LEGIONELLA FOUDDATINC Jacobi takes quick action; no reported injuries

One of the borough's public hospitals took quick action when Legionella bacteria was discovered in its water supply.

Officials at Jacobi Medical Center on Pelham Parkway held a walk through of its facility for media on Thursday, August 2 where it highlighted new water filters for showers and faucets, a command center stocked with bottled water and clean wipes for bathing and a filtration monitoring system to protect the hospital against further Legionella outbreaks.

Legionella, which causes Legionnaire's Disease (a type of pneumonia) when ingested, was found as part of a routine water test of multiple locations in the hospital's water supply, said officials. The hospital expects to be using bottled water for up to two months, they said.

"As part of our aggressive water monitoring program, our routine required testing of our potable water supply and found very low levels of Legionella bacteria at NYC Health and Hospitals/Jacobi," read a statement from the city's public hospital system. "Per guidance from the New York State Department of Health, which regulates hospitals, we have taken steps to prevent any impact on our patients, staff or visitors. Safety is always our highest priority."

As of Thursday, August 7, no one at the hospital has gotten Legionella at Jacobi, said a medical center spokesman.

Christopher Mastromano, Jacobi Medical Center CEO, said that the hospital automatically tests its water supply in cooling towers and in its potable water, and as a result of a recent test taken in early July and the findings received at the end of the month, some of the potable water was found to contain low-levels of Legionella.

"Under New York State Department of Health guidelines, if more than 30 percent of the samples we take have any Legionella, we automatically increase our '(water) treatments'," said Mastromano.

As part of the stepped-up measures the hospital is 'super-heating' hot water tanks and flushing out the hospitals water system, with the hospital monitoring the results (and hopefully noting im-

Recognition for 'Junior' Guzman-Feliz

The name Lesandro 'Junior' Guzman-Feliz will become immortalized on the corner of 183rd Street and Bathgate Avenue, right where the 15-year-old was brutally murdered by gang members over a case of mistaken identity Wednesday, June 20.

Councilmember Ritchie Torres is directing the City Council in the renaming process which is expected to be finalized by early 2019 if approved.

"The legacy that Junior Guzman leaves behind summed up in #JusticeForJu-

nior has been an awakening for all of us and has become a national rallying cry against gang violence in our streets. The images of Junior's death have become to our time what the images of Emmet Till was to his own time. Junior's death has awakened all of us, and has confronted us with a crisis that we cannot afford to ignore," Torres said.

In wake of Junior's tragedy, Torres also allocated one million dollars to seven police precincts in the Bronx to combat the dangerous rise of gang violence in the borough, those being: the 40th, 42nd, 44th,

46th, 47th, 48th (Junior's home precinct) and 52nd precincts.

"I pushed for \$1 million to be included in the recently adopted city budget and it will go directly to the 48th Precinct for 'Cure Violence' gang-violence prevention initiative. This will take a holistic approach that will connect former gang members and violence interrupters with youth who may be at risk of joining gangs, and link them to social services, conflict resolution specialists and legal services as needed," said Torres.

Bronx restaurants decry gov's attempt to end tipping

Governor Cuomo's push to remove tipping at restaurants in New York state through regulations would seiously impact the survival of small 'mom & pop' owned eateries throughout the borough, according to the industry.

Bronx merchants and economic association leaders convened at historic Arthur Avenue Retail Market on Tuesday, August 7 in efforts to advocate that tipping is what keeps the restaurant business alive, especially in the Bronx.

"The way that the government is going about this is not helping us - it's hurting us," said Regina Delfino, the manager of near 100-year-old Mario's Restaurant, another staple of Arthur Avenue and a Bronx small business. "We can't afford to pay those salaries, we can't make the money that large corporations can pay. It's not fair to us, our employees, and this will put us along with other 'mom and pops' right out of business," she added.

Andrew Rigie, the executive director of the NYC Hospitality Alliance also explained

how restaurants, especially city based, will be driven out of business by eliminating tipping

"If the governor eliminates the tip credit it will have a significant impact on the restaurant industry overall, small businesses are being challenged enough as it is and this will only worsen that problem," Rigie said.

"The fact is clear, restaurant owners are scared and they're nervous," he added.

The NYS Department of Labor recently held hearings on the state's wage structure to explore the elimination of the tipped credit that affects workers in restaurants, car washes and nail salons.

Opponents of Cuomo's initiative to revamp the tipped credit wage believe it would push the service industries further towards automation, thus costing more jobs throughout both the borough and state.

What's worse for lovers of Italian cuisine, it could mean the end of Arthur Avenue as they know it.

"All of our restaurants are 'mom and pop' stores, their

success comes from the generosity of patrons tipping because of the excellent service," said Frank Franz, executive director of the Belmont BID.

"A perfect example to look at is Europe where people don't tip, you pay 52 Euros for a fried chicken and you get lousy service, when an American walks into a European restaurant servers flock around them because they know a good tip is coming. That's the nature of the business, so government should run it's businesses and let us run ours," he

concluded.

Bob Jaen, president of the Throggs Neck Merchants Association raised concern that eliminating restaurant tipping will set a dangerous precedent.

"Who's next then? Cab drivers, bartenders, delivery people? The ones that want to enact this policy have never worked in a restaurant or the service industry so its very easy for them to get behind something like this," Jaen said

restaurant wait staff who currently work 40-hours a week will likely be dropped down to 20 hours. Staffing cuts are almost guaranteed to be a result, he warned.

