### Threatening letter puts Columbus on alert

The Columbus High School Campus was put on alert last week when a threatening letter was found in one of the campus high schools.

The letter was found by a janitor cleaning desks at around 10:30 a.m. on Thursday, March 9.

card on a student's desk stated "ima shoot up the school," according the NYPD.

The staff member who reported the letter was unable to identify which student, if any, wrote it.

The NYPD immediately responded and conducted a thorough search and cleared the building, according to a NYC Department of Education DOE. spokesperson.

The school, located on Astor Avenue, was put on lock-

down while police swept the building for threats.

However, a search of the

building and lockers yielded nothing. "Students and staff are

safe, and an evacuation was not necessary," the spokesperson said.

The Columbus High School The Hallmark greeting Campus consists of six separate schools: Astor Collegiate Academy, High School for Language and Innovation, Global Enterprise Academy, Collegiate Institute for Math and Science, Bronxdale High School and Pelham Parkway Academy.

Inquiries as to which of the schools the incident took place in were not returned by the

President of 49th Precinct Community Council Joe Thompson said he had

not been made aware of the incident, or any other recent public safety incidents at the school.

Since the early 2000s, the school has seen a large influx of Albanian students into the mostly black and Hispanic school, he said.

Racial tensions in the school have calmed down considerably over the past few years, Thompson said.

"It's actually been a lot better in recent years," he said.

Columbus High School itself closed in 2014 after 75 years due to academic troubles, including plummeting graduation rates.

That school has boasted several famous alumi, including actress Anne Bancroft, former Giants and Mets catcher Johnny Monell, state

### Montefiore Medical eyes former Mandee site

One of the borough's major hospitals is about to expand its services in the east Bronx.

Montefiore Medical Center is currently in the process of inking a lease for 3860 E. Tremont Avenue, which is currently occupied by a Rainbow apparel retail store.

The property is located on Tremont Avenue at the Cross Bronx Expressway Service Road.

The triangular site contains limited on-ste parking and 15,000 square feet of retail

space, plus a basement.

"In order to serve a growing population in a community that is currently underserved in terms of primary care providers, we (Montefiore) are planning to lease this (Throggs Neck) location," said a Montefiore Medical Center spokesperson.

Montefiore confirmed that the northwest corner of East they intend to use the property as a Montefiore Medical Group primary care practice facility.

> Montefiore does not purchase its sites.

This particular Rainbow


store was occupying the location while the owner found a long-term tenant. Rainbow operated the store under the physical layout of the former tenant knowing its stay was only temporary.

Montefiore added that if lease plans are approved, the building would be renovated over the next six to eight months.

A closing date for Rainbow or an opening date for the primary care practice facility have not yet been announced.

### Uber hub welcomes new, present drivers

As the ridesharing company Uber continues to introduce its service into the outer boroughs, the company is making it easier for new drivers to join their ranks.

On Wednesday March 8 at 11 a.m., Uber and the NYC Hispanic Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon cutting at the company's newest Greenlight Hub at the New Horizons Shopping Mall at 961 E. 174th Street.

The 3,000-square-foot office is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week and is staffed by company employees trained to assist current and prospective drivers, said New York City area Greenlight Hub manager Jeanine Mendez.

Approximately 1,700 fu- Mendez said. "That process ture and current drivers visit the center each week, according to the company.

"Our goal is to make sure that people who want to get on the road and want to be affiliated with Uber are able to come into one of our locations and get assistance navigating the TLC process,"

is expensive and it can take quite a few months to get through it, so we try to minimize the cost and make it as easy as possible."

Uber differs from traditional car-for-hire services in that drivers operate using a software application that can be downloaded on smartphones and other electronic devices.

The app is used by customers to request a driver to pick them up at a given location and drive them to where they want to go.

Payment transactions are also done electronically.

Uber drivers also differ from traditional taxi driv-

ers in that they use their own vehicles and set their own work schedule.

In addition to competing with city car service companies, Uber also faces competition from Lyft, a similar platform that is also gaining customers in the New York City area.

at the hub provide assistance for new drivers looking to navigate the city's onerous Taxi & Limousine Commission (TLC) licensing process.

Prospective drivers can also sign up for free classes required by the TLC offered daily at the company's other Greenlight Hub in Long Island City, Queens.

The Bronx hub quietly opened its doors earlier this month, according to the company, and has been ramping up to serve the over 40,000 TLC-licensed drivers who complete a trip for Uber each week.

The new facility also aims at being a place for drivers to interact with Uber representatives to answer questions and learn more about the service.

In addition to the resources provided by Uber, the hub also includes space for vendors that sell car insurance.







### Citywide ferry model at Soundview Library

Residents of the Bronx will soon have a chance to view the new Soundview Ferry up close and personal - sort of.

NYC Economic Development Corporation and Borough President Ruben Diaz announced on Monday, March 13 that a scale model of the new citywide ferry service vessels is now available for viewing at Soundview Li-

The model will stay at the the library through Wednesday, March 22 before moving to the Bronx Museum for the rest of the month.

The new vessel will be a part of the East River ferry's new Soundview route, set to launch in 2018, which will travel from Soundview to Wall Street/Pier 11.

Along the way it will make stops at East 90th Street and East 62nd Street.

NYCEDC president James Patchett said the model will "give Bronxites a firsthand look of the state-of-the-art vessels that will transform the way they commute across the city."

The price for using the

ferry service will drop from \$4 to \$2.75 - the same cost as taking the subway.

The Soundview route is a part of a larger \$55 million expansion of the East River ferry service.

