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

Judge to city: Show St. Peter's proof

A move by the city to block the releasing of documents related to the controversial opening of a St. Peter's Avenue homeless shelter in August 2009 has been denied by the Supreme Court Appellate Division.

The case of Westchester Square v. the Department of Homeless Services was allowed to proceed into the discovery phase when Associate Justice Leland DeGrasse denied a motion by the city's lawyers to stop the release of documents and testimony related to the opening of shelter at 1564 St. Peter's Avenue.

The decision upholds Bronx Supreme Court Justice Geoffrey Wright's decision in May that granted the merchants and residents of Westchester Square, along with the city Comptroller's office which has joined in the suit, the right discovery, said Square attorney Steven Kaufman. These actions are part of the "Article 78" proceeding.

"Now we go through discovery," Kaufman said. "We bring in some depositions, and we want them to produce documents -- the whole nine yards."

The plaintiffs in the suit are going to show that the city acted improperly when it opened the shelter, Kaufman said.

The issue at stake is can the city take a building planned as a permanent residential facility and convert it into a shelter without going through the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure or Fair-Share

way station is getting a face lift.

Work is already underway to spruce up the station, and it is expected to be completed by February. The upgrade will in-

clude an exterior paint job and removal of all loosehanging netting. There will be several measures to combat the severe problem of pigeon feces that plagues both the elevated station itself. and Amendola Plaza, which sits an street level.

The MTA is installing systems to deter pigeons, such as spikes, repellent gel and a sonic repellent system. It also pledges to clean all pigeon droppings at the station and will install a "Do Not Feed the Pigeons" sign.

Train service will not be affected by the ongoing improvements. Pelham Pay is the terminus of the #6 IRT line.

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Co-op City resident

Manuel Rodriguez uses the Pelham Bay Park station several times a week. He agreed that it could use an upgrade.

"Sure it needs work," he said, pointing to a large pile of bird droppings. "It's ugly.'

But Sharlee Benjamin of Pelham Bay said she has no opinion about what the station looks like, she just needs the train to run on time

"I don't think it's necessary," she said. "But as long as it doesn't get in the way of my commute."

The MTA did not release figures on the cost of the project, and all work is being done in-house by MTA employees.

The agency is also exploring the possibility of improvements to the station's platform and canopy as part of its 2012-14 Capital Program but does not yet have the funding.



Bad road bend leads to tragedy

On Monday, November 28, at 2:50 p.m., I witnessed a tragic accident. A van and a motorcycle collided, both driving at a speed of 35 to 40 mph.

The driver of the van was in the left lane, the cyclist was in the right lane, both driving towawrds East Tremont Avenue. As they were rounding the bend on Bronxdale Avenue in front of the Con Edison facility, the driver of the van swung into the right lane because the vehicle in front of him was making a left turn onto Pierce Avenue.

The van, not seeing the cyclist in the right lane, caused both to collide.

The cyclist was thrown 6 to 8 feet in the air, landing on his back and head and was not wearing a helmet. He died upon impact.

Many school children cross Bronxdale Avenue by the gym for fear of the Con Edison trucks, which exit the property on Bronxdale Avenue, while walking to school.

Bronxdale Avenue has a blind spot where the road bends at the Con Ed site. By the time you seen an oncoming vehicle while crossing the street, it's too late.



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
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Chamber donates 30,000 toys for the holiday season

45th Precinct celebrates 2011 major crime reduction

Crime in the 45th Precinct is significantly down in 2011, and with 2012 rapidly approaching, Captain Russell Green and Councilman Jimmy Vacca took the opportunity to thank some of the people responsible for the decrease.

Reported incidents are down over 13 percent, and according to Vacca, the 45th is on pace to have the largest decline of any precinct in the city.

Vacca and Green presented certificates of thanks at the precinct's Community Council meeting on Thursday, December 1 at Villa Maria Academy. They singled out three groups responsible for the great results - the precinct's detective squad, its corps of auxiliary officers and the Co-op City security force, which works closely with the NYPD in patrolling the massive housing complex.

Members of the 45th Precinct's detective squad handle over 180 cases each over the course of a year. Yet according to Green, they handle the workload with aplomb. The unit has also been key in investigating the 45th this year.

"They have a tremendous case-closing rate," he said.

Green and Vacca also thanked the precinct's auxiliary officers for volunteering their time and taking some of the pressure off of the paid, full-time officers.

