As the warm weather continues, Orchard Beach is once again welcoming toes on its sand.

But along with the million bathers that will frequent the beach this year will be tons and tons of garbage: dirty baby diapers, water bottles, empty beer containers and rotting, half-eaten food.

"Nobody throws any-Will a new NYC Parks De- thing away at the beach any more. People drink and eat and leave their garbage on the sand as if a busboy is gomuch-awaited ing to come around to pickup after them," said one beachgoer. "It's like the garbage cans are there for display. I saw someone change a diaper on the sand and just leave it there to float out into the water, and that's not even half of the stuff that washes out from the shore," another

beachgoer added.

The same sun worshipper has also seen a large influx of glass bottles left behind that eventually end up buried under the sand. "People step on these buried bottles and cut their feet all the time, and if the bottles that don't get kicked under sand they just end up floating into the water," the beach lover said.

The only message in these bottles and other trash is that

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
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## 'New York Salutes America' on June 28th

The whole community is invited to a fireworks show that has become a borough tradition at Orchard Beach.

The annual New York Salutes America fireworks extravaganza, which is also a celebration of the communities comprising the borough, will take place at the beach in Pelham Bay Park on Thursday, June 28.

The event, which features a fireworks extravaganza by the world-renowned Fireworks by Grucci, is also a boardwalk festival that features musical entertainment and a program at 7 p.m. at the beach's bandstand, followed by fireworks at around 9:20 p.m.

New York Salutes America is the borough's largest fireworks show and serves as a precursor to the start of Independence Day events, with thousands expected to attend.

The Bronx Tourism Council produces the event, which is hosted again this year by Senator Jeff Klein and Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr.

Klein has co-hosted the show since he was first elected to the senate in 2004.

The senator said it was a tradition that he will always work to continue, adding he has now coordinated the event with two borough presidents to make the fireworks extravaganza happen every year.

"I think our goal is to ultimately

have it as the premier fireworks display, rivaling what Macy's does," said Klein. "It is a way for the Bronx to come together and celebrate our diversity and our communities, and is an early start to the Fourth of July."

The borough president appears to be equally enthusiastic to be co-hosting the event.

"Every year, my office is thrilled to partner with Senator Jeff Klein to bring fireworks to Orchard Beach as part of the 'New York Salutes America' celebration," said Diaz. "This year, I encourage everyone to come out with their friends and family to enjoy the fireworks, our annual empanada eating contest, music, food and fun as we begin our city's celebration of our nation's independence."

For the fourth year, the Bronx Empanada Eating Contest comes back to the fireworks extravaganza and boardwalk festival, featuring mini-empanadas from the Havana Café.

Sophie Thierfelder, Bronx Tourism Council deputy director, said as of press time that the council is still finalizing the roster of sponsors for this year.

These sponsors typically include companies and non-profits from around the borough and beyond, according to previous Bronx Times articles.

About two months of planning go

into preparing the event, said Thierfelder, who described it as a "beautiful event" that will have significance for United States citizens or those who want to celebrate the country's history, including the fireworks and a concert on the beach.

"It is a nice place to go either with your partner or with friends and family," she said.

Square, saying he makes it a point to attend annually.


"I love the fireworks display; they do a great job," said Bieder, describing New York Salutes America as 'old home week' or a kind of reunion for neighbors.

## James Monroe Campus honors longtime coach in field renaming

On Saturday, June 11, the James Monroe Campus Schools community celebrated their longtime baseball coach and physical education teacher by renaming the field after him.

Going forward, the baseball field on the Monroe Campus will be known as the 'Mike Turo Field,' and friends, family and alumni showed up in full force for their one and only coach, Coach Turo.

"This is such a great honor, but my job is to help get the students to college and to continue their education," said Turo before the ceremony.

"Sure, everyone likes to win, but my job is done when I see them get to that next level of education," continued Turo.

Over the last 41 years, many people have considered Mike Turo to be the best high school baseball coach in New York City.

His record, specifically the six city and 35 borough championships and over 1,325 games won, are a testament to those

statements

But it has been Turo's unmatched dedication and commitment to the students that shaped his legacy.

"There's never a dull moment with coach," said current student and player, Juan Pinero.

"He teaches us to respect ourselves and those around us," added another current student and player, Bryant Bassett.

Mike Turo does not just talk the walk, he walks the walk, and all of his teachings and life lessons are led by examples, not just lectures.

Even the school administrators and his volunteer assistant coaches can attest to his scheduling of early morning practices, which his players are all expected to attend.

"You don't find people like Mike Turo everyday," said Dr. Ramon Namnum, principal of the High School of World Cultures within the Monroe Campus.

"His efforts are more than commendable and he's more

than deserving of this," continued Namnum, who helped reach out to Assemblyman Marcos Crespo about getting the field renamed.

Those efforts include the attention he pays to maintaining the field, making sure those who use it keep it clean, even driving to the campus just to make sure tarps are placed on the baseball diamond when it rains.

He even commutes three hours daily to get to and from the school from his home on Long Island, sacrificing family time to stay at the school just to help out.

"Mike is who he is today because he loves what he does and he's really good at it," said Teresalyn Turo, Mike's wife.

"Everyone in the Bronx knows him and the team has become part of our family too," added Danielle and Michael Turo Jr, Teresalyn and Mike's two children.

