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

OUTLE MALL FOR CINEPLEX

Screen to go dark at Whitestone

A major Bronx cineplex could soon be a "Woodbury Commons" type retail outlet mall.

The Whitestone Cinemas at 2505 Bruckner Boulevard, home to the Whitestone Multiplex Cinema since 1983 and a drive-in theater before that which opened in the 1950s was sold for a reported \$30 million.

Sources said that the buyer is now putting together a team that in the next few weeks will begin outreach and planning to develop a mall.

The site on Bruckner Boulevard was sold Wednesday, May 9 from the movie amusement company KBT Theaters LLC of Norwood, MA to a subsidiary of the real-estate holding company Lightstone Group, according to

the city Department of Finance website.

Community Board 10 district manager Kenneth Kearns said that he had heard about plans to develop the site into a Woodbury Commons-style outlet mall, but at that time it was not confirmed.

There is also a lease agreement on file for KBT Theaters to continue leasing the property.

A spokeswoman for the Lightstone Group declined comment on the property and its future use.

Any business or non-profit that would bring large amounts of truck traffic would cause issues because the roadway infrastructure nearby needs a great deal of repair, said Jim McQuade, chair of CB 10's Economic Development Committee. If there were

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Locals not surprised at Throggs Neck vet's arrest

The arrest of a local veterinarian charged with illegally dumping euthanized house pets off a highway came as no surprise to a number of Throggs Neck locals.

Dr. Andrew Manesis. 66, of New Canaan, CT, owner of Throggs Neck Animal Hospital at 3800 E. Tremont Avenue, was charged May 29 with petit larceny, scheme to defraud and violating environmental conservation law.

Officials say Manesis was paid by pet owners to dispose of the animals in a dignified manor.

Throggs Neck local Amanda Morley said she was not completely surprised when she heard about the charges against Manesis.

"Growing up, I always had cats, and so there were times when I needed to bring them there," Morley said. "He was a miserable human being and he just seemed mean, like he had no care for the animals he treated, so when I heard about the story I wasn't completely surprised. But it's heartbreaking."

Morley said she will not be bringing her cats to that hospital any more.

"As convenient and close as that place is, I will not be going back," she said.

Mari Aponte, a Throggs Neck resident who brings her dog Kobe to the animal

liked Menasis and thought he was very friendly, and although her husband thought he was very "money hungry", she continued to use his services.

After she learned of the allegations brought against the veterinarian, Aponte said she was shocked.

"I was uncomfortable when I heard what happened," Aponte said. "You feel like you can't even trust

Aponte said she started using the hospital five years ago, when she decided to switch veterinarians.

"I used to bring my pet to Manhattan, but this place was closer, so it was easier," she said. "But now, I am going to take him back to Manhattan."

Some 35 euthanized pets were found by a NYS Department of Transportation worker in black plastic garbage bags along the Hutchinson River Parkway in Westchester County.

Manesis, who has been in business in the Bronx since 1981, was arrested on Friday after being pulled over in Portchester.

According to police, the motive for Manesis dumping the euthanized animals along the highway is unknown.

hospital, said she always police and the Humane Law Enforcement Division of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals of Westchester.

The investigation began April 5 when 26 dead cats, eight dogs and a lizard were found in brush along the highway.

After determining all of the animals were individually owned, detectives used indentification from one of dead cats to track down the owner, who then led them to

Police also used evidence from the scene to track down two other owners and link the cases to Manesis' animal hospital.

Pitbull owner James Chiu, who was shopping for his pet at the Schuvler Pets store on E. Tremont Avenue, said he felt Menasis was just out to make money and didn't really care about the animals he was treating.

"I've been there twice, and his services were less than mediocre for the amount of money he charges," Chiu said. "I was not impressed with him for what I paid for."

The owner of a pet store, who asked not to be identified, said he has heard a number of people complain about the vet.

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



Unwanted sidewalk hampering safety

A major fire safety issue along a Pelham Parkway service road could also see already scarce parking spaces disappearing.

Local officials are furious a new unwanted sidewalk is hampering fire engines making turns and they want it torn up.

Tower ladders also have trouble fully extending their stabilizers to keep from tipping while trying to reach apartment buildings along the road from reps met May 30 at Community White Plains Road to just bevond Williamsbridge Road.

