

POPULAR COACH TO BE RECOGNIZED CB 10 approves first step to honor Michelle Muccio

Friends of a deceased cheerleading coach and spirited community volunteer are advocating for a street renaming in her honor.

Community Board 10 unanimously voted on Thursday, May 17 to rename the corner of St. Theresa and Edison avenues in Pelham Bay after Michelle Muccio, a coach and community volunteer who perished in an automobile accident on I-95 in March.

Muccio, 44, a popular cheerleading coach at Cardinal Spellman High School and the



Bronx Park East protests 6-story building development

A development company with plans to construct a 6-story apartment building on White Plains Road is facing tremendous community opposition.

On Wednesday, April 25 the Bronx Park East community held a protest at 2241 White Plains Road, the proposed site of the project, to say "no" to over-development in their area.

"The community does not want this development here," said Raphael Schweizer, cofounder of the Bronx Park East Community Association and lifelong resident, after the protest.

One of the biggest concerns the community has about the project is its affect on the area's limited street parking.

"This neighborhood is already over saturated with cars and it's so hard to find parking," said longtime resident Evelyn Hernandez-Rosa, after the protest.

According to those in attendance at Community Board 11's March meeting, developer Volmar Construction said there are no plans to incorpo-

rate off-street parking for the building's tenants.

Residents are upset the developer didn't reveal its intentions before it went ahead with its plans.

Schweizer said residents would prefer an alternative project, like a multistory parking garage, a much-needed amenity for the area.

"The reason we're fighting so hard is because we want developers to know that if they don't ask for community input or permission to build first, they will be defeated," said Schweizer.

On Thursday, April 26, Community Board 11 voted to send correspondence to HPD recommending they do not give city funding to construct the 36 units of affordable housing.

Besides the parking issue, some local residents are skeptical about the project's affordability. The size of the apartments do not match the rent, they believe.

The NYC Department of Housing, Preservation and Development, the office of Councilman Ritchie Torres, and Volmar Construction were informed of CB 11's recommendation the day after the vote was taken.

HPD was still considering the project for development as of Tuesday, May 22, according to an HPD spokesperson.

The spokesperson verified that all projects under review

for HPD funding must adhere to strict structural guidelines before being approved.

Councilman Ritchie Torres has been in contact with developers Volmar Construction, HPD, and the community board, since March when the plans were officially filed with the NYC Department of Buildings.

Since the development falls within Torres council district, his input is required for the specific funding Volmar Construction is applying for from the city.

On March 20, a representative from the councilman's office toured a similar property owned by the developers to get a sense of the their workmanship.

"The councilman is inclined to defer to the local community board and civic associations, but no final decision had been made at this time," said a spokesman for Torres in May.

As of Wednesday, May 23, Volmar Construction still had not responded to emails or phone calls from the Bronx Times with a comment on the project.

Community reacts: Facebook post causes 45th Precinct stir

The 45th Precinct community is still reeling over a Facebook picture posted on Friday, May 18.

The photo depicted 21-yearold Kelvin S. Rodriguez holding a gun while standing in front of a 45th Precinct squad car that was parked along Frisby Avenue.


Rodriguez, who also lives on Frisby Avenue, was arrested on Sunday, May 20, and charged with criminal possession of a weapon and making 'terroristic threats'.

Even though Rodriguez was apprehended, community members are still fuming over his disgraceful disrespect for our men and women in blue.

"This is disturbing and downright scary," said Annie Boller, a member of the 45th Pecinct Community Council.

"To know there is a good chance that basically anyone you pass on the street could be carrying a gun is mind boggling," continued Boller, who explained she was a licensed gun owner once and that her permit dictated she could not remove it from her home.

resident was taken to Bronx Criminal Court for a pre-arraignment meeting before a judge on Sunday, May 20, where he was released on his own recognizance.

An area resident said many neighbors have complained about Rodriguez's behavior over the last few years.

"There are luxury cars that (stop in front of his house) at 11 p.m. honking their horns and someone runs out and gives them something," said the resident.

"I see the people at that house smoking all the time and they probably all carry guns," the resident claimed.

On Monday, May 21, NYPD did not state whether they were able to uncover the actual gun in the picture, according to Bob Bieder from the community council.

However, they do think the weapon was real and not a toy, Bieder suggested.

"He was just trying to show off to his friends," said Bieder. "Just a stupid kid with a gun and that's frightening in and of itself."

Bieder explained the very action of standing next to a police car with a gun is considered making a terroristic threat.

Others in the community recalled the conversation circulating on social media about the photo.

Most of conversation revolved around whether someone with an illegal weapon in front of a marked police car would try to fire that weapon at officers inside, like the

tragic death of police officer Miosotis Familia in July of 2015.

"I don't know this kid's record or history," said John Provetto, a long time resident of the community. "But if his gun is illegal, he probably does not mean to do good things with it."

Provetto started the COPS-HOT program, a fund that provides money to those who help identify suspects who shoot and kill police officers.


No police officers were

physically harmed by Rodriguez.

"This is a community that respects, admires and genuinely cares about their women and men in blue," said district manager of Community Board 10, Matt Cruz.


"The gentleman's actions are not indicative of the greater community within the 45th Precinct."

Rodriguez is due back in Bronx Criminal Court on June 25.

2018 Participatory Budget results around the boro

This year's participatory budgeting results are in.

After the year-long process of compiling public projects by public vote, Council districts, 8, 11, 15, 16, and 17 each allotted the \$1 million minimum for their constituency to recommend a use for.

Most districts favored using the funds towards school and education upgrades, along with other unique projects.

District 15 dedicated a majority of its funding towards improving school technology and renovations.

This comes just after Councilman Ritchie Torres dedicated \$2.5 million for a rooftop garden and soundstage for Theatre Arts Production Company School on Webster Avenue.

Torres expected that the majority of the funds would be directed to the schools in his 15th district, saying that 'Bronx schools should be brought into the 21st century with technology,' noting the minimum voting age in participatory budgeting is 14.

"Something like this is like learning a language, it should be done at the youth level and grown into adulthood," said Torres.

The councilman boasted that since 2015, the amount of people voting on the budget in his district doubled from 2,000 to 4,000.

He praised the newly legislated participatory budgeting procedure, a year-long process of community involvement, as a 'grassroots' form of democracy that rewards civic engagement.

District 17 also targeted its participatory funds for similar educational purposes while also suggesting the upgrading of community faculties.

"Participating in this community-driven process each year is incredibly important to me because residents are able to directly decide what projects should be invested in," said Councilman Rafael Salamanca Jr. "I commend each of the participating groups who made their voices heard and rallied residents to go vote," the councilman added.

District 16 wanted a majority of its funding put towards school and libarary upgrades

and the use of security cameras at various locations, using only about \$910,000 of the allotted million.

The Bronx portion of District 8 put their money towards school gym and basketball court renovations.

Some of the major projects that were recommended are: *District 15:*

Two electronic Real Time Bus Countdown Clocks at four bus stops, \$120,000; Mobile Laptop Carts, \$35,000 per school, \$315,000 total; renovation of M.S. 118 school auditorium; curtains-\$150,000/ lighting-\$250,000/AV-\$15,000, \$415,000 total; New York Public Library upgrades throughout \$200,000; M.S. 45 Murrell auditorium reparation \$450,000; and Smartboards for schools, \$315,000.

District 17:

M.S. 302X Girls Prep Academy auditorium renovation; full renovation of the auditorium, \$600,000; Hunts Point Recreation Center Upgrades; updated with exercise machines, equipment and increase the space for physical activity, \$100,000; Bronx Charter School for the Arts Technology; and 55 Chromebooks for students, 20 laptops for teachers, 12 Smart Boards, 2 TVs, sound system and video camera, \$150,000.

District 16:

Science Lab for P.S./I.S. 218, \$600,000; New York Public Library upgrades, \$200,000; and security camera installations, \$70,438.

District 8 (Bronx):

South Bronx Prep gym renovation, \$1,184; and basketball court renovations at Patterson Houses, \$1,083.

District 11 did not report its participatory budget winning projects in time for deadline.


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

Anti-gun violence artwork comes to Jackson Houses

A south Bronx community and a Manhattan artist have taken a creative, unique approach to raise awareness of gun violence and its detrimental impact.

Titled 'Tracing the Bullet: a story of community and gun violence,' artist Kate Browne and her Bronx-based team took three weeks to assemble a temporary, ten-foot tall, walk-able wooden cocoon at the Andrew Jackson Houses basketball court in Morrisania.