Other ferries, according to the plan, will service the Rockaways, south Brooklyn, and Astoria - all of which are scheduled to launch later this

In addition there will be a lower east side route added in

The EDC is also touting the technological and environmental upgrades on the new vessels.

To accommodate the new routes, the city is adding 19 new vessels to the ferry service, each of which will be of aluminum construction, using the equivalent of 77 million 12-ounce beverage cans.

According to the corporation, aluminum is safer and a lighter weight, therefore increasing fuel efficiency.

Also, the ferries will use low-carbon emission engines.

As for the technology, each vessel will be equipped with wifi, charging stations, and

heated decks.

The ferries will seat 150 passengers while also allowing space for bicycle racks, strollers and wheelchairs.

A \$1 fee is charged for bring a bike on board.

The city will kick in \$30 million in operating support per year over a period of six years.

According to the EDC based on a projection of 4.6 million annual trips - the pertrip subsidy for the ferry service will be \$6.80.

The East River Ferry Service began as a pilot program back in 2011, solely servicing Manhattan.

Since then the EDC began looking for ways to add additional routes to service.

In 2013, they proposed a citywide service which included the East 90th and East 62nd street stops.

EDC thought these spots valuable for the expanded service due to their population

density, limited transit options and travel habits.

During his State of the Borough address on March 5, Diaz pointed to the new Soundview route as one of the borough's success stories.

Diaz said bringing the ferry to the Bronx "has long been a priority of my administration" and having the model at the library will "provide Bronxites a closer look at the future of ferry service in Soundview."

### Sewer upgrades readied in southwest Bronx

Neighborhoods in the southwest portion of the Bronx are scheduled for sewer and water main upgrade as part of a \$46 million infrastructure project.

The NYC Department of Design and Construction, the NYC Department of Transportation and the NYC Department of Environmental Protection are partnering to install 39,300 linear feet of much needed upgrades.

According to Franco Mesiti, deputy director at the DDC, many of the cast iron pipes within the southwest Bronx's water system were installed in the 1900s and some even date back to the 1890s.

"Cast iron mains are very brittle," said Mesiti. "In time, they break."

He continued, "If you have ever experienced a water main break on a 36-inch or 48-inch size water main it is an enormous burden."

Construction workers will replace the iron with steel pipes.

The areas that are currently receiving the upgrades are:

· Southern Boulevard be-

tween Crotona Park East and Westchester Avenue

- Boston Road between East 179th Street and East Tremont Avenue
- East 179th Street from Boston Road to the dead end
- East Tremont Avenue between Boston Road and Bronx Street
- Bronx Street between East Tremont Avenue and East 179th Street.

In addition to water mains and sewers upgrades, the plan also calls for 29 new catch basins and 26 new sewer manholes.

Apart from sewer system fixes, the city will install new streetlamps and plant 160 new trees around the project sites.

In addition, there will be 1,500 square feet of new asphalt and concrete replacement at bus stops in the area and 50,000 square feet of new sidewalk and curb realignment.

Elected officials often complain about infrastructure issues within their district but have to wait for the city to address those issues.

When asked why it takes longer for these problems to

get attention, Mesiti pointed to financing.

"This is a \$45 million dollar project," said Mesiti. "Financing these projects can be lengthy."

Despite the costly nature of the project, Mesiti said waiting any longer to complete the project could also be extremely expensive.

According to Mesiti, if a water main were to burst it could take down the elevated train tracks that sit above streets like Southern Boulevard.

"Where there are elevated structures [damages are] probably in the millions," he said.

Mesiti also said all of the new water main pipes on Southern Boulevard will be moved closer to the curbs on either side of the street putting them further away from the train el.

While the construction workers are installing the sewer upgrades, it could have an effect on local businesses and residents.

Workers have already reduced the walking space on certain sidewalks along the construction site.

In addition, work on major

streets such as Southern Boulevard will force adjustments to traffic flow.

Mesiti said DDC will maitain two-way traffic running on Southern Boulevard.

"We give 72-hour notices and 24-hour notices every time a construction activity starts that would affect the community," he said.

DDC expects to complete the project by the summer of 2019.

### Supports new **COLA flavor**

Dear editor,

California Congress member John Garamendi introduction of House Bill 1251 for CPI-E Act of 2017 makes sense. This bill would require the use of the Consumer Price Index for the Elderly (CPI-E) instead of the current Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) when determining annual costof-living adjustments (COLAs) for Social Security, federal employes retirement annuities and veterans' benefits.

The current COLA calculation fails to measure seniors spending, especially in health care. In 2016, health care inflation was 4.1 percent, while the CPI-W indicated the average price of consumer goods increased only 0.3%. For those over the age of 62, 12% of their spending goes toward health care while the general younger population spends just 5%.

The fact that we do not use the CPI-E already is disappointing. Instead, cost-of-living adjustments for seniors collecting Social Security and federal civilian or military retirement benefits are based on the costs experienced by urban wage earners and clerical workers. They are not based on the costs experienced by retired individuals. For many, the 2017 COLA of 0.3% amounted to only several dollars.

Ask your congressmember to join 25 others who have signed up as co-sponsor. Also ask senators Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibraand to introduce the same legislation in the Senate?

### Avoiding more tragedies

Dear editor.

I am writing this letter in regards to the tragic events that recently took place in Throggs Neck. As the executive director of the National Homeowner-Landlord Association (NHLA), I am familiar with both the details of this particular situation and many other similar situations.

