TRUMP GOLF LINKS DEBUTS

18-hole course at Ferry Point officially opens

After almost 15 years of planning and development, Trump Golf Links at Ferry Point is officially open for golf.

On Tuesday, May 26, Donald J. Trump, chairman and president of the Trump Organization, and special guest Nicklaus officially opened Trump Golf Links at Ferry Point, which is being considered by many as the most anticipated new golf course in the county.

Nicklaus, winner of 18 major championships as well as the 2014 Architect of the Year by Golf Magazine, was chosen as the course designer for the 18-hole Jack Nicklaus Signa-

was also designed in consultation with Sanford Design.

During the grand opening ceremony, Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr. and Assemblymen Michael Benedetto and Councilman James Vacca each spoke on the completion of the long-awaited golf course, each thanking Trump and Nicklaus for betting on and believing in the Bronx.

After their short speeches, Trump spoke on the success of the course's completion amidst the initial delays of the project.

"I am honored to have played such a major role with respect to this great course for the people of New York City and finally finished what ture Golf Course. The course many could not in a very short

period of time," said Trump, who was accompanied at the grand opening by family members Donald Jr, Ivanka and Eric Trump, executive vice presidents of development and acquisitions for Trump Golf Links at Ferry point.

"Trump Golf Links at Ferry Point is truly an incredible course that will undoubtedly host many major championships in the years to come."

The golf course itself, located at 500 Hutchinson River Parkway, offers New York City residents a championship caliber, luxury resort experience unlike anything else, allowing for private and public venues on the tournament-ready

The influential women are chosen by the annual planning committee, made up of Rosemary DeLuca of the Wildlife Conservation Society, Elizabeth Figueroa



CB 10 squashes Tremont Ave.'s road-diet

Community Board 10 scuttled a controversial plan, after intense community opposition, calling for narrowing the roadway on East Tremont Avenue in Waterbury-LaSalle.

Leaders in the business and residential communities, and parents at nearby P.S. 14, appealed to CB 10's full board to oppose the plan that would have seen travel lanes reduced from 4 to 3 on East Tremont Avenue from roughly Waterbury Avenue to Bruckner Boulevard to promote pedestrian safety. One of the travel lanes would have been a designated turn lane.

The city Department of Transportation idea ran into fierce opposition from the Throggs Neck Merchants Association, which organized community opposition from the Pelham Bay Taxpayers, Pelham Bay Merchants, Throggs Neck Home Owners Association and the Waterbury LaSalle Community Association, which showed up in masse at the CB 10 meeting on Thursday, May 21.

The suggested changes was part of the Vision Zero initiative.

The proposal, one of four for traffic calming on East Tremont Avenue, was not supported, by a 29 to 3 vote, with one abstention.

"The community's voice was heard, it held sway, and they got the "no" vote

they were looking for," said CB 10 chairman Martin Prince, who added that talking about reducing or slowing the amount of traffic is a difficult subject.

The board encountered opposition from all corners of the board, including P.S. 14, whose parents were concerned that the plan would lead to increased traffic on Logan and Crosby avenues just when the school was about to start an expansion.

Gianna Dell'olio, part of the P.S. 14's School Leadership Team, said at the meeting that a crucial intersection near the school, where Logan Avenue reaches Bruckner Boulevard, is already backed up with traffic.

If more traffic was to be diverted from East Tremont Avenue because traffic was not flowing well, then the side streets would be impacted, she implied.

TNMA board member John Cerini, who organized opposition to the plan, brought together interested parties to fight the proposal.

"I definitely agree we need to do

something to control the speeding," said Cerini, but added: "I am sure that if we put our heads together between the merchants association, homeowners association, and the schools, we can do something to reduce the speed."

Cerini said that after the April full-board meeting, it seemed like the so-called 'road diet' proposal was not moving forward, but then he learned at a Tuesday, May 12 CB 10 Municipal Services Committee meeting that it was.

Cerini said he was gratified by the final vote.

"I applaud CB 10 for doing the right thing," said Cerini.

Prince said that the board could have been better informed about the community's feelings about the proposal, but he also said that CB 10 has a responsibility to look at all sides.

For its part, through a spokesman, DOT stated that it would be happy to abide with the CB 10 decision.

Also not supported by CB 10 was an idea to make the Hutchinson River Parkway service road between East Tremont and Westchester avenues one way, and the narrowing of East Tremont Avenue at Whitmore Avenue.

Approved by CB 10 was the installation of a concrete island at Ericson Place and East Tremont Avenue.

Cary Leeds tennis center to open in June

A world-class tennis center is set to open in the Bronx next month.

New York Junior Tennis & Learning will celebrate the opening of the Cary Leeds Center for Tennis & Learning in Crotona Park on June 15.

When it opens, the multi-use 12,000-square foot, two-story clubhouse will contain classrooms, a youth lounge and fitness center, and a technology learning lab that will facilitate NYJTL's educational initiatives, as well as a fully-functional tennis club with locker rooms and a pro shop.

The center's 20 tennis courts, 10 of which will be covered for weather, plus two to be built with stadium seating, will host more than 6,000 hours per year of free tennis for New York City youth, in addition to numerous tournaments.

The Crotona Park courts have been home to one of NYJTL's existing community tennis programs, which offers free tennis instruction to thousands of kids across the city, for more than 20 years.

The organization also already provides academic programming at dozens of sites across the city, including 15 schools in the Bronx, five of which are within walking distance of the tennis center.

The ties to the neighborhood made Crotona Park the obvious place for the Cary Leeds center, said NYJTL CEO Deborah Antoine.

"This is an old home for us," she

NYJTL's mix of tennis and academic programing uses sports as a vehicle for learning life skills, said Antoine.

Tennis helps the kids learn about persistence, winning and losing, and other important lessons which ultimately help them succeed in school and other areas.

"It's all about developing character," said Antoine.

NYJTL's programming attracts parents because of the emphasis on learning and the nurturing environment,

she said, and the families' love of tennis comes later.

"It's contagious," said Antoine.

The organization wants the center to be a place that hosts model programs, such as Breakthrough New York, which coaches high-ability, low-income middle schools students all the way through the college admissions process. Their third location will be based at the clubhouse.

Other partners include the Tennis Channel, which has provided film equipment to teach the kids about broadcast and media, and the Women Sports Foundation.

"It's so much more than a tennis club," said Antoine about the center.

But the tennis club, the revenue from which will support the non-profit, is filled with reminders of the sport's legends.

The clubhouse itself is named after sports icon and social justice pioneer Billie Jean King, who supported the project.

'New York Junior Tennis and Learning's new Cary Leeds Center is rooted in a great cause, promoting the love of tennis and healthy exercise in one of the most impoverished neighborhoods in our country," said King. "NYJTL strives to build champions on and off the court, and I fully expect this new venue to not only foster a deep appreciation of tennis and education in this community but to make a difference in the lives of so many."

The modern clubhouse was designed and built by Gluck+, which aimed to create a building that was both unobtrusive in the park—one of its two stories is below ground—yet sculptural in nature, said Peter Gluck.

But above all, the function of the center drove the design, which will offer multiple viewing points of the two stadium style tennis courts that will open

"It's a wonderful celebration of tennis," said Gluck about the project.





Accident prone intersection causes traffic safety concerns

Safety concerns for a accident prone intersection have resurfaced after a recent incident put a crossing guard in the hospital.

On Friday, May 15, the crossing guard was struck by a car outside of Our Lady of Mount Carmel School at around 8:20 a.m. as students were arriving for class.

"In an unfortunate incident this morning, school crossing guard Jenny Arias was struck by a car at the intersection of East 188th Street and Bathgate in Belmont. She is in great pain, but in stable condition and much appreciation goes to Local 372 for monitoring her progress. My staff and I send our thoughts and prayers to Jenny and her family and wish her a speedy recovery," Councilman Ritchie Torres said.

In years prior, parents and school faculty have petitioned the New York City Department of Transportation to have either an all-way stop sign or traffic light installed at this intersection, however their request were denied by the DOT's traffic study.

The area's present signage and faded crosswalk paint is deemed insufficient by community members and local elected officials in enforcing traffic laws and safeguarding pedestrians and students as they cross the street.

"I share the frustrations of the Mount Carmel school community in advocating for preventive traffic measures. For the past four years, Mount Carmel has reached out to the city's Department of Transportation to get traffic calming measures implemented at that dangerous intersection," Torres expressed. "They've requested speed bumps, stop signs, and lane markings to no avail. While DOT has made the reduction of traffic related fatalities a priority through Vision Zero, in this case instead of implementing the measures it prolonged the process by re-

questing a study to be conducted first. Our children and community members deserve an immediate solution not more red tape and excuses from city agencies."

"Now is the time to take action. I will convene a meeting between DOT, school leaders and community members to discuss what traffic calming measures can be implemented. I'll also work with my colleagues in the City Council to introduce legislation to require DOT to install traffic calming measures in front of schools. We cannot wait for another school crossing guard or one of our children to be hurt to demand change," he added.

According to the NYPD's Motor Vehicle Collision Data Report for April 2015, a collision occurred at this intersection involving two individuals, one driving a sports utility / station wagon vehicle and another driving a vehicle labeled "unknown," however no injuries were reported in that particular incident.

On Friday, May 15, Senator Jeff Klein wrote to NYCDOT Commissioner Constance Moran on behalf of the school urging her to reevaluate this intersection following the morning's incident.

"It's clear that something needs to be done to improve traffic safety at the intersection of East 188th Street and Bathgate Avenue," Senator Klein stated. will benefit all residents."

According to a NYCDOT spokesperson, the department is currently re-evaluating the feasibility of an allway stop sign for the intersection and is looking into installing a speed bump on East 188th Street between Washington and Bathgate avenues.