Residents led a lighted procession through their NYCHA complex, coming together at the court, known locally as 'the cage,' for the illumination ceremony of the cocoon in the late hours of Saturday, May 19.

While its exterior is quite aesthetically pleasing, the true protest to gun violence is within its wooden rings.

Internally draped with local materials and objects from those that were personally affected by gun violence in the area, these first hand accounts play as a soundtrack as one walks within the artistic exhibit.

"Not long after I began, I realized that gun violence was a central fact of life for so many," said Browne. "A mother recalled her son's blood spreading across the hallway in front of their apartment door after he'd been shot," she added.

This 'trace of the bullet' extends further than just the victims and their families, however.

In a span of three years, Browne interviewed residents of multiple housing developments in the area, EMTs, nurses, trauma surgeons, a funeral home director, violence interrupters, housing cops, grief counselors and bio teams that clean up after shootings.

Browne also recalled one account of a cleaning crew neglecting their duties, resulting in family and friends project planned for eastern Europe.

having to wash away the victim's blood.

"By now I've interviewed more than 200 people, I realized that the story of even a single gunshot is so fragmented, it easily defies comprehension," said Browne. "Working with the people in this part of the south Bronx, I wanted to try to piece some of these stories back together, to weave a partial account of their lives that better suggests the whole," she added.

Many of those she interviewed posed for portraits that are hanging in the Morrisania Air Rights community room, an adjacent housing complex that Browne used as her base of operations over the years.

Browne ultimately settled on the location of the Jackson Houses basketball court to host the exhibit because she was drawn to the coloration and patterns it vibrantly boasted.

Having grown up in rural Pennsylvania, communities like the Bronx were something very foreign to Browne. She had previously done a project with a south Bronx middle school, having children create objects that symbolized something from their lives

"Doing that taught me a great deal about the community's issues," said Browne. "I was eager to return and do an even larger project in the area," she added.

While Browne has done cocoon projects around the world in previous years, she said that this Bronx community was like none she had ever seen before.

"The support and welcome that I received was like nowhere else in the world. This is a remarkable community. It is so strong and that's something that goes back many generations," Browne said.

Next for Browne is another cocoon

Silence is deafening

Bronx - Queens Congressmember and aspiring future House Speaker Joseph Crowlev is incorrect when he blames the federal government for insufficient funding of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority. Federal support for transportation has remained consistent and growing over the past decades.

When a crises occurred, be it 9/11 in 2001 or Hurricane Sandy in 2012, Washington was there for us. Additional billions

let them know that he was a in assistance above and beyond yearly formula allocations from the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Transit Administration were provided. In 2009, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act provided billions more.

Most federal transportation grants require a 20% hard cash local share. In many cases, FTA accepted toll credits instead of hard cash for the local share. This saved the MTA \$1 billion in the previous 2010 - 2014 Five Year Capital Program. One billion, two hundred million will be saved under the 2015 - 2019 Five Year Capital Program. Washington has made available over \$1.3 billion in 2018 for the MTA to apply for. FTA funds a significant portion of the MTA's capital program. There are other opportunities for several hundred million

more in annual discretionary competitive grants.

President Trump's proposal (changing the split to 20% federal and 80% local) which was and will continue to be dead on arrival in Congress, really only impacted the competitive New Starts program. This funds a handful of system expansion projects like East Side Access and Second Avenue Subway. All the other programs will continue with a 80% federal and 20% MTA local share.

Why is Congressmember Crowley silent in not critiquing both Governor Cuomo and Mayor de Blasio for their continued shortfalls in the billions both still owe the MTA for fully funding the current \$32 billion MTA 2015 - 2019 Five Year Capital Plan?

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Extra 'Ferry \$\$' will not add more Bronx stops

A proposed increase in NYC ferry service funding won't mean additional stops in the borough just yet.

The ferry at Clason Point in Soundview is expected to become operational sometime this summer, but news that the city's executive budget allocated \$300 million over the next several years for ferry infrastructure reinforcement and expansion will not lead to additional docks in the Bronx.

A NYC Economic Development Corporation spokeswoman stated that the planned expansion recently announced is designed "to meet current and future demand projected for the current system, which includes the Soundview route launching this summer."

Councilman Mark Gjonaj said that the ferry service for Ferry Point was his "one ask" in terms of his district in the Fiscal Year 2019 city budget negotiations, and that he is advocating for additional stops and routes with the Council Speaker Corey Johnson, including a dock at Ferry Point.

"(The funds) are not going towards the expansion of ferry service into Ferry Point Park, which is a transpor-

A road has also been constructed that leads to the waterfront, she added

"I believe that right now that the Soundview ferry is a great asset and I think within a couple of years they are going to have one at Ferry Point," said Poggi.

Poggi said she also believes that a Ferry Point ferry could take some riders off the subways, easing overcrowd-

According to a source at EDC, after the launch of the Soundview ferry, EDC plans to commence a feasibility study in the fall to examine what additional communities NYC Ferry can expand to in the future.

Other site suggestions for ferry service are being floated, including at Orchard Beach.

Paul Klein of the City Island Chamber of Commerce said the organization has continually advocated for extending ferry service, and that Orchard Beach would be a good location because it has a several thousand car parking lot that is under-utilized throughout most of the year.

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

LGBT folks attend historic senior residence groundbreaking

A new LGBTQ-friendly, low-income senior housing project is officially underway.

On Thursday, May 17 seniors of the LGBT community, SAGE, HELP USA, representatives of the governor and mayor's office along with other local elected officials and leaders broke ground on the Crotona Senior Residences.

Located at 771 Crotona Park North, the development is actually the first of its kind in country.

Seniors of the LGBTQ+ community in the Bronx have hailed the project a victory.

"I thought I'd never see this day," said 74-year-old Joyce Banks. "It's been a long time coming and I'm glad."

Banks explained she already applied to live in one of the 84 units at Crotona Senior Residences.

The property will be energy efficient, including solar fixtures, and have a community garden.

Alongside having housing for a group that had long faced housing discrimination. SAGE will run an LGBT senior center on the first floor of the building, which will include health and cultural programs, a computer area, and even provide meals to the seniors in the neighborhood.

"It is truly because of our LGBT elders and their activism that this project is happening," said SAGE CEO Michael Adams during the ceremony.

SAGE is an organization that advocates and provides services for LGBT elders, one of which attested for the need to support those members of the community.

"Everyone deserves to grow old with dignity and respect and a little bit of happiness," said 64-year-old Marie Spivey who explained that as she

got older, her gender and sexual orientation made her feel increasingly concerned about her safety.

Spivey also planned to apply for housing at the new development.

Another Bronx SAGE constituent, Gwendolyn Offley, considered herself one of the lucky ones to have found subsidized housing elsewhere in the borough.

"This is a good thing for our community and we are blessed to see it being built," said Offley.

The 75-year-old explained if she had not already found suitable housing that she would have likely applied to the Tremont development.

In addition to the inclusivity and the center, 26 of the one-bedroom and studio apartments at Crotona Senior Residences will be dedicated to housing homeless seniors.


The project, which cost \$41.4 million, was funded by several state, city and local entities, a funding package that was challenging at times.

Borough President Diaz Jr, who contributed \$600,000 to the project, explained one of the challenges was that construction was affected by a large rock outcropping on the lot that the contractor had to work around.

'Where there's a will, there's a way and the Bronx is resilient," said the borough president on overcoming the physical obstacles of the project after the ceremony.

Construction of the Crotona Senior Residences is expected for completion by the end of 2019.

Other beneficiaries of the project include NYS Homes and Community Renewal who financed more than \$20 million and NYC Housing Preservation and Development SARA Program, which contributed over \$10 million, among other contributors.





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TN post office makes changes to parking habits

The Throggs Neck post office has long been a staple of the community.

In 2018, however, residents in the vicinity of the station are fed up with its delivery trucks.

The Throggs Neck Merchants Association and Community Board 10 have both heard from constituents about the increasing number of trucks that continue to block businesses, driveways and even traffic.

As the community put its foot down, the post office agreed to work collaboratively on a solution to the problem.

"I spoke with the post office manager and understand the complexities they face," said Bobby Jaen, the president of the TNMA.

"The existing pattern of where the postal trucks park has caused a lot of anguish for residents and merchants," he continued.

This station's overall business has increased more than 100% in the last two years the manager claims. As of May 2018, the Throggs Neck station is handling about 40 percent of Amazon's 10465 deliveries in

addition to their business with Fedex and UPS, as well as their own packages and mail deliveries, according to the station manager Fernando Sanchez.