Among those that came to show their support were one of Coach Turo's former students and players, Francisco Justo,

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## Diego Beekman presents Mott Haven jail alternative

Before there were talks of a jail, the NYPD tow pound in Mott Haven was being eyed for bigger and better purposes.

Non-profit Diego Beekman Mutual Housing for years has been formulating an expansion plan that included the acquisition of the pound on 141st Street and Concord Avenue.

Being part of a larger, neighborhood revitalization, representatives from Diego Beekman presented their affordable housing and development pitch to Community Board 1 on Thursday, May 31.

The proposed plan would split the superblock containing the current tow pound into two halves, creating two distinct blocks, while expanding adjacent Wales Avenue as a vehicular street that would run through the new development down into East 141st Street.

Major parts of the redevelopment include converting the tow pound grounds and surrounding block into 533 housing units spread throughout 12 buildings on the lot.

The plan also calls for a three-story turing plant in addition to a crime she's seen in the past

supermarket with a rooftop parking deck.

After extensive research was conducted, Mott Haven was determined to be a 'food desert,' with little variety or healthy options.

Also, recent surveys have found that a supermarket was number one 'service want' by residents of the area.

Improved public safety was also found to be a frequent request while the report also indicated six homeless shelters in close proximity to the Beekman houses.

Diego Beekman's plan extends past developing the tow pound, though.

Two other neighborhood sites had also been eyed for development as both affordable and senior housing at 351 Powers Avenue and 698-700 E. 138th Street.

Worse than Beekman's plan being overruled by a jail, there is expressed concern for Mott Haven's overall welfare if the site is grabbed by the mayor.

Johnnie Johnson a board member of Diego Beekman and lifetime resident of the light-manufac- area talked about the drop in

four years.

"As soon as we took over, began fixing the buildings, it's become beautiful now, we can breathe now," said Johnson.

If a jail is built on the site, "Property values are going to go way down, who's going to want to buy something over here?" she said.

Johnson also mentioned

that many residents approached her saying they would likely move if the jail is built, including herself.

"Everybody is scared of this, they're terrified, it's sad," Johnson said.

During the CB 1 meeting, Councilman Rafael Salamanca Jr. addressed the issue of the new jail, advocating that Mott Haven is not the right spot.

"The Lippman report indicates that the best location for a jail is near civic centers, which is why the courthouse is the right location, nobody wants a jail in their district,' Salamanca told residents.

The councilman also stated that constructing a jail on the tow pound site would place three jails within two miles of each another in the south

Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. is aware that in the end, a community somewhere in the Bronx will have to host the jail, but he along with many others believe it should not be placed at the police pound site.

Diaz organized a protest of the Mott Haven jail site on May 1 to express his opposi-

"What we're saying is the way (the mayor's office) went about selecting this site, the fact that this community has already toughed it out and that the community has an actual plan for (this spot), this is just not an acceptable location," Diaz said.

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## Edenwald YMCA's ULURP passes in record time

After more than 30 years, Edenwald's quest for a community center received its final approval.

The news came to Community Board 12 on Wednesday, May 23, when George Torres, the board's district manager, received an email informing him the YMCA had been approved by the City Council for its Edenwald location.

"Including a community recreation center has been on this community board's registry of district needs for 35 years," said Torres.

"We are beyond excited and for me, I know I'll cry during the breaking ground ceremony," continued Torres.

The Uniform Land Use Review Procedure process for the Edenwald YMCA project was completed in an incredibly short time - three months and one day, the fastest ULURP public approval on the NYC Economic Development Corporation record.

The Council had forgone the hearing process for the project, deferring to Councilman Andy King's approval of establish a community center

the facility and its location.

The project also garnered unanimous support across the entire community and all of its local elected officials.

So, by skipping the Council hearing and vote, the ULURP approval process was sped up, shaving almost nine months off the calendar.

'When everyone is in agreement, that's when government works most effectively," said Councilman King, who grew up in the CB12 community.

He remembered trying to

in the area as a teen.

Every year a community center location or sponsor was proposed, there were mitigating factors that prevented the plan from moving forward.

Finding a suitable site, obtainingthe necessary funding, or locking up support, were some of the issues that delayed the project, according to King.

"The work really began with the community," said Senator Jamaal Bailey referencing the community members he recalled being at the forefront of the calls for a community center.

Bailey also grew up in the area and had long supported the construction of a community center.

"Not just government, but people make things happen and if you don't do something, outcomes don't change," said 91-year-old Alonzo de Castro, another advocate for the community and the community center.

De Castro explained a few years ago he saw an opportunity to gather support for a community center again.

That call to action helped the YMCA get the unanimous support it received.

The YMCA efforts to host the new community center in 2016, were backed by Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie, Mayor de Blasio, Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. and the EDC.

'We are one step closer to the ground breaking and one step closer to a huge win for the Bronx," said Heastie on the news of the Council's approval.

The YMCA was the first to offer to partner with the community and provide some of their funding towards the project, according to King.

The project, though expected to begin construction this fall, could actually see shovels in the ground as early as the end of the summer, according to Joseph Chan the YMCA's senior vice president of Real Estate and Management Property.

The 50,000 square-foot facility will be located on 1250 E. 229th Street and contain amenities such as new basketball courts and pools, among other features.





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#### TN merchants rally behind BID: heads for CB10 approval

The effort to establish the Throggs Neck Business Improvement District is ready to clear its next hurdle, a vote of support from Community Board 10.