NYCDOT will refurbish the street markings as well as check the area's school crossing and school zone signs to evaluate if additional signage is required.

By now the community has heard the news, the NYC D.O.T. East Tremont Avenue 'road diet plan' was voted down. For those who are unaware of the road diet plan, the proposal was to reduce travel lanes on East Tremont Avenue between Waterbury and Baisley avenues from two lanes each way to only one lane in each direction.

I am proud to say that we at the Throggs Neck Merchant Association came together with the rest of the community to fight this proposal. Community Board 10 tabled the proposal at the April meeting of the Municipal Services Committee. We were told there would be no vote in May, but instead it was taken to a vote and defeated by the nine member committee on May 12.

I was glad I was able to attend that meeting and bring that news back to the community. In a short period of a few days our community unified to reverse the proposal at the full board meeting held on May 21st.

There were many concerns about the plan that would cause congestion to other areas such as Crosby and Logan avenues. These streets have schools such as P.S.14 and St Benedicts School where hundreds of children would be at risk due to higher traffic flow.

I am a lifelong resident and business owner in Throggs Neck. All my children attend the local schools. As you can imagine, as parent and home owner, I am also concerned about pedestrian safety. While we agree with the community board that we have to do something about the speeding that takes place in certain areas, the solution has to be better than congesting our neighborhood and shifting the danger onto residential areas.

I feel that we as a community can come up with better solutions to this problem. As I walked along East Tremont to have petitions signed against the proposal, I was given some great ideas by residents and business owners.

Some ideas were to add flashing lights as you approach the curve at Whitmore Avenue, speed bumps, additional traffic lights, a stop sign and crosswalk, rumble strips, additional speed limit signs

and speed cameras. Some also suggested having police officers stationed there for a period of time to warn speeders on the first offense and then ticket on the next offense.

Ultimately, while we need drivers to be more cautious, we also need to place additional responsibility on our pedestrians. Pedestrians need to be held accountable and follow the rules as well. In my lifetime I have been hit by two cars, one at seven years old because I ran into the street without looking both ways and one at 14 by a drunk driver.

I am one of the lucky ones who lived to tell my story. I learned to be more cautious today because I know how it feels to be hit by a car. However we cannot let fear allow us to make changes that we will regret later.

We at the Throggs Neck Merchants welcome the opportunity to work with CB 10 and NYC D.O.T to come up with acceptable alternatives that may solve the problem at hand. Again I would like to thank all of those who came out to help get the proposal voted down. 
and Spanish in the lobby of the building.



Community celebrates up-zoned groundbreaking

A groundbreaking just a few blocks from Yankee Stadium may have ushered in a new era of building for the area.

The new 17-story, 134-unit apartment residential building, with first- and second-floor retail space, was said to be the first to take advantage of a 2009 Department of City Planning rezoning of East 161 Street and River Avenue.

The rezoning paves the way for high-density residential and commercial development.

The project being developed on River Avenue between East 157th and 158th streets will include housing for very-low, low and middle income tenants, many 'green' elements and a 61-space garage.

Borough President Ruben Diaz, Jr. indicted that the project was a harbinger of things to come in the area, and said he was proud to provide \$1 million in capital funding.

"This is exactly what we are looking for," said Diaz of

would set the tone for development in other nearby communities that had been rezoned in recent years.

The building at 810 River Avenue is financed under Mayor de Blasio's comprehensive affordable housing plan that plans to build or maintain 200,000 affordable units in ten vears.

The project will include about 26,000 square-feet of commercial and community space.

"(The building at) 810 River Avenue demonstrates how a rezoning can be a catalyst for mixed-use, mixed-income residential redevelopment in transit-rich neighborhoods," said Vicki Been, Department of Housing Preservation and Development commissioner. Anthony Richardson represented the Housing Development Corporation at the groundbreak-

the project, who added that it field requiring environmental remediation. The block had been the location of a bowling alley for roughly 50 years.

"We want to keep and draw our families and professionals here, and to have the people who already live here have quality and affordable housing," he said.

With a major part of CB 4 along Jerome Avenue north of the construction site being studied for rezoning, Jose Rodriguez, the district manager, said that he wants the community to be part of the process, helping city agencies develop best practices and have their voices heard on what they would like to see in their community.

As for 810 River Avenue, south of the area being considered for rezoning, the district manager had words of praise for the developers.

"We applaud their courage and investment in the community," said Rodriquez.

Despite the large crowds that he has played in front of, Markov has shown that whether he's performing at a venue in front of an audience of 20 or 20,000, his level of effort remains the same.

"I always give maximum effort during my performances, no matter the audience, the location or the venue, because having the same approach towards every performance will help me continue to make progress as an artist," said Markov, who performed at Celia Cruz Bronx High School of Music for the first time on





Soundview forms drug free coalition

A newly formed community group hopes they can make a difference in Soundview.

Local residents and representatives from communitybased organizations came together on May 26 for the first meeting of the Soundview Community Drug Free Coalition.

The formation of the coalition was initiated by the Soundview Residents Council, which will apply to be part of the federal Drug-Free Communities Support Program, which provides grants to eligible coalitions of \$125,000 per year for five years, renewable for five more.

The program's mission is reducing the abuse of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, prescription and other drugs among youth, grades 6 through 12.

A grant, if secured, would fund communication campaigns, workshops, and other efforts to address the culture of drugs in the community.

But in order to apply and receive a grant in 2016, the coalition must be established for six months with members

from 12 community sectors, meet regularly and develop a plan for the funding's use. The coalition also must identify matching funds for the grant, although in-kind donations can be included.

The mix of members must include representatives from the sectors of youth, parent, business, media, school, youth-serving organization, law enforcement, religious/ fraternal organization, civic/ volunteer group, healthcare professional, governmental agency with expertise in substance abuse and other organization involved in reducing substance abuse.

Participating organizations include Urban health Plan, Jobs Plus Goodwill, Leake and Watts, Odyssey House, Bronx Connect, Councilwoman Annabel Palma's office and NYPD PSA 8, among others. The Bronx Times Reporter is participating in the coalition as the media partner.

In order to be successful, coalition members need to learn about the various issues drug issues affecting youth, such as the use of new

powdered alcohol or their access to relatives' prescription drugs, and then develop communication campaigns and workshops to address those issues, said coalition facilitator Dr. Jose Ramirez, who is guiding the group's process.

The goal is to support youth and provide them with guidance, while creating an unfriendly environment for drugs, said Ramirez, emphasizing that the coalition needs to be in it for the long haul.

"You can't beat this drum once and expect the problem to go away," said Ramirez.

Soundview Residents Council president Anne Johnson recognizes the challenges the coalition will face in its mission.


"I know we'll never get all the drugs out of the community, but hopefully we can get some," said Johnson. "We'll let them know we're not going to take it, we're not going to put up with it."

She hopes that as the coalition takes off, more local organizations, community residents, and neighboring housing projects will want to get involved.

Members of the Soundview Residents Council said they felt energized by the first meeting, seeing other organizations come together to address the issue.

"We feel like we're going to do something that matters," said Maxine Rice.



Independent film shot in Mott Haven

Though it appears on the film's currency, this statement actually came from a resident happy to see a crew shooting this movie in his neighbor-

Filmed in Mott Haven, 'Inside Out/Outside In' is a dance film and live performance art piece created in collaboration by filmmaker Jennifer Klein and 277 Dance Project. Its cast consists of five dancers and one actor.

The independent film was shot inside a working Delbia Do Factory located at 2550 Park Avenue and was filmed around its hours of operation.

'Inside Out/Outside In' is best described as a visually stunning art piece occurring in a factory where each character has a specific role and face life from the inside-out and outside-in.

Klein expressed a lifelong interest in filming and while living in England at age 16, she filmed Cornwall fishermen as part of a film project.

Her background includes experience in production design and film design and she has worked on several Broadway shows including 'Grand

> Klein has film experience most notably shooting two documentaries following the 2010 Haitian earthquake and what doctors experience there everyday.

"I'm inspired by the places I've lived in and by the people I meet. They're a great source of inspiration and whenever you put yourself into another neighborhood, you really absorb a lot around you," she shared.

Founded in 2008, 277 Dance Project's mission is to create emotionally driven work and collaborates with theater artists, original music, and visual art to establish works evoking emotion, empathy, and deeper meaning.

"It was a great experience working with Jennifer and seeing how she transformed the neighborhood all around us into this magical world. It's a very abstract film serving as an art piece that is open to interpretation," Nicole Philippidis, 277 Dance Project choreographer and artistic director


"The score is very industrial in its composition and stays true to the sounds of the environment of the factory," Philippidis explained.

A Bronx veteran who served as a senior nurse advisor caring for American soldiers and Afghani civilians was recently awarded a certificate of recognition honoring her contributions to her nation and the medical field.

On Tuesday, May 19, Senator Jeff Klein honored Analiza Benjamin, Captain in the United States Navy Reserve Nurse Corps. and North Bronx Healthcare Network senior associate director for nursing administration at the 2015 Veterans Hall of Fame Celebration in Albany.

"For the distinguished men and women in uniform who have proudly served this country, the American people owe you a great debt of gratitude. I am proud to stand with my colleagues in government to honor and celebrate Analiza Benjamin who has served in the U.S. Navy Reserve for nearly 20 years," Senator Jeff Klein expressed.

Serving as senior nurse corpsofficer, Benjamin worked as senior nurse advisor to the Afghanistan National Army's

into Dari, the native Afghan language and conducted numerous training sessions and presentations regarding patient safety, quality patient care as well as attaining and self-sustaining a quality health care.

train and educate Afghan residents on these issues.

