Car crashes into store, one dead

Local officials are awaiting reports from two city agencies after a man crashed his car into a Westchester Square building, killing himself and injuring his passenger.

The late-model Honda Accord crashed through a brick wall and into a sign shop at 1649 Overing Street off East Tremont Avenue about 1 a.m. on Thursday, July 12.

BOGUS TICKET REFUND

‘Bike lane’ summons dismissed

The city has heard Phyllis Cannon's roar.

The hapless driver who got a ticket for parking her car in a non-existent bike lane finally got a refund.

That after Mayor Bloomberg, who championed all those real bike lanes, publicly dissed the Morris Park shop owner.

The proprietor of Superior Paint & Hardware at 1059 Morris Park Avenue, Cannon received notice in the mail that she had been slapped with a \$115 ticket for parking her 1998 Honda in the non-existent bike lane in front of 1810 Hone Avenue before work the morning of Saturday, January 28.

She had parked the car in

what she thought was a perfectly legal spot less than a block away from the shop, but somehow received this ticket on a block where no bike lane exists. After receiving the notice, and filing two appeals online - the first denied because of lack of photographic evidence, the second because the city stated no new evidence can be presented on a second appeal - she reached out to Councilman Jimmy Vacca. The New York Post produced an exclusive article about her plight on July 5, after she had paid the ticket to avoid increasing the \$115 fine.

“Councilman Vacca stayed on it, the police department has acknowledged that this was an incorrect ticket and the city will is-



Reverence and reflection at Van Cortlandt Memorial Grove

A once desecrated war memorial grove is back to its former glory.

Local vets were joined by city Parks officials and lawmakers for the re-opening of the Van Cortlandt Park Memorial Grove on 246th Street and Broadway.

The memorial grove, established in 1949, received a \$250,000 facelift that went towards replacing several bronze plaques honoring 39 fallen WWII and Korean War servicemen who died in Europe, North Africa and the Pacific.

"This will remain a place of reverence for generations to come," said outgoing Department of Parks commissioner Adrienne Benepe.

Much of the renovation work included the replacement of 15 original plaques, which stand at the foot of large oak trees.

Herb Barret, a Riverdale resident and veteran, led the campaign to restore the site for the past six years. Cycling along the verdant pastures in 2006, Barret noticed the grove was completely trashed.

"The place was so shabby," said Barret.

Years of barbecuing left the grove heavily strewn with "garbage, branches, and charcoal."

This will remain a place of reverence for generations to come.

Several of the bronze plaques also disappeared, according to Barret. "When I first looked at it there were about eighteen."

Seeing a need to honor the veterans the right way, Barret teamed with Don Tannen in forming the Memorial Grove Restoration Group.

"Pestering" local lawmakers for help, the group found it from Councilman Oliver Koppell, who allocated \$250,000 in city capital funds to spruce up the grove.

The project had a more personal link for Koppell,

the son of refugees from Nazism.

"These servicemen helped protect my family, and prevent the spread of Nazism," said Koppell.

But even as Koppell signed off on the allocations, the project dragged for years.

"It was a small contract," said Bob Bender with Community Board 8. "There were not a lot of companies that really wanted to bid on it."

Adding to delays were the missing plaques. Bad record-keeping forced researchers to sift through old documents to make sure their final count was accurate, according to Bender.

Work on the project finally began in 2011. Besides the plaques, contractors installed a new fence, trees and benches for people to sit and reflect.

The project has sparked interest for families of other fallen soldiers to be honored in the park. Anyone interested can call the Van Cortlandt Park Conservancy at (718) 430-1890.

Pelham Parkway sidewalk decision set in concrete

The city says its decision to keep a controversial - and allegedly dangerous - sidewalk along Pelham Parkway is carved in concrete.

But Community Board 11 hasn't given up its fight to see the sidewalk along the Pelham Parkway South service road ripped up.

While Board 11 is not empowered to take legal action against the city, sources say a lawsuit may be in the works by other parties.

In June, the NYC Department of Design and Construction wrote a letter to outraged citizens and elected officials, saying the new unwanted sidewalks, running from White Plains Road to a block beyond Williamsbridge Road, comply with city standards and will not be ripped up.

City officials argue that despite the new sidewalk narrowing an already narrow street, FDNY firetrucks can still get through safely.

But opponents, including Board 11 and the Unionformed Firefighters Association, disagree.

Besides having to lose already scarce corner parking spaces so the rigs can make tight turns from side streets, the sidewalk makes getting to fires at hi-rise apartments lining the roadway just plain dangerous, they argue.

Their concerns include: tower ladders now have no room to extend their stabilizers to keep them from tipping while trying to reach hi-rise floors and firefighters can't reach their equipment when compartment doors become wedged in from cars parked on both sides of the narrowed street.

John Fratta, Board 11 assistant district manager, said the board has requested copies of any letter or e-mail between the mayors office and the FDNY regarding the sidewalks.

"They are telling us it is going to take between 30 and 60 days to send what

we're asking for," Fratta said. "So far we haven't gotten anything."

As of June, work completed by the DDC included installation of storm sewers and catch basins from Stillwell to Wilson avenues.

Over the coming weeks, 44 trees will be planted along the middle mall.

"They are done with construction on the service road," Fratta said. "They are saying they will be done with the main road by the end of the year."

Work slated to be completed during July and August will include installing storm sewers and catch basins, a curb line and concrete road base on the parkway's main eastbound roadway from Stillwell Avenue to Wilson Avenue and from Wilson Avenue to Boston Road.

During this phase of construction, left turns will not be permitted for vehicles heading westbound during construction hours from 7

a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday to Friday.

Drivers wishing to make left turns are encour-

aged to use the north and south service roads from which turns are permitted.

"If they complete the

work by the end of the year like they are predicting," said Fratta, "we will be very pleased."

Senator Klein's cleanup push tackling foreclosed home sites

Uncared-for foreclosed properties can be a blight on the community.