On Wednesday, June 27, the NYC Small Business Services will present the Throggs Neck BID application before a CB 10 public hearing at 3077 Cross Bronx Expressway at 7 p.m.

Ten of the 75 BIDs in the city operate in the borough, with Morris Park receiving the most recent designation at the start of 2018.

At first the Throggs Neck Merchants Association had trouble lining up support for the BID because of a lack of understanding of what the BID would mean for merchants and property owners, according to the TNMA.

The TNMA spoke with merchants and property owners individually, going door to door to explain the benefits of a BID and to gather support for it, according to Bobby Jaen the president of the TNMA.

As of Monday, June 11, Jaen reported the TNMA had 139 merchants and property owners on their list of yay's.

"We have way more commercial business owners and merchants who have pledged their support than we we're required to have," said Jaen.

In Throggs Neck, the main boundaries of the BID would run from East Tremont Avenue and Bruckner Boulevard, south to Miles and Tremont avenues, plus a handful of businesses north of Bruckner Boulevard as well.

BIDs are funded and maintained by its local stakeholders, the merchants and property owners within the defined boundary.

"How could you say 'no' if the money is from and for the neighborhood," continued Jaen.

The funds to operate a BID are acquired through special dedicated property tax assessments.

Commercial property owners within the geographical BID would have their properties assessed an additional \$38 per linear front footage, with corner properties assessed slightly higher, according to the TNMA.

Within the proposed

Throggs Neck BID zone, there are 13 private homes, which will also be assessed an additional \$1 a year.

These numbers remain constant every year, unless there is a unanimous agreement to change those assessment rates, according to Jaen.

The future Throggs Neck BID committee would use these funds for the advancement of the neighborhood to attract more consumers and other businesses to the area.

"If you look up and down Tremont Avenue, there are a lot of empty store fronts," said Gerri Colon, another member of the TNMA.


"The BID could change that and try to turn it around for the better," continued Colon.

Some of these improvements could include additional street cleaning and garbage pickup, the installation of security cameras, and cre-

ation of spaces of beautification like adding more greenery and sidewalk lights.

As the TNMA amasses more yay's as newer merchants join the effort, Jaen believes the BID will likely receive the necessary amount of support at the CB10 hearing to move forward with its ratification.

If CB 10 vote okays the BID, the process requires five more approvals before it's enacted.






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## Street renamed for Bronx vet, LEP Joseph Morabito

Bronxites saluted a family man who believed in liberty and the 'American Cause'.

On Sunday, June 10, Councilman Mark Gjonaj joined relatives in dedicating the intersection of Laconia and Waring avenues as 'Law Enforcement Professional Joseph A. Morabito Way.'

The heartfelt ceremony honored the late 54-year-old law enforcement and military veteran tragically killed overseas five years ago.

"Today and always we salute Joseph Morabito's dedication to our country, his service and sacrifice will proudly be remembered," stated Gjonaj.

Morabito was born to the late Joseph Anthony and Antoinette Morabito on June 10, 1958 in Allerton.

For over 34 years, he served in law enforcement starting as a military police officer assigned to the U.S.S. Kitty Hawk and Naval Investigation Ser-

His impressive resume included time as a U.S. Veterans Administration Investigation Section federal officer: U.S. Department of Defense Police

Counter Terrorism Task Force lieutenant; a certified SWAT officer, supervisor and training officer; certified in VIP Protection and Police General Topics Instruction; firearms instructor; Counter Terrorism Task Force School supervisor; a U.S. Treasury Department federal lieutenant officer and an undercover narcotics officer.

Upon retirement in 1999, Morabito and his family moved to Haines Falls, NY, but he often visited the Bronx while on leave.

In 2006, Dyncorp International and the U.S. State Department hired Morabito as an international law enforcement professional. He served his first Iraq tour that same year.

While stationed in Haiti in 2008, he earned 14 commendations and two Service Stars for various missions he conducted as a civilian international police officer and instructor and Haiti National Police Force advisor.

Between 2009 to 2013, Morabito was assigned to various MPUs and task forces while stationed in Iraq and Afghani-

He was the Scorpion Police Academy's lead instructor and an advisor to the Iraqi National Police Force.

Morabito accompanied the INP on missions and raids into hostile situations.

According to his wife Andrea, he was affectionally known as 'Joey Pots and Pans' by troops stationed in Afghani-

"He became famous for the meals he cooked and he grew into a fatherly figure for the younger soldiers," she shared.


On Saturday, June 8, 2013, Morabito was one of three service members fatally shot by a man dressed in Afghan National Army attire while teaching policing to residents at an Afghan National Army base in Paktika. The gunman was slain by American forces.

The night before, Morabito was awarded his own customized chef's hat and apron and cooking utensils by his fellow troops in a surprise ceremony.

A fan of the Yahoo! cooking show, 'Chow Ciao with Fabio Viviani,' Morabito often shared photos of meals he created in Afghanistan utilizing the show's recipes to its Facebook page.

Chow Ciao aired a special segment 'Behind the Stove: A Tribute to Joe Morabito' on July 2013.

posthumously He was awarded the Secretary of Defense Medal for the Defense of Freedom and a memorial bench near his Haines Fall home.

Msgr. Devrain encourages anyone that wants additional tickets to contact his rectory.

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


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### St. Barnabas Hospital's Filipino nurses celebrate 35 years

A local hospital honored a cross section of its workforce that it recruited from overseas and trained decades ago.