In 2013, she was transferred to Operational Health Support Unit Portsmouth Detachment A, Navy Operational Support Center New York City with the rank of captain to ensure proper communication among clinical personnel and certain military liaison/personnel.

As the North Bronx Health Care Network's senior associate director of nursing administration, Benjamin oversees the operation and clinical staffing of the hospital to ensure both patient safety and satisfaction.

In addition, she is responsible for the development and implementation of the nursing department's policies and procedures.

Prior to her military service in Afghanistan, Benjamin engaged in humanitarian medical missions in Thailand and her native Philippines.

"As an immigrant to the United States, being inducted into the Veterans Hall of Fame means a great deal to me," Benjamin divulged.

NYBG Board member Sigourney Weaver presented the Garden's Founders Award to Eric Schmidt, Google's Executive Chairman, in appreciation of Google's major financial and technical support for the Garden's work on

A grant from the Sloan Foundation is not only funding the Garden's work on WFO but will also be used to make WFO accessible through NYBG on the open-access Digital Public Library of America, a searchable portal of the full breadth of human knowledge and ex-

Research by the Garden's scientists, both in the field and on-site at NYBG's International Plant Science Center, is a major source of the WFO data, expected to be available to the public by 2020. The much-needed project is critical to biodiversity scientists, science educators, government policy makers, conservationists, and the world at large.

Montefiore Health System announced its support for the Coalition for Organ Distribution Equity (CODE), a national coalition with the mission of reducing geographic disparities in wait times for donated organs and the severity of patients' illnesses at the time of transplant. These disparities are responsible for more than 100 avoidable deaths every year.

The demand for transplantable organs in the United States has long outpaced the supply. More than 90,000 people are on the nation's organ transplant waiting list and about 10 percent of them are in New York State. While 7,000 people in our area are waiting for life-saving organs, last year, this area had only 261 donors. On average, 106 people are added to the nation's organ transplant waiting list each day -- one person in desperate need of a transplanted organ every 14 minutes.

Making matters worse, the nation's organ allocation system creates geographic disparities in access to organs: people living in some parts of the country, particularly New York, wait far longer and are sicker when they receive organs than those in other parts of the country. Consequently, hundreds of Americans needlessly die every year waiting for organs. By decreasing the number of regions used to determine organ allocation, discrepancies in wait times can be reduced and lives can be saved.

CODE strongly supports efforts by the Organ Procurement and Transplant Network (OPTN), under the authority of the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), to reform the methodology by which organs are distributed for transplant in the U.S. Last summer, the OPTN-designated United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS) Liver and Intestinal Organ Transplantation Committee issued a concept paper that outlined new organ distribution models. CODE is calling for a data-driven approach to determining a new methodology that will reduce geographic disparities and save lives.

The UNOS Liver Committee is convening on June 22 to discuss its progress and welcome public comment.



DR. ANITA VAZQUEZ BATISTI

Turns theory into practice for tomorrow's educators

Dr. Anita Vazquez Batisti, an associate dean and founding director of the Center for Educational Partnerships at Fordham University's Graduate School of Education, has raised over \$230 million through public and private sources during her career, to design programs that develop theory into practice for tomorrow's educators.

The center's mission is to provide services and assistance to teachers, administrators, students and parents, as well as to education and government agencies designed to enable all children to achieve and succeed.

Dr Batisti is an experienced, knowledgeable educator, fundraiser and administrator who understands the complexities and subtleties of both urban and suburban school systems, related service providers and empowered networks.

During the course of her career she has served as an administrator, educator and development specialist for NYC schools districts, the NYC Department of Education, Fordham University, Pace University, TNew York University, The United States Department of Education, the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and not-for-profit organizations.



Her grant writing abilities have launched the following initiatives in her role at Fordham: the first Bronx Regional Bilingual/ESL Technical Assistance Center serving the Bronx exclusively, the Lower Hudson Valley Bilingual/ESL Technical Assistance Support Center, Bilingual School Psychology Support Center Long Island/, ESL Teacher Leadership Academy, and the Mathematics and Literacy Coaching.

Her work with the Fordham Partnership Organization gives Anita access to 35 public schools, using a diagnostic-prescriptive approach to develop targeted interventions for students and their families.

The Fordham programs serve over 700 schools, 1,000 K-12 teachers, 100 administrators and 10,000 students in New York state.

"I am a true lover of New York City", the upper east side born and raised native confessed. Growing up in the 'not so chic' mid 60s when it was rent-controlled afforded her the many wonderful amenities the city had to offer. She currently owns a co-op not far from where she grew up.

"My grammar school was a block away and I attended a high school across the street from where I lived, and Central Park was my backyard, what's better than that," she recalled of her childhood.

Her dad, born in Puerto Rico, was a postal worker and her mom of Hungarian descent, always stressed education. When Anita's parents split up she watched her mother become very independent, taking on a job as an airline reservation agent. From this experience she learned how important it was to be self suf-



NANCY BIBERMAN

Creating and preserving sustainable affordable housing

Nancy Biberman is a nationally-recognized expert in the creation and preservation of sustainable affordable housing and community-focused development, with more than 30 years of experience advocating for low-income families across New York City.

Nancy began her career as a legal services lawyer. She was part of a team that sued New York City and the state, winning the first class action lawsuit in the country to give battered women access to the court system and police protection. As the founder and director of Women's Housing and Economic Development Corporation (WHEDco), Nancy has worked to provide low-income south Bronx families with the stable, enriching communities and opportunities usually reserved for more affluent neighborhoods.

Her work is inspired by her belief that pride of place is a transformative force in families' lives, leading to a focus on affordable housing and the elements vital to a vibrant community – economic opportunity, retail, healthy food, culture, health care and education.

In 1995, Nancy conceived, financed and developed the dilapidated Morrisania Hospital, long a symbol of



the disinvestment and abandonment that plagued the Bronx. WHEDco reopened the building as Urban Horizons, a mixed-use, award-winning affordable housing complex and economic development center.

At a time when affordable hous-

ing development was disconnected from economic development, health and education, Urban Horizons included a primary health care facility, a food business incubator, and Head Start Center with seats for more than 100 children.

WHEDco's Intervale Green followed in 2009 and is the nation's largest multifamily, Energy Star-certified affordable housing development. Built to provide Bronx families with far more than homes, Intervale Green contains art installations, a rooftop farm, and WHEDco's Childcare Training Institute, which trains hundreds of women each year to become licensed home-based childcare entrepreneurs.

The organization plans to break ground this year on Bronx Commons, an arts-based development with affordable housing and the Bronx Music Heritage Center, in the Melrose neighborhood. All told, under Nancy's leadership, WHEDco now reaches more than 40,000 people annually through affordable homes and a variety of programs.

Nancy first cut her teeth in affordable housing development while working for MFY Legal Services,



where she developed the West End Intergenerational Residence, a multigenerational housing development for low-income residents and the first conversion of privately-held SRO housing to nonprofit ownership in New York City.

Nancy was then hired by Catholic Charities to manage a 23-building city-financed housing rehabilitation project in the Highbridge area. She was founder of the East Side SRO Law Project and negotiated precedent-setting housing preservation language in the Union Square Special Zoning District that created hundreds of units of affordable housing.

Nancy is a graduate of Barnard College and Rutgers-Newark Law School, and is a recipient of the James A. Johnson Fellowship from the Fannie Mae Foundation and a Revson Fellowship at Columbia University's School of Architecture and Planning.

Nancy's work has received recognition from the 2009 National Charles L. Edison Tax Credit Excellence Award for Green Housing and the Paul Davidoff Award for Leadership in Housing and Equal Opportunity from the American Planning Association.

Making strides in HIV/AIDS prevention

One Bronx doctor is making strides in HIV/AIDS prevention.

Dr. Yvette Calderon, director of the emergency medicine director at North Central Bronx Hospital, has been recognized for her significant work in the

She was recently named one of the National Hispanic Health Foundation's 'Key Leaders' in expanding health care access, and last year was the The New York State Department of Health AIDS Institute honored her with the Dr. Linda Laubenstein Annual HIV Clinical Excellence Award.

Dr. Calderon, of Puerto Rican heritage, grew up in a housing project. Her family struggled with language barriers in medicine.

"I saw first hand issues of access to care," she said. "That was something I knew I wanted to correct."

Dr. Calderon, who attended Einstein College of Medicine and has spent her entire career within the North Bronx Healthcare Network at both Jacobi and NCBH, said she was drawn to emergency medicine because it's a gateway for patients receiving all types of care.

"You're the first person they get to see," she said.

Her interest in preventing HIV/



AIDS came from her experiences in the emergency departments during the 90s, when she saw many people with the disease coming into the hospital.

"We all knew if we could find these patients earlier, they wouldn't become AIDS patients," said Dr. Calderon.

Dr. Calderon, who is also the associate dean of Diversity Enhancement at Einstein, has spent the past 15 years doing research in HIV prevention and implementing those findings at NCBH and Jacobi. Her mission of prevention

The first part is to getting as many people tested as possible. The second step is providing 'linkage to care,' which means getting people with positive test results to meet with a specialized HIV provider for a full evaluation and future treatment.

"When you retain these patients in care, you don't see them in the ER," said Dr. Calderon

In order to achieve these goals, Dr. Calderon and medical director of the North Bronx Health Network's Adult HIV Service Dr. Jason Leider, developed Project BRIEF.

The model for HIV prevention has five components—Behavioral intervention, Rapid HIV Testing, Innovative video, Efficient cost and health care saving and Facilitated seamless link to outpatient HIV care—and Calderon has presented the model all over the world.