Residents already have lost parking on the south side of the service road because of parkway buses being diverted during reconstruction work until the vear's end.

Fire officials say they plan to solve the turning problem by installing NO STANDING fire zones at corners.

One local official sees politics over safety.

"The first test that we were at, we were told clearly the road-

way is too narrow. They could get through, but the roadway was so narrow they can't open doors and use stablizers," said John Fratta, Community Board 11 assistant district manager.

"A second test was demanded by the mayor's office, and now miraculously they would be able to fight a fire," said an angered Fratta. "I think a phone call had to be made to headquarters by the mayors office saying 'not to embarass us.""

Fire and other city agency Board 11 with community and elected officials, who later said they're not satisified with the answers they got.

"What they told us is that they have other streets in the Bronx that are very narrow, so why should this be any different?" said Fratta. "Ours was not. It was made narrower because the city put in an unnecessary sidewalk.



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Morris Park slumlord hit with \$56G in fines

Seven months of tenant organizing at a violationplagued building in lower Morris Park has resulted in more than \$56,000 in fines against the landlord. The property owner is listed with the Department of Buildings as 1662 White Plains Road LLC. But tenants identified him as Val Preluvakaj.

The city Department of Housing Preservation and Development began legal action for basement work without a permit that may have compromised the integrity of the building by removing structural supports during construction.

The tenants of the 17unit apartment building reached out to Councilman Jimmy Vacca, who personally visited the site and has sent his housing specialist Richard Torres numerous times to organize the tenMay 10, a judge responding to a legal action by HPD fined the owner \$56,000, in addition to \$43,000 in DOB. HPD, and Environmental Control Board fines still outstanding.

"This building is on our radar screen, the landlord so far has appeared unwilling to make repairs, and this has gone on long enough," Vacca said. "He is now receiving significant fines and we have court orders insistently that he make the repairs that he is required to make."

The owner of the building has been required to fix all violations within 30 days, and HPD has served him with an order directing the correction of conditions in the building according to guidelines: the most serious "C" violations within 24 hours of receiving the notice. "B" violations within 20 days, and "A" violations

Then on Thursday, after 60 days, Torres said.

If the owner does not comply with the order, he will face a lien against the property, Torres said.

"We have been organizing the tenants for seven months, beginning in October 2011," Torres said. "We were able organize the tenants, and ratchet up the violations count. We have been able to hammer the building owner with HPD and DOB Environmental Control Board violations. We brought it to the attention of HPD, and based on the information and violation count, HPD decided to take the property owner to court for failing to comply with the housing maintenance code."

One building tenant who asked not to be identified said tenants fear speaking out because of possible retaliation by the landlord.

Efforts to reach Preluvakaj were unsuccessful.

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LABOR TROUBLE

We hear **Gov. Cuomo**'s nomination of Bronx Assemblyman **Peter Rivera** as new state labor commissioner might be hitting some rough seas.

Rivera's former law partner and campaign treasurer, **David Griffiths**, 66, was convicted last week in Manhattan federal court of fraud and obstruction of justice in the theft of funds from the ghost-like Parkchester non-profit Neighborhood Enhancement for Training Services (NETS) where he served as executive director. Peter pumped \$2 million in state funds and loans into it, with his son on its payroll.

There's also some question of the Parkchester/Castle Hill pol listing his district residence at the two-bedroom Parkchester apartment where his son's exgirlfriend and son lived.

The full senate still has to vote on his nomination, but it hasn't scheduled a hearing, even with a June 21 senate recess looming.

With no love lost between them, Senator **Ruben Diaz Sr.** told us he plans to demand the senate kill Cuomo's nomination.

Cuomo annnounced his nomination of the first high-ranking Latino to his administration at November's legislative Somos El Futuro confab in San Juan, but some are wondering just how well Cuomo's staff vetted Peter.





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Police warn Italian residents to be leery of local con artist

"Non lasciare che ti con" - Don't let him trick you.

A slick con artist has been making the rounds in the Morris Park community, hitting up Italian-speaking elderly residents for cash. The man walks away only to vanish without a trace.

Officer Jay Sturdivant, one of the 49th Precinct's community affairs officers said he has been hearing anecdotal reports of the trickster. He learned about the latest grift at the May 21 Northeast Bronx Community Association meeting during Police Night.