"People are making more purchases on the internet," said Sanchez, who began working as the manager in May. "When we get more business, we need more trucks to make the deliveries."

Jaen and the district manager of CB 10 suggested a few parking alternatives to Sanchez.

These included moving excess trucks that do not fit in the station's loading bay area, to park on the service road along I-95 or the open spaces next to St. Raymond's Cemetery.

These areas have often been used by movie production crews when they film in Throggs Neck and need space to park additional vehicles.

However, since the post office is a federal service, all of their trucks have to be parked in designated areas next to the branch, according to Sanchez.

Failure to comply with those rules without getting approval first could result in punishment by the federal gov-

ernment or the Postal Police, which operate under a different branch of the postal service.

"The good thing is we are both trying to be more community minded with our compromise," added Jaen on his discussion with Sanchez.

Sanchez planned to discuss a proposal to move the trucks away from the branch with higher authorities of the USPS. In addition, he said he would reinforce 'a good neighbor' policy with his employees, by respecting residential driveways and avoid blocking street access.

"If I have to knock on every door in the neighborhood to explain we are trying to do better, I will do it," stressed Sanchez on the gravity of his commitment to the community.

As of Tuesday, May 22, postal trucks were seen parking perpendicular to the sidewalk along Phillip Avenue next to the station, tightening their nightly parking formation as Sanchez promised.

He, Jaen, and CB 10 DM Matt Cruz are scheduled to meet again Tuesday, June 12 to discuss the progress being made.

"We want the community and the post office to know we are watching them," said Cruz. "We will stay in contact until the problem is fixed."





The Pearly Gates to receive street lighting upgrade

The Pearly Gates Park in Westchester Square has a brighter future ahead, literally.

New lighting is to be installed in the park's immediate surrounding area.

Additional LED lighting is to be placed at the intersections of Tratman Avenue and St. Peter's Avenue as well as Tratman and Rowland avenues.

Extra long arms are to be installed on the already existing light poles at the two intersections adjacent to the park, to expand the area the lighting will enhance.

Tratman and St. Peter's will receive the upgrade on two light poles while Tratman and Rowland will have only one.

Approved in early May of this year, the project is under the jurisdiction of the NYC Department of Transportation.

Technically, the new lighting will shine down on the street and sidewalks outside the park, but The Pearly Gates Park will still benefit.

This lighting project comes

as part of a larger, citywide initiative that is a 'sister act' to the 'vision zero initiative', according to a DOT spokesperson.

Community Board 10 district manager Matthew Cruz explained that the request for the new lighting was in CB 10's list of district needs.

It was the only lighting project on the list to be ap-

proved.

"Safety was a concern of the nearby residents. We've had many complaints about the park's darkness at night," said Cruz.

Sandi Lusk, the director of Westchester Square-Zerega Improvement Organization is thrilled to see this project come to fruition.

She's been working to im-

prove The Pearly Gates, with a major focus on the playground, since 1990.

'It's come a long way," said Lusk. "More policing and better lighting have been priorities that we've been pushing for, this a great upgrade" she added.

Lusk also explained that in the past the park was subject to large amounts of vandal-

ism, while dangerous gang activity had also tarnished The Pearly Gates as well.

In the 2016 a shooting also occurred in the park's immediate area, which had also prompted Lusk to call for an increased police presence for the intersection.

In time she had met with many local elected officials including the mayor to make the community space of the park safe for all, while indicating that the park's diminutive size could be the reason it is sometimes overlooked.

In the past, part of that community space was used during summertime for children's programs as well.

"It's a weak link that needs support and things have gotten much, much better," said Lusk. "I don't want things to ever go back to the way that they were," she added.

Cruz estimates the lights should be installed by the end of June, in the second quarter of the year.

However, the DOT says it has up to six months to complete the order for the new lighting.



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
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Parkchester reunion brings 500 plus to Brewski's

Albie, Brian and their friends hope to host another Parkchester reunion in the future.



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

It's an uncommon, inhibiting speech disorder that also affects his motor skills.

Chris mainly uses an iPad to communicate; he can also sound out some phonetics, such as when he predicted the Cleveland Cavaliers to win the NBA finals this season.

Despite these challenges, Chris is taking his young life in stride.

"He amazes us every day. The fact that he's non-verbal and has still made so many gains," said Chris' father, Michael Dejesus. "He reads, he's doing excellent with math and understands things conceptually," he added.

Chris and his family were out for a walk some weeks ago when they made their way into JJ Busco's Deli.

After ordering. Chris' mother, Addy Ordiz ap-

proached the staff telling them about Chris and his iournev.

Busco's immediately wanted to join Chris' team, coming up with a sandwich to name for Chris during Apraxia Awareness Week from May 14 through May 20.

Called 'The Little Giant,' the hero for the tyke is packed with grilled chicken topped with bacon, American cheese, lettuce, tomato, mayonnaise and ketchup.

The name was chosen by his mother, in recognition of Chris' life and all that's he's overcome and accomplished.

"We're all about the neighborhood and helping out wherever we can, we thought it was a great cause and we were excited to be a part of it," said JJ Busco, the deli's owner.

During Apraxia Awareness Week, Busco's deli sold a whopping 123 Little Giant sandwiches.

When Chris came into the deli on Monday, May 21, his eyes lit up when he saw JJ and a Little Giant hero with a side of fried mac and cheese balls.

While his motor skills may have development issues, that

didn't stop Chris from dancing to the Frankie Valli song that was playing inside the deli

Chris has also become a sensation around the Bronx.

Ramapo for Children is an organization that helps young people who face learning obstacles, including social, emotional, and cognitive challenges, by nurturing and supporting their success.

It helps young people learn to align their behaviors with their aspirations. It provides adults with a toolbox of strategies and techniques that enables them to promote positive behavior and to foster social and emotional skill development in young people. The organization equips school districts, administrators, and teachers with the practical tactics they need to create these positive environments.

As a result, safer communities are built, where people feel like they belong and are connected to others. At the heart of Ramapo's work is the conviction that all children seek the same things: to learn, feel valued, and experience success.

Ramapo for Children began when Camp Ramapo was es-

tablished in 1922 as an all-boys camp in the Ramapo Mountains. In 1923, the organization's Rhinebeck campus property was purchased, and Camp Ramapo moved to where it is today — in New York's beautiful Hudson Valley region.

The camp expanded in 1956 when it became co-ed. It has continued to flourish over the years. Camp Ramapo still operates each summer. It is a residential program that welcomes more than 500 children every year. The camp is designed to support the unique needs of children ages 6–16 who have a broad range of social, emotional, and cognitive abilities. The programs there are designed to promote independence, self-confidence, and fun.

Camp Ramapo is offered only in the summer, but it feeds into the Ramapo Leadership Program, which is open to teen campers and young people from the community who can stay on campus one weekend per month, year-round, participating in skill-building activities that are centered on specific themes — including nutrition, navigating social situations, and stress management.


At the Rhinebeck campus, Ramapo for Children also offers the Staff Assistant Experience, a residential program designed to put young adults on the path towards independence by teaching them social, vocational, and life skills in a communal setting. Ramapo Retreats, another on-campus program, are full-day and multiday teambuilding retreats designed to strengthen communication and trust among group participants. They are open to students in elementary through high school, as well as to school staff members, community groups, and colleges.

Since 2001, Ramapo for Children has expanded its offerings beyond the campus to include Ramapo Training, its professional development program that provides workshops, coaching, and technical assistance to educators, youth workers, and caregivers. It is widely utilized by schools, afterschool programs, and daycares. It offers restorative practices, behavioral management support, and more.

A Ramapo coach says, "Participants leave our workshops and one-on-one coaching sessions feeling more empowered because they come away with a concrete set of tools for promoting positive behavior, and strategies for creating focused, productive learning environments."

Ramapo For Children estimates that it serves 500 campers; 200 camp counselors; nearly 30,000 educators, youth workers, and caregivers; almost 12,000 retreat participants; and 35 young adults transitioning to independence.

NYBG Exhibits 'Georgia O'Keeffe: Visions of Hawaii'



Message from Councilman Mark Gjonaj

For decades New York City schools have dealt with the unfortunate circumstance of using transportable classroom units, commonly known as trailers, to accommodate for overcrowding schools. These trailers are not physically connected to the school building which means that they are outside of the security infrastructure. It also means that children must go out in the cold to use the restroom, go to lunch, and classes like art and gym.