"These men and women are volunteering their time, some are retired, some work full-time jobs, some are students," Green said, "They're really an amazing unit. They're always there for us. Always available."

Lieutenant Joseph Giattino of Pelham Bay works as a custodial engineer for the NYC Department of Education, yet still makes himself available as an auxiliary officer.

"You find the time to do something you enjoy," he said.

Giattino pointed to "camaraderie" and the chance to "work with good cops" as the things that keeping him coming back to police work. The 45th Precinct is

also responsible for patrolling Co-op City, which would be a very manpower draining task if not for the

murders, with six cases in assistance of the housing complex's security force. The guards are employed by RiverBay Corporation, not the NYPD, but they work closely with the 45th.

"It's an amazing place, it's a city within a city," Green said of Co-op City. "Every time I go there, I still get lost.

"It's a joy to watch (the security force's) work. The one thing I'm really impressed with is their investigation (procedure). They have great surveillance and are always posting pictures, keeping people aware in real time."

Frank Apollo is the chief of the Co-op City security force and has worked in Co-op security for 25 years. He said the working relationship between his unit and the 45th Precinct is as strong as he can remember.

"The cooperation allows us to keep crime rates low in Co-op City" Apollo said. "And the relationship expands to both (Green's) troops, and my troops as well.

And lest anyone forget Green's role in the crime reduction. Vacca said simply "he's on the money."

CB 10 urges constituents to consider

A new program run by the city's Department of **Environmental Protection** will issue \$4 million worth of grants to private property owners, business owners and not-for-profit organizations to install green infrastructure that is intended to reduce flooding, sewer overflow and pollution in the event of heavy rain. But according to Community Board 10 district manager Ken Kearns, denizens of his area are not taking full advantage of the program a trend he is baffled by considering how live in close proximity to the water.

Applications for the grants are due on Wednesday. February 15 and are available on the DEP's web site.

A DEP press release on the program said that "preference for grants will be given to projects in DEP's priority watersheds and those that can provide evidence that they will create further benefits such as increased shade, decreased energy use for cooling buildings,

increased awareness about storm water management, and increased community stewardship.'

No part of CB 10 falls within a "priority watershed area," but Kearns still feels homeowners would be making a mistake not to at

least apply for the grants.

"It would prevent pollution in Eastchester Bay, it would prevent flooding, and it would create pleasant-looking green spaces," he said. "You have a lot of organizations or co-op boards in these neighborhoods."

The DEP is expecting to see proposals that involve rain-collecting mechanisms such as cisterns. green roofs, porous pavement and rain gardens. Ideally the systems would limit the flow of excess rain water into sewer systems and use it to support vegetation.

Marcia Pavlica, president of the Country Club Civic Association, said she planned to learn more about the program and possibly encourage participation in her neighborhood. "I'm looking forward to disseminating the information," she said. I think we are much more environmentally aware now, and the only right thing to do is be concerned (about the environment)."

Dottie Poggi, president of Friends of Ferry Point Park, said she was aware of the program and has begun filling out the application, but was daunted at first by its complexity.



Parks to remove invasive plants from OB Road

Turtle Cove plant diversity to attract birds

The continuation of the ecological restoration Pelham Bay Park's Turtle Cove will now expand west from the cove into the wooded area along Orchard Beach Road.

Since 2009, the inlet from Eastchester Bay known as Turtle Cove has been getting a lot of care from the Parks Department as part of an ongoing restoration of native vegetation and removal of invasive plants which cripple the natural habitat. Parks has also installed a new footbridge as part of the Siwanov hiking trail.

The upcoming phase of work includes the removal of invasive plants and the replanting of native vegetation on 11.5 acres. The phase on the narrow woodland between the back fence of the Turtle Cove Driving Range and Orchard Beach Road should be complete

within two years, according to a draft of the Parks Department contract dated Wednesday, November 30.

Bloomberg's Mavor MillionTreesNYC initiative has greatly aided in providing the necessary funding to make the project a reality, said Pelham Bay Park administrator Marianne Anderson.

"This is going to create a more diverse plant life that is going to attract wildlife," Anderson said. "The MillionTreesNYC project has been a godsend in terms of funding projects like this."

Currently, the location is overrun with invasive plants including Porcelainberry, Mile-A-Minute, and Oriental Bittersweet, Anderson said. People driving through the park on Orchard Beach Road can expect to see some changes in the next year as the forest is cleared of invasive plants, Anderson said.