Anthony Salimbene and his wife Eileen found out the hard way when overgrowth from the backyard at a foreclosed property at 224 Revere Avenue next to their home turned their back yard and deck uninhabitable in the summer time.

Bugs, critters, and standing water made their lives miserable, said Eileen Salimbene.

It took a two-man crew armed with machetes three days to clear the overgrowth next door, finally finishing on Monday, July 9.

The trash filled about 30 extra-large garbage bags, while bundles of overgrown tree branches and limbs were stacked high across the property's driveway.

The cleanup was thanks to Senator Jeff Klein's office, which reached out to the bank owning the foreclosed property, the U.S. Bank National Association. Klein has now relaunched his Neighborhood Preservation Initiative to help homeowners

facing similar problems with foreclosed homes on their block that aren't maintained by the banks that took them over.

"Keeping the Bronx clean and safe is something that I've always made a top priority," said Klein. "When I heard about how badly this property had been neglected, I knew that something had to be done. I immediately alerted the bank and reminded them that, just like any other property owner, they have a legal duty to maintain the homes they own."

Klein said the Neighborhood Preservation Initiative will "send cleaning crews across the Bronx, bringing neglected properties back from the brink of disrepair and ensuring that banks meet their legal obligations to the community."

Klein first launched his initiative in 2010 and helped clean up about 14 properties.

He passed legislation in 2009 requiring banks to maintain properties they own.

Since the enactment

of that legislation, banks have finally been held to the same standards as ordinary homeowners, according to Klein's office.

The Revere Avenue property, vacant since 2010, had also attracted a small menagerie of two possums, a raccoon, and a skunk, said Eileen Salimbene. Standing water in the backyard was posing a risk of West Nile Virus, and the city Department of Health had been notified, she said - "It was nature's wild kingdom in that backyard!"

"Thanks to Senator Klein, I can finally go into my backyard again," said Anthony Salimbene. "To his credit, as soon as he heard about the problem, he sprang into action and made sure that the job got done."



Heading for the extinction list

Dear editor,

Democrats outnumber Republicans by 2,821,021 voters. There are 5,649,934 registered Democrats versus 2,828,913 Republicans. Others have registered as 2,334,113 Unaffiliated (no declared party affiliation), 447,710 Independence, 150,703 Conservatives, 44,412 Working Families and 23,099 Green.

Contrast these numbers with registered voters in 2002. That year, Democrats outnumbered Republicans by slightly more than 2 million. There were 5,188,113 registered Democrats versus 3,112,493 Republicans and 2,195,356 Unaffiliated (no declared party affiliation). Over the past ten years, Republicans have lost while Democrats and Unaffiliated registered voters continue to grow.

Democrats currently hold all statewide offices. The last Republican Senator was Alfonse D'Amato. He lost his seat to Democrat Charles Schumer in 1998. The last Republican state comptroller, Ned Regan, won his final term in 1990. The last Republican state attorney general, Dennis Vacco, served only one term winning in 1994. The last Republican to win any statewide office was former Governor George Pataki. His final term began in 2002. Since then, no Republican has been successful in winning any statewide office. Republican Party primary winner Wendy Long will be left on the Republican/Conservative Party alter of sacrificial lambs. Both State Republican Party chairman Ed Cox and Conservative Party chairman Mike Long have a consistent track record running second and third tier candidates for statewide office who are preordained to lose. She will go down in the political history books as another asterisk just like her predecessors Joseph J. DioGuardi (2010), Jay Townsend (2010), John Spencer (2006) and Howard Mills (2004). Former Congressman Rick Lazio (2000) and former Senator Alfonse D'Aamto (1998) were the last two credible Republican/Conservative Party candidates for United States Senator. They both had name recognition and the millions of dollars necessary to run credible campaigns.

Past election results speak volumes. In 2010 Democrat Gillibrand was just appointed by former Governor Paterson to fill the vacated seat of Hillary Clinton who became Secretary of State under President Obama. Gillibrand defeated Joseph J. DioGuardi 2,837,684 to 1,582,693. Likewise in 2010, Schumer defeated Jay Townsend 3,047,880 to 1,480,427.

In 2006, Clinton defeated Republican/Conservative John Spenser 2,846,428 to 1,3912,189.

In 2004, Schumer defeated Republican Howard Mills and Conservative Marilyn G. O'Grady 4,769,734 to 1,625,009 and 220,960

In 2000, Hillary Clinton moved to Chappaqua, in Westchester County, New York. This was done to establish legal residency in New York, so she could run for the seat being vacated by Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan. Clinton easily defeated Republican Long Island Congressman Rick Lazio 3,665,217 to 2,767,760 and Independence Party candidate Jeffrey E. Graham 43,181.

In 1998, then Brooklyn Congressman Charles Schumer defeated three term incumbent Republican/Conservative Senator Alfonse D'Amato by 2,5701,065 votes to 1,854,423.

Any winning Republican/Conservative candidate for Senate needs to raise \$20 to \$30 million and turn out their own political base. Note that out of 2,828,913 registered Republican voters only 5% or 140,000 participated in the primary. Of that number, only 69,168 came to vote for Long while 48,429 voted for Congressman Bob Turner and 18,307 for Nassau County Comptroller George Maragos. Most telling, is that 95% or 2,693,001 voted for none of the above by staying home. Long has a difficult hill to climb between now and November convincing 98% of fellow Republicans to come out and support her. Long will also need to capture a majority of independent and a significant number of Democrats. Even more challenging, to be taken as a serious candidate, Long needs \$1 million per week just for media buys in the Metropolitan New York market. With no significant name recognition, secure Republican voter base or money, Wendy Long is clearly the underdog candidate. Gillibrand has had over two years to build her name recognition and has already raised over \$10 million. Long starts out the general election campaign with virtually no cash on hand after her Republican Party primary victory.

