WALKOUTS TO PROTEST GUNS

Students mark Parkland, FL massacre victims

In showing of national unity, students from around the borough took part in the National School Walkout to protest gun violence in schools.

P.S. 71, the Academy of Mount St. Ursula and Fordham Preparatory School in Fordham, and others elsewhere in the borough participated in National School Walkout Day on Wednesday, March 14.

Over 3,000 schools across the United States took part in the protest scheduled exactly one month after the Parkland. FL school massacre at 10 a.m.

The walkouts lasted 17 minutes, one minute for each victim of the shooting.

New York State Assembly en-

dorsed the walk out.

A statement from the NYS Assembly stated they stood in solidarity with the students as they solemnly remember and honor memories of the students and teachers killed in the Florida high school shooting, adding that silence holds power that words often fail to convey and that the students deserve change.

Contrary to de Blasio's endorsement, the NYC Department of Education had barred government officials, media, and parents from school property at P.S. 71 during the protest, and students were blocked from recording or photographing the action.

One student had a phone Mayor de Blasio and the confiscated during the walk-

Councilman Mark Gjonaj watched alongside parents, expressing support for the youngsters, from the street side of the schoolyard fence.

"We're all encouraged by the youth for standing up to fight an issue that has polarized the nation," said Gjonaj. "I had hoped to be part of the solidarity and had hoped for this movement to encourage community involvement."

Prior to the DOE's decision on Tuesday, March 13, Gjonaj and other elected officials were invited to attend and speak during the walkout.

Carla Carroll is the mother of seventh grade P.S. 71 student Scarlett Carroll. She believes that the protest also touches on an issue more close to home for

Jerome Ave. rezone plan reaches Council

The proposed rezoning for Jerome Avenue has reached the New York City Council. This follows the NYC Department of City Planning's approval of the de Blasio administration's plan.

If approved it would influence 95-blocks of housing decisions along Jerome Avenue from McClellan Avenue to East 184th Street, including several intersecting east-west commercial corridors. The corridor of gritty auto repair shops and warehouses is expected to slowly vanish as new

the area.

"This vote is a major victory after years of community planning, bringing together thousands of residents, business owners, community groups, community boards 4,5 and 7 and elected officials to develop a shared vision of the future of this neighborhood, in which all residents are served," said Councilman Fernando Cabreara.

The rezoning is expected to result in a net increase of 3,800 housing units, 160,000 square feet of community facility space and 58,000 square housing opportunities engulf feet of commercial space.


According to the mayor's office, of the area's approximately 4,600 total housing units, about a quarter of them (1,150) would be permanently affordable through Mandatory Inclusionary Housing.

The mayor's office also anticipates 40 percent of the new housing development will be locked in as permanently affordable, when MIH and city financing programs are fully implemented.

Beyond housing subsidies, the city is committing \$189 million for parks and other

Mott Haven angered by Mayor's jail plan, lack of support

Raucous chants of "we will fight and we will win" opened a town hall meeting about Mayor de Blasio's unsettling plan to build a jail at 320 Concord Avenue in Mott Haven.

The mayor released a plan to construct a jail on the vacant parcel that currently is used as a NYPD police pound and was the former site of Lincoln Hospital.

The meeting's packed venue, P.S. 65, sits two blocks from where the jail would be built, one of the many issues that residents took exception

The noticable absence of several local elected city officials, including Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr., Councilman Raphael Salamanca or anyone from the mayor's office, contributed to the community feeling slighted in their struggle to have their voices heard.

"It's insulting to us," said Mott Haven lifetime resident Hector Cortez. "We voted for them, shouldn't they be here to listen to our issues?" he exclaimed. Residents fear that the construction of a jail would inadvertently erase decades of hard work and triumph for the Mott Haven community.

"We've done so much to build up this community. Years ago you couldn't catch a cab around here," said Sonia Taylor, who has lived a majority of her life in the Mott Haven area. "A jail would devastate all that we've done for women and the entire community," she added.

Residents also expressed concern over the jail's close proximity to the Diego Beekman houses.

The Mott Haven community had been eyeing the rubble-strewn square block for an affordable housing development, for over two years.

"I had been an active participant in the Diego Beekman plan. I told the mayor that the community had a very robust meeting on what the community wanted to see more of," Councilwoman Diana Ayala told residents at the meeting.

Needless to say a jail was not on their list.

Ayala also mentioned the possibility of an alternate loca-

tion for a jail that the city needs to build because it plans to close the Rikers Island facilities.

Jassen Cintron has lived close to the Beekman housing his entire life. "As a community we want to focus on kids and their education," he said. "Having a jail in the community is not what we want kids to see or grow up around," he added.

When Cintron spoke at the town hall he encouraged residents to stick together and unite to defeat the issue at hand.

He also recounted that while growing up in the neighborhood there was an element of shame and embarrassment in telling people that you had grown up in the Bronx, but he and his family stayed.

"Now we're proud of where we are from, we haven't had a meeting like this in 20 years, things are changing, we watch out for each other, we break bread with each other," Cintron said.

While residents are in agreement with the inmate reduction initiative and the permanent shutting of Rikers Island, they are demanding greater support from all their elected representatives as well.

Lou Curcio remembered for M.S 101 renaming push

As the community came together at M.S. 101 to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the sacrifice made by police officer Edward Byrne, a lot of the people who were instrumental in the school's renaming are sadly, no longer with us.

They include a man all credit with suggesting the idea to name the Throggs Neck school after the young hero cop slain in 1988: Louis Curcio.

Curcio was an elected member of the NYC Board of Education's School Board 8 and its president at the time. The BOE used to run the city's school system prior to the implementation of mayoral control and the establishment of the Department of Education.