Despite pledges from consecutive city administrations to end the use of trailers there are currently 5,400 students going to school in transportable classroom units. What was originally intended to be a stop-gap measure to help schools deal with overcrowding has morphed into an everyday reality that most people accept without question.

In 2003 Mayor Bloomberg stated that it was a goal of his administration to remove all school trailers by 2012. In 2014 Mayor de Blasio pledged that his administration would remove all trailers from city schools within five years; we are now in the final year of the pledge and the administration testified that they do not have a plan for the remaining 99 trailers.

By not taking action we, as a city, are setting these children up for failure. We cannot reasonably expect these kids to reach their full academic potential if they are concentrating more on how to stay warm than the lesson.

It is also important that we do not forget how these structures impact teachers. Just as students cannot learn in such conditions, it is unjust to make a teacher work in trailers. We cannot expect a teacher to be an effective instructor when they have to prioritize the health and safety of their students.

It is morally indefensible that in the richest city, in the richest country, on earth children are forced to learn in trailers. When the administration prioritized universal pre-k it found the space and funding to make it a reality; the only reason trailers still exist is because the administration has not prioritized it. It is time the mayor follow-up on his pledge and eliminates school trailers once and for all.

Weekly insurance tips from John Cerini

Do you own a business? Are you thinking of starting a business? This year is an important year to strategize if you are starting a new business. There are many types of business entities you can have. These are: Sole Proprietor - individual owner (no corporate protection), you must file a Schedule C; Partnership – two or more owners (no corporate protection), you must file a 1065 tax return and distribute a K-1 to the owners; C-*Corporation* – corporation which is not a pass-through* entity with one or more owners, you must file an 1120 tax return and it does not affect the owners personally; S-Corporation - corporation which has the benefits of being a pass-through* entity; and Limited Li*ability Corporation* – this entity acts like the chameleon of corporations. Based on the number of partners, it can be a sole proprietor, partnership or corporation, all while having the protection of the corporate veil.

* The definition of a pass-through entity simply means that the corporation profit or loss pass through to the shareholders of the business entity. For example, if you have an LLC with two owners that each have fifty percent shares of the company and there is a profit of \$10,000, then each owner would report a \$5.000 income on their personal tax return given to them on a K-1 of the business entity. The individual pays the taxes to the federal government, not the business.

This is a good time to have a business due to the new tax plan. On December, 22, 2017, President Trump signed The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act into law, the first major tax reform in 31 years. The new tax reform law makes many changes to the tax code. Many businesses will be impacted. Tax benefits include a reduction in the corporate tax rate, increase in the bonus depreciation allowance, an increase in the section 179 expensing amount and the repeal of the corporate alternative minimum tax. S-Corporations, partnerships, LLCs, and sole proprietorships will be allowed a deduction of 20% of qualified business income, subject to some limitations.

Here are some of the new law bullet points as of the beginning of 2018: Cor*porate taxes*:. tax rate reduction for C corporations from the top rate of 35% to 21%; Deductions and credits: the entertainment deduction has been repealed. The cost of tickets to concerts, football games or the ballet are no longer deductible. This will be a big hit to many service-related businesses who tend to take clients out for business meetings; Bonus depreciation: the usual 50% bonus depreciation allowance has been temporarily increased to 100% for qualifying property placed in service after September 27, 2017, and before January 1, 2023. Additionally, bonus depreciation will be allowed on the purchase of used property for the first time: Interest deductions: For businesses which have sales higher than \$25 million, the new tax law maximizes the write off for interest expenses to 30% of adjusted taxable income; Pass-through businesses:. taxpayers who have pass-through entities described above can now deduct up to 20% of domestic qualified business income. In rare cases, net rental income may be eligible for all or some of the 20% deduction. As an accountant, I am not happy with a part of the new law that says some service businesses like lawyers, accountants, doctors, etc, limits will apply and may not be eligible for the 20% deduction at all; and Net operating losses: the old tax law would allow for 100% of (NOL) net operating loss deduction of your taxable income. However, the new rule limits your NOL to 80% for tax years beginning January 1, 2018. We also used to be able to carry losses back for two years, but now we can only carryforward losses. The old law allowed for carry forward of 20 years, now the new law allows for the them to be carried forward forever, with the limitation for the 80% of your taxable income per vear.

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
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

Matter Of Health: Talking to children about alcohol

Many people consume alcohol when attending summer parties, holiday gatherings or weddings. Children in attendance may see adults drinking and having a good time and wonder why alcohol is off-limits to them.

The National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism says that parents can have a major impact on their children's drinking habits by influencing children's values and decisions about drinking. Alcohol can affect both the body and the mind, and parents who want their kids to approach alcohol responsibly when they are of legal drinking age can teach their youngsters about the ways alcohol can influence their health.

The NIAA states that alcohol is used by more young people than tobacco or illicit drugs. A person who begins drinking as a young teen is four times more likely to develop alcohol dependence than someone drink.

Alcohol and its effects

Many kids and their parents are not overly concerned about alcohol, which does not carry the same stigma as illegal drugs. When consumed in small amounts, alcohol may not seem very dangerous, but even small quantities can affect the body.

Alcohol is a depressant, which slows down the body and makes a person feel relaxed. With more alcohol, movements become clumsy and uncoordinated. It also interferes with decision-making abilities and could

lead to risky behavior. As alcohol slows reaction time, driving under the influence can be deadly.

The liver is responsible for filtering who waits until adulthood to try a alcohol out of the blood. With greater quantities of alcohol, it can take longer for the liver to do its job. Over time, alcohol consumption can damage the liver.

Get the facts

Some families have misinformed views about alcohol. Beer or wine may be considered "safer" than hard liquor, but each has the same effect on the body. It can take anywhere from two to three hours for a single drink to leave a person's system and the process cannot be sped up.

Parents concerned about their children and their consumption of alcohol can present the facts and urge kids to wait until they are adults before trying alcohol. Waiting until adulthood can minimize some of the health implications of drinking early.

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

Vaccines and their side effects

Vaccines are to prevent disease and keep us healthy. Vaccines are responsible for something called "herd immunity." If the majority of people in a community have been vaccinated against a certain disease, an unvaccinated person is less likely to get sick himself. During the past 60 years, vaccines have helped eradicate smallpox and almost wiped out all cases of polio. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention also reports a 99 percent reduction in the incidence of bacterial meningitis since the introduction of the vaccination against the disease.

Despite the good they can do, some people are hesitant to follow recommended vaccination schedules for fear of side effects. Some

> Vaccines undergo rigorous safety testing prior to being approved for use and, once approved, are continually monitored for safety. But as with any medication, there are possible side effects associated with vaccinations, although most are not serious. The following are some side effects that people may experience after being vaccinated.

• injection site reactions, such as pain, swelling, a small lump, and redness

- mild fever
- shivering
- fatigue
- headache
- muscle and joint pain

More serious side effects, such as allergic reactions, are rare. Parents should monitor their children after vaccinations for any behavior or health changes. Some doctors recommend taking a fever reducer, such as ibuprofen, if a fever develops and makes a child or adult feel uncomfortable after he or she is vaccinated.

Many vaccination side effects are short-lived and not a cause for concern. But if side effects do not subside shortly after you have been vaccinated, bring this to the attention of your physician.

It can be tempting to forgo vaccines out of fear of any of the aforementioned side effects. But the benefits of vaccines far outweigh the risks. Although they are not 100 percent effective in every person, vaccines do provide the best defense against diseases that can kill or injure millions of people.

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5 fun ways to get fit

Exercise benefits both the mind and body. Study after study indicates how physical activity can reduce the propensity for illness, boost mood, lower stress levels, and much more. Still, certain people find it difficult to muster the motivation to get up and move.

In 2013, researchers at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention analyzed data from more than 450,000 American adults ages 18 and older who were randomly polled across the 50 states. Participants were asked about aerobic physical activity outside of their jobs. The findings were eye-opening. Estimates indicated nearly 80 percent of American adults do not get the recommended amounts of exercise each week. People most likely to exercise, according to the CDC study, were between the ages of 18 and 24.

Lack of time and inspiration may be to blame for disinterest in exer-

cise. Boredom with routine and being unaware of alternative fitness regimens also may be contributing factors. Increasing the fun associated with workouts could lead to greater success in or outside of the gym.