St. Barnabas Hospital in 1982 and 1983 helped Filipino nurses immigrate to the United States to staff the hospital, with scores making the 8,000 mile journey on a 19-hour flight to live in a dormitory on the medical center's Fordham campus.

Today, 35 years later, many of the nurses are still employed at St. Barnabas, and on Wednesday, June 6 the hospital celebrated all of their accomplishments in a ceremony and party that honored their dedication to the hospital's patients.

The ceremony, which included a tribute from Dr. David Perlstein, St. Barnabas Hospital's CEO and president, took place in what was the former nurses dormitory: the Braker Building.

"Can you imagine how much courage it took for these nurses, all in their early 20s, to leave their families and come to the Bronx?,"

asked Robert Church, chief nursing officer. "And can you believe the commitment they have given to us at St. Barnabas Hospital by choosing to work here for 35 years?"

Among the nurses in this cohort who still work at the hospital is Vernie Bacolot, who us still on staff along with roughly 30 other Filipino nurses who came to the United States during this period.

a nurse educator at the hospital and who served as president of the Philippine Nurses Association (New York Chapter), said she started at the hospital in July 1983.

She was directly recruited to come to St. Barnabas, and upon arriving in America moved into the Braker building, which served as temporary housing until they were established enough to get their own spaces.

In many cases, they lived there for years, she said.

"We were excited because we were here in America, and we had heard a lot about it when we were in the Philippines," said Bacolot. "At the same time, there was an adjustment phase: we had to adapt to the culture, the language and the way nursing is practiced here."

The immigrant nurses received a great deal of sup-

port from each other as well as the administration, and within six months to a year typically were acclimated to working with patients at the hospital, said Bacolot.


"We had the skills, but we had to adjust to the people around us," she said.

Bacolot has been in the nursing education department since 1992, where she trains new nurses, nurse attendants and nursing clerks.

She described the atmosphere at St. Barnabas Hospital, a community hospital, as being "like one big family" and the administration as very supportive of Filipino nurses.

Bacolot said that she came to America to find "greener pastures" and that there are many nursing schools in the Philippines, the graduates of which are often encouraged to go overseas to find work in order to better support their families.

According to the hospital, there are currently 146 nurses of Filipino heritage on staff, including those in the original recruitment 35 years ago and later hires.



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## 'SMM' reveals borough's crack epidemic gangsters


An English-American journalist penned a book about how the crack epidemic had rattled a Bronx community two decades ago.

Award-winning journalist Jonathan Green chronicles an unfortunate era in the borough's past: the crack epidemic and its impact on the Soundview community in the 1980s and 1990s in his new book 'Sex Money Murder: A Story of Crack, Blood, and Betrayal'.

The 384-page true crime story follows four characters through a dramatic and troubling period when crack cocaine ran rampant in the Soundview Houses and the police and federal authorities sought to bring down members of the Sex Money Murder gang.

Two of the people chronicled in the book are gang members Pipe and Suge, who were ultimately taken down by federal law enforcement after a vicious killing in broad daylight of someone suspected of cooperating with cops in 1997

The book is also notable because it also contains the story from the perspective of law enforcement in the persons of Detective Pete Forcelli, a young crime fighter who worked during this period with a small, specialized group of detectives based out of a converted closet in the 45th Precinct and John O'Malley, a federal law enforcement official who grew up in Soundview but

left the community as crime and disorder engulfed it.

"It was important for me that we have both sides of the story," said Green, adding that while O'Malley and Forcelli wanted to tell the story, they were reserved and it took some time to convince everyone to get on board with the book, which took five to six

years to complete.

A key incident in the narrative was a murder at a football game on Thanksgiving Day that opens the book and turns out later on, after an exhaustive telling of the origins of the crack epidemic and the four subjects, to be the downfall of gang's reign of terror.

Gunfire was sprayed into a crowd of players and onlookers from Soundview and Castle Hill houses during a holiday football game, which was normally a time of calm, thus leading to an uproar in the community that finally broke the 'code of silence'.

After the incident, individuals that attended the event approached the 43rd Precinct, offering them bits and pieces of information about the shooters, the book relates

Locales in and around Soundview are mentioned in the book, including Throggs Neck and Country Club, which are recalled as places where respect for the law remained relatively intact during this period, and Clason Point, where O'Malley grew up.

City Island, a favorite restaurant haunt for one gang member, and Co-op City, a relatively safe-haven, are also mentioned.

Even today, people continue to be fearful of speaking about the gang in Soundview, Green said, illustrating the type of impact they had on instilling fear as they participating in a trade

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## 29-year HIV AIDS survivor preaches about risk-taking

Ed Shaw was an average New Yorker; he lived in Manhattan, held a job and was very social.

In 1988, Ed received the news that rocked him to his core and changed his life.

He tested HIV-AIDS positive at the age of 47.

Now, 29 years later Ed is alive and well, and calls Morris Heights his home.

"I was in denial for five years after my diagnosis, I didn't seek treatment or anything" said Shaw. Ashamed of the stigma that went along with HIV-AIDS during the peak of it's epidemic, Ed became reclusive and cut himself off from almost everyone in his life. "I exhausted all of my money and funds in about a week because I thought I was going to die then and there," said Shaw.

Afterwards, Shaw endured five months of being homeless once he realized death wasn't imminent.