Jaen called on all merchants associations and BIDs within the city to come together to show unanimous opposition to the plan to eliminate tipping.

"If you keep picking on the little guy sooner or later we're going to revolt, we need to handle this now or we will be He went on to explain that sorry later," he exclaimed.

Robert A. Williams, pro basketball player, Bronx activist, 77

The Bronx lost one of its best on Wednesday, July 18. Robert A. Williams, whom

spent his life as a professional basketball player and community activist passed at the age of 77.

Williams was the captain of the NYU men's basketball team that battled the Duke Blue Devils in the NCAA tournament 1963, he then played professionally as one of the first African Americans in Spain for some years.

Later he would also become NYU's first African American assistant basketball coach, going on to earn a Master's degree in Public Administration and Policy.

Williams came home from Europe to continue playing basketball in the famed Rucker Park League of Harlem in the late 1960s, at that time he also began giving back to the Bronx and the rest of the city.

He started Sports Foundation, Inc., a youth program that focused towards education and substance abuse prevention.

Cedric McClester worked

with Williams from the earliest days of SFI, although he had heard about the Bronx legend from the Rucker Park basketball league.

"Bob wanted to show social responsibility through teamwork. He thought sports and a teamwork mentality would show the youth how to choose the right path," said McClester. "He had a love for young people," McClester added.

Since those days of the 1970s, SFI grew exponentially and so did Williams' legacy.

"It started with sports but overtime it grew much more to a childhood development program that had used sports as a catalyst, as SFI developed it became much more focused on after school and family programs, even though the name is Sports Foundation it really became the foundation of everything else," McClester joked.

While the foundation may have not turned out to be all that sports oriented, Bob always remained locked in to athletics. During the 1990s he along with the late Howard Garfinkel, co-founded the NYC Basketball Hall of Fame which still exits to this day.

When the new Yankee Stadium was being built, Williams was appointed to the Yankee Council, which provided him the abiliity to steer Yankees community dollars to worthy organizations.

SFI is still heavily involved to this day.

One SFI assisted young man told both Robert and Cedric that because of the foundation he was able to attend Harvard, which he hadn't thought would be possible in his wildest dreams.

Williams was also known for his sense of humor and approachability.

Also, while many at the time would use the term 'dawg' as one of endearment, Williams rathered the term 'horse'

"I don't know really, that's what he called people, I think he felt it was an upgrade from dog because you were as big and strong as a horse in his mind," McClester said.

Williams' son, Robert Reginald Jr. said that a truly proud moment was when

Soundview's historic ferry launch begins Wed., August 15th

Ferry service is coming to the borough!

The long-awaited Soundview ferry that will pick up and drop off passengers along a route that runs from Clason Point Park and Manhattan is scheduled to begin service on Wednesday, August 15, announced the NYC Economic Development Corporation.

The ferry route will include stops at East 90th Street on the Upper East Side, East 34th Street in Midtown and Wall Street/Pier 11 in lower Manhattan, according to EDC.

According to EDC, the ferry, which will be operated by Hornblower Cruises, will take about 54 minutes from Soundview to Wall Street.

Local elected officials hailed the service as another option for commuting in transit-starved communities that are often located along the waterfront and are relatively far from subway lines further inland in the borough.

Senator Jeff Klein, whose district includes parts of Soundview, said that in addition to that he expects the ferry to expand employment

opportunities and he pledged to work with nearby homeowners to "ensure a seamless transition."

"The ferry service will be a great relief to many Soundview residents who have for far too long been deprived of adequate transportation infrastructure and burdened with a long commute back and forth to work," said Klein.

Klein added: "Improved transportation opens the doors to greater employment opportunities, recharges the local economy and allows our city's workers to spend more time with their families."

Senator Luis Sepulveda who represents much of Soundview and surrounding communities said he was glad to see that bus routes were extended to reach the ferry launch.

"I'm happy to see the longawaited start of ferry service from Soundview to Manhattan, that along with recently extended Bx27 bus service, will hopefully serve thousands of Bronx commuters in my district and beyond," said Sepulveda.

The senator believes that the ferry service will mean a quicker trip to Manhattan and help relieve overcrowding on local subway lines, while offering a refreshing and scenic ride.

"What could be better?" Sepulveda asked.

CameronClark, Hornblower Cruises senior vice president, said that the ferry would have the same basic fare of \$2.75 as the subway and buses and will offer free transfers, so that riders who use it can transfer ferries and access Brooklyn and Queens for work or recreation.

Clark said that he visualized people car-pooling to the Soundview location. Once in Manhattan there are sometimes shuttles from the ferry slips to inland Manhattan landmarks.

He said he recently rode the ferry from Soundview to Wall Street, and said that it can be refreshing sail down the East River, in the process passing Roosevelt Island and the United Nations.

James Patchett, EDC president, noted that the addition of the Soundview launch is part of a larger transit expansion plan.

"We're excited to launch NYC Ferry service in the Bronx, the Upper East Side and the Lower East Side, which have historically been transit deserts," said Patchett.

The ferry's hours of operation are Monday to Friday, 6:30 a.m. to 9:10 p.m. (23 Manhattanbound trips leaving daily) and 6:30 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. (19 Manhattan-bound trips leaving daily) on weekends.