1. Do what you enjoy.

Wasting time on activities that you don't enjoy may cause you to throw in the towel prematurely. Don't base fitness choices around what worked for others; find things that work for you. Exercise physiologists at John Hopkins Weight Management Center say to start with an activity that you already enjoy, even if it's aligned with the trend of the moment. Chances are you can find a class or make up a routine that works for you.

2. Tweak your playlist.

Music can improve performance during a workout and may actually



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take your mind off of strenuous or repetitive activity. Tunes also can be coordinated to the workout. Songs that feature lyrics such as run, punch, push, or groove can reinforce movements in the routine, offers the National Academy of Sports Medicine. Also, tailor songs to coordinate to the beats per minute of different activities. Strength activities and endurance activities can feature songs with higher BPMs.

3. Exercise with friends or a group.

Having other people around can make workouts more enjoyable, and that interaction may spur competition that can make you more inclined to stay the course. People who were in the competitive groups in a study of 800 graduate and professional students at the University of Pennsylvania went to 90 percent more classes than those who exercised independently or were not competitive. The results were published in the journal Preventative Medicine Reports. Competition can be a driving factor in efforts to exercise.

4. Head outdoors.

You may be more inclined to workout if you do so outside. Activities such as hiking, snowshoeing, swimming, and cycling on natural courses can be inspiring and burn calories.

5. Try sports or another ac-tivity.

Exercise regimens do not have to include running on a treadmill or lifting weights. All types of activities can work, and some may be more enjoyable to you than traditional exercises. Everything from martial arts to dance classes to volleyball can offer cardiovascular and muscle-building benefits in a fun atmosphere.

Making exercise fun motivates many people to embrace fitness and stick with their workout regimens.

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Let's talk health: Why vision is more than meets the eye

For most, a trip to the grocery store is all about picking up our favorite, go-to items. However, have you ever wondered if your dietary choices are affecting your vision?

"Most people believe that vision is only about seeing 20/20. In reality, eyes work as an intricate system that is vital to your health. It is more complicated than people think", shared Union Community Health Center's Director of Optometric Services, Dr. Renee Yearwood. Often times, importance on eye health takes last place when we think about overall wellness. In observance of Healthy Vision Month, Dr. Yearwood debunks common vision misconceptions and shares how we can keep our eyes in top shape.

Practicing good eye habits should begin at a young age. For children, it is important to have eyes checked before they begin attending school. During that time, parents should look out for early signs of impaired vision. Dr. Yearwood explains that most parents believe their kids watch television too close to the screen, resulting in poor eyesight. In fact, that could already be a sign of trouble. Children sometimes get closer to the screen because they have difficulty seeing from far away. Monitoring your child's behavior, in addition to a yearly eye exam, could help identify signs of vision trouble early. For adults, Dr. Yearwood suggests scheduling an eye exam every 2-3 years as long as there is no family history of eye abnormalities, or the person is not experiencing trouble seeing. For people over the age of 40, she recommends having eyes checked every year to diagnose the on-set of diseases, like glaucoma or cataracts.

"During a routine eye exam, there are a number of things your doctor observes including: the extraocular muscles, pupils, the similarities between each eye, peripheral vision, eye pressure, quality of vision when reading and last, but not least, how well you see" Dr. Yearwood added. Individuals who are experiencing dry eyes, headaches, blurry vision or any discomfort should schedule a full routine check-up with an optometrist promptly. However, most times early eye conditions show no symptoms at all. This is why it is imperative to get your eyes examined routinely.

Habits we develop in our daily lives can actually be harmful to our eves. Our smartphones are a key culprit in affecting our vision. The majority of people hold phones too close to their faces, causing a strain on their eyes. "I tell people to use simple geometry when holding their phone. If where your arm meets your elbow makes an acute or right angle, the phone is too close. Holding your phone at an obtuse angle is a safe distance away from your eyes" says Dr. Yearwood. Another helpful tip includes changing your phone settings. Lowering the brightness or using a tinted screen protector can decrease the impact on your eyes. The best thing you can do is just take a break from your device and go outside. Encourage your children, or even yourself, to limit the technology and get some fresh air.

If you are wondering if eating carrots will keep your eyes problem free, Dr. Yearwood unfortunately says that there is no scientific evidence behind this belief. However, eating a diet enriched with colorful vegetables, fruits, and lean meats can place you on the right track for heathy vision. "Consuming foods with antioxidants, omega 3s and zinc, along with drinking plenty of water is good for ocular health" shared Dr. Yearwood. Environmental factors such as allergens and eye quality can dry out our eyes. To promote moisture, it is important to stay hydrated. With the summer months soon approaching, wearing 100% UV protection sunglasses will keep your eyes protected from the sun's harmful rays.

As a final reminder Dr. Yearwood adds, "They say eyes are the windows to the soul, but they are not a single pane. They are multifaceted".

Early signs of Parkinson's disease

Despite affecting roughly 10 million people worldwide, Parkinson's disease, a neurodegenerative disorder, remains a mystery to many people.

To people outside of the medical field with no personal or family history of Parkinson's, the disease may only ring a bell because of some notable names attached to it. The late Muhammad Ali and actor Michael J. Fox are two household names that made their Parkinson's diagnoses public. But even those who study Parkinson's for a living do not know everything about this puzzling disease.

According to the Parkinson's Foundation, the cause of Parkinson's disease is largely unknown. While there's no cure for the disease, various treatment options can help those diagnosed with the disease live as normal and productive a life as possible.

The PF notes that understanding the disease and its progression is the first step to living well. Though the foundation also notes that people first start experiencing symptoms later in the course of the disease, learning to recognize some early symptoms may compel people to seek treatment.

• Tremor: Many people might experience shaking after a vigorous workout or when they are dealing with stress or injury. But the PF notes that a tremor in a finger, thumb, hand, or chin while at rest is a common early sign of Parkinson's disease.

• Small handwriting: Handwriting can change as people age, especially if they are experiencing stiffness in their hands or their vision is deteriorating. But micrographia, a disorder in which handwriting becomes abnormally small and cramped, is another early indicator of Parkinson's disease.

• Loss of smell: The PF advises people who are having trouble smelling foods such as bananas, dill pickles or licorice speak with their physicians about Parkinson's disease. Temporary loss of smell due to something like the common cold, congestion or the flu is not an early indicator of Parkinson's.

• Difficulty sleeping: A significant other may notice their partner moving suddenly during sleep, and such movements may be indicative of Parkinson's. The PF notes that periodic tossing and turning is normal, as is quick jerks of the body during initial sleep and in lighter stages of sleep are common and should not be mistaken for Parkinson's.

• Stiffness: Stiffness related to current or past injuries or even arthritis is not indicative of Parkinson's. But stiffness in the arms, body and legs that is unrelated to injury or arthritis and does not go away with movement might be a sign of Parkinson's. The PF notes that people sometimes describe this symptom by saying their feet feel stuck to the floor when they try to move.

• Constipation: People who strain to move their bowels might be showing an early sign of Parkinson's. However, various factors, such as dehydration and a diet without adequate fiber, can cause constipation. In addition, men and women on medication may want to look into side effects of their medications to determine if their medicine, and not Parkinson's, is the cause of their difficulty moving their bowels.

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

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How to reduce damage to eyes resulting from prolonged screen time

According to a 2015 report have an adverse effect on vision. published in the Daily Mail, many people spend more time on their devices than they do sleeping. A recent Nielsen Company audience report also found that adults in the United States devote about 10 hours and 40 minutes each day to consuming media on their personal computers, tablets, multimedia devices, TVs, and more.

Researchers continue to study the effects of screen time on personal health. but there is reason to believe that screen time may be especially harmful to vision. Devices force the eyes to focus at near range, and over time that can

Prevent Blindness America says that eye fatigue, dryness and blurred vision are some of the common effects of prolonged screen use, but these are not the only concerns. Digital devices also expose the eyes to blue light. While research as to how blue light impacts vision is ongoing, there is concern over the long-term effects of screen exposure since these screens are in close proximity to the eyes and use is often prolonged. Prevent Blindness America says that studies suggest continued exposure to blue light over time can lead to difficulty focus-


ing, premature aging of the eyes and even damage to retinal cells.

A recent study by the National Eye Institute found the frequency of myopia, also known as nearsightedness, has increased exponentially in the last few years. Reasons include a spike in time spent looking at things close-up and a lack of outdoor activities that require focusing elsewhere. The American Academy of Pediatrics notes that a separate study recently found that excessive screen time usage in adolescents was associated with development of acute onset esotropia, or crossing of the eyes, and that limiting usage of gadgets decreased the degree of eye crossing in these patients.