"Five years later, after many hospital visits I finally decided to get treated and open up about what happened to me," said Shaw. As Ed first began opening up about his disease, there were two people in his life that he was concerned about sharing his secret with.

"I brought my brother and sister down to the city one night after not speaking to them for years, I told them what happened and broke down in the restaurant, they rushed to hug me and I can still see the look on their faces as soon as I told them, it gets me choked up to this day still," Shaw recalled.

Once he embraced his life and realized HIV-AIDS wasn't a death sentence, Ed began to embrace the pow-

erful community of survivors like himself.

"We are one, big community; no matter our age, our race, our sexual orientation. We need to help support one another," Shaw said.

Now at the age of 76, Ed is still involved in raising awareness and education of the disease throughout numerous discussion groups.

Shaw recently spoke to the NYS Department of Health about HIV-AIDS and community relations on Wednesday, June 13.

"I've worked with so many people and that is what's changed my life, a huge part of it all, is speaking with teens and college kids," Shaw said.

He also mentioned the importance of educating youth, explaining that risky behavior can cause lifelong consequences. It's one of the most rewarding aspects to his work.

Shaw also mentioned many older adults need to recognize the fact that they are at risk too.

'With an older age group there isn't a lot of concern when there should be. They are also at risk and pretending that they aren't wont prevent something from happening," Shaw said.

Another element to the puzzle according to Shaw is different health departments working in unison with one another.

"The state and city health departments need to work more hand-inhand especially when it comes to engaging the community and you can bet I spoke to that on Wednesday."



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
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#### Picnic basics: tips to prevent foodborne illness

Now that the weather is warm, you may be thinking about more outdoor dining. But ants and bees aren't the only thing you have to worry about at picnics. Eating outdoors in warm weather presents a food safety challenge. Bacteria in food multiply faster at warmer tem-

peratures so the basics of food safety are especially important. Here are some tips to stay healthy while you're having fun.

Wash hands.

If you're in an outdoor setting with no bathroom, use a water jug, some soap, and patowels. Consider

carrying moist disposable towelettes for cleaning your hands.

Keep raw food separate from cooked food.

Don't use a plate that previously held raw meat, poultry, or seafood for anything else unless the plate has first been washed in hot, soapy water. Keep utensils and

surfaces clean.

Marinate food in the refrigerator, not out on the counter.

And if you want to use some of the marinade as a sauce on the cooked food, reserve a separate portion. Don't reuse marinade that contained raw meat.

> Cook food thor-

Always use a food thermometer. Hamburgers should be cooked to 160°F.Ifathermometeris not available, make sure hamburgers are brown all the way through, not pink. Chicken should be cooked to at least 165°F.

Refrigerate freeze food promptly.

It can be hard to remember while a party is going on, but food should not be left out of the cooler or off the grill for more than two hours.

Keep hot food hot.

Hot food should be kept at or above 140°F. If bringing hot takeout food such as fried chicken or barbecue to an outdoor party, eat it within two hours of purchase. If you're grill-

ing yourself, remember to check that your food reaches a safe internal temperature. When reheating food at the outing, be sure it reaches 165°F.

Keep cold food cold.

Cold food should be held at or below 40°F. Foods like chicken salad and desserts that are in individual serving dishes can be placed directly on ice or in a shallow container set in a deep pan filled with ice. Drain off water as ice melts and replace ice frequently.

Or Keith Olbermann's ongoing and obscene rants? Why is there no Hollywood pressure against the comics who belittle the President's wife, or call his 12-year old son a 'rapist' and 'homeschool shooter?' Bill Mahr has described the President as an "Orangutan" and that's apparently ok with the show biz crowd. In fact, actors like Robert De Niro frequently call Trump an 'idiot,' insulting not only the President but firing...as [director] Nicho-

Ben Shapiro writes: "The left likes to bully, and it's good at it...if you're a conservative in Hollywood you stay underground for fear of



Writing in The Atlantic, Caitlin Flanagan notes that "somewhere along the way, the hosts of the late-night shows decided that they had carte blanche to insult not just the people within this administration, but also the ordinary citizens who support Trump, and even those who merely identify as conservatives."

There was a clear drive to rein in Roseanne's show, in which pro-Trump comments, to the utter dismay of Hollywood power brokers, were included. 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## Weekly tax tips from the Bronx Tax Man

#### **Business Tax Obligations**

Do you own a business? Are you thinking of starting a business? Whether your business is home based on has a store front, you need to abide by the same rules and tax returns as every other business.

Let's start from the beginning. After you decide on a name, and an entity type such as LLC, C-Corp, S-Corp, Partnership or Sole Proprietor, then you must get your business registered with the State of New York, Bronx County and Internal Revenue Service. Usually you will need an CPA or Enrolled Agent to help get these steps done for you. I would not advise doing this on your own. If you don't complete the process or do it incorrectly, you may have fine or violations or worse occur.

Once you have your entity and your Federal Tax Identification Number, you can now proceed to apply for your Sales Tax Certificate of Authority and your NYS Department of Labor Unemployment Insurance Identification Number. You will need these to file your required quarterly sales tax returns as well as your quarterly payroll tax returns. Below is a schedule of due dates for these taxes. Remember even if your sales or payroll are zero for the period in question, the taxing authority must receive your taxes indicating that you have had no sales or employees. If not, they will estimate your taxes using the average business in your industry, which could be much higher than what you actually had. For example, if you are a home improvement contractor in the Bronx, and the average home improvement contractor shows \$250,000 in sales per quarter, then you will get a tax bill using this as an estimate. You can imagine how unpleasant it would be to receive a bill for the taxes on \$250,000?