Remember how proud Governor Cuomo was when the new Tappan Zee Bridge opened? He made a cold political calculation by promising not to raise the tolls when

running for another term in 2018 or president in 2020 (the world's worst kept secret). To pay back the \$1.6 billion dollar federal loan and \$1 billion New York Thruway Authority Bond which helped finance the \$3.9 billion bridge along with up to \$900 million in final bills to the contractor, tolls will have to go up by double or more over several years. The well-respected Moody's Investment Services estimated the tolls will go up to \$7.60 by 2021 and \$15 by 2026 for the Thruway Authority to be able to pay back the loan, bond and up to \$900 million more in pending contractor final payment claims.

The Metropolitan Transportation Authority will pay for installation of Positive Train Control on the Long Island and Metro North railroads by obtaining a \$967.1 million loan from the Federal Rail Road Administration. It is a 22 year loan at 2.4 percent interest. The FRA loan will have to be paid back over the next four MTA Five Year Capital Plans ending by 2038.

When it comes to paying for all his \$100 billion worth of transportation promises, Cuomo reminds me of Wimpy who famously said "I'll gladly pay you Tuesday for a hamburger today."

Taxpayers and Metropolitan Transportation Authority riders will have to deal with higher fares, taxes, more debt and borrowing in coming years to cover the costs for all of Cuomo's transportation improvements.

Cuomo doesn't believe in pay as you go or balanced budgets.

\$4.2 million set aside to repair four aging borough libraries

Four borough library branches are getting additional funding to meet critical needs thanks to City Council budget allocations.

New York Public Library branches in the central-west Bronx are getting a total of \$4.2 million in funding, including \$50,000 each for technology upgrades and millions for a new roof and exterior renovations at two of the locations.

The Belmont Library and Enrico Fermi Cultural Center on East 186th Street has been allocated \$2.5 million for an exterior rehabilitation to stop water from entering the building as well upgrades to the building's HVAC system.

The Grand Concourse branch on East 173rd Street has been allocated \$1.5 million dollars for a new roof, which hasn't been replaced since 1959, according to NYPL officials.

The allocation were part of funding secured by Councilman Ritchie Torres for libraries specifically in his district, with the Tremont branch and Bronx Library Center also receiving the technology grants.

"I think the public library system,

especially in the Bronx, has been chronically neglected and plagued by decades of disinvestment," said Torres. "They have gone decades without reliable roofs, brick repairs, elevators and accessibility."

The councilman said that he recognizes that the libraries are an indispensable resource for the borough.

"Our libraries are more than a repository of books," said the councilman. "They are really a hub of services and support for the local community, serving as a setting for English language learners [and] early childhood education."

The four libraries in Torres' district collectively receive nearly a million visits per year, a circulation of 650,000 books and in a recent year held 7,300 program sessions for 160,000 individuals, said the councilman.

"The impact for these four libraries alone have on the Bronx community is staggering," said Torres. "I am proud that I was able to secure more funding in the current budget cycle than any other elected official in the Bronx." The whole community has a vested interest in insuring that the libraries are in good repair, Torres said.


The NYC Department of Design and Construction will administer the funding and steward the work, said the councilman.

Water leaks have been long-standing problems at the Belmont and Grand Concourse branches, according to both branch managers.

At Belmont, where work is currently also underway on repairing the roof as part of a separate project, repairs to the exterior of the building are also needed to make sure water leaks don't damage books, said manager Ignayra Lopez.

"We have been having leaks, especially in our Italian book section," said Lopez, who indicated the duration and frequency of the water leaks had increased over time until something had to be done.

The \$50,000 technology grant the library will receive will be used to purchase new computers; especially for the Young Adult section so youths can do their homework and work on college applications, said the branch manager.

"People depend on this library," said Deborah Allman Grand Concourse branch manager.

For example, she noted that the relatively small branch sometimes draws over 40 children to their library story times.



Los Viajeros TV competition win takes Bronx, city by storm

Some of the Bronx's most delectable food is always on the go.

The Los Viajeros food truck has been cooking up a storm at Jacobi Hospital on Wednesday afternoons for sometime now, but the origin behind Caitlyn Napolitano, the co-owner of spicy Latin food on wheels is even more savory.

She loves food and loves to eat. Growing up in an Italian family in New Jersey, it was a rite of passage for her to help make Sunday night dinner with her grandmother.

Although, it wasn't until after studying communications at Penn State and travelling to Italy that the cooking affectionado learned and saw a "a new side of food."

Around that time she also realized that a 9 to -5 job simply wasn't for her, admitting she didn't enjoy working for other people.

Last year, Caitlyn competed on the Food Network's Chopped, winning the grand prize.

"I practiced...a lot," she said. "I had to start learning how to make desserts, which weren't my forte," the chef added.

More than practicing making desserts, Napolitano practiced keeping her composure on television.

She was used to working under high pressure and in stressful environments so the pressure of being on television didn't get to her.

However, she did have to fight off the tendency to use foul language like Gordon Ramsay, a popular TV chef, often resorts to using.

"I just kept saying in my head, do not disgrace the family on national television," Caitlyn joked.

Her victory brought her business great publicity and a tremendous boom to Los Viajeros.

The couple recently expanded into a brick and mortar spot in Columbus Circle.