Eyes, just like any other muscle, require a varied workout to remain healthy. Many vision experts recommend the 20-20-20 rule. According to this rule, for every 20 minutes of looking at a screen, a person should look away at an object 20 feet away for 20 seconds or more. This will help eye muscles to relax. The group All About Vision says to use proper lighting, such as ambient lighting. Position a computer monitor so that windows or lights are to the sides instead of in front or behind it. Be sure indoor light isn't too bright, as bright light can contribute to glare and fatigue.

Antireflective lenses on eyeglasses or filters for screens also can help absorb some of the blue light and limit how much reaches the retina and accesses the central nerve of the eye. This may alleviate digital eye strain as well. Screen users may want to adjust the display of their devices so they feature a cool, gray tone, which produces less glare.

Eyes can be adversely affected by screen time unless strategies are implemented to limit strain and to rest muscles.



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The growing threat of vaping



Cigarette smoking continues to decline among pre-teens and teenagers according to a survey from Monitoring the Future. But the number of young people who are vaping or smoking ecigarettes has increased. This underscores the importance of greater education for youngsters and their parents about the potential hazards of vaping.

The popularity of vaping is troubling. A study from researchers at the Department of Psychiatry at Yale University School of Medicine that was published in the journal Pediatrics found the rising frequency of e-cigarette use was a significant risk factor for future conventional cigarette use. In the study, researchers surveyed 1,408 Connecticut high school students three times, in autumn 2013, spring 2014 and autumn 2015, on their use of e-cigarettes and traditional tobacco cigarettes. Teens who used an e-cigarette within a month of participating in the survey in 2013 had seven times greater odds of smoking tobacco cigarettes in 2014. A year later, e-cigarette users were more than three times more likely to smoke tobacco cigarettes.

Perceptions that vaping is less harmful than conventional cigarettes may be a contributing factor to their rising popularity. Also, the widespread availability of these products and their assorted flavors may be appealing to youth.

Vaping ads may be enticing

kids, too. Cigarette ads glamorizing smoking have all but vanished. However, vaping ads are becoming more noticeable. According to a National Youth Tobacco Survey, about seven in 10 middle and high school students were exposed to e-cigarette advertisements in 2014, when the vaping trend began to explode.

Even though e-cigarettes are marketed to be safer than traditional cigarettes because they purportedly contain fewer chemicals and harmless water vapor, some experts say this isn't the case. No federal agency oversaw initial development of the e-cigarette industry, so no standards exist - although this may be changing soon. One Food and Drug Administration review of 18 different e-cigarette cartridges found toxic and carcinogenic chemicals in some but not others. Also, some products that were labeled to be nicotinefree actually did have nicotine.

Many vaping juices contain nicotine, propylene glycol, glycerine, and flavorings. No longterm evidence regarding the safety of these chemicals when inhaled exists. The American Lung Association says some e-cigarettes use diacetyl, a buttery-flavored chemical once used in food production like popcorn. When inhaled, diacetyl causes bronchiolitis obliterans more commonly referred to as 'popcorn lung.' This is a scarring of the tiny air sacs in the lungs that results in the thickening and narrowing of the airways.

Some teens also replace the e-juice with marijuana and hash oils. These vaporized oils produce little smell, which makes them hard to detect.

Vaping may seem like a harmless trend. But parents and children should be cognizant of the threats that vaping poses to oneÕs overall health.

Strategies to get kids to exercise

Exercise is an important component of a healthy lifestyle. That's not just true for adults, but for children and teenagers as well.

Parents concerned about their kids living sedentary lives may have more to worry about than they know. According to a 2017 study published in the journal Preventive Medicine that analyzed data from the National Health and Nutrition Examination survey from 2003-2004 and 2005-2006, 19-yearolds spent as much time being inactive and sedentary as 60-year-olds.

Getting kids to be more active may be especially difficult for today's parents, who must contend with the internet, social media, tablets, smartphones, and other distractions as they try to encourage their kids to unplug and spend more time being physically active. But parents can try various strategies to get kids off the couch and exercising.

• Set a positive example. Kids, especially young children, often try to emulate their parents. Parents can capitalize on kids' desire to be like mom and dad by exercising in front of their children. Young children may not be ready to lift weights or run on the treadmill, but parents can embrace kid-friendly exercises, such as walking and cycling. Invite kids along for



daily bike rides or go for family walks around the neighborhood after dinner.

• Park the car. Kids don't need to know they're exercising in order to be more physically active. In lieu of driving to the bank or pharmacy, parents can leave the car at home and ride their bikes alongside their children when running errands. If possible, parents can walk youngsters to and from school rather than driving them.

· Choose friend-friendly activities. Adults employ the buddy system as a means to motivate themselves to keep exercising, and that same principle can apply to children, who might be more excited about physical activity if their friends are joining them. Team sports provide chances to exercise with friends, as do organizations like the Boy Scouts of America and the Girl Scouts of America. But even inviting a child's friend along on a family hike or bike ride may make such activities more fun for kids.

• Give gifts that encourage physical activity. Kids might want the latest device or video game for their birthdays, but parents also can give gifts that encourage youngsters to be physically active. Bicycles, rollerblades, ice skates, and sports equipment are just a handful of potential gifts that may compel kids to exercise more.

Childhood obesity is a significant problem, with the 2015-2016 NHANES reporting that 20.6 percent of youths between the ages of 12 and 19 were obese. Getting kids off the couch and exercising more often can help reduce those figures and ensure healthier futures for kids of all ages.

What is dehydration?

Dehydration happens when the loss of body fluids, namely water, exceeds the amount of fluids that is taken in. When a person is diagnosed as dehydrated, that typically means his or her body has lost so much fluid that is has begun to lose its ability to function normally.

Who is vulnerable to dehydration?

Anyone can suffer from dehydration, which can be especially dangerous to young children and older adults. The Mayo Clinic notes that older adults, who naturally have a lower volume of water in their bodies, may not feel thirsty until they are already dehydrated, so it's important that aging men and women understand that thirst is not always the best indicator that they're becoming dehydrated. Babies may become dehydrated when they get sick with an illness that causes vomiting and diarrhea. But even teens and otherwise healthy adults can suffer from dehydration.

What are the symptoms of dehydration?

Symptoms of dehydration vary with age. Parents of babies and young children should be on the lookout for signs of dehydrations, as infants and even toddlers may not be able to communicate that something is wrong.

Signs of dehydration in infants and young children include dry mouth and tongue, a lack of tears when crying, sunken eyes and cheeks, and a sunken soft spot on the top of the skull. In addition, babies who produce no wet diapers for three hours may be suffering from dehydration. A sense of listlessness or irritability in infants and young children is another potential indicator of dehydration.

Adults who experience extreme thirst may be suffering from dehydration. Less frequent urination and a dark-colored urine when going to the bathroom also is symptomatic of dehydration. Fatigue, dizziness and confusion are some additional indicators of dehydration in adults.

Can dehydration be prevented?

Dehydration can affect anyone, but there are ways to prevent it, even among those people who are especially susceptible to dehydration, such as children and older adults.

Parents of babies who are vomiting or experiencing diarrhea should speak with their pediatricians and discuss the ways to prevent such children from becoming dehydrated. Breastfeeding more frequently and giving the baby a medicine such as Pedialyte" can prevent the occurrence of dehydration in babies who are sick. The Mayo Clinic recommends parents take a proactive approach to preventing dehydration in young children, meaning they should not wait until dehydration occurs or symptoms of dehydration present themselves before taking action.

Adults who want to prevent dehydration should drink plenty of fluids and include lots of fruits and vegetables in their diets. Such foods contain lots of water and can help the body avoid becoming dehydrated.

The Mayo Clinic recommends that athletes begin hydrating the day before engaging in strenuous exercise. A telltale sign of a well-hydrated body is clear, diluted urine. Athletes should replenish their fluids during exercise and continue doing so even after they finish working out or competing.

Older adults should make a concerted effort to drink more fluids when suffering from minor illnesses, which is when such men and women most commonly become dehydrated. Drink extra water when battling influenza, bronchitis or bladder infections, remembering that feelings of thirst often surface only after the body has become dehydrated.

Simple ways to kick bad habits

Bad habits run the gamut, from the relatively innocuous, such as biting one's nails, to the potentially deadly, such as smoking tobacco. As much as people may strive to avoid bad habits, few people may say they don't have at least one.