Republicans such as Presidential candidate Mitt Romney, former Senator Alfonse D'Amato, former Mayor Rudy Guiliani and former Governor George Pataki will all write off Long as a lost cause. If Long is lucky, perhaps some may go through the motions with nominal endorsements along with token campaign appearances and fundraiser's on behalf of Long. None will make any serious attempts to tap into their own respective campaign contributors pool to raise the millions necessary to help Long run a successful challenge. television media buys to provide any political coattails for Long. Romney will spend little or no time campaigning in a state he has already written off. The Albany GOP State Committee is broke. The Republican State Senate campaign committee is preoccupied with preserving their fragile majority. The national Republican Senate campaign committee along with various independent conservative movement, business and other pro Republican political action committees will invest their resources in other races around the nation with more credible candidates.

With Obama and Gillibrand heading the Democratic Party ticket, they will be providing strong coattails for fellow Democrats further down the ballot running for Congress, State Senate and State Assembly. 

Annual summer meals program kicks off at Orchard Beach

Get it while it's hot!

The annual summer meals program is now underway.

Chancellor Dennis Walcott, joined by federal and city agencies and non-profit organizations at Orchard Beach on the program's kick-off day, Friday, July 13, encouraged families to take advantage of free breakfast and lunch for their young-

sters through the program, which runs through August 31.

Summer meals are provided in more than 1,000 locations, including pools, parks, public housing sites and soup kitchens throughout the five boroughs.

The Department of Education is also operating a mobile refrigerated truck that provides meals to children at Orchard Beach. It

also operates another refrigerated truck at Flushing Meadows Park and will shortly add a third one to serve meals to youngsters at Queens Farm Park, Walcott said.

The DOE said it served more than 7 million meals last summer, including 67,000 meals served by the trucks. That's more meals than some states served for their entire summer program, it said.

To help promote summer meals, Share Our Strength, a national non-profit that focuses on eliminating childhood hunger, is providing text messaging capabilities and has produced postcards and flyers that are being distributed throughout the city through food advocates, community-based organizations, city agencies and the DOE to alert families of the summer

meals program.

"We want all families with children, no matter their residency, to have one of our nutritious meals free of charge," the chancellor said. "We are reaching out to families through posters and flyers, thanks to the efforts of the USDA, Share Our Strength, the Mayor's Food Policy Coordinator and the Office of School Food."

Bill Shore, founder and CEO of Share Our Strength, said he is thrilled to be partnering with the DOE to ensure that every child in New York who needs something to eat gets it.

"The summer meals program is a great way to make sure that kids who get free lunch during the school year can also get the nutrition they need when school is out," Shore said.

Councilman Jimmy Vacca agreed.

"The summer meals program is a wonderful opportunity for young children to receive free meals at over 1,000 schools, pools, parks and other great places in the city while they enjoy their summer vacation," Vacca said. "Just like during the school year, it's absolutely vital that

we continue to offer these free and nutritious meals to these youngsters during the months that they are not in school. Making sure our kids eat healthy year-round is something that we should all take seriously."

DiMaggio stamp unveiled by USPS

Pre-order sales surpass other baseball stamp greats

Another home run for a Yankees great.

Joe DiMaggio, already immortalized in history books, will live on forever thanks to the US Postal Service.

A forever stamp bearing his name will be unveiled on Saturday, July

21 at the Bronx General Post Office at 558 Grand Concourse.

And DiMaggio's legend has hit a grand slam with pre-order sales surpassing 420,000, the most out of the other baseball stamps in circulation.

The Borough President's office will join of-

ficials with the United States Postal Service in presenting the stamp to the public at a ceremony described as a "double-header".

On top of the new stamp, Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. will also proclaim July 21 as Joe DiMaggio Day in the borough.

"On behalf of all Bronxites, we will cement the 'Yankee Clipper's' place in Bronx history," said Diaz Jr., himself a lifelong Yankees fan.

The postal service's customer advisory council chose DiMaggio to be placed on the stamp after reviewing hundreds of proposals.

The stamp features DiMaggio at home plate ready to hit a ball out of the park.

Stamp sheets will be available the same day of the unveiling in the Bronx with limited quantities going on sale nationwide on July 23.

DiMaggio fans are welcome to stop by the Bronx General Post Of-

fice to have their items signed by special guests including members of the DiMaggio family, though officials warn that space will be limited.

"It's a great honor for New York City and a homage to the Bronx," said Raschelle Parker, USPS New York District Marketing Manager.

Nicknamed "Joltin'" Joe and "The Yankee Clipper", DiMaggio dedicated his entire 13-year career as center fielder for the Bronx Bombers.

Known for his 56-game hitting streak in 1941, DiMaggio lead the Yanks to ten American League pennants and nine World Series championships.

Retiring in 1951, the three-time MVP winner and 13-time All-Star was inducted to the Baseball Hall of Fame four years later.

He died in 1999, but his legend lives forever.

"I feel responsible because I should of made sure all i's were dotted and the all t's were crossed.

"I am the head coach of the varsity softball team at Preston High School and spring is an extremely busy

and intense season for me. I tried to delegate the responsibility of the league's spring season. I can't do everything, but this incident tells me I have to."

But quoting the old Brooklyn Dodger fans' favorite saying, she said "Wait'll next year!"

Health network receives HIV funds

The **Bronx Community Health Network** will receive more than \$1 million in federal funding for their ongoing efforts to prevent, treat, and manage HIV/AIDS in the Bronx, Congressman José Serrano announced.

The \$1.043 million grant was issued by the Health Resources and Services Administration under Title 3 of the Ryan White Act. Congressman Serrano worked for reauthorization of the deeply important Ryan White Act, which funds most of the HIV/AIDS-specific health care and prevention in the nation.

Serrano called the work that the organization performs “exemplary and deserving of the support that our government is giving to it.”

“Their model, which treats the whole patient, is the way medicine should be practiced,” he noted, saying it is particularly important in cases of people with HIV/AIDS.

“They need more comprehensive care than others might in order to successfully manage their disease. Through management of existing infections and education of those not infected, BCHN is doing extremely important work to roll back the spread of this deadly disease,” he said.

Dr. Jay Izes, BCHN’s chief medical officer, called care of patients with HIV/AIDS and prevention of infection in people who are at high risk of developing HIV/AIDS “an essential part of the BCHN mission.”