"We have had quite a bit of complaints about the state of the forest, with trees that are primarily black locusts falling down left and right," Anderson said. "They will notice an improvement right away by how clean it looks."

Currently, the forest looks like it has a veil growing under it. Soon motorists driving by will see something that is a little more idyllic, Anderson said.

The Friends of Pelham Bay Park have assisted in the removal of the invasive plants in the area, and have already noticed more wildlife, including birds, around Turtle Cove, said the organization's president Lizbeth Gonzalez.

Gonzalez said, "The removal of invasive plants and shrubs is incredibly hard work, and we get scratched and poked by the thorns that are suffocating native plant growth."





He also worked into the book the summer he spent working at a concession stand at Orchard Beach, and other experiences he had while growing up, he said.

Lazellari is a graduate of Truman High School and Rutgers University.

In 1999, Lazellari's short story "The Date" was published in Playboy Magazine's fiction issue, and he worked for years at Marvel Comics prior to his current role at a major financial services media company.

The novel was written in spurts throughout the 1990s, and after his college graduation, a more polished draft was completed in 2003.

Awakenings was then revised again several times before it, and two follow-up novels, were finally sold.

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

Several events occurring during the past week highlight the extraordinary danger this nation faces due to our declining military strength.

Following the failure of the Super Committee to address the budget deficit, drastic automatic cuts to our defense budget are scheduled to be emplaced. They will decimate an armed force that has already shrunk by half since 1990. As we have previously reported, the Navy has been cut from 600 ships to 288, the Army has been reduced from 18 to 10 divisions, and the Air Force has crashed from 37 combat wings to 20. We have not spent less on defense as a proportion of GDP since 1940. Over the last 10 years alone, the percentage of our federal budget spent on defense has dropped from an already reduced 15.6% to 14.6%.

Plans to modernize the equipment we still maintain, including artillery, bombers and ships that, in some cases, were first operated by the grandfathers of our current soldiers, sailors, Marines and pilots have been canceled, delayed or threatened. The



dream of rendering American soil safe from missile attacks has been largely abandoned, thanks to opposition from the White House and congressional liberals, despite the success of the technology needed to do so. While we have let our

guard down, our adversaries have been rapidly preparing for conflict on a massive scale.

On November 29. China dispatched its new aircraft carrier back to sea. This follows Beijing's announcement of an extraordinary new pulse weapon that could disable our fleet from a great distance. China has engaged in space-related weaponry that could largely blind all of our defense systems. Their armed forces are already larger than ours; within the next several years, their technology will outstrip us, as well.

Russia is modernizing its already potent armed

forces. After bullving President Obama into making unnecessary and inappropriate concessions on missile defense. Moscow, also on November 29, activated additional missile defense radars, and is threatening to do far more. While the White House abides by an already lopsided START treaty, the Kremlin continues to threaten to tear up provisions that do not benefit it. It has been the often stated goal of the Putin/Medvedev regime to make Russia's armed forces second to none. The Obama Adminis-

tration has justified its opposition to key weapons projects by claiming that future combat will be of a low-scale, asymmetrical nature. The unprecedented buildup by both Russia and China herald a scale of fighting that resembles a world war rather than a mere guerrilla campaign.

Unfortunately, the bad news doesn't stop there. North Korea's nuclear program and the continued threats of its leadership to wage war over imagined threats and slights renders a nuclear assault

Some time later, I found out that those gifts were the only gifts they received that Christmas. They did not even have a tree to put them



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

Ozzie Yon is confident that if he builds it, they will come

"It" is a baseball diamond, but Yon is not a farmer from Iowa like Kevin Costner's character who builds his own field in the movie Field of Dreams. He's a construction project manager from Pelham Bay. And his field would be in Ferry Point Park, not a cornfield.

Yon, a baseball enthusiast, wants to build a brandnew, top-of-the-line baseball field in Ferry Point Park. He is organizing a group of colleagues from the construction industry who are experience in the construcwilling to build the field free of charge, if they can find donors for the necessary materials.

Any construction would have to be approved by the city's Parks Department. Yon said he has reached out to Bronx borough commissioner Hector Aponte and is

awaiting a face-to-face meeting.

He and his enlisted colleagues have been making in a condition where it's safe trips to the field every other weekend since late summer. plotting how they could install a regulation diamond.