A 2015 60 Minutes/Vanity Fair poll found that people tend to be more judgemental of themselves than others when it comes to bad habits. Nearly seven in 10 Americans admitted they judge themselves more than they judge other people. Men and women who are hard on themselves when it comes to their bad habits may want to try some of the following techniques to break those behaviors. • Employ the buddy system. Men and women who aspire to lose weight often stay motivated by exercising alongside a friend or family member and/or encouraging their families to adopt certain dietary changes. The buddy system also can be employed when trying to break bad habits. Whether a partner, family member or friend is trying to break the same bad habit or not, having someone along to praise your successes and discourage you from falling back into bad habits can make overcoming certain behaviors that much easier.

• Try something new. When trying to quit a bad habit, having something to do in its place can help. For example, men and women who want to spend less



time staring at their devices or watching television can benefit from finding something healthy to do in the hours they would normally be spending online or on the couch. For example, adults may find joining a recreational sports league gets them out of the house on weeknights when they would otherwise be sitting at home watching television. Replacing something that's perceived as a negative habit or behavior with one that's considered positive can provide the motivation necessary to kick a bad habit.

 Figure out what's triggering your bad habit. Another way to kick a bad habit is to understand what triggers it.
 Such an understanding can help people develop healthier reactions to the triggers, ultimately eliminating the bad habit. For example, if stress at the office compels you to smoke a cigarette, you can prepare healthier ways to respond to that stress, such as walking around the office, than heading outside to smoke a cigarette. When necessary, speak to a psychologist about identifying triggers if you cannot identify them on your own.

· Educate yourself. Adults with especially harmful bad habits, such as excessive alcohol consumption or smoking, may find all the motivation they need to change their behaviors by educating themselves. For instance, smokers may be surprised to learn that, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, more than 10 times as many American citizens have died prematurely from cigarette smoking than have died in all the wars fought by the United States combined. The National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism notes that excessive alcohol consumption over a long period of time can cause cardiomyopathy, arrythmia, stroke, and high blood pressure. People may recognize that smoking and excessive alcohol consumption are bad for them, but learning just how bad might provide the spark they need to change their ways.

Breaking bad habits is seldom easy. But adults who commit to changing their ways can overcome even the worst of habits.

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



Mental Attitude: Too many drivers using their phones, despite knowing dangers. Past studies have shown that drivers who talk on cellphones are up to four times more likely to crash, and those who text are up to eight times more likely to be involved in a collision than individuals who don't use phones while driving. A survey of more than 2,600 drivers revealed that nearly 58% agreed that talking on a cell phone is a serious threat to their safety, while 78% admitted the texting is a significant danger. Yet, nearly 50% of those surveyed said they had recently talked on their cellphone while driving and more than one-third had sent a text or email while behind the wheel. AAA, April 2018

Health Alert: Nearly 10% of adults now have type 2 diabetes in the US. According to a new report, 21 million adults in the United States (US) now have type 2 diabetes, a condition linked to being overweight or obese that increases the risk for heart disease, nerve damage, kidney damage, vision loss, and Alzheimer's disease. Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, March 2018

Diet: Ensure your fruits and vegetables are safe to eat. Though rich in vital nutrients and vitamins, raw fruits and veggies can harbor potentially harmful germs, such as Salmonella and E. coli. When selecting fresh produce, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention suggests the following: choose produce that doesn't look bruised or damaged; keep precut fruit and vegetables cold; keep fruit and vegetables separate from raw meat, poultry, and seafood in your grocery

bags and in the refrigerator; wash hands, knives, cutting boards, and countertops before and after preparing fruit and vegetables; and wash all produce before eating, cutting, or cooking. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, March 2018

Exercise: Physically active kids may sleep better. Among a group of 1,100 Brazilian teenagers, researchers found that those with low aerobic fitness were 80% more likely to experience poor sleep quality. World Journal of Pediatrics, March 2018

Chiropractic: Manipulation plus exercise helps teens with back pain. Back pain is common in the adolescent population, but little research exists on treatment options for this group of patients. In a new study, researchers randomly assigned teenagers with back pain into one of two treatment groups for a three-month period: spinal manipulation combined with exercise therapy or exercise therapy alone. The investigators monitored low back pain severity, disability, quality of life, medication use, and patient and caregiver-rated improvement and satisfaction at 12, 26, and 52 weeks. The findings revealed that for adolescents with back pain, spinal manipulation combined with exercise is more effective than exercise alone over a one-year period. Pain, March 2018

Wellness/Prevention: Turn down the volume! Experts estimate that up to 20% of Americans aged 12 to 19 have some degree of hearing loss. Technology is most likely to blame, especially with the use of earbuds. To help protect your child's hearing, the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends: instruct them turn down the volume to about 60%, ask them to take breaks after an hour of listening, and make sure your child can talk to others and hear what's going on around them when listening to music. The left does not retain a monopoly on misbehaving and corrupt politicians. But, because of the reluctance of much of the media to criticize their ideological soulmates, leftist politicians have had the opportunity to move high and fast, since the misdeeds they commit tend to be glossed over until they can no longer be hidden.

The tide may be changing, however, at least for male politicians who suddenly find themselves on the receiving end of the fury of a group they had courted for so long. The days of Bill Clinton getting a pass despite a history of sexual misconduct may be over.

Schneiderman is Eric the archetype of the leftist elected official who claims to adhere to a strict path of political correctness and devotion to group identity causes, but in their own lives make a mockery of all they publicly stand for. Similar to a predecessor in the office of New York State Attorney General. Elliot Spitzer, Schneiderman abused his position by using it as a vehicle to harass those who disagreed with his political beliefs. Spitzer, shortly after winning the governorship, left office in disgrace for sexual misdeeds.

Sexual misdeeds are something of a tradition with New York's leftist politicians. Former Assembly Speaker Shelly Silver even used taxpayer dollars to provide hush payments to victims of sex abuse by members of his legislative body. He was eventually convicted of money laundering and fraud.

Both Spitzer and Schneiderman evaded criticism for their stunning abuse. As the New York Post noted, "Touting his lawsuits against the Trump administration on the travel ban, environmental issues, immigration, and other matters, Schneiderman embraced his stature as a 'resistance' figure. In a February video made for the leftist MoveOn.org to encourage voting in local elections, he said: 'If you really, truly want to be part of the resistance, this is where the fight lives.' Arkansas Attornev General Leslie Rutledge, chairwoman of the Republican Attorneys General Association, called Schneiderman the 'ringleader' of



anti-Trump activists fighting the president in the courts. 'As Schneiderman leaves office in disgrace, his impact and influence with activist state attorneys general and candidates cannot be overstated,'"

Schneiderman filed 100 lawsuits or administrative actions against the Trump administration in 2017. The Daily Caller News Foundation reported in December. The City Journal offers this description of Schneiderman: "New York's progressives scored a breakthrough by electing as the state's attorney general Eric Schneiderman, who had no prosecutorial experience but, as Ben Smith noted in a Politico profile...had 'spent his career building an ideological infrastructure for the left.' an Economist study emphasizes that "Lawsuits are likely to be a critical form of resistance for Democrats in the Trump era...On January 29th, 17 Democratic attorneys-general signed a letter vowing to 'use all of the tools of our offices to fight this unconstitutional order.' Four Democratic attorneys-general have officially filed or signed onto lawsuits challenging the restrictions. ... the city of San Francisco sued Mr. Trump over another executive order demanding that federal funding be withheld from so-called 'sanctuary cities' that limit their cooperation with federal immigration authorities."

Similarly, Spitzer, as Attorney General, abused his office. The Wall Street Journal noted that "As attorney general, Mr. Spitzer pursued a self-aggrandizing crusade against Wall Street without regard for the costs to New York companies. their shareholders, or his state's position as the global capital of finance. He targeted high-profile business people and institutions on flimsy pretexts, abused his powers as prosecutor, and destroyed careers, reputations and companies through leaks to the press, rumor-mongering, and threats. Spitzer knew that an indictment, even if never proven, would seriously damage a company's reputation and even put it out of business. Among other things, federal securities laws do not permit indicted companies to manage money. Thus his targets in the heavily regulated securities industry could not call his bluff and have their day in court to prove their case, choosing to settle instead. This made for easy prosecutorial prey for a man with boundless political ambitions. His cases grabbed splashy headlines, but most people never knew the full story until it emerged vears later."