I spend my days in the Bronx Housing Court and my experience day in and day out is one of terrible systemic unfairness directed at landlords.

What happened on Logan Avenue in Throggs Neck is a perfect example of this. From what I understand, the tenant was never authorized to live in that apartment and took possession of it simply through coercion and manipulation. Once he gained possession, the tenant did not pay rent and vandalized the property. Further, to add insult to injury, the tenant would call the city to have them write fines and violations in the name of the landlord.

The landlord had no choice but to spend thousands of dollars on an attorney and was forced to accept the fact that this case would take many, many months to resolve. In the meantime, the landlord's financial losses mounted into the tens of thousands - with no end in sight.

ing what he did - simply attempting to shed some light on this landlord's assumed state of mind and financial condition. Rhetorically, I ask - How much abuse can a person take? How can the owner of a 2-family home be expected to absorb that amount of lost income when the bills continue to arrive each month? If this scenario was an isolated incident maybe I wouldn't have felt the need to write but unfortunately this is the norm that we live with as landlords in NYC.

New York City property thankfully continues to gain in value so as a landlord there is the potential to do well, but today this comes with a steep price - to have your rights trampled and then be treated like you have less rights than the tenant who is not paying rent, vandalizing the apartment, etc. It is a common joke around Housing Court that criminals perpetrating violent crimes are treated with more kindness than landlords. I guess what I am saying is that an incident like this was bound to happen. The most vulnerable of homeowners - immigrants, first-time homebuyers and senior citizens are being subjected to a system that assumes that every landlord is well off and should have no problem absorbing the effects of lost rent and a dragged out 6- to 18-month legal process costing tens of thousands of dollars. In many cases these homeowners give up and sell their homes hastily - sadly abandoning the American Dream.

If you are a Bronx landlord and think you will find justice or get a sympathetic ear from our elected officials, you are mistaken. As a result, NHLA feels it's time for something to be done to assist all Bronx homeowner-landlords.

Our requests are simple: 1) A help desk in Bronx Housing Court where small homeowners (3-family or less who live in the residence) can get help and advice from a real advocacy group who knows and understands the system; 2) Funding for attorneys and staff to try to counter the millions of dollars spent on legal aides on the tenant side; 3) An earmarked section in Housing Court specifically for small homeowners; and 4) A limit to the number of orders to show cause allowed in owner-occupied homes.

We have been asking for these things for over 18 months with no success. If these resources existed, maybe the tragedy in Throggs Neck could have been avoided.

We, at Hostos, witness daily the challenges confronting our students. With unwavering dedication these men and women balance coursework, jobs and, in many cases, the responsibilities of parenthood. They are working hard to invest in themselves, and the Excelsior Scholarship shows that New York state wants to invest in them, as well.

The governor's proposal has yet to be approved by the New York legislature. A great deal of time, energy and critical thought will be necessary before the plan is ready for presentation to the decision-makers in Albany. The effort is well worth it, as the Excelsior Scholarship has the potential to revolutionize education in New York state. It could well inspire and encourage future generations of students. It deserves our deepest thought and speaks to our highest aspirations.

### Success Academy Bronx scholars dominate NY State Chess Championship

This weekend, 151 scholars representing 15 Success Academy schools traveled to Saratoga Springs, New York. to compete in the 50th Annual New York State Scholastic Chess Championships. Out of 1,200 students who competed from across the state of New York, Success scholars made up 13% of the entire two-day tournament and brought home big wins with four teams finishing in the top five of both the ES and MS Championship sections.

From Friday afternoon through Monday morning, scholars ate, slept, and breathed chess. They each played six rounds, three per day (each lasting up to two hours), in divisions determined by their United States Chess Federation ratings. Scholars spent much of their downtime playing fast-paced blitz chess games, studying chess tactics, and competing in after-dinner matches against their coaches.

In every division, Success scholars had a stellar performance. The high-lights include:

SA Union Square and SA Bronx 1 dominated in the Middle School Reserve section, finishing in first and second place, respectively.

In the Elementary Reserve section, SA Union Square finished in second and SA Bronx 3 finished in third place. SA Bed Stuy ES and MS (combined team) finished in fifth place.

The SA High School of the Liberal Arts finished in second place in the High School Reserve section, which featured 17 teams. Leading the team's strong performance was tenth grader Reanna Phillips, who won five of six games.

In the Middle School Championship section—a division with 16 teams where only top players compete—SA Bronx 1 finished in fourth place and SA Harlem East finished fifth.

SA Midtown West and SA Cobble Hill tied for third place in the Elementary School Championship section (the most competitive elementary school division).

In the Elementary School Intermediate section, SA Union Square and SA Williamsburg finished fourth and sixth place, respectively, out of 26 teams.

Chess is an critical part of Success Academy's school design. All scholars from kindergarten through fourth grade take chess as part of the required curriculum. In middle school, chess is offered as an elective for scholars who are interested. Sean O'Hanlon, senior manager of SA's Chess Program, and his team of top chess coaches, have done incredible work to create a world-class chess program that develops players' skills and strategic thinking, while also teaching good sportsmanship and team spirit.



## FDNY drone makes history in the Bronx

#### BY ROBERT WIRSING

The future of firefighting made its historic debut last week in our borough.

On Monday, March 6 at 6:20 p.m., FDNY's first ever tethered drone made its maiden flight in response to a fouralarm fire raging inside a sixstory apartment building at 653-657 Crotona Park North.

One hundred and sixtyeight firefighters responded to the incident and gained control over the blaze by 8 p.m.