"I've used that park since when I was a kid," the 35-year-old Yon said. "We had cookouts, and softball was a popular sport back then. As we're getting older we are looking to give back to our community. A lot of my peers, we're starting to see there's a lack of activities for kids.



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Big G ready to serve the Feast of Seven Fishes

For Giordano's Big G, who has a great reputation for high quality meats and seafood year round, the Christmas season is a time when many customers choose Giordano's to stock up on fish for Christmas Eve.

Located in the heart of the Morris Park community at the corner of Sacket and Paulding avenues, Giordano's Big G sees a big increase in fish sales as southern Italian and Sicilian families choose to stay local to buy fish for the Christmas Eve Feast of the Seven Fishes. said owner Carl Giordano.

Many of the families in the community celebrate the Feast of the Seven Fishes, also know as The Vigil or La Vigilia, which is a commemoration of the wait for the midnight birth of the baby Jesus.

Families typically stock up on seven fishes, but sometimes more. Often they purchase king crab, shrimp, sword fish, calamari, mussels, cod fish, octopus, filet of sole, salmon, smelts, baklava, and other delights, Giordano said.

"One of my busiest holidays here is Christmas Eve because of the increase in sales of fish. Most people buy seven fishes, but some choose to do more."

Variety is the key to making sure that a Feast of the Seven Fishes celebration is a success. While the origin of the celebration is unclear, the Feast of the Seven fishes may be a reflection of the seven sacraments, and seven deadly sins, which are central to the Roman Catholic heritage. Some families also choose to eat 10 fishes on Christmas Eve, possibly in remembrance of the 10 stations of the cross, or even 13 fishes, remembering the 12 disciples and Jesus.

Fish prices remain very stable during the holiday season, expect when market demands on very fresh fish may call for slightly higher prices, Giordano said.

"A lot of the really best fish comes frozen from other parts of the country. so the price doesn't fluctuate much," Giordano said. "Most of the really good seafood, like King Crab, is a frozen product."

One of the largest holiday favorites for the feast is baklava, a salted cod, Giordano stated.

"A big thing with the Italians is baklava, which has to be soaked for three or four days," Giordano said.

Giordano's Big G celebrated its 30th anniversary in business in 2007, effectively starting after Giordano chose to leave working at a supermarket and go into the wholesale food business, which was originally located in Throggs Neck. He gradually expanded into the retail side, and today carries all types of meats and seafood, including large platters, sometimes at a flat price that is cheaper than buying the pieces individually. The family owned business is located at 1554 Paulding Avenue.

Giordano is a frequent contributor to local fundraisers, and he is grateful for his customers's loval patronage and hopes to continue to make the familyowned store a success for many years to come.

The story of Anne Hutchinson, a revolutionary

Toby Liederman held a dinner celebrating the close of the Anne Hutchinson year at Artie's on City Island last Thursday. The occasion reminded me that it's been a good while since I've written church. He was, in effect, sianything substantive about this indomitable woman who has both a major parkway and a river named in her honor. That's quite an accomplishment for someone who lived in the area we now call the Bronx for such a short period of time.

Anne Hutchinson was born in Alford, England in 1591 and was the daughter of an Anglican minister and teacher by the name of Francis Marbury. The trouble was that Francis was somewhat revolutionary in his ideals and practices often putting him at odds with the

As the crowds continued to grow, men also began appearing and the authorities grew alarmed that a woman could attract such crowds at a time when women were still cast in an inferior mold. This one woman dared to be different and Boston would never be the same.

She was placed under arrest in the home of a friend of the court in Roxbury until the religious trial could be held.

The religious trial was held in Boston on March 22, 1638 and it was no surprise that she was found guilty and excommunicated from the church.

The Nets And Dwight Howard

Marc Stein and Chad Ford (ESPN.com) wrote about how the Nets are looking ahead to take over the back pages in NY's papers. "The New Jersey Nets are prepared to offer a trade package featuring Brook Lopez and two future first-round picks to acquire Dwight Howard before the Orlando Magic center becomes a free agent in July 2012, according to sources close to the situation.