The Hefe burrito has been

While reflecting on her prominent and recent success Napolitano said "I never went to culinary school and I never measure out ingredients and it works." Caitlyn and Carlos travel

City and even Thailand to discover new hot sauces and spices for their dishes.

"Travelling is what inspires us, that's what Los Viajeros means, The Travellers," she said.







Sensory changes in older adults by Healthy Seniors CliCC

Older adults are often faced with problems of sensory impairment. The most common sensory impairments include changes in vision, hearing, sensation in feet and hands, and posture and balance. Others include changes in smell and taste. These problems get worse as we age, but not everyone is impacted the same. The age that sensory deficits begin and the rate at which sensory perception declines varies among individuals.

Disease and the environment that we live in can impact our sensory perception. Diabetes can impact vision and sensation in feet and hands. Smoking can decrease a person's sense of smell and taste. Exposure to prolonged loud noise can create irreversible changes in hearing abilitv.

Here are some statistics regarding sensory changes in older adults: • One in six persons age 70+ has vision deficiencies

• 60% of older adults who have vision problems do not use glasses or have glasses that do not improve their vision sufficiently

• Individuals who live below the poverty level have a rate of vision loss that is 50% higher than that of other older adults

• 25% of seniors aged 70+ have hearing problems

 Close to 70% of older adults that could benefit from using a hearing aid do not use one

sensation in their feet

• 75% have abnormal postural balance testing

• Loss of feeling in the feet and hearing loss are more common in men than women

• Women are more likely than men to have balance impairment

In order to maintain a good quality of life, decrease morbidity, and increase daily functioning, it is important to be aware of sensory impairments and how they

• 25% have decreased can be addressed.

Sensory impairment can lead to increased chance of conditions such as hip fracture or depression. Making sure that you or your loved one gets regular primary care MD or NP check-ups and vision, hearing and balance screening/fall risk evaluation is critical to potentially avoiding these negative outcomes. Some sensory changes, like hearing and vision impairment, if unattended to may lead to decreased

communication skills and confusion. If you notice a problem with your vision, hearing, feeling in feet or hands, or any of your other senses, it is important to seek professional advice.

Our Perspective H&M Workers Demand a Fair Contract!

etail workers are facing some of the most abusive scheduling practices of our lifetime. From insecure hours, to on-call scheduling practices that leave workers scrambling to find last-minute childcare and eldercare and canceling classes, to "clopenings" the practice of having to

close a store only to open it again in a few hours later: what were once good jobs in our communities are now leaving workers with paralyzed when it comes to earning a living for their families.

Workers at H&M close their stores at 2am. They spend hours offloading trucks with new inventory after a long day on the sales floor with customers. They're then required to return to the store at 6am to restock and tidy the clothes before the store opens to the public. Many of these part-time workers also don't get the hours they were once guaranteed and depend on. What was once a high-road employer has now become a lowroad employer.

Khadejiah Legrier a sales associate at H&M recounts what life has become for workers at H&M in recent years as the U.S. management of the Swedish company has allowed the employer to become among the worst in the city. "I travel over an hour to get to work every day. When I heard that H&M wanted to reinstate a banned practice of 'clopenings', which would require that I get less than 5 hours of sleep a night I was outraged. Working at H&M has been a good job over the past 12 years, but if they instate these horrendous scheduling practices I won't be able to provide for my family and I will need to seek other employment," said Khadejiah.

Khadejiah speaks to the extreme sleep deprivation so many workers face and will continue to face as H&M continues down its current path. If workers continue to be forced to keep these hours it will impact their safety traveling to and from work, their ability to go to school, and provide childcare and eldercare just to name a few.

For part-time workers like Khadejiah who cannot get enough hours to even pay for their Metrocard to get to and from work it's only the beginning of a spiraling set of problems workers face including food insecurity, homelessness and lack of opportunity retail jobs once provided.

Khadejiah is not alone, she is among over 1,500 H&M workers who are in the fight for their lives to secure a contract that ensures that their jobs are stable, good jobs in our city. H&M cannot afford to continue refusing to negotiate in good faith.

These workers suffer the effects of sleep deprivation, insufficient hours and wages to make ends meet in a city where the cost of living is rapidly increasing. Meanwhile, several other union employers in the city ZARA, Modell's, and Macy's to name a few have enforced higher part-time hour minimums and banned "clopenings". As a result, workers are able to plan their schedules and their lives; and that security has bolstered sales at these union retailers. H&M has lost its way.

H&M workers deserve a fair contract for helping the company succeed and expand in New York City, and all retail workers have a stake as these union members take a stand against the outrageous policy of forcing workers to accept "clopenings." Weekly insurance tips from John Cerini

Do you have an Umbrella Policy? Have you ever heard of umbrella insurance? Let's discuss what an umbrella policy is and what it covers.