One of the key components that Calderon helped develop was the introduction of HIV testing to emergency rooms, to reach more people.

When patients are first seen, they are asked if they would like to take an



HIV test. Those who say no are given an educational video on the subject to help convince them to take a test, and watch a second video while they wait for results.

Calderon said because people often feel uncomfortable discussing sexual health in person, videos are more effective at getting the message across, and about one-third of the patients who initially deny the test change


The hospital continues to engage and educate patients after they test positive, sending them links to short videos on various issues surrounding living with HIV.

The videos and other innovate techniques the hospital uses for outreach have been developed through extensive research with community partici-

"You need to know what's important to them to get them to buy in and take care of themselves," said Calde-

All that hard work has paid off. Since Project BREIF was launched at NBHN in 2005, Jacobi and NCB hospitals have tested more than 100,000 patients, and the hospital has increased 'linkage to care' to 85 percent.

"We know it works," said Calderon.

Protecting workers from greedy contractors

Michelle Centeno works for the NYC Comptroller's Office and is responsible for making sure that all firms awarded NYC contracts pay prevailing wages to all their employees.

"We investigate all complaints, some deriving from the worker, others from a union rep," she said.

She explained that recently there was a security installation at Jacobi Medical Center. The prevailing rate of pay for that type of work being performed was \$60 an hour, but the contractor was only paying \$12 to \$20 an hour.

"We come in, review the work records and perform an audit assessment to determine if there is a violation," she explained.

"If the firm is found at fault, it's ordered to pay the underpaid workers the difference in pay plus 6% to 16% interest, compounded daily," she said.

Sometimes contract awardees bring in sub-contractors or labor brokers in an effort to circumvent the prevailing wage law, that has been on the books or over 50 years.

"In a tight employment market, the workers will agree to take a lower rate of pay."





She is the co-founder of the Bronx Clergy Roundtable, the largest partner-coalition in the Bronx boasting of over 500 clergy partners comprised of clergy and community leaders.

She is also the co-founder of the New York City Clergy Roundtable, a network of clergy from all five boroughs working together on critical issues facing our city.

Rev. Que has been involved in various compaigns across the city including the living wage campaign, paid sick leave campaign, fiar wages for fast food workers campaign, fair wages for airport workers campaign,

Most notably, Rev. Que was one of three negotiators who solidified the historic community benefits agreement (CBA) on behalf of the people



for the Kingsbridge National Ice Center.

After losing a brother to the crack epidemic, Rev. Que became aware that if her brother had the proper

direction, he would still be alive to-

"If we catch the young from making bad choices early, we can change the outcome of their life," she said. "Many of these young adults can't see themselves outside their environment.."

She was not drawn into the social scene she was surrounded by and took her school work seriously.

After attending an elementary school gifted program, she was accepted to Stuyvesant High School.

"My breakthrough came at 13 years old. A French teacher took me to a fancy French restaurant where only French was spoken. It exposed me to a world beyond my block. I learned there is more to life," she re-

The culture she experienced made her want more.

"If given the opportunity many youngsters living in drug infested, permiscuous environments would respond. There's a lack of support and expsore," she said.

Her biggest campaign at this time is to raise the age of teens from 16 to 18 to be placed in an adult prison population.


"Sixteen and 17 year olds don't belong with adults in prison. There are higher rates of sucide, rape and ricidivism," she explained.



Some of her awards include: Standing on Her Shoulder award, Women of Excellence award, Minister of the Year award, Senator Joseph L. Galiber award and others.





Creating a working relationship with the police

Elizabeth Gill is a Bronx-born community leader who has devoted a good portion of her life to making a difference.

Raised by Trinidadian parents, she first became involved in community service when she and her brother, at age 14, joined a center run by the Jewish Council. The Daily News and the defunct New York Mirror were conducting a youth leadership program which they both joined.

"It was an opportunity to meet Danny Kaye," she recalled, adding "The program took an interest in ustook us to the Bronx Zoo and other places. It was during WWII and our parents didn't own a car."

From that humble start Elizabeth learned the importance of community service.

When her three daughters attended local schools she was involved in their PTAs, right up to college. "I felt it was important to be involved in their education.

When her youngest daughter came home from a nearby park in 1988, and told her mom, "I can't go back to that park anymore, some guy showed me a gun and another



was smoking marijuana," Elizabeth knew it was time to attend 47th Precinct Community Council meetings.

three lovely daughters at that time and I wanted that same feeling to be shared with all the parents in the precinct," she said.

As the president of the 47th Precinct Community Council for the past 20 years she has worked tirelessly to foster good relations with the police officers. "We're at a point in the 47th where we have a great deal of respect for one another."

Elizabeth pointed to a situation that occurred a few years back when an officer chased a young man into his home and the man was shot dead. When the police officer was acquitted of any wrongdoing, there were no riots, just organized protests, she said. "That was because the community and the police have had a longstanding relationship.

"The NYC Police Department should bring back the'beat cop,' she feels. In those days everybody knew the police officer's name and he knew their names as well, she said.

"That's the best way to reduce crime in our communities - our kids need to relate to the police," she believes.

Elizabeth's precinct council "I was very fortunate to raise meetings are held once a month at

various locations within the precinct's confines. A guest speaker is invited that is pertinent to the part of the precinct hosting the meeting. Over 100 people attend her meetings.

"The residents of the community get a chance to voice their concerns directly to the precinct's captain," she said.

The community advocate has worked with many other area organizations over the years including the 47th Precinct Crisis Intervention Report Team, North Bronx Williamsbridge Branch NAACP, Mt. Vernon Police Department, a volunteer at St. Mary's Hospital for Special Needs, coordinated Bronx Borough Harmony Day Event, coordinated the annual 47th Precinct Harmony Breakfast and coordinated the annual 47th Precinct Children's Holiday Party. She has secured many grants for the 47th Precinct community.

She has been awarded for her dedication by the Korean Merchants Association of the Northeast Bronx, Police Reserve Association of NYC, East of Laconia Association, NYS Association of Black and Puerto Rican Legislators, Seton Falls Restoration and many, many more..



She has received awards from The New York League of Puerto Rican Women, Angels to the Rescue and St. Lucy's Church.







BARBARA ROBLES-GONZALEZ

Putting the emphasis on community in the DA's office

Barbara Robles-Gonzalez was born in 'El Barrio, but raised in the Soundview area, where she still resides today. She attended Adlai E. Stevenson High School where she ranked in the top 3% of the class.

She attended St. Lawrence University on a scholarship, where she studied Government and Caribbean and Latin Amrican Studies. She obtained her Masters in Public Administration at New York University's Rober F. Wagner School of Public Service.

Ironically she was in the Bronx District Attorney's Explorer Program when she was in high school, never realizing that upon graduating NYU in 1998 she would land a job in the DA's office, where she still serves today as director of the Community Affairs Unit.

"The first time I met Mr. Robert Johnson, the Bronx District Attorney, he appeared so down to Earth. He was so inviting to speak to," she recalled.

During her 16-year tenure, Barbara was the program director for the Operation Weed and Seed program operating in the cofines of the 43rd Precinct. The program strategy was a federally-funded initiative that aimed to 'weed' out the criminal element, while 'seeding' positive



programs in targeted high-crime neighborhoods.

She also managed a staff of trained personnel to provide alternatives to the streets through 'Safe Havens', such as recreational programs and homework

In 2002 she was promoted to deputy director of the Community Affairs Unit. Her new responsibilities included overseeing the programmatic details to many of the effective CAU programs that engaged different facets of the community through outreach, education and intervention.

Barbara has held the director's position for the last eight years. She is responsible for the overall administration of the prevention and intervention programs for youth, adults, seniors, and communities, as a whole





REVEREND CARMEN HERNANDEZ

Making sure her neighbors receive all services

Reverend Carmen Hernandez has pursued a life of community commitment. The oldest of nine siblings on her mother's side, she has made gargantuan efforts to see that her neighbors receive adequate services.

At the age of 6 her family relocated to the Bronx from Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico. After several stops along the way Rev. Carmen finally settled down as an adult in Soundview.

In 1997 she was ordained a youth-community pastor by the Gathering Place Global Ministry and hasn't stopped organizing since.

This led Rev. Carmen to take a leadership role in her community over 30 years ago. She first became involved in tenant causes, representing 1471-73 Watson Avenue Tenant Group.

She founded the Stratford Community Services, Inc. to empower atrisk inner city children. Through her efforts and a slew of activities specifically targeted towards youth she has



proven to be a vital part of her community. She sponsored self esteem workshops and computer literacy classes

She coordinated the first Stratford Annual Back 2 School Jam Block Party, which continued for two decades.

efforts and a slew of activities specifically targeted towards youth she has persuading many to work together to

build a stronger business outlook to empower the shopkeepers to create a positive environment in the neighborhood. She credits Rite Check Cashing and Inca Cola for stepping forward to lead the charge on commercial landlord issues

Rev. Carmen also helped build the Bronx Christmas Parade and is currently working on the 1st Macy's Bronx Thanksgiving Parade.

Ten years ago she founded and currently serves as the senior vice president of the Bronx Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Inc. and is presently the president/founder of the 1st NYC LGBTQS Chamber of Commerce.

Eventhough she was diagnosed with a debilitating case of fibre myalgia, which left her disabled, her advocacy goes on undaunted. She came out as a lesbian 30 years ago.

The reverend has received many awards and recognition for community efforts including:the Grounbreaker Latina Leader Award in 2006 by Catalina Magazine; the NYS Regional and International Small Business Administration Award; Lo Mejor de Nuestra Comunidad Award; Our Youth's Hispanic LGBT Activist of the Year award; El Diario's Mujeres Destaca-

das Award; At&T Bold Honor Award; honored at the Pride Awards in the Lesbian of the Year category and Our Youth's Hispanic LGBT Activist of the Year honors.