Two firefighters were taken to Jacobi Hospital after sustaining minor injuries.

The fire's cause remains under investigation.

The \$85,000 eight pound drone incorporates high-definition and infrared cameras allowing transmission of live images of a fire operation to the chief overseeing the inci-

Its cameras allow chiefs at the command post to view where firefighters are operating on a building's roof and to make decisions regarding fire suppression and ensuring members' safety.

view of the roof which allowed the incident commander on the ground to view the firefighters as they were conducting roof operations, venting the roof and putting water on the fire," explained Timothy Herlocker, FDNY Operations Center director.

Incident commander FDNY deputy assistant chief Dan Donoghue noted crews knew to move when the drone's visual feed captured the building's roof starting to fail.

The aerial image is fed di-"We were able to get a good rectly to the incident com-

mander and shared with senior decision makers through the FDNY Operations Center.

The quadcopter is connected by a small cable carrying electricity to the device granting it unlimited flight time.

All controls, data and power transmit back and forth via the tether, preventing interference with radio frequency signals.

remote-controlled drone is piloted by the FDNY Command Tactical Unit's specially trained firefighters.

The department's fleet is comprised of three drones to deploy as needed.

The FDNY works closely with the Federal Aviation Administration to ensure the drone operates safely and adheres to all NYC air space rules and policies.

FDNY's Operation Center contacts the FAA before flying the drone for permission to deploy at night or into restricted Class B Air Space.

Approval takes ten minutes and occurs while the drone and its operators are responding to a fire.

DOB confirmed no additional properties were affected by the blaze.

nications officer, said the Red Cross met with approximately 81 displaced people at the scene consisting of 61 adults and 20 children.

The Red Cross registered six families consisting of 25 adults and two children for emergency housing and emergency funds to help them get through the next few days.

### Acclaimed Latin flautist, Dave Valentin, passes

A Bronx musician who served as an ambassador for Latin jazz, the borough and his Puerto Rican heritage has died.

The music world and the borough mourned the loss of David Valentin, who passed away on Wednesday, March 8 after suffering two strokes, family and friends said. He was 64.

Valentin was Latin jazz's premiere flute player, and according to sources interviewed for this article, he was arguably the best overall U.S. flautist at the peak of his career, from the late-1960s through early 2000s.

The flautist would always talk to audiences about being from the south Bronx and his cultural heritage, friends said.

He would mentor youth in schools and community organizations, nourishing musicianship, they said.

Valentin won a Grammy award in 2003

He was a Bronx Walk of Fame inductee in 2000.

His cousin Lourdes Torres said that Valentin grew up on Fox Street near Southern Boulevard and lived in Harding Park for many years.

He was a schoolteacher for a time and he loved to give back to the youth and community even after he became famous, she said.

"He did a lot of volunteer work with organizations," said Torres, adding "He would never say no to a teacher who asked him to visit their classroom."

He was an active volunteer at Castia Maria Center for Arts & Education, only asking for a Yoo-hoo chocolate drink as compensation for his work there, she said.

"I am going to remember most his love of his community and his wanting to share his music with the world," said Torres, who she received messages of condolences for Valentin from all over the globe. His manager for rougly 14 years, Richie Bonilla of Throggs Neck, said that Valentin performed on six continents and that he would often open his shows with a shout-out to the borough and to his Puerto Rican heritage.

"He was very proud that he was from the Bronx," said Bonilla.

Valentin had a unique way of playing the flute, combining the melody with verbal percussion at the same time, said his manager, explaining he knew how to manipulate his mouth to create percussion sounds.

"He had a pure tone," he said of the flautist's music, which according to another friend and a musicologist, Felipe Luciano, was heavily imbued with Cuban Charanga (dance music) and Conjunto (trumpets and brass).

Valentin was an important part of the band Conjunto Libre that made "phenomenal" recordings in the 1970s when Valentin was a band member, according to Luciano.

Valentin began to emerge to a wider audience and became a leading performer in his own right in the 1980s, said the musicologist.

He formed his own ensemble of musicians to perform fusion and Latin jazz music, making albums under his own name with himself as the leader.

"He began to develop a fan following because of his way of handling the flute; his triple-tonguing, his dexterity, his ability to fly over the scales were legendary," said Luciano.

Later, Valentin was a contractor for Tito Puente and his Latin Jazz Ensemble, said Luciano.

A Valentin contemporary, Grammynominated Latin jazz drummer Bobby Sanabria, said that the loss is one not just for music fans but for the borough because Valentin was a Bronx ambassador through his musicianship.

Bonilla said that Valentin's brother George Valentin, his cousin and nieces survive him.



The 45th Precinct Community Council will honor six community leaders they consider exemplary at their upcoming community breakfast.

The celebration of police and community unity is scheduled for Wednesday, May 10 at Villa Barone Manor from 8:30 to 11 a.m.

Honors will go to Sal Grassia, Pat Devine, John Bonizio, Michelle Sajous, Karen Nani and posthumously to Joseph Oddo.

Reservations are currently being taken for seats at \$15 each, said Bob Bieder, council president.

The cost of admission is less than the actual cost of the breakfast, which is subsidized by generous sponsor support, he said.


Honoree Pat Devine said the award was a "great honor" and he heaped praise on the council.

### Kingsbridge development adds traffic concerns

It's not hard to see why Kingsbridge was recently projected to be the hottest neighborhood in the city for 2017 by real estate company Street-Easy.

Various new retail and mixed-use development projects in various states of completion dot the landscape.