“This competitive grant renewal reflects HRSA’s evaluation of the innovative, patient-centered care that we provide.”

Inside Lehman XII, **Lehman College’s** student co-produced video news magazine, has won three awards—the Videographer Award of Distinction, the Communicator Award of Distinction, and

the Hermes Creative Award (gold). They bring the total number of awards won by the magazine to twenty-five since 2004.

“The show’s main goal is to provide professional hands-on training for our students and also to produce programs that are informative and entertaining to the general public,” said Lynne Van Voorhis, executive producer of Inside Lehman. “The awards are evidence that our students are succeeding beyond all expectations, which is exciting to all of our participants and the College. The program’s producer, Tom O’Hanlon, guides the students to aim for excellence in their work and ultimately prepares them for the possibility of a career in the profession.”

The news magazine typically features five stories, each ranging between five to seven minutes in length and focusing on work being conducted by faculty and students, campus initiatives, and issues that impact the surrounding community.

The most recent production included a story on asthma in the Bronx and the link between poverty and air quality in certain urban, industrial settings. A segment on noise-induced hearing loss discussed appropriate levels of noise consumption, how to prevent hearing loss, and the consequences of ignoring these recommendations.

Another story on Korean studies followed one student’s quest to comply with foreign language requirements despite being unable to read or write due to an earlier accident. With some creative thinking on the part of administration, Henry Chang was able to enroll in an independent study program in the Korean language designed by the Lehman Department of Languages and Literatures. He was then paired with two Korean students—one ex-

change student and another earning her degree at Lehman, who taught the class and offered tutoring, thereby helping him fulfill his requirements and graduate.

Other segments featured a story on eating healthy while on a budget and modern dance, which showed prospective dancers how to enter the professional arena.

The Videographer Awards is an international competition designed to recognize excellence in video productions, television commercials, news, program and digital media. The Communicator Awards are judged and overseen by the International Academy of the Visual Arts, and the Hermes Creative Awards is an international competition for creative professionals involved in the concept, writing and design of both traditional materials and programs and emerging technologies.

Centers National Center for HIV Care in Minority Communities to participate in the 2012 HIV in Primary Care Learning Community.

As a result, the health center has launched a comprehensive clinical training program and allocated additional resources to its physicians to assist them with the management of highly active antiretroviral therapy.

It has also increased access to HIV testing by expanding the availability of

OraQuick testing at more of its locations. HIV rapid testing is now offered at its three primary care sites. Most recently, the center recruited an Adolescent Medicine physician to expand its services for youth, including LGBT youth who may be at greater risk for HIV.

The center also offers a full range of primary care, adult medicine, pediatrics and dental care services, as well as needed specialty services such as physical and occupational therapy, cardiology, urology, optometry,

dermatology and podiatry, with about 150,000 medical, dental and physical rehabilitation visits annually to 25,000 individual patients at its four locations.

Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr.'s office helped launch the 2nd Bronx Can Health Challenge on Saturday, July 14, hosted by Blink Fitness, a new fitness center located at 744 St. Ann's Ave and East 156th Street.

Staff from Lincoln Medical and Mental Health Center, a CAN partner, regis-

tered community residents, recorded vital stats, measurements and screened for blood pressure and diabetes. Blink Fitness had trainers on site to provide fitness tips and extended free trials to all participants 18 years and older. Blink Fitness will also provide a complementary six-month membership to the top male and female participants with the highest percentage of weight loss.

The health initiative brings together individuals, doctors and other health providers, places of wor-

ship, community gardens and community centers, schools, and civic-minded groups to promote behaviors that lead to healthy lifestyles.

"The Bronx CAN Family Health Challenge is a perfect example of how members of our Bronx community could work together to create great programs that have a large, positive impact on the well-being of the borough," said Diaz. "I urge all Bronx students and their families to take on the eight-week Family Health

Challenge."

"Too many of our residents are suffering from preventable ailments like obesity and high blood pressure," added local state Senator Jose M. Serrano.

Assessing your abilities as an aging driver

When a person first earns a driver's license, he's earned more than just the right to legally operate an automobile. To many drivers, a driver's license is symbolic of freedom and self-sufficiency.

The significance of a driver's license never truly dissipates, which makes it difficult for aging people to address their abilities as a driver and whether or not they can still safely share the road with other motorists. Many drivers can safely stay behind the wheel well into their golden years, but others begin to recognize their skills are starting to diminish as they approach senior citizen status. For those who want help gauging their abilities as a driver, some self-examination can help.

Assess your eyesight

Healthy eyes are essential to being a safe driver, and drivers can assess their eyesight in a number of ways. In addition to

visiting an eye doctor for an eye examination, drivers should look for signs that they're having difficulty with driving. If signs and street markings aren't so easy to read anymore, you might need a new prescription for eyeglasses. When the glare of headlights at night makes it difficult to see, your driver's seat might need to be adjusted or you might want to consider antiglare eyeglasses that make it easier to see at night.

Know your comfort level

Safe drivers are also comfortable drivers. To assess your comfort level as a driver, ask yourself the following questions before getting back behind the wheel.

- Is it troublesome to look over your shoulder and change lanes?
 - Has steering become difficult?
 - Has your reaction time when switching from the gas pedal to the brake pedal decreased?
- If you can answer "yes" to any of the questions above, then it could be that you're beginning to

lose strength, coordination and flexibility, which can make it more difficult to operate a motor vehicle. Answering "yes" doesn't mean you have to give up your driver's license.

In fact, your doctor might be able to prescribe therapies or medicines or suggest a fitness regimen that can make it easier for you to comfortably drive a car. In addition, if you're having trouble steering or operating a motor vehicle in any way, you might just want to find a vehicle that's easier to drive, such as one with an automatic transmission that has power steering and brakes.

When assessing your comfort level, also examine your mental state while driving. If other drivers make you uncomfortable or traffic signs are confusing, this can make it difficult to safely operate an automobile. Such feelings when driving could also be a side effect of a particular medication, so discuss the issue with your doctor to see if that's the case and if there are any alternatives.