#### Sales Tax Schedules

Sales tax collected from December to February would be due March

Sales tax collected from March to May would be due June 20th

Sales tax collected from June to August would be due September 20th

Sales tax collected from September to November would be due December 20th

Payroll taxes withheld from your employee's paychecks must be paid on a schedule. This schedule could vary based on the volume of taxes collected. A typical business would have to make a monthly tax deposit with the Internal Revenue Service once a month by the 15th of the following month. For example: you would pay the taxes withheld for the month of January no

later than the 15th of February. You would need to create an account for the tax payments on a electronic system called EFTPS. State tax payment are due when the tax liability accumulates to the amount of seven hundred dollars. From that payroll date a typical tax payer would only have 5 days to get that payment into the New York State Department of taxation and finance. You would need to create an only NYS Tax Account to do so. Payments cannot be mailed in any longer.

#### **Payroll Tax Schedules**

Payroll paid to employees from January to March would be due by April 30th

Payroll paid to employees from April to June would be due by July 31st

Payroll paid to employees from July to September would be due by October 31st

Payroll paid to employees from October to December would be due by January 31st

Along with the 4th quarter reports due by January 31st, you also have to file the W-2's for your employees and a copy must be submitted to the Social Security Administration.

The entity return due date varies depending on the type of entity you have. The due dates would be as follows:

- 1. Sole Proprietor (non-corporate) would be due by April 15th
- 2. Single member LLC would be due by April 15th
- 3. Partnership or Multi Member LLC will be due March 15th
- 4. S-Corporation would be due March 15th
- 5. C-Corp would be due three and a half months after end of tax year:

Ex: If your year ends December 31st, your tax return is due April 15th; if your year ends June 30th, your tax return would be due October 15th (a tax year that ends on December 31st is called a calendar year, however

a tax year that ends on any other date in the year is called a Fiscal year.)

Therefore, as you can see by these return deadlines, an average business has nine annual tax filing. However, on each filing there may be multiple tax filing for the Internal Revenue, NYS and NYC, there for those nine filings can be as much as nineteen. Now while these returns we have discussed today are the usually returns any business must file, there may be more returns you must file based on your type of business. For example, do you sell tobacco, tires, lottery services? Are you a hair stylist? Are you a truck driver? Do you have Tractor Trailers? Do you own a restaurant? These and many many more may have additional taxes to be filed.

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

Through October 28: In 1939, at the age of 51. Georgia O'Keeffe traveled on commission to Hawai'i to produce images for a Hawaiian Pineapple Company promotional campaign. Georgia O'Keeffe: Visions of Hawai'i, will explore this lesserknown chapter in her career, the enduring cultural impact of mid-century perceptions of Hawai'i, and the natural history of the Hawaiian Islands—one of the most ecologically diverse places on Earth-hidden behind O'Keeffe's depictions. Integrating art, horticulture, and historical interpretation, the exhibition will explore the Hawai'i that O'Keeffe experienced and also reveal the complex history of the Hawaiian Islands that she was not familiar with at the

Visitors will experience a lush flower show in the Garden's Enid A. Haupt Conservatory evoking the gardens and landscapes that inspired O'Keeffe as well as the complex story of the flora and unique ecology of Hawai'i. Plantings with more than 300 types of plants designed by Francisca Coelho and set pieces designed by Tony Award-winning designer Scott Pask explore the profound importance of plants in Hawaiian culture and growing concerns about threats to native Hawaiian plants.

Georgia O'Keeffe: Visions of Hawai'i, through October 28: A stunning display in the LuEsther T. Mertz Library Art Gallery offers a rare focus on Georgia O'Keeffe's works of art created during a nine-week sojourn in 1939 while on commission to produce images for a Hawaiian Pineapple Company promotional campaign. Her works depicting Hawaiian subjects garnered critical and popular attention when they were exhibited in 1940 at An American Place, the gallery of her husband. famed photographer Alfred Stieglitz (1864-1946). The exhibition spotlights a transformative experience in the legendary artist's life, revealing O'Keeffe's deeply felt impressions and the enduring influence of the Islands' rugged topography, dramatic landscapes, and exotic plants.

The works in this grouping, not seen together in New York since their 1940 debut, were all created in 1939 and include Heliconia, Crab's Claw Ginger [plant depicted is actually a 'lobster claw' heliconia] and Pineapple Bud (both of which were used in the Hawaiian Pineapple Company's advertisements and which are held today in private collections); Hibiscus with Plumeria (loaned by the Smithsonian American Art Museum); and a series of landscape paintings depicting Maui's interior 'ao Valley and lava-studded shorelines (loaned by the Honolulu Museum of Art, the Memphis Brooks Museum of Art, and a private collector).

Off in the Faraway Somewhere: Georgia O'Keeffe's Letters from Hawai'i, through October 28: An original short film narrated by Academy Award-nominee and NYBG Trustee Sigourney Weaver features excerpts from O'Keeffe's personal letters to her husband, famed photographer Alfred Stieglitz, written during her journey to and around the Hawaiian Islands.