Add in easy access to Manhattan via the IRT 1 train and Van Cortlandt Park and it's no wonder people are flocking there.

But increased development and road congestion have left area leaders concerned about traffic safety, especially at one particular intersection.

Earlier this month, Assemblyman Jeffrey Dinowitz called on the NYC Department of Transportation to study a stretch of West 230th Street that runs from Broadway to Tibbett Avenue which he refers to as a "half mile of danger."

There have been 131 accidents involving more than 250 vehicles on that stretch of road alone, according to statistics obtained by the as-

semblyman's office from the NYPD Vehicle Collision data reports.

Nearly half of the accidents took place at the intimidating intersection of West 230th Street and Broadway, where a multi-level shopping center was recently constructed and where an access ramp to the Major Deegan Expressway is located nearby.

"Residents from all over the Bronx use West 230th Street to gain access to the Major Deegan, and many of them deal with this hazardous situation daily," Dinowitz stated. "With so many accidents happening along this corridor, the city needs to take steps to ensure the safety of drivers and pedestrians."

Dinowitz also recently called for the placement of a traffic signal at the intersection of West 230th Street and Tibbett Avenue to allow left hand turns onto Tibbett from westbound West 230th Street.

Tibbett gets heavy traffic on weekdays due to the nine schools that are located near it, as well as various businesses such as a large U-Haul rental

center.

The DOT has two ongoing open left turn studies – one on Broadway and West 230th Street and another at West 230th Street and Tibbett Avenue - which it anticipates completing in the coming week, according to a DOT spokesperson.

Kingsbridge Riverdale Van Cortlandt Development Corporation executive director Tracy Shelton said she supported ongoing traffic studies for the area, since there has been so much development in recent years.

She said the proposed traffic signal at Tibbett would be a

huge help.

"That entire corridor needs as much TLC as it can get in terms of traffic safety," Shelton said. "Because it's just so up and coming with development, and that adds trucks and everything else into the mix. It's just a perfect storm in terms of traffic issues."

Community Board 8 chairman Dan Padernacht said the intersection of Broadway and West 230th Street was by far the area's biggest traffic concern, and that the board would likely support additional traffic studies.

The DOT had already altered the intersection to prevent illegal left turns and made the crossing light times longer, he said, but the new shopping center had further exacerbated the problem.

Padernacht said another area of concern that may be revisited is West 238th Street at Broadway and Bailey Avenue, due to another new retail center on Broadway, that features several retailers including a BJ's, a Petco and a Buffalo Wild Wings eatery.

Colucci founded the Pelham Bay Taxpayers and Civic Association and ran a local newspaper, the News Sentinel in the '70s.

There has been some minor crime at the park in recent years, including a cellphone robbery in 2011 and a stabbing of a 21-year-old man in 2015, but Prince said there had been no recent incidents he could think of.

"The most the park has had is a homeless person camping out, but we've been pretty pro-active with the BronxWorks counselors to get them moved elsewhere, as we do with Pelham Bay Park," Prince said.





### Elected officials restore zoned students seats at P.S. 24

On Wednesday, March 15, local elected officials including Assemblyman Jeffrey Dinowitz, Councilman Andrew Cohen and Senator Jeff Klein were alerted by many parents in the community that their children had been waitlisted for the September 2017 P.S. 24 Kindergarten class. By Friday, over 20 families had called the elected official's respective offices citing concerns over similar letters that they had received stating that their children, who lived within the P.S. 24 school zone, would not be offered a seat at the school.

P.S. 24 is one of the best elementary schools in the Bronx and a compelling reason for young families to buy ing some who live across the homes and move into the community. In many ways, the school's accomplishments reflect the success of the community and its continued wellbeing is in the interest of everyone, whether they have children who attend the school or not. Unfortunately, in recent years, the school has experienced severe overcrowding, exacerbated by the Department of Education's bungling of the Whitehall Annex lease as well as by the administration's acceptance of high numbers of out-of-zone students.

Due to this overcrowding problem, 58 children residing in the P.S. 24 zone, includstreet or around the corner. were put on a waiting list. This was unacceptable to all of the parents and the elected officials. After many meetings and conversations with district superintendent, Maribel Hulla, principal Steven Schwartz, and other DOE officials, the decision was made to reverse this ill-conceived plan and to offer seats at P.S. 24 to all 58 children.

"I am so pleased we were able to convince Dept. of Education officials to change their minds and to agree to accept the 58 zoned children of P.S. 24 that had been put on a waitlist. Every child in the school's zone, without excep-

Advocates of space exploration were gratified to note the inclusion of space research in the President's inaugural address ("We stand at the birth of a new millennium, ready to unlock the mysteries of space.") In a reversal of the role Obama mandated the space agency to play, the new Administration is emphasizing manned space flight and the pursuit of major goals for human exploration beyond low earth orbit, in the near term, using American spacecraft.

The Morning Ticker recently noted that "The incredible upset win of Donald Trump over Hillary Clinton could have huge ramifications NASA. Donald Trump may send America back to the moon. That's what some people are saying now that he and the Republican Party has swept into power, including Newt Gingrich, who himself loves the idea of a colony on the moon. The transition from an Obama presidency

to a Trump administration is certain to be a jarring one for NASA. The agency can expect a significant revamp in its mission, focusing much less on climate change and more on space missions, including possibly our first trip to the moon in decades. Analysts suggest that the administration may push for a lunar landing as a stepping stone on the way to Mars. It would also be a very public way to reassert the U.S.'s mastery of the space domain and our closest neighbor."