Umbrella insurance is additional liability coverage you can purchase, usually from your auto insurance carrier, which covers you above and beyond your underlying liability limits of your home and auto and boat insurance. In New York State, the NYS minimum liability coverage allowed by law is \$25,000/\$50,0000/\$10,000. What this breaks down to is \$25,000 liability coverage per person, \$50,000 per accident, and \$10,000 in property damage. The term liability coverage indicates the amount of protection you will have in the event of a lawsuit against you due to an accident you may have been the cause of. Property damage is the coverage if you damage someone else's property during an accident. While these are the NYS minimum limits allowed by law, as you can imagine, if you are involved in an accident that was in fact your fault, these minimum coverages will not be sufficient. As we all know, an attorney will not waste their time suing you for a few thousand dollars. When you are sued, it will usually be for hundreds of thousands into the millions. Therefore, the umbrella policy is so important in our society today.


not allow you to purchase an umbrella policy which will cover you for a million dollars or more, unless you have higher limits of liability coverage on your auto and home insurance. Usually insurance companies will ask you to carry a minimum of \$250,000/\$500,000/\$100,000 on your auto insurance and \$500,000 minimum liability on your home or apartment insurance. This will ensure that your underlying insurance policy must be first maximized before your umbrella is required. Some Auto insurance carriers may allow for lower coverage of \$100,000/\$300,000/\$50,000. You will need to ask your auto insurance carrier what their guidelines are to qualify for the umbrella.

At this point, if you agree to take on an umbrella policy, you will now have your underlying coverages plus the umbrella.

For example: If you have \$500,000 for your home owner's insurance, plus the \$1,000,000 umbrella, you now have \$1,500,000 total coverage on your home liability. The umbrella policy does not increase your property protection, just the liability portion of the policy. This will give you the peace of mind you need to rest easy and know your insurance company will fight for you in the event of a claim.

You may be asking, how much does Most auto insurance carriers will a typical umbrella policy cost? Each

company will have different variables that make up their cost, but you can estimate a one million dollar umbrella policy will cost the average Bronx consumer somewhere around \$400 per year. However, if you a higher risk than others, you will pay more. So, is it worth it? The answer to that should be answered with another question. Do you have assets that you need to protect? Do you have a business? Do you have children? If you answered yes to any of these, then an umbrella should be a must. However, If you feel that at this stage of your life, you do not have any valuable assets (no home, no children, no bank accounts, no investment accounts, no vehicles, etc) then you may choose not to purchase this policy. However, remember in a lawsuit, the winnings may be attached to your future earnings. Therefore, what you don't have now may still be up for grabs in a lawsuit. If you hit the lotto a year after you are sued and lose the case, your lottery winnings may not be subject to the lawsuit from the past. I am not a lawyer and cannot give you legal advice, but I am an insurance agent and will tell you every day of the week that it makes simple sense to purchase an umbrella. Protection from anything in life can be priceless. Until the day you need the insurance protection, you may think it's useless, but trust me you will be so happy you have

As lead Democrat on the Commerce, Justice, and Science Appropriations Subcommittee—which funds NSF and the HSI program-Serrano and Congressman Joseph Crowlev successfully included language in the America COMPETES Act that mandated the creation of an HSI program.

HSIs received \$30 million in funding in FY 2018 and due to the efforts of Congressman Serrano, the House Appropriations Committee has increased funding for this program to \$50 million for FY 2019.

Under this round of NSF HSI grants, a total of 31 educational institutions, including two in New York City and one in Puerto Rico, received a total of \$45 million in funding.

"This Hispanic-Serving Institutions program funding will lead to greater collaboration between the National Science Foundation and

Hispanic-Serving Institutions across the nation to further invest in our Hispanic students and their education in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). Today, Hispanics currently make up 16 percent of the U.S. workforce, but only 6 percent pursue careers in the STEM fields. We need to make sure that every American is ready to participate, contribute, and pursue careers in these fields now and in the future. These awards will help ensure that HSIs, which have traditionally lacked funding, can educate future Hispanic scientists and engineers," said Serrano.

Weather, weather, weather. Either it's been torrential rainstorms or extreme heat, but we keep plugging along in the garden and at the market.

The Garden at Preston got cleaned up in the spring, but with the planning of the Market at Preston and the fact that the teacher who partnered with me on the garden moved with her family to Tennessee, that garden is silent this season.

I'm hoping to get in there and get it weeded and maybe get some winter squash and lettuces in for a fall crop, but I am not very hopeful that I will have the energy to do this on my own.

While I have been negligent of the garden, I have been quite active in the kitchen.

We already have batch of cherry vinegar fermenting, I have a bunch of mango skins and seeds in the freezer and the next time I take advantage of a sale on mangoes, I'll set up a batch of mango vinegar.

Peaches and plums have been arriving in our fruit shares with CSA and I have been collecting peach skins to get a batch of peach vinegar going soon too.

Every time we have mushrooms leftover after the market, whatever fresh mushrooms didn't sell get put in the dehvdrator and turned into

mushroom powder. If you tried my recipe for Zucchini Fritters, you probably noticed that was one of the ingredients and probably wondered

what the heck mushroom powder is.

It's basically dried mushrooms thrown in a spice grinder and it's great for adding to soups and stocks and sauces and pretty much anything to add a nice umami flavor. Earth and smoky and subtle, it's worth trying

Stop by the Lewis Waite Farm Network table at the Market at Preston if you are interested in trying some.

The CSA has been pumping out tomatoes, peppers, squash and basil, so I did a few demos last week to show off my Roasted Tomato Recipe. It's really easy to get overwhelmed this time of year with all of the tomatoes around.

While there is the traditional method of making sauce with bushels of plum tomatoes, quite often our vegetable drawers are filled to the brim with assorted tomatoes and other summertime vegetables.

I love to just fill a glass baking dish with rough chopped assorted vegetables, a tablespoon or two of olive oil, a good sprinkle of salt and pepper and a good toss together, into the oven at 425 degrees for 30 minutes, another

foo though

toss and back in again for an additional 30 minutes.