"He would speak to the victims in Italian and says he know their family members," recalled Sturdivant. "Once he hooks you, that's when he gets money from you, stating that his wife is sick in Rome and he needs

The victims feel obligated to give."

There have been several incidents stretching as far back as a year ago.

The fast-talking thief recently ripped off an elderly Tomlinson Avenue man for \$300 in exchange for scraggly leather jackets.

Sturdivant has counted four victims so far who have met the man in various locations, including Allerton and Morgan avenues. "There could be more," he said, noting that some victims may be too embarassed to report it.

Still, Sturdivant said the NYPD will keep its eyes open for him.

"The NYPD will continue to monitor this situation." said Sturdivant.

Saving City Island Ladder 53 annual budget rite of spring

Here we go again.

The annual rite of spring is on again with City Island's beleaguered Fire Ladder Co. 53.

The unit with the least number of fire runs in the city is reportedly on City Hall's fourth annual budget chopping block, and locals are once again raising the fire alarm.

Residents and a host of electeds, including mayoral contenders, rallied Monday evening, with a diminished number of only a 100 or so showing up this year at a town hall-style meeting.

The mayor's executive budget proposal has called for closing 20 fire companies citywide, and residents of the isolated nautical community are sure Ladder 53 will be one of them. It cannot leave the island, other than for fire runs to nearby Orchard Beach.

Vacca hosted the rally in the gym of St. Mary Star of the Sea School on Minnieford Avenue, telling the crowd: "We have to make sure that no future mayor even considers closing Ladder Company 53.'

Borough Ruben Diaz Jr. said he believes there should be sacred cows in government - and one of them should be public safety.

"It is very upsetting and it is getting pretty ridiculous," Diaz said of the annual budget dance threat to the fire company.

"I think this is important in a community like City Island, where you have wooden homes next to active restaurants," said Manhattan Borough President - and mayoral contender - Scott Stringer.

Fellow mayoral contender and former City Controller Bill Thompson called the budget proposal

Councilman Jimmy a "sick joke" because for the past three years the administration has proposed cutting the companies, and the City Council has always restored the money before the final budget was adopted by the end of June.





The future of American free speech on the internet will be the focus of a key conference this coming December. The meeting will not take place in Washington. or anywhere in the U.S.A. It will not include members of the public, the press, or even any elected officials other than a White House representative.

If that doesn't frighten you enough, then consider this: the most enthusiastic proponents of the event are the Chinese and the Russians. They, along with other members of the United Nations, will convene at the World Conference on International Telecommunications to establish a cyberspace regulatory scheme. The ability to engage in uncensored political speech is on the table.

Some nations, especially China, already engage in internet censorship. Unfortunately, Secretary Clinton's State Department has failed to adequately combat internet censorship, according to the Global Internet Freedom Consortium. In fact, although Congress provided \$50 million in funding to the State Department for this fight, little has been done.

United Nations Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon has echoed those who believe

in at least some censorship by stating that "considering the immediate impact of information in the digital world, journalists must be much more responsible in their work to ensure accuracy, balance and fairness, and not use the media to disseminate hatred or conflict, or incite violence." Unfortunately, the definitions of "accuracy, balance, fairness and inciting" would be left to the same rulers who internet writers may be opposing. The fact is, both governments and other powerful institutions have increasingly killed, arrested or censored internet journal-

China, Russia, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan are introducing a resolution at the U.N. to establish an internet "governance" concept that would insert censorship into this most democratic of me-

Observer Raven Clabough writes that "Last vear, Russian Prime Minister Vladimir Putin met with the head of the [UN's] International Telecommunications Union [ITU] and declared 'in-

ternational control over the internet' to be vital. Former UN Ambassador David Gross contends that "in the...[Decemberl conference...countries such as China and Russia will once again attempt to expand the authority of the ITU.

Concernhasbeenmounting in Washington about the Obama Administration's position on the issue. The major shift could be seen in the White House's acceptance of the innocuous sounding but worrisome Anti-Counterfeiting Trade Agreement, or "ACTA." The general purpose of the measure is to establish global standards and an international legal framework to enforce intellectual property rights, copyright laws, etc., a goal that is clearly in American interest. But both the means it uses to do so, and the manner in which the President imposed its provisions, has caused extraordinary concern to civil libertarians and constitutional traditionalists.