According to the Daily Caller. SpaceX's founder Elon Musk "made two trips to Trump Tower during the transition period and discussed how NASA could be primed to send astronauts to Mars using public-private partnerships, according to The Washington Post. Trump also met... with space program historian Douglas Brinkley about the Apollo program, which took NASA to the moon during the 1960s...Another billionaire space entrepreneur, Robert Bigelow, thinks that Trump could potentially double NASA's budget.

There is some similarity in that both Trump and his predecessor favor an expanded role for private sector technol-

A 2015 study by the National Defense University notes that "U.S. government policies over the past decade have focused on shifting space activities from the public sector to the more efficient private sector...Government policies have encouraged and supported the rise of new entrants and entrepreneurs into the space launch and broader space transportation market...overcoming the hurdles of high upfront capital investment costs. These new entrants are implementing process and pursuing product innovation in the rocket and on-rocket, orbital and suborbital launch markets..."

However, the practical application of Obama's use of the private sector was more

in the nature of a replacement NASA-developed space technology, at least in the immediate future., and particularly in the realm of manned space flight. Trump's outlook is concentrated on having the private sector complement an ambitious and timely human space program.

The prior president mandated NASA's attention be directed to efforts intended to assist a climate change agenda. The new administration appears prepared to return the space agency to its original function. The time table for significant manned space accomplishments appears set to move faster under the Trump Administration.

Trump has long believed that NASA's emphasis on climate change during the Obama Administration was a misuse of the agency's budget. He also doubts the veracity of some of the data produced by various sources used to justify funding within the space agency for that purpose. In a criticism of NASA data, a Real Science review noted that in 1989: " ...scientists from the United States Commerce Department's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said that a study of temperature readings for the contiguous 48 states over the last century showed there had been no significant change in average temperature over that period...But in the year 2000, NASA and NOAA altered the historical US temperature record, which now shows that there was about one degree centigrade US warming during the century before 1989... The altering of Icelandic data by NASA was particularly troubling, because the cooling from 1940 to 1980 was a well known and difficult historical period in Iceland. NASA erased Iceland's history, without even the courtesy to contact Iceland's experts...Additionally, we know that there was tremendous warming in the Arctic prior to the 1940s. which Hansen has erased from the historical record in Iceland, Greenland and elsewhere.'

## Fluid fuels function by Healthy Seniors CliCC

Dehydration is dangerous for everyone, including older adults. If left untreated, dehvdration can result in death. We can lose water from our bodies simply by breathing, sweating, urinating and crying. Sodium is also lost with fluids; we need sodium (salt) for the normal functioning of our muscles and nervous system. If you are exercising or walking on a warm day, you are losing more water than usual and need to drink even more fluid.

Some health conditions put

dehydration. These include swallowing disorders from a stroke or Parkinson's disease, mobility issues that can make it difficult for someone to obtain fluids; diarrhea, vomiting or excessive sweating, as well as certain medications can increase the risk.

Individuals with diabetes are at particular risk. Dehydration can cause diabetic ketoacidosis, a condition that causes acids to build up in the body and can lead to coma and death. Dehydration can also

older people at greater risk of cause blood sugar levels to rise faster than normal, which can require additional medication and treatment.

Symptoms of dehydration in older adults can be vague. Older people often do not feel thirsty or have a dry mouth; they may be confused, have a headache, feel lightheaded, have low blood pressure or even feel heart palpitations. Their urine may be darker than normal, and if you gently grab the skin on the back of their hand, the skin will not spring back into place.

To prevent dehydration, most individuals should drink ~8 cups of water a day (if they are not on fluid-restriction). Keep a glass of water next to you and take small sips throughout the day. Drink water, milk or juice with meals, but keep it to approximately ½ cup while eating, as fluids may dilute the digestive juices in your stomach and slow digestion. Limit your drinking in the evening to avoid the need to go to the bathroom during the night. Limit your intake of coffee, alcohol and

high protein drinks as these may cause you to go to the bathroom more often and lose more fluids. Foods high in water, such as fresh fruits and vegetables can help with your hydration.

## How to make 'Playboy' great again

Playboy magazine used to be the illicit thrill that men of all ages hid in their sock drawers.

Now it is more like the socks. Even though the magazine recently decided to add naked ladies back into the mix (no nudes, it seems, was bad nudes), it is still hard to get excited by Playboy anymore. But to give props where props are due: It is also hard to imagine we would ever be as blase as we are today about sex, and even women's lib, if it weren't for Hugh Hefner and his crazy 1953 creation.

Hef was a frustrated cartoonist at the time, working in the Esquire subscription department. When his request for a \$5 a week raise got turned down, he decided to strike out on his own. Somehow he pulled together \$10,000 and prepared to launch a racy new magazine: Stag.

Fortunately for him, the name "Stag" was already taken. So instead he called it "Playboy." The first edition featured a centerfold (a word we wouldn't even have without Hef!) dubbed, "Sweetheart of the Month." By the very next issue, the centerfold was rechristened "Playmate." And as author Julie Keller has mused, "There is a vast ideological gap between the words."

There sure is. "Sweetheart" harkened back to courtship. But a playmate is someone you play with. It is fun, but it isn't

Thus began the smashing of

The genius of Playboy was not that it published naked young flesh. You could buy dirty pictures even then. As Time Magazine noted in a cover story on Hefner at the height of his career — 1972, when Playboy was selling 7 million copies a month — "He took the old-fashioned, shame-thumbed girlie magazine, stripped off the plain wrapper, added gloss, class, and culture."