The result is a mixture that you can then put through a food mill and turn

into a delicious sauce. Lots of times, I freeze the sauce and have created many a winter dinner with these little packages.

For the CSA, I did a take on the recipe with tomatillo, onion, garlic scape, a peeled cucumber, a sweet green pepper and a bunch of cilantro.

After passing the mixture through a food mill, I added the juice of one lemon and created a pretty awesome Tomatillo Salsa.

For the Farmers Market, I made a Curried Apricot Catsup with apricots, cherry tomatoes, onion and garlic.

passing this mixture After through the food mill, I added some sugar, vinegar and water, plus a heaping tablespoon of a Curry seasoning mix I got from the Teeny Tiny Spice Company, one of the vendors in our Lewis Waite Farm Network.

The catsup was a huge success, so I found some apricots at the farmers market in Connecticut and made another batch over the weekend.

It's a great technique and a great way to utilize the abundance we can sometimes end up with when we have our own gardens, are members of a CSA or just love going to farmers markets - lots of produce and not enough time.

Any tomatoes, peppers, garlic, onions, summer squash, cucumbers, celery or herbs can be used, I've even tossed a few carrots in the mix and they make a great addition.

The only vegetables I would avoid using are anything cruciferous like broccoli or cabbage and I wouldn't add any greens like kale or chard either.

Stick to the nightshades, alliums and squashes and you can't go wrong. Just remember to label the bags! If you make a sauce that is spicy, for example, you need to make sure the label says so.

Over the winter, a thick sauce, filled with zucchini and peppers, is perfect for a homemade pizza.

Once thawed out, the sauce is ready to use, unlike simple jarred plum tomato sauce that still needs to be cooked in order to use.

So give it a try. Like some of my friends that have tried this technique, may be tempted to just get a loaf of good crusty Italian bread and eat this mixture right out of the baking dish, it's that good.

So give it a try and in the meantime, be the change you want to see in the world.

I would like to share my personal reaction to our illustrious Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr.'s reasons for voting "no" to the carefully selected site for the fantastic Bronx Animal Center.

Due to his very simple vision of this complicated issue, the addition to our borough and city of a future 60 million dollar state-of-the-art, beautifully designed, HVAC air-filtrated system, LEED compliant building and the amazingly naturally lit animal center, is now in question. Our area will be giving up the phenomenal low-cost veterinary clinic for the public, free food pantry and free dog training, home base for a Bronx-specific adoption van, 100 or more jobs of various strata due to his vote. His simple explanations for his vote against this complicated site

selection are not acceptable.

He said that with more outreach we may have been able to make this work? How do we compete with a lobbyist being paid to push for

this site for supportive housing, politically funded buses and robo phone calls illegally saying they were from Community Board 10 to attend the meeting in Co-op City? And petitioners from a West Harlem Democratic political club getting misleading flyers signed for a supportive housing development on the site?

His statement that this is not the last shot and he thinks the NYC Economic Development Corporation will other sites to fit the shelter is nonsense. Many people including myself



have researched and found nothing. Most sites have old mold/mildew/toxic problems that are not acceptable for living creatures with surgery and medical care.

The borough president states he is representing the hundreds and hundreds of residents that he based his "no" vote on (when the meeting was in Co-op City) where approximately 250 people out of a population of 55-60,000 with no sign-in sheet, some hiding their faces from cameras. Ninetyseven percent seniors, with many walkers and canes, were bussed into the meeting, chanting and screaming and yelling about fear of noise, poop, smell etc. from the shelter, which was shown to be exaggerated, using comparative existing shelters that have no issues with surrounding community. Our 7,000 signatures letters etc. should be considered as well.


As far as the 'phantom' YMCA-type recreation center that the residents want: The whole Baychester Village was not notified (which was the reason for the original plan for the recreation center which was based on a program that does not exist anymore in the old 'little yellow school house'. The only youth who spoke was an impressive girl who wanted the animal shelter and said there are plenty of options for recreation and she would like to be involved with the animals for possible

future job.

Not one youth asked for a recreation center? No sports teams asking for a field? Truman High School has such great facilities and the possibilities of them opening up extended hours was booed and brushed aside when the Youth Services Committee of CB10, chairperson Bob Beider stood up to explain that he was at a meeting with Scott Stringer a day or two before and made headway with that (I happened to be there to ask the Comptroller if we can keep the shelter money in escrow). Also, the mayor's office offered to work with the community on this issue and they were brushed aside as well.

As far as the No Pet lease policy of Co-op City, there are 500 to 600 support dog owners who were not notified. They have rights to speak their mind. River-Bay has no enforcement in place for pet owners. The 1,000 or more pet owner's Co-op City were afraid to speak up because of the No Pet clause in their lease agreement would have appreciated the animal center. ACC does not adopt dogs out to no-pet lease residents.

As far as the transportation issues: Most animal owners jump in a cab to transport or adopt. Especially to a low cost clinic where they will save hundreds of dollars. The few that use public transportation can use the IRT 6 train to the Co-op City Bx12 bus. Thousands of people find their way to shop or dine at Bay Plaza daily and the animal shelter site next to Bay Plaza and a Petland Discount.

during a nine-week sojourn in 1939 while on commission to produce images for a Hawaiian Pineapple Company promotional campaign. Her works depicting Hawaiian subjects garnered critical and popular attention when they were exhibited in 1940 at An American Place, the gallery of her husband, famed photographer Alfred Stieglitz (1864-1946). The exhibition spotlights a transformative experience in the legendary artist's life, revealing O'Keeffe's deeply felt impressions and the enduring influence of the Islands' rugged topography, dramatic landscapes, and exotic plants.