Sources told ESPN.com this week that, to sweeten the proposal, New Jersev would likewise offer to take back the contract of Magic forward Hedo Turkoglu, who has three seasons left on his contract worth just under \$35 million. Absorbing Turkoglu's remaining salary would become financially feasible for the Nets after the expected release of swingman Travis Outlaw through the amnesty clause that will be included in the NBA's new collective bargaining agreement and by including another smaller contract or two in the deal. It's been an open secret around the league that the Nets' dream scenario is pairing Howard with DeronWilliams, after they followed up their failed pursuit of Carmelo Anthony last season by trading for Williams just before the February trade deadline. Kennedy's quick start routs Gompers

Knights get back to their winning ways

You knew there was something amiss last winter when Johnny Mathis didn't talk about Madison Square Garden other than taking in a Knicks game.

The legendary John F. Kennedy boys basketball coach always talks about getting to the Garden, site of the PSAL Class AA finals, but with a diminished roster, it was unrealistic. Tuesday, after the improved Knights opened the league season with an impressive 71-53 victory over Gompers, he was back at it.

"The ultimate goal is to win the big one," he said.

That, more than the victory, spoke volumes about Kennedy, which manhandled Gompers though talented wings Terry Larrier and Bashier Ahmed didn't find their groove. Instead, the Knights received balanced scoring – five different players scored at least nine points – with Larrier leading the way with 14, Ahmed following with 12, Jason Nunez had 10 and David Hardy and Alfonso Davis notched nine apiece.

Nunez made the play of the evening, flying out of bounds to save a loose ball while landing across a chair and water cooler, which led to an uncontested layup for Ahmed. The two points didn't make much of a difference – Kennedy was comfortably ahead at that point – but it displayed Kennedy's hunger so early in the year.

Mathis was most impressed with his team's defensive effort on Gompers star Carlos Galan. The high-scoring junior guard, who averaged 25 points per game last year to lead Bronx AA, was held to just 10 points. Kennedy (2-0, 1-0 Bronx AA) forced the ball out of his hands, double-teaming him on the wing with the long-armed Larrier or Ahmed and a quick guard.

"We take a lot of pride in our defense," said Nunez, the younger brother of Louisville freshman Angel Nunez. Jordan Webb led Gompers (0-1, Bronx AA) with 16 points. The Panthers got within 61-51 in the 4th quarter, but Kennedy answered with eight straight points.

Kennedy got out of the gate slow, until a 13-0 run to end the first half created a 35-23 margin at halftime. Larrier, a transfer from Sacred Heart in Yonkers, and Ahmed showed what they are capable of at points. Larrier sank back-to-back long 3-pointers while Ahmed did a little bit of everything. from finishing inside, rebounding and leading Kennedy in transition and creating opportunities for his teammates.

Last season's 4th-place finish and second-round playoff loss didn't sit well at Kennedy, which is used to winning, Mathis said. Early in the year, the Knights seem prepared to bring back that tradition. Part of that would be a Bronx AA title.

RUNNING STARS Wilson, Hayes pull away from Cross

Tyler Wilson saw Holy Cross as the perfect litmus test for his Cardinal Hayes team. How the Cardinals fare against the Knights, a perennial 'AA' contender, will determine just where they stand after moving up from the 'A.'

"I always talked about it before the season started," Wilson said of the season opener. "This game right here is gonna tell us where we're at. If we win, we're gonna be able to compete with the Christ the Kings and St. Raymonds. If we lose, we still got more work to do."

By his own estimation, Cardinal Hayes may have already proven itself to be among the league's elite.

Wilson had five of his seven points and two key assists in the fourth quarter to help lead Hayes to a 56-44 win over Holy Cross in a nonleague boys basketball game between two CHSAA Class AA teams Friday night in Flushing.

"I feel like we proved to everybody that we're a good team instead of all talk," Fairfield-bound big man Amadou Sidibe said.

Hayes (1-0) was going to be a talented bunch coming into the season even before Rice closed and Wilson, Naasir Williams, Shavar Newkirk and Chris Robinson ended up at the Bronx school. Now the Cardinals, on paper, look like an immediate 'AA' contender.

Wilson made sure that label stuck Friday. Cross (0-1) was down just 40-35 when he swooped into the lane for a timely basket and foul. The junior lead guard made the free throw to put Hayes up 43-35 with 4:54 left.

He scored again on his team's next possession and, right after that, found Donovan Johnson in transition for a basket and all of a sudden Hayes had a 7-0 run and was up 47-35. Eddie Roscigno responded with a three-point play for Holy Cross, but Wilson drove and dished again, this time to Sidibe for a huge three-point play that have the Cardinals a 50-38 lead with 3:37 left.