And how! As its subscriber base grew, so did Playboy's reputation as a purveyor of taste, showcasing some of the best writers around. So, yes, obligatory joke here: You really could read Playboy just for the arti-

Then again, you could read The New York Review of Books for the same thing. Did you?

Enough said.

The lofty writing not only provided gentlemen with an excuse for their subscriptions, it helped change the entire

perception of non-marital sex, from dark, dirty doings with prostitutes to a sophisticated pastime men pursued with willing women of their own class. This, of course, required willing women. And that required a revolution.

Hefner himself has said he was a feminist before it was cool. Exactly how feminist remains one for the gender studies classes. Sure he "objectified" women's bodies. But he also supported birth control (he had to), pre-marital sex (ditto), and sexual pleasure for both partners (why not?).

Ironically, one thing he did not seem to believe in was actual, earthy sexiness. Peter Bloch, a former editor at Penthouse, recalls being disappointed by his Playboy subscription every month.

"The girls were very cute, but they were photo-shopped and in weird poses," he lamented. "Any woman I saw walking down the street seemed more sexy.'

It's possible that's because Hefner wasn't really selling sex. He was selling lifestyle. The women were simply part of a modern man's lair, along with a wet bar and hi-fi. That's why Hef made sure all the advertising was aspirational. Howard Lederer, the magazine's ad director, told Time in 1972: "We don't want a reader to suddenly come on an ad that says he has had breath."

Martin Pazzani was brand manager at Smirnoff Vodka back in Playboy's heyday.

"We spent tens of millions" on Playboy ads, he recalls. Today he the head of a premium Tequila, Tears of Llorona, and he not advertise in Playboy or any magazine.

That's part one of the onetwo punch that knocked the wind out of Playboy.

"The internet was a problem for just about every existing media enterprise," says Nat Ives, executive director of Advertising Age.

Of course, the Internet provided more than just a new ad medium. It provided more porn than all the Playmates of all

"Playboy changed the landscape, and then vice versa," pop culture historian Robert Thompson sums it up.

Today the bunny logo, once so titillating, looks like something from a '70s  $\,$ time capsule. But because it is still one of the most recognizable brands one earth, publicist Richard Laermer came up with a great idea for it:

Open a Playboy Museiim

Do it in Vegas. Showcase the man, the mansion, the magazine. Trace their trajectory across the times they changed. Fill the gift shop with Playboy overstock — mugs, sunglasses, key chains. And in the cafe, serving Heffacino?

Bunnies! Male, female, and gender fluid, wiggling their tails. Just like that, Playboy goes from creeky to cheeky again, and is celebrated for its amazing place in American history.

Not just its place in the sock drawer.

He built it. And they came.

I'm speaking of my Israeli cousin, Peter Kurz, a transplanted Manhattanite who has been managing baseball in the Holy Land for more than a de-

Peter has been running the Israel Association of Baseball. which now has more than 1,000 players rounding the bases in a land more comfortable with guns and bayonets than bats and balls.

The past two weeks — 50 years after the Six Day War - we have witnessed a minor miracle take place in the Far East at the World Baseball Championships in Korea and Japan. Once again, tiny Israel has defeated four big countries in less than a week. Should we now call it the Six Day Sweep?

Like David in the biblical David vs. Goliath battle, the 41st ranked Israeli baseball team has beaten up on the big boys: third-ranked South Ko-

fifth-ranked Cuba, and ninthranked the Netherlands have all been felled by the mighty slingshots from the Israeli

When I visited cousin Peter in Israel five years ago we were traveling to Jerusalem in his car to see the holiest of the holies when his cellphone rang and on the other end was his Israeli co-commissioner Haim. They were in search of American Major League Baseball players who have some Jewish roots to add to the Israeli national team.

"What about Ian Goldstein (not the real name)?" asked Sh-

What a difference a generation makes. And now, with a new generation of Jews cheering on the Israeli baseball team in its not-so quixotic quest for world domination, I realize that the world really is flat.

Wouldn't it be great if there could be a baseball league of teams in the Middle East and instead of war and stockpiling weapons, they duked it out on the ballfield? Where teams from Saudi Arabia and Iran and Yemen and Syria and Israel could compete for wins and

losses and the Semitic Baseball Championship?

If America could heal from the Civil War in the 1860s and less than a century later have southern teams compete against northern teams in the major leagues, then maybe there is hope for the healing power of baseball.

Go team Israel! Go Peter!



## La Lupe, Queen of Latin Soul, lived on E. 140th St.

There's a stretch of East 140th Street between St. Ann's Avenue and Cypress Avenue that carries an official street sign bearing the name "La Lupe Way." Someone recently asked me about it and I recalled it very well as there had been some controversy surrounding the bill when it was first introduced by Fernando Ferrer. It was later re-introduced by Borough President Adolfo Carrion to a more receptive City Council who approved it in December of 2001.

Guadalupe Victoria Yoli Raymond, commonly known as La Lupe, was unquestionably the most important Latin female singer to come out of Cuba after the revolution. She was born on December 23, 1936 in San Pedrito, a barrio of Santiago, and was studying to become a teacher until becoming star-struck after winning a singing contest on the radio in 1954. The following year her family moved to Havana and soon she was making a name for herself at the local clubs. Her performance at Club La Red in 1958 really showcased her talent as she kept telling the pianist Homero Balboa to play

faster and faster. She was more than just another singer, she was a performer.