Curcio did much of the legwork in getting approval from the school board and the district superintendent, Max Messer, to name what was then J.H.S. 101 after Byrne, said his friends and family. Byrne was killed while on duty in Jamaica, Queens.

"I remember my brother spending countless hours working on this," said John Curcio, Louis' brother, adding that he was only briefly mentioned at the ceremony at M.S. 101 on Tuesday, February 27 commemorating the 30-year anniversary of Byrne's heroic death.

John shared a mountain of corre-

spondence and documents with the Bronx Times that chronicled Louis' assiduous work on the project, serving as a chairman of the Dedication Committee that helped rename the school.

One of a handful of surviving members of the dedication committee, James Vacca, confirmed that Curcio, who passed away in 2012 and was a teacher at Lehman High School, played a key role in the effort.

"Louis felt the (renaming) would send a message to future generations. He was a teacher and he came from that background," said Vacca. "He was an educator who saw the value of imparting to kids a respect for law enforcement."

Vacca said that Curcio felt that a curriculum could be developed to make the school's namesake serve a didactic purpose, and said he believes the former school board president was correct in this assertion.

Curcio also felt that it was a way to memorialize Byrne in perpetuity, said Vacca.

John Curcio said that many of his brother's friends were detectives and police officers.

"He was born and bred in Pelham Bay and 101 was a neighborhood school," said his sister-in-law and Dedication Committee member Margaret Curcio, adding that he also served as a board member and president of the

Pelham Bay Taxpayers Association.

Members of the Dedication Committee saw their worked rewarded when the school was renamed on April 27, 1989.

Committee members included its executive assistant Maureen Sheridan, as well as Linda Burke, Joseph Calandruccio, John Collazzi, Curcio, Edward Delatorre, Jean DePesa, Anthony Ferranti, Joseph Henderson, Josephine Hession, Robert Iovino, Michael Kadish, Carl Larsen, Mary Maringione, Joseph McNulty, Messer, Patrick Norberto, Debra Pagnozzi, Joseph Powell, Julia Rodriguez, Anne Schuster, Myron Steinfast, Vincent Tolentino, Kenneth Wilkoff and Vacca.

Byrne's parents were ceremonial members of the committee.



Traffic signal installed at Bronx Park East & Waring

A long-awaited traffic signal has been installed in one borough community.

Advocacy has been underway for a traffic signal at Waring Avenue and Bronx Park East since at least 2012 and in late February the light finally became operational.

Installing a traffic signal at the crossing was something that the Bronx Park East Community Association has been advocating for since its inception six years ago, said the organization's coleader Rafael Schweizer.

The intersection has seen a number of close calls with both children in strollers and elders in wheelchairs, said Schweizer, noting that it is a block away from P.S. 96 and adjacent to Waring Playground in Bronx Park. It has also been the scene of numerous car collisions, he said

The two-way, four-lane roadway is close to a New York Botanical Garden entrance gate located near the intersection. The entrance was recently renovated and reopened last March, said Schweizer.

"Up until recently, this roadway has had zero traffic calming

devices: no crosswalk, no stop signs and no traffic light," said Schweizer, adding he believes the intersection has been an issue for at least 10 to 15 years or possibly longer.

Efforts to get a traffic light approved stalled, when NYC Department of Transportation studies in both 2012 and 2014 indicated that there wasn't a need

for a traffic control device at the location, said Schweizer.

Nevertheless both Constance Moran, former Bronx DOT commissioner and Nivardo Lopez, the current Bronx DOT commissioner visited the site personally and met with the community, he said.

After Councilman Ritchie Torres intervened, a third study

request was initiated. Residents were delighted to learn that the signal was approved in September 2017 and the installation work began in January, he said.

Torres organized a rally and held at press conference at the formerly troubled intersection in November 2016.

"Thanks to the relentless activism from the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{BPECA}}$ and

local residents, in partnership with my office, the intersection of Bronx Park East and Waring Avenue finally received a new stoplight that will make the intersection safer," said Torres. "The intersection was of concern for many years, and now residents will be able to walk safely at that location."

"The third traffic study at the Waring Avenue/Bronx Park East, which is near a school, showed higher vehicle volumes and less time for people to cross than previous studies – deeming the location feasible," stated the DOT spokeswoman.

The final part of the project, marked crosswalks at the intersection, are awaiting warmer weather.

The community activist thanked Luisa Benedetto, former chief of staff for Councilman Torres, and Romina Enea, Torres's special assistant, for their work on the project.

Additionally, BPECA is looking to tackle the troubled intersection of Thwaites Place and Barker Avenue, where a terrible car crash occurred on Friday, March 9, he said. The association is requesting a four-way stop.



EARLY MORNING FIRE IN BELMONT



Two people were killed in an early morning fire in Belmont. According to the FDNY, the fire started inside a first floor apartment at 2381 Hoffman Street on Monday, March 5 at around 1:30 a.m. Approximately nine people including three firefighters were injured and underwent hospitalization. Fire marshals have not yet determined a cause, but they believe an open apartment door allowed the blaze to spread quickly. Two men, whose identities have not been revealed, died after being trapped by the flames. Red Cross teams were on the scene to provide temporary housing, emergency funds, blankets and other assistance to eight displaced households consisting of 12 adults and 3 children.

Diversity lost in medicine cuts

Dear editor.