Flora Hawaiiensis: Plants of Hawai'i, through October 28: This exhibit traces the history of Hawai'i's flora, from unusual native plants, to those valued by the ancient Hawaiians, to the ornamental and agricultural plants O'Keeffe painted. Displays showcase archival photos, illustrations, and letters from the LuEsther T. Mertz Library and specimens from the William and Lynda Steere Herbarium.

The exhibit also highlights the work of current and former NYBG botanists in the Pacific Islands, including Collaborators in Hawaiian Botany, Drs. Otto and Isa Degener, who explored and documented the flora of Hawai'i in their magnum opus, Flora Hawaiiensis (1932-80), and worked to conserve its ecology.

Georgia O'Keeffe's Hawaiian Vovage, through October 28: Part of the exhibition Georgia O'Keeffe: Visions of Hawai'i, Georgia O'Keeffe's Hawaiian Voyage is a display highlighting the artist's journey from her departure at New York's Grand Central Terminal through her nine- week island-hopping explorations of exotic flora and lush landscapes.

Contemporary Hawaiian Art by Mark Chai, through October 28: Outdoor installations by contemporary Hawaiian-Chinese sculptor Mark Chai, inspired by the forms of the plants that O'Keeffe encountered while visiting Hawai'i are on view and illuminated for evening events.

In the Sunroom Project Space, Austin Ballard's installation Rumors is on view. Fabricating furniture using cane webbing and epoxy clay, Austin Ballard constructs an immersive domestic setting. 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
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
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

#### Elder question of the week by Salvatore M. Di Costanzo

Dear Mr. Di Costanzo: Is it true I can gift \$15,000.00 without jeopardizing Medicaid eligibility for nursing home care?

This is a question I'm continually asked, so I'm glad I have another opportunity to clear things up. The main thing to remember is this: IRS rules are different from Medicaid rules.

Under current IRS rules. you may gift up to \$15,000.00 to as many people as you'd like in 2018 (increased from \$14,000.00 in 2017) without needing to file a gift tax return. This is known as the gift tax exclusion, and you riod during which Medicaid can think of gifts that qualify as being excluded from needing to be reported to the IRS. If your gift to someone (other than your spouse) is over \$15,000.00, you must tell

The annual gift tax exclusion, however, does not tie into Medicaid. Under rules concerning Medicaid eligibility for nursing home services, any gifts within the preceding five (5) year period (often referred to as the "look back period") will be evaluated and may result in a penalty pe-

will not pay. (It is important to note that currently, there is no look back period for community Medicaid when one stays at home.)

Again – and I can't stress this enough – do not try to reduce your assets for Medicaid eligibility purposes by making gifts that you do not need to report to the IRS. You will need to report them to the government for Medicaid purposes, and they can have a detrimental effect on eligibility.

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





of us adults played managed to entertain not just us, but children for hundreds or even thousands of years. Get your kids to try them and they just may play long and hard enough to need some water from the hose. And then you know what they're drinking in?

Take a look at how old some of your favorite games are:

Hopscotch: If you were a Roman soldier, you would have hated hopscotch. That's because the game began as a grueling exercise. Soldiers in full armor had to run or hop or somehow make it across 100-foot long hopscotch grids, the same way football players have hop through all those tires.

to hop through 10 squares. Back in the day, the word at the top would be "London," because that's where Rome's famous 400-mile road led. (You'd think it would lead to "Rome," but no.)

The word hopscotch it-The games that most self comes from hopping, of course, and "scotch" which is a bastardization of "scratch." Kids would scratch the lines on the ground. When I was growing up, we called the top "Blue Sky," which may harken back to the fact that when Germans played this game they called it "Himmel und Hölle" — Heaven and Hell. (Those cheery Teutons.) You'd get to the top and you were in heaven, or the sky.

> In any event, it is a nifty game and requires only chalk and a stone. Roman soldiers optional.

> Jacks: Jacks go back to Ancient Greece. You can see pictures of the game on urns (if you look really hard). Back then, however, no one had balls.

Well, I mean, no one had a bouncy ball. Or jacks, per se. They had, instead, the knuckle, wrist, and ankle bones of sheep, so the Buttokidsitlookedlike early name of the game was

"Knucklebones." Kids would toss these into the air and have to catch them either in their palms or on the back of their hands or some other way that made it hard, hence

When rubber finally made its way to Europe in the 1700s, the first bouncing balls were introduced and these made their way into the games. But for centuries before that. kids played jacks with whatever they had on hand (literally — ;), including apricot seeds in Egypt and little bags of rice or sand in China.

And by the way, jacks is short for "jackstones," which came from "chackstones" which came from chucking stones — throwing them.

Capture the Flag: This one is depressing. The game is just too glaringly modeled on war — and not just war exercises, like hopscotch. In a real war — in the Civil War, as a matter of fact you'd come upon your enemy and shoot or stomp or bayonet them, all in the service of literally capturing their flag. At the end of the skirmish what mattered most, insanely enough, was not how many people died, but who'd captured the other team ... er ... the other side's flag.

I realize I haven't watched nearly enough Ken Burns or I'd have known that. But it wasn't until reading up on this particular game that I learned that the soldiers stuck trying to keep their flag from falling into the enemy's clutches were called "color guards" — for guarding their side's colors. I'd thought color guards were just a Boy Scout thing.

Anyway, the game is played just like war, but without the bayonets.

Blind Man's Bluff: The bluff is that because you are blindfolded you "accidentally" end up touching anyone you want, anywhere you want. No surprise that this

game was a big hit with the original #MeToo despot, Henry VIII and his friends. Back then, it was an adult game. Very adult.