The works in this grouping not seen together in New York since their 1940 debut, were all created in 1939 and include Heliconia, Crab's Claw Ginger [plant depicted is actually a "lobster claw" heliconia] and Pineapple Bud (both of which were used in the Hawaiian Pineapple Company's advertisements and which are held today in private collections); Hibiscus with Plume-ria (loaned by the Smithsonian American Art Museum); and a series of landscape paintings depicting Maui's interior 'lao Vallev and lava-studded shorelines (loaned by the Honolulu Museum of Art, the Memphis Brooks Museum of Art, and a private collector).

Off in the Faraway Somewhere: Georgia O'Keeffe's Letters from Hawai'i, through October 28: An original short film narrated by Academy Awardnominee and NYBG Trustee Sigourney Weaver features excerpts from O'Keeffe's letters to her husband, photographer Alfred Stieglitz, written during her journey to the Hawaiian Islands.

Flora Hawaiiensis: Plants of Hawai'i, through October 28: This exhibit traces the history of Hawai'i's flora. Displays showcase archival photos, illustrations, and letters from the LuEsther T. Mertz Library and specimens from the William and Lynda Steere Herbarium.

The exhibit also highlights the work of current and former NYBG botanists in the Pacific Islands, including Collaborators in Hawaiian Botany, Drs. Otto and Isa Degener, who explored and documented the flora of Hawai'i in their magnum opus, Flora Hawaiiensis (1932–80), and worked to conserve its ecology.

Bronx scene Lehman Art Gallery upcoming exhibit

in conjunction with the Mexican National Commission of Public Textbooks and the Institute for Mexicans Abroad through the Consulate General of Mexico in New York, will present a major exhibition of 20th century Mexican painting masterpieces from August 13 to September 22.

This special six-week presentation at Lehman College in the Bronx is the only stop in New York and its final stay in the United States on an international tour that has already included showings in Chicago and Los Angeles. The exhibition travels later this fall to Bogotá, Colombia.

Pintando: Colors of Education features more than three dozen paintings by renowned artists like Manuel Felguérez, Leonora Carrington, David Alfredo Siqueiros, Olga Costa, Alfredo Zalce, José Luis Cuevas, Luis Nishizawa, and Jorge González Camarena.

The exhibition, curated by Laura H. Bazán of the Mexican National Commission of Public Textbooks, includes paintings that are widely recognized as treasures of Mexican heritage, all commissioned by the National Commission of Public Textbooks to illustrate the covers of books used in Mexico's schools.

Many of the paintings in Pintando, which were created between 1960-62 and 1987-88, depict Mexico's national heroes and leaders of the country's social movements and struggle for independence. The paintings also include landscapes of its countryside, with allegory and symbols that depict the mother country in images that embody civic virtues. The work of the exhibited artists, who belonged to the Mexican art movements El Muralismo and La Ruptura, also shows a deep commitment to education and a great sense of national pride.

A related program series, sponsored by the Jamie Lucero Mexican Studies Institute at the City University of New York, which is based at Lehman College, will feature lectures by Mexican and Mexican-American visual artists. The lectures will take place on three consecutive Tuesdays in September at the Lehman College Art Gallery. The programs, which begin at 1 p.m., are free and open to the public.

The Lehman College Art Gallery, have played an important role, both as artists and as muses in many works in the exhibition. Arroyo will delve into the fascinating story of the women who served as models for the different textbooks' iconic cover images.

September 11 - Felipe Galindo: Art in Textbooks as a Reflection of the Artistic Panorama in Mexico: Galindo will speak from his personal experience about the art movements and cultural policies in Mexico which influenced the images on the covers of student textbooks between 1959 and 1987

September 18 - Diego Anaya: The Impact of an Image Through Time : Anaya will explore how images linger in our memory without us knowing their origins or purposes, and how we create personal associations that give images our own meanings.

Pintando: Colors of Education at Lehman College celebrates an agreement signed this year between the college, the Jaime Lucero Mexican Studies Institute, and eight of Mexico's public universities to generate more student and faculty exchange opportunities.

Lehman College has deep ties with the nation of Mexico. In 2013, the college became the only official recipient in the United States of an Olmec Head. The statue—a replica of "The King"— was the first sculpture of its kind to be unearthed in San Lorenzo Tenochtitlán, Veracruz, Mexico in 1964. The replica, a gift from Mexico to celebrate the first anniversary of the Mexican Studies Institute at CUNY, was installed adjacent to Lehman College's main plaza

Historic stained glass at Scott Place Cafe

The Fort Schuyler Hotel occupied the southeast corner of East Tremont and Puritan avenues for many years. The northeast corner was occupied by Polchinski Marble.

The address of the hotel was 3271 East Tremont Avenue where Crown Monuments now stands. It's location, directly across the street form the main entrance to St. Raymond Cemetery must have induced the owner to place a sign in the window that read: "Come in, have Louis Richter and operated as a drink, take a seat, it's better



here than across the street."