Consider others' concerns

Aging drivers are often the last to notice if their abilities behind the wheel are starting to diminish. Loved ones are often put in the position of talking to aging drivers about their abilities, and this can cause friction. If loved ones have expressed concern about your abilities as a driver, honestly address these concerns, even if it's initially hurtful or embarrassing to do so. Your loved ones are sharing their feelings out of genuine concern for your well-being, so don't look at it as

an assault on your self-sufficiency. Some organizations, including the AARP and AAA, offer driving classes for mature drivers to help them more adequately handle the challenges aging drivers might face.

Aging drivers face obstacles they may or may not be prepared for. When such challenges arise, that doesn't necessarily mean it's time to stop driving entirely. Instead, honestly weigh a host of factors before deciding if it's still safe for you to be behind the wheel.

crumbs and other dirt that can end up staining the seats of the car. A shop vac has more horsepower than a regular vacuum and will draw dirt out more easily.

If you have leather seats, use a mild soap and water solution and dampen a cloth to wipe down the seats. The same solution can be used on the plastic components,

such as cup holders and storage areas. Use a dry cloth to dry and buff out any streaks. There are leather seat protector products available, and upholstered seats can be protected with a scotch guard-type product.

Create a dirt barrier

Carpeted mats are meant to make the car interior appear

sleek and refined. Yet, many times, these mats can get soiled quite quickly. A good investment is to purchase vinyl or plastic mats that have a raised perimeter that will trap any dirt or liquid (like melted snow) on the mat. Then the mats can be easily removed and hosed off.

Along the same lines, car seat covers can be bought that will serve as a barrier between dirt, crumbs, fur, and anything else that would normally become embedded in the upholstery. There are kick mats that can be placed on the rear side of front seats. This way, if kids in the back put their feet up on the seats or have a tendency of kicking, they won't dirty the seats.

If your car has a trunk, consider lining it with an impermeable material that can absorb spills and catch dirt. With the spring planting season just around the corner, you don't want the topsoil or fertilizer spilling into the carpet-lined trunk making a mess. For SUV drivers, a mat or liner can be installed in the cargo area. Check with your dealership or an after-

market retailer if there are products specifically designed for this purpose. Otherwise a blanket, absorbent sheet, etc., can be used in a pinch.

Clean off before driving

The warm-weather season is one full of frolicking in parks or seaside. Be sure to stomp shoes clean of sand and dirt before entering the car. Pay special attention to the cleanliness of pets and children's feet before entering the car.

Get a trash receptacle

In a perfect world, there would be no eating and drinking in a car and no chance for food and beverages to spill. However, many people find from time to time that they need a snack or a refreshment in the car. Avoid a mess by having a small bag or trash can to collect the remnants of the meal so they don't end up on the floor or seats. Look for drinks with straws and covers for easier drinkability in the car. Only allow foods that won't cause major stains if spilled, such as water and dry snacks.

Four ways to conserve fuel

Stop paying so much at the pump with these tips

Fuel prices have traditionally been at their highest during the summer months. That's unfortunate for vacationers and road trip enthusiasts who must budget the cost of fuel into their vacation expenses. Those costs can be considerable, especially if gas continues to hover around \$4 per gallon as it has for much of 2012.

But as costly as gas has become, drivers can still mitigate those costs by employing a few strategies aimed at increasing their driving efficiency. The following are a few ways drivers can offset high fuel costs regardless of the time of year.

- Maintain a consistent speed. Though it might be hard to maintain a consistent speed when driving during rush hour, it should not be too difficult to do so when hitting the open road. The easier you are on the engine, the less taxed that engine will be and the less fuel it will need as a result. - Don't drive when you can walk or bike. It might sound simple, but the best way to conserve fuel is not to use it at all. During the warmer months, walk or ride your bicycle when performing local errands. This

when you need to travel locally.

- Obey the speed limit. The open road entices many drivers to put the pedal to the metal, but driving over the speed limit is both illegal and expensive. The U.S. Department of Energy notes that drivers pay an additional \$0.31 per gallon for every five miles they drive over 60 mph. Since gas prices have already hovered around \$4 per gallon for much of the year, drivers would be wise to obey the speed limit and conserve their fuel as well as their money.
- Don't make your vehicle into a traveling closet. Many drivers keep excess materials in their cars, whether it's a cooler for picnics, a set of golf clubs, or an old baby stroller. Excess weight will rear its ugly head at the pump. The Department of Energy notes that an extra 100 pounds in a vehicle can reduce its miles per gallon by as much as two percent. Before hitting the highway, check your trunk and the backseat and remove any unnecessary items.

Drivers spend a considerable amount of money at the gas pump each week. But a few simple strategies to conserve fuel can save money and help the planet at the same time.

Motorcycle safety prevents accidents

Motorcycles have been around for decades, and so have riding enthusiasts. Through all of the innovations and motorcycle design changes, safety while riding remains of the utmost importance.

Very often, motorcycle accidents are attributed to lack of rider skill. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that there are roughly four million registered motorcycle riders on American roadways. There may be many others who are unlicensed and still hop on a motorcycle as a preferred mode of transportation.

There are several advantages to motorcycles. With some models, motorcycles offer a ride with good fuel economy. Cycles take up less space than cars, and they can be easier to park and maintain in an urban setting.

The administration's statistics indicate that motorcycle fatalities make up around five percent of all traffic fatalities. Eighty percent of motorcycle accidents result in injury or death, compared to the roughly 20 percent of other vehicles. That's due to the minimal protection the vehicle provides. This further emphasizes the necessity to properly and safely operate a motorcycle to avoid accidents in the first place.

Riding safely first involves purchasing a bike that is the right size and power for the rider. Larger bikes can be heavy and riders who are small in stature may not be able to maneuver or lift the motorcycle, should it

fall over. Also, riders should choose bikes that fit their lifestyles. For instance, a trail bike will not be safe on a highway.