I'm an African-American Nigerian immigrant who was raised in the Bronx, and am now a current student at the Associated Medical Schools of New York's post-baccalaureate program at the University at Buffalo. This state-funded diversity in medicine pipeline program has opened doors for

This program has helped me by allowing me the time, opportunity, and necessary funding to pursue my goal of becoming a doctor. The information provided in the courses I am taking will give me the advantage I need to be successful in medical school. Because of this program, I will be attending SUNY Upstate Medical University in the fall, and I am closer to achieving my goal of becoming a physician.

I just turned 29, and as a nontraditional applicant to medical school, there are a number of challenges and difficulties that come with that, especially when combined with the challenges associated with being a minority male. This program has helped me meet these challenges by providing necessary support and the tools I need to be successful.

AMSNY's programs, supported by the state legislature, have helped hundreds of students like myself go on to become doctors who have done

great things in their communities. These programs are important because they help increase diversity in medicine by increasing the number of underrepresented students in medical school.

But despite the persistent lack of diversity in medicine, programs like this one which address the issue are once again being scaled back, facing a 20% budget cut. This means one in five future students from underrepresented backgrounds won't get the opportunity to become doctors and improve NY's healthcare.





CB7 hears homeless shelter proposal for Fordham Manor

At the Community Board 7 Housing Committee meeting on Tuesday, March 13, members of the community and board listened to yet another proposal for a shelter, this one set for Fordham Manor.

The planned location at 360 E. 193rd Street, a former Montefiore facility, is slated to add another 110 units for single homeless adult women from throughout the borough.

The shelter will be operated by Black Veterans for Social Justice, an organization with over 25 years experience with homeless shelters in the city.

This shelter promises a different kind of experience for both clients and residents of the community in an effort to get women in the shelter back on their feet, the operator claims.

"We are highly invested in the communities we open shelters in, not only because of the people we service, but because we're all human beings and we believe we all need to be ser-

viced." said Jelani Mashariki. the regional director of Shelter Operations at Black Veterans for Social Justice.

"If neighbors are having a block party, our clients offer to help clean up, if there's a community garden, our clients help with the upkeep because we're all part of this community," continued Mashariki.

He also explained that the shelter will create job opportunities for qualified Bronxites as part of the process.

As this shelter is the first of this organizations' to open in the borough, one of the biggest concerns residents had at the meeting was the location and how it was chosen.

"One hundred and ninetythird is the worst place to put a shelter, I don't even want to be there," said Dwayne Osborne, a resident of that area. "If you don't get robbed something's going to happen to you over there, so you may want to reconsider this location."

The location was proposed

by a not-for-profit provider through an open-ended Request For Proposal process, according NYC Department of Homeless Services representatives present at the meeting.

The board stressed to DHS and Black Vets reps the importance of early and adequate communication to communities where shelters are to be sited, besides coming to the community board.

"A lot of people are not against shelters, some of them want to really help," said Myrna Calderon, a member of the CB7. "But you don't even give them the opportunity because shelters are often just thrown into communities with little time to react."

This shelter will be full service, offering clients three meals a day and provide programming all day long to improve the residents' lives.

The clients living in the proposed all women's shelter will have a10 p.m. curfew.

Students, teachers rally against DOE merger plans

On Tuesday, March 6, students, teachers, and parents of the Holcombe L. Rucker School of Community Research protested the NYC Department of Education's plans for their school's

"When our schools are under attack, we stand up and fight back," chanted a crowd outside the building.

One proposal being considered details plans for Rucker high school and Longwood Preparatory Academy, which share space and are both in the Renewal Schools program, to be consolidated into one school.

"Our mayor made a promise to help strengthen schools that needed it, but he is now going back on his promise and it's not right," said Wendy Nathaniel, a teacher at HLR.

LPA was formerly the Banana Kelly High School, which was placed into the Renewal program in 2014 with Holcombe L. Rucker.

According to the DOE, both schools have struggled with low enrollment, which has created budget and programming challenges.

To rectify the situation, the DOE plans to phase out Holcombe Rucker, while transitioning all its students

"HLR's legacy will only be a distinct memory and that's not fair," said

"Proposals for consolidation seek to improve learning environments by combining the strengths and best practices of both schools," according to the DOE in the Panel on Education Policy notice.

In another proposal, the DOE is considering a plan to co-locate a char-

middle school grades from its Bronx 3 and 4 locations into the same building as the high school.

"You're sitting here and saying you support us but you really don't care," said HLR sophomore, Rosby Vazquez, to the PEP at the public hearing on the proposals.

The Success Academy-Bronx Middle School plan will essentially make way for the expansion of the Success Academy network, which many in the HLR community believe will lead to the eventual phase out of the high school grades, leading to a Success Academy takeover of the entire building.

The Holcombe Rucker School's community has vowed not to go down without a fight and promised to continue protesting and attending all PEP meetings.

'When you combine schools, who gets the resources," asked another HLR student during the public hearing inside the school. "We should be able to get priority over everyone else because our school has been here the longest."

According to students and teachers at HLR, for 11 years the school pleaded with the DOE for the resources the school lacked, such as an auditorium, gymnasium, library, as well as a renovated cafeteria, but those requests were all denied or ignored.

The PEP is expected to vote on the options on Wednesday, March 21 at the High School for Fashion Industries in Manhattan.

"LPA has made significant improvements, including a consistently improving graduation rate. Holcombe Rucker currently has a stronger graduation rate," said the DOE in the PEP notice. "The NYCDOE firmly believes that these communities will be stron-

Professional rugby team to play exhibition game at Gaelic Park

New York City's first professional rugby team is set to host it's biggest match of 2018 on Saturday, March 24 at Riverdale's iconic Gaelic Park.

The newly formed Rugby United New York will be joining a national league that is also newly formed, Major League Rugby, coming 2019.