DEBORAH HUNT

Textbook gives guidance to our caregivers

Deborah Hunt, a local professor and author, has published two textbooks about the nursing profession.

The Nurse Professional: Leveraging Your Education for Transition into Practice is a new textbook by the College of New Rochelle associate professor of nursing, Pelham Bay local, and Community Board 10 Health and Human Services Committee chairwoman.

The book is intended to serve as a guide for student nurses as they transition from the classroom to the workplace in hospitals and medical facilities.

"The new book is for student nurses and new nurses as they are preparing to become registered nurses," stated Hunt. "This is a foundational book for all students and new nurses to prepare them for their transition into their professional practice role."

She explained that the tips and techniques she advocates in the The Nurse Professional have a basis in her own experience both working at hospitals like Montefiore-Einstein, Our Lady of Mercy Medical Center (now Montefiore North) and Westchester Square Medical Center (now Mon-



tefiore Westchester Square), her 20 years in nursing and in her experience as a nurse educator at CNR.

"The book is kind of a culmination of a lot of things that are going on in my career," said Hunt. "When I worked in the hospital I did a lot of recruitment and hired a lot of new nurses, and I noticed that a lot of times

they would leave rather quickly. They would just feel overwhelmed and even though we had orientation programs, reality would hit, burnout would occur, and we would just have this 'revolving door'."

After moving onto academia at CNR, she said she and her colleagues noted that many nurses who had graduated were coming back to the school with questions, sometimes feeling frustrated or overwhelmed, and in other cases having a hard time in their first job, said Hunt. Another challenge is passing the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX), she added.

Presented in four parts, the guide covers topics like successfully passing the NCLEX and getting your first position, time management and organizational skills, feeling confident and competent, nurse bullying and workplace violence.

The book also covers successful transition from college to the work-place, and how to delegate to nurses assistants. One of many ideas it advocates is journaling as a way to break stress and keep perspective during what can be trying times in a career.

The book is needed, Hunt said, because academic studies show as high as 30% turnover in the first year for new nurses, 57% in the second. All this turnover comes at a cost.

Hunt grew up in Morris Park and attended Columbus High School, St. Raymond's High School for Girls, and St. Francis Xavier. She later graduated from Mount Vernon School of Nursing, and earned a Bachelors Degree at Mercy College, a masters at CNR, and a doctorate (PhD) at Adelphi University, she said.

JUDY HUTSON

Activist proves 'Home is where the heart is'

'Home is where the heart is' goes the adage and no where is that saying more evident then on East 222nd

Judy Hutson, an executive board member of the East 222nd Street Block Association for the last 15 years, is a second generation caretaker of the broad residential roadway that connects the New England Thruway to the Bronx River Parkway.

Judy remembers that while growing up, her parents, who still live in the original house they purchased on East 222nd Street between White Plains Road and Barnes Avenue, fought the city's plan to turn an old church into a methadone treatment clinic and coordinated efforts with the police to rid the area of illegal drug sale activity,

"Their activism inspired me to get involved", she said of her Barbados-born parents who emigrated to the United States from London, England, when Judy was only 4-years old.

When it came time for Judy to plant her own roots, she purchased the house next door to her parent's home and continued their efforts to improve the quality of life for the families on East 222nd Street...

"We've addressed many concerns



over the years, one of the most urgent being the slowing down of traffic on the heavily-travelled thoroughfare," she explained.

Working through the Department of Transportataion traffic calming measures were initiated. The roadway was channeled into single lanes of traffic in each direction, with dedicated turn lanes and a bike lane.

When developers started replac-

ing single-family homes with small apartment buildings, the residents successfully rezoned the area to 2- and 3-family, thwarting any further undesirable attempts to disrupt the current streetscape.

Currently Judy obtained grant money from NYC Committee to purchase sidewalk flower pots for the 700 block. There are now 22 pots adorning the avenue. The city has also promised to install wrough iron barriers around each of the avenue's tree pits.

"Since we placed the pots on the avenue we're seeing less garbage. People respect what we're doing," she

Through the Bronx River Alliance she founded Friends of Shoelace Park to maintain the linear park space along the Bronx River Parkway from East 211th Street at Bronx Boulevard, nearly a mile, to East 230th Street.

She also serves as the co-chair to the Alliance's Greenway Team. For several years Judy organized a 10K run in the park, which started at 'The



DEBRA ANN JAFFEE

Commitment to others becomes a Godsend

A Bronxite, through and through, Debra Jaffee has moved only eight blocks over her lifetime from where she was born in Morris Park.

Debra credits her grandmother, who enlisted her at the age 17 to help some seniors complete paperwork, for her strong community commitment.

"I remember there were a couple of seniors that had difficulty reading documents they needed to fill out and my grandma had me do it for them, and that was the beginning," she said. "I continued to go to the senior center on a regular basis to help the seniors".

Little did she know then that her early exposure to volunteer work would become a therapeutic Godsend.

While raising her family she coached t-ball for the Van Nest Little League, became its first woman umpire and participated in local politics, even serving in an elective position as a State Committewoman. But her biggest challenge was yet to come.

About 13 years ago she was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis. The doctors told her the disease was going to be hard on the caregivers as well,



as she lost her ability to walk and her eyesight deteriorated.

The best way to fight the illness was to remain active and with her husband Keith's encouragement she joined the local community board.

Four years ago an opportunity presented itself when the 40- year old St. Clare's Senior Club's nonpaying

director position became available. The program had become dormant and needed to be massaged back to health.

The club, which does not accept funding, now serves over 100 seniors, complimenting the Morris Park Community Association's 3-day program.

"We meet one day at the center for activities and go on an outing the other day," she said.

"Seniors need to remain active, need to be on the move. This generation of seniors has friendships that go back 60 to 70 years. You'll never see anything like that again," Jaffee said.

The seniors are asked for a \$2 donation on Thursdays to defray the cost of the coffee and light refreshments. Some area merchants such as Conte's Bakery and Exit Realty donate to the center so that the seniors get an extra treat.

On certain holidays, such as Mother's Day, special events are held. This past holiday for \$5 they had a lunch and all the ladies received a red rose. Once a year the center holds an English Tea, when the members get dressed up and they hold a tea social. The club also features speakers



While on Community Board 11 she served on the Sanitation Committee and helped clean out Matthews Muliner Playground.











PROFESSOR CYNTHIA JONES

Passionately educating the most vulnerable

Professor Cynthia Jones has passionately educated the most vulnerable of Hostos Community College students with wonderful results.

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education recently named the English Department lecturer the 2014 New York State Professor of the Year.

Professor Jones began teaching all levels of English as a Second Language reading courses in the the late 1970s as an adjunct professor.

She has taught in the Hostos Community College Early College Initiative Program since its inception and served as an Office of Academic Affairs Faculty Fellow from 2011 to 2014.

Her interest and expertise in areas of high school-colloration and developmental education have defined her tenure at Hostos.

She is also the chairperson of the General Education Committee, codirector of the Honors Program, and interim co-director of the Center for Teaching and Learning, and coordinator of the Qualitative Reasoning Fellows Initiative.



Professor Jones grew up in the University Heights section of the Bronx, attnding P.S.26, J.H.S.82 and Walton High School.

Her dad taught her the importance of reading. He subscribed to the Reader's Digest and always read newspapers, she recalls. Her love for reading was further advanced by her English teachers who recommended many

great novels.

"I went through a phase when I read nothing but books by Russian authors," she confessed. "Today I'm still an avid reader."

She is a firm believer that a good educator can have a profound effect on a student's future.

"As a teacher you seldom know how you impact your students, but I was on an elevator once when a former student recognized me and said 'You are the best teacher. You changed my life. My life had been a mess, but after I took your summer workshop I became so motivated."

"Encounters like that remind you that the work you do can produce significant results", she said

Professor Jones believes it is important to give service to the community and donates many hours to her church and her employer where she serves on a conflict resolution committee

She resides in Parkchester, but spends most of her free time in South Carolina with her mom of 92 years.

During her visits to the south she has become fascinated with the history of the schools that where built Pronx Momen 2015

with 50/50 matching funds provided by Sears Roebuck and Company. All-in-all she believes over 5,000 of these modest school houses were constructed across the south during this program.

"My mom taught in one of them. They were built during the segregation period. Today, very few remain. They were small and could not accommodate the growing needs of the changing times," she said, adding, "Some have received landmark status".

BHARATI SUKUL KEMRAJ

Devoted to touching the heart of many

Born in Meten Meer Zorg, Guyana, Bharati Sukul Kemraj, commonly known as 'Kavita,' migrated to the Bronx at the age of seven. She is the daughter of Chandra Sukul and Pandit Vishnu, a Hindu priest. She has three sisters and two brothers. She graduated from Fordham University in 2006 with a B.A. in Communications and Media Studies.

In 2000, Bharati founded the Bharati Dance Academy at the Vishnu Mandir Hindu Temple, where she is still the dance teacher and choreographer. In 2008, she founded Bharati 'Where the Magic of Exposure Becomes Reality,' a media production and public relations company.

At BronxNet TV from 2005 to 2010, Bharati covered local, national and international news, events and topics for the New York Emmy Award-winning live show 'Open.'

She also coordinated guests, wrote scripts, created graphics and trained students in all areas of production for the weekly program 'Diálogo Abierto' and hosted the monthly program "Wel-IUS: The Pulse of our Community."

Planting the seeds for the next generation to enjoy

Nilka Martel still lives in the same building she was raised in on Virginia Avenue.

