presence on the court will be missed."

The injury occurred during the first half of Hofstra's game at Columbia. He played just five minutes in the nonconference matchup.

Buie saw action in eight games for the Pride this season, averaging just over 15 minutes per outing. The sixfoot guard had 22 total points to his name during the earlyseason games, but ranked second on the team in assists with 17.

Buie – who led Wings to a PSAL and State Federation championship in 2015 – played in 34 games off the bench for Hofstra during his freshman season, averaging three points and 1.4 assists.

Buie won't be able to help his team on the court for the rest of the year, as Hofstra looks to make a run at a CAA title, but Mihalich is certain the sophomore will still be able to contribute on the bench.

"We know he will be an important vocal leader from the bench for the remainder of this year as he recovers and prepares for the 2017-18 campaign," Mihalich said.

LEHMAN LIONS CRUISE TO PSAL CHAMPIONSHIP WIN OVER TRUMAN

The Lehman football team couldn't come up with another word for it. In fact, the Lions couldn't come up with many words. They were far too busy yelling.

No. 3 Lehman defeated borough rival Truman 30-0 on Dec. 3, clinching the PSAL bowl championship at MCU Park, a victory that was nothing short of perfect from every angle.

"It just was all about the teamwork," said senior running back Carlos Soto, who racked up four touchdowns in the win. "Practice this week was great, everything was great and we just balled out."

Lehman handed topseeded Truman its only regular season loss of the season on Nov. 5, but the Lions felt as if their overtime semifinal victory over McKee/Staten Island Tech prepped them for a

run at a title.

"Last week was a nail biter and then this week, with all our preparation, we got to see them one time," Lehman coach Christopher Ditullio said. "So the second time we got to gameplan against what they were going to do to us. It all has to do with the kids."

Lehman got on the board late in the first quarter as Danny Sanchez connected with Richard Martinez on a four-yard strike after a blocked Truman punt and, from there on out, it was all Lions.

"We had no doubt," Martinez said. "We said we were going to keep pushing the ball and if somebody made a mistake we were just going to push each other. It was just about getting to the next level."

Soto took control of the the ball and ground game in the second searching quarter – pushing into the end sidelines.

zone from one yard out for his first touchdown of the night.

He was a force to be reckoned with throughout the game, racking up 109 yards on 13 carries, and his 53-yard touchdown dash on the first play of the fourth quarter all but wrapped up the victory.

"I was just seeing green grass," Soto said. "My linemen were opening up great holes. And it was just nothing but grass and grass and the end zone."

Soto's night was certainly impressive, but Lehman's defensive effort was in complete shutdown mode from the opening whistle. The Lions forced four turnovers – including a pair of recoveries by Martinez. His fumble recovery with just over seven minutes left in regulation gave Lehman the chance to, effectively, run out the ball and left the Mustangs searching for answers in the sidelines. "That [recovery] ended the game right there for us," said Martinez, who also notched a third-quarter interception. "All we told each other was what our coach told us to say. Look at the scoreboard. That's it right there."

Lehman came up short against Truman in the postseason last year, but as the Lions walked off the field with smiles plastered on their faces, that game felt like a distant memory. This was a rejuvenated squad, determined to rebuild the program and set a brand-new standard for future teams.

This one was perfect, but Lehman's not done yet.

"You can see it all in the effort the kids are fighting with," Ditullio said. "This year it was, 'yeah, we're going to win this game.' There was a lot of confidence. Winners are going to win and that's what the kids are going to do."

Hayes comes up short in state championship shootout

Cardinal Hayes football coach CJ O'Neil stood in front of his team and told them just one thing - he was proud of them.

The Cardinals came up just short of their state championship aspirations on Dec. 4, falling 50-44 to Canisius in the CHSAA final at Fordham University.

Hayes gave up the game-winning touchdown with 17 seconds left, after the squad was whistled for offsides to keep the Canisius drive alive the play before. It was a heartbreaking end to an otherwise historic season for the team, which clinched the program's first 'AAA' title last month.

"They're Hayesmen," O'Neil said. "They work and they work and they work and they work and we won a championship two weeks ago. We got out here today and we had a chance to close them out and just couldn't do it."

It was a back-and-forth affair all game as both team's offenses went punch-for-punch on each snap with Hayes and Canisius each notching bigtime plays throughout the afternoon.

Lucas Nunez thought he made the biggest play of the day, however, with just under nine minutes left when he blocked and recovered a Canisius field goal attempt.

"We just knew that the kicker had a really good leg," said Nunez, who also hauled in six receptions

for 152 yards. "I just tried to block it and focused on scooping it up." The play set up Hayes on the Canisius 34 yard line and, three plays later, Cardinals quarterback Christian Anderson connected with Elijah Jones for a 31-yard touchdown strike, giving Hayes a 44-42 lead with 7:49 left. It was the team's first lead of the title tilt.

"We keep fighting. That's our team," said Anderson, who threw for 380 yards and three touchdowns. "We fight through adversity and we continue to play on."