This spring, RUNY is playing an exhibition season to give New Yorkers a taste of what is to come from what the league calls America's fastest growing sport.

"Despite living and playing rugby in the city for 20 years, I was astonished by the player numbers and the growth of the sport in the region," said chairman and founder James Kennedy.

"We want to work with the entire community to grow the sport we all love and make it accessible and enjoyable for everyone," he added.

RUNY has already started to positively impact their local community at a grassroots level, one of the pillars of MLR.

The club has partnered with Play Rugby USA, a youth development nonprofit that uses the unique power of rugby

to empower and inspire youth, primarily from underserved communities, and Solace House, a mental health awareness center in New York.

RUNY's inaugural 30-man team is entirely comprised of local players.

Most of them live and play rugby within the city while some come from surrounding areas such as New Jersey and Westchester.

The roster was whittled down from an initial 50 player group who were invited from clubs throughout the tristate area.

Led by head coach Mike Tolkin, former head coach of the USA national rugby team and native New Yorker, Rugby United NY will kick off its exhibition schedule in March with its match on the 24th against the Boston Mystics.

Joining Tolkin on the coaching staff will be assistant coaches Bruce McLane, Andrew Britt and Vili Vakasisikakala.

"This is a particularly historic moment for rugby in New York," said Tolkin. "This will be the first domestic professional endeavor in the city and it provides an opportunity for the wealth of talented players and coaches found in our great local clubs to come together as a formidable team," he added

The match at Gaelic Park will feature RUNY facing off against a team from the city's traditional sporting rival, Boston.

Before the main event kicks off, another classic New York matchup will take place between the NYPD and the FDNY rugby teams.

The annual match between the city's service departments is played to benefit McNaughton-Engeldrum fund for the families of fallen personnel.

Rugby United New York's home match against Boston, which will be open to the public, is set for Saaturday, March 24 at 7 p.m.

The full day of rugby will kickoff at 4 p.m. with the matchup between the FDNY and NYPD.

While not confirmed, it is anticipated that RUNY will make either Gaelic Park or Fordham University its home venue for the 2019 season.

Tuskegee Airman, Bronxite, Floyd Carter passes at 95

A legendary Tuskegee Airman has earned his angel wings.

Lieutenant Colonel Floyd Carter, a highly decorated veteran of three wars and 27-year NYPD veteran, passed away on Thursday, March 8 at 95-years-old.

For over 31 years, the Yorktown, VA native served his country in active and reserve roles before settling down in the northwest Bronx in 1956 where he resided with his grandson Jonathan Carter.

Carter's career began in 1944 after enlisting in the Aviation Cadet Program and graduating as a bombardier and navigator.

Upon graduation, he was transferred to Tuskegee, AL to enroll in the first class of African American student officer pilots completing his triple rating and earning his pilot's wings in 1945.

In September 1947, Carter joined the newly formed United States Air Force and in the following year, he led the first squadron of cargo planes into West Berlin transporting food and medicine for the Berlin Airlift.

At the height of the Cold War, Carter and his squadron braved stressful conditions while navigating a narrow neutral air space as Russian Mig air craft tried to break the squadron's composure.

He kept his men calm under pressure and his squadron successfully reached their destination without any casualities.

While serving in the USAF Reserves, Carter aided in the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam War in which he transported troops and supplies during the Tet Offensive from Thailand and Japan.

He was also placed into active/ standby duty for the Santo Domingo Uprising and Cuban Missile Crisis.

In 1971, Carter became the first African American officer to command a C-141 four engine, heavy lift transport squadron composed of white officers at McGuire Air Force Base in New Jersey until his 1974 retirement.

In addition to his military career, Carter served for 27 years as a NYPD Detective 2nd Grade before retiring in 1980.

He earned many commendations for his service in the armed forces including the Meritorious Service Award, Air Force Commendation Medal, the Medal for Humane Action for his involvement in the Berlin Airlift and a proclamation presented to him by former Congressman Charles Rangel for his remarkable achievements in 2005.

On March 29, 2007, Carter was

among 200 of the last surviving Tuskegee Airmen awarded the Congressional Gold Medal of Honor, the highest civilian award, by former president George W. Bush.

He served as the grand marshal for the 31st annual Bronx Veterans' Day Parade in Throggs Neck on November 8, 2015.

Carter told the Bronx Times in 2015 he kept hopeful despite experiencing setbacks and discrimination by knowing that "all things are possible with God" and "to receive His blessing, you must do the right thing and be patient."

He is survived by his wife of over 70 years Atherine; their children Floyd, Jr. and Rozalind and his grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Carter's funeral arrangements were not finalized by press time.

"I extend my heartfelt condolences to the friends and family of Floyd Carter, Sr., one of the last of the Tuskegee Airmen and veteran of the NYPD," stated Congressman Adriano Espaillat. "Mr. Carter dedicated his remarkable life to serving his country and his city and we are grateful."

Last year, Espaillat sponsored a bill to rename the U.S. Post Office at 99 Macombs Place in the airmen's honor.

Bay Plaza shopping center may include new hotel

On Thursday, March 1, an application was filed that would pave the way for a topnotch six-story, 130-room hotel for the northeastern corner of the Bay Plaza Shopping Center.

The plans for the hotel are still in the preliminary stage, according to James Friend of Friend Development Group, the project's developer and partner in the venture, along with Prestige Properties and Development.

Friend Development has built hotels before. The firm is responsible for Cross County Shopping Center's 8-story Hyatt Place hotel and another in downtown Brooklyn, a large Hampton Inn on Flatbush Avenue.

Friend said the project was too early in its initial planning stage to say definitively whether the project is a go. More details would be forthcoming in the coming months.