It is a good idea to enroll in a motorcycle safety course if it's your first experience with a bike. This course will give invaluable tips regarding maneuvering, learning about operating the cycle, defensive driving techniques, and other tips specific to motorcycles. For example, intersections are one place on a roadway where many accidents take place. Bike riders should try to enter an intersection with a larger vehicle on the right of the motorcycle, or at least in the left-most lane to provide a space cushion from oncoming traffic.

Of course, protective clothing and equipment are essential to minimize injuries if an accident should occur. Helmets, goggles, boots, long pants, jackets, and the like should be worn at all times. Injuries can often be prevented with protective gear, but many riders still don't embrace such gear.

Another important safety tip is to recognize that traveling with another passenger is much more difficult to do than riding alone. A passenger can throw off the balance of the bike and add weight, two factors that may be different from what the rider is used to. Before taking another passenger out for a spin, riders should be extremely experienced in handling the bike and proficient in all controls and safety maneuvers.

Here are some other safety tips motorcycle riders can heed.

- Treat other motorists with courtesy.
- Do not tailgate.
- Do not cut through the middle of lanes or pass cars on the right while traffic is stopped.
- Be especially alert at intersections.
- Use signals whenever appropriate.
- Avoid driving during inclement weather.
- Assume the motorcycle is invisible to other drivers; position yourself to be seen.
- Avoid sudden braking or turning.
- Maintain a safe distance between vehicles.
- Use headlights during nighttime and daytime hours.
- Watch the road surface to anticipate potential hazards.

Following safe driving methods helps prevent motorcycle-related accidents, injuries, and death.

Let's play Parent Jeopardy.

The category is "Teenagers". The answer is, "One of the most difficult and challenging stages a parent faces." You now have 15 seconds to come up with the correct question.....Okay, time's up. If you said, "What is adolescence?", you can give yourself 200 points. Get ready for Double Jeopardy.

Teens can be baffling, can't they? They have a fierce desire to be different, except when they have a fierce desire to be the same. This makes sense if we think about it for a moment. A teenager's "job", psychologically speaking, is to find his or her unique and distinct personality and place in the larger world.

A big piece of finding one's place in society is to be accepted and liked by one's peers, and this is what makes teenagers especially susceptible to "peer influence" or "peer pressure". The bizaare hair colors, unusual hair styles, outlandish clothing—it all speaks to the teenager's need to define him or herself as special and distinctive in the world. But most of all, the teen also

wants to belong, to be a part of the group. What teenager has not argued with a parent that since everybody does it, they should be allowed to do it too? If everybody does it, then it must be okay, no big deal, no problem. When it comes to alcohol and other drugs, teenagers believe that most other teens drink, and many adults share this same misperception. Doesn't everybody do it as part of growing up? Can it really hurt?

Good questions, and fortunately, we do have some answers. TNCAP recently conducted an extensive survey of almost 1300 students in Throggs Neck area schools. First, the good news: most teenagers do not drink! It may seem contrary to our expectations or experience; for instance, if a teen's group of friends drink, then that becomes his or her social reality. Teens who drink on weekends tend to talk about it at

school, too, adding to the sense that everybody does indeed drink. But our kids deserve and need to know the truth: everybody's not doing it and yes, it can really hurt.

Now, the bad news: early use of alcohol is linked to a large number of problems later on in life, a recent research study says. Those who drink before age 14 complete fewer years of education than those who don't, which in turn affects employment, earnings, marriage, etc. The most recent TNCAP survey revealed that 25% of our 8th graders have used alcohol. One out of four 8th graders are jeopardizing their health, happiness and success and may not realize it.

A safe community is everybody's business. Parents, educators, coaches, alcohol sellers and servers, ministers, and all other caring and concerned adults have a role to play in the deadly serious business of keeping alcohol out of the hands of minors. A teen who drinks is jeopardizing not just his own health but the health of those around him and the well-being of all who care for him. Now that's really Double Jeopardy.

sue a refund,” Cannon said. “This is thanks to the New York Post, CBS 2, Channel 11, and Councilman Jimmy Vacca, who was on it first.”

The ticket has produced a large amount of aggravation, Cannon said at her store.

“When you get a ticket for something that you deserve, it is upsetting, but you know you are wrong,” Cannon said. “When you get a ticket for something you didn’t do, it is an insult, an annoyance, and harassment!”

She said that she hopes that some good comes out of this by traffic agents being more cautious and considerate when motorists are ticketed, Cannon said.

After the story broke, Mayor Bloomberg was asked about the ticket by reporters, and was quoted in the Post as saying “fixing a ticket is not something that a mayor should do, and I will not do that - I have no idea whether she was right or wrong.”

Phyllis Cannon was all smiles inside of her store after learning that the city voided a bogus parking ticket she received for parking in a nonexistent bike lane on Hone Avenue.

Councilman Vacca said that neither he nor Cannon ever asked anyone to fix a ticket, and he called it the case of a “bike lane that never was.” Vacca said that the mayor could not answer the question because it was before the agencies conducted the inquiry.

“In this case, she does not deserve the fine,” said Vacca. “There is no bike lane on the street, there are

no plans to put a bike lane on the street, and this was blatantly wrong.

“The NYPD traffic division should be sending a letter to the Department of Finance and a refund should be issued, Vacca said.

Vacca also praised the efforts of the Post. “The New York Post article did bring it to light, and the article was helpful in resolving the case,” said Vacca.

Six families over the Clarke and Son Signs’ store had to be evacuated, and two adjacent stores ordered closed, with vacate orders on all three buildings.

As of press time, a Department of Buildings spokeswoman said that two apartments and the two stores facing Overing Street were still under vacate orders.

Community Board 10 and the president of the Westchester Square Civic Association are awaiting findings from the city Department of Transportation and the Department of Buildings as to what can be done to improve vehicular and pedestrian safety at the intersection, and to learn if and when the families can return to their apartments and the two stores near E. Tremont Avenue can reopen.