The para-legal by profession, turned an employment lull into a very satisfying block beautification effort.

She gathered her two children and her neighbors and they went to work pulling weeds from sidewalk cracks and planting curbside flower beds on her street.

She even got the elderly involved.

"We got a permit to close Virginia Avenue at Newbold Avenue and while the young took care of the spruce up, the older residents of the block cooked," she said.

She formed a not-for-profit organization, GIVE, getting involved in Virginia Avenue Effort, so she could raise hundreds of dollars to continue her work.

We've now expanded our efforts to other park properties," she said. "We must get the youth involved so they'll protect these valuable green spaces for the future generations."

The efforts involve picking up trash, installing tree guards, Expressway, to water the 40 trees



mulching and watering.

"Every week, a group of youngsters would accompany me to Concrete Park, of the Sheridan

"Our group now numbers over 500 volunteers, mostly from the Bronx," she said. "When we have these cleanups, we target our youth and educate them about not abusing our green space," she said.

She's teamed up with the Bronx River Alliance and is now adopting park trees, cleaning up litter-strewn public step streets, and has formed another group, Friends of Starlight Park.

Nilka is planning to retire GIVE and open a new not-forproft, named in honor of a good friend and fellow park's activist, Friends of Morgan Powell.

Morgan was known for his vast knowledge of the Black history pertaining to the Bronx River area. "We want to preserve his legacy, but add a Latino element to the lectures he presented.'

Milka has three children: Iantha Hernandez, 24, and the two that help her in the field, Lialynn, 18, and Isaias, 17. Her children have been instrumental in attracting the many youth volunteers

Wrting books so children learn to read

Naomi Pouchi, a retired educator, didn't lose her love of teaching when she left the classroom in 2012.

Years of reading to students also provided her insight in to what type of books young kids are drawn to, leading her to write about animals, jazz during those years.


From the period 1995 to 2003 over 85 half-hour shows were produced and aired spotlighting both local and world renown musical artists on the local public access channels.

Teaching young educators the value of giving

Dr. Lisa Anne Rizopoulos has forged a career in higher education that has brought together her highly recognized statute as an educator and the love and compassion for others taught to her by her mom and dad.

In 2015, Fiordaliza's dream came true when she was appointed by Mayor de Blasio to a 10-year term to the New York Family Court.



JUDGE LLINET ROSADO

Showing empathy for the underserved

Judge Llinet Rosado has spent her whole professional career empowering those without a voice. Whether an undocumented immigrant or a victim of domestic violence, she had the empathy to guide them to a better life.

The multi-faceted justice's varied background in public service has provided her the tools to make sound decisions from the bench.

She arrived in the Lower East Side from the Dominican Republic with her divorced mom and three sisters when she was 5, and moved to the Bronx when she married. All her legal experience has taken place in the Bronx

Upon graduation from Union University at Albany Law School she began a career at the Bronx Legal Aid Society, representing indigent people accused of commiting crimes. Subsequently, she became an attorney at Children's Law Center, where she represented children in custody, visitation, neglect, child support and domestic violence cases in both the Family Court and Integrated Domestic Violence Part.

"I've dedicated my life to public service," Judge Rosado said, adding, "The pay is small, but the rewards



are great, especially when you help another human being."

Her desire to empower others was instilled in her by an aunt that practices law in her native country. "She proved that the way you handle yourself will define your success, " she said. "She is an amazing person."

In 2012, when she came before the screening panel to be a judge candidate, her varied work history made her qualified for the civil, criminal or family court.

Later that year she was elected Civil Court Judge of Bronx County and currently sits in Bronx Family Court where she presides over custody, visitation and family offense petitions. In Family Court, she is the co-chair of the Custody, Visitation and Family Offenses Taskfoce and co-chair of the Bronx Family Court newsletter.

"My various experiences in public service provided me with a broad work history that was very marketable. I had worked in so many areas of the justice system," she explained.

Family court is going through a phase where decisions are made based on what's best for the child according to Judge Rosado. "Children do best when they have access to mom and dad, as long as the parents show respect to one another," she said

Since 1999 she has been a professor at Hostos Community College, where she has taught Criminal Law, Family Law, Trial Advocacy and Introduction to Criminal Justice Administration.

Judge Rosado has served on community boards 4 and 9 in the Bronx, was assistant treasurer of the Association of Law Secretaries of the Supreme and Surrogate's Courts, and served on he Council District 17th Round Table Advisory Committee.

She is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Latino Judges Association, Black Bar Association of Bronx County, Bronx Catholic LawBronx Influential Women 2015

WILMA TAMAYO

Providing legal guidance for the indigent

Wilma Tamayo, in her role as administrator and programmatic coordinator at Fordham University School of Law, oversees initiatives aimed at providing immigrant children, victims of domestic violence, those living in homeless shelters and anyone in need of help, guidance on their legal rights.

Born in the Dominican Republic, she came to the United States with her mom, a sister and two brothers at age 14, residing near the Grand Concourse and Fordham Road.

Her mom, who was a nurse in her native country, was reduced to doing factory work in her new homeland.

"My mom went to Columbia University and obtained a certicate degree in Holistic Medicine and shortly opened a holistic pharmacy," Wilma fondly remembered.

Wilma said her mom would coach her customers on proper nutrition.

"She put me and my sister through college, but unfortunately she did not live long enough to see me graduate," she said.

Since 2008 she has worked at Fordham University Center for Social Justice. In 2009 the school started to administer CLARO, Civil Legal Advice and Resource Office, to provide free le-



gal advice to residents with credit debt who are being sued by either an original creditor or debt buyer.

The program operates through partnerships with the Bronx County Bar Association, New York City Bar, Legal Services NYC-Bronx, NYU Law School Debtor's Rights Project and Fordham.

Many people got into trouble

with consumer debt during the financial crisis, when they lost jobs and fell behind on payments, she explained. Some used the credit cards to pay for medical emergencies she said.

Very often people don't know their rights, she said. They are taken to civil court but don't have legal help, and the majority of the cases end in a default judgment in favor of the creditor. This element of unfairness is part of the reson these cases present a social justice issue.

"These people don't have the money to pay for legal representation," she said. "The other side, they have representation."

"At the beginning there were only 4 to 5 volunteers dealing with 10 to 15 cases a week, but in 2015 over 60 people are counciled each session by almost 15 volunteers, made up of attorneys, law students, experts and staff members," Wilma said, adding "All the volunteers are very giving."

Some of the defendents CLARO helps were not properly served and are not aware of the issue until after a judgment has been entered agains them in court, and they find that their bank account is restrained or they receive a notice of garnishment from

their employer.

The Bronx CLARO program operates out of the Bronx County Courthouse each Thursday afternoon from 3 to 6 p.m.

"For me and for everyone at CLARO, it's important that these defendants to understand what's going on," she concluded.



LORETTA ZAINO

Bringing Italian language and culture to youngsters

Timing is everything in life and Loretta Zaino is living proof.

When Loretta entered junior high school, she was fast tracked to do 7th, 8th and 9th grades in two years. So when she graduated from college in 1973 with a teaching degree she quickly landed a job at a Soundview school teaching 6th grade. Her peers, that graduated the following year, had difficulty finding work because the city was in the midst of layoffs due to a financial crisis.

Her impressive work performance during her short stint at C.S. 232 and the fact that she was a licensed Math teacher got her an immediate position at a high school where she spent her entire career. After retirement she accepted a teaching assignment at Villa Maria Academy.

Loretta also had a license to teach Foreign Language and when an opportunity to teach Italian in St. Theresa's Aurora program, sponsored by the late-Senator Guy Vellela, was offered to her she did not hesitate to sign up.

When the funding dried up for the Italic Institute-run afterschool program she went out and convinced Senator Jeff Klein of the class' impor-



tance, and he agreed to contribute funding. Now with a smaller budget, she drastically cut her salary and moved the newly named Primavera Program to St. Benedict's. The program is offered on Saturday mornings for children in grades 4 through 8. There is no cost to the families that use the program.

"A lot of schools don't provide language, especially parochial schools," Loretta said adding, "Speaking another language gives a student an advantage."

Due to limited funds the class size has been cut in half and only 40 students per year can now receive instruction.

"We do more than teach Italian. The class is exposed to the Italian culture and cuisine as well," she said. At times a cook is invited in to make meatballs, and at other times a baker will make cannolis for the class.

From time-to-time some students have been able to turn their Italian class into a college scholarhip. One student was recently awarded a 4-year high school scholarship to the Scola d'Italia and four free years of college in Europe. Another student received a Columbus Citizen Foundation partial tuition scholarship to Fordham University.

In addition to the language program, she hosts an Italian Night Fundraiser for her parish, St. Benedict's every year since 2003. And she teaches an adult Italian language class as well.





Just in time for summer, there's another report on sunscreens. It says that 80% of sunscreens either don't work as effectively as the makers say and/or contain harmful ingredients. That is alarming because proper protection from the sun is crucial if we are to protect ourselves from skin cancer.

The analysis was published by Environmental Working Group (EWG) in their 2015 Guide to Sunscreens. They found that four out of five sunscreens, lip balms, and moisturizers don't live up to manufacturer's prom-Many contain oxybenzone which can penetrate the skin, enter the bloodstream.

and then disrupt the hormone system by acting as estrogen. Many also contain vitamin A, which sounds good but can heighten sun sensitivity and speed development of skin tu-

According to EWG the best sunscreens were made by: John Masters Organics, Seventh Generation, Adorable Baby, Alba Botanica, Allure, Blue Lizard, Bull Frog, Burt's Bees, Earth's Best, Nature's Gate. Raw Elements USA. Tropical Sands, True Natural and Vanicream. It's worth checking these out!