"Real estate development is dependent on a lot of factors and we still have a lot of variables out there that we need to nail down in order to move forward," Friend said.

The developers have filed an application to separate a buildable parcel along Bartow Avenue, adjacent to the Hutchinson River Parkway's right-of-way, from the shopping center's parking lot.

The new 200- by 500-foot tax lot would be used for the proposed hotel.

Community Board 10 has been notified of the project and is keeping a watchful eye on its possible impact on its host community.

"It's a hotel so we want to make sure it's something that respects the Co-op City community," said CB10 district manager, Matt Cruz.

"Second we want them to be mindful of parking in that community and make sure their plans don't interfere with the current traffic patterns," Cruz added.

Depending on the progress of the project, Cruz is considering the possibility of bringing together the developers and RiverBay, Co-op City's corporate entity, because of the residential complex' close proximity to the project.

The hotel is rumored to be a Hampton Inn, a Hilton fran-

chise.

Cruz, who met with local leaders and the developers when the application was filed, mentioned the project's location is prized because of the anticipated 2023 completion of a Metro North train station in Section 5 of Co-op City.

The hotel is expected to include a gym and an indoor swimming pool for guests only and a conference center, according to details Cruz received in his meeting with the developers.

The conference center will

be able to hold up to 200 guests and its design would allow it to hold two events simultaneously. An onsite warming kitchen would permit catered parties as well.

As the project is still in the planning phase, a rendering is not yet available.

The Bay Plaza Shopping Center and Mall at Bay Plaza sits at 2100 Bartow Avenue between I-95 and the Hutchinson River Parkway.

The complex includes stores like JC Penney, PC Richards, Macy's, Outback

Steakhouse, Swarovski, and a hundred other shops.

While many developers in the Bronx have built questionable motels recently, only the Residents Inn by Marriott at Hutch Metro Center on Waters Place and the Bronx Opera House on East 149th Street are legitimate hotels.

The Residents Inn is operating at an amazing 90 percent of capacity.

As of now, the new Bay Plaza hotel has no set construction start or completion date.

Concourse dancer draws Dior commerical, Alvin Ailey role

Some children like painting, others like running, but for Khalia Campbell, dancing was the talent she pursued.

Since she was two-yearsold, Khalia has been dancing, an artistry her parents predicted she would embrace before she even took her first breathe.

"My father was a DJ and he used to put headphones around my mother's stomach when she was pregnant with me," said Campbell, who was born and raised and continues to live in the Bronx.




experience and the first time I saw the commercial on TV, I screamed for my grandma, who I was living with, to come watch."







Choosing long term care - Part 2 by Healthy Seniors CliCC

In the previous article, we described some of the choices if you need to make a long-term care Having the right information can help make the decision easier. It is important to be ready with questions when deciding if a care agency of facility is a good fit. Here are some questions you should ask:

- Ask if they can deal with the care needs of the person.
- · Ask how long they plan for an older person. have been providing services, and how they hire and train staff. Ask if they do background checks on staff.
 - Ask how much they charge. Find out the cost of basic services, and ask if there are extra costs.
- If the person will need care for the rest of their life, ask how the agency deals with end of life care.

Other questions depend on the type of care provided:

Questions for home care agencies and community-based programs

- Is care available at the times it is needed?
 - · Do they require a

minimum number of dential Care hours of care?

- Are they licensed by the state? Some services must be licensed, while others are not.
- · For in-home care, can you expect that the same person will come to the home each time?
- What happens if the person doesn't show up

Questions for Resi-

- How many residents live there?
- How many staff are there for the residents?
- · How many residents does each staff member care for?
- · What activities are offered for residents?
- What happens if the person's care needs increase?
- · What happens if there is a medical emergency?
- · How are the person's care preferences respected?
- · Are families called if there is a problem?
- · Are there regular meal and snack times?

After visiting and asking questions, the most important thing to consider is comfort. Did the place feel warm and inviting? How did it smell? In community centers and residential care, did the people seem well-cared for and happy? It is okay to use instincts to answer this question. If the care agency does not feel right, it is not the right choice.

Message from Councilman Mark Gjonaj

The recent flurry of storms in our area resulted in 7,140 power outages, including several that lasted for multiple days, has exposed some of the short comings in our electrical infrastructure. These outages are unacceptable for relatively minor storms that were accurately forecasted days in advance. These were not overly powerful, apocalyptic, storms. The power outages were not caused by devastating forces of nature. This was a preventable disaster that was a result of poor planning and maintenance by the City of New York and Consolidated Edison Energy Com-

While they both share blame, they played two separate roles that contributed to this.

First, the city is to blame for not

addressing what is the root problem of the power outages and that is poorly maintained and positioned trees. The city, admirably, wants to plant a million trees, but can't seem to maintain the ones that currently exist. If we had better maintenance of trees by power lines this problem would not have become as severe as

Secondly, Con Ed has to take responsibility for allowing the problem of power outages to persist by not having an adequate response system

Con Ed, for its part, completely let the people of the Bronx down by failing to prepare and react to the storm. While the power outages aren't their fault, they alone are responsible for the duration of the outages. Again,

this was a storm that was accurately predicted, yet Con Ed appears to have been caught off guard. Instead of having crews ready to work it seemed as if they were scrambling to the news of the storm.

This lack of preparation and awareness on behalf of the city and Con Ed is very unbecoming of the richest city in the richest country of the world. We must do better.

Weekly tax tips from The Bronx Tax Man

Standard Deduction vs Itemized Deductions

What is the difference? Which do you qualify for? Which is better? What are the pros and cons of each? Can you change from year to year? Does your filing status have any bearing on your deductions? Are there limitations on these deductions? These will be answered during this article. Let's get started.