The city DOT has been studying the intersection of Silver and Overing streets and E. Tremont Avenue since 2011, and CB 10 has

requested speed humps for several Zerega streets and improvement of pedestrian safety at the particular intersection where the accident occurred, said CB 10 district manager Kenneth Kearns.

“I think traffic control in general is a good thing,” Kearns said. “I think DOT was responsive to the board request for an analysis of the intersection. We don’t have analysis yet and we are waiting for it. The agency is in the process of getting that information together and we are confident that city DOT will present it to us.”

The area around the accident scene would be perfect for a Neighborhood Slow Zone - an initiative that has just been expanded by Mayor Bloomberg to reduce the speed limit from 30 MPH to 20 MPH in certain areas.

“I have asked for signs to reduce speeds on all streets nearby,” said Lou Rocco of the local association. “I wish we could have a Neighborhood Speed Zone here because we got schools

and medical centers, and trucks are always speeding through here.”

Rino Sicilaino, owner of the Rino of Italy hair salon, across Overing Street from the accident, said he had seen many car crashes at the location after about 25 years in business.

But whatever is done at the intersection, and the surrounding blocks in Westchester Square and Zerega, it comes too late for 49-year-old Gilberto Alfonso, who died in the car crash.

After the car was pulled from inside the building, messages for Alfonso appeared at a memorial on wooden planks put up in front of the gapping hole in the wall of the building. The messages appear to come from family members, friends, and even people he did not know.

Hours after the accident Juan Clarke, who owns Clarke and Son Signs, was still reticent about the tragedy.

“When I imagine it,” Clarke said, “it is not good.”

Once again, New York City is ground zero for those wishing to harm the United States. According to AP published reports, Iranian intelligence operatives are engaging in activities that continue to worry the NYPD. Fortunately for residents of the five boroughs, the local police force seems to be more realistic about the threat than the federal government.

America's largest city is not alone. Brian Higgins (D-NY) believes that Tehran's terrorist proxy Hezbollah presents a danger throughout the Western Hemisphere, with an active presence in fourteen North American cities. The threat to New York is part of a larger movement by Iran to establish a military presence within the western hemisphere, with a particular emphasis on using several anti-U.S. states in South America as a base for their operations.

There is bipartisan concern in Congress that the White House has not

responded to the threat, although the problem is recognized. In recent testimony before Congress, Southern Command General Douglas Fraser recently told Congress that "Iran is very engaged in Latin America. The Director of National Intelligence, James R. Clapper, believes that Iranian officials...are now more willing to conduct an attack in the U.S. in response to real or perceived U.S. actions that threaten the regime."

Iran's involvement goes far beyond mere advice and technical assistance. The Pentagon's 2010 report to Congress on Iran's military power, emphasizes that the Qods force, the elite paramilitary unit of Iran's Revolutionary Guards, is now deeply involved in the Americas.

Roger F. Noriega, the former ambassador to the

Organization of American States and former Assistant Secretary of State, notes that "Iranian officials have made no secret of the regime's intention to carry its asymmetrical struggle to the streets of the United States and Europe."

The challenge goes far beyond ground-level threats. Germany's Die Welt publication described the Islamic Republic's construction of intermediate range missile launch pads on Venezuela's Paraguaná Peninsula. Both nuclear and ballistic missile threats are emerging from Venezuelan-Iranian cooperation. Iran's Admiral Habibollah has announced plans to send warships to the Atlantic coast of the United States. This is far more than a "show the flag" exercise. Having these vessels in this close places American cities within range of nuclear-capable missiles.

The Tehran/Caracas axis, encouraged by Venezuela's Hugo Chavez, is particularly troubling. The Foundry's Peter Brookes reports that the two na-

tions have a Memorandum of Understanding "pledging full military support and cooperation that likely increases weapons sales... One could easily see Tehran using Caracas as a stepping off point for attacking U.S. or other (e.g. Israeli) interests in this hemisphere or even the American homeland, especially if action is taken against Iran's nuclear program...There is concern that Iran and Venezuela are already cooperating on some nuclear issues. There have been reports that Iran may

be prospecting for uranium ore in Venezuela, which could aid both countries' nuclear programs, should Caracas proceed... While still prospective, of course, there is the possibility that Tehran, which has an increasingly capable missile program, could sell or help Caracas develop ballistic missiles capable of reaching American shores."

Despite wide-scale concern, the White House has slashed funds from the military's Southern Command, the armed forces'

organization responsible for Latin American affairs. New York's police force may have the best anti-terrorist capabilities in the world. However, the threat coming from Iran is a full-scale military challenge, and Washington must live up to its responsibilities to protect both our city and our nation. sign going up on at the vacant former site of a WaMu bank on Morris Park and Hone avenues.

“I got the first phone calls on Friday, June 19 that there was going to be an OTB,” Fratta said. “I immediately called up OTB like a raving lunatic and they didn’t know anything about it.”

After a little research, it was discovered that the sign was merely just a prop for the movie.

Sandow was born and raised in Morris Park.

“We shot the film in the neighborhood where I grew up, which was an incredible coincidence,” Sandow said. “It’s been 25 years since I lived in that neighborhood, and to experience its generosity of spirit while shooting my first feature was a gift.”

Sandow said he was originally drawn to the project because of its focus on gambling.

“On the surface, it deals with gambling: its draw and

the addiction of it,” Sandow said. “I was born and raised in a neighborhood where losing more money than you had to the local bookie was a rite of passage. I accomplished this at 15, but quickly realized that it was a sucker’s game and that it was much more profitable to be on the other side of it.”

Sandow said the other reason he took on the project was because of his anger over 9/11.

“It was post 9/11 and I was very angry that my country was inciting a war which I believed to be very obviously based on deception,” Sandow said. “Directing Ponies was a way for me to have a voice on this issue.”

The compelling drama is set in New York City within the world of Off Track Betting and reflects on the anxieties faced by recent immigrants to America.

The main characters have fled their home countries because of war or other forms of strife, but find America is not the safe

haven they are looking for—especially post 9/11.