Neither man suffered for their abuse of their position for partisan political goals. The major media, for the most part, gave them a pass. The press only took note when they engaged in actions which were not only repugnant, but also offended a group which the left courts as a key constituency. The horrifying act of another icon of the left, Senator Ted Kennedy, received a complete pass for his horrendous action which lead to the death of female friend, just as he received a pass for his attempts to work with the Soviet Union to prevent the election of Ronald Reagan.

Despite the pounding rain and thunder, our May 15th meeting was very well attended. We were delighted to welcome four guest speakers.

Matt Cruz, district manager of Community Board 10, was our first speaker. Buildings going up in our community are of grave concern. The house at 1950 Hobart Avenue has been sold and will be converted into a 4-story building with nine one bedroom units, without amenities. Questions about parking were presented. Cruz noted all questions and said he will look into the issues presented. Additionally, he distributed shopping bags from CB 10 which can to be put to excellent use once plastic bags are banned.

Second speaker was Nivardo Lopez, Bronx Borough Commissioner of the NYC Department of Transportation listened to concerns about traffic, pot holes, speed bumps, yellow lights and heard of studies which were performed years ago but yet nothing seems to result positively for our community. There is too much traffic coming through Pelham Bay. Furthermore, once Orchard Beach opens, it will be worse. He took several questions

and also spoke privately with some people so that he would not take up all the time allotted, which had to be shared with another guest speaker.

Our third speaker was Councilman Mark Gjonaj who was welcomed. He elaborated on his first 100 days in office. He explained the mayor's proposed budget for NYC is \$89 billion, which boils down to \$10,400 per NYC resident. A \$1.6 billion increase in property tax is also part of the mayor's budget. Additionally the water board will increase rates. The council has suggested to the mayor that serious consideration be given to real estate tax abatement In discussing Pelham Bay issues, the councilman is recommending that the comfort station across the street from the subway be privatized and opened to the public. Refurbishing that structure will be very costly but by privatizing, it could turn into a positive project for Pelham Bay.

As to 3250 Westchester Avenue, no permit has been approved to raise that building to 12 stories, as the contractor originally wanted. The contractor has now agreed to a 6-story building. Councilman Gjonaj pointed out that Councilman Rafael Salamanca,



who is the chair of the council's Zoning Committee, is a Bronxite and he too is very concerned about overbuilding and over populating the Bronx which impacts on the quality of life of its residents.

The mayor has allocated \$9 million to legalize basement apartments. How that will come about, remains to be seen. To legalize a basement apartment, two egresses will have to be provided along with other adjustments landlords would have to make. Those adjustments would be costly undertakings for landlords.

Addressing the on-going concern about all the traffic. the councilman said once the Metro North stations are up and running, that should alleviate much of the traffic in Pelham Bay. It was pointed out that 8,000 cars cut through St. Paul Avenue and 6,000 cars cut through Burr Avenue. That figure does not include the #12 Select tandem buses running up Burr Avenue in addition to 6,000 cars.

Once Orchard Beach opens, more buses will be added to that route creating more noise and pollution.

Our fourth speaker was Chrys Napolitano from Locust Point spoke about two great options in our community for fresh fruits and vegetables. The Locust Point CSA and the Farmers Market at Preston High School.

The first option is the Locust Point CSA. CSA stands for Community Supported Agriculture. They work with Stoneledge Farm, a family owned and operated certified organic farm in Cairo, NY. Members buy a share in the farmers harvest in advance and starting on Monday, June 4, members stop by our distribution site in Locust Point to pick up their 'share'. A full share consists of 8 to 10 different varieties of vegetables per week and is more than enough for a family of four. A full share of vegetables costs \$555 for 24 weeks, which comes out to about \$23 a week. You can split a share if you like.

They recommend splitting with a family member or friend, but if you need a share partner, they are happy to try to make a match. You can also purchase fruit, mushroom, dried bean or coffee shares.

Check out the farm's website at www.stoneledge.farm. If you like what you see, create an account and place an order. If you have any questions, contact Chrys Napolitano at cnapolitano491@ gmail.com. There are lots of EPOC residents that are members of their CSA and they donate our extra vegetables to the Edgewater Social Welfare organization.

Chrys' second option is the Farmers Market at Preston High School. Starting on Tuesday, June 12 from 4 to 7 p.m., the Farmers Market at Preston will be open every Tuesday evening until November. They're working with the Westchester Growers Alliance who will be providing vegetables and fruit, plus we're bringing in vendors that carry meat, dairy, pantry items and lots more. There will be something for everyone-including prepared foods people who want to eat healthy but don't have time to cook. They're also planning on having visiting chefs do to demos because we can all use a few cooking tips.

Senator Jeff Klein's office was represented by Damaris Moné, who was our guest speaker at our March meeting.

Whether it's at the recent Health Fair at I.S.192 or our recent visits to local community associations, it's all good. We want to thank Lynn Gerbino of the Throggs Neck Homeowners, Mary Jane Musano of the Waterbury LaSalle Community Association, Joe Donovan of the Locust Point Civic Association, Michele Torrioni of the Pelham Bay Taxpayers and Mike McNerney of the Country Club Civic Association for allowing us the time to speak with their members. It's always great fun to entice people with information about delicious food.

I'm used to getting a positive reaction when I get to speak about the CSA, but there's always someone in the audience who complains that the CSA won't work because they live alone or because they don't have time to cook. It was so nice to be able to share with everyone the fact that we will now have a farmers market, and we'll have produce and prepared food – something for everyone.

If you would like to join the CSA, go to www.stoneledge. farm to create an account and then place an order. If you want a half share or have questions not answered on the farm's website, contact me at

cnapolitano491@gmail.com.

We are getting contracts back from vendors for the farmers market and it looks pretty exciting. DIG Farm from North Salem, NY, has been on board since late last vear. They have been instrumental in helping with connecting to other local farmers. We visited DIG Farm last summer; my husband and I invited my brother and his wife (who live in North Salem) to one of their Sunday brunches on the farm. We had a great time getting to know Allison Turcan, farmer and owner of DIG Farm. Allison visited us at Preston in September for our first Farm2Table club meeting and once she saw the property and realized that this was where we are hosting the market, she was totally on board. Check them out at www.digfarm.org. I totally recommend attending the Brunches on the Farm if they host them this year. For \$25 per person we were treated to a delicious farm fresh feast, plus got to spend the morning walking the farm and the gorgeous property the farm is located on.

Stoneledge Farm, our CSA farm will also provide produce when they have extra and we'll also be able to get local NYS fruit from their supplier. Stoneledge Farm is a certified organic farm, which not a lot of smaller farms can say. Being a certified or-



ganic farm is expensive and requires lots of paperwork. Stoneledge Farm has many CSA sites and over 1,000 share partners, so they can handle this. However, many smaller producers can't afford the certification, but still use organic practices. This is true of the farmers that Stoneledge purchases the fruit from for the CSA fruit shares. I can vouch for the fact that the peaches and blueberries are the best I have ever tasted.

Lewis Waite Farm, our CSA Extras program provider, will also be participating. Lewis Waite Farm carries products from over 40 producers of meat, dairy and prepared foods. We'll have about ten or 12 of their most popular products on hand to purchase, or you can place an order which you can pick up at the market. Go to www. csalewiswaitefarm.com to check out the farms they represent. We'll have the following products available at the market: ground beef, beef hot dogs, chicken wings, goat cheese, farmhouse cheddar, bacon, breakfast sausage, ground turkey, eye round steaks, veggie burgers, hummus and sliced farmhouse

bread. If you've ever stopped by our Monday night CSA distribution, these are the items our members love!

Don's Living Foods, whose sprouts, beans and micro greens were featured in my last column, will be making deliveries to us in the Bronx. Sherrill Cropper really sold him the idea of being able to reach our CSA group and the Farmers Market, so he's going to create a whole growing cycle for us that he can harvest on Sunday mornings and deliver to us by the end of the day.

We'll have Sweet Milk & Sugar, a local Bronx baker, as a vendor - she was our first signed contract. Plus we're waiting for contracts from Waterside Candle in Silver Beach and a chef that will be making vegan food. I heard from a Kombucha vendor who may book a market date here and there, so he's sending us a contract so that he can book a table at the last minute. He already does another market every other Tuesday, but he's intrigued by the site! As we receive more vendor commitments, we'll be posting information on our Facebook page.

The market will start off small; we're hoping to have four to six vendors there per week. The most important factor is going to be our community – I know a lot of you have been waiting for something like this, so this is so exciting to be able to see it coming together. 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

where her children went to primary school, touching the lives of countless children by being willing to lend a helping hand, said DiPierro.