Surprisingly, EWG found the following sunscreen manufacturers to be the worst: Neutrogena, Banana Boat, Coppertone, NO-AD and Ocean

Potion. Who knew! And yes, the sunscreen I use is on this list! I think I'll try Bull Frog or Burt's Bees.

Another important point brought out by EWG is that according to the FDA, there's no increased protective benefit in products having a SPF above 50. Also SPF refers only to protection against UVB rays that burn the skin not UVA rays that accelerate aging, suppress the immune system and can cause skin cancer.

About 3.5 million people in the U.S.A will develop skin cancer this year and nearly 74,000 of these cases will be melanoma. That is three times as many as in the 1970's according to federal health statistics.

EWG suggests that we buy broad spectrum SPF sunscreens between 15 and 50, limit sun exposure, buy products with natural ingredients that block both UVA and UVB ravs and check the UV index each day to help plan activities accordingly.

Please heed EWG's warnings or at least do your own research. Protection from skin cancer is paramount. Don't take a chance with your health.



Benedetto's Summer Reading Challenge

Assemblyman Benedetto announced that the Assembly's annual Summer Reading Challenge is just around the corner. Every year, the Assembly partners with New York State libraries to encourage children to continue reading during the summer after the school year ends. Upon completion of the Summer Reading Challenge, children will receive a New York State Assembly Excellence in Reading Certificate.

"Learning shouldn't stop when the last bell rings at the

end of the school year," Assemblyman Benedetto said. "The Summer Reading Challenge offers a fun and exciting way for children of all ages to read, expand their imaginations and learn new things all year round."

To participate in the program, children must read by themselves or with a partner for a minimum of 15 minutes every day, for at least 40 days through the months of July and August. The days can be marked off on a provided calendar and submitted to Assemblyman Benedetto. Those who participate will be awarded a New York State Assembly Excellence in Reading Certificate during a presentation at the end of the summer. This year's Summer Reading Challenge theme is, "Every hero has a story."

"Reading is a fun, inexpensive and educational activity that can also provide quality family times," Assemblyman Benedetto said. "Fostering a love of reading in our children is a gift that will last for many years to come."

This year's Summer Reading Challenge themes are "Dig Into Reading" for children and "Beneath the Surface" for tweens. The challenge, while fun for the entire family, is a significant way to keep books in the hands of children throughout the summer months, noted Assemblyman Benedetto. The initiative helps combat the inevitable decrease in learning - known as the "summer slide" – that takes place when young people are not in school during the summer.

Unfortunately, the slide disproportionately affects children in high-need communities, where families may not have adequate out-of-school access to books and other educational resources.

Some thoughts on sleep and sleep disorders

ve been thinking a lot about sleep lately. It is a topic many complain about and discuss occasionally with friends and family, but it still remains a very mysterious topic to most people around the world.

After air, water, and food, sleep is probably the most essential thing in our lives to ensure our health and daily functioning. It bears repeating that almost all humans spend one third of their lives (25–30 years!) sleeping.

So why do we still know so little about this time when our brains and our bodies seem to turn off? What role does sleep play in our overall health? What role do dreams play in our psychological well being?

When I was a freshman in college, I took an introductory psychology class and the professor spent a lot of time teaching about sleep and its important relationship to our waking lives. He also assigned us to read a book by a famous Stanford sleep researcher Dr. William Dement called "Some Must Watch While Some Must Sleep." Out of the hundreds of books I read in college, that one still stands out as groundbreaking and ahead

There are more than 80 diagnosed "sleep disorders" according to the American Institute of Sleep, and many of them

can only be diagnosed in sleep laboratories where patients are wired up to electrodes all night to monitor their sleep and brain waves. The two best-known disorders are sleep apnea (constricting of breathing airwaves that leads to frequent arousals each night) and restless leg syndrome (an involuntary jerking of the leg which awakens those who suffer from it and their bedmates).

But sleep and its discontents is a much more multi-faceted problem and it seems to get worse each year despite the technological and medical progress we are making. In fact, technology has recently been discovered to be a new and onerous impediment to good sleep: the more "blue light" one is exposed to in the hours before sleep, the harder it is to fall asleep and this exposure to computer devices also negatively impacts the quality

Teenagers today, many of whom desperately need at least eight to nine hours of quality sleep each night, are tethered to their phones in bed, making our kids weary and less productive. Technology, the great advance of the late 20th century, which is supposed to make our lives better and easier, is actually in some ways an impediment to a healthier, quieter life.

In addition to technology, the major

advances in pharmaceutical drugs of the 20th century may also be a counterproductive element in our desire to lead healthier, better-rested lives. Rather than seek natural and behavioral fixes to our sleep problems, a growing percentage of Americans are resorting to quick fixes in pills. These may help in the short-term, but they can have significantly deleterious effects in the medium- to long-term. Chronic dependence, memory impairment, and other negative side effects are now being discovered in recent research about sleep medications.

More than 70 million Americans have chronic sleep problems and almost half get less than the recommended amount of sleep according to a recent Gallup survey. The amount of money spent each year on sleep related products - including specialized mattresses, white noise machines, apps that monitor your sleep, and a wide range of prescription and over-the-counter medications — is almost \$24 billion and growing.

What can we do to deal with this growing public health problem? First of all, we have to stop looking at sleep as a sign of weakness and prizing those who work so hard that they are chronically sleep deprived. We have to recognize that our teenagers need more sleep, and simple fixes like starting their school

day later will go a long way to help alleviate the problem. We must begin to educate people on the many ways they can help themselves get better nights of sleep through nutrition, sleep hygiene (no technology or television in the bedroom) and common sense approaches such as no food just before going to bed, no caffeine for at least 8 hours before sleep time, and keeping a regular sleep schedule even on weekends.

Now, if you'll excuse me, I need to hit the sack.

New York City Mayor de Blasio has been traveling from the confines of the Big Apple and his duties as chief executive of America's largest city to advocate for a nationwide progressive agenda.

As outlined in the Huffington Post, his priorities are:

- 1. Raise the federal minimum wage to \$15 per hour.
- 2. Reform the National Labor Relations Act to enhance workers' rights.
- 3. Pass comprehensive immigration reform.
- 4. Oppose trade deals that "move power to corporations at the expense of American jobs, workers' rights, and the environment.'
- 5. Pass national paid sick leave
- 6. Pass national paid family leave.
- 7. Make pre-K, after-school programs and child care universal
- 8. Expand the Earned Income Tax Credit.
- 9. Allow students to refinance student loan debt.
- 10. Close the carried interest loophole.
- 11. End tax breaks for companies that ship jobs over-
- 12. Implement the "Buffett Rule" so millionaires pay

their fair share.

13. Closing the CEO tax loophole that allows corporations to take advantage of 'performance pay' write-offs.

Noticeably absent in that list are key topics that should be the concern of a big city mayor, such as combatting local crime, reducing unemployment and easing traffic, all significant problems that should command his attention.

Murders in New York City are up 20% in 2015, according to the NYC Police Department. The city's 7.2% unemployment rate far exceeds the national level of 5.5%.

Two-thirds of student testtakers in grades 3 to 8 didn't meet state standards on the English language arts (ELA) and math tests. New York ranks fourth in traffic congestion.

And then there is the issue of taxes. In addition to New York State's already high taxes, the city itself imposes a personal income tax. As noted in Forbes, "Very few other U.S. cities assess individual income taxes and/or business income taxes. (Pennsylvania and Ohio have local school taxes on earned income but the rates are fairly low, except in Philadelphia.) Many investment advisers and pro-

fessionals moved their residences and businesses to Connecticut where the top tax rate is 6.5%, saving 10% of their highest-marginal income." If you own an unincorporated business, there is a special tax on that, too.

Some of the mayor's national ideas are harmful to his constituents. Allowing more illegal immigrants into the nation at a time of high unemployment places downward pressure on wages. Increasing the minimum wage encourages companies to move their operations overseas.

Emphasizing spending on 'progressive' issues at the expense of basic services such as having a sufficient number of police on patrol threatens to make municipalities unsafe. The residents of cities run by 'progressive' mayors are noticing.

Joel Gilbert, who researched cities run by progressives, described what he found in a WND interview: "In

...I met a lot of people living in horrible conditions, particularly African Americans, who I was surprised to learn were now staunch conservatives as a result of living in progressive-controlled cities like Detroit, Chicago and Newark," Gilbert said...After 60 years of progressive politics in their cities, they understood very clearly that they had not been progressing but rather regressing all this time, and they were mad."

Indeed, a recent Quinnipiac poll notes that de Blasio's overall approval ratings have dropped to 44%, a particularly low number considering his landslide victory in the last election.

Here is a breakdown of the ten cities with populations above 250,000 that have borne the brunt of long-term rule by progressives, as outlined by Frontpage: St. Louis's poverty rate is 26 percent overall; Newark, New Jersey's poverty rate is 26.1; The residents of Cincinnati, OH are afflicted by a poverty rate of 27.4 percent overall; Philadelphia, PA, 28 percent of city residents overall live in poverty; Milwaukee, WI sports a poverty rate of 29.9 percent overall; In Buffalo, NY, 29.9 my journey through America percent of residents overall

are living below the poverty level; El Paso, TX, one-in-four live in poverty; In Cleveland, OH, 36 percent of its residents live in poverty; And then, there is Detroit, MI, in a class by itself, with 36.2 percent of residents living in poverty; Camden, NJ rounds out the top ten, with a poverty rate of 42.5 percent.