Under the treaty, signed by President Obama last October, foreign interests are entitled to demand that internet service providers (ISPs) remove web content within the United States without any court supervision. This sets a precedent for authoritarian nations to demand that critical political comments be removed from U.S. websites in future treaties. Equally as worrisome

is the manner in which Washington "ratified" the measure. The treaty has been presented by the White House as an "executive agreement," circumventing any interaction with Congress.

Not to be outdone in the realm of acting irresponsibly, our own New York State Senate is considering a bill (deceptively named the "Internet Protection Act") introduced by State Senator Tom O'Mara (R-Elmira) that would provide some control over the internet under the guise of preventing cyberbullying.

The rising threat of governmental censorship and lawsuits is threatening the internet's freedom. Legitimate concerns such as copyright protections can be addressed by simpler cooperative efforts on a state to state level. Last week, on Memorial Day, we honored those who gave their lives to protect our freedom and our Constitution from foreign armies. Will we now surrender them to foreign bureaucrats? This has been the latest development in the four-year quest by the Morris Park Alliance to help the business area achieve a self-sustaining support mechanism.

The meeting, led by senior staff member Jeff Lynch, explained the benefits enjoyed by the business owners after a Business Improvement District is set in place. Services such as improved sanitation, graffiti control, street festivals, cooperative advertising, holiday lighting and much more are all issues discussed during the investigative process. Once the merchants' needs have been established, a steering committee is formed to determine just how the programs will be implemented and the costs associated with them. After the program has been outlined and a budget is

formed the entire package is presented to the City Council for their approval of the program. If all portions of the program meet with the council's approval, a tax surcharge is accessed to each property owner to equitably share the costs associated with the program. The benefit to both the merchant and the landlord is significant. The scheduled events will bring more foot traffic to the community, heighten visibility and increase sales. 



Astronaut, Mario Runco, Jr., from Highbridge

Astronaut Mario Runco Jr. was born on January 26, 1952 and raised in the Bronx at 1215 Nelson Avenue in Highbridge where he attended Sacred Heart Elementary School which is located at 1248 Nelson Avenue just across the street on the next block within view of his home. Upon graduation in 1966, he attended Cardinal Haves High School on the Grand Concourse at 151st Street, graduating in 1970. He then enrolled in City College where he earned a bachelor's degree in Earth and Planetary Science in 1974. He earned his Master of Science degree in Atmospheric Physics from Rutger's Uni-

versity two years later. He worked briefly as a New Jersey State Trooper before enlisting in the Navy in June of 1978 where he worked in a variety of positions. He served aboard the amphibious assault ship USS Nassau as a meteorological officer until December of 1983 after which he taught at the Na-


val Postgraduate School in Monterey, California. His next shipboard assignment was as commander of the USNS Chauvenet, a survey vessel. He was chosen as an astronaut candidate on June 5, 1987 and qualified in August of 1988. Thereafter, he took part in three space flights: 1991, 1993 and 1996 and logged over 551 hours in

His first mission was aboard the Space Shuttle Atlantis which was launched on November 24, 1991 and completed 110 orbits of earth. It successfully launched the 5,200 pound Defense Support System Satellite before landing at Edwards Air Force Base in California on December 1, 1991, several days early. The total time in space for the mission was 6 days, 22 hours, and 50 min-

His next mission was aboard the Space Shuttle Endeavor (STS-54) which was launched from the Kennedy Space Center at Merritt Island, Florida. It was launched on January 13, 1993 and successfully deployed a NASA Tracking and Data Recovery Satellite.

Also of significance to Mario Runco is that he then became the 48th American to walk in space. The space suit, as an aside, cost 10 million dollars. The mission lasted for 5 days, 23 hours, and 38 minutes before returning to the Kennedy Space Center.

His final space mission was aboard Space Shuttle Endeavor (STS-77) which was launched on May 19, 1996. That flight successfully deployed two satellites which included the Spartan

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





"The rabies vaccination is important, number one, because it is the law. and number two, to protect our dogs if they happen to come in contact with other dogs or wildlife that may have rabies."

Hoffman said microchipping is important because if a person's dog happens to get lost and wind up with animal control, staff can scan the microchip and return the dog to its owner.

The alliance will attempt to do six more clinics for dogs and cats this sum-

"I remember going there as a kid," Twomey said. "Many people would pile into the car because they charged something like 50 cents per car, and then once they were inside. they would pile out."





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