She recorded her first album, "Con el diablo en el cuerpo" (With the devil in my body), for RCA Victor in 1960 and two years later was exiled to the United States. She became an immediate sensation for her extreme antics, such as banging her high heels on the piano, throwing herself on the floor, tossing clothes and anything else available at the audience. The crowds went wild urging her on and she responded with unbounded en-

She was manic and almost impossible to control. She was fighting a losing battle with herself and it would certainly help bring about her early demise. Stardom only added to her erratic behavior especially after Pedro Almodovar included her song "Puro Teatro" in his film "Women on the Verge of a Nervous Breakdown." Her stage

shows are unforgettable which is why she managed to sell out her performance at Madison Square Garden, the first Latin singer to do so.

La Lupe, also known as La Yiyiyi by some of her fans, moved to East 140th Street here in the Bronx in 1986 and remained here until her untimely death on February 29, 1992. It was during these years that she settled down somewhat, turning to religion and switching to gospel music. The "Queen of Latin Soul" was reigning as a more becalmed soul but the damage was already done and death finally knocked on her door at age 52. She's now at peace in St. Raymond's Cemetery.







Jackson led the charge down the stretch, scoring the next two field goals and giving Hayes a 61-58 lead with 1:01 on the clock. Molloy had two chances at the game-tying play, but Hayes' defense held strong down the stretch.

By the final whistle, five different Cardinals notched double-digit performances and Hayes racked up 16 assists on 24 made field goals.

The victory wasn't just historic for the Cardinals basketball team - it also marked the first time a CHSAA school has clinched the basketball and football title in the same school year since St. Francis Prep did it in 1957.

Now, the Cardinals turn their attention to the NYS Federation tournament later this month, certain, after the year they've had they can do just about anything.

"It was just our year, just meant to be. A lot of things fell our way over the course of the playoffs," Lodds said. "We fell to All Hallows in the Archdiocesan and people said, 'Good season Hayes' like we were done. My guys wouldn't have any of that."

## Scanlan skids in OT, falls in CHSAA state final

The comeback almost played out the way Monsignor Scanlan wanted it to.

The Crusaders' girls basketball team forced overtime in the final seconds of regulation, but couldn't grab any extra momentum, falling 66-55 to The Mary Louis Academy in the CHSAA state championship game at Fordham University on March 11.

"We forced the overtime, just couldn't hold on," said Scanlan coach Tom Catalanotto. "We were short-handed most of the season, lot of injuries and today we were, for the most part, healthy. We just couldn't do it."

The two teams – who were playing for the third time in the last three weeks, including the second time this month – battled back and forth for much of regulation, exchanging baskets and struggling to grab any sort of consistent momentum.

Mary Louis jumped out to a four-point lead with 1:49 left on the clock, but the Crusaders answered every bucket with one of their own. Sophomore forward Kaylen Banwareesingh led the charge down the stretch, scoring the final two Scanlan baskets of regulation – including a bank shot with 8.1 seconds left on the clock to force OT, draining the bucket following a backdoor assist from freshman Kateri Poole.

Scanlan did its best to keep up the defensive intensity during overtime – playing a tough 2-3 zone from the opening tip to the final whistle – but that proved more difficult than usual when the Hilltoppers started hitting their shots and driving into the open lanes.

Mary Louis guard Jordan Nixon was a force to be reckoned with in overtime, weaving her way through the Scanlan defense and drawing fouls in the waning minutes.

"We knew that [we wanted to play zone] because the last time we played them, we played man," Catalanotto said. "We left the lane wide open for Jordan and she took advantage of it. This time we tried to control her a little bit, but she's a great player."

Scanlan tied up the game at 55-all – on a Banwareesingh shot – with 2:47 left in overtime, but the Crusaders struggled to slow down Mary Louis' offense as the minutes continued to tick down and the Hilltoppers wrapped up the victory at the free throw line.

Mary Louis went 11-for-12 from the charity stripe in the final 2:23 of overtime and kept Scanlan off the board completely in that same stretch, forcing the Crusaders into a handful of turnovers and mis-

really hard, so we just wanted to make sure we came out and played them honest," said Mary Louis senior Danielle Patterson, who gave the Hilltoppers the lead with 2:23 in OT. "We didn't want to back up because we just thought we could beat them."

It's a disappointing loss for the Crusaders – who fell in the state tournament last season as well – but Catalanotto couldn't bring himself to be anything but proud of himself when his team walked off the court.

"They came a long way, we were just a B team five years ago and they've battled. We've gotten better players in and last year we made a statement, made it to the AA finals. And now making it back again this year."

Catalanotto is also certain the future is bright for the Crusaders, set to return all but three players from this year's roster. And after a difficult end to an challenging season, Scanlan is, already, gunning for another run at a state title.

"We've got a lot of babies on this team, a lot of young kids," Catalanotto said. "We're going to be around for a long tie."

senators Guy Valella and his successor, Jeff Klein.

David Berkowitz also attended the school before his 1977 killing spree as the Son of Sam killer.

Councilman James Vacca said he had nothing but fond memories of the school, which had over 4,000 students until the late '90s when it was downsized.

"We had 4,700 students - it was an overcrowded school on double sessions," Vacca said. At that point Columbus was a destination point. If you didn't make Bronx High School of Science, Columbus was second best in the borough."

Vacca said the schools on the Columbus campus had gotten several upgrades during recent years through his office, including a new cafeteria and library tech center.

The smaller schools are aimed at providing students more individual attention, he said.

But on the other hand he confirmed the campus has had metal detectors for many years.

"Each school has challenges, and I think they are trying to address them, but I think work still has to be done," Vacca said.