• Standard Deduction: The United States Treasury along with every state in the United States of America has a 'Standard Deduction.' This is the amount you can earn without paying any taxes. The amount is based on your filing status and your age. The amount typically will go up a little each year. For the year 2017 the amounts are as follows:

Single under 65 = \$6,350, Single over 65 = \$7,900;

Married couple filing joint return where both are under 65 = 12,700;

Married couple filing joint return where one spouse is 65 = \$13,950;

Married Couple filing joint return where both are 65 = \$15,200;

Married person filing separately from their spouse under 65 = \$6,350;

Married person filing separately from their spouse and over 65 =\$7,600;

Head of Household under 65 =\$9,350;

of household over 65 Head =\$10.900.

• Itemized Deductions: So, the big questions is do you qualify to itemize your deductions? Well let's run through a few questions. Do you own a home, co-op, condo or time share? Do you pay mortgage interest and real estate taxes? Are your annual state and local taxes withheld from your pay higher than the standard deduction amount listed above? Do you make large donations to your church or house of worship? Do you have gambling Income and Losses? Do you have unreimbursed deductible work expenses, such as uniforms or union dues? Do you have a casualty or loss, such as a theft or fire? Do you have medical expenses that surpass 10% of your adjusted gross income? If the answer to any of these could be yes, then you may be eligible to itemize. After calculating your figures, you would add them on the Schedule A and deem if you are eligible. For the NYS itemized deductions they will not allow the deduction of the NYS and NYC taxes paid throughout the year.

Another question people ask is, what is the benefit of itemizing and are there disadvantages to itemizing? The main advantage to itemizing is having larger deductions resulting in lower taxable income, which in turn lowers taxes and yields larger refunds. However, it is not all peaches and cream. For anyone who itemizes their deduction in a year where they receive a New York State refund, that refund must now be added back to your income in the year in which the refund is received. In some cases, the state refund may be a substantial increase to your federal income. Another down side to the itemized deductions is that you are more likely to be audited by the IRS or NYS Department of Finance. This is due to the burden of proof now being on you 'the taxpayer' to validate all your claims of additional

Some people exaggerate many deductions to increase their refunds without regard for the consequences. This will result in large fines, penalties and interest on the underpayment of taxes should you lose the audit. Even if you go to a tax preparer, you the taxpayer are always responsible for the accuracy of the return. Don't assume you will not be held accountable. Therefore, it's important to choose the right professional. Someone who will stand by your side in the event of an audit. Some of the large seasonal tax franchise offices have the nerve to charge an audit guarantee fee of \$50 or more. If they were confident in their abilities as a tax professional, they shouldn't charge you to guarantee their work.

If you file Married filing separately from your spouse, you both must file the exact same way. If you itemize, then your spouse must itemize. If your spouse files the standard deduction, then you must file the standard deduction. If you don't communicate on how you intend to file, and you file using different deductions, one of you will be audited and forced to follow the same method as your spouse.

You can change your method of deductions year to year. In any given year, you may have higher deductions for many reasons. There may have been a fire you need to claim, you may have won the lottery or had a bad year with high medical bills. You may have started a new job and have deductible non-reimbursed employee expenses, you may have just bought a home or refinanced your existing loan. An evaluation of your circumstances should take place each year with your tax advisor.

Elder question of the week

Dear Mr. Di Costanzo: My aid, which would help pay for be included when determining aunt and uncle live alone, but my aunt's health has been declining. My uncle tries to do his best, but it's hard for him to manage caring for her alone. I looked into having home health aides come in, but my aunt and uncle don't have much money, and I was told that they're just over the income limit to qualify for any assistance. Is there anything I can do?

We're so glad you asked this question, which shows pervasive misinformation that causes unnecessary struggle. Based on the facts presented, it sounds like your aunt could qualify for Medicaides at home. This is known as community Medicaid.

To be eligible for Medicaid, one cannot have assets greater than an amount set every year. Certain assets do not count. In the case of your aunt, if she has assets greater than \$15.150.00 (in 2018), we can employ the technique known as "spousal refusal", where most of her assets would be transferred to your uncle, who would then refuse to support her (financially, that is).

Spousal refusal pertains to income as well. Your uncle's income would not necessarily vour aunt's income for Medicaid purposes. In New York, if one has income greater than the maximum amount set every year (\$842.00 in 2018), one has essentially two choices: use the excess amount to pay for care at home, after which Medicaid will pay for the rest, or enroll in a pooled income trust, whereby the surplus income is deposited into a pooled trust and the money so deposited is then used for the Medicaid recipient's expenses such as food, utilities, mortgage, taxes, and so on. For example: Say your aunt's income was \$200.00 over the income limit. She could deposit \$200.00 into a pooled trust every month and use the money for expenses described above.

Managing the financial and healthcare needs of your loved ones is difficult but speaking with an elder law attorney can ease at least some of the burden.







The key reason for America's extraordinary political divide is the growing lack of adherence to the Constitutional foundation of the nation's government.

In the past, liberals and conservatives mainly battled over methodology, how best to achieve commonly shared goals.

Today, the Left sees traditional concepts of individual rights and impartial government as an obstacle to achieving their aspirations. The manner in which national discussions take place has been dramatically altered as

Even the most bitter debates of prior, turbulent periods were modified by the generally agreed upon (and quintessentially American) concept that "I disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it." (some believe the saying originated with Patrick Henry)

To some, that idea is an outdated concept. In recent years, Loretta Lynch, while

serving as attorney general, seriously considered criminally prosecuting those who merely disagreed with the concept of climate change.