Kickball: Sit down. Here's a shocker. Kickball was invented not in ancient someplace, but in Cincinnati in ... 1917! Unlike baseball, or even jacks, which require some serious hand-eye coordination, in kickball a giant ball rolls right toward vou, for gosh sake. It is like being a human bowling pin. Because it was so much easier than any game ever, gym teachers pounced on it and by the 1920s it was already a physical education staple and today it's still alive and, well, you know.

So here's the deal. Kids love their video games. But a study often quoted by Peter Gray, author of a basic textbook on psychology used at Harvard and beyond, found that 86 percent of kids prefer playing outside to computer play.





World's Fairs have traditionally served as futuristic beacons, providing






### History of Beck Mem'l Church

The village of West Farms had been growing and when it reached a population of 300, some members of the Presbyterian Church thought it was time to have their own church and minister. Dr. Gardiner Spring, the pastor of the Brick Church, and Robert Lenox acting as advisors met on August 14, 1814. Robert Given, James Bathgate, Caleb Pell, Ebenezer Waterbury, John Gillespie and James Renwick were chosen as the first trustees and by the following year construction on a church building began on 180th Street opposite the current edifice.

Rev. Isaac Lewis was installed as the first pastor and divided his time between his existing congregation in New Rochelle and the new church in West Farms.

He served for four years and was replaced by a series of ministers beginning in 1819 with Rev. Truman Osborne and all serving pro tem until Rev. Joseph D. Wickham was officially installed as the second pastor in 1825. He was succeeded by Rev. George Stebbins in 1829 and a long line of pastorships ensued.

The new church was built at 980 East 180th Street and dedicated in 1895. The name of the church was changed from the First Presbyterian Church of West Farms to the Beck Memorial Church in 1910.

> The first big event at the new church was the celebration of the centennial of their founding on May 10, 1914 starting with a memorial service by Rev. Dr. Charles Payson Mallery, the pastor emeritus who served from 1885 to 1907, and was well-familiar with its history. He detailed the history of the church from its beginning to that point in time. The celebration continued later that day with talks by Rev. Howard Duffield, Rev. Dr. David Gourley Wylie, and Dr. George

after themselves and it's becoming both a problem and an eyesore.

The NYC Parks Department is aware of the problem.

In an effort to encourage the beach users to clean up after themselves this new season, Parks is implementing some new changes with trash disposal.

"We are experimenting with a new trash management approach at Orchard Beach by placing all trash cans on the boardwalk as opposed to directly on the sand," said a spokesperson for Parks.

"The hope is that this will encourage people to carry their garbage off the beach. This approach also allows our staff to empty trash cans faster. We are also installing orange banners near trash bins to direct beach goers," the spokesperson added.

While Parks is hopeful that this policy will encourage those on the beach to cleanup after themselves, other beachgoers are skeptical.

"Nothing is going to change. The trash cleanup policy didn't work when the cans were on the beach. So why would people that already aren't walking a few feet to a trash can now be inspired to walk back to the boardwalk?" said the perplexed beachgoer. "The best bet to fixing this issue is more cans in more places, not less," they added.

Michael Torres has called a joke," Torres added.

Soundview his home and Orchard Beach his stomping ground for over 30 years.

He's personally seen people at the beach take an apathetic approach to cleaning up after themselves.

"Orchard Beach always had issues with trash, especially in the water, all over the park and the basketball courts. The park has improved in recent years but it is a long way off compared to other areas in city," said Torres. "I've seen some disgusting stuff float out into that water honestly. a bathroom here," said Silver, who added in remarks he calls it a 'comfort station plus' because of its ability to be used as a performance space.

The commissioner said in remarks that soccer players drink a lot of water and Gatorade and need public restrooms.

The 750-foot building was a \$4.5 million dollar project funded with \$2.9 million from the NYC Department of Environmental Protection and \$1.6 million from the mayor's office.

Dotti Poggi, Friends of Ferry Point Park leader, said that plans for a new comfort station, the first in the park since the 1970s, were originally proposed when funds became available as part of the Croton Water Filtration Plant mitigation in the mid-2000s, but that the money ran out before it could be built.

She believes that it will make the park more environmentally sound.

Senator Jeff Klein, who attended the ribbon cutting, said that this comfort station would allow the public to expand recreational and educational service for children in the park.

"Ithank the NYC Parks Department for their ongoing commitment to improving the quality of life, and health and well-being of Bronx residents," said Klein, adding in remarks that he

looks forward to the future completion of a waterfront promenade.

The community, especially the various local sports leagues who utilize the park, will certainly welcome the facility, said Assemblyman Michael Benedetto.

"It is a magnificent park used by thousands of people every single weekend," said Benedetto, adding "It is a crying shame that this park too often gets neglected."

Those playing cricket and participating in remote-control aviation utilize the park.

Lesly Lowe, Commonwealth Cricket League president, said that the league has been playing there for four decades, most of the time without a working bathroom facility.

He said that players in the league often had NYC Parks Enforcement Police watching them while they played to make sure no one urinated in the

wooded areas.

Frank Verdejo of the Bronx Blue Angels Model Aviation Club, which has been flying RC aircraft in park for 20 years, said that the comfort station alleviates a lot of issues concerning bringing women and children to the park, and allows the club to discontinue its port-o-san rentals.