“The characters in the story struggle greatly to survive, and display fantastic ingenuity to survive,” Sandow said. “I find this admirable true: how some people can find a way to survive at all costs. It’s a hard view but one I can’t help but recognize as something deep, dark, ugly and beautiful.”

Ponies began as an original stage play written by Michael Batistick and was produced by Michael Imperioli’s Studio Dante, where it received a critically acclaimed extended run under Sandow.

In 2009, Batistick adapted his play for the big screen for Sandow to direct.

The cast includes John Ventimiglia, famous for his many television appearances, and most recently best known as restaurateur Arthur Bucco on the HBO series The Sopranos. It also stars Kevin Corrigan, Babs Olusanmokin, and Tonye Patano.

Just about everyone you speak with will agree that no recent Bronx historian can produce the quality and originality of John McNamara's columns.

He began writing them in 1956 and continued doing so for the next 44 years. He set the standard for those of us who followed by looking into areas where no one else thought to venture and sharing his findings with his readers, many of whom would follow his stories week in and week out. His column was often the first thing people read upon opening their paper.

It wasn't just Bronx history that was captured by his pen, but he also set about recording his vast and varied trips around the globe. That in itself sets him apart from other journalists as many of his experiences can never be re-lived.

His chronicles on the Great Depression have captured that historic epic as he lived it. The same can be

said about his "riding the rails" as a hobo or traveling aboard tramp steamers with no fixed schedule. Some things do change and some experiences simply cannot be repeated.

John's world of yore has come and gone. We, for our part, can be grateful not only for his wanderlust, but also that he had the skill and craftsmanship to capture such a broad slice of his life in writing.


Fortunately, some of those stories were recounted in his last book, "McNamara's Vagabond Travels." Each is a little historical gem polished to perfection by the master himself. He approved the proof copy of the book shortly before his death on October 15, 2004, just a couple of months shy of his 92nd birthday. His

Look at the front cover and you'll note that it reads "Vol. 1 - The Early Years." This book was meant to be the first in a series about his global travels.

What surprised everyone is that the book simply didn't sell very well, negating the need for further volumes. Everyone who read the book was mesmerized by it saying that it read like a fast-paced novel. Unfortunately, there was no money in the budget for advertising so the publisher had to rely on press-releases only.

Bryant tried to raise his stock by playing in the Portsmouth Invitational, a showcase for the top college seniors in front of NBA scouts. Bryant's K&D Rounds Landscaping team lost all three games. He av-

eraged close to eight points and four assists in 22 minutes of play. He improved as the week went on, scoring 11 points in his final contest. Bryant didn't think it was the best environment for him to showcase his talents.

"It was really a lot of selfishness," Bryant said. "A lot of guys were there for themselves trying to impress an NBA team. It was a good experience, though."

The Brooklyn native was a key cog to West Virginia's success in a loaded Big East during his four seasons with the school. His senior year he averaged 16.9 points, 2.7 assists and 3.1 rebounds as the Mountaineers went 19-14 and 9-9 in conference play. As a sophomore, West Virginia went 31-7 and reached the Final Four.

"It was a great experience," Bryant said. "I got to

play with some great people. [The Final Four] is a once in a lifetime experience. That's what everyone wants to do in college basketball."

He feels like he has a good chance of landing a summer league invite, but knows there are a lot of guards out there even from last year's draft.

"I'm just going to pray and hope I get an opportunity," Bryant said.

All-City softball Player of the Year: Cheryl Lopez, Tottenville

Lopez was already the favorite for All-City Player of the Year. She put herself over the top by putting the ball over the wall.

The city's best pitcher beat Susan Wagner, 3-1, in the PSAL Class A city championship game and provided every single run of support for herself with a three-run home run out of St. John's University's Red Storm Field.

The incredible performance added to Lopez's already impressive résumé. The junior went through the playoffs like a buzz saw, leading Tottenville to a second straight title and an eighth crown in the last nine years. In last year's championship game, Lopez gave up just one hit to Madison over 10 innings. This time, she did it with her bat, too.

"She is a true leader on this team because she picks people up," Tottenville coach Cathy Morano said. "She does it sometimes in a quiet way and sometimes in a loud

way with that shot."

All-City softball Coach of the Year: Marco Altieri, Susan Wagner

After reaching five semifinals in the last six years, Altieri and Wagner broke through to the PSAL Class A championship game for the first time in 23 years. Doing it with bulldog ace Taylor Sarcone, a four-year starter in the circle, meant a lot to Altieri. He and assistants Tim McAuliffe and Melissa Zipf did a phenomenal job getting the most out of their talent. All three of the Falcons' league losses were to eventual champion Tottenville.

"We have been coming up short, running into really good teams," Altieri said of reaching the title game. "One thing the girls said is we are going to do it this year. We all believed in each other."

First Team

P Jackie Cautela, St. Joseph by the Sea

The junior was Sea's most consistent hitter and a dominant ace in the circle even with her team sporting a three-pitcher rotation. She went unbeaten with an 0.81 ERA and notched 39 strikeouts in 26 innings pitched. Cautela tossed a 1-0 shutout of Preston in the CHSAA Archdiocesan final and hit .667 in five playoff games.

P Victoria Goldbach, Archbishop Molloy

The Catholic University-bound windmill saved her biggest moments for her final season. Goldbach won four playoff games, including a 1-0 victory against Fontbonne Hall in which she struck out 13, and blanked St. Joseph by the Sea, 1-0, allowing just two hits in the CHSAA state semifinals.

Just a freshman, Orrico never played like one at any point this season, competing with a veteran's poise and determination. She got big hit after big hit and pitched Preston past Moore Catholic, 4-1, and into its first CHSAA Archdiocesan final since 2004.

SS/P Maria Palmeri, Archbishop Molloy

One of the most decorated players in Molloy history, the C.W. Post-bound Palmeri again provided punch in the Stanners' order. She led the Queens schools to a third straight trip to the CHSAA state final and a fourth consecutive Diocesan crown by driving in the tying run in Game 1 of the championship

series against rival St. Francis Prep.

SS Jillian Regan, Tottenville