In 2014, U.S. Senator Charles Schumer (D-NY) introduced legislation that would have limited the application of the First Amend-

On college campuses, conservative speakers, students, and professors are subjected to harassment.

For the first time in U.S. history, there is serious debate on the basic, constitutional underpinnings of the nation.

Earlier this year, some Californians began advocating a ballot initiative to repeal the section of their state laws that recognize the U.S. Constitution as the supreme

In a January article in The Week, national correspondent Ryan Cooper wrote: "The American Constitution is an outdated, malfunctioning piece of junk — and it's only getting worse." Louis Seidman, in a New York Times op-ed, complained

about "our insistence on obedience to the Constitution, with all its archaic, idiosyncratic and downright evil provisions... Our obsession with the Constitution has saddled us with a dysfunctional political system, kept us from debating the merits of divisive issues and inflamed our public discourse."

In 2012, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg stated during an interview on Egyptian television that she wouldn't recommend the U.S. Constitution as a model.

Another Justice, Elena Kagan, refused to acknowledge the inherent concept of inalienable rights during her 2010 confirmation hearing.

These comments are not the work of fringe characters writing in obscure journals, which makes them all the more worrisome.

The acceptability of opposition to Constitutional concepts became commonplace during the Obama Administration. Even Mr. Obama's supporters were left uneasy with his record. Garret Epps expressed his concern in the Atlantic: "... even for those like me who admire Barack Obama, the constitutional record is disturbingly mixed. Obama leaves the Constitution weaker than at the beginning of his terms."

The former president's contempt for Constitutional limitations was evident not primarily in his direct actions, ("I've got a pen and I've got a phone,") but in the way he turned the machinery of the federal government into a partisan political engine. This practice was a standard of totalitarian regimes throughout the 20th century that disregarded customary laws.

CATO's Ilya Shapiro notes that "The Obama administration has been the most lawless in U.S. history ... my accusation rests on the 44th president's seeing himself as professionally above the law, ignoring the executive branch's legal limits and disrespecting constitutional bounds like federalism and the separation of powers."

Using the IRS to intimidate the Tea Party, threatening to have the Federal Communications Commission put "monitors" in newsrooms, assuming control of aspects of the internet, using the Environmental Protection Agency to dramatically expand federal power, ignoring the role of the Senate in foreign treaties, all occurred during the Obama Administration.

These unconstitutional activities laid the groundwork for the eventual use of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to spy on the Trump campaign, cover up Clinton misdeeds, and inflame passions across the nation.

In the absence of widespread deference to Constitutional principles, excesses of power and a general sense of disunity have occurred and will continue to take U.S. politics and discourse to a dark and unprecedented

Radio Jarocho, a New York-based ensemble that offers a modernized take on the traditional Mexican sounds from Veracruz, will perform on Monday, March 19, at 12:30 p.m. in the Music Building on the **Lehman College** campus. The concert, which is open to the public with free admission, is being present by Lehman College's Department of Music, Multimedia, Theatre, and Dance.

Radio Jarocho plays son jarocho, the rowdy, upbeat, and at times melancholic music of the countryside of Veracruz, Mexico, and gives it a decidedly urban twist. A combination of Spanish, Afro-Caribbean, and Mexican indigenous music, son jarocho is customarily played in the fandango, a community celebration where people gather to play, sing, and dance.

The group released its second CD, Café Café, in 2012, and recently its members have also helped build communities of son jarocho practitioners in New York, Philadelphia, and Boston.

The Bruce Museum, 1 Museum Drive, Greenwich, CT, will exhibit Wild Bees: Photographs by Paula Sharp and Ross Eatman, opening at the Bruce Museum on Saturday, April 14, features approximately 26 exquisite photographs of wild bees in their natural habitats, along with native bee specimens that can be viewed under a video microscope, an interactive website, bee houses, and giant model bees at 20x scale.

While many people are aware of the collapse of European honeybee populations, fewer know that native insect pollinators are declining globally due to a combination of habitat loss and fragmentation, pesticide use, pathogens, and invasive species. Native bees pollinate both wild plants and agricultural crops – many of which cannot be pollinated by honeybees. Wild bees are important pollinators of wildflowers, garden flowers and commercial crops including fruit trees, berries, melons and garden vegetables, yet their significance in sustaining healthy ecosystems is often overlooked.

The photographs in the exhibition are part of a three-year wild bee project undertaken in July 2014 by photojournalist and writer Paula Sharp and nature photographer Ross Eatman to document wild bees inhabiting New York's Rockefeller State Park Preserve and neighboring Stone Barns Center for Food and Agriculture.



Fiorello LaGuardia read comics from Fieldston home

Fiorello LaGuardia had a lovely home in the Bronx at 5020 Goodridge Avenue in the exclusive community of Fieldston. It was from this home that he read Dick Tracy, Little Orphan Annie, and the other popular comic strips of the day to the children of the city over WNYC radio. The reason, of course, was the newspaper strike of 1945. Interestingly, when he passed away just two years later, the mortgage to that house was one of the few items they found in his bank safe deposit box. The other item was \$8,000 in war bonds and the meager contents are often cited as a clue to his honesty and integrity while in office.

Another oft mentioned connection to the Bronx has to do with the Bartow-Pell Mansion at 895 Shore Road in Pelham Bay Park. When Robert Moses was ousting the tenants of the various mansions in Pelham Bay Park owned by the City of New York, he was also preparing to evict the International Garden Club who had been leasing the Bartow-Pell mansion since 1914. LaGuardia simply moved himself and

his staff into the building using it as his summer City Hall and he even brought along the entire Press Corps. This was in 1936 and it was an oppressively hot summer. His quick and decisive action saved the mansion which remains one of the great treasures of the Bronx.