The National Review notes that American cities "are by and large ...monopolies generally dominated by the socalled progressive wing ... The results have been catastrophic, and not only in poor black cities such as Baltimore and Detroit. Money can paper over some of the defects of progressivism in rich, white cities such as Portland and San Francisco, but those are pretty awful places to be nonwhite and non-rich, too:

Blacks make up barely 9 percent of the population in San Francisco, but they represent 40 percent of those arrested for murder, and they are arrested for drug offenses at ten times their share of the population."

t is the place you can grab a gallon of milk or a can of frosting at midnight, but is it possible it is also one of those amazingly New York things that, like Central Park, makes us all a little calmer and hap-

The bodega is what we're talking about today: That humble store, often as tall as it is wide, stocked with every item you didn't expect to find there. (Except you sort of did, or why'd you go there in the first place?)

Muffins mummified in cling wrap, plantain chips both salted and un, Hershey bars slightly reshaped by global (or at least store) warming — all these are staples at the typical mom-and-pop bodega.

But you can also find these staples — cheaper, bigger, less lumpy — at the local supermarket, which is often just a block or two further. So why would anyone patronize the dinky little deli when there is a bona fide grocery right across the

get out within 60 seconds. At the grocery everything has to be scanned and there are long lines. Somehow bodega cashiers always know what everything costs from memory.'

"You can send your kid to get milk without any wayward glances," adds another mom, Liz Gustafson.

There's also something of the scavenger hunt about the bodega. You go in there and think, "They can't possibly have a strawberry syrup." Or, "I don't want to go to the supermarket just for *one* package of onion soup mix." And then you look way, way, waaaaay up on the shelf — and there it is!

Maybe slightly past its sellby date. Maybe 29 cents more than at the grocery. But still.

But even beyond the speed and clown-car quality of being stuffed with a million items you can't believe all fit, there is another draw.

"The cat!" says Eileen Mul-

Well, yes, but beyond that, too. I'm talking about the twofooted friends. The people.

"I've run to my local bodegas to grab sodas or snacks a few times and realized I didn't have enough cash on me. And rather than run to the ATM and back, the owners — who know me as a regular — have let it go

with the promise that I'll bring back the full amount the next day," says Inwood's Jena Tesse Fox, a writer. "You can't do that in a supermarket."

'On Monday when I needed an avocado I went to get one at the bodega and the owner said, 'They're not so good, but they're he only ones we have today," reports social re-searcher Marla Sherman. She skipped the purchase, but that is the way bodega owners win hearts. They're on our side.

When I lived on 10th Street, I liked the bodega on Second Ave and 10th because they would feed snacks to Dooley — little pieces of turkey," says journalist Adrienne Press. Dooley was her basset hound.

Homemade food also lures us in. In the backroom or upstairs, some grandma is making pakoras, or tacos. I was in an East Elmhurst bodega the other day that sold homemade glazed fruit. And the smells are irresistible, too.

"At the bodega on my corner, they always seem to be making bacon," says lawyer Diane Glass. She keeps kosher, but it's not verboten to pass by

As the years go by and relationships deepen, the family bodega owners become our extended family, too.

"When my mom had a severe stroke, the owner of the local mini-market saw me through his window, walking home from the hospital in tears," marketing consultant Amanda Hass recalls. "It's a bit of a blur, but he made sure I had food. And, years later, he made the platters to feed folks after she died. He let me 'borrow' his best worker to help me move her belongings. Twice. So hell yeah, I don't mind paying a premium.'

When you live in a city where the people who sell you your gum also lend you money, love your dog, and see you through life's biggest transitions, you live in a city that cushions the slings and arrows of daily life.

Let us raise a cup of \$1 coffee, then, to the very best bodega in New York City.

The one down your block.



Wave Hill joins with its partners in the Fairfield Westchester Museum Alliance in presenting Seven Deadly Sins: Wrath-Force of Nature, one in a groundbreaking series of seven exhibitions taking place this summer. Each of seven cultural institutions explores one of the seven deadly sins, a favorite subject of painters and poets over the centuries.

This dense exhibition pictures a collective anxiety about the frequency and intensity of natural disasters-tsunamis, hurricanes, floods, droughts and forest fires-and climate change. It features 26 paintings and sculptures that showcase the ways in which artists respond to these catastrophes. The exhibition will be complemented by programs across the institution, especially on Sinful Weekend, Saturday and Sunday, August 8 and 9.

Underpinning the show is Wave Hill's interest in presenting work that contributes to the way we think about these disasters, and the conceptual and visual tools we need in order to make sense of, and, ultimately, cope with, an increas-

ingly precarious world. Building on a rich legacy of allegorical paintings depicting wrath over the centuries-a tradition that continues today-paintings take pride of place, rounded out with one sculpture and one installation. The works in the show, tightly hung to envelop the visitor, will fill Glyndor Gallery, a former Georgian Revival home situated on the southern slope of Wave Hill's property. The intensely beautiful, ordered character of the garden landscape offers a striking contrast to the subject of the work in

The 12 artists shown have a history of engagement with the subject of natural disaster. Alexis Rockman's monumental studies of the sky in vibrant motion neatly counterpoint the near-abstract small paintings of Brian Novatny, which suggest shipwrecks and collapsing bridges. Using collage as a way to patch together imagery, both Brian Adam Douglas and Tameka Norris focus on the human toll of disasters. Amer Kobaslija and Diane Burko have rigorously pursued the observation of landscape in distress, through plein-air studies and aerial perspective painting respectively. Anne Peabody contributes a baroque installation of scorched copper leaves, evoking a wildfire, while David Opdyke's broken telephone pole irrupts directly onto Wave Hill's pristine grounds. Angela Dufresne's virtuosic brushwork and Julie Heffernan's haunting imagery suggest people in retreat or standing courageously against a risk-filled world. And in the work of Kent Monkman and Jon Rappleye, the human figure is taken violently apart and reconstituted, using art-historical, botanical and cultural references.

Wrath-Force of Nature is curated by Director of Arts and Senior Curator Jennifer McGregor, Curator of Visual Arts Gabriel de Guzman and Curatorial Fellow David Xu Borgonjon.

Wave Hill's collaborators in this summer's series of exhibitions are The Aldrich Museum (Sloth), Bruce Museum (Pride), Hudson River Museum (Envy), **Hudson Valley Center for Contemporary** Art (Lust), Katonah Museum (Gluttony) and the Neuberger Museum (Greed).



This was the first time that one of our presenters, Tom Vasti, delivered his program in full period costume while discussing the various local road houses and speakeasies in the east Bronx. Mr. Vasti, vice president of the East Bronx History Forum used many images from his private collection to highlight the era of prohibition. In addition, Mr. Vasti selected movie footage from "Boardwalk Empire" to dramatize his point. Doris Roberts, of Everybody Loves Raymond, a local gal

When you see the name Doris Roberts, the first thing that comes to mind is Marie Barone, Ray's meddling mother, on the hit show "Everybody Loves Raymond."

The series ran from 1996 to 2005 and although she was supposed to be just a supporting character, to many viewers she was the star of the show. Roberts played the doting Italian housewife who spent much of her life in the kitchen or next door at her son's house. They were the two main ingredients that made the show a big hit and garnered four of the five Emmys received by Roberts. The other was for her portrayal of a homeless woman on 'St. Elsewhere.'

She was in far too many movies and television shows to enumerate them all here but among my favorites is Chevy Chase's "Christmas Vacation." She played the part of Frances Smith in that 1989 flick. She also played Jessie, the mayor's wife, in "The Taking of Pelham One Two Three" and I mention that film for its obvious Bronx connection.

She did love to cook and even co-authored a cookbook.

She is a fine actress and if you recall the episode of "Everybody Loves Raymond" where she took the whole family to Italy to visit her family, her dialogue was incredible. You would swear she spoke Italian all her life. But, Italian she was not. She was raised by her mother and grandparents in the typical Jewish household here in the Bronx where cream cheese and lox was far more likely to be served than lasagna.

Roberts was born on November 4, 1930 in St. Louis, Missouri but her father deserted the family so her mother, Ann Melzer, took her to the Bronx where they moved in with her mother who helped raise Doris in the Jewish faith. Her mother married Chester H. Roberts and Doris took her stepfather's last name.

Her parents ran the Z.L. Rosenfield Agency which was a stenographic service that

catered to the entertainment industry. It was, therefore, no mystery how Doris ended up in show business.

We should all be grateful that she chose acting over stenography or there would be one less star on Hollywood's Walk of Fame. Her pink terrazzo and brass star was unveiled on February 10, 2003 in front of 7001 Hollywood Boulevard. I haven't been to the Walk of Fame since 1967 at which time there were far fewer stars than exist today.

The first permanent star was installed on March 28, 1960 to honor director Stanley Kramer. Today there are about 2466 stars each weighing almost 300 pounds and about 10 million people now visit the site each year generally starting at Grauman's Chinese Theatre at 6935 Hollywood Boulevard.


By the way, every now and then someone decides to vandalize or even remove a

"You have an ideal situation with Ferry Point Park, located just minutes from downtown Manhattan and included with great views," said Jack Nicklaus. "It's an unbelievable golf course and I hope it's a great source of pride for New Yorkers and a special experience for those who visit."

The state of the art, 7,400-yard course, which is the first public course to open in New York City in more than 50 years, was developed by both Trump and Nicklaus, who took over the project after the original developer stepped down in 2011.

Prior to the golf course, this portion of Ferry Point Park was a landfill.

In 2016, a \$10 million clubhouse designed by architectural firm Hart-Howerton will greet golfers on their way to playing the course.





As soon as I saw Mills sit at the Knicks' desk I knew it was a lost cause.




Preston was leading by a run and four outs away from celebrating their first CHSAA Archdiocesan softball championship before everything changed on one bang-bang play.