Hayes' defense held strong on the Crusaders next drive, forcing Canisius' first punt of the afternoon. The Cardinals looked like they were going to be able to wrap up the game, but Anderson was picked off by Cole Burniston in the end zone on 2nd and 2 after the senior scrambled in the backfield to keep the play alive.

"That was big," Canisius coach Rich Robbins said. "We got a good turnover and then we gave them right back to them. It was that kind of game."

The turnover gave Canisius second life and the Crusaders didn't waste the opportunity, marching down the field to set up a 39-yard field goal attempt with 17 seconds left. Hayes was whistled for offsides, however, giving Canisius an automatic first down and, on the very next snap, Jayce Johnson connected with Zeke Margaritis for the game-winning touchdown.

The play left Hayes stunned on the sidelines and despite two more chances downfield, the Cardinals season ended in disappointing fashion. "It's really tough, but it was a great season," said Anderson, who finished the year second in single-season passing yards. "It was a tough loss today, but I'm so proud of my team."

Hayes returns a good chunk of its starting lineup next year - particularly on the offensive side of the ball - and this season only serves as fuel for the metaphorical fire. The Cardinals know what they can do and they're certain, next year, they'll be back.

"I couldn't be prouder of them," O'Neil said. "They've changed the landscape of New York City football and we're just going to keep going. That's the plan."

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New York Yankees to honor Derek Jeter with number retirement and Monument Park plaque on Sunday, May 14

The New York Yankees today announced that they will honor Derek Jeter during a pregame ceremony with the retirement of his No. 2 uniform number and the unveiling of his Monument Park plaque on Mother's Day, Sunday, May 14, 2017.

Jeter will become the 22nd player in franchise history to have his number retired and first since teammates Bernie Williams, Jorge Posada and Andy Pettitte had their numbers retired during the 2015 season. His No. 2 will be the 21st number retired by the Yankees as No. 8 was retired for both Yogi Berra and Bill Dickey on Old-Timers' Day in 1972.

The Kalamazoo, Mich. native played his franchise-record 20th and final season with the Yankees in 2014. retiring with a personal career winning percentage of .593 (1,628-1,117-2) and five World Series championships (1996, 1998-2000, '09). A 14-time American League All-Star, Jeter is sixth in baseball history with 3,465 career hits and tops the Yankees' alltime list in hits, games played (2,747), doubles (544), stolen bases (358), atbats (11,195), singles (2,595) and hit-bypitches (170). He recorded eight seasons with at least 200 hits and is one of two players in franchise history along with Lou Gehrig (eight) with as many as four. Jeter capped his farewell season with a dramatic "walk-off" RBIsingle against Baltimore in his final career game at Yankee Stadium and another RBI-single in his final career at-bat three days later at Boston's Fenway Park.

Lions roar in the trenches as o-line sets title tone

It all started months ago – in the weight room and the gym and the collective minds eye of the Lehman football team.

And it all came to a head on Dec. 3 as the Lions offense showcased just what it was capable of, cruising to a 30-0 victory over Truman in the PSAL bowl championship at MCU Park.

But while the Lehman stars racked up the yardage, it was the guys up front – the linemen in the metaphorical trenches – that were the building blocks of the victory.

"We knew we were going to be good up front," said Lions coach Christopher Ditullio. "It just had to do if we were able to run the football and protect the football." Lehman did more than just run the football – the Lions racked up 275 yards of offense as the front line consistently held its blocks and kept Truman's defensive standouts from doing much of anything throughout the championship tilt.

"Our left side is amazing," Ditullio said. You want to talk about our center, left guard and left tackle. They were absolutely fantastic tonight." Lehman saw a handful of players take a handoff out of the backfield, but no one was more successful on the ground than senior running back Carlos Soto.

His four-touchdown performance was a highpoint in a series of bright spots for the Lions, but despite his jam-packed stat sheet, Soto was quick to point out that it was a group effort.

"We worked hard all week, all year, out in the weight room," Soto said. "And it just can't any better than this. It's an absolutely great feeling." It wasn't always easy – although the final score might suggest otherwise – and Lehman actually punted on its first possession of the second half, losing one yard on the ground before Danny Sanchez tossed a pair of incompletions.

The Lions regrouped, however, refocusing their energy and their determination to hold their blocks and Soto responded with a six-yard touchdown run on Lehman's next drive.

"We came into it starting off kind of slow," senior Richard Martinez said. "But we talked and we said we had to keep going and keep fighting. We got back into it and that's all it was."

In the final 20 minutes of the game, Lehman notched just two plays for a loss and, in addition to the squad' dominant run attack, Sanchez also racked up 82 passing yards for the Lions.

It was a one-two punch of offensive effort that left Lehman practically bursting with championship-confidence.

"We didn't have a single turnover," Ditullio said. "When we were carrying momentum early in the second half, we could put it on our quarterback Danny Sanchez's shoulders and he was able to continue. He completed passes and kept it going."

The battle in the trenches was exactly the kind of game Lehman was hoping to play, determined to execute its offensive gameplan against a familiar foe. And, when it mattered most, that's exactly what the Lions were able to do.

Those early-season practices and hours spent in the gym were worth it.

"[This win] means everything," Soto. "A lot. Everything. I don't know how to actually explain it right now."