La Guardia worked his way through law school at New York University by working as an interpreter. He spoke several languages fluently including Italian which he learned from his father and perhaps it was this commonality of language that created the deep friendship with the Piccirilli family of Bronx sculptors. He also learned Yiddish from his Jewish mother though few people knew of his Jewish background and once when accused of being anti-Semitic, he challenged the accuser to debate him in Yiddish. Needless to say, the challenger backed down.

He loved nothing more than a debate and drifted towards politics winning a seat in Congress in 1916. When World War I broke out, he proved his patriotism and the love of his country by leaving the House of Representatives and enlisting in the United States Air Corps where he saw action in Italy and Austria. He achieved the rank of Major. Perhaps that's why it was appropriate that the North Beach Airport in Queens which was opened on October 15, 1939 as the New York Municipal Airport was later named for him. The original name was the Glenn H. Curtiss Airport but it was re-christened for LaGuardia on June 1, 1947.

Fiorello LaGuardia served as Mayor of New York for three terms spanning the years 1934 to 1945. He then took a post

as Director General of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration. He passed away on September 20, 1947 and was interred in a simple grave on Alpine Avenue in the Oakwood Plot of Woodlawn Cemetery here in the Bronx. Over 45,000 people came out to pay tribute to

"the little flower," as he was called, when he was laid out for viewing. The simple inscription on the modest white stone reads "Statesman, Humanitarian." Both descriptions are appropriate for the man who devoted his life to easing the burdens on his fellow man.

the school's community.

"The school has twice been on lockdown due to an active shooter in the area, one of them being last week, and parents were not notified either time," said Carroll. "Students have called parents crying hysterically because they were hiding in closets."

She added: "These students are also protesting shortcomings within the school's safety protocol."

Scarlett had been a key engineer in coordinating the walkout and read an essay she had written during the protest

"We, as students, need to be part of the decision on what to do to make our school's safety stronger," stated Scarlett's essay. "We demand to meet with our principal, our teachers, parents, our local police department, and our fellow students to decide on a comprehensive policy on how to safeguard lives in the event of a code red emergency.

"We shouldn't be afraid of going to our school, the place where we should feel most safe...Just look at us, we've been locked down twice due to active shooter situations outside our school," she added.

Carla agrees with her daughter's idea of having students more involved with the school's safety protocol.

"These kids know every nook and cranny of the building, when it comes to defining safety zones, who's better to ask than these kids?" said Carroll.

Steve and Sue Nadel who have lived across from the school for over 25 years, joined a few parents and Gjonaj in support of the students' activism.

"When we were kids the worst thing that could happen at school was being sent to the principal's office, these kids shouldn't fear being shot," said Sue Nadel.

"I hope that what is going on today will prompt better safety regulations within schools," said Steve Nadel.


In a jointly held walkout approved by both school administrations, Fordham Preparatory School and Academy of Mount St. Ursula students met at a midway point between their schools near Southern Boulevard and Bedford Park Boulevard and then walked back to Fordham Prep's Joe Fox Memorial Track for a brief prayer service.

Hundreds of students took part in the walkout, and there were many chants

opposing gun violence and signs with anti-shooting messages like 'Armed with Peace Tactics' and 'Ban the sale of AR-15s.'

At the service, the crowd responded "present" when the names of the Parkland fallen were read, to show they are still with us and alive in the student movement.

"To come out as a school with the administration supporting us says a lot as an institution," said Arthur Mabaka, Fordham Prep senior, adding "A lot of it was run by the students because we wanted to show our empathy for what happened in Parkland and to connect as much as we can with those going on the walkout today through the nation."

At both high schools, participation was voluntary, and Mount St. Ursula

students Fredricka Wade, Quenlynn Jowers, Blerentina Krasniqi, Genesis Feliciano and Arion Gilmore jointly suggested that the federal government take action rather than offer condolences, and called for more counseling, mental health services and gun ownership restrictions.

Wade said she doesn't believe anyone deserves to die, especially at the young ages of many of the Parkland massacre victims.

Teenagers shouldn't be worried about going to school, and there should be no reason that a teenager should own or buy a gun, said Krasniqi.

Gilmore said she thought the rally's

Gilmore said she thought the rally's visibility would draw attention to the larger issue of stopping gun violence in schools.

"We decided to participate (in the National School Walkout) because we are very concerned about the violence going on in schools," said Jean Marie Humphries, AMSU principal. "We believe very strongly that there needs to be better mental health services and detection to see what can be done to stop this violence."


public realm improvements.

"I am proud of the work we've accomplished through the Jerome Neighborhood process and look forward to witnessing the Jerome Corridor flourish in the years ahead." Said Councilwoman Vanessa Gibson.

According to the mayor, other major investments that are earmarked for the zone include: two state-of-the-art schools in District 9 and 10; approximately \$56 million in park improvements; community assets and public safety improvements; improved access and an addition to the Davidson Community Center; improved public safety through the installation of ARGUS cameras through-out the Jerome Corridor; transportation upgrades achieved through major commercial corridor improvements that include new lighting, crosswalks, benches, wayfinding, ADA upgrades, repaving, and other Vision Zero Upgrades; Public Realm Improvements upgrades, 'Under the El' with new bus bulbs, sidewalks, public space access among other improvements; investments to increase mobility, open up new public space under the elevated tracks, and strengthen connections to local retail; dedicated SBS programming; compliance assistance and business grants of \$20,000 for auto and other industrial businesses on the Jerome Avenue corridor; and a dedicated training program for auto and other workers in the area.