"He's tough to stay in front of," Hayes coach Joe Lods said. "He got the ball to the right guys in the opportune situations and made me look like I know what I'm doing."

The 6-foot-8 Sidibe led a balanced scoring attack with 13 points and 6-foot-7 forward Jalen Jenkins, another lengthy future Division I forward, had 10 points. Fadil Yacoubou had eight points, Shavar Newkirk had

six and Williams and Johnson each had five.

"Last year, I would think we would have folded under this pressure," Sidibe said. "But we didn't fold, we rose above it."

Holy Cross routed Hayes in its season opener last year. On Friday, the Knights struggled shooting from the outside. Marquise Moore led them with 12 points and Will Davis and Roscigno each added 10. The Cardinals' size and length was bothersome inside.

"When you're not making your perimeter shots and can't get to the basket,

it doesn't leave much," Cross coach Paul Gilvary said.

Gilvary scoffed at the notion that Hayes was not a viable 'AA' team and he doesn't believe there's any talk about it.

"Anybody who questions that hasn't been paying attention the last couple years," he said. "What do they have five, six Division I players on the team? How many do you have to have to be a 'AA' team? They're gonna do very well. They're gonna have a very good season, I'm sure."

Friday was a good way to start.

Mother Frances Hernandez brought her two children, Julian, 9, and Charlie, 4, to the tree lighting.



Analysis, which is mandated by the City Charter. Bonizio said. The city has been relying on a decision in the case of Ferrer v. Dinkins, which gave the city the right to operate a homeless shelter in a transient facility, like a motel, if an emergency was declared. Bonizio stated.

"We were very blessed to have a judge who did not rubber stamp the arguments made by the city but had the guts to look into it," Bonizio said.

The Bloomberg Administration's policies on affordable housing and housing the homeless have led to an increase in homelessness, said Square plaintiff Sandi Lusk

"[The administration] has steadfastly refused to be realistic about the causes of homelessness. [and] the critical need to transition the homeless into permanent housing or allow them to enter public housing," Lusk stated.

The city has used dubious and underhanded methods to warehouse a growing population at "at risk" buildings like the St. Peter's Avenue facility, and over-

whelmed communities by bypassing normal ULURP proceedings and hearings, Lusk said.

"We hope the discovery in our case will shed some light on these machinations, which have been going on in the shadows for too long," Lusk said.

The lawsuit lacks merit and the city Law Department is confident that the city satisfied all applicable requirements when it opened the shelter for families with children, a Law Department spokeswoman said. The shelter will remain open as the case moves into discovery, said

Seth Diamond, Department of Homeless Services commissioner.

"We disagree with the court's denial to hear our appeal," Diamond said. "However, we believe in a transparent process and are working expeditiously to respond to the petitioners' discovery requests. At the same time, we will continue to provide contractbased services with full supports at St. Peter's shelter to homeless families with children, working with them to return to the community in permanent housing as quickly as possible."

the corner of Pelham Parkway and Stillwell Avenue, which is the first turn into Pelham Gardens from Pelham Parkway.

DOT claims that the light was installed right before Thanksgiving after a request from a resident and a study of the intersection. Local residents are not happy about the new light, which replaced a stop sign on Stillwell Avenue, and claim that it is actually creating traffic and congestion.

"I honestly do not understand why this light was installed to begin with. That area was fine with just a stop sign," said Vincent Prezioso, president of the North East Bronx Community Association. "What's cause a huge problem with worse is the timing, right in the middle of all the Pelham Parkway reconstruction project. I've talked to plenty of people about this new light and we're all verv disappointed."

Prezioso said that he and other local residents were caught off-guard with the light installation and that he had never heard anydiscussion on the matter.

Several complaints have already been made to Community Board 11 and the office of Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. According to Prezioso, the limited space on Stillwell Avenue between Pelham Parkway North and Pelham Parkway causes cars to back up onto Pelham Parkway.

"The backed up cars

the traffic light camera on Pelham Parkway. If a car is waiting at the new traffic light but is stuck on Pelham Parkway, that camera will go off," Prezioso said. "There's just a lot of issues that can be caused by this light, especially during the daily rush hour."

Backed up traffic could also block the BX 12 bus lane, which stops on Pelham Parkway immediately before Stillwell Avenue, Prezioso said.

According to a spokesperson for DOT, the agency recently inspected the location again and is planning to make adjustments to the signal's timing to avoid traffic buildup on Stillwell Avenue.



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
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