Many, who passed that way, including myself, recall that sign when the hotel was later turned into a tavern. You could see it from the bus window and it was often commented upon. The building was owned by a café, restaurant, bar and grill

as well as a catering facility. The building also showcased a beautiful stained glass panel that read: "FORT SCHUYLER HOTEL," and although the business has been closed for many years, the stained glass panel was rescued and still exists

The savior was local historian, Ron Schliessman. Both he and his father were famous for photographing scenes in the East Bronx and collecting all sorts of memorabilia. The "FORT SCHULYER HOTEL" sign ended up in the loft of his barn on B Street with thousands of other collectibles and when he was moving up to Franklin, New York with his family, he told me to come over and see if there was anything I wanted. I looked around and took a few bottles but really had no room to store all the great items he had accumulated. I called John Collazzi and the two of us decided to rescue the

stained glass panel.


It was in many pieces so we gathered them all up and John got a price for the restoration work. We then decided to sell off the bottles and paper collectibles to raise the money to pay for the stained glass work. We lugged it out to City Island being as careful as we could so as not to cause any further damage and making sure that we had all the pieces. This was in August of 1997 and it took a good while to get it back from the restorer as he had to locate the correct colored glass to match the original. When we did get it back, it looked great.

When the Bronx Times Reporter moved to Calhoun Avenue, John installed the panel in his office. I wonder how many people even noticed it there.

It now has a much nicer and more visible home and those wishing to view it can now stop by the Scott Place Café at 3602C East Tremont Avenue (since closed).

It is worrisome that the basic and underlying principles for which, and upon which, the nation was founded are under attack. There can be little doubt that those on the extreme left clearly have a very different vision, not just of what America should be, but whether it's guiding principles are worthy of existing at all.

Increasingly, the concept of free speech has been assaulted by those who would force their partisan views of political correctness and acceptance of censorship upon the citizenry. Academic institutions harass, intimidate, and force out students and teachers who dare to challenge left wing orthodoxy. Media and internet powers ignore contrary views and engage in efforts to delete opinions that conflict with theirs. Officials, during the Administration Ohama sought to place federal monitors in news rooms. New

York's Senator Schumer actually introduced legislation to limit the application of the First Amendment towards paid political speech. Socalled campaign regulations move far beyond guaranteeing fair and transparent elections and into the realm of actively discouraging average citizens from competing with career professionals in running for office.

Consider also the comments of Obama-era Attorney General Loretta Lynch, who openly considered criminally prosecuting anyone who merely expressed verbal disagreement with Barack's views on climate change.

Similarly, the actions of the Obama-era Environmental Protection Agency in believing that it could, even in cases where no clear environmental issue is at stake, control the actions of landowners on their own property is a major cause for alarm.

The Declaration itself discussed the threat of bureaucracy over elected government, when it complained that the King "... erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance."

Unable to win at the ballot box, the Left has engaged in street riots, intimidation of its opposition, and the harassment of White House appointees. Once again, this was a type of action mentioned in the Declaration, when it complained that King George III "excited domestic insurrections amongst us..."

provements) by the middle of August, said Mastromano.

"Because of the testing, the DOH asks us to put our most at-risk patients on water restrictions," said the CEO, adding "We made a decision that instead of just focusing on those, we were going to put everyone on water restrictions."

As of August 2, some 15,000 bottles of water were distributed at the hospital.

The hospital has also checked to see if anyone had Legionella that was acquired elsewhere, going back as far as two-months. They hadn't, said the CEO.

Silvio Mazzella, Jacobi Medical Center's Community Advisory Board chairman, said that he has received regular updates about the Legionella concern from the CEO and top hospital officials.

"The way Jacobi handled it, I got good feelings," said Mazzella. "They immediately notified me and told me how they were going to handle it.'

Mazzella said that the hospital showed they care about patients and staff, and that all stakeholders were informed in an appropriate manner.

They actually took the worry away because of their concern and showed that they actually cared." said Mazzella. "I was very proud of them."

The hospital was well-prepared, he added.

This is not the first outbreak of Legionella in the borough in recent years.

Earlier this year, several people contracted Legionnaires disease in Co-op City leading to one fatality.

In 2015, in the 15 cooling towers in

zip code - were found to have Legionella, with 13 people testing positive for Legionnaires' Disease.

That very same year, a Legionella the 10461 zip code - which is Jacobi's outbreak killed 12 in the south Bronx.

"I want to see justice for my son after this honor. Thank you so much for the honor, but I want more; I want justice for my son. I don't know what else to say. I have too much emotion," said Junior's mother Leandra Guzman-Feliz during the announcement of the street renaming proposal.

Growing up, Junior had dreamed of being a police detective. Since January he had enrolled in the NYPD Explorers program in the 45th Precinct.

Bruce and Howard Bendell, owners of City World Automotive, strong supporters of the program, contributed a generous \$25,000 to the Explorers program in the wake of Junior's passing.

The NYPD has also established two \$5,000 scholarships to be given to two high school graduate explorers in Junior's name.

"There is no better way to honor a young man whose stated dream was to become one of the greatest detectives in the world than by establishing a memorial scholarship in his honor,' Police Commissioner James O'Neill said.

Celebrities like Cardi B, Carmello and Lala Anthony have all contributed and paid respects to Junior and his family as well.

Right now his intermediate school is looking for a fitting way to remember the young man. One idea being considered was a scholarship fund in his honor.




